PRISON BUILDING PROPOSAL MAY DIE

■(GIT) A measure requiring the Department of Corrections and any private prison company to apply for and receive a certificate of need before building new prisons in Oklahoma may be left to die in committee, its Senate author says.

Senator Bruce Price, D-Hinton, said he will likely ask that SB1219 be sent back to committee, where it could be left to die.

"It still has to be reconsidered, and I'm not totally sure what I want to do with it," Price said. "I may just have it sent back to committee and let it die."

Price filed notice to have the bill reconsidered after it failed Tuesday by a 18-25 vote. Opponents of the proposal argued that the marketplace, not government, should decide whether private companies build new prisons.

Under the provisions of the bill, private companies, as well as the Department of Corrections, would have to show the need exists for additional prison bedspace before construction of new prison facilities or the expansion of existing facilities would be permitted. Two provisions of the measure indicate that a primary factor in determining the need for additional prison space would be the amount of bedspace required by only the DOC and the Federal Bureau of Prisons.

That means private companies could not build facilities in Oklahoma for the purpose of housing out-of-state prisoners, a point Price conceded.

"It would limit who they could house," Price said. "That was something that was brought up both on the floor and in committee. I would be willing to listen to ways to open it up."

However, Price cautioned, the likelihood exists that the state will need to impose some restrictions on prison construction, particularly that undertaken by private companies, in the future.

"I think we're eventually going to have to come up with some discipline in the system of building prisons. Maybe this was too premature, but we're going to have to get a handle on it, or it's going to get to the point it has in Texas."

In Texas, where 554 Oklahoma medium security inmates are currently being held in private prisons, the chairman of the state prison board has threatened to consider imposing various regulations on the construction and operation of private facilities. Officials there are concerned about the number of facilities being built, as well as the types of prisoners being brought into the facilities from other states.

Those problems, Price said, is something he hopes Oklahoma can avoid.

"I'd rather not see us get to be like Texas," Price said. "I think we need to have some order to this process to make it work right."

Corrections department spokesman Jerry Massey said Price's proposal was not likely to have an adverse effect on the department and its search for additional prison bedspace.

"We already have to go through a justification process whenever we ask the legislature for funding," Massey explained. "Funding is not easy to come by, and it has to be justified thoroughly."

Regulations such as those proposed by Price, Massey added, are more likely to impact

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those in the private sector, although they, too, have certain standards that must be met in order to do business with the state.

"When we look at contracting with a private prison, we take into account a variety of factors — safety, the plant's physical construction, staffing and so on," Massey said. "We do that as a matter of course, and those involved in the private prison industry are aware of that."

"Obviously, we are concerned that the prisons be safe and meet our standards."

Price must bring the matter back to the Senate floor no later than Monday or it will die.

EDUCATORS COMMENT ON WILLIAMS REFORM BILL

■(GIT) It has been called "the son of HB1017." The measure by Sen. Don Williams, D-Balko, reforming many of the state's educational issues is drawing comments from educational leaders. Senate lawmakers passed SB1100 this week.

"It probably has a good chance of getting through both houses," Education Secretary Dr. Floyd Coppedge said of the measure. "Although I think the school choice issue may have a tougher time in the House."

One of the measure's larger issues, the Parental School Choice Act removes school district limitations by allowing parents to decide where their children go to school. It would, however, allow districts to deny the transfer if it caused classes to exceed size limitations or if available materials or previously adopted policies prevent it.

The biggest fight over school choice has been centered on transportation of students. Questions have risen as to who is actually responsible for getting students to school; the district or the parents.

The Williams measure would allow nonresident school districts to provide transportation from its district line to the assigned school. The resident district may also transport the student to its boundary, but the measure does not require it. It also provides that if the resident district chooses not to transport the student, and that student qualifies for free or reduced lunch, the resident district shall reimburse the student's parent for each day transportation is not provided. It limits reimbursement to 180 days or 20 miles per day, one way and not to exceed \$.10 per mile.

"I think the district should have the final say and transportation should be dealt with in a fair and equitable manner," said House Subcommittee on Higher Education Chairman Rep. Laura Boyd, D-Norman. "Oklahoma has been very good about encouraging modified school choice by leaving it up to the district."

Boyd is the co-author of a House measure also attacking the mid-term funding solution. HB2055 by Rep. Jack Begley, D-Goodwell, not only proposes a solution to the funding problem,

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but proposes a fix for the mid-term shortfall of the last two years. "The House solution is a better bill," Boyd said.

"I think enough people are committed to solving the mid-term funding problem that they can work together to find a solution," Coppedge said.

The governor's executive budget seeks to pump some \$3 million into the funding formula, an amount legislative leaders have said is lower than necessary. Coppedge said the shortage has been compensated for by an increase in teachers' retirement funding, also supported by the funding formula. "A large amount has been placed into teachers' retirement," he said. "Where else will teachers get money for teachers' retirement except from the formula money? The money is there, it's just a question of how it will be spent."

Coppedge said he supports the proposed amendment to the bill by Sen. Charles Ford, R-Tulsa. Under the Ford amendment, tabled by Senate members, mid-term funding laws would be returned to pre-1989 status. Schools would qualify for funding when they showed two percent growth or an enrollment increase of twenty new students, whichever is less. "It allows schools to recapture those students," Ford said Tuesday.

"I want to see a plan that comes as close as possible to funding every student," Coppedge said. "There is no reason to think that a growth student should be funded at a lesser rate than a student in a stable enrollment environment."

Kay Floyd, Oklahoma School Boards Association, called the bill "unique," saying state lawmakers should examine similar trends in other states. "Look at what is happening around the country," she said. "A lot of places are experimenting with children. That is not reform."

"What ever we do should help children learn more," she said. "We need to keep that in mind and not pass something just because it is popular."

Calling the measure the next step after HB1017, Floyd urged education leaders to examine the past. "Everyone wants significant reform," she said. "We just need to make sure it's significant."

RESOLUTION MEMORIALIZIZES CONGRESS TO EXAMINE THE HIGHWAY BEAUTIFICATION ACT OF 1965

■(GIT) The 1965 Highway Beautification Act that regulates the erection and maintenance of outdoor advertising signs, displays, and devices in areas adjacent to the federal interstate and primary highway system was inspired by late U.S. President Lyndon Baines Johnson's wife, Lady Bird Johnson. The resolution was enacted as part of an effort to clean up the interstate and primary highway system inundated with advertising billboard signs. Earlier this week, an Oklahoma lawmaker filed a resolution stating that the federal requirements are "overly burdensome" and "have caused undue economic hardships" on small businesses throughout the state.

The 1965 Act stated that outdoor advertising should be controlled in order to protect public investment, promote safety and recreational value and to preserve natural beauty. The act controls the size and location of the signs. HCR1078, authored by Rep. Clay Pope, D-Loyal, memorializes that Congress review the Act to exempt certain businesses and organizations.

The resolution states that an "overwhelming majority" of the interstate and primary highway system in Oklahoma is located in rural areas. For that reason, "most small business owners are not located near the interstate or a primary highway." Pope's resolution contends that those small businesses "strongly rely" on billboard advertising "as a means to attract potential customers."

Rep. Leonard Sullivan, R-Oklahoma City, said 85 percent of jobs are created by small busi-

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nesses. The resolution asserts that "the Oklahoma Legislature recognizes the importance of small businesses to the economic viability of Oklahoma."

Mitch Surrett, general counsel for the Department of Transportation, said if Oklahoma does not comply with federal regulation the state would stand to lose critical funding for transportation. Surrett explained that many believed outdoor advertising was "ugly." However, because there were thousands of signs already standing, there was a provision to "grandfather" them into the Act.

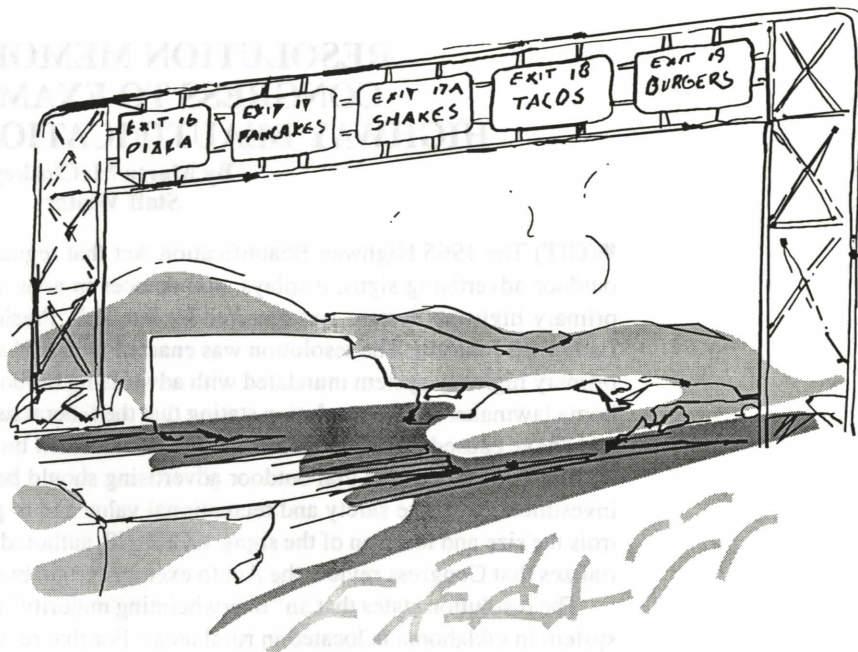
Surrett said that in 1972 an agreement was made between the state and the federal government. The agreement addressed all aspects of the national policy relative to the control of outdoor advertising. It was up to the state to enforce the agreed upon regulations, but Surrett explained that no additional federal funding was allotted to enforce the rules.

Over the years, many were unaware of the regulations, Surrett said. However in 1992, the state received funding as a result of the Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act (ISTEA). This enabled them to enforce the 1972 agreement.

Surrett explained that there are exemptions for churches, non-profit groups and small businesses in the federal regulations. They can erect signs eight square feet in size. However, Surrett said he believed those standards could be expanded to 32 square feet, as long as the sign was used in directing the public to the location.

