

Application of Indigent Soldier or Sailor of the Confederacy for Pension under the Act of February 25th, 1915

I,

J. D. Brunley - enlisted as Jasper Brunley

do hereby make application to the Board of Pension Commissioners for a pension to be granted me under the Act passed by the Fifth Legislature of the State of Oklahoma, and approved February, 25, 1915, on the following grounds:

I enlisted and served in the military service of the Confederate States during the war between the States of the United States, and that I did not desert the Confederate service, but during said war I was loyal and true to my duty, and never at any time voluntarily abandoned my post of duty in the said service; that I was honorably discharged or surrendered

at Chattanooga Tenn in Aug or Sept 1864 + was prisoner until close of war + then paroled at Anderson

(Give date and cause)

and I have been a bona fide citizen of this State for over twelve months prior to the passage and approval of the Pension Act, approved February 25, 1915. I do further state that I do not hold any National, State, city or county office which pays me a salary or fees of \$180.00 per annum, nor have I an income from any other employment, nor do I receive from any source whatsoever, money or other means of support amounting in value to the sum of \$180.00 per annum, nor do I own in my own right, nor does any one hold in trust for my benefit or use, nor does my wife own, nor does any one hold in trust for my wife, estate or property, either real, personal or mixed, either in fee or for life, of the assessed value of over One Thousand Dollars, household goods and wearing apparel excluded, nor do I receive any aid or pension from any other State or from any other source, and that I am not an inmate of the Confederate Home, or any other benevolent or penal institution, and I do further state that the answers given to the following questions are true:

7. What is your occupation, if able to engage in one? farming

8. What is your physical condition? Health failing rapidly - heart trouble

9. In what State was the command in which you served organized? Texas

10. How long did you serve; give, if possible, the date of enlistment and discharge enlisted in Sept 1862 & was paroled at close of war

11. What was the letter of your Company, number of Regiment, Battalion or Battery Co. K 48 Tennessee Infantry

12. If transferred from one command to another, give time of transfer, name of command and time of service never transferred

13. What branch of the service did you enlist in, infantry, cavalry, artillery or navy? Infantry

14. If commissioned direct by the President, what was your rank and line of duty? Only a private

15. If detailed for special service, under the law of conscription, what was the nature of your service and how long did you serve? no

16. What is the assessed value of your home, if you own a home? never owned



Answering your inquiry of September 15th relative to a burial claim for Confederate Pensioners wish to advise that no such claim is allowed excepting that the family of a deceased pensioner is entitled to use the last warrant issued, to ^{be} applied on burial expenses.

In the case of Mr. Brumley, who died on August 21st, we have arranged to have the warrant issued in Mr. Brumley's name - on his claim for this present quarter, and let the widow cash it; then have the widow apply in her own name, as is our usual procedure in such cases, and grant her a pension effective October 1, 1926. We were under the impression that Mrs. Orville Sneed, who recently notified us of Mr. Brumley's death and who advised that the widow was sending in her application, had already attended to this matter, but as she has not done so to date we herewith enclose an application blank and will be grateful to you if you will have it executed and returned at once by Mrs. Brumley.

As to the transfer, the date of marriage has no effect on the pensions of those already on our roll.
