**EDUCATION REFORM BILL PASSES SENATE,
MID-TERM FUNDING KEY ISSUE**By Brandon Beard

■(GIT) With ten amendments, nearly seven hours of debate and seemingly endless partisan deadlock, Senate lawmakers passed an education reform measure Tuesday that, among other issues, seeks to permanently fix the state's mid-term education funding problem.

Forty-five sections in length, SB1100, by Sen. Don Williams, D-Balko, also adds steps to the minimum teacher salary schedule for career teachers, creates the "Parental School Choice Act," and establishes funds for education technology improvements.

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Sen. Charles Ford, R-Tulsa, went head-to-head with Williams early on, attempting to insert his own mid-term funding solution into the bill. The issue of chargeables quickly became the issue topping debate.

According to Ford, schools qualify for funding after reaching a point of two percent growth in student enrollment, or twenty new students, whichever is less. "This bill returns to the pre-1989 law," he said. "It allows schools to recapture those students."

With a vote of 28 to 17, the Ford amendment was tabled.

"I think our plan is the best on the table right now because it places the most emphasis on the classrooms in all of our public schools," Williams said. He said his mid-term funding solution is based on funding of school districts' needs and not on enrollment figures.

Of the approximately \$101 million in common education funding proposed in the governor's executive budget, \$48 million is proposed for mid-term funding, which would only affect a handful of the state's schools, Williams said. Only \$3.1 million of budgeted funds would affect schools statewide. "We want to invest money directly into the classroom where it will do the most good," he said.

Don Williams said Oklahoma only funds its schools at 75 percent of the national average. Even with the state's low cost of living taken into account, the numbers still rest at about 85 percent. "SB1100 won't put us in the top 10 immediately, but it will be a substantial step forward."

Saying she supported other of the measure's initiatives, Sen. Penny Williams, D-Tulsa, disagreed with mid-term funding language, saying it should be dealt with in a separate measure. "I do not think this mid-term funding solution should be in this bill," she said. "If we put technical problems and solutions in this bill and say they are for educational improvements, we are kidding ourselves." She did, however, say she thought the measure had "some real chance for reform."

Penny Williams supported an earlier amendment by Sen. Grover Campbell, R-Owasso, that attempted to remove the language all together. The amendment ultimately failed.

"I will personally ask the governor to veto this measure on the basis of school funding," said Senate GOP Leader Gerald "Ged" Wright, R-Broken Arrow. "It's not right, it's not equitable, and it's not the right thing to do."

Wright called the measure unfair. "The children in these school districts should not be forced to suffer when other communities are receiving more than their fair share," he said, claiming under the measure, growing school districts will be penalized for additional property tax revenue. "As I have said before, I don't know of any parent who would let their child go hungry if there was more than enough money for food, and that is just what the Democrats are doing."

"This is not a perfect bill," said Sen. Maxine Horner, D-Tulsa. "The time to do something for education is now."

Despite dissenting votes from 12 Republicans and 5 Democrats, the measure and its emergency clause, passed with a vote of 27 to 17. Don Williams filed a motion to reconsider, allowing the measure to be heard again within three legislative days.

Other amendments to the bill include the repeal of current law relating to AIDS and sex education in schools, language addressing possession of firearms by students, use of school property by the district and a section allowing the American flag to be flown in classrooms.

The bill now goes to the House.

HOUSE HEARS DEBATE OVER AMENDMENT TO SCHOOL DISTRICT BUDGET ACT

■(GIT) House Members today heard debate regarding HB2323, authored by Rep. Dale Smith, D-St. Louis, which creates the School District Budget Act. The intense debate, however, was not regarding the content of the bill, but rather an amendment proposed by Rep. Dan Webb, R-

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Oklahoma City. This amendment relates to the powers of the Oklahoma State Board Association.

As author of the measure, Rep. Smith said, "I think I have a good bill, but other factors are making us waste unnecessary time. We're tied up with amendments, which direct us from what we're doing. I have presented a budget that will save time and money for the school districts, and give Oklahomans a full budget. Now, we have an amendment which takes one group out."

As questions arose regarding the possible relationship between the OSBA and their stand against SQ669, and their exclusion from the measure, Rep. Don McCorkell, D-Tulsa responded, "This is not a debate of 669, or the school board's stand on it. That is simply not the issue."

Rep. James Hager, D-Pawhuska, voiced his opposition to the amendment by saying, "The OSBA has been doing a service to the state and we have continuity with them. I have never had a request saying to change this. The system is not broke, there hasn't been a problem outlined to me, and no concern has been brought to me...except about this issue."

