## WHAT MADE IT OVER THE COMMITTEE HURDLE ... AND WHAT DIDN'T

■(GIT) Horse tripping and domestic violence, open records, educational reform, environmental restrictions and changing the way Oklahoma sentences and houses its criminals. These are just some of the tough issues facing lawmakers this year. With this week's wrap-up of committee work, some of this key legislation may yet make it to the governor's desk. However, with the wrap-up of committee work this week, many bills were left out in the cold. So as the committee chairmen put their gavels on the shelf until next year, *Capitol Network News* took a look at what made it over the committee hurdle...and what didn't.

Oklahoma prisoners may soon find themselves serving a minimum of 85 percent of their sentence before being eligible for parole if the Truth in Sentencing Policy Advisory Commission has its way. **HB1138**, by Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore, would also change the way prisoners are sentenced, doing away with the need to sentence a prisoner to a 100 year sentence to ensure they serve at least 30 of those years.

"We need credibility in the system," said District Attorney Bob Macy, supporting the initiative during a recent press conference. "The people need to believe in it."

The measure unanimously passed the full Senate last April and is currently awaiting conference with House and Senate members. The commission is scheduled to meet sometime this month to put the finishing touches on its report to the governor and legislative leadership. "We are about eighty-five percent finished," said Chief Deputy of the attorney general's Criminal Division Richard Wintory recently. "Our concern is getting it right, not right away."

Tents may be the place where those tougher sentences are carried out if Senate Concurrent Resolution (SCR) 47 is adopted. Originally designed to create four new 500-bed medium security prisons, the measure, by Sen. Gene Stipe, D-McAlester, was amended recently, directing the Department of Corrections to purchase tents, barbed wire and fencing to house prisoners, an attempt to address the state's prison overcrowding problem. Author of the amendment, Sen. Jerry Pierce, R-Tulsa, called the change a "cheaper" alternative.

Similar legislation has proved successful in other states, such as Arizona. The Arizona State Prison Complex at Tucson utilizes the concept, housing prisoners in 500 tents on the facility's grounds.

"We will possibly be expanding the number to 900 at the request of the Legislature," said John Hallahan, warden at the Arizona facility.

"I think a lot of people think we treat prisoners too good," said Sen. Sam Helton, D-Lawton, supporter of the Pierce amendment. "I think a lot of senators were sending a message to their constituents."

Though the measure does not carry the effect of law, resolutions are often considered a "firm recommendation" to agencies to follow legislative intent. SCR47 is awaiting approval from the House.

Sen. Kevin Easley experienced defeat recently with the defeat of **SB793**. Members of the House Committee on Energy, Environment and Natural Resources killed the measure, designed to remove the Corporation Commission's authority to regulate oil and gas, by assigning it a

The measure barely passed the Senate last month with a vote of 26 to 19, only one vote over the required 25 votes to pass a measure in the Senate.

The measure is an attempt to address alleged problems with the oil and gas division of the commission. It would assign oil and gas authority to a newly created Energy Administration Board, with members appointed by the governor and legislative leadership.

"I am willing to support moving the agency if they fund it properly," said Corporation Commission Chairman Cody Graves, commenting on the lack of appropriated state dollars to the division. "I just want to make sure this five billion dollar industry will continue to operate efficiently."

On the environmental front, a bill by Rep. Russ Roach, D-Tulsa, would allow communities to conduct gas cap integrity tests, an attempt to bring municipal environmental standards up to par with Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) mandates. Failure to remain within EPA clean air levels can result in the loss of federal dollars and industry to an area. **HB2346** is awaiting attention from the full Senate.

"This legislation would be the most cost-effective way to keep us within attainment," said Tulsa Chamber Vice President of Governmental Affairs Richard Hedgecock. Cities not in compliance with EPA clean air standards often find it "...difficult to recruit new business or allow existing businesses to expand," he said.

After threats of EPA sanctions five years ago, Tulsa enacted the Ozone Alert Program. When air quality reaches unacceptable levels, initiatives such as reductions in Reid vapor pressure in gasoline and free bus rides are put into place.

"This bill would give us one more tool to stay in attainment," said Tulsa Mayor Susan Savage.

The use of the coolant Freon and other chlorofluorocarbons (CFCs) is another environmental issue facing lawmakers this year. **HB2155**, by Rep. Randall Erwin, D-Nashoba, would condone the manufacture, sale, distribution and use of CFCs. Designed to reduce the threat to the earth's reported decaying ozone layer, the measure recently passed the Senate Committee on Energy, Environmental Resources and Regulatory Affairs. Members disagreed on the actual threat CFCs posed to the environment.

"This is the biggest hoax ever pulled on the American people and the world," was the recent comment from the bill's Senate author Frank Shurden, D-Henryetta.

Already against federal law, questions were raised as to the bill's affect on CFC distribution and use. "It [the bill] doesn't affect anything," said Department of Environmental Quality Executive Director Mark Coleman. "It's a wash, except to maybe mislead the consumer." Coleman said passage of the measure may mislead Oklahoma consumers into believing their use of CFCs is now legal.

He urged Senate lawmakers to "...put something in it to make sure people understand that they would still be in violation of federal law."

The measure now goes before the full Senate, after passing out of committee with a narrow vote of 6 to 5.

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Possibly one of the most controversial and heavily debated measures this year has to be educational reform. Issues including mid-term funding, open school transfer, charter schools and career teacher incentives have topped the lists of legislators and lobbyists, Democrats and Republicans alike, each hoping to see their own initiatives included in the final draft of legislation.

Called the "son of 1017," **SB1100**, by Sen. Don Williams, D-Balko, is the most broad-based educational reform measure in the works. A similar House measure, **HB2055**, by Rep. Jack Begley, D-Goodwell, is also working its way through the Legislature, but has received less attention.

"It probably has a good chance of making it through both houses," Education Secretary Floyd Coppedge said recently, though he did expect problems with specific issues as school choice, which, along with open school transfer, is being dealt with under separate legislation.

