

## About the Data:



## Monthly Sales Subject to Tax:

From January 1980 to July of 2008, the Cleveland County WIA has experienced consistent and positive growth. Annual sales subject to tax have increased from \$455.75 million in 1980 to \$2.130 billion in 2007. That equates to an increase of over 367%. During the same time period the rate of inflation increased by 158%.


## Workforce:

Between 1990 and 2007 the Cleveland County WIA experienced consistent and positive growth. The WIA did, though, experience a slight downturn between 1999 and 2000. Between 1990 and 2007 the Cleveland County WIA increased its average annual workforce from 95,078 to 118,140, an increase of 24.26%.

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
## Workforce:

The Cleveland County WIA's average annual unemployment rate between 1990 and 2007 remained below both the statewide and national average. The Cleveland County WIA's average annual unemployment rate between 1990 and 2007 was 3.38%. During that same time period the national average annual unemployment rate was 5.4%, or 59.76% higher than the Cleveland County WIA's.


## Per Capita Personal Income:

The Cleveland County WIA's per capita personal income has realized a positive increase between the years of 1986 and 2006. The Cleveland County WIA's per capita personal income increased somewhat more rapidly between 1996 and 2006 than it had between 1986 and 1995. The per capita personal income increased 139.22% between 1986 and 2006, equivalent to \$18,496. During the same time period inflation increased 83.94%, allowing the Cleveland County WIA to outpace inflation by 65.86%.

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
## Per Capita Personal Income:

Between 1986 and 2006 the Cleveland County WIA's per capita personal income was nearly identical to that of the state average. Though each area followed a similar trend, the Cleveland County WIA's per capita personal income was on average \$125 less than the statewide average.



## Average Annual Salary:

Between the years 2001 and 2007 the Cleveland County WIA followed the statewide and national trend in average annual salaries. The Cleveland County WIA's average annual salary trailed the statewide average annual by approximately \$4,320 during that same time period. The Cleveland County WIA's average annual salary increased from \$24,457 in 2001 to \$30,171 in 2007. This is an increase of 23.36% or \$5,714.

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
## Total Wages Paid Annually:

Total wages paid annually has increased rapidly between 2001 and 2007 for the Cleveland County WIA. In 2001, employers paid a payroll of \$1.5 billion. By 2007, that figure had increased to \$2.263 billion. This equates to a 50.87% increase in total wages paid.

The Cleveland County WIA's total annual wages paid for 2007 was \$2.263 billion. The Cleveland County WIA contributed 4% of the state's total annual wages paid in 2007. The total annual wages paid in Oklahoma in 2007 was \$54.47 billion dollars.


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Number of Business Establishments in the Cleveland County WIA 2001-2007




## Number of Business Establishments:
