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and "special promotional game" to the Oklahoma Charity Games Act, exempts religious, charitable, labor, fraternal and educational organizations from the definition of "organization" and states the price for an employee license shall be \$5.00. The measure also states that an organization licensed to conduct charity games may remit a monthly equivalent amount of tax to the Oklahoma Tax Commission in lieu of paying the distributor for taxes levied.

The bill was amended on page 8, section 5 line 21; page 3 section 1, line 16; and pages 4 and 5, section 1. These amendments were provided to clarify that these acts were not class III gaming. The bill received a do pass vote.

SB910, also authored by Rep. Fields, clarifies language pertaining to the Oklahoma State and Education Employees Group Insurance Act, the Oklahoma State Employees Benefits Act, and the Oklahoma Health Care Authority Act. The bill received a do pass vote, with the title restored.

SB791, authored by Rep. Jari Askins, D-Duncan, removes the prohibition against transporting a concealed rifle or shotgun in a vehicle. The measure received a do pass vote with the title restored.

SB694, authored by Rep. Joe Hutchinson, D-Jay, adds county boards and public trust authorities to provisions allowing dual office holdings. The measure received a do pass vote.

SB922, authored by Rep. Larry Roberts, D-Miami, transfers the State Employee Assistance Program from the Office of Personnel Management to the State and Education Employees Group Insurance Board effective July 1, 1996. The bill received a do pass vote with the title restored.

SB1106, also authored by Rep. Roberts, modifies sections pertaining to the Oklahoma State and Education Employee Group Insurance Board and the Oklahoma State Employees Benefits Council and prohibits the Board from offering a health plan which is owned or operated by the state and which utilizes a capitated payment plan for providers which uses a primary care physician as a gatekeeper to any specialty care provided by physician-specialists, unless specifically authorized by the Legislature. The bill received a do pass vote with the title restored.

SB1167, authored by Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore, provides regulations relating to simulcast races and fair associations licensed to conduct race meeting and clarifies days considered racing days. The measure also provides for percentage of winnings to be received from wagering and provides for distribution of such moneys. It also states Oklahoma does not conduct live racing. The measure received a do pass vote.

SB1040, authored by Rep. James Dunlap, R-Bartlesville, establishes criteria for setting premiums within the State and Education Employees Group Insurance Act. The measure received a do pass vote with the title restored.

HCR1071, authored by Rep. Frank Davis, R-Guthrie, proclaims the Legislature's support of a Sports Museum in the City of Guthrie. The resolution received a do pass vote.

SB1260, authored by Rep. Jim Glover, was pulled from the agenda.

SENATE GENERAL GOVERNMENT APPROVES FOUR HOUSE BILLS, ONE FAILS

■(GIT) Monday, members of the Senate General Government Committee met and approved four measures. Measures included, **HB2101**, authored by Jack Begley, D-Goodwell, allows officers or employees of a municipality with a population of more than 2,500 to conduct business with the municipality. It also allows members of any board of education of the municipality with a population over 2,500 to furnish materials or supplies to said municipality and allows members of any board of education within a municipality with the above stated population to vote on contracts between area vocational-technical schools and the entity by which the member is employed.

HB2213, authored by Rep. Howard Cotner, D-Altus, modifies the description of geographic areas represented by the Red River Boundary Commission.

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