Some of the more controversial sections of the bill include career teacher incentives and retirement funding, early and alternative education programs, permanent mid-term funding solutions and textbook funding increases. The proposed initiative carries the weight of over \$100 million in state dollars.

The so-called "Ryan Luke bill" has managed to survive its trip through the legislative process. The measure modifying penalties for those involved in child abuse cases is facing attention from the full Senate. With near unanimous support so far, **HB2053**, by Rep. Laura Boyd, D-Norman, passed the House with a vote of 98 to 2 early last month and the Senate Judiciary Committee with a vote of 11 to 0.

One of the few lawmakers in opposition to the bill, Rep. William Graves, R-Oklahoma City, told House members the bill had the potential of contributing to the already too many false child abuse cases. "It has been shown that two-thirds of all child abuse cases are unfounded," he said on the House floor. "DHS has too much power already. DHS can, by speculation or suspicion, take children away from good parents."

Saying the bill "fills in the gaps" of the current system, Boyd called the necessary attention to child abuse "unfortunate."

"In 1994, there were 31 deaths caused by abuse, 39 percent were children under the age of one, and 74 percent were under five years old," she said. "I believe this bill goes a long way to protect children, not just adults. HB2053 goes a long way to bring this issue to a balance."

The "Ryan Luke bill" is awaiting a vote by the full Senate.

An amendment to Sen. Lewis Long's "horse tripping bill" now expands the measure to address domestic violence. **SB680** addresses the underground sports of horse tripping and bear wrestling.

"While some say it's not a problem now, I want to stop it before it becomes a problem," the Glenpool Democrat said late last year, just after prefiling the bill. "I think everybody has a conscience. I don't think anybody wants to see animals get hurt."

Sen. Penny Williams, D-Tulsa, offered an amendment on the Senate floor, increasing the fine for assault and battery against spouses, former or current, and anyone with whom the defendant has had a child or used to live with.

"All we are doing," Williams told Long at the time of the amendment, "is increasing the penalty for domestic abuse from five hundred dollars to two thousand dollars, which does not compare to five thousand dollars for wrestling a bear."

In the House Committee on Criminal Justice, the bill was amended to reduce the fine for bear wrestling to \$2,000, and increase the fine for domestic violence to \$3,000.

Passing the Senate unanimously, the measure is awaiting consideration by the House.

A measure by Sen. Trish Weedn, D-Purcell, was killed in the Senate Committee on Small Business, but resurrected moments later.

**SB719** modifies the requirements of the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation (OSBI) to provide criminal history information to members of the press. Originally defeated in the Senate Committee with a tie vote of 4 to 4, questions were raised as to the vote's legitimacy. The uncertainty caused the committee's chairman, Sen. Jim Maddox, D-Lawton, to reassemble members

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to recast their votes. The recall resulted in two members changing their votes, passing the measure with a vote of 6 to 2.

Supported by the Oklahoma Press Association (OPA), the measure would require the OSBI to provide computerized information of all its criminal history information, a dangerous task, according to the OSBI.

"The whole purpose is not to deny access to the media," said Kym Koch, OSBI public information officer. "We don't feel like we can protect the integrity of the data. We can't guarantee the integrity of the reporter to double-check that record or the integrity of that entity to update their records on a daily basis."

Koch said OSBI technology currently does not allow for up to the minute updates in status, which is constantly changing.

"Good people can get hurt by the dissemination of raw data," said Sen. Dick Wilkerson, D-Atwood, calling the potential of inaccurate information being released too high. "Unless your name is Zoran Brusanovich, there is a good chance your name is on file."

A similar measure passed both houses of the Legislature two years ago, "without a single dissenting vote," said Weedn. It was vetoed by Gov. David Walters.

"The OSBI is in the business of selling their records for the purpose of making money to spend any way they want," said OPA President Ben Blackstock. "The only way we are going to know the OSBI has rotten records is to have them operate under the Open Records Act as it is."

The measure now goes before the House for consideration.

A measure by Sen. Darryl Roberts, D-Ardmore, recodifying Oklahoma's entire criminal code was killed. The measure never emerged from Rep. William Paulk's House Committee on Criminal Justice last year.

It is uncertain if Roberts will tackle the issue again next year. The measure, coupled with SB1, another recodifying measure, represent some eight years of work for the veteran lawmaker.

Roberts stated last year, that if the measure failed this time, he would not bring it up again. It remains to be seen if he will change his mind or not.

Capitol Network News will continue to follow these and other measures as they wind their way through the halls, offices and chambers of the Legislature. With just approximately eight weeks left in the Second Session of the 45th Oklahoma Legislature, one thing is certain: the scramble for the governor's signature will be exciting.

## LAWMAKER DISCUSSES 'SATURDAY EXPERIMENT'

■(GIT) Oklahoma voters are not as likely to accept the idea of returning to the caucus system to choose delegates to national political party conventions as are state Democrats who voted earlier this month to ask the legislature to do just that, an Oklahoma City lawmaker believes.

Speaking during a recent meeting of the Senate's Appropriations Subcommittee on General Government and Transportation, Sen. Keith Leftwich, D-Oklahoma City, said, "The genie is out of the bottle, and I don't think the voters are going to want to go back."

The Oklahoma City Democrat was referring to a request from state Democrats who voted during their annual convention this month to ask lawmakers to do away with the quadannual presidential preference primary. If the primary is eliminated, caucuses would be used to choose the delegates to the national party conventions.

Democrats cited a number of reasons for their request, particularly low voter turnout. Other speculation about the request has centered on the way delegates to the national convention are chosen — by the state campaign chairman for the winning candidate — to the possibility that obscure candidates, such as Lyndon LaRouche, Jr., have shown the potential to win state delegates under the current system.

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Leftwich noted that complaints about the caucus system remain unchanged — that too few people participate and that they are dominated by special interest groups.

Leftwich said during the meeting that rather than eliminating the presidential preference primary, the state might want to consider what he called the Saturday experiment — moving the presidential preference primary to the Saturday before Super Tuesday.

Speaking with *Capitol Network News*, Leftwich said the idea is consistent with efforts to improve voter participation.

