

APPLICATION OF INDIGENT SOLDIER OR SAILOR OF THE CONFEDERACY FOR PENSION UNDER THE ACT OF FEBRUARY 25th, 1915

THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA,

County of Sequoyah

I, Thomas J. Nunn,

(Christian Name, Middle Initial and Surname)

do hereby make application to the Board of Pension Commissioners for a pension to be granted me under the Act passed by the Fifth Legislature of the State of Oklahoma, and approved February 25, 1915, on the following grounds:

I enlisted and served in the military service of the Confederate States during the war between the States of the United States, and that I did not desert the Confederate service, but during said war I was loyal and true to my duty, and never at any time voluntarily abandoned my post of duty in the said service; that I was honorably ~~XXXXXX~~ ~~XX~~ surrendered at Greensboro, North Carolina, in spring of 1865, after General Lee had surrendered at Appomatox.

(Give date and cause)

and I have been a bona fide citizen of this State for over twelve months prior to the passage and approval of the Pension Act, approved February 25, 1915. I do further state that I do not hold any National, State, city or county office which pays me a salary or fees of \$180.00 per annum, nor have I an income from any other employment, nor do I receive from any source whatsoever, money or other means of support amounting in value to the sum of \$180.00 per annum, nor do I own in my own right, nor does any one hold in trust for my benefit or use, nor does my wife own, nor does any one hold in trust for my wife, estate or property, either real, personal or mixed, either in fee or for life, of the assessed value of over One Thousand Dollars, household and wearing apparel excluded, nor do I receive any aid or pension from any other State or from any other source, and that I am not an inmate of the Confederate Home, or any other benevolent or penal institution, and I do further state that the answers given to the following questions are true:

1. What is your age? 82 April 4, 1915.
2. Where were you born? In Georgia, cant remember county.
3. How long have you resided in Oklahoma? 14 years.
4. In what county do you reside? Sequoyah
5. What is your postoffice address? Muldrow, Oklahoma.

6. Have you applied for a pension under the Confederate Pension Law and been rejected? If rejected, state when and where Never rejected. Have drawn pension in Arkansas.

7. What is your occupation, if able to engage in one? Not able to work.

8. What is your physical condition? Poor due to old age.

9. In what State was the command in which you served organized? Arkansas.

10. How long did you serve; give, if possible, the date of enlistment and discharge Enlisted in spring of '61 and served till the surrender in '65.

11. What was the letter of your Company, number of Regiment, Battalion or Battery Company 7th Arkansas regiment.

12. If transferred from one command to another, give time of transfer, name of command and time of service Company I of 6th & 7th, consolidated.

13. What branch of the service did you enlist in, infantry, cavalry, artillery or navy? Infantry.

14. If commissioned direct by the President, what was your rank and line of duty? Not commissioned.

15. If detailed for special service, under the law of conscription, what was the nature of your service and how long did you serve? Volunteered.

16. What is the assessed value of your home, if you own a home? Have no home.

17. What is the assessed value of your other property? No property.

18. Have you ever transferred your property to anyone with the understanding that you were to be cared for during your life time? No.

19. Have you transferred to others any property of any kind for the purpose of becoming beneficiary under this law? No.



You have been granted a pension under the Act providing pensions for Confederate soldiers, sailors and their widows, and you will receive the sum of \$2.50 per month, payable quarterly, in the months of Jan., April, July and Oct., upon the execution of a quarterly claim for each quarter, blank for which purpose will be sent to your permanent address twenty days before the end of each quarter. At the top of this certificate is a number. This is your PENSION NUMBER, which you MUST PLACE ON EVERY LETTER OR PAPER YOU SEND TO THIS OFFICE, WITHOUT EXCEPTION. (Don't fail in this particular.)

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INSTRUCTIONS · -- IMPORTANT INFORMATION · -- READ CAREFULLY

1. The Pension Board meets the 1st Monday in Jan., April, July and Oct. (Warrants are mailed out about the 15th of those months.)
2. If you do not receive quarterly claim blank by the 20th of Dec., March, June or Sept., respectively, or your warrant within two weeks from DATE OF BOARD MEETING, advise us of that fact.
3. ALL PENSION PAPERS MUST BE MADE OUT AND SIGNED WITH PEN AND INK WITHOUT EXCEPTION, and promptly returned -- by next mail.
4. Failure to follow in every detail all the instructions printed on the Back of the Quarterly Claim may cause the loss of your payment. (Read said instructions every time and follow them exactly)
5. Your name must always be signed and spelled EXACTLY as it is at the top hereof, and in the heading of each quarterly claim, omitting or adding nothing. No exception to this rule.
6. All signatures "by mark" must be witnessed by the signatures of two witnesses, the mark must be in evidence, made with pen and ink, and designated "his mark" or "her mark."
7. Permanent removal from this state, OR temporary absence therefrom for a period of six months, cancels your pension, under the law.
8. When you are temporarily away from home, have someone call for your mail and forward it to you. Don't ask for frequent changes of address, as the Board declines to make temporary changes.
9. As quarterly claims are sent out as "3d Class Mail" you must furnish your Postmaster additional postage for forwarding same.
10. All banks that have deposits of State Funds are required by the State Treasurer to cash these warrants at face value, without discount. Don't take less than face value for your warrant, but write us, giving the name of bank refusing to cash warrants.
11. Receipt card enclosed with your warrant must be executed by YOU PERSONALLY, as per printed instructions thereon, and mailed to this office the same day you receive warrant or payment of such warrant will be stopped here at this office.
12. Any deviation from these instructions or any omissions, will constitute sufficient grounds for cancellation of your pension.
