RESOLUTION TO TRANSFER DEQ RESPONSIBILITIES BACK TO THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT SPARKS DEBATE

■(GIT) "I'm going to make both sides mad! It's not who's doing it. It's the whole system. It's the whole bureaucracy. I don't think it will make any difference who it goes to. I don't think it makes a hill of beans were it's put. The fees will still be the same," said Rep. Mark Seikel, D-Harrah today during a debate on the House floor regarding HJR1095, authored by Rep. Mike Mass, D-Hartshorne.

This measure transfers certain responsibilities from the Department of Environmental Quality back to the Health Department. The measure brought forth startling differences of opinions, and sparked a dynamic debate by numerous members of the House.

Rep. Mass said he authored the bill after increased complaints from his rural constituents regarding the astronomical fees they felt they were paying under the DEQ. After the DEQ was born, employees of the Health Department were transferred to the new agency. Mass said he feels that under different leadership back at the Health Department, issues may be resolved more effectively.

The areas involving private sewage, public works and wastewater management, are some of those included in the bill to be transferred back under the jurisdiction of the Health Department.

Rep. Bill Graves, R-Oklahoma City, said, "Certainly the government has abused their power in regards to the environment. There are things done in the name of the ozone that are unnecessary. When people are forced to give up their land because of an endangered species, dams can't be built because of threats, land is taken away for oil unnecessarily. We should curb the government's involvement."

Rep. Terry Matlock, D-Garvin, said, "Before we switched things over, I had never had any complaints from my constituents. I get call after call now. I get stopped in the grocery store, I get stopped at the filling station. I am always getting complaints over DEQ. They charge exorbitant fees for things that shouldn't be that high. Everytime we turn around, there's another fee with DEQ. Everyone pays under DEQ's system. It doesn't seem to be working. Let's switch it back to something that works."

Rep. Seikel argued that he felt neither system was working. He said he felt the system would follow the bureaucracy regardless of its location.

Taking a definite stand, Rep. Howard Cotner, D-Altus said, "I read in the newspaper the DEQ is maybe buying a \$3 million dollar building for offices. When I think about this Department, I look to see where the funds go. While we're searching for money to fund education, they're coming to HARASS my constituents. This is the first bill I have seen to do something good for the people of Oklahoma."

Rep. M.C. Leist, D-Morris, who authored the legislation which gave birth to the DEQ, argued the DEQ was doing an acceptable job.

Concluding the defense of his bill, Rep. Mass said, "I was on the study which helped form DEQ,

and I voted for it then. But I was convinced it would be a one-stop shop for environmental needs; But it wasn't."

"I'm all for the environment, but I am also for common sense state government. If it costs a county more money than they have to answer to the law, what difference does it make where the EPA, DEQ, or whatever is. I'm not doing this for my health, or to be cute. I'm doing this because people from southeastern Oklahoma have called on me to complain about being overrun by overbearing people."

The resolution was adopted with a vote of 56-43.

BILL ELIMINATING CABINET LIMITS FAILS

■(GIT) A bill that would eliminate the statutory limit on the number of cabinet posts appointed by the governor was defeated Wednesday in a 15-30 vote.

Senate Bill 1129, authored by Gerald Wright, R-Broken Arrow and presented by Mark Snyder, R-Edmond, would have eliminated the statutory limit of 10 to 15 cabinet posts that the governor is allowed to appoint. The bill would have also allowed each cabinet secretary to have an assistant.

Several senators objected strongly to the proposal, arguing that the measure would result in large increases in spending for cabinet posts. The measure also led several senators to express their dislike for the cabinet system in general.

"The cabinet system was sold to us on the basis it wouldn't cost us anything, because the governor would take the existing agency heads and give them the title of secretary," Senator Darryl Roberts, D-Ardmore, said, referring to the creating of the state's executive cabinet system under then-governor George Nigh. "That's not what happened, and this has become nothing more than another high-dollar level of bureaucracy.