"We've talked for sometime about holding an election on a Saturday," Leftwich said, "to see what kind of effect it might have on voter participation."

Another consideration, mentioned by both Leftwich and state Democrats, is the effect such a move could have on candidate interest in the state. Many people, particularly those within the state political parties, have complained about the lack of attention paid Oklahoma by the presidential candidates.

Leftwich noted that South Carolina also holds its presidential preference primary on that day. Because of that, he said, Oklahoma might want to consider moving its primary to an even earlier Saturday.

"I can't say either way that it's going to get candidates more interested in the state, but it might," Leftwich said.

Other, less specific ideas for increasing voter participation and candidate interest have also been mentioned by various lawmakers. A key concern this year, however, was to avoid tampering with the system and giving the appearance of attempting to influence this year's presidential primaries.

Twenty-five measures dealing with elections, particularly voter registration requirements, are currently making their way through both houses of the legislature.

## EDUCATION REFORM LEGISLATION DISCUSSED AT CONFERENCE

■(GIT) The Organization of Rural Oklahoma Schools (OROS) held their annual Spring Conference in conjunction with the fifth National Conference on Creating the Quality School Friday in Oklahoma City. Organization members listened to a presentation on federal legislation by the National Rural Education Association (NREA), and a question and answer Legislative update followed NREA's presentation. The update allowed members to ask Rep. James Hager, D-Pawhuska and Chairman of the House Education Committee, questions on pending state legislation, specifically **SB1100**, known as education reform bill.

Pauline Hodges, president-elect for NREA, urged members to not neglect federal legislation and targeted a House resolution introduced by freshman Oklahoma Congressman, Steve Largent.

**HR1946**, known as the "Parental Rights and Responsibilities Act of 1995," is backed by 151 House sponsors, Hodges claimed. The resolution would allow parents to sue schools and teachers that exposed their children to issues conflicting with their beliefs. It would also allow a student to opt in or out of any class, school, portion of curriculum and challenge minimum graduation requirements. The bill would also allow parents to challenge home school regulations and minimum age laws relating to compulsory school attendance.

Hodges said the National Parent Teacher Association encourages federal intervention on these local issues. "There is also an identical bill in the Senate," she said.

Hodges encouraged members to contact their Congressmen as well as state elected officials to go on record denouncing the measure. "It is pretty scary what is happening in Washington," she said.

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"I also encourage you to contact Congressman Ernest Istook to go on record supporting the Senate omnibus education bill." Hodges explained that the House version of the bill asks for \$1.4 billion, however, the Senate version of the bill asks for \$4.4 billion. She added that Title 1 will lose 17 percent in funding as a result of pending legislation.

In the end of the presentation, Hodges commented on local politics. "At the local level, I was amused, but not surprised that the governor's education conference did not include any educators." She commended members and Oklahomans for voting down SQ669. "If we cannot take a stand, we should not be involved in rural education," she said.

Jerry Needham, OROS's current executive director, echoed Hodges's request for members to become active in legislative issues. "The Republicans elected think they are anointed." He continued, "We forget the importance of national legislation." Needham explained that elected officials are not aware of the local impact of their legislation. "It is up to us, we have a responsibility...and I will certainly call Istook," he said.

Perry Willis, OROS's executive director-elect, backed Needham and Hodges and asked for members to become involved in the legislative process. "This is the most trying time in education...I urge members to put the organization and rural education issues in the forefront."

Willis made a proposal to schedule the organization's next Spring conference at the State Capitol during session. "There is no reason to not tie the conference together with the Capitol, we need to be represented at the Capitol," he said. Willis and Needham commended the organization's legislative liaison, Vernon Florence, and encouraged members to follow his lead. "Legislators, who are not educators, rely on us for input on education related legislative issues."

Ray Henson, Talihina superintendent and OROS director for Southeastern Oklahoma, informed members of an upcoming trip to Washington. During the trip members will have the opportunity to meet and discuss educational issues with Oklahoma Congressional delegates.

In addition, Florence told members that this Wednesday, 100 to 150 rural superintendents from across the state will visit the State Capitol. He explained that there are three crucial issues facing rural education and educators. They include teacher retirement, mid-term funding and the ad valorem tax protests. "I encourage superintendents to become educated on the political process, not just the issues," he said.

Florence updated members on local legislation that could affect smaller school districts. **HB2102**, authored by Rep. Jack Begley, D-Goodwell, would create two funds to address property tax protests. One would set up an escrow and the other a cash flow fund. If a company wins a court case protesting property taxes, the escrow fund would be utilized. However, the cash flow fund would allow schools to retain obtain cash advances. This method would take pressure off the school with unresolved ad valorem tax protests. He said the bill had been amended for protests to be handled by administrative law judges and protesters would bear the burden of proof, not the Tax Commission.

Florence introduced Hager to discuss the Senate education reform bill. "SB1100 is the catch-all bill," Hager said. "Wednesday, the bill left the House Education Committee." He explained the changes made to the measure by committee members. "Telecommunications was reduced from \$25 million a year, for four years, to \$10.4 million for the first year." He added, "We will have to work on this in conference."

Hager explained that members proposed \$40 million for teacher retirement, but the Senate did not propose anything. Members raised career teacher salaries by \$14 million, alternative education programs by \$6.8 million and mid-term funding by \$16.5 million. "The House is also wanting to expand early childhood programs," he said. With residency, Hager said the education is the receiving end of a "tragic situation." However, the Office of Juvenile Affairs is currently trying to work with the state on the issue. "I also plan to contact the Commission on Children and Youth."

Hager told OROS members that the bill's title had been stricken, and that lawmakers will continue to hammer out the details of the bill in conference.

OROS members voiced concerns on the transportation issue with open-transfer, teacher re-

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tirement and midterm funding. Hager explained that with open transfer, parents could request that the receiving school provide the transportation for their children.

Hager explained that teacher retirement would still be appropriated through the formula. "If we line-item this appropriation, the requests for funding outside the formula would be unending."

Mid-term funding, he explained, would include chargeables and only address this year's funding. It would not address the loss in funding for the past two years. "I have a deep concern that we could come up empty handed on the second floor," he said.