Presently, businesses can use logo signs located only on interstates. However, Surrett said due to cost, usually only national chains, not "mom and pop stores" can afford to advertise on them. He explained that an unregistered sign is illegal. It costs a \$100 to register a sign and an additional \$20 each year after for renewal.

The resolution could be heard as early as next week in the House.

NO RETREAT FROM SQ669 POSITION, SAY STATE RETAIL LUMBER DEALERS

■(GIT) "Contrary to what folks may be hearing, I want to make it clear that we have not retreated from our position on State Question 669," Ed Stuart, Stillwater lumber dealer said today.

Stuart is Oklahoma vice president of the Mid-America Lumbermens Association, a five-state regional association. "Oklahoma members of this association are still just as strongly opposed to this question as when we announced our position in December," he said.

SQ669 will appear on the March 12 ballot. It would roll back and freeze property taxes at levels that existed in 1993. Thereafter, taxes could only be increased by a maximum of 3 percent, providing 60 percent of the voters agreed to do so.

Stuart said members of his group have never promoted passage of SQ669, "and, in fact, we are not neutral on the question as some have speculated. That's not us. That's another group."

He said, "We are opposed to SQ669 for the same reasons most responsible people are opposed to it. Not only do we believe it will hurt our public schools and vo-tech system, it will significantly reduce revenue used to provide important city and county services."

Stuart said there has been so much inaccurate and misleading information fed to the public by those who are pushing the question that "it's no wonder the question is being called a fraud" by Taxpayers For Fairness, the coalition formed to fight passage of the question.

"How can the proponents continue to say approval of SQ669 will not hurt schools? They must be the only group in Oklahoma that does not know our public schools rely on local property taxes for 30 to 35 percent of their operating funds. Vo-tech schools derive from 58 to 65 percent of their funds from property tax," he said. "Shut down that flow of operating revenue and guess what will happen to your public school."

He said the question is being promoted by a privileged class of people who are promoting their own selfish interests at the expense of the greater good of all Oklahoma citizens.

"That has an un-American and un-Oklahoman smell to it," Stuart said. "We reject that kind of narrow-minded thinking and urge the citizens of Oklahoma to join with us and vote 'No' next Tuesday on State Question 669."

114 STATE EMPLOYEES COULD BE FURLOUGHED AS A RESULT OF BUDGET SHORTFALLS AT THE CORPORATION COMMISSION

■(GIT) General Administrator for the Corporation Commission, Jay Edwards, told members of the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Natural Resources and Regulatory Services on Monday that without supplemental funding, the Commission would have to shut down the Oil and Gas Conservation Division for 23 days. A move that would furlough the division's 114 employees.

Currently, Edwards said the Commission is \$1,278,396 in the red.

Edwards said the governor recommended an increase of \$500,000, however, that was before the shortfall from gross production. If the agency receives what the governor recommended plus \$278,000 to make up for the loss in gross production, Edwards said the Commission could survive.

Edwards said he will most likely know within two weeks of the Legislature's and the Governor's decision.

JOB FAIR PROVIDES 'VISIBILITY' FOR PROJECT 1000

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Making Project 1000 happen is a little like painting a picture on new canvas: it has to be made visible before it can be understood and appreciated, says Oklahoma Corporation Commissioner Ed Apple.

Project 1000 is a public and private partnership to create more jobs in Oklahoma for Oklahoma college graduates by getting 1,000 Oklahoma companies to hire at least one more Oklahoma college graduate this year than they planned to hire.

To help create visibility, understanding and appreciation, Apple, who is chairing Project 1000 at the request of Gov. Frank Keating, is seeking Oklahoma business firms and college seniors to participate in a job fair on April 9 at the State Capitol Building. The goal is to bring together at least 250 business organizations and as many as possible graduating seniors who would like to put their job skills to work in Oklahoma.

A new company locating in Oklahoma that would create 1,000 jobs would draw immediate attention while creating 1,000 more in-state jobs for Oklahoma college graduates one at a time would go almost unnoticed, but it would have about the same economic impact in terms of salaries paid, goods and services purchased and taxes collected," explained Apple.

Apple emphasized that Project 1000 is not a Corporation Commission function, nor funded with state money.

The job fair on April 9 is being organized and managed by college placement directors from several state universities, and all state colleges and some private schools are providing job fair information to interested students through their career placement offices.

The state Department of Commerce, the Oklahoma Employment Security Commission and the Regents for Higher Education are participating in Project 1000 in their areas of occupational and career development expertise, and the state Chamber of Commerce, the United Federation of Independent Businesses and many other community organizations are also assisting, Apple said.

EXECUTION VIEWING BILL RECEIVES MINOR DISCUSSION

■(GIT) HB2056, authored by Rep. Wayne Pettigrew, R-Edmond, proposed a bill Monday that would provide a place within the walls of the state prison for immediate family members of the victim to watch those convicted of the capital crime die.

Pettigrew explained to members that a room set up with a closed circuit monitor will serve as the viewing area.

House Speaker Pro Tempore, Jim Glover, D-Elgin, asked Pettigrew how many people could fit in the viewing area.

Pettigrew explained that immediate family members defined by the bill mean the spouse, a child by birth or adoption, a stepchild, a parent, a grandparent or sibling of the deceased victim.

The measure passed with a vote of 98 to 2. It will now go to the Senate for further consideration.

WOMEN'S GROUPS MAKE PLEA FOR INCARCERATED WOMEN

■(GIT) Women's groups from across Oklahoma urged state legislators Wednesday to begin looking for ways to deal with what they described as a developing crisis in Oklahoma's prisons — the incarceration of women for nonviolent offenses and a plan to transfer some of those women to out of state facilities.

According to Mary Tinker, a criminal justice specialist with the League of Women Voters, Oklahoma has the highest incarceration rate for women in the nation, and increasingly, more women are being sent to prison for nonviolent offenses.

"Because of this policy," Tinker added, "Oklahoma has crowded prisons well beyond capacity at a continuing danger to employees and inmates. The current solution is to contract for private prison beds. However, there are no private prison beds for women in Oklahoma, not do informed sources at the Department of Corrections anticipate any to be available soon.

"Therefore, 50 women have been sent to a converted city jail in Odessa, Texas, and 80 more are scheduled to go to San Antonio soon."

Asked whether the department is planning to transfer more women out of state, corrections department spokesman Jerry Massey replied:

"Yes. Part of our latest proposal before the Board of Corrections asks for bed space for an additional 89 women."

That space, Massey said, would be in private prisons located out of state.

"An Episcopal minister who works in prison ministries states that of the fifty (women transferred to Texas), 16 have young children who have been regular weekly visitors to the children and mothers program at Mabel Bassett.

"Since the women went to Texas two months ago, only six have had visits from Oklahoma."

That, Tinker said, punishes children and families and diminishes the effectiveness of pro-

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grams designed to reduce recidivism and break what she called "an intergenerational pattern" of criminal behavior that "involves several members of the family at a given time."

"...We encourage policy makers to carefully examine Senate Bill 671, The Community Corrections Act."

SB671, which died in committee last May, would have provided for the creation of a criminal diversion docket in certain instances and would have authorized the courts to impose a punishment as an alternative to incarceration in certain instances.

The proposal was authored by Senator Bruce Price, D-Hinton, and Representative Jack Bonny, D-Burns Flat.

"As the act is now designed, it would specifically address many of the problems that we have discussed this morning," Tinker said.

"...In terms of desired outcomes," Tinker said, "if a person can be adequately controlled and reformed in the community, it is much more human to try to keep him or her connected to family."

RESOLUTION COULD IMPACT OVERCROWDING IF FUNDED

■(GIT) A concurrent resolution introduced Wednesday could help the Department of Corrections deal with its overcrowding problem — if it is ultimately funded.

Senate Concurrent Resolution 47, authored by Senator Gene Stipe, D-McAlester, and Representative Bill Smith, D-Ringling, directs the DOC to solicit competitive proposals from private prison contractors for the design, financing, siting, construction and operation of two 500-bed medium security prisons.

"By the end of fiscal year 1997," DOC spokesman Jerry Massey said, "we are going to need to lease around 3,500 beds."

The question, however, is whether lawmakers would agree to provide the funding necessary to lease prison space.

Massey said proposals for the use of private prison space, such as Stipe and Smith's resolution, appear to be the best way for the corrections department to deal with its immediate growth.

"The advantage of private prisons and private construction is that they're not bound by the purchasing regulations we are," Massey explained. "That means they can build a facility more quickly."

Massey estimated that it would take the department from two to three years to construct a facility one 500-bed facility, while a private contractor could probably build the same facility in a year or less.

Some 13,160 inmates are currently housed in DOC facilities in Oklahoma, including 250 who are being held in the condemned east cellhouse at the Oklahoma State Penitentiary in McAlester. That's 196 inmates above the crisis operation population limit and 2,527 above the State Board of Correction's legal population.

An additional 554 inmates are housed in private prisons in Texas. Approximately 340 inmates are backed up in county jails across the state, Massey said, waiting for bedspace to become available.

MARTIN AMENDMENT TO SUSPENDED SENTENCE BILL FAILS

■(GIT) "You have bypassed the committee process," said Sen. Herb Rozell, D-Tahlequah, to Sen. Carol Martin, R-Comanche. The comment came in response to Martin's amendment to SB1231, by Sen. Bruce Price, D-Hinton, dealing with suspended sentences. Originally an unheard bill before the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Public Safety and Judiciary, the amendment was brought to the floor, drawing criticism for Martin. It would create county farm work programs as a form of alternative sentencing.

Questioning the necessity for the bill, Sen. Keith Leftwich, D-Oklahoma City, said judges are capable of sentencing prisoners to similar community sentencing programs without the measure.

Sen. Ben Brown, D-Oklahoma City, said the money would be better spent on prevention and treatment rather than incarceration.

Senate Majority Leader, Billy Mickle, D-Durant, said the bill was not specific to types of crimes, allowing for violent criminals to be placed into programs with less than maximum security supervision.

