GARRETT, COPPEDGE ADDRESS GOALS 2000

■(GIT) State Superintendent of Public Instruction Sandy Garrett and Dr. Floyd Coppedge, education secretary, went before the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Education Monday. The two education leaders addressed Goals 2000: Educate America Act, the federal program that stands to grant Oklahoma over \$5.5 million in educational assistance funding.

The program, signed by President Clinton in March of 1994, includes \$1,153,998 in first-year planning and technology grants. Oklahoma was approved for these funds in September of 1994. In September of 1995, the state was approved for additional second-year funds totaling \$4,396,613.

First-year funds must be spent no later than September 30, 1996, with members of an appointed advisory panel showing "substantial progress" with those funds by June 30. Second-year funds will depend on the panel's progress. To date, Gov. Frank Keating has yet to make his appointments to this panel, putting those funds in jeopardy, Garrett said.

Keating said in a November 21 letter to Garrett that the council should be limited to 20

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members, ten appointed by him and ten appointed by Garrett. "I will direct my staff to move expeditiously to name my appointees to this panel so that our efforts can get underway soon," he said in the letter.

"We may lose the first year funding if we don't make those allocations pretty soon," Garrett said. "We need this money in Oklahoma — if we don't get it, somebody else will spend it."

Coppedge blamed the governor's failure to make the appointments on concerns surrounding federal requirements. "There has been a further delay in getting that done, as the governor checks to see if there are any federal controls that we can't have."

In a statement last week from Keating Communication Director Dan Mahoney, "Our concern, of course, is it [Goals 2000] will come with federal strings attached like so many federal programs do. If that is the case, and it means federal intrusion into Oklahoma's public schools, the governor will not support it."

Mahoney said Keating was in consultation with other governors, some of who turned away the federal funds. "We want to make sure that we keep federal hands off our education system and until we know the details, we aren't going to go rushing for this money," he said. "We don't want some sort of national education curriculum."

"There are a lot of governors who support the concept of Goals 2000," Garrett said. "George Bush of Texas, for example — they are in their second year." Garrett said conversations with U.S. Education Secretary Richard Riley have assured her there are no further federal requirements.

"Who would we request to state that there are no further requirements on these funds," asked Sen. Don Williams, D-Balko, committee chairman. "How do you go beyond Secretary Riley?"

If received, Garrett, Coppedge and Keating all agree that the funds could be used to improve the reading, writing, math and science skills of the state's teachers.

"Do we not need this money for core teacher preparation," asked Sen. Penny Williams, D-Tulsa. "To me it is just mind boggling that we are about to turn away money that we desperately need. Why would we want to turn down six million dollars?"

"We have received nothing," Garrett said. "We can access the money when the panel is in place."

114 STATE EMPLOYEES COULD BE FURLOUGHED AS A RESULT OF BUDGET SHORTFALLS AT THE CORPORATION COMMISSION

■(GIT) General Administrator for the Corporation Commission, Jay Edwards, told members of the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Natural Resources and Regulatory Services that without supplemental funding, the Commission would have to shut down the Oil and Gas Conservation Division for 23 days. A move that would furlough the division's 114 employees.

Currently, Edwards said the Commission is \$1,278,396 in the red. These losses, Edwards attributed to revenue shortfalls in the Indemnity Fund and a fall off in excise tax from gross production.

Edwards said the governor recommended an increase of \$500,000, however, that was before the shortfall from gross production. If the agency receives what the governor recommended plus \$278,000 to make up for the loss in gross production, Edwards said the Commission could survive.

Edwards said he will most likely know within two weeks of the Legislature's and the Governor's decision. "I am hopeful the Commission will receive the supplemental funding," he said.

REGIONAL MANAGERS TO KEEP THEIR JOBS, DEPARTMENT CALLING FOR ELIMINATION OF CLERICAL POSITIONS

■(GIT) Representatives from the State Tourism and Recreation Department said they would not eliminate the State's Regional Offices, however, they will redirect the clerical functions of those offices. Members of the Senate Tourism and Recreation Committee heard the proposed plan from Executive Director of the Tourism and Recreation Department, Ed Cook.

Today, Cook said the elimination of the ten clerical positions would give an added \$300,000 directly to maintenance. Maintenance for the state's 53 parks has an annual budget of approximately \$700,000.