"I guarantee you this will cost the state millions of dollars," Roberts added. "We ought to do away with the whole thing and go back to the way it was established in the constitution."

Joining Roberts in opposing the bill was Senator Dave Herbert, D-Midwest City, who said he, too, has not supported the cabinet idea since its inception.

"I didn't like it then, and I don't like it now," Herbert said.

Senator Charles Ford, R-Tulsa, spoke in defense of the bill, saying its opponents were trying to lump the problems of the previous three governors' administrations on the current governor. Ford challenged Roberts and others opposing the measure to give an example of problems within the current cabinet, particularly regarding spending.

In urging passage of the bill, Snyder said it would ultimately be up to the Senate to decide whether a cabinet appointment was approved, and as a result, the Senate would have a say in the costs resulting from the measure.

"This bill gives any governor," Snyder said, "the ability to organize agencies and departments in a way he feels best for the administration of government."

After the bill's 15-30 defeat, Wright announced plans to possibly bring the proposal back to the floor for reconsideration.

RESOLUTION APPROVED REGARDING COLLECTIVE BARGAINING DISPUTES

■(GIT) As law enforcement officials and audience members listened, House members adopted HJR1078 today. The measure would authorize a governmental entity to submit a dispute resolution decision to its voters for approval or rejection. However, the decision would not go into effect until a revenue measure to accompany the funding decision was also approved by the people.

The Oklahoma Municipal League wrote a letter on March 4 to the resolution's author, Rep. Larry Ferguson, R-Cleveland, describing their opposition to the measure. In the letter, officials of the association said the bill "substantially changes the current Fire and Police Arbitration Act" and "further erodes the ability of local elected officials to be accountable to their citizens and to conduct the business of local government."

Officials of the association told Ferguson that the Oklahoma Supreme Court is currently trying to establish the constitutionality of certain sections in the Fire and Police Arbitration Act. The association encouraged the Legislature to set aside decisions on the matter until the court could render its decision.

Rep. Abe Deutshendorf, D-Lawton, asked Ferguson why the Legislature was dealing with the issue. "Why don't we wait till the court can make a decision?" Ferguson told Deutshendorf that it could take years before the Supreme Court decided and the issue needs to get off the ground now.

Rep. Wayne Pettigrew, R-Edmond, told Ferguson that he believed this resolution would take management decisions away from cities. "State Question 640 did the same to the House of Representatives," Ferguson responded. SQ640 requires tax increases to have 75 percent approval of those voting.

The measure was reconsidered and passed with a vote of 54 to 45. It will now go to the Senate for further consideration.

EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION BILL ALLOWING A MERGER RECEIVES APPROVAL FROM HOUSE

■(GIT) A floor substitute for Senate Bill 1162 was addressed in both houses today. The measure provides for the merger of University Center at Tulsa and Rogers State College. House members voted 87 to 13 in favor of the bill. The same consensus was conveyed by the Senate later in the day when members voted 44 to 0.

The floor substitute for the bill would make employees and others with grievances go through administrative channels first before entering the judicial system, explained Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore, author of the bill.

Rep. Wayne Cozort, R-Tulsa, tried to amend the bill with a provision that would have allowed the governor to appoint the nine member board. "Would this give Keating nine new appointments," Rep. Chris Hastings, R-Tulsa, questioned Cozort. "No ...," Cozort answered.

However, Steidley said that by the same token, the amendment does not give any assurance that people currently serving on the Rogers board could not be re-appointed. Steidley motioned to table the amendment. Members voted 49 to 41 in favor of tabling the amendment.

Rep. Michael Thornbrugh, R-Tulsa, offered two amendments suggesting that the governor

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make appointments when necessary, but only with the advice of the Senate. The amendments passed.

Cozort debated against the bill saying it eliminates three appointments by Governor Keating and transfers the power to the Senate Pro Tempore and President of University Center at Tulsa, Rodger Randle. He continued, "I will urge the governor to veto this bill."