With a vote of 16 to 25, a nearly straight party-line vote, the amendment failed. The bill, "gutted" of most of its language, with its emergency clause, passed with a vote of 41 to 0. It will now go to the House for consideration.

TRAFFIC-CONTROL DEVICE TAMPERING BILL TO INCLUDE TRAFFIC CITATION

■(GIT) Monday in session, members agreed to amend HB2078, dealing with tampering with traffic-control devices to include failure to yield to the right-of-way when exiting a subdivision. The bill, authored by Rep. Tommy Thomas, D-Atoka, is an attempt punish those who willfully deface, knockdown, injure, alter or remove any road sign or marker posted in Oklahoma.

The act would be a misdemeanor and punishment would be a fine of up to \$100 or imprisonment in the county jail for a 30 day term, or both.

Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore, amended the bill to include rules adopted for subdivisions. In particular, a rule that could warrant a traffic citation if, when an individual is exiting a subdivision, they do not yield the right-of-way.

The bill passed unanimously. It will now be heard in the Senate for further consideration.

GOVERNOR'S TASK FORCE ON TOBACCO AND YOUTH DISCUSSES OPTIONS

■(GIT) The Governor's Task Force on Tobacco and Youth met Thursday to continue discussions about possible options to keep tobacco out of the reach of Oklahoma's youth.

The Task Force has proposed a resolution that would give the ABLE Commission more manpower to enforce tobacco related crimes.

In the Resolution presented by Dean Henderson, the Task Force moves, "To increase state-level enforcement activity in the critical effort to reduce illegal sales of addictive tobacco products to Oklahoma youth, we recommend that the Oklahoma State Legislature and the Governor approve funding for at least six agents for the Oklahoma ABLE Commission (two per geographi-

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cal enforcement district) to be assigned to full-time enforcement of state laws against youth access to tobacco."

Dr. J. Kevin Barry with the Oklahoma ABLE Commission said that within the last three months the points of sale of tobacco products has increased by 100, making a total of 6100 sites for which the Commission is responsible.

In relation to the issue, the Task Force discussed the repercussions resulting by the Synar Regulation. The Synar Amendment required all states to reach a 80% compliance rate with youth prevention tobacco laws by the year 2000. If the states fail to comply, they will lose up to 40% of federal substance abuse funding. In Oklahoma, that would mean a loss of \$6 million in federal funding which is the sole source of funding for the substance abuse programs in Oklahoma.

The Task Force is faced with finding a way to ensure Oklahoma reaches full compliance with the Synar Regulation. However, as Dr. Barry noted, a large source of the problem is vending machines that sell tobacco products. As the current statutes stand, the only one accountable if a minor purchases tobacco products from such a machine is the minor, not the owner of the machine.

The Task Force decided that the issue of the vending machine problem needs to be further explored before the next legislative session.

Dan Reich with the Oklahoma State Department of Education brought the group up to date with the latest efforts being made in the schools for tobacco prevention programs.

Reich also brought to the members' attention that while certain forms of education and prevention are mandated under HB1017, the efforts are not enough. The members agreed to support a curriculum proposed by the State Board of Education to be created and dispersed to teachers across the state as a teaching mechanism.

GARRETT, COPPEDGE ADDRESS GOALS 2000

■(GIT) State Superintendent of Public Instruction Sandy Garrett and Dr. Floyd Coppedge, education secretary, went before the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Education Monday. The two education leaders addressed Goals 2000: Educate America Act, the federal program that stands to grant Oklahoma over \$5.5 million in educational assistance funding.

The program, signed by President Clinton in March of 1994, includes \$1,153,998 in first-year planning and technology grants. Oklahoma was approved for these funds in September of 1994. In September of 1995, the state was approved for additional second-year funds totaling \$4,396,613.

First-year funds must be spent no later than September 30, 1996, with members of an appointed advisory panel showing "substantial progress" with those funds by June 30. Second-year funds will depend on the panel's progress. To date, Gov. Frank Keating has yet to make his appointments to this panel, putting those funds in jeopardy, Garrett said.

Keating said in a November 21 letter to Garrett that the council should be limited to 20 members, ten appointed by him and ten appointed by Garrett.

"We may lose the first year funding if we don't make those allocations pretty soon," Garrett said.

Coppedge blamed the governor's failure to make the appointments on concerns surrounding federal requirements.

Garrett said conversations with U.S. Education Secretary Richard Riley have assured her there are no further federal requirements.

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If received, Garrett, Coppedge and Keating all agree that the funds could be used to improve the reading, writing, math and science skills of the state's teachers.

STUDY SAYS EDUCATION FUNDING LAGS, OKLAHOMA STILL IN BOTTOM TEN AFTER ADJUSTMENT

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Even when it is adjusted to reflect the state's low cost of living, Oklahoma common education funding still lags far behind most other states, according to a new study released Monday.

"We know we can stretch a dollar farther in Oklahoma, but we can't stretch it far enough to make our public schools competitive at the present funding levels," said Senator Don Williams, chairman of the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Education.

The study conducted by the Center for the Study of States adjusted per pupil common education expenditures to reflect each state's respective cost of living. Although Oklahoma's national ranking on K-12 education investment improves slightly when adjusted for cost of living, the state does not rise out of the country's bottom ten.

In the region, Colorado (27th), Kansas (25th), Missouri (30) and Texas (31) all invest more cost of living adjusted dollars in common education.

In a dollar to dollar comparison, for example, Texas invests \$600 dollars more per child than Oklahoma while Kansas invests \$900 more per child.

"The states we are competing with are investing more money on education and as a result, have higher per capita personal incomes.

According to the study, the six states with the highest per capita personal income ranking also have the highest per pupil expenditure ranking.

The six states (including Oklahoma) with the lowest personal income ranking also rank the lowest in per pupil expenditures.

Oklahoma's per capita personal income is 81 percent. When adjusted for cost of living, it rises to 98.1 percent.

"Our low cost of living helps make us more competitive, but it doesn't take us as far as we need to go in education," said Senator Williams.

The Senate leadership is advocating a plan that would invest an additional \$83 million in common education and institute important new reforms as well.

The Senate education package, SB1100, calls for deregulation and public school choice. It also includes funding for new classroom technology, teacher training and performance incentives among other things. Teachers' retirement and midterm funding is being addressed in separate legislation.

Governor Keating has proposed an alternative program for common education, but it contains very little money for actual classroom expenses. Of the new funding proposed for common education in the executive budget, only \$3.1 million would be placed into the funding formula that benefits the classroom budgets of all schools.

The lion's share of the funding would go to retirement, midterm adjustments and miscellaneous education programs. The largest budget item, \$48 million for midterm, would benefit only a few eligible schools. Two-thirds of Oklahoma schools, those that do not qualify for midterm, would not receive a single dollar.

"I think our plan is the best on the table right now because it places the most emphasis on the classrooms in all of our public schools," said Senator Williams.

The full Senate is expected to vote on SB1100 this week, possibly as early as Tuesday.

EDUCATION REFORM BILL PASSES SENATE, MID-TERM FUNDING KEY ISSUE

■(GIT) With ten amendments, nearly seven hours of debate and seemingly endless partisan deadlock, Senate lawmakers passed an education reform measure Tuesday that, among other issues, seeks to permanently fix the state's mid-term education funding problem.

Forty-five sections in length, SB1100, by Sen. Don Williams, D-Balko, also adds steps to the minimum teacher salary schedule for career teachers, creates the "Parental School Choice Act," and establishes funds for education technology improvements.

Sen. Charles Ford, R-Tulsa, went head-to-head with Williams early on, attempting to insert his own mid-term funding solution into the bill. The issue of chargeables quickly became the issue topping debate.

With a vote of 28 to 17, the Ford amendment was tabled.

Williams said his mid-term funding solution is based on funding of school districts' needs and not on enrollment figures.

Of the approximately \$101 million in common education funding proposed in the governor's executive budget, \$48 million is proposed for mid-term funding, which would only affect a handful of the state's schools, Williams said. Only \$3.1 million of budgeted funds would affect schools statewide.

Don Williams said Oklahoma only funds its schools at 75 percent of the national average. Even with the state's low cost of living taken into account, the numbers still rest at about 85 percent.

Sen. Penny Williams, D-Tulsa, disagreed with mid-term funding language, saying it should be dealt with in a separate measure.

Penny Williams supported an earlier amendment by Sen. Grover Campbell, R-Owasso, that attempted to remove the language all together. The amendment ultimately failed.

"I will personally ask the governor to veto this measure on the basis of school funding," said Senate GOP Leader Gerald "Ged" Wright, R-Broken Arrow.

Wright called the measure unfair. "The children in these school districts should not be forced to suffer when other communities are receiving more than their fair share," he said, claiming under the measure, growing school districts will be penalized for additional property tax revenue.

Despite dissenting votes from 12 Republicans and 5 Democrats, the measure and its emergency clause, passed with a vote of 27 to 17. Don Williams filed a motion to reconsider, allowing the measure to be heard again within three legislative days.

Other amendments to the bill include the repeal of current law relating to AIDS and sex education in schools, language addressing possession of firearms by students, use of school property by the district and a section allowing the American flag to be flown in classrooms.

The bill now goes to the House.

HOUSE HEARS DEBATE OVER AMENDMENT TO SCHOOL DISTRICT BUDGET ACT

■(GIT) House Members Tuesday heard debate regarding HB2323, authored by Rep. Dale Smith, D-St. Louis, which creates the School District Budget Act. The intense debate, however, was not regarding the content of the bill, but rather an amendment proposed by Rep. Dan Webb, R-Oklahoma City. This amendment relates to the powers of the Oklahoma State Board Association.

As questions arose regarding the possible relationship between the OSBA and their stand against SQ669, and their exclusion from the measure, Rep. Don McCorkell, D-Tulsa responded,

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"This is not a debate of 669, or the school board's stand on it. That is simply not the issue."

Rep. James Hager, D-Pawhuska, voiced his opposition to the amendment.

Despite debate, the amendment passed with a vote of 60-35.

In an effort to continue efforts to perfect the measure, Smith made the motion to strike the title of the bill. However, his motion failed with a vote of 53-43.