Cook explained the plan to committee members. The ten employees currently in clerical positions at the regional facilities would remain with the department. The positions will be eliminated through attrition. The four regional managers would remain at their posts in the four quadrants outlining the state, along with park superintendents. "We are not going to lay off anyone," Cook said.

In fact, Cook explained that the department was in the process of modernizing equipment for those facilities and has completed necessary employee training for those systems. "Regional managers will report directly to the Oklahoma City administration office."

Earlier during Interim, Sen. Gene Stipe, D-McAlester, told Cook he was concerned about calls he had received on the matter. "This way we will not have senators and representatives scattered around the state taking care of complaints from people that think all regional offices are going to close," Cook said.

In the last five years, Cook said the department has saved money by increasing fees and through the process of attrition. "The maintenance situation is critical. If we do not do something, we will not be able to maintain our parks," he said.

WORKERS' COMPENSATION BILL RECEIVES AMENDMENTS ON HOUSE FLOOR

■(GIT) HB2430, a workers' compensation bill amending language pertaining to workers' compensation, received an amendment by Rep. Don Kinnamon, D-Stroud, stating that the burden of proof for any claim for compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act shall be on the employee. "The burden of proof for accidental injuries arising out of and in the course of employment shall be preponderance of the evidence."

The bill also states that injury from combat that occurs in the workplace and injuries sustained while under the intoxication of drugs or alcohol shall not be compensated.

Rep. Al Sadler, D-Ardmore, questioned the intent of Kinnamon's amendment. "Are you saying if a guy picks up a two-by-four and starts attacking me, there is nothing I can do," he asked Kinnamon.

Kinnamon said if the injury was not work related, the company would not be liable for the costs.

The amendment passed 74 to 20.

Rep. Bill Smith, D-Ringling, proposed an amendment that would make mediation the mandated first choice for both parties before going to court. However, if the claim could not be

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rectified through mediation, court would be the alternative. He told members that the case load in Washington was reduced by 30 percent due to a similar law.

Rep. Chris Hastings, R-Tulsa, proposed an amendment to the amendment to "clear up Smith's amendment." The amendment states that a person injured on the job should receive treatment before the mediation.

"Is this an attorney amendment," asked Rep. Dan Webb, R-Oklahoma City. No one responded to Webb's question.

An amendment by the bill's author, Rep. Bill Settle, D-Muskogee, stated that the Insurance Commissioner shall provide a plan to jump-start the pilot program for 24-hour care coverage by January 1998.

Rep. James Hager, D-Pawhuska, proposed an amendment that would not allow insurance companies to retroactively assess employers regardless of past status.

Hager's amendment was tabled.

The bill passed with an unanimous vote of 101 to 0.

HOUSE HEARS WORKPLACE AND EMPLOYEES PROTECTION ACT

"This bill just gives employers more ways to protect their employees," Askins said.

As the bill was up for discussion, Rep. William Graves, R-Oklahoma City, offered an amendment that would specifically include abortion clinic employees to be protected during peaceful protests.

The measure passed with a vote of 98-2.

BARBER BILL GETS SECOND CHANCE

■(GIT) In session, members voted to reconsider HB2550 by Rep. Mark Seikel, D-Harrah. The measure applies to professions and occupations and creates the Oklahoma Barbers' Regulation Act. The need for the Act and certain of its provisions had been questioned by members in a prior session. The bill was debated again today on the House floor.

Rep. Frank R. Davis, R-Guthrie, asked Seikel why he wanted to create another agency. "I got a haircut this Saturday and my barber said he did not know a thing about this barber bill," he said. "How many boards and commissions do we have anyway?"

Davis challenged members by asking if anyone could tell him exactly how many boards and commissions are regulated by the Legislature in Oklahoma. He added, that if anyone could give him the number he would "gladly" vote for the bill. No one could.

Seikel argued the mere reason that Davis's barber did not know about the act, was the reason for its need. "Barbers need to know that the state regulates them," he said.

"This is more than getting a haircut... it is getting good dialogue between them (the barbers) and the state," Seikel said. "The only people who will be upset is our good friends at the State Health Department, who currently receive fees to regulate barbers."

The measure passed with a vote of 58 to 41. It will now go to the Senate for further consideration.