Steidley debated in favor of the bill. "This assures some continuity between existing boards and then, only through attrition, the governor will appoint new individuals." He added, "This bill represents innovation, I urge you to support it."

BROWN PSYCHOLOGY BILL FAILS

■(GIT) Senate lawmakers Wednesday shot down a measure creating a new class of mental health professional. SB1221, by Sen. Ben Brown, D-Oklahoma City, would have created the classification of "master psychologist" for those having completed a master's program in psychology, allowing them to practice and treat patients.

The bill also would have created an advisory committee, placing it under the Oklahoma State Board of Examiners of Psychologists. The committee would advise the board on matters relating to licensure, practice and investigations.

"You've got a situation with the doctors sitting at the top, not wanting to let anyone else in," Brown said. "Every time we have allowed a level of practice not equivalent to M.D. or Ph.D., it has not done any damage."

Similar situations between ophthalmologists and optometrists and dentists and denturists have recently come before the Legislature, drawing equally split views.

Dr. Bob Sanders, assistant commissioner for the Oklahoma State Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse, said, while those qualified for the master psychologist level are useful, further education is needed before they should be allowed to practice. "We feel like a person with training at the doctoral level is better prepared to deal with the various personality disorders," he said.

Currently, psychologists must go through extensive testing, completing lengthy educational and personal therapy assessments. Those at the master's level are not required to meet those requirements. "We have the greatest respect for the master's psychologists," Sanders said, "but that is not the whole program." Often, persons at the master's level are used for assessment and diagnostic evaluation purposes.

"I think this is a bill whose time has not come," said Sen. Bernest Cain, D-Oklahoma City. "Maybe in the future, if they raise some of the standards in the program."

Sanders agreed with Cain, saying if the master's program was expanded, increased course work and extended internships would be necessary.

Psychology Board Chairman, Dr. Arlene Schaeffer said, though she could not speak for the board, her own professional opinion reflected those of Sanders. "It has always been the opinion of the National Association of Psychologists that the entry level for psychologists is the doctoral level."

A vote of 15 to 31 defeated the measure and closed the door on the estimated 2,000 individuals seeking the title of master psychologist. Brown filed a motion to reconsider, stating he may or may not bring the issue up again.

CHILD SUPPORT COLLECTION BILL ADVANCES

■(GIT) Efforts to win approval of a bill designed to clarify questions about the statute of limitations on child support collections moved forward Wednesday with the 36-9 approval of Senate Bill 1175.

Authored by Bernest Cain, D-Oklahoma City, the bill made its second appearance on the Senate floor in as many days. Cain had the measure laid over Tuesday because of concerns related to another provision in the bill dealing with liens on real property.

Cain admitted today that some discussion was still necessary to clarify the real property lien provision and urged senators to approve the measure.

Senator Gene Stipe, D-McAlester, argued that some statute of limitations was needed on child support collections to avoid fraud and the fleecing of the elderly.

"We have seen cases where men in their nineties have had their children come back and allege things, because there was no statute of limitations," Stipe said.

Without some limitation on time during which child support could be collected, Stipe added, "This would be a trap for the elderly to be preyed upon by their own children."

Senator J.R. Wilkerson, D-Atwood, said courts throughout the state are currently in a quandary because there is no clear law concerning the statute of limitations on child support collections.

"The child support people want some sort of limitation and the courts want to know how far back they should go," Wilkerson said.

Responding to a question, Cain said passage of the bill would mean that someone judged to owe child support would owe that money until it was paid in full. As debate on the measure progressed, however, Cain seemed to be in agreement with those who suggested a limit on the number of years after the child turns 18 might be appropriate.

"If you want to limit it to a certain number of years after the child turns 18, that's okay with me," Cain said. "What I don't want to see is someone elude paying child support for five or six years and the state not be able to collect."