The bill passed with a vote of 98-0.

EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION BILL ALLOWING MERGER RECEIVES APPROVAL FROM HOUSE

■(GIT) A floor substitute for Senate Bill 1162 was addressed in both houses Wednesday. The measure provides for the merger of University Center at Tulsa and Rogers State College. House members voted 87 to 13 in favor of the bill. The same consensus was conveyed by the Senate later in the day when members voted 44 to 0.

The floor substitute for the bill would make employees and others with grievances go through administrative channels first before entering the judicial system, explained Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore, author of the bill.

Rep. Wayne Cozort, R-Tulsa, tried to amend the bill with a provision that would have allowed the governor to appoint the nine member board. Steidley motioned to table the amendment. Members voted 49 to 41 in favor of tabling the amendment.

Rep. Michael Thornbrugh, R-Tulsa, offered two amendments suggesting that the governor make appointments when necessary, but only with the advice of the Senate. The amendments passed.

Cozort debated against the bill saying it eliminates three appointments by Governor Keating and transfers the power to the Senate Pro Tempore and President of University Center at Tulsa, Rodger Randle.

Steidley debated in favor of the bill. "This assures some continuity between existing boards and then, only through attrition, the governor will appoint new individuals." He added, "This bill represents innovation, I urge you to support it."

LAWMAKERS SAVE RELIGIOUS AMENDMENT FOR CHARTER SCHOOLS ACT

■(GIT) Rep. Don Ross, D-Tulsa, put faith to the test Thursday when he successfully amended an amendment by Rep. Bill Graves, R-Oklahoma City. Ross claimed the amendment was discriminatory against other religions. The Graves amendment would allow charter schools the option to teach the Bible as a literary and history course. Ross's amended amendment passed with a narrow vote of 53 to 46.

Ross's amendment states that charter schools could opt to teach literature and history courses on all religions.

Graves debated in opposition to Ross's amendment. "Our country was founded on the religion of Christianity," he said.

Rep. Mike O'Neal, R-Enid, also debated in opposition to the amendment.

Ross debated in favor of his amendment. "I am not against the Bible." Ross explained that he wanted to give every religion a chance.

Floor substitute for HB2268, the Oklahoma Charter Schools Act, authored by Rep. James Bryant, R-Tulsa, passed 62 to 37. Several sections of the bill were codified to ensure Federal funds for school lunches, limit the number of charter schools operating in the state to 15 per year,

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allow for appeals to be directed through local school boards and limit enrollment to the charter school's district.

RESOLUTION TO TRANSFER DEQ RESPONSIBILITIES BACK TO THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT SPARKS DEBATE

■(GIT) "I'm going to make both sides mad! It's not who's doing it. It's the whole system. It's the whole bureaucracy. I don't think it will make any difference who it goes to. I don't think it makes a hill of beans were it's put. The fees will still be the same," said Rep. Mark Seikel, D-Harrah today during a debate Wednesday on the House floor regarding HJR1095, authored by Rep. Mike Mass, D-Hartshorne.

This measure transfers certain responsibilities from the Department of Environmental Quality back to the Health Department. The measure brought forth startling differences of opinions, and sparked a dynamic debate by numerous members of the House.

Rep. Mass said he authored the bill after increased complaints from his rural constituents regarding the astronomical fees they felt they were paying under the DEQ. After the DEQ was born, employees of the Health Department were transferred to the new agency. Mass said he feels that under different leadership back at the health department, issues may be resolved more effectively.

Rep. Bill Graves, R-Oklahoma City, said, "Certainly the government has abused their power in regards to the environment."

Rep. Terry Matlock, D-Garvin, said, "Before we switched things over, I had never had any complaints from my constituents. I get call after call now."

Rep. Seikel argued that he felt neither system was working. He said he felt the system would

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follow the bureaucracy regardless of its location.

Taking a definite stand, Rep. Howard Cotner, D-Altus said, "...This is the first bill I have seen to do something good for the people of Oklahoma."

Rep. M.C. Leist, D-Morris, who authored the legislation which gave birth to the DEQ, argued the DEQ was doing an acceptable job.

Concluding the defense of his bill, Rep. Mass said, "I was on the study which helped form DEQ, and I voted for it then. But I was convinced it would be a one-stop shop for environmental needs; But it wasn't."

"I'm all for the environment, but I am also for common sense state government. If it costs a county more money than they have to answer to the law, what difference does it make where the EPA, DEQ, or whatever is. I'm doing this because people from southeastern Oklahoma have called on me to complain about being overrun by overbearing people."

The resolution was adopted with a vote of 56-43.

BARBER BILL GETS SECOND CHANCE

■(GIT) In session Monday, House members voted to reconsider HB2550 by Rep. Mark Seikel, D-Harrah. The measure applies to professions and occupations and creates the Oklahoma Barbers' Regulation Act. The need for the Act and certain of its provisions had been questioned by members in a prior session. The bill was debated again Monday on the House floor.

Rep. Frank R. Davis, R-Guthrie, asked Seikel why he wanted to create another agency.

Davis challenged members by asking if anyone could tell him exactly how many boards and commissions are regulated by the Legislature in Oklahoma. No one could.

Seikel said, "The only people who will be upset is our good friends at the State Health Department, who currently receive fees to regulate barbers."

The measure passed with a vote of 58 to 41. It will now go to the Senate for further consideration.

BILL ELIMINATING CABINET LIMITS FAILS

■(GIT) A bill that would eliminate the statutory limit on the number of cabinet posts appointed by the governor was defeated Wednesday in a 15-30 vote.

Senate Bill 1129, authored by Gerald Wright, R-Broken Arrow and presented by Mark Snyder, R-Edmond, would have eliminated the statutory limit of 10 to 15 cabinet posts that the governor is allowed to appoint. The bill would have also allowed each cabinet secretary to have an assistant.

Several senators objected strongly to the proposal, arguing that the measure would result in large increases in spending for cabinet posts. The measure also led several senators to express their dislike for the cabinet system in general.

"I guarantee you this will cost the state millions of dollars," Sen. Darryl Roberts, D-Ardmore, said. "We ought to do away with the whole thing and go back to the way it was established in the constitution."

Joining Roberts in opposing the bill was Senator Dave Herbert, D-Midwest City, who said he, too, has not supported the cabinet idea since its inception.

Senator Charles Ford, R-Tulsa, spoke in defense of the bill, saying its opponents were trying

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to lump the problems of the previous three governors' administrations on the current governor.

In urging passage of the bill, Snyder said it would ultimately be up to the Senate to decide whether a cabinet appointment was approved, and as a result, the Senate would have a say in the costs resulting from the measure.

"This bill gives any governor," Snyder said, "the ability to organize agencies and departments in a way he feels best for the administration of government."

After the bill's 15-30 defeat, Wright announced plans to possibly bring the proposal back to the floor for reconsideration.

RESOLUTION APPROVED REGARDING COLLECTIVE BARGAINING DISPUTES

■(GIT) As law enforcement officials and audience members listened, House members adopted HJR1078 Wednesday. The measure would authorize a governmental entity to submit a dispute resolution decision to its voters for approval or rejection. However, the decision would not go into effect until a revenue measure to accompany the funding decision was also approved by the people.

The Oklahoma Municipal League wrote a letter on March 4 to the resolution's author, Rep. Larry Ferguson, R-Cleveland, describing their opposition to the measure.

Officials of the association told Ferguson that the Oklahoma Supreme Court is currently trying to establish the constitutionality of certain sections in the Fire and Police Arbitration Act. The association encouraged the Legislature to set aside decisions on the matter until the court could render its decision.

Rep. Abe Deutshendorf, D-Lawton, asked Ferguson why the Legislature was dealing with the issue. "Why don't we wait till the court can make a decision?" Ferguson told Deutshendorf that it could take years before the Supreme Court decided and the issue needs to get off the ground now.

Rep. Wayne Pettigrew, R-Edmond, told Ferguson that he believed this resolution would take management decisions away from cities.

The measure was reconsidered and passed with a vote of 54 to 45. It will now go to the Senate for further consideration.

OFFICE OF VOLUNTEERISM COULD BE ABOLISHED BY BILL

■(GIT) In session Tuesday, House members voted in favor of abolishing the Office of Volunteerism. The measure would transfer the authority over the office from the Secretary of State to the Department of Civil Emergency Management. It also creates the Oklahoma Commission on Volunteerism. The one full time employee of the office would transfer to the commission.

Author of the bill, Rep. John Bryant, R-Tulsa, agreed to strike the title and explained that the measure was prompted by events following the blast of April 19, 1995. "After the bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building, the department realized more disaster relief was needed for individuals involved in the bombing," he said.

Sadler said he believed the purpose of the office would be lost when it was absorbed into the proposed commission. Rep. Mark Seikel, D-Harrah, pointed out that he had a similar bill barely pass yesterday because it created a new board. Seikel wanted to know how Bryant's bill was different. Bryant told Seikel and members that he had included a repealer in the bill to dissolve the Oklahoma Volunteerism Advisory Council.

Rep. William Paulk, D-Oklahoma City, wanted Bryant to reassure him that the one full time

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employee of the office would not be eliminated as well. Bryant and Rep. Jim Reese, R-Deer Creek, assured Paulk that the employee would transfer to the commission.

The measure, and its emergency clause passed with a vote of 68 to 31.

HOUSE HEARS WORKPLACE AND EMPLOYEES PROTECTION ACT

■(GIT) The House Monday heard discussion over HB2374, authored by Rep. Jari Askins, D-Duncan, which creates the Workplace and Employee Protection Act.

"This bill just gives employers more ways to protect their employees," Askins said.

As the bill was up for discussion, Rep. William Graves, R-Oklahoma City, offered an amendment that would specifically include abortion clinic employees to be protected during peaceful protests.

The measure passed with a vote of 98-2.