MARTIN AMENDMENT TO SUSPENDED SENTENCE BILL FAILS

■(GIT) "You have bypassed the committee process," said Sen. Herb Rozell, D-Tahlequah, to Sen. Carol Martin, R-Comanche. The comment came in response to Martin's amendment to SB1231, by Sen. Bruce Price, D-Hinton, dealing with suspended sentences. Originally an unheard bill before the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Public Safety and Judiciary, the amendment was brought to the floor, drawing criticism for Martin. It would create county farm work programs as a form of alternative sentencing.

"The problem I have with this is money," Rozell said. "Where are you going to get the money to pay for this?" The measure states funding for the program "shall be subject to the availability of funds from the county, state, or a combination of both the county and the state."

Questioning the necessity for the bill, Sen. Keith Leftwich, D-Okla. City, said judges are capable of sentencing prisoners to similar community sentencing programs without the measure. "Why not come forward with a resolution endorsing this," he asked.

"My concern is we are about to saddle the state with more pressure to build more and more prisons," said Sen. Ben Brown, D-Okla. City. "I am hesitant to add to that burden." Brown said the money would be better spent on prevention and treatment rather than incarceration. "My understanding is that eighty-five percent of the people that come through DOC [Department of Corrections] programs have drug and alcohol problems."

Senate Majority Leader, Billy Mickle, D-Durant, said the bill was not specific to types of crimes, allowing for violent criminals to be placed into programs with less than maximum security supervision. "Your bill is not specific."

"We are going to have seventy-seven little miniature, tiny prisons," Mickle said. "We should never yield our discretion in lieu of political expediency."

With a vote of 16 to 25, a nearly straight party-line vote, the amendment failed. The bill, "gutted" of most of its language, with its emergency clause, passed with a vote of 41 to 0. It will now go to the House for consideration.

EXECUTION VIEWING BILL RECEIVES MINOR DISCUSSION

■(GIT) HB2056, authored by Rep. Wayne Pettigrew, R-Edmond, proposed a bill Monday that would provide a place within the walls of the state prison for immediate family members of the victim to watch those convicted of the capital crime die.

Pettigrew explained to members that a room set up with a closed circuit monitor will serve as the viewing area. Rep. William Paulk, D-Okla. City, expressed concern and asked Pettigrew if there would be any copies of the video or if the viewing process would be "live."

Pettigrew assured Paulk and other members that the purpose of the closed circuit television was to block the efforts of others who might want to view the video.

House Speaker Pro Tempore, Jim Glover, D-Elgin, asked Pettigrew how many people could fit in the viewing area. He expressed a concern that family members would be limited.

Pettigrew explained that immediate family members defined by the bill mean the spouse, a child by birth or adoption, a stepchild, a parent, a grandparent or sibling of the deceased victim.

The measure passed with a vote of 98 to 2. It will now go to the Senate for further consideration.

TRAFFIC-CONTROL DEVICE TAMPERING BILL TO INCLUDE TRAFFIC CITATION

■(GIT) Monday in session, members agreed to amend HB2078, dealing with tampering with traffic-control devices to include failure to yield to the right-of-way when exiting a subdivision. The bill, authored by Rep. Tommy Thomas, D-Atoka, is an attempt punish those who willfully deface, knockdown, injure, alter or remove any road sign or marker posted in Oklahoma.

The act would be a misdemeanor and punishment would be a fine of up to \$100 or imprisonment in the county jail for a 30 day term, or both.

Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore, amended the bill to include rules adopted for subdivisions. In particular, a rule that could warrant a traffic citation if, when an individual is exiting a subdivision, they do not yield the right-of-way.

Rep. Jack Begley, D-Goodwell, asked if youths attending college up in the Oklahoma panhandle would be subject to the bill. "Sometimes they just borrow the signs," he told Thomas.

Thomas said that he understood that the panhandle had their own set of rules, but in his county, it would be illegal.

The bill passed unanimously. It will now be heard in the Senate for further consideration.

NATURAL GAS BILLING BY A ROLL OF THE DICE

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) A note on my Oklahoma Natural Gas (ONG) bill for February says my gas bill has been "adjusted" 66 cents for temperature that was three percent warmer than normal. What that explanation doesn't say is that "adjusted" means "increased."

