The records show that Malcom Hussy (name not found as Malcom Huzza), private, Company B, 62d Virginia Mounted Infantry, Confederate States Army, was enlisted October 26, 1862. On the roll of the company for November and December, 1864, last on file, he was reported present. No later record of him has been found.

It is proper to add that a further search of the records will be made, if desired, upon the receipt of specific data as to the date and place of his capture, and the circumstances in connection with his confinement and release from Camp Chase, Ohio. If service was rendered in any other organization it should be so stated.

Dear Mr. Matthews:

I am enclosing herewith application of Malcom Huzza for a place on the Confederate Pension Roll. You will note that the blanks for affidavits of two comrades as to service are not filled. In lieu of that, I attach the credentials with which this applicant gained admission to the Confederate Home several years ago, or rather a copy thereof, handed to me by Capt. Harris, Supt. of the Home. This for the reason that since the time these credentials were gotten up, this old man's comrades have died, so that at this time he is unable to produce affidavits other than those which gained him entrance to the Home.

I trust that you can receive the credentials admitting him to the Home as a substitute for the affidavits, and suggest that in case of doubt about the copy, that you communicate with Capt. Harris, who will certify as to the authenticity thereof.

This old man was discharged from the Home, and later instituted some suits against the Trustees, but I told him that he would be wiser to drop such matters and secure a pension and dismiss these actions. This I expect to do. He is really very much in need, earning a short of semi-existence by mending old umbrellas about town. I hope that he can secure the pension.



An old Confederate soldier, Malcolm Huzza, formerly an inmate of the Confederate Home here, wishes to make application for enrollment on the Confederate Pension Roll. He has been out of the Confederate Home for about four years, and during that time the death of old veterans has intervened so that he would not be able to get up anew the proper credentials for placing him on the Pension Roll. The papers and credentials, however, upon which he was admitted to the Confederate Home, are still at the Home. I therefore, at the suggestion of the office of Hon. D.M. Hailey, write to ask whether those papers upon which admission to the home was formerly had, will be sufficient showing for placing him upon the pension roll, and if so, will you advise me how to proceed to have him so placed on the roll.