669 BAD FOR OKLAHOMA, BOREN SAYS

■(GIT) With the March 12 vote on State Question [SQ] 669, the measure attempting to roll back property taxes to the 1993 level, less than one week away, attention turned to Oklahoma University President David Boren as he addressed the Senate Committee on Infrastructure and Strategic Planning Thursday. The former U.S. Senator spoke out against the initiative, saying it would be bad not only for OU, but for Oklahoma's economic development.

Boren compared passage of the measure to the oil bust of the mid-eighties, saying it would result in an immediate depletion of nearly half of the state's tax base.

Questioning 669's constitutionality, Boren predicts it will spark a wave of lawsuits aimed at reversing the measure.

Under the measure, property taxes would be lowered only for those who purchased property before 1993. Anyone wishing to purchase or make improvements on property purchased after 1993 would be expected to pay a higher rate.

OU would feel the effects of the measure with the loss of some \$70 to \$90 million in state appropriated dollars, forcing the university to use funds derived from its Reach for Excellence Campaign to bridge the funding gap.

The money is collected from private contributions and used for academic improvements. Passage of 669 would result in a decline in contributions, the idea being that people will find it difficult to donate money for the pursuit of excellence when it is being used "just to keep the doors open," Boren said.

HOUSE MEMBERS DEBATE SB995, OUTLOOK FAVORABLE FOR OPTOMETRISTS

■(GIT) Thursday, Rep. Dwayne Steidley, R-Claremore, told fellow members and spectators that SB995 was the anticipated measure they had all been waiting to hear. The bill would restrict the power of certain boards to ask for a declaratory ruling against other boards, except those professions the board governs.

Rep. Don McCorkell, D-Tulsa, asked Steidley if he believed the measure would remove the ability of the State Medical Licensure Board to license individuals practicing surgical procedures. "The bill says boards should not be getting into other boards business," Steidley responded.

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"The State Medical Board still has the right to bring an injunction against anyone practicing outside the scope of their capabilities," Steidley remarked. "Under Title 12, they still have the right to ask for a declaratory judgment."

Rep. Russ Roach, D-Tulsa, questioned Steidley on the intent of the bill. "Isn't this bill first and foremost about laser surgery," Roach asked Steidley.

"This has nothing to do with that," Steidley asserted.

Roach told Steidley that the Legislature has reviewed many bills involving boards. Those boards are usually trying to expand their scope of practice. "If your bill passes, it will interfere with existing lawsuits and will allow boards to define their own scope of practice," he said.

"The State Medical Licensure Board could do that now," Steidley maintained.

Rep. Don Ross, D-Tulsa, told Steidley that he did not have a problem with boards suing one another. Ross explained there was a much larger problem. "The specific focus is a question of laser surgery," he said. "The driving force to my decision in voting for or against the bill, addresses the qualifications of those who perform this type of procedure."

Rep. Robert Worthen, R-Oklahoma City, told members that if the bill did not pass, any procedure that became unattractive publicly could be stopped by the State Medical Licensure Board.

Rep. Ray Vaughn, R-Edmond, offered a floor amendment that allows individuals to seek legal recourse if they believe their optometrist is incompetent. The amendment received an approval. The amendment also dates the legislation to not interfere with the current lawsuit by the State Medical Board against the Optometric Association.

Rep. Forrest Claunch, R-Midwest City and Rep. William Paulk, D-Oklahoma City debated in favor of the bill. The lawmakers agreed that there have been no complaints on the qualifications of optometrists. Both lawmakers concurred the real issue focused on the power of the boards.

Rep. Fred Perry, R-Tulsa, debated against the measure. Perry said he believed the measure did not set a good precedent.

Rep. Jim Glover, D-Elgin, also debated in favor of the bill. "This was discussed in committee," he said. "In fact, Roach presented a bill during that time that would allow all boards to sue one another." Glover explained that supporters of the bill never argued over patient access and that the bill would not authorize nor limit any procedure.

Steidley concluded the debate. "If we do not want a good optometry board, then we should rethink the whole process," he said. "Times have changed. People used to call osteopaths quacks." Steidley urged members to vote in favor of his bill. Members voted 83 to 18 in favor of the bill.

HOUSE BILLS MOVE FROM SENATE HUMAN RESOURCES COMMITTEE

■(GIT) The Senate Human Resources Committee met Thursday, moving its first set of House bills this session.

HB1066, by Rep. Al Sadler, D-Ardmore, would expand the definition of "licensed mental health professional" to include licensed marital and family therapist. A committee substitute, the measure received a vote of 8 to 2 after having its title stricken.

HB2243, by Rep. Wayne Cozort, R-Tulsa, allows the use of physical force under certain circumstances in an institution that houses a minor. The committee substitute received a vote of 8 to 0.

HB2385, by Rep. Mark Seikel, D-Harrah, requires confidentiality for review of ethical complaints for determining qualified corporations. With a vote of 10 to 0, the measure passed.

HB2438, by Rep. Joe Eddins, D-Vinita, allows administrators of ICF-MR/16 facilities to supervise more than one facility providing those facilities are within a 20 mile radius. A committee substitute with a stricken title, the measure received a vote of 10 to 0.

HB2478, by Rep. Betty Boyd, D-Tulsa, received a vote of 10 to 1, passing it out of commit-

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tee. The bill creates the Genetic Privacy Nondiscrimination Act, relating to genetic testing. The bill was amended, requiring the State Insurance Commissioner to consult with the State Commissioner of Health in related matters. A committee substitute, the bill also had its title stricken.

HB2003, CS HB2348, CS HB2391, CS HB2574 and HB2648 were all laid over.

OKLAHOMA CUTS SIZE OF STATE GOVERNMENT, BUCKS REGIONAL, NATIONAL TRENDS

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Oklahoma has been more successful at cutting state government than any other state in the region over the last five years, according to a national trade publication.

A report in the latest issue of State Policy Reports documented the effectiveness of state government downsizing efforts in the 50 states during a five year period from December 1990 to December 1995.

According to the study, Oklahoma was one of just seven states in the country to cut state government during that period.

Oklahoma was the only state in the region to cut the size of state government. Texas, New Mexico, Arkansas, Missouri, Colorado, Louisiana all increased government employment.

"I think this sends a great signal to business recruits around the country," said Senator Larry Dickerson, D-Poteau. "It tells them that Oklahoma is running a cost-efficient state that is using its resources wisely."

The Poteau legislator says the decline in state government should also bolster support for a state employee pay raise program he authored this year.

Under SB1128, state employees who receive a performance evaluation score of "meets standards" or higher, would receive a raise of \$1,200. In addition, state nurses and other health care professionals who are significantly below the market salary average would have their pay raised. The estimated cost of the pay program is approximately \$42 million.

SB1128 was approved by the full Senate Wednesday on a 44-0 vote. Its next stop is the State House of Representatives.

ELIZABETH DOLE TAKES THE FLOOR

■(GIT) U.S. Senate Majority Leader and presidential candidate Bob Dole, R-Kansas, was represented by his wife Elizabeth, who came to Oklahoma City Wednesday to spread his campaign message before members of the Legislature.

Former cabinet secretary to both the Reagan and Bush administrations, Mrs. Dole was named as one of the ten most admired women by a recent Gallup Poll. She has also served as National

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President of the Red Cross.

"I have seen so much tragedy and so much pain as president of the Red Cross," she said, commending the state on its performance during the April 19 Murrah bombing. "I have never seen anything like the way this community came together to help the victims of that bombing — It was incredible."

Citing her husband's tenure and experience as a six-time U.S. Senate leader, Mrs. Dole said he will bring the same to the presidency. "The White House is no place for on-the-job-training," she said.

She also touched on points of her husband's platform, addressing welfare reform, education reform, agriculture and trade.

Stressing a "growth oriented policy," Mrs. Dole said her husband's goals also include the opening of foreign trade markets. "When four percent of the consumers are in the United States and 96 percent are outside the United States, we need to go for those outside markets."

Thanking Legislators, she said, "The only occasion that I can think of that would top this would be addressing a joint session of the U.S. Congress where my husband is giving a State of the Union address."

TULSA MAYOR SUSAN SAVAGE ADDRESSES WOMEN

■(GIT) Tulsa Mayor Susan Savage urged Oklahoma women to challenge their own and the state's priorities in her keynote address Wednesday before an estimated 300 women who gathered at the Capitol for Network for the Nineties Legislative Day.

Speaking in the House chamber, Savage, who is serving her second term as Tulsa's mayor and chairs the Indian Nation Council on Municipal Governments, said that it is important, particularly for women, to take the time to examine what government does and how to find new ways to achieve their goals.

Savage said the pioneer women who helped settle Oklahoma were an excellent example of what it sometimes takes to achieve one's goals.

"The future was all they had when they arrived in Indian Territory," Savage explained. "But they were full of hope and promise."

Savage also praised the women of Oklahoma who had found personal success, noting that more women currently serve in the state legislature than ever before and that other key government offices, from Chief Justice of the Oklahoma Supreme Court to legislative pages, are also held by women.

"Despite women's accomplishments," Savage cautioned, "women are often evaluated by different standards," including looks, emotional quotient, their children and whether they work or remain in the home.

That is why, Savage said, it is important that women challenge the priorities of the state and themselves.

In closing, Savage urged those in attendance to continue their personal searches for growth and involvement.

"Each of you has to continue to look for the pattern of life in unusual places," Savage said.

LEGISLATOR ISSUES STATEMENT CALLING FOR INVESTIGATION OF STATE SENATE DEMOCRATS

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Following is a statement by state Rep. Wayne Cozort, a Republican from Tulsa, concerning campaign donations to Senate Democrats:

"In light of serious disclosures by *The Conservative Review* newspaper, today I am calling for

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a full-scale investigation into contributions by Oklahoma trial lawyers to State Senate Democrats.

"*The Conservative Review* has made some very troubling disclosures regarding political donations to the Democrats of the Oklahoma State Senate Political Action Committee by the Oklahoma Trial Lawyers Association Political Action Committee. These donations occurred while the Senate was considering Senate Bill 263, the so-called tort reform law, in 1995.

"*The Review* disclosed that a large amount of contributions — \$33,600 — was made while the bill was before the Senate.