This confusing note varies on customer bills because ONG is divided into 13 "temperature" regions inside Oklahoma.

The statement on each of our bills about temperature results from ONG rate case No. PUD-477. In that rate case, the Corporation Commission, on June 19, 1995, approved a "temperature adjustment clause" on our bills based on National Weather Service data spanning the latest 30-year period.

In other words, we now pay according to temperature averaged over the last 30 years. Specifically, our monthly gas usage is adjusted based on what the temperature for the month would have been if it were normal (average).

If the actual temperature is colder than normal, we win because we pay less; but if the actual temperature is warmer than normal, we lose because we pay more.

That win-lose game is stacked!

The global atmosphere is getting warmer. Although scientists disagree on why we're experiencing global warming, they predict an increase in the average global temperature of one-to-six degrees during the next century. Also, scientists agree that the earth's surface temperature rose about one degree during the last century.

Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore, filed House Bill 2926 this session to "solve" the temperature adjustment problem for his complaining constituents. His bill requires that ONG be more specific about how the temperature adjustment amount is calculated.

I amended Steidley's bill to say that customers have the right to pay for actual usage.

Seems to me that getting rid of the adjusted usage based on temperature would solve the problem, at least for ONG customers.

STUDY SAYS EDUCATION FUNDING LAGS, OKLAHOMA STILL IN BOTTOM TEN AFTER ADJUSTMENT

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Even when it is adjusted to reflect the state's low cost of living, Oklahoma common education funding still lags far behind most other states, according to a new study released today.

"We know we can stretch a dollar farther in Oklahoma, but we can't stretch it far enough to make our public schools competitive at the present funding levels," said Senator Don Williams, chairman of the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Education. "This study confirms that we have to invest more money into common education, specifically into the classroom."

The study conducted by the Center for the Study of States adjusted per pupil common education expenditures to reflect each state's respective cost of living. Although Oklahoma's national ranking on K-12 education investment improves slightly when adjusted for cost of living, the state does not rise out of the country's bottom ten.

For example, Oklahoma rose from 43rd to 42nd in per pupil expenditures adjusted for cost of living. In the region, Colorado (27th), Kansas (25th), Missouri (30) and Texas (31) all invest more cost of living adjusted dollars in common education.

In a dollar to dollar comparison, for example, Texas invests \$600 dollars more per child than Oklahoma while Kansas invests \$900 more per child.

"Graduates in Texas and Kansas are going to have an advantage over our students because

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they have better resources available to them," said Senator Williams. "We need to level the playing field for our kids."

"The states we are competing with are investing more money on education and as a result, have higher per capita personal incomes. The only way we are going to match their personal income levels is by investing in education."

According to the study, the six states with the highest per capita personal income ranking also have the highest per pupil expenditure ranking.

The six states (including Oklahoma) with the lowest personal income ranking also rank the lowest in per pupil expenditures.

Oklahoma's per capita personal income is 81 percent. When adjusted for cost of living, it rises to 98.1 percent.

"Our low cost of living helps make us more competitive, but it doesn't take us as far as we need to go in education," said Senator Williams. "We're still in the bottom ten no matter how you look at the numbers, and that's unacceptable from both an education and economic development standpoint."

The Senate leadership is advocating a plan that would invest an additional \$83 million in common education and institute important new reforms as well.

The Senate education package, SB1100, calls for deregulation and public school choice. It also includes funding for new classroom technology, teacher training and performance incentives among other things. Teachers' retirement and midterm funding is being addressed in separate legislation.

"We want to invest money directly into the classroom where it will do the most good," said Senator Williams.

Governor Keating has proposed an alternative program for common education, but it contains very little money for actual classroom expenses. Of the new funding proposed for common education in the executive budget, only \$3.1 million would be placed into the funding formula that benefits the classroom budgets of all schools.

The lion's share of the funding would go to retirement, midterm adjustments and miscellaneous education programs. The largest budget item, \$48 million for midterm, would benefit only a few eligible schools. Two-thirds of Oklahoma schools, those that do not qualify for midterm, would not receive a single dollar.

Of the 550 Oklahoma school districts, only 202 qualified for midterm funding in the 1994-95 school year. Under the present midterm formula, 30 districts would receive almost half of the \$48 million dollars in new funding proposed by Governor Keating.