Hager blasted claims that test scores by Oklahoma students were poor. "I want to see these numbers...I believe in public education," he said. He urged members to resist "nay-saying" comments on state public education.

"Get to know your legislator," Hager recommended. "The best advice I could give you is to find a few people at the Capitol you can talk with, this will enhance the dialogue on these issues."

## KEATING CHALLENGES OEA CHIEFS TO EMBRACE EDUCATION REFORM PROPOSALS

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Governor Frank Keating said Thursday the leaders of the Oklahoma Education Association should join him and President Clinton in supporting education reforms like school choice, charter schools and merit pay for outstanding teachers.

"I would hope those who claim to speak for Oklahoma's educators would join leaders of both parties, including the president they support, in a real discussion of what's best for our schools and our young people," Keating said. "Sometimes the OEA leadership tends to be far more liberal than the thousands of caring teachers out there who support school choice, charter schools and merit pay. They just don't get heard as often as the OEA leaders."

In a speech to the National Governors Association Education Summit on Wednesday, President Clinton endorsed school choice and charter schools and supported merit pay for teachers, specifically citing programs in South Carolina and Kentucky that were virtually identical to a merit bonus plan Keating has offered in Oklahoma.

"Some people had a fit when I suggested merit bonuses for outstanding teachers in schools where student performance improves," the governor said. "When President Clinton said the same thing, they said it was a worthy idea. That sounds like a double standard to me."

In his address to the NGA meeting, President Clinton said:

"I also believe anytime you're trying to hold teachers to higher standards they should be rewarded when they perform. I know that in South Carolina and Kentucky, if schools markedly improved their performance, they get bonuses and the teachers get the benefit."

President Clinton also said: "Let me also say I think that we ought to encourage every state to do what most states are now doing, which is to provide more options for parents. You know, the terms of the public school choice legislation and the charter schools — a lot of you have done a very good job with the charter schools."

Gov. Keating has repeatedly proposed school choice and charter schools for Oklahoma. Members of both parties have joined in supporting legislation this session on those two issues, although action in a House committee on Wednesday removed the school choice provision.

"I have no quarrel with those who are part of an emerging national consensus on public education," Keating said. "From a Democratic president to governors from both parties who attended the summit, there is a growing belief that new ideas will build better schools, while the same tired old ideas won't. I hope the OEA leaders will become a part of that discussion."

"I thought the president made an excellent point when he said we should keep the question of

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education beyond partisanship," Keating said. "It's too bad some of our more liberal education figures can't take that advice to heart. They continue to resist or ignore any ideas that aren't part of their own agenda."

In his speech, the president also endorsed more rigorous academic standards to be established by the states, rather than the federal government, and suggested that schools trim administrative costs to devote more funds to the classroom. Both are traditional Republican themes.

"When I proposed the most rigorous academic graduation standards in the nation, most people noticed that the OEA leaders were absolutely silent," Keating said. The governor's plan calls for a required high school core curriculum of four years each of math, science, English and social studies. "I'm still waiting for them to either endorse or oppose this very important idea, but I guess they don't have an opinion. That's too bad. They act as if only their tiny handful of leaders have valid positions on education, but that's definitely not what we heard from President Clinton on Wednesday."

## INSURANCE DEPARTMENT TO GET NEW OFFICE SPACE

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Insurance Commissioner John P. Crawford will be officed in a different location thanks to the help of Lt. Governor Mary Fallin and Senate and House leadership.

In December of last year, the State Insurance Fund, Crawford's office landlord, evicted the Insurance Department from its current location at 1901 North Walnut in order to move the Fund's office back to that location.

"Finding a new place to office was not a problem except for the fact that state law was very specific as where the Insurance Commissioner's office can be located," Crawford said. "The law said that our office had to be either in a state owned building or be located in the Capitol itself. There just wasn't adequate space to meet that criteria, so the law had to be changed.

After working closely with the House and Senate leadership, Crawford's 'move bill' (HB 1817) was sent to the Lt. Governor's office for signature. Having been signed by Fallin on Tuesday, her first of this legislative session, the Insurance Department is free to locate their new home.

"I want to thank everybody that made this move possible, especially Lt. Governor Fallin for signing the bill in the Governor's absence," Crawford said. "She has shown great leadership initiative, and I am grateful."

When asked where the new location for the Insurance Department will be, Crawford stated: "It is down to two different locations, both of which beat the heck out of moving to the Capitol's parking lot, which would have been our only alternative if it were not for our friends across the street."

## NICKLES PRAISES PASSAGE OF FARM BILL CONFERENCE REPORT

■(WASHINGTON) Oklahoma Senator Don Nickles Thursday praised final passage of the 1996 Farm Bill, saying farmers would benefit from greater flexibility, simplicity and opportunity.

"This bill represents a long-term plan to get the government out of the farming business — an idea I strongly support," Nickles said. "No longer will the government tell farmers which crops to plant and no longer will the government tell farmers to leave productive land idle in exchange for a federal handout."

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The joint House-Senate Conference Report on the bill, officially titled the Federal Agricultural Improvement and Reform Act (FAIR), passed 74-26.

"Oklahoma and other Western states have suffered a severe drought during the past six months," Nickles said. "Farmers told me that if Congress failed to enact this Farm Bill, many would be forced out of business. Congress had a responsibility to farmers in Oklahoma and every other agricultural state to enact a farm bill this week. I am pleased they did so."

The bill now goes to the President for signature.

## INHOFE HAILS PASSAGE OF LINE ITEM VETO

■(WASHINGTON) U.S. Senator James M. Inhofe (R-Okla.) Thursday hailed the Senate's passage of the Line Item Veto as an historic achievement which shows that the Republican Congress is keeping its promises to the American people. The Senate voted 69-31 late Wednesday to give future presidents the power to reject specific parts of large spending bills. The House is expected to pass the same bill today.

"Passing the line-item veto is an historic achievement," Inhofe said. "It will help us cut wasteful spending. But even more important, it will force accountability. Now, if the president signs a bill, he will be directly accountable for everything in it. And if he vetoes specific items, Congress will be forced to vote and be accountable on those items."

