Before me, Stye Reed, a Notary Public in and for Bryan county, Oklahoma, on this the 10 day of April, 1925, personally appeared Dave Allison, who being by me first duly sworn, says on his oath that he is now a resident of Bryan county, Oklahoma and that he has been a resident of Bryan county, Oklahoma for the past 3 years and that he has been a resident of what is now the state of Oklahoma for the past 3 years; ~~and~~

He says on his oath that he was born in ^{Dade} ~~White~~ county, ^{Georgia} ~~Tennessee~~ and that thereafter he lived in Warren county, Tennessee. He says that he well remembers the Civil War which began in 1861 and ended in 1865, and that within his personal knowledge, James Madison Nunley was a soldier in the Confederate Army and that he enlisted in the service about September or October, 1863 and remained in the service until the surrender of the Confederate forces in 1865.

Affiant says that it is particularly within his knowledge that he saw the said James Madison Nunley just after a battle was fought at Pikeville, Bledsoe County, Tennessee, and that the said James Madison Nunley, in company with his Captain, Alex Sanders, was in refuge at a point in Van Buren county, Tennessee, about eight miles from Spencer, and that the said James Madison Nunley and the said Captain Alex Sanders were cut off from their command. He says on his oath that he well remembers that the said Captain Alex Sanders was at that time bearing a fresh wound in his mouth and jaws; that the said Captain Alex Sanders, James Madison Nunley and one Kelsey Levan and a man named Murphy, were together. Affiant says that he went to the above mentioned soldiers to bring them food and that they, and each one of them, were then in Confederate uniforms. He further says on his oath that to the best of his information and belief they afterwards rejoined the Confederate command.

Affiant further says that the said James Madison Nunley is a son of Archie Nunley (Nunnelly) and a first cousin of General Nunley (Nunnelly) and Riley Nunley (Nunnelly), who were privates in Company E of the

16th Tennessee Regiment.

He says on his oath that he was born in ^{marion} ~~White~~ county, Tennessee and that thereafter he lived in Warren county, Tennessee. He says that he well remembers the Civil War, and that within his personal knowledge James Madison Nunley was a soldier in the Confederate Army, having been sixteen years of age at the time of the last conscription, and going under the command of Captain Alex Sanders at that call to arms and serving until the surrender of the Confederate forces. Affiant further says that he has knowledge of the different members of the Nunley (or Nunnelly) family which lived in Warren county, Tennessee during the time of the Civil War, and that James Madison Nunley (or Nunnelly) is a son of Archie Nunnelly and a first cousin of General and Riley Nunnelly, who were privates in Company E of the 16th Tennessee Regiment.

Affiant says that he remembers going in company with his older brother, Dave Allison, to a place in Van Buren county, Tennessee, about eight miles from Spencer, just after a battle was fought at Pikeville, Bledsoe county, Tennessee, where Captain Alex Sanders and three of his company, the said James Madison Nunley, Kelsey Levan and one Murphy, were cut off from their command and were in hiding, and that he and his brother carried food to these men, who were then in Confederate uniform and that Captain Sanders was suffering with a wound in his mouth, and Levan was wounded in his thigh.
