Some time back at my request you mailed me a pension blank for Mrs. Margaret A. Jones, 705 W. California St., Oklahoma City, widow of Gerome Liggett - See "A-7029 as widow of James Jones."

Gerome Liggett was an uncle of mine and enlisted in the Civil War from Lewisburg, Tennessee, county seat of Marshall County. Of course, I was quite young and can only remember he and my father coming home on a furlough, and took their cartridges out of their belts and putting them on a towel on the front porch. This is all I remember about it.

The situation is like this: There was one man living when Mrs. Jones took the matter up with me to find some one who could testify as to Uncle Gee Liggett's services in the army; this man by the name of Jim Ewing, who was on his death bed and in no condition to answer questions, except that he said he remembered that Gee Liggett was in the army; and within a few days he died.

So far as is known there is nobody living that can answer the questions on the questionnaire you sent to me. A daughter of Mrs. Scott Davis writes me that she finds in her mother's diary a notation that Gee Liggett was in the Civil War.

Could the information be gotten from Washington that would answer for the purpose of getting Mrs. Jones a pension?