Under the line item veto bill passed Wednesday, a president will be able to reject specific items contained in large spending bills. Two-thirds votes in both houses of Congress would then be needed to reverse the action.

"This is a reform the people voted for in 1994 as part of the Contract With America," Inhofe said. "The Republican Congress is keeping its promises."

### SENATE AGRICULTURE PASSES TWO BILLS

■(GIT) Members of the Senate Committee on Agriculture and Rural Development passed two measures Monday, both addressing livestock.

**HB2988**, by Sen. Paul Muegge, D-Tonkawa, allows the Department of Agriculture to act in the best interest of the shippers of livestock, in the event of market failure.

After having its enacting clause stricken, the measure passed with a vote of 9 to 1.

**HB2989**, also by Muegge, creates the Livestock Dealers Act. With a stricken enacting clause, the measure was given a do pass motion with a vote of 9 to 1.

### STATE TREASURER'S AG-LINK PROGRAM HAS HELP FOR FARMERS STRUGGLING WITH DROUGHT

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) State Treasurer Robert Butkin doesn't have any rain for Oklahoma Family farmers, but he does have money—\$19 million ready to loan. The low-interest money is available through the Treasurer's Agricultural Linked Deposit program.

Butkin said the Ag-Link program provides low-interest loans to qualified family farmers by linking certificates of deposit with loans at participating financial institutions. Individual farmers may qualify for up to \$350,000.

To qualify, Butkin said the applicant must have a debt-to-asset ratio of at least 55 percent and must earn at least 60 percent of his or her gross income from farming or ranching. The interest rate charged on loans is reduced by up to three percent.

Butkin said farmers who believe they might qualify for an Ag-Link low-interest loan should contact their local financial institution or call the Treasurer's Office at 405-521-3191.

### HOUSE EDUCATION SUBCOMMITTEE TAKES UP BUDGET REQUESTS

■(GIT) Members of the House Appropriations and Budget Subcommittee on Education met Monday, hearing budget requests from three state agencies before the Legislature makes its final appropriations decisions for the year.

The Oklahoma Commission for Teacher Preparation is asking for \$3,367,169 for fiscal year (FY) 1997, a sizable increase from the \$146,000 the commission was appropriated last year. The governor, however, is recommending only \$1,800,000 for next year.

The largest request from the commission comes in the form of \$2,275,227 for teacher assessment system revisions.

The State Board of Education is asking for just over \$1.5 billion for FY '97, a 5.3 percent increase from last year's funding. The largest portion of the request comes in the form of over \$53 million to fund the Career Teachers Salary Enhancement program. Those teachers having

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more than fifteen years experience would have money added to their minimum salary schedule. Recommendations from the Senate include breaking up the years of service into two categories. Teachers with 16 to 19 years of experience would receive a bonus of \$1,000, while teachers with more than 20 years would receive an additional \$1,000.

The governor has recommended a similar program that would rank schools based on standards set by the Office of Accountability. Under the governor's plan, schools reaching the top 20 percent would award its teachers with bonuses.

The board is also asking for \$13.5 million to fund FY '96 midterm funding. The governor has suggested just over \$22 million, providing for anticipated FY '97 growth.

The Oklahoma School of Science and Mathematics is asking for \$4,251,619 in FY '97 funding, a 24.8 percent increase over last year. Their largest request is for \$300,000 to equip and furnish a new dormitory and dining area, expected to be completed in the spring of 1997.

## SENATE SUBCOMMITTEE ON RETIREMENT AND GROUP HEALTH APPROVES NINE BILLS

■(GIT) Nine bills were reported do pass out of committee by members of the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Retirement and Group Health. **HB2188**, authored by Rep. Joan Greenwood, R-Moore, received some debate by members.

The contention focused on a section of the bill that contained an "opt out" provision for state elected officials. The provision would have allowed state elected officials to decline the state insurance coverage. Sen.(s) Angela Monson, D-Oklahoma City and Ted Fisher, D-Sapulpa, opposed the section, saying the shift of officials to private insurance could cause problems in the long-run for those wanting to remain in the state program.

In favor of the section, Sen. Mike Fair, R-Oklahoma City, explained to members the choice for including only state elected officials in the "opt out" provision concerned time. "State elected officials could be here at the Capitol for a couple of years, as opposed to state employees," he said.

In response to Fair's comment, Fisher said he believed that if someone was a state employee or elected official, they should use the insurance provided. Monson agreed. Monson and Fisher offered an amendment to strike the language of section three from the bill. The amendment was adopted. The title and the enacting clause were also stricken from the bill. The measure received a do pass.

Other measures approved by committee members included:

**HB2072**, authored by Rep. James Hager, D-Pawhuska, relates to the Oklahoma Law Enforcement Retirement System. It expands membership to include park managers or park supervisors of the Tourism and Recreation Department. It also provides for the transfer of funds.

**HB2088**, authored by Rep. Larry Roberts, D-Miami, modifies life insurance benefit amounts for certain state employees.

**HB2090**, also by Roberts, relates to the Oklahoma Firefighters Pension and Retirement System. It modifies procedures for payment of death benefits. The measure was amended with title restored.

Committee substitute for **HB2094**, by Roberts, relates to the Oklahoma Law Enforcement Retirement System. Monson explained it was still in shell form. The bill would allow the selection of more than the required two physicians, in an effort to settle disputes over claims. The substitute also changed the notification of disputed claims from 60 to 30 days.

**HB2189**, authored by Rep. Jack Begley, D-Goodwell, requires the State and Education Employees Group Insurance Board to make certain payments to out-of-state hospitals. The bill's enacting clause and title were stricken. It was amended to clarify some language.

**HB2422**, another shell bill by Roberts, clarifies references to the Teachers' Retirement System of Oklahoma.

**HB2475**, a shell bill by Roberts, relates to the Health and Dental Insurance Reserve Fund. It provides for the transfer of funds to the Teachers' Retirement System. Section two of the bill, along with the enacting clause was stricken. Section two of the bill addressed distribution of appropriations for the Teachers' Retirement System and the State and Education Employees Group Insurance Board.