ELIZABETH DOLE TAKES THE FLOOR

■(GIT) U.S. Senate Majority Leader and presidential candidate Bob Dole, R-Kansas, was represented by his wife Elizabeth, who came to Oklahoma City Wednesday to spread his campaign message before members of the Legislature.

Former cabinet secretary to both the Reagan and Bush administrations, Mrs. Dole was named as one of the ten most admired women by a recent Gallup Poll. She has also served as National President of the Red Cross, the organization that handles nearly 70,000 disasters a year and provides approximately half of the country's blood supply.

"I have seen so much tragedy and so much pain as president of the Red Cross," she said, commending the state on its performance during the April 19 Murrah bombing. "I have never seen anything like the way this community came together to help the victims of that bombing — It was incredible."

Citing her husband's tenure and experience as a six-time U.S. Senate leader, Mrs. Dole said he will bring the same to the presidency. "The White House is no place for on-the-job-training," she said. "He is the longest serving Republican Senator in Senate history."

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She also touched on points of her husband's platform, addressing welfare reform, education reform, agriculture and trade.

She stressed giving more power to the states to control their own welfare reform, saying it would save taxpayers an estimated \$60 billion "by not paying Washington bureaucrats."

"Work works," she said. "It gives people the dignity to end the cycle."

She said the nation currently spends about \$285 billion on primary and secondary education and an additional \$16 billion in funding for the U.S. Department of Education. In 1979, Sen. Dole voted against the creation of the department. "We need parents and teachers working together at a local level."

Stressing a "growth oriented policy," Mrs. Dole said her husband's goals also include the opening of foreign trade markets. "Bob Dole doesn't want to build a wall around America," she said. "When four percent of the consumers are in the United States and 96 percent are outside the United States, we need to go for those outside markets."

Thanking Legislators, she said, "The only occasion that I can think of that would top this would be addressing a joint session of the U.S. Congress where my husband is giving a State of the Union address."

WOMEN'S GROUPS MAKE PLEA FOR INCARCERATED WOMEN

■(GIT) Women's groups from across Oklahoma urged state legislators Wednesday to begin looking for ways to deal with what they described as a developing crisis in Oklahoma's prisons — the incarceration of women for nonviolent offenses and a plan to transfer some of those women to out of state facilities.

According to Mary Tinker, a criminal justice specialist with the League of Women Voters, Oklahoma has the highest incarceration rate for women in the nation, and increasingly, more women are being sent to prison for nonviolent offenses.

Eighty percent of the women serving time in Oklahoma prisons in 1994, Tinker said, were there for nonviolent offenses, including larceny, fraud, drug crimes and other nonviolent crimes.

"Because of this policy," Tinker added, "Oklahoma has crowded prisons well beyond capacity at a continuing danger to employees and inmates. The current solution is to contract for private prison beds. However, there are no private prison beds for women in Oklahoma, not do informed sources at the Department of Corrections anticipate any to be available soon.

"Therefore, 50 women have been sent to a converted city jail in Odessa, Texas, and 80 more are scheduled to go to San Antonio soon."

Jerry Massey, spokesman for the Department of Corrections, said the department oversees some 1,738 women, including 1,169 who are housed in DOC facilities in Oklahoma.

Asked whether the department is planning to transfer more women out of state, Massey replied:

"Yes. Part of our latest proposal before the Board of Corrections asks for bed space for an additional 89 women."

That space, Massey said, would be in private prisons located out of state.

Tinker said the practice of and plan to ship women prisoners from Oklahoma to other states was of particular concern.

"An Episcopal minister who works in prison ministries states that of the fifty (women transferred to Texas), 16 have young children who have been regular weekly visitors to the children and mothers program at Mabel Bassett.

"Since the women went to Texas two months ago, only six have had visits from Oklahoma."

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That, Tinker said, punishes children and families and diminished the effectiveness of programs designed to reduce recidivism and break what she called "an intergenerational pattern" of criminal behavior that "involves several members of the family at a given time."