"The contributions disclosed by *The Conservative Review* cry out that in the state Senate, 'legislation is for sale.' The rest of the Legislature does not need this kind of cloud hanging over our heads, and therefore we must do something to end this type of situation from occurring again.

"The best way I know to correct the system is to prohibit campaign contributions at a time when they could help influence the outcome of important legislation.

"I ask the legislative leadership to use bills already in committee to begin the reform process this session.

"In the meantime, these contributions should be investigated further by a state agency or investigative body with the subpoena power necessary to obtain additional information about the contributions.

"We must determine if state ethics law, specifically Title 74, Section 257;20-1-9, has been violated. We must determine if something of value was given or received in exchange for votes on legislation.

"To that end, I have drafted and submitted a resolution for adoption by the House of Representatives. The resolution specifically demands that a full investigation be initiated into the trial lawyers contributions made to the Senate Democrats' PAC in April and May 1995, and it requests that the investigation be conducted in one of the following methods:

- 1) Governor Frank Keating order an investigation by the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation and turn the results over to the appropriate district attorney; or
- 2) The Attorney General's office gather and present evidence to the current multi-county grand jury regarding the contributions.

"Such an investigation is the only way I know how to determine completely if legislation in the Oklahoma Legislature is for sale."

PRO TEM RESPONDS TO COZORT "HYPOCRISY" URGES HIM TO SHINE LIGHT ON STAMPGATE

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Saying he's surprised that Representative Wayne Cozort hasn't applied the same ethical scrutiny to himself and his colleagues, the leader of the Oklahoma Senate is dismissing charges leveled by the Tulsa Republican today as "partisan politics at their worst."

"There's not an ounce of truth in the insinuations of Representative Cozort and he knows it," said Senator Stratton Taylor. "This is a thinly veiled partisan attack designed to tar any and all Democratic legislators who voted for tort reform.

The Senate President pointed out that the tort reform legislation in question was initiated, not by the trial lawyers, but by business interests. It was solicited, supported and signed into law by Governor Keating. The bill was also backed by the State Chamber of Commerce and numerous other business organizations. Legislative records indicate that Representative Cozort and a number of other Republican legislators voted for it.

"Governor Keating was the biggest proponent of the tort reform legislation and he received political contributions from business organizations and lawyers who supported the bill. Representative Cozort has also received contributions from those business interests.

"I thought the reason people voted for the bill was because they felt it was good tort reform

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legislation as I did. That's why Senate Democrats supported it. Maybe Representative Cozort had different motives," said Senator Taylor.

The Senate President says Cozort's actions are especially hypocritical in light of his silence on a previous investigation involving Republican legislators.

"If Representative Cozort is so interested in ethical government, why didn't he stand up and protest when Governor Keating fired the special prosecutor who was investigating 'Stampgate?'" asked Senator Taylor.

In 1994, the *Daily Oklahoman* and other news media documented how Cozort and other Republican legislators had used the state-financed stamps to fund their re-election efforts and the campaigns of other GOP candidates. Then-Governor Walters appointed a special counsel to investigate the improprieties, but Governor Keating fired the prosecutor and halted the probe as one of his first official acts in office.

"The transgressions of Republican legislators were well documented by the news media, but Representative Cozort didn't utter a peep when the investigation was killed.

"If Representative Cozort wants me to create a special committee to continue the investigation of Stampgate, I'll be happy to oblige him. There are many people who have been wanting to get Representative Cozort under oath for a long time. It's been said that truth is to Wayne Cozort what light is to a vampire."

Representative Cozort is drawing his allegations from a newly formed political opinion news letter operated by Republican Party activists.

The *Conservative Review* was created less than 6 months ago and has published only two issues. Its founder is David Dank (husband of Republican Representative Odilia Dank) and its editor is GOP political consultant Mike Hammer.

The Senate President wasn't the only Senate Democrat to respond to Representative Cozort's attack. Senator Kevin Easley dismissed the credibility of the Tulsa Republican.

"This is the same guy who introduced a bill this year to legalize prostitution," observed Senator Easley. "Maybe we should ask him what he received in return for that legislation. Was he paid in cash or services?"

LAWMAKER GOES TO BAT FOR MENTAL ILLNESS

■(GIT) An Oklahoma City lawmaker wants to require that psychiatric services be included in both individual and group health insurance policies. SB799, by Sen. Angela Monson, went before the Senate Tuesday. The measure would require the coverage for victims of severe mental disorders such as schizophrenia, panic disorder and severe depression.

Responding to a constituent request, the Oklahoma City Democrat defended the measure, saying it might be worth additional costs to insurance companies.

Sen. Bernest Cain, D-Oklahoma City, estimated the cost to be approximately \$1.00 per month, per covered employee.

Sen. Ben Robinson, D-Muskogee, said the insurance industry has a long history of treating mental illness as something other than an illness.

"The insurance companies are complaining that this will cost them more money," said Sen. Lewis Long, D-Glenpool.

Concerned that individual health policy costs would skyrocket as a result, Sen. Howard Hendrick suggested Monson strike the bill's title, allowing her to consider other options.

"Maybe we need to further specify in this bill that we are talking about severe mental illness and not a divorced couple who needs counseling," Monson said, agreeing to cripple the bill's

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title.

The measure and its emergency clause passed with a vote of 32 to 14. The bill will now be taken up by members of the House for their consideration.

"POOR PERSONS" ACT RECEIVES AMENDMENT ADDRESSING FRAUD

■(GIT) Committee substitute for HB2978, an act relating to poor persons was read today on the House floor by Rep. Opio Toure, D-Oklahoma City, author of the bill. Rep. Bill Graves, R-Oklahoma City, offered an amendment to the bill stating that persons guilty of welfare fraud shall be excluded from receiving any assistance.

Rep. Wayne Pettigrew, R-Edmond, asked Graves to amend the amendment for individuals who did not commit "purposeful" welfare fraud.

Graves said he would not be open to such an amendment because fraud is willful. Pettigrew explained, "It could be an accident...someone could accidentally fill out a form wrong."

The amendment to the amendment failed. However, Graves' amendment passed. The bill, would also establish a welfare-to-work program. The measure passed 96 to 0 with an emergency clause.

DHS BILL ON CHILD SUPPORT COLLECTIONS PASSES

■(GIT) A bill approved by the Senate on Tuesday would allow anyone, including Hell's Angels, to bid for the collection of child support on behalf of the Department of Human Services.

SB1247, authored by Bernest Cain, D-Oklahoma City, would allow DHS to contract with anyone willing to bid on child support collection services. The bill would also establish auditing procedures to help ensure that the money that was collected is appropriately distributed.

Senator Dave Herbert, D-Midwest City, asked Cain whether the bill would allow for "anybody" to bid for the services, including Hell's Angels, who Herbert described as "good collectors."

Cain said the bill did not restrict anyone from bidding for the service.

Cain said the law would be especially helpful in areas where child support collections were low. "This bill does not change the way payments are collected at present, but it does give DHS another tool or option in the collection of the payments."

The bill received a passing vote of 36-9 with the title stricken.

CHILD SUPPORT COLLECTION BILL ADVANCES

■(GIT) Efforts to win approval of a bill designed to clarify questions about the statute of limitations on child support collections moved forward Wednesday with the 36-9 approval of Senate Bill 1175.

Authored by Bernest Cain, D-Oklahoma City, the bill made its second appearance on the Senate floor in as many days. Cain had the measure laid over Tuesday because of concerns related to another provision in the bill dealing with liens on real property.

Cain admitted today that some discussion was still necessary to clarify the real property lien provision and urged senators to approve the measure.

Senator Gene Stipe, D-McAlester, argued that some statute of limitations was needed on child support collections to avoid fraud and the fleecing of the elderly.

Senator J.R. Wilkerson, D-Atwood, said courts throughout the state are currently in a quan-

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dary because there is no clear law concerning the statute of limitations on child support collections.

Responding to a question, Cain said passage of the bill would mean that someone judged to owe child support would owe that money until it was paid in full. As debate on the measure progressed, however, Cain seemed to be in agreement with those who suggested a limit on the number of years after the child turns 18 might be appropriate.

"If you want to limit it to a certain number of years after the child turns 18, that's okay with me," Cain said. "What I don't want to see is someone elude paying child support for five or six years and the state not be able to collect.

"If they come back to town and they've got a wad of money in their pocket, they should know they're going to have to pay."

BROWN PSYCHOLOGY BILL FAILS

■(GIT) Senate lawmakers Wednesday shot down a measure creating a new class of mental health professional. SB1221, by Sen. Ben Brown, D-Oklahoma City, would have created the classification of "master psychologist" for those having completed a master's program in psychology, allowing them to practice and treat patients.

The bill also would have created an advisory committee, placing it under the Oklahoma State Board of Examiners of Psychologists. The committee would advise the board on matters relating to licensure, practice and investigations.

Dr. Bob Sanders, assistant commissioner for the Oklahoma State Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse, said, while those qualified for the master psychologist level are useful, further education is needed before they should be allowed to practice.

Currently, psychologists must go through extensive testing, completing lengthy educational and personal therapy assessments. Those at the master's level are not required to meet those requirements.

"I think this is a bill whose time has not come," said Sen. Bernest Cain, D-Oklahoma City.

Psychology Board Chairman, Dr. Arlene Schaeffer said, though she could not speak for the board, her own professional opinion reflected those of Sanders.

A vote of 15 to 31 defeated the measure and closed the door on the estimated 2,000 individuals seeking the title of master psychologist. Brown filed a motion to reconsider, stating he may or may not bring the issue up again.

THE STATE HEALTH DEPARTMENT DISCUSSES CRITICAL FUNDING NEEDS WITH LAWMAKERS

■(GIT) Wednesday, Health Department staff officials explained that salaries of nurses employed by the Health Department compares poorly with that of nurses employed by other state agencies and private businesses. "They work for a few years as a public nurse practitioner, then go straight to home health care companies," Dr. J.R. Nida, Commissioner of Health, explained to members of the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Health and Social Services.

Julie Crowder, a nursing student attending the University of Oklahoma, supported Nida's statement.