**HB2861**, by Roberts, modifies provisions to qualify for domestic orders; authorizing child support orders. The measure's title was stricken.

Measures receiving report progress from members included:

**HB2583**, authored by Rep. Wayne Pettigrew, R-Edmond, the bill would have addressed disclosure and un-funded liability.

**HB2653**, authored by Rep. Bill Mitchell, D-Lindsay, modifies the procedures for disability determination. Monson, co-author of the bill, explained that it might be useful to conduct an Interim Study on the matter.

**HB2903**, authored by Rep. Calvin Anthony, D-Stillwater, allows rural water, sewer, gas or solid waste management district or nonprofit water corporation entities to participate in the State and Education Employees Group Health and Life Insurance plans.

**HB2427** was not heard. The measure, authored by Rep. Shelby Satterfield, D-Tulsa, modifies service for unused sick leave in the Oklahoma Law Enforcement Retirement System.

## SENATE SUBCOMMITTEE MOVES TRANSPORTATION FUNDING BILL

■(GIT) The Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on General Government and Transportation met Monday, addressing one measure. **HB2667**, by Sen. Keith Leftwich, D-Oklahoma City, reapportions the fees, taxes and penalties received from the Oklahoma Vehicle License and Registration Act to the General Revenue Fund and State Transportation Fund.

Addressing the bill for Leftwich was Subcommittee Chairman Sen. Larry Dickerson, D-Poteau. He said the bill would eventually have its enacting clause stricken by the full Senate Appropriations Committee.

Currently, the State Transportation Fund receives only 0.3 percent of the state's motor vehicle tax collections, or \$1,591,667. The proposed measure would increase that amount to 5.3 percent.

Failing to obtain the necessary quorum, the roll was held open until other members could register their votes. The measure, however was given a do pass motion.

## HOUSE SUBCOMMITTEE PASSES ONE MEASURE

■(GIT) The House Appropriations and Budget Subcommittee on Public Safety and Transportation passed one measure at its Monday meeting. **SB1151**, by Rep. Robert Weaver, D-Shawnee, requires the costs of incarceration to be calculated and credited to the inmate's obligation for cost. It also requires the Department of Corrections to pay into the Crime Victim's Center fifteen percent of any gross wages earned by an inmate in a private prison industries program. It was given a do pass motion.

Two other measures were not so fortunate. **SB1052**, by Rep. Joe Hutchison, D-Jay, makes modifications relating to the Department of Public Safety and the powers and duties of related officers. **SB1058**, by Rep. Bob Ed Culver, D-Tahlequah, modifies language relating to the creation and duties of the District Attorneys Council. Both measures were given motions of report progress.

## SENATE PASSES \$19.7 MILLION SUPPLEMENTAL APPROPRIATIONS MEASURE

■(GIT) The Senate Monday passed a measure granting \$19.7 million in supplemental appropriations to various state agencies, including the Oklahoma Department of Corrections (DOC).

**HB2822**, by Sens. Enoch Kelly Haney, D-Seminole, and Sen. Cal Hobson, D-Lexington, appropriates some \$9.2 million to the DOC for the following areas:

\$5,567,925 for the purpose of funding the Contingency Review Board's authorization of 560 new prison beds. Also included in the figures is \$1,399,873 for additional bed space.

\$285,000 for the Energy Management System at Western State Psychiatric Center in Fort Supply.

\$1,000,000 for the purposes of meeting federal rebate requirements.

\$1,000,000 for the construction of sewage lagoons at the Eddie Warrior and Jess Dunn Correctional Centers in Taft and the Joe Harp Correctional Center in Lexington.

The measure passed with a vote of 46 to 1.

Also addressed by the Senate was **SCR49**, by Sen. Gene Stipe, D-McAlester. The measure authorizes the Commission for Human Services to enter into a lease-purchase agreement with the Pittsburg County Building Authority to provide county office space for the Department of Human Services.

The resolution was adopted.

## SENATE EDUCATION DEREGULATION BILL RECEIVES APPROVAL AFTER MANY AMENDMENTS, OTHER BILLS ALSO APPROVED

■(GIT) Tuesday, In the House Appropriations & Budget Subcommittee for Education, members approved SB1100. However, the approved version contained several amendments. Chairman, Rep. Jack Begley, D-Goodwell, told members the bill's co-author, Rep. Calvin Anthony, D-Stillwater, will request the bill to be assigned to the subcommittee for conference work.

**SB1100**, the education deregulation bill, included several repealers. However, after Rep. James Hager, D-Pawhuska, offered his amendment, the majority of repealed provisions were reinstated. The length of school years and days, workshops for board members, records of attendance, inter-local cooperative agreements, language pertaining to the school activity fund, consolidation and transportation were just some of the provisions reinstated by Hager.

In another sweeping move, Rep. Larry Adair, D-Stillwell, amended the bill to delete the entire section addressing "open" transfers. Adair stood firm when questioned that the amendment could be too rigid.

Begley had several amendments of his own, including two deleting provisions for programs such as advanced placement.

With mid-term, Rep. Jim Reese, R-Deer Creek, suggested an amendment deleting the Senate section and adding Begley's version. The amendment failed. However, Begley did suggest an amendment putting the House language on tracking systems and permanent mid-term solutions into the section.

Rep. Betty Boyd, D-Tulsa, offered an amendment raising the cost of textbooks per student to \$50 from \$25. Her amendment was adopted.

A discussion by members on underage children, weight charges and eligibility requirements for kindergartners developed. An amendment by Hager was adopted to include a .9 weight that would prohibit underage kindergartners from receiving free or reduced school lunches through the Head Start programs. The amendment also kept the cap on eligibility and included provisions of a bill by Rep. Joe Eddins, D-Vinita, that addressed preventing individuals from abusing the programs.

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Anthony included an amendment to restore the bill's title. There were several other amendments for clarification. The bill received a do pass by members.

