HOUSE JUDICIARY COMMITTEE ADVANCES 8 BILLS

■(GIT) The House Judiciary Committee on Tuesday gave do pass recommendations to eight bills:

SB719 (amended) by Sen. Trish Weedn, D-Purcell, and Rep. Larry Rice, D-Pryor, modifying the definition of record as it relates to the Oklahoma Open Records Act to include data files created by or used with computer software and exempts the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation from furnishing criminal history information;

SB1061 by Sen. Dick Wilkerson, D-Atwood, and Rep. Jari Askins, D-Duncan, stating that any order directing a defendant to pay costs of representation shall be a lien against all real and personal property of the defendant and may be filed against such property as provided by law;

SB1185 (amended) by Sen. Jerry Smith, R-Tulsa, and Rep. Chris Hastings, R-Tulsa, allowing for the destruction of all paper records that have been microfilmed;

SB1218 by Sen. Smith and Rep. Bill Settle, D-Muskogee, providing a procedure for the construction of duplicate sections of law related to statutes and reports;

SB1240 (amended) by Sen. Smith and Rep. Hastings, modifying legal requirements related to child support;

SB1261 by Sen. Smith and Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore, modifying statutory references pertaining to the Small Claims Procedure Act and the Oklahoma Pleading Code relevant to petitions to transfer to another docket of the district court;

SB1294 by Sen. Smith and Rep. Steidley, exemption from jury service persons who have previously served within the previous two years; and

SB1310 (as amended) by Sen. Bernice Shedrick, D-Stillwater, and Rep. Steidley, modifying statutory references to workers' compensation.

SENATE JUDICIARY HOLDS LAST MEETING, MOVES HOUSE MEASURES

■(GIT) In its last meeting this year, the Senate Judiciary Committee moved several assigned House measures Tuesday.

HB1507, by Sen. Lewis Long, D-Glenpool, relates to homestead exemptions. It adds exemptions relating to child support obligations. With a vote of 2 to 7, the measure failed.

HB1989, a committee substitute by Sen. Jerry Smith, R-Tulsa, modifies duties of the district court judge in issuing instructions relating to acquisition of lands by purchase, donation or condemnation. The measure received a vote of 11 to 0, passing it out of committee.

HB2053, a committee substitute by Sen. Ben Brown, D-Oklahoma City, modifies requirements for those involved in child abuse and neglect cases. (See related story.)

HB2056, by Sen. Brooks Douglass, R-Oklahoma City, requires the Department of Corrections to provide a place within the walls of the state prison at McAlester so that members of the immediate family of any deceased victim of the defendant may witness the execution. It also requires the judge who presided at the trial and the chief of police of the municipality in which the crime occurred to witness the execution. The measure was passed out of committee with a vote of 8 to 0.

HB2182, by Sen. Gene Stipe, D-McAlester, states legislative intent to protect the rights of child witnesses. It states considerations that must be considered before deciding to accept the

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