"We believe that for the state of Oklahoma to embark upon a policy which punishes children and ensures family disruption is wrong and unnecessary," Tinker said. "Instead, we encourage policy makers to carefully examine Senate Bill 671, The Community Corrections Act."

SB671, which died in committee last May, would have provided for the creation of a criminal diversion docket in certain instances and would have authorized the courts to impose a punishment as an alternative to incarceration in certain instances.

The proposal was authored by Senator Bruce Price, D-Hinton, and Representative Jack Bonny, D-Burns Flat.

"As the act is now designed, it would specifically address many of the problems that we have discussed this morning," Tinker said. "The bill carries very detailed provisions for required substance abuse treatment and supervision of the results of that treatment. Strict sanctions would also be brought to bear earlier in an offender's career so that patterns of crime have less chance of becoming a way of life. The court would also be given more information upon which to base sentencing decisions."

"...In terms of desired outcomes," Tinker said, "if a person can be adequately controlled and reformed in the community, it is much more human to try to keep him or her connected to family."

THE STATE HEALTH DEPARTMENT DISCUSSES CRITICAL FUNDING NEEDS WITH LAWMAKERS

■(GIT) Today, Health Department staff officials explained that salaries of nurses employed by the Health Department compares poorly with that of nurses employed by other state agencies and private businesses. "They work for a few years as a public nurse practitioner, then go straight to home health care companies," Dr. J.R. Nida, Commissioner of Health, explained to members of the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Health and Social Services. "If I do not have nurses, I am out of business!"

Julie Crowder, a nursing student attending the University of Oklahoma, supported Nida's statement. "New graduates do not go directly into home health care. However, after gaining a few years experience as a public nurse, they leave to work for a home health care business which often pays better and offers flexible hours," she said.

For the Fiscal Year 1997 appropriation request, the department is asking for \$1,268,324 to aid in salary increases for public health nurses. In fact, the Governor's recommendation matches the department's request. Nurses would receive an additional \$400 a month with the request.

In addition to salary increases for nurses, the department said funding for vaccines and immunizations are not sufficient. Nida told members that 11 percent of children under age three are "falling through the cracks." That percentage averages out to equal approximately 90,000 Oklahoma children per year.

In the past, the State Legislature appropriated funding for those immunizations. It has only been in the last couple of years that the department was able to cover those costs through federal money. With cuts in federal funding, the department needs the state to help pick up these costs. The agency is asking for \$3,254,999. The governor's recommendation falls short of the agency's request by approximately \$353,000.

Sen. Bernest Cain, D-Oklahoma City, asked Nida how he proposed to reach the 90,000 non-immunized children. Nida said the money would mandate universal coverage for all children. As common practice, Nida explained that private doctors were already referring their patients on to

the Health Department to receive their shots. "It costs them less," he explained. "We supply free vaccine to every doctor, but they may charge a fee for the inoculation."

Nida explained that staff time accounted for most of the cost in universal coverage. The Health Department is mandated by federal law to not turn any child away. "This is a program that involves no bureaucracy," said Brent Van Meter, Deputy Commissioner for Special Health Services. "This money goes straight to the people."

Nida explained that the agency may not lose its federal funding this year. However, the powerful pharmaceutical lobbies in Washington demanding full price for the vaccines, could "kill" the federal contract.

The committee touched on other items including infectious disease control, family planning and teen pregnancy. Members plan to tour a facility that provides programs for teen mothers and their children. "This is one area we could gain bipartisan support," Chairman of the Committee, Sen. Ben Robinson, D-Muskogee.

TULSA MAYOR SUSAN SAVAGE ADDRESSES WOMEN

■(GIT) Tulsa Mayor Susan Savage urged Oklahoma women to challenge their own and the state's priorities in her keynote address Wednesday before an estimated 300 women who gathered at the Capitol for Network for the Nineties Legislative Day.