Other measures approved by members included:

**SB852**, authored by Rep. Bill Case, R-Midwest City, relates to the State Travel Reimbursement Act. It would remove exemptions for dentists and other health professional from standard methods for computing per diem.

**SB908**, authored by Rep. Debbie Blackburn, D-Oklahoma City, prohibits general enrollment fees or nonresidential tuition to be charged to children of any employee of the State of Oklahoma who have given their lives in the line of duty. The bill was amended to restore title.

**SB1164**, authored by Rep. Betty Boyd, D-Tulsa, modifies eligibility requirements related to the Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Program. It also re-designates some duties from the State Department of Education to the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education.

**SCR38**, authored by Rep. Bill Settle, D-Muskogee, authorizes the Board of Regents for Oklahoma Agricultural and Mechanical Colleges to issue revenue bonds on behalf of Connors State College for approximately \$2.5 million.

**SCR40**, authored by Rep. Charles Gray, D-Oklahoma City, authorizes the Board of Regents of Oklahoma Agricultural and Mechanical Colleges to issue certain revenue bonds.

The subcommittee will meet today at 8:00 a.m. Members will hear **SB707**.

## LAWMAKERS PASS SENATE MONEY MEASURES

■(GIT) Members of the full Senate Appropriations Committee passed 47 of its assigned measures Wednesday. The bills are the last that will be passed out of the committee before the Legislature adjourns in May.

**HB1555**, by Sen. Herb Rozell, D-Tahlequah, relates to state government. The measure authorizes the purchase of nonmedical, assistive technology related items by the State Department of Rehabilitative Services without competitive bid requirements. The measure's effective date was updated and the measure was given a do pass motion.

**HB2055**, a committee substitute by Sen. Don Williams, D-Balko, modifies the determination, computation and procedures relating to the mid-term funding formula for schools.

The measure was given a do pass motion.

**HB2059**, by Sen. Ed Long, D-Enid, creates the Oklahoma Tuition Savings Account Act, providing aid and assistance in financing for post-secondary education. It allows residents to contribute a maximum amount of \$5,000 to a tuition savings account, while allowing that amount to be deducted from the contributor's state income tax. With a stricken title, the measure received a do pass motion.

**HB2072**, by Sen. Angela Monson, D-Oklahoma City, expands membership of the Oklahoma Law Enforcement Retirement System (OLERS) to include park managers and supervisors of the Tourism and Recreation Department. The measure was given a do pass motion.

**HB2080**, by Rep. Jack Begley, D-Goodwell, is a shell bill designed to address the State Aid Formula. The measure had its enacting clause stricken and was given a do pass motion.

**HB2088**, a committee substitute by Rep. Larry Roberts, D-Miami, modifies language relating to the State and Education Employees Group Insurance Plan. It states that any person wishing to continue with their life insurance policy after retirement shall pay the full cost of that insurance at the rate established by the board. With a stricken title, the measure was given a do pass motion.

**HB2090**, a committee substitute by Monson, modifies payments of death benefits for members of the Oklahoma Firefighters Pension and Retirement System. It states that benefits shall be paid to the spouse of the insured, providing that the marriage has existed for at least 30 months. The measure received a do pass motion.

**HB2094**, a committee substitute by Monson, clarifies references relating to the Oklahoma Law Enforcement Retirement System. By unanimous consent, Monson restored the bill's title. It was given a do pass motion.

**HB2115**, by Sen. Jerry Smith, R-Tulsa, modifies the conditions which constitute murder in the first degree. The measure received a do pass motion.

**HB2147**, a committee substitute by Sen. Larry Dickerson, D-Poteau, creates the Procurement Procedures Act. With a stricken title, the measure was given a do pass motion.

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**HB2164**, a committee substitute by Sen. Penny Williams, D-Tulsa, requires Oklahoma state higher education facilities to annually publish all tuition and fees free of charge to any person requesting the information. The measure received a do pass motion.

**HB2179**, by Sen. Howard Hendrick, R-Bethany, authorizes the Oklahoma Health Care Authority to accept federal grants. The measure was given a do pass motion.

**HB2188**, a committee substitute also by Hendrick, modifies the definition of "medical savings account" to include that which is offered by the State and Education Employees Group Insurance Board. It allows any funds remaining in a medical savings account at the end of the tax year to remain in the account for future medical expenses. The measure received a do pass motion.

**HB2189**, a committee substitute by Penny Williams, requires the State and Education Employees Group Insurance Board to pay for medical services and treatment rendered by out-of-state hospitals. It requires the treatment be set at the same level paid to an in-state hospital if the insured employee was referred by a physician and it was the closest hospital to the employee's place of residence, unless otherwise contracted with another out-of-state hospital. The measure received a do pass motion.

**HB2271**, by Sen. Brooks Douglass, R-Oklahoma City, increases the minimum assessment for the sexual assault victims examination fund to \$40. With a stricken enacting clause, the measure received a do pass motion.

**HB2279**, by Sen. Ben Brown, D-Oklahoma City, exempts persons over the age of 65 from paying a fee for a traffic record summary. With a stricken title, it received a vote of 18 to 14, passing it out of the committee.

**HB2323**, a committee substitute by Sen. Brad Henry, D-Shawnee, creates the School District Budget Act. The measure received a do pass motion.

**HB2335**, by Sen. Ed Long, D-Enid, allows a school board to create policies regarding the food expenses incurred during travel of employees of the district. With a stricken title, the measure received a do pass motion.

**HB2403**, a committee substitute by Smith, modifies deposits to the Attorney General's Revolving fund, allocating 25 percent of each deposit as follows: three-fourths to the Attorney General's Evidence Fund and one-fourth to the Attorney General's Revolving fund. The measure received a do pass motion.

**HB2407**, by Sen. James Maddox, D-Lawton, specifies the purpose of the State Long-Term Care Ombudsman Program. It states legislative intent to strengthen and fund the program. With a stricken title, the measure received a do pass motion.

**HB2422**, by Monson, is a shell bill which modifies sections of law pertaining to the calculation of retirement benefits within the Teacher's Retirement System. With its enacting clause stricken, the measure received a do pass motion.