For the Fiscal Year 1997 appropriation request, the department is asking for \$1,268,324 to aid in salary increases for public health nurses. In fact, the Governor's recommendation matches the department's request. Nurses would receive an additional \$400 a month with the request.

In addition to salary increases for nurses, the department said funding for vaccines and immunizations are not sufficient. Nida told members that approximately 90,000 Oklahoma children

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per year are "falling through the cracks" each year.

In the past, the State Legislature appropriated funding for those immunizations. It has only been in the last couple of years that the department was able to cover those costs through federal money. With cuts in federal funding, the department needs the state to help pick up these costs. The agency is asking for \$3,254,999. The governor's recommendation falls short of the agency's request by approximately \$353,000.

Sen. Bernest Cain, D-Oklahoma City, asked Nida how he proposed to reach the 90,000 non-immunized children. Nida said the money would mandate universal coverage for all children. As common practice, Nida explained that private doctors were already referring their patients on to the Health Department to receive their shots.

Nida explained that staff time accounted for most of the cost in universal coverage. The Health Department is mandated by federal law to not turn any child away. "This is a program that involves no bureaucracy," said Brent Van Meter, Deputy Commissioner for Special Health Services. "This money goes straight to the people."

Nida explained that the agency may not lose its federal funding this year. However, the powerful pharmaceutical lobbies in Washington demanding full price for the vaccines, could "kill" the federal contract.

The committee touched on other items including infectious disease control, family planning and teen pregnancy. Members plan to tour a facility that provides programs for teen mothers and their children. "

CHILD ABUSE CASES UNDERREPORTED, DOCTOR TELLS HOUSE COMMITTEE

■(GIT) The number of child abuse cases in Oklahoma is dramatically underreported, according to an Oklahoma City pediatrician who testified before the House's Children, Youth and Family Services committee Thursday.

Dr. John Stemke, from the department of pediatrics at Children's Hospital in Oklahoma City, told the committee that the death of two-year-old Ryan Luke in McAlester last year was just one of many similar cases in the state.

Dr. Stemke said cases of physical abuse differed greatly from those of sexual abuse. Child abuse investigators appear "to work overtime to show that a case is not child abuse," while those involved in the investigation of alleged sexual abuse "overrespond," Dr. Stemke said.

Asked by Rep. Laura Boyd what legislators could do to distinguish between parental discipline and physical abuse, Dr. Stemke explained that it was the opinion of many in the medical profession that if injuries, such as broken bones, result from the striking of a child, then it should be considered child abuse.

Dr. Stemke, who chairs the hospital's Child Protection Committee, estimated that some 1,400 cases of suspected child abuse pass through his hospital each year, resulting in an average of one death per month.

Dr. Stemke also said that he and other physicians are working with the medical examiner's office to improve reporting procedures in cases involving child deaths.

For example, Dr. Stemke said, a child may show no outward signs of injury and may be believed to have died from Sudden Infant Death Syndrome, but the autopsy reveals other serious injuries which the medical examiner may not be able to say were the cause of death.

"We would like the medical examiner to say in those cases that he could not determine the cause of death and that there were signs of physical abuse," Dr. Stemke said.

That, Dr. Stemke said, would mean law enforcement and other agencies would not automatically close their investigations into the child's death.

Dr. Stemke also urged the lawmakers to find ways to get agencies that have contact with families with children to share information.

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By sharing information between agencies, Dr. Stemke said, the agencies might be better able to reduce instances of child abuse.

Similarly, Dr. Stemke told the panel, the confidentiality laws surrounding child abuse investigations should be examined.

Also appearing before the committee was Debbie Richardson, executive director of the Oklahoma Committee to Prevent Child Abuse.

Richardson said the problem of child abuse in Oklahoma and other parts of the country had become "a public health crisis."

The focus of her group, Richardson said, was to break the cycle of abuse, by targeting families, particularly at-risk families, with prevention efforts. Those efforts, Richardson said, would take a period of years to be successful.

KEATING CALLS FOR PASSAGE OF GROSS PRODUCTION TAX EXEMPTIONS FOR OKLAHOMA'S SAGGING OIL INDUSTRY

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Governor Frank Keating and several representatives of Oklahoma's oil industry today called for the passage of gross production tax exemptions for the sagging Oklahoma oil industry.

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"As a candidate for governor one of the most important elements of my platform was the adoption of tax exemptions for marginal oil and gas wells. Last year, I proposed similar provisions in my budget message and this year I have done the same. The debate for gross production tax exemptions is over and I am pleased to see the Democrats responding to my message. I urge the legislature to adopt these measures that are in the best interest of Oklahoma's faltering oil industry," said Keating.

"Oklahoma's oil industry is a \$5 billion dollar a year industry which employs around 60-thousand Oklahomans. The oil industry generates over \$1-million dollars per day in gross production taxes. What we are trying to do is save an industry that is plugging 3 to 4 wells per day," Secretary of Energy Mike Smith noted.

"The oil and gas infrastructure is eroding and the declining livelihood of this industry and potential job loss is a serious threat to one of our state's largest industries and a major tax base. OCC SEEKS SUGGESTIONS ON NEW SALTWATER DISPOSAL TECHNOLOGY

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) The Oklahoma Corporation Commission is seeking information and suggestions from well operators, engineers, geologists and other petroleum technology specialists on how the regulatory agency could help encourage use of a new method of disposing of salt water that is a byproduct of oil and gas production.

Presently, the salt water is separated at the wellhead and pumped into approved underground formations through licensed disposal wells.

Some companies have started using a new technology called simultaneous injection and production which separates the petroleum from the salt water underground at the reservoir and pumps the salt water directly into an approved deeper disposal reservoir in the same well.

"Simultaneous injection reduces disposal costs and is environmentally safer because the salt water is never brought to the surface where there is a risk of accidental spillage and soil contamination, and production economics are improved because the petroleum does not have to be forced to the surface through standing water at the perforation point," Dr. Bruce Langhus, Corporation Commission underground injection control manager, said.

But commission rules that prescribe environmental safety requirements for subsurface disposal of salt water don't recognize simultaneous disposal as an option, so operators can't realize full economic benefits from the new technology, Langhus said.

Langhus said the Corporation Commission is seeking suggestions on how its underground injection rules could be revised to encourage use of the new technology.

Langhus said the Corporation Commission plans to change its underground injection rules. "But right now, we want to collect ideas and suggestions to help make sure that proposed rule changes will be helpful to the oil and gas industry and will continue to protect the environment," he said.

PARENTAL CONSENT FOR DRIVER'S LICENSES APPROVED

■(GIT) Parents of teens would have the final say in whether their child could apply for a driver's license under the terms of a bill approved Tuesday by the Senate.

SB1115, authored by Brad Henry, D-Shawnee, would require a parent or guardian's consent before a child under the age of 18 could apply for and receive a driver's license. The bill would also allow the parent to withdraw that consent after the license is issued, resulting in the suspension of the driver's license.

Henry said he authored the bill in response to concerns expressed by two of his constituents, who he said were single mothers with incorrigible 16-year-old sons.

Henry said he did not see the measure as a solution to the juvenile crime problem, but called the measure "an additional tool for parents to deal with incorrigible children."

Senator Frank Shurden, D-Henryetta, expressed concern that the measure might be abused by parents.

By unanimous consent, the bill's title was stricken, and it received a passing vote of 31-6.

HOUSE BILL GAINS PRAISE FROM MEMBERS AND GOVERNOR, PASSES HOUSE

■(GIT) HB2775 gained nonpartisan praise Thursday. The measure, authored by Rep. Fred Perry, R-Tulsa, would give new corporations with earnings of \$25,000 or less an exemption from state taxes for up to five years. The measure passed successfully 90 to 10, but some members had questions concerning regulation.

Rep. Loyd Benson, D-Frederick, asked Perry if there were any provisions in the bill preventing a corporation from re-creating itself under a different name to receive the tax break again.

Rep. Leonard Sullivan, R-Oklahoma City, said the money would not be significant enough to entice most of those businesses into that scenario. The measure would save a company \$1,500 per year.

Perry agreed to strike the title and continue an open dialogue in codifying the bill. He agreed and stressed that the majority of new jobs in Oklahoma are created by small businesses and without adequate returns many declare bankruptcy within five years.

Rep. Robert Worthen, R-Oklahoma City, endorsed the measure. "Regarding fiscal impact of the bill, revenue would have gone to the general fund, but now it goes straight to the communities."

Governor Frank Keating also endorsed the bill.

STATE TRANSPORTATION DEPARTMENT PLEASED WITH UNANIMOUS VOTE

■(GIT) Out of the approximately \$280 million in new money for Oklahoma, the Department of Transportation could receive \$27 million. HB2667 would re-appropriate funds from the Oklahoma Vehicle License and Registration Act to the General Revenue Fund and the State Transportation Fund. The measure passed unanimously in the House Tuesday. If it becomes law, the State Department of Transportation could construct a five-year statewide improvement plan.

The measure, authored by Rep. Fred Stanley, D-Madill, would take 3/10th's of 1 percent to 5.3 percent from the general fund. The funds would then be credited to the State Transportation Fund through the Treasurer's Office. State Secretary of Transportation, Neal McCaleb said that most of the funds will go toward the construction projects. "We could add a few people to maintenance, but we would be reluctant to add administrative positions," he said.

McCaleb explained that over the last five years, the department has lost funds. "This would restore lost federal funding." To compensate, he explained that the department had reduced its employees by 20 percent. However, contracts increased by 50 percent.

If the bill passes on the Senate floor and the governor signs it into law, the department will start receiving the money in 1997.

Monday, the Transportation Commission met and adopted a resolution including HB2667, plus several other measures.

REGIONAL MANAGERS TO KEEP THEIR JOBS, DEPARTMENT CALLING FOR ELIMINATION OF CLERICAL POSITIONS

■(GIT) Representatives from the State Tourism and Recreation Department said they would not eliminate the State's Regional Offices, however, they will redirect the clerical functions of those offices. Members of the Senate Tourism and Recreation Committee heard the proposed plan from Executive Director of the Tourism and Recreation Department, Ed Cook.