Speaking in the House chamber, Savage, who is serving her second term as Tulsa's mayor and chairs the Indian Nation Council on Municipal Governments, said that it is important, particularly for women, to take the time to examine what government does and how to find new ways to achieve their goals.

"There are so many challenges before us, and the world is changing so quickly," Savage said.

Savage said the pioneer women who helped settle Oklahoma were an excellent example of what it sometimes takes to achieve one's goals.

"The future was all they had when they arrived in Indian Territory," Savage explained. "But they were full of hope and promise."

"Despite all the hardships, they showed courage and were unyielding in their pursuit of their goals."

Savage also praised the women of Oklahoma who had found personal success, noting that more women currently serve in the state legislature than ever before and that other key government offices, from Chief Justice of the Oklahoma Supreme Court to legislative pages, are also held by women.

"Despite women's accomplishments," Savage cautioned, "women are often evaluated by different standards," including looks, emotional quotient, their children and whether they work or remain in the home.

That is why, Savage said, it is important that women challenge the priorities of the state and themselves.

"We must challenge the priorities of a state that imposes a greater penalty for bear wrestling than it does for family violence. We must challenge the priorities of a state that has seen its corrections department budget grow by eight percent, while its education budget has grown by only one percent," Savage said.

Savage also said the women should challenge the passage of State Question 669, which she said would limit economic development, hurt education and shift the tax burden to those interested in coming to Oklahoma and creating jobs.

In closing, Savage urged those in attendance to continue their personal searches for growth and involvement.

"Each of you has to continue to look for the pattern of life in unusual places," Savage said.

JOB FAIR PROVIDES 'VISIBILITY' FOR PROJECT 1000

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Making Project 1000 happen is a little like painting a picture on new canvas: it has to be made visible before it can be understood and appreciated, says Oklahoma Corporation Commissioner Ed Apple.

Project 1000 is a public and private partnership to create more jobs in Oklahoma for Oklahoma college graduates by getting 1,000 Oklahoma companies to hire at least one more Oklahoma college graduate this year than they planned to hire.

To help create visibility, understanding and appreciation, Apple, who is chairing Project 1000 at the request of Gov. Frank Keating, is seeking Oklahoma business firms and college seniors to participate in a job fair on April 9 at the State Capitol Building. The goal is to bring together at least 250 business organizations and as many as possible graduating seniors who would like to put their job skills to work in Oklahoma.

"The Project 1000 job fair is a starting point, a first effort to get Oklahoma business firms and soon-to-be college graduates together for some face to face conversation about jobs and career opportunities in Oklahoma," Apple said.

"Project 1000 is a different concept of economic development for those who are accustomed to thinking in big numbers. A new company locating in Oklahoma that would create 1,000 jobs would draw immediate attention while creating 1,000 more in-state jobs for Oklahoma college graduates one at a time would go almost unnoticed, but it would have about the same economic impact in terms of salaries paid, goods and services purchased and taxes collected," explained Apple, who worked in business and banking before being appointed to the Corporation Commission in January 1995.

Providing more job opportunities through Project 1000 is also more reliable than depending on one company, Apple said, noting that Micron Technology, a computer chip manufacturer that once considered Oklahoma as the location for a new plant, has suspended plans to build the new plant in Utah. "That's about 4,000 anticipated jobs lost because of a change in market conditions in one industry," he noted.

Apple emphasized that Project 1000 is not a Corporation Commission function, nor funded with state money.

"It is a joint venture with many concerned groups, however, I feel that any legislator, any elected official or any state agency has an obligation to provide whatever support he, she or it can to help Oklahoma grow and prosper whenever an opportunity presents itself," he said.

The job fair on April 9 is being organized and managed by college placement directors from several state universities, and all state colleges and some private schools are providing job fair information to interested students through their career placement offices.

The state Department of Commerce, the Oklahoma Employment Security Commission and the Regents for Higher Education are participating in Project 1000 in their areas of occupational and career development expertise, and the state Chamber of Commerce, the United Federation of Independent Businesses and many other community organizations are also assisting, Apple said.