In defense of his own amendment Webb said, "I agree with Rep. Hager; it's not broke, it's just illegal. The way it's stated in the statutes is illegal. Whether it's for profit or not, we're specifying one entity; that's illegal. It's just that simple."

Despite debate, the amendment passed with a vote of 60-35.

In an effort to continue efforts to perfect the measure, Smith made the motion to strike the title of the bill. However, his motion failed with a vote of 53-43.

The bill passed with a vote of 98-0.

PARENTAL CONSENT FOR DRIVER'S LICENSES APPROVED

■(GIT) Parents of teens would have the final say in whether their child could apply for a driver's license under the terms of a bill approved Tuesday by the Senate.

SB1115, authored by Brad Henry, D-Shawnee, would require a parent or guardian's consent before a child under the age of 18 could apply for and receive a driver's license. The bill would also allow the parent to withdraw that consent after the license is issued, resulting in the suspension of the driver's license.

Henry said he authored the bill in response to concerns expressed by two of his constituents, who he said were single mothers with incorrigible 16-year-old sons.

"The last thing they wanted was for their boys to go out with a friend and get their drivers' licenses," Henry said.

Henry said he did not see the measure as a solution to the juvenile crime problem, but called the measure "an additional tool for parents to deal with incorrigible children."

Senator Frank Shurden, D-Henryetta, expressed concern that the measure might be abused by parents.

"If they're all good parents, this would be great," Shurden said.

Shurden said some parents might withhold their consent unless the child agreed to use the license for illegal activity, such as buying and selling drugs.

By unanimous consent, the bill's title was stricken, and it received a passing vote of 31-6

OFFICE OF VOLUNTEERISM COULD BE ABOLISHED BY BILL

■(GIT) In session today, House members voted in favor of abolishing the Office of Volunteerism. The measure would transfer the authority over the office from the Secretary of State to the Department of Civil Emergency Management. It also creates the Oklahoma Commission on Volunteerism. The one full time employee of the office would transfer to the commission.

Author of the bill, Rep. John Bryant, R-Tulsa, agreed to strike the title and explained that the measure was prompted by events following the blast of April 19, 1995. "After the bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building, the department realized more disaster relief was needed for individuals involved in the bombing," he said.

"Why do they think the responsibilities of the office will function better under the Department of Civil Emergency Management as opposed to the Secretary of State," Rep. Al Sadler, D-Ardmore, asked Bryant.

Sadler said he believed the purpose of the office would be lost when it was absorbed into the proposed commission. Rep. Mark Seikel, D-Harrah, pointed out that he had a similar bill barely pass yesterday because it created a new board. "My bill had one big stumbling block...it created a new board," he said. "Members were telling me they did not want any new boards or commissions." Seikel wanted to know how Bryant's bill was different. Bryant told Seikel and members that he had included a repealer in the bill to dissolve the Oklahoma Volunteerism Advisory Council.

Rep. William Paulk, D-Oklahoma City, wanted Bryant to reassure him that the one full time employee of the office would not be eliminated as well. Bryant and Rep. Jim Reese, R-Deer Creek, assured Paulk that the employee would transfer to the commission.

The measure, and its emergency clause passed with a vote of 68 to 31.

LAWMAKER GOES TO BAT FOR MENTAL ILLNESS

■(GIT) An Oklahoma City lawmaker wants to require that psychiatric services be included in both individual and group health insurance policies. SB799, by Sen. Angela Monson, went before the Senate Tuesday. The measure would require the coverage for victims of severe mental disorders such as schizophrenia, panic disorder and severe depression.

Responding to a constituent request, the Oklahoma City Democrat defended the measure, saying it might be worth additional costs to insurance companies. "I understand the nature of insurance," she said. "There is a sharing of risk — we share in the risk that at any time it could be one of us."

Sen. Bernest Cain, D-Oklahoma City, estimated the cost to be approximately \$1.00 per month, per covered employee.

"You know and I know that nothing comes off this floor at the cost we said it was going to," said Sen. Dave Herbert, D-Midwest City. "I want to be sure when we get this finished that we don't have something that is going to balloon on us in five years." Herbert called the bill "landmark legislation."

Sen. Ben Robinson, D-Muskogee, said the insurance industry has a long history of treating mental illness as something other than an illness.

"The insurance companies are complaining that this will cost them more money," said Sen. Lewis Long, D-Glenpool. "I haven't seen too many insurance companies filing for bankruptcy."

Concerned that individual health policy costs would skyrocket as a result, Sen. Howard Hen-

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drick suggested Monson strike the bill's title, allowing her to consider other options.