Monday, Cook said the elimination of the ten clerical positions would give an added \$300,000 directly to maintenance. Maintenance for the state's 53 parks has an annual budget of approximately \$700,000.

Cook explained that the ten employees currently in clerical positions at the regional facilities would remain with the department. The positions will be eliminated through attrition. The four regional managers would remain at their posts in the four quadrants outlining the state, along with park superintendents.

Cook said that the department is in the process of modernizing equipment for those facilities and has completed necessary employee training for those systems.

In the last five years, Cook said the department has saved money by increasing fees and through the process of attrition. "The maintenance situation is critical. If we do not do something, we will not be able to maintain our parks," he said.

NATURAL GAS BILLING BY A ROLL OF THE DICE

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) A note on my Oklahoma Natural Gas (ONG) bill for February says my gas bill has been "adjusted" 66 cents for temperature that was three percent warmer than normal. What that explanation doesn't say is that "adjusted" means "increased."

This confusing note varies on customer bills because ONG is divided into 13 "temperature" regions inside Oklahoma.

The statement on each of our bills about temperature results from ONG rate case No. PUD-477. In that rate case, the Corporation Commission, on June 19, 1995, approved a "temperature adjustment clause" on our bills based on National Weather Service data spanning the latest 30-year period.

In other words, we now pay according to temperature averaged over the last 30 years.

If the actual temperature is colder than normal, we win because we pay less; but if the actual temperature is warmer than normal, we lose because we pay more.

Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore, filed House Bill 2926 this session to "solve" the temperature adjustment problem for his complaining constituents. His bill requires that ONG be more specific about how the temperature adjustment amount is calculated.

I amended Steidley's bill to say that customers have the right to pay for actual usage.

Seems to me that getting rid of the adjusted usage based on temperature would solve the problem, at least for ONG customers.

LAND CLASSIFICATION BILL HELPS HUNTING PRESERVES

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) A bill currently making its way through the legislative process would benefit landowners who have created hunting or nature preserves on their property or are considering doing so. Specifically, the bill would make sure there is not a tax penalty to convert agricultural land to a hunting or nature preserve.

Senate Bill 1004, by Don Williams of Balco, would, for ad valorem tax purposes, specify that agriculture land that has been converted to a nature or hunting preserve would retain its previous classification as agriculture.

Williams said that he decided to introduce this legislation after looking at how the issue was handled in Texas.

"They had to pass a constitutional amendment to do this in Texas," he said. "I don't want the tax issue to discourage landowners from converting agricultural land to hunting or nature preserves and that's why I'm bringing this bill."

Senate Bill 1004 was debated and passed by the Senate on Feb. 27. The bill now goes to the House of Representatives.

WORKERS' COMPENSATION

WORKERS' COMPENSATION BILL RECEIVES AMENDMENTS ON HOUSE FLOOR

■(GIT) HB2430, a workers' compensation bill amending language pertaining to workers' compensation, received an amendment by Rep. Don Kinnamon, D-Stroud, stating that the burden of proof for any claim for compensation under the Workers' Compensation Act shall be on the employee. "The burden of proof for accidental injuries arising out of and in the course of employment shall be preponderance of the evidence."

The bill also states that injury from combat that occurs in the workplace and injuries sustained while under the intoxication of drugs or alcohol shall not be compensated.

The amendment passed 74 to 20.

Rep. Bill Smith, D-Ringling, proposed an amendment that would make mediation the mandated first choice for both parties before going to court. However, if the claim could not be rectified through mediation, court would be the alternative.

Rep. Chris Hastings, R-Tulsa, proposed an amendment to the amendment to "clear up Smith's amendment." The amendment states that a person injured on the job should receive treatment before the mediation.

An amendment by the bill's author, Rep. Bill Settle, D-Muskogee, stated that the Insurance Commissioner shall provide a plan to jump-start the pilot program for 24-hour care coverage by January 1998.

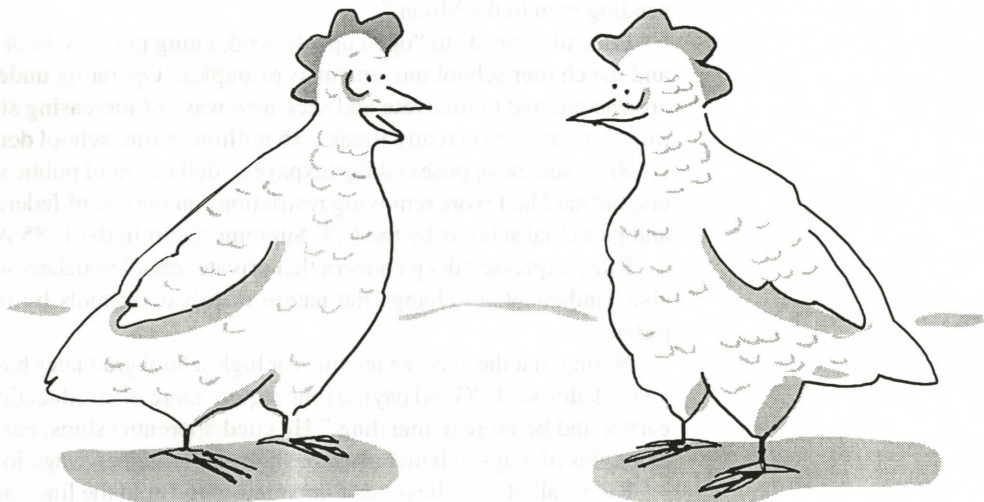
Rep. James Hager, D-Pawhuska, proposed an amendment that would not allow insurance companies to retroactively assess employers regardless of past status.

Hager's amendment was tabled.

The bill passed with an unanimous vote of 101 to 0.

RILEY DEFENDS, CHALLENGES PUBLIC SCHOOLS

■(WASHINGTON) U.S. Secretary of Education Richard W. Riley this week strongly defended public education as “the very cornerstone of our nation’s economic and democratic future” and called on all Americans to “come together for the common good of all our children.”

Riley conceded that public education has problems, but said, “More than a debate, we need action — a lot more of that old fashioned American ‘can do’ spirit that brings out the best in all of us.”

To address what he called “the most urgent task,” he announced a new national partnership “dedicated to the single goal of improving reading and writing in America.”

Citing projections that school enrollments will reach an all-time high this fall, Riley also raised several other challenges: to empower parents, to make schools safer, to expand effective innovation and access to technology, to raise academic standards, to prepare young people for jobs, and to assure opportunities for higher education.

Noting that “strong families make for strong schools,” Riley said we must “give parents the power and time to help their children learn more.”

He also stressed the importance of safe, orderly and disciplined schools. Following President Clinton’s lead, Riley said school uniforms may be a way to “create a better atmosphere.”

Riley defended the Goals 2000 school improvement initiative and called for a bipartisan effort to raise academic standards, noting that, “We will only win the battle for excellence if we have excellent teachers. Our schools need to get and hold the best teachers and be willing to weed out bad teachers, to help inexperienced but talented teachers get better, and to reward schools that get results.”

Riley said bringing libraries and classrooms on-line is “a national mission, as important as sending men to the Moon.”

Education needs to “open up,” he said, citing public school choice, schools-within-schools, and the charter school movement as examples. Operating under a public charter, these schools are encouraged to innovate and seek new ways of increasing student achievement. The Education Department currently funds a \$6 million charter school demonstration project.

Riley said he opposes taking taxpayers’ dollars out of public schools for private school vouchers, but said he favors removing restrictions on the use of federal Title I funds placed on private and parochial schools by the U.S. Supreme Court in the 1985 Aguilar v. Felton decision.

Riley expressed deep concern that private school vouchers would destroy public schools and also fundamentally change the nature of private schools by making them accountable to the public.

Noting that the average income for high school graduates has been declining over the past 20 years, Riley said, “Good paying jobs require more of an education, and that education has to start earlier and be more demanding.” He cited apprenticeships, career academics and tech preps as examples of ways to better prepare students for higher-wage jobs.

Riley called on colleges and universities to “hold the line” on tuition and urged the Congress to maintain funding for student loans and grants. He renewed his call to expand the Direct Student Loan program and voiced support for President Clinton’s merit scholarship, work study and tuition tax deduction proposals.

PROSTATE DISEASE TRIAL TO STUDY 3,000

■(WASHINGTON) The largest and longest study to test whether drugs can stop noncancerous prostate growth is recruiting 3,000 men at 17 centers, the National Institutes of Health (NIH) announced today.

The Medical Therapy of Benign Prostatic Hyperplasia (BPH) Trial will test whether the oral drugs finasteride (Proscar) and doxazosin (Cardura) will prevent further growth of the prostate that might require more expensive treatment such as surgery.

BPH is an expensive disease. About 7.5 million men have BPH, with about 250,000 men needing prostate surgery each year. All forms of treatment for BPH cost an estimated \$5 billion each year, and as the U.S. population ages, these costs will increase.

"By the year 2000, the number of men over 50 will have increased by 25 percent, and we estimate that about 9 million men will have symptoms of BPH," says Steven Kaplan, M.D., a trial physician at Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center in the New York City.

TASK FORCE OUTLINES ACTIONS TO IMPROVE GRADE CROSSING SAFETY

(WASHINGTON) In an announcement to the National Association of Counties, Secretary of Transportation Federico Pena today released a report on how highway-rail grade crossing safety can be improved.

The report of the department's Grade Crossing Safety Task Force said that better cooperation, communication and education among federal, state and local governments and the private sector is needed to prevent future highway-rail accidents.

The report of the task force recommends 24 steps that the federal government, state and local governments, railroads and transit agencies can take to reduce fatalities at grade crossings. It charges DOT with the responsibility of guiding government and industry to work together, utilizing existing tools and expertise to find the appropriate combination of actions to make crossings safer.

The Secretary said that the task force's recommendations will help meet the goal, established in the June 1994 grade crossing action plan, of reducing crossing accidents and fatalities by 50 percent within 10 years.

The task force was headed by Associate Deputy Secretary Michael P. Huerta and consisted of representatives of four DOT administrations: the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA), the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA).