"I think our plan is the best on the table right now because it places the most emphasis on the classrooms in all of our public schools," said Senator Williams.

The full Senate is expected to vote on SB1100 this week, possibly as early as tomorrow.

LAND CLASSIFICATION BILL HELPS HUNTING PRESERVES

From Department of Wildlife

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) A bill currently making its way through the legislative process would benefit landowners who have created hunting or nature preserves on their property or are considering doing so. Specifically, the bill would make sure there is not a tax penalty to convert agricultural land to a hunting or nature preserve.

Senate Bill 1004, by Don Williams of Balco, would, for ad valorem tax purposes, specify that agriculture land that has been converted to a nature or hunting preserve would retain its previous classification as agriculture.

"Agricultural land is valued differently than other commercial-use land and the purpose of

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this bill is to make sure landowners are not penalized and that they can keep that agricultural valuation if they convert their land to a hunting or nature preserve," said Williams.

Williams said that he decided to introduce this legislation after looking at how the issue was handled in Texas.

"They had to pass a constitutional amendment to do this in Texas, so I thought I should look into the situation in Oklahoma," he said. "I don't want the tax issue to discourage landowners from converting agricultural land to hunting or nature preserves and that's why I'm bringing this bill."

Senate Bill 1004 was debated and passed by the Senate on Feb.27. The bill now goes to the House of Representatives.

PROSTATE DISEASE TRIAL TO STUDY 3,000

From U.S. Department of Health & Human Services

■(WASHINGTON) The largest and longest study to test whether drugs can stop noncancerous prostate growth is recruiting 3,000 men at 17 centers, the National Institutes of Health (NIH) announced today.

The Medical Therapy of Benign Prostatic Hyperplasia (BPH) Trial will test whether the oral drugs finasteride (Proscar) and doxazosin (Cardura) will prevent further growth of the prostate that might require more expensive treatment such as surgery.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration approved finasteride in 1992 and doxazosin in 1995

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to relieve the symptoms of BPH. "These drugs can relieve the symptoms in many men over the short-term.

But we don't know if they only postpone, or can actually prevent, the need for surgery or other treatment down the road," says John McConnell, M.D., a urologist at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center in Dallas and chairman of the study.

BPH is an expensive disease. About 7.5 million men have BPH, with about 250,000 men needing prostate surgery each year. All forms of treatment for BPH cost an estimated \$5 billion each year, and as the U.S. population ages, these costs will increase.

"By the year 2000, the number of men over 50 will have increased by 25 percent, and we estimate that about 9 million men will have symptoms of BPH," says Steven Kaplan, M.D., a trial physician at Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center in the New York City.

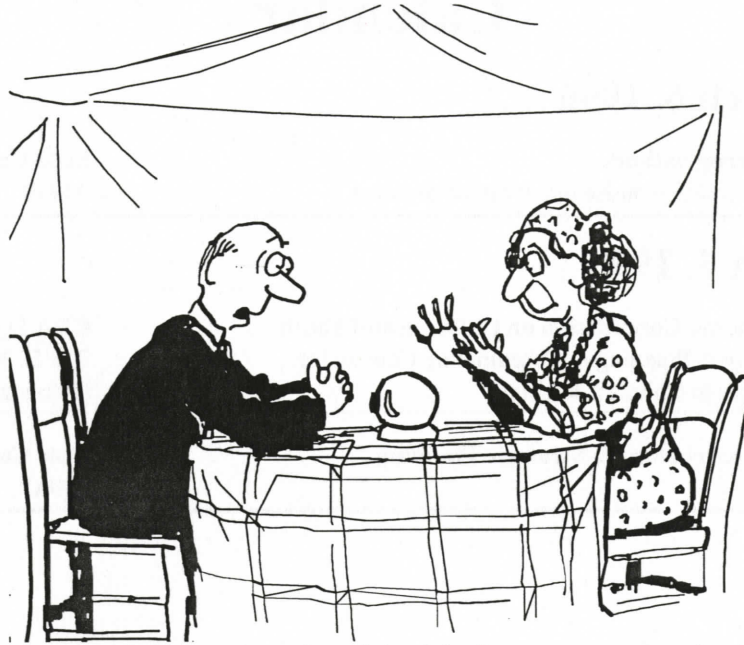