"Maybe we need to further specify in this bill that we are talking about severe mental illness and not a divorced couple who needs counseling," Monson said, agreeing to cripple the bill's title.

"If you are a diabetic, you need insulin. We don't question that," she said. "If you have one of these illnesses, there are things that you need."

The measure and its emergency clause passed with a vote of 32 to 14. The bill will now be taken up by members of the House for their consideration.

"POOR PERSONS" ACT RECEIVES AMENDMENT ADDRESSING FRAUD

■(GIT) Committee substitute for HB2978, an act relating to poor persons was read today on the House floor by Rep. Opio Toure, D-Oklahoma City, author of the bill. Rep. Bill Graves, R-Oklahoma City, offered an amendment to the bill stating that persons guilty of welfare fraud shall be excluded from receiving any assistance.

Rep. Wayne Pettigrew, R-Edmond, asked Graves to amend the amendment for individuals who did not commit "purposeful" welfare fraud.

Graves said he would not be open to such an amendment because fraud is willful. Pettigrew further explained his proposed amendment to Graves. "It could be an accident... someone could accidentally fill out a form wrong," he said. "That is not fraudulent."

The amendment to the amendment failed. However, Graves' amendment passed. The bill, would also establish a welfare-to-work program. The measure passed 96 to 0 with an emergency clause.

DHS BILL ON CHILD SUPPORT COLLECTIONS PASSES

■(GIT) A bill approved by the Senate on Tuesday would allow anyone, including Hell's Angels, to bid for the collection of child support on behalf of the Department of Human Services.

SB1247, authored by Bernest Cain, D-Oklahoma City, would allow DHS to contract with anyone willing to bid on child support collection services. The bill would also establish auditing procedures to help ensure that the money that was collected is appropriately distributed.

Senator Dave Herbert, D-Midwest City, asked Cain whether the bill would allow for "anybody" to bid for the services, including Hell's Angels, who Herbert described as "good collectors."

"Nobody owes them any money," Herbert said.

Cain said the bill did not restrict anyone from bidding for the service.

Cain said the law would be especially helpful in areas where child support collections were low. Those areas, he said, would be primary targets for the bidding of child support collections.

"This bill does not change the way payments are collected at present, but it does give DHS another tool or option in the collection of the payments."

The bill received a passing vote of 36-9 with the title stricken.

STATE TRANSPORTATION DEPARTMENT PLEASED WITH UNANIMOUS VOTE

■(GIT) Out of the approximately \$280 million in new money for Oklahoma, the Department of Transportation could receive \$27 million. HB2667 would re-appropriate funds from the Oklahoma Vehicle License and Registration Act to the General Revenue Fund and the State Transportation Fund. The measure passed unanimously in the House Tuesday. If it becomes law, the State Department of Transportation could construct a five-year statewide improvement plan. According to State Secretary of Transportation, Neal McCaleb, the move would "put dollars back into Oklahoma roads."

The measure, authored by Rep. Fred Stanley, D-Madill, would take 3/10th's of 1 percent to 5.3 percent from the general fund. The funds would then be credited to the State Transportation Fund through the Treasurer's Office. McCaleb said that most of the funds will go toward the construction projects. "We could add a few people to maintenance, but we would be reluctant to add administrative positions," he said.

McCaleb explained that over the last five years, the department has lost funds. "This would restore lost federal funding." To compensate, he explained that the department had reduced its employees by 20 percent. However, contracts increased by 50 percent.

"This is an important economic development issue." He continued, "However, it is also an issue of life and death." McCaleb said 60 percent more deaths occur on dilapidated roads.

If the bill passes on the Senate floor and the governor signs it into law, the department will start receiving the money in 1997. McCaleb said he was pleased with today's outcome.

Yesterday, the Transportation Commission met and adopted a resolution including HB2667, plus several other measures. The resolution read:

"WHEREAS, Transportation funding in Oklahoma is insufficient to meet road building demands and a stable, reliable source for adequate transportation funding is now required to continue interstate, highway and road improvements; and

"WHEREAS, state transportation's share of the total state budget has not been reduced to 4.5 percent from 7.2 percent during the last five years, and Oklahoma leads the nation in the diversion of highway user fees to non-transportation purposes; and

"WHEREAS, the Governor has requested \$40 million in new funding for Fiscal Year 1997, toward that end, House Bill 2667 would earmark an additional five percent of the motor vehicle tax collections for the State Transportation Fund to increase by \$27 million; and

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KEATING CALLS FOR PASSAGE OF GROSS PRODUCTION TAX EXEMPTIONS FOR OKLAHOMA'S SAGGING OIL INDUSTRY

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Governor Frank Keating and several representatives of Oklahoma's oil industry today called for the passage of gross production tax exemptions for the sagging Oklahoma oil industry.