OKLAHOMA CUTS SIZE OF STATE GOVERNMENT, BUCKS REGIONAL, NATIONAL TRENDS

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Oklahoma has been more successful at cutting state government than any other state in the region over the last five years, according to a national trade publication.

A report in the latest issue of State Policy Reports documented the effectiveness of state government downsizing efforts in the 50 states during a five year period from December 1990 to December 1995.

According to the study, Oklahoma was one of just seven states in the country to cut state government during that period.

Oklahoma was the only state in the region to cut the size of state government. Texas, New Mexico, Arkansas, Missouri, Colorado, Louisiana all increased government employment.

"We've done a great job of streamlining government," said Senator Larry Dickerson, chairman of the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on General Government and Transportation. "Most other states are adding state government workers. We're bucking the national and regional trends."

"I think this sends a great signal to business recruits around the country," said Senator Dickerson. "It tells them that Oklahoma is running a cost-efficient state that is using its resources wisely."

The Poteau legislator says the decline in state government should also bolster support for a state employee pay raise program he authored this year.

Under SB1128, state employees who receive a performance evaluation score of "meets standards" or higher, would receive a raise of \$1,200. In addition, state nurses and other health care professionals who are significantly below the market salary average would have their pay raised. The estimated cost of the pay program is approximately \$42 million.

If it is implemented, the program will bring the average pay of state employees a little closer to the average private sector salary. According to a survey conducted by Deloitte and Touche for the Office of Personnel Management, state employee pay is currently between 13 and 16 percent below market.

"We've been successful in making state government leaner and meaner," said Dickerson. "It's time that we reward our best state employees with a pay raise so we can prevent them from jumping to the private sector. When we constantly have to rehire and retrain workers, it costs the state money."

SB1128 was approved by the full Senate today on a 44-0 vote. Its next stop is the State House of Representatives.

OCC SEEKS SUGGESTIONS ON NEW SALTWATER DISPOSAL TECHNOLOGY

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) The Oklahoma Corporation Commission is seeking information and suggestions from well operators, engineers, geologists and other petroleum technology specialists on how the regulatory agency could help encourage use of a new method of disposing of salt water that is a byproduct of oil and gas production.

Presently, the salt water is separated at the wellhead and pumped into approved underground formations through licensed disposal wells. The process is costly since an on-site disposal well must be established or the salt water must be hauled to a designated disposal well at another location.

Some companies have started using a new technology called simultaneous injection and production which separates the petroleum from the salt water underground at the reservoir and pumps the salt water directly into an approved deeper disposal reservoir in the same well.

"Simultaneous injection reduces disposal costs and is environmentally safer because the salt water is never brought to the surface where there is a risk of accidental spillage and soil contamination, and production economics are improved because the petroleum does not have to be forced to the surface through standing water at the perforation point," Dr. Bruce Langhus, Corporation Commission underground injection control manager, said.

But commission rules that prescribe environmental safety requirements for subsurface disposal of salt water don't recognize simultaneous disposal as an option, so operators can't realize full economic benefits from the new technology, Langhus said.

For example, he said, an operator who wants to dispose of salt water on-site must meet surface casing requirements for a disposal well although the requirements are unnecessary when the salt water is separated underground.

Langhus said the Corporation Commission is seeking suggestions on how its underground injection rules could be revised to encourage use of the new technology.

"Simultaneous injection promises to cut down on the largest source of oilfield waste while improving the economics of almost every oil and gas well in Oklahoma," Langhus said. He cited several uses of the technology and the economic results.

Langhus said use of the new technology is especially important in Oklahoma where the average oil well produces fewer than three barrels of oil but more than 36 barrels of salt water per day.

Langhus said the Corporation Commission plans to change its underground injection rules. "But right now, we want to collect ideas and suggestions to help make sure that proposed rule changes will be helpful to the oil and gas industry and will continue to protect the environment," he said.
