I do further state that I do not receive from any source whatever, money or other means of support amounting in value to the sum of \$180.00 per annum, nor do I own in my own right, nor does anyone hold in trust for my benefit or use, estate or property, either real, personal or mixed, either in fee or for life, of the value of One Thousand Dollars, household goods and wearing apparel excluded, nor do I receive any aid or pension from any other State or from the United States, or from any other source, and I do further state that the answers given to the following questions are true:



**INSTRUCTIONS.**

The applicant must fill in all the blanks in the application in a neat legible hand, and swear to its correctness before one of the County Board of Examiners, or some other officer authorized to administer an oath. The accompanying schedule of property must also be filled out and sworn to, both application and schedule of property must be filed with the Board of Examiners of the County. The affidavits for witnesses must also be filled out and sworn to by persons of personal knowledge as to the service and other matters contained in the blank affidavits for witnesses. It is not necessary that the witnesses be residents of the State, but they must have a personal knowledge of what they swear to. All applications not verified by the affidavit of two persons must be rejected. As the application will become an office record, they should be made out carefully and neatly.

The County Board of Examiners must have each applicant (who is not physically or mentally unable to appear), to appear before them, when they must examine the applicant orally as to all matters pertaining to his application; he must, if a male person be examined physically by the medical member of the Board, both oral and physical examination must be by the County Board reduced to writing, and forwarded with the application, affidavits and schedule of property, to the Auditor of the State, to be by him laid before the State Board of Examiners. Should an applicant be unable to appear and represent himself, the Board may take such measures as in their opinion may be necessary to satisfy themselves of the merits of the application. In such cases the full facts of the case must be set out in their written report and recommendation. If one or more limbs are lost, or the entire use thereof, or if the applicant is blind, this must be reported, and the applicant placed in the class he may justly belong. All persons who served in the "Militia, State Reserves or Home Guards of the State of Alabama" during the war between the States are eligible to relief under this Act. But service in the military organizations of other States does not qualify them,

Dear Madam:--

With reference to an increase in the amount of your pension will advise that all pensioners of the State of Oklahoma receive the same amount, \$2.50 per month and no more or less. There is no way by which we can increase or decrease this amount now, regardless of what the needs of some particular pensioner may be.

However, the legislature has appropriated more money for payment of pensions during the next fiscal year, and we are glad to inform you that all pensioners will be increased beginning with the payment to be made in October, 1917, at which time you will receive a warrant for exactly double the amount you are now receiving, which will make the October payment \$15.00, but your July payment, for which you have just filed claim, will be for the usual \$7.50. There is no way by which we can make any increase before October, and at that time the increase will be made without any request upon the part of the pensioner.


I have yours of the 7th. referring to the above and first wish to advise that this bank has never at any time discounted any state warrants and especially state pension warrants altho we have any number of times refused to pay out the money on them and see no reason wherein we are compelled to buy something we do not want.

Now with reference to this particular warrant Mr. Dill was in and We informed him that we were not buying state general funds warrants nor had not bought any since the numbers on same reached 100000 as we had our limit prior that time and as you know, by looking over the records for the past three years, state warrants of this number will be outstanding for some two years or more if paid then. We have a party or two that I think is buying state warrants at a discount possibly and I told Mr. Dill that under no condition would we buy the warrant but that I thought he could get the money on it at the discount he mentioned. I feel sure that he did discount this warrant to some one at appx. the figure he mentioned.

Since this matter has been mentioned we would like an expression from your office as to the objection (legal) to our or any bank discounting state paper and especially pension warrants. We are at liberty to buy government bonds at a discount or anything else at what it can be bought for and seems this paper would be no exception. Of course I understand that in giving any one something we expect to give it to some one who needs it or has earned it and expect them to get the full benefit from same, however if an individual can legally buy state pension warrants at a discount why should a bank be an exception?

I trust I have not been too sarcastic but seems to me banks in general are getting kicked from too many directions at once.