"As a candidate for governor one of the most important elements of my platform was the adoption of tax exemptions for marginal oil and gas wells. Last year, I proposed similar provisions in my budget message and this year I have done the same. The debate for gross production tax exemptions is over and I am pleased to see the Democrats responding to my message. I urge the legislature to adopt these measures that are in the best interest of Oklahoma's faltering oil industry," said Keating.

"For the past 15 years the Oklahoma oil industry has been in significant decline and we cannot afford to lose any more jobs by prematurely capping marginal oil wells due to the burden of the gross production tax," said Secretary of Energy Mike Smith.

"Oklahoma's oil industry is a \$5 billion dollar a year industry which employs around 60-thousand Oklahomans. The oil industry generates over \$1-million dollars per day in gross production taxes. What we are trying to do is save an industry that is plugging 3 to 4 wells per day," Smith noted.

"Many rural areas of the state depend on jobs created by the oil industry. The oil and gas infrastructure is eroding and the declining livelihood of this industry and potential job loss is a serious threat to one of our state's largest industries and a major tax base. The Oklahoma Legislature must pass tax exemptions for marginal oil wells. Otherwise many important jobs will be lost and economic activity in our rural communities will be devastated. It is time to help this important part of our economy to prevent any further loss of jobs and assist the economies of our rural communities," Keating said.

The Conservation Hall of Fame was established in 1985 to recognize friends of conservation and conservation district directors who have had a positive influence on Oklahoma's conservation programs.

TASK FORCE OUTLINES ACTIONS TO IMPROVE GRADE CROSSING SAFETY

■(WASHINGTON) In an announcement to the National Association of Counties, Secretary of Transportation Federico Peña today released a report on how highway-rail grade crossing safety can be improved.

The report of the department's Grade Crossing Safety Task Force said that better cooperation, communication and education among federal, state and local governments and the private sector is needed to prevent future highway-rail accidents.

Among the report's key recommendations was that state transportation agencies should be focal points to ensure proper coordination between highway authorities and railroads on the interconnection of grade crossing warning devices and highway traffic signals, and of the distance between tracks and parallel highways. These agencies should develop a list of state and local highway authorities and railroad contacts to be involved in the planning, design, construction, operation and inspection of grade crossing warning devices interconnected with nearby highway traffic signals, the report stated.

The report also recommended that state and local highway authorities conduct engineering studies to determine if safety improvements are needed at grade crossings near highway intersections where there is limited space between highway and track and no signal interconnection. The authorities also should ensure that space between highway and track is a significant consideration early in the planning and design process where physical changes are being proposed to the highway or railroad at interconnected signal locations.

The report of the task force recommends 24 steps that the federal government, state and local governments, railroads and transit agencies can take to reduce fatalities at grade crossings. It charges DOT with the responsibility of guiding government and industry to work together, utilizing existing tools and expertise to find the appropriate combination of actions to make crossings safer.

The Secretary said that the task force's recommendations will help meet the goal, established in the June 1994 grade crossing action plan, of reducing crossing accidents and fatalities by 50 percent within 10 years.

The report identified five potential problem areas: 1) inadequate communication between highway traffic signals and rail crossing warning devices; 2) lack of available space for motor vehicles between crossings and adjacent highway intersections that could trap a vehicle on the track; 3) "high-profile crossings" — those at which there is an unusually abrupt change in the level of the road's surface as it crosses the tracks — which can trap low-clearance vehicles; 4) light rail transit crossings which operate in right-of-way shared by motorists and pedestrians; and 5) the adequacy of information on grade crossing safety given to operators of oversized and overweight vehicles.

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The task force was headed by Associate Deputy Secretary Michael P. Huerta and consisted of representatives of four DOT administrations: the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA), the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA).

RILEY DEFENDS, CHALLENGES PUBLIC SCHOOLS

From U.S. Dept. of Education

■(WASHINGTON) U.S. Secretary of Education Richard W. Riley this week strongly defended public education as "the very cornerstone of our nation's economic and democratic future" and called on all Americans to "come together for the common good of all our children."

"There is a growing debate about how we educate our children," he said. "On one side, are those who believe you can prepare for the future by cutting education today, who see little value in public education, who seek quite literally to abolish it as an institution. This view is, to my mind, too narrow, too divisive, too fond of bashing teachers, too quick to tear down, rather than build up. I disagree with that vision. The politics of blame and exploiting people's legitimate anxieties has never served America well, and it is so wrong when it comes to the education of our children." Eighty-nine percent of American children attend public schools.

