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HB2620, a committee substitute by Maddox, creates the Construction Division within the Department of Corrections. The measure was given a do pass motion.

HB2621, by Dickerson, creates the State Employees Fair Labor Relations Act. The measure is an effort to provide a "fair workplace that is responsive to the needs of state employees," the bill states. Even with eleven opposing votes, the measure was given a do pass motion.

HB2667, by Sen. Keith Leftwich, D-Oklahoma City, reapportions the fees, taxes and penalties received from the Oklahoma Vehicle License and Registration Act to the General Revenue Fund and State Transportation Fund. After having its enacting clause stricken, the measure was given a do pass motion.

HB2670, by Senate President Pro Tempore Stratton Taylor, D-Claremore, provides for county reimbursement of inmate medical expenses. The measure, after having its enacting clause stricken, was given a do pass motion.

HB2671, also by Taylor, creates the State Employee Pay Evaluation Act of 1996. With a stricken enacting clause, the measure received a do pass motion.

HB2690, a committee substitute by Leftwich, creates the Oklahoma Ethics in Privatization Functions Act. The measure is designed to set guidelines for privatization of state services and contracts.

An amendment to the bill deleted all of section 14. The section was an attempt to prevent candidates from accepting donations from Jan. 1 to June 30 of each year.

The amended measure was given a do pass motion. It received 5 nay votes.

HB2735, by Sen. Mike Fair, R-Oklahoma City, relates to persons eligible for parole. It provides for prisoners who are illegal aliens to be paroled into the custody of Immigration and Naturalization Services.

An amendment by Brown removed section 3 of the measure. The section directed the Department of Corrections to determine the place of birth of all in their custody.

After having its title stricken, the amended measure was given a do pass motion.

HB2782, a shell bill by Monson, creates the State Employee Compensation System Reform Act. Its enacting clause stricken, the measure was given a do pass motion.

HBs 2852, 2853 and 2854, shell bill's by Taylor, all create the Governmental Powers Clarification Act. The measures were all given a collective do pass motion.

HB2861, by Monson, relating to retirement systems, modifies qualifying provisions for domestic orders. It also authorizes child support orders. The measure, with a stricken title, received a do pass motion.

HB2932, a committee substitute by Sen. Ben Robinson, D-Muskogee, provides for reimbursement of sheriffs' costs for transportation services. After having its title stricken, the measure received a do pass motion.

HB2938, a committee substitute by Dickerson, modifies the duties of the office of the attorney general and allows the office to recover related costs and expenses. With a stricken title, the measure received a do pass motion.

HB2950, by Brown, authorizes the employment of convicted felons for use in drug and other substance abuse rehabilitation programs. The measure received a do pass motion.

HB2969, a committee substitute by Monson, directs the Oklahoma Health Care Authority to distribute materials evaluating health plans or health care providers to the governor, and legislative leadership. The measure had its title stricken and was given a do pass motion.

HB2971, a committee substitute by Henry, amends the Oklahoma Firefighters Pension and Retirement System and the Oklahoma Police Pension and Retirement System to allow adopted children to be included as beneficiaries. The measure was given a do pass motion.

HB3008, a committee substitute by Cain, states that the Department of Corrections shall not use its facility at 1411 N. Classen Blvd., in Oklahoma City, for the purposes of inmate custody. The measure was given a do pass motion.

HB3021, a committee substitute by Brown, requires health insurance policies to provide related coverage for diabetics. The measure was given a do pass motion.

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
