HOUSE PASSES LICENSE PLATES BILLS

■(GIT) During session Tuesday, lawmakers passed each proposed piece of legislation that was before them. Those considered today were:

HR1062, authored by Rep. Don Kinnamon, D-Stroud, commends and congratulates banker H.E. "Gene" Rainbolt for his activities on behalf of the State of Oklahoma.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

SB752, authored by Rep. James Holt, R-Ponca City, modifies language relating to special license plates by creating a United States Air Force Association License Plate.

The measure received a passing vote of 98-0 with an emergency clause.

SB783, authored by Rep. Larry Adair, D-Stilwell, requires the Department of Agriculture to establish planting and harvesting seasons for the purpose of meeting the maximum driving and on-duty time exemptions set forth in the National Highway System Designation Act of 1995.

The bill received a vote of 99-0 with an emergency clause.

SB886, authored by Rep. Jari Askins, D-Duncan, provides for special license plates for police officers.

The measure passed with a vote of 100-0.

SCR50, authored by Rep. Fred Stanley, D-Madill, praises the life and achievements of the late Bill Vinson.

The resolution was adopted.

SENATE VOTES — MARCH 26, 1996

■(GIT) The following measures were addressed Tuesday on the Senate floor:

HB2082, by Sen. Gilmer Capps, D-Snyder, et al., designates the black swallowtail as the state butterfly of Oklahoma. The measure passed with a vote of 46 to 0.

HB2085, by Sen. Gene Stipe, D-McAlester, changes the limitation to commence prosecution of financial crimes to five years. It also changes the limitation to commence prosecution for lewd or indecent proposals against children to seven years. The measure passed with a vote of 47 to 0.

HB2112, by Sen. Trish Weedn, D-Purcell, modifies the penalty for defacing, stealing or possessing road signs or markers. The measure passed with a vote of 47 to 0.

The measure was amended to include the option of sentencing offenders to both fines and imprisonment in addition to community service.

HB2122, by Sen. Brad Henry, D-Shawnee, modifies requirements for attorneys relating to subpoenas, depositions and witnesses. The measure passed with a vote of 32 to 14.

HB2152, by Sen. Jerry Smith, R-Tulsa, adds other areas used for court functions to the acceptable list of expenses court funds may incur. The measure passed with a vote of 44 to 2.

The measure was amended, renumbering applicable paragraphs within the measure.

HB2223, by Sen. Frank Shurden, D-Henryetta, prohibits county commissioners from spending funds for any purpose other than normal operating expenditures. The measure passed, with an emergency clause, with a vote of 46 to 0.

HB2227, by Sen. J.R. "Dick" Wilkerson, D-Purcell, provides that a judge may issue a search warrant for an occupied dwelling if he finds that evidence is located on the premises between 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m., the search is a crime scene search or the subject of the warrant is a fugitive or the subject of an outstanding warrant. It also states search warrants for other than occupied dwellings may be served at any time without special direction. The measure passed with a vote of 43 to 4.

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