Riley conceded that public education has problems, but said, "More than a debate, we need action — a lot more of that old fashioned American 'can do' spirit that brings out the best in all of us."

To address what he called "the most urgent task," he announced a new national partnership "dedicated to the single goal of improving reading and writing in America."

Citing projections that school enrollments will reach an all-time high this fall, Riley also raised several other challenges: to empower parents, to make schools safer, to expand effective innovation and access to technology, to raise academic standards, to prepare young people for jobs, and to assure opportunities for higher education.

Noting that "strong families make for strong schools," Riley said we must "give parents the power and time to help their children learn more." He cited efforts in the St. Louis area to involve businesses and churches with schools and said parents should "slow down your lives. Volunteer in school. Above all, stay connected to your children."

He also stressed the importance of safe, orderly and disciplined schools. Following President Clinton's lead, Riley said school uniforms may be a way to "create a better atmosphere."

Riley defended the Goals 2000 school improvement initiative and called for a bipartisan effort to raise academic standards, noting that, "We will only win the battle for excellence if we have excellent teachers. Our schools need to get and hold the best teachers and be willing to weed out bad teachers, to help inexperienced but talented teachers get better, and to reward schools that get results."

Riley said bringing libraries and classrooms on-line is "a national mission, as important as sending men to the Moon," but he said that must be "just one step in a growing effort to move American education into the future."

Education needs to "open up," he said, citing public school choice, schools-within-schools, and the charter school movement as examples. He said that, as part of his next budget, President Clinton will ask Congress for "venture capital" to create additional charter schools. Operating under a public charter, these schools are encouraged to innovate and seek new ways of increasing student achievement. The Education Department currently funds a \$6 million charter school demonstration project.

Riley said he opposes taking taxpayers' dollars out of public schools for private school vouchers, but said he favors removing restrictions on the use of federal Title I funds placed on private

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and parochial schools by the U.S. Supreme Court in the 1985 Aguilar v. Felton decision.

Riley expressed deep concern that private school vouchers would destroy public schools and also fundamentally change the nature of private schools by making them accountable to the public.

Noting that the average income for high school graduates has been declining over the past 20 years, Riley said, "Good paying jobs require more of an education, and that education has to start earlier and be more demanding." He cited apprenticeships, career academics and tech preps as examples of ways to better prepare students for higher-wage jobs.

Riley called on colleges and universities to "hold the line" on tuition and urged the Congress to maintain funding for student loans and grants. He renewed his call to expand the Direct Student Loan program and voiced support for President Clinton's merit scholarship, work study and tuition tax deduction proposals.

"Our task is not to retreat to our own separate racial, ethnic, cultural or political interest group, but rather to do the hard work of learning to come together for the good of all our children," he said.

"We know how to create good schools. Now, is the time to get the job done — to roll-up our sleeves — to recapture that pioneer spirit of working together to make America's schools bastions of hope, creativity and learning."

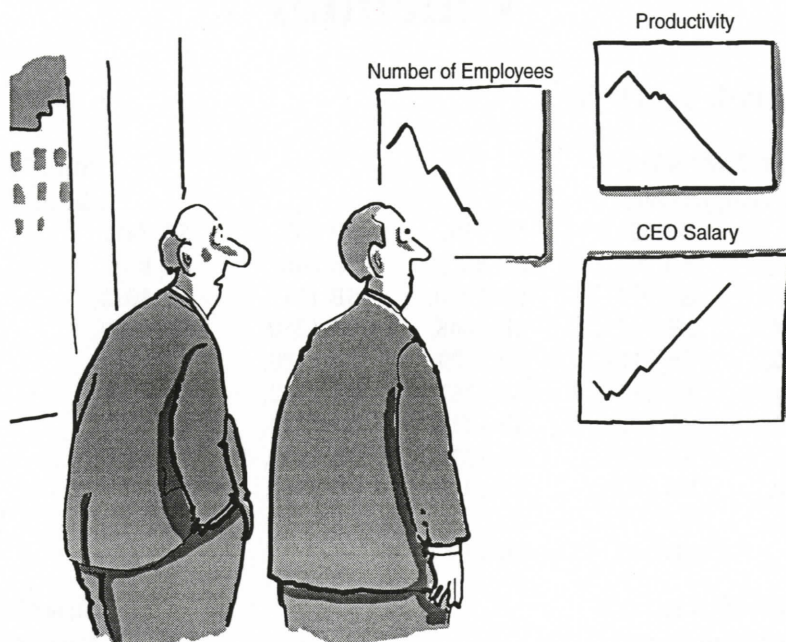