**HB2470**, by Sen. Sam Helton, D-Lawton, creates the Oklahoma Prison Industry Marketing Development Advisory Task Force. It provides a sunset date for the task force of July 1, 2002. With a stricken title, the measure was given a do pass motion.

**HB2475**, a committee substitute by Rep. Larry Roberts, D-Miami, directs the transfer of \$25,000,000 from the Health and Dental Insurance Reserve Fund to the Teachers' Retirement System of Oklahoma. A shell bill, the measure received a do pass motion.

**HB2480**, by Sen. Dave Herbert, D-Midwest City, declares the Friday following Thanksgiving Day as a state holiday. It also states if a holiday falls on a Saturday, the previous Friday shall be designated a holiday in its place. Similarly, if a holiday falls on a Sunday, the next Monday shall be declared. The measure received a do pass motion.

**HB2531**, by Rozell, creates the Oklahoma Public Funds Investment Practices Reform Act of 1996. A shell bill, the measure's enacting clause was stricken and it was given a do pass motion.

**HB2548**, by Sen. Bernest Cain, D-Oklahoma City, modifies language relating to the Department of Human Services, specifically claims and payroll. The measure's title was stricken and it was given a do pass motion.

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**HB2620**, a committee substitute by Maddox, creates the Construction Division within the Department of Corrections. The measure was given a do pass motion.

**HB2621**, by Dickerson, creates the State Employees Fair Labor Relations Act. The measure is an effort to provide a "fair workplace that is responsive to the needs of state employees," the bill states. Even with eleven opposing votes, the measure was given a do pass motion.

**HB2667**, by Sen. Keith Leftwich, D-Oklahoma City, reapportions the fees, taxes and penalties received from the Oklahoma Vehicle License and Registration Act to the General Revenue Fund and State Transportation Fund. After having its enacting clause stricken, the measure was given a do pass motion.

**HB2670**, by Senate President Pro Tempore Stratton Taylor, D-Claremore, provides for county reimbursement of inmate medical expenses. The measure, after having its enacting clause stricken, was given a do pass motion.

**HB2671**, also by Taylor, creates the State Employee Pay Evaluation Act of 1996. With a stricken enacting clause, the measure received a do pass motion.

**HB2690**, a committee substitute by Leftwich, creates the Oklahoma Ethics in Privatization Functions Act. The measure is designed to set guidelines for privatization of state services and contracts.

An amendment to the bill deleted all of section 14. The section was an attempt to prevent candidates from accepting donations from Jan. 1 to June 30 of each year.

The amended measure was given a do pass motion. It received 5 nay votes.

**HB2735**, by Sen. Mike Fair, R-Oklahoma City, relates to persons eligible for parole. It provides for prisoners who are illegal aliens to be paroled into the custody of Immigration and Naturalization Services.

An amendment by Brown removed section 3 of the measure. The section directed the Department of Corrections to determine the place of birth of all in their custody.

After having its title stricken, the amended measure was given a do pass motion.

**HB2782**, a shell bill by Monson, creates the State Employee Compensation System Reform Act. Its enacting clause stricken, the measure was given a do pass motion.

**HBs 2852, 2853 and 2854**, shell bill's by Taylor, all create the Governmental Powers Clarification Act. The measures were all given a collective do pass motion.

**HB2861**, by Monson, relating to retirement systems, modifies qualifying provisions for domestic orders. It also authorizes child support orders. The measure, with a stricken title, received a do pass motion.

**HB2932**, a committee substitute by Sen. Ben Robinson, D-Muskogee, provides for reimbursement of sheriffs' costs for transportation services. After having its title stricken, the measure received a do pass motion.

**HB2971**, a committee substitute by Henry, amends the Oklahoma Firefighters Pension and Retirement System and the Oklahoma Police Pension and Retirement System to allow adopted children to be included as beneficiaries. The measure was given a do pass motion.

**HB3008**, a committee substitute by Cain, states that the Department of Corrections shall not use its facility at 1411 N. Classen Blvd., in Oklahoma City, for the purposes of inmate custody. The measure was given a do pass motion.

**HB3021**, a committee substitute by Brown, requires health insurance policies to provide related coverage for diabetics. The measure was given a do pass motion.

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**HJR1084**, a committee substitute by Dickerson, would require a constitutional amendment to clarify language relating to the Pardon and Parole Board. The measure was given a do pass motion.

**SCR52**, by Monson, Authorizes the Board of Regents for the University of Oklahoma to issue \$10.4 million in revenue bonds. The measure was given a do pass motion.

## HOUSE APPROPRIATIONS AND BUDGET COMMITTEE ADVANCES BILLS

■(GIT) The House Appropriations and Budget Committee dispensed of 83 bills Wednesday, giving do pass recommendations to 82 of the measures before the committee and agreeing to report progress on the one remaining measure.

**Senate Concurrent Resolution 34**, by Sen. Bernest Cain, D-Oklahoma City, and Rep. Debbie Blackburn, D-Oklahoma City, would have authorized the Department of Environmental Quality to purchase the former Southwestern Bell Building located at 707 North Robinson Street at a cost of \$3.2 million. Without debate, a do pass recommendation on the measure failed, and the committee approved a report progress report.

### SIMILAR BILLS FACE DIFFERENT FATES IN SENATE FINANCE COMMITTEE

■(GIT) Two seemingly similar bills faced different fates Tuesday when the Senate's Finance Committee met.

**HB3026** by Rep. Mike Mass, D-Hartshorne, and Sen. Gene Stipe, D-McAlester, failed to receive a do pass recommendation after a somewhat heated discussion, most of which involved Stipe and a representative of the Oklahoma Tax Commission. The bill would provide a deduction from the taxable income of any resident taxpayer who is a swine or poultry producer and who constructs or expands their production in Oklahoma.

Stipe deferred to a tax commission representative when questioned about the measure's tax implications. The representative said the commission's only concern was that the bill would allow those who claimed the deduction to do so twice — first on their federal income tax returns, on which Oklahoma bases taxable income, and again as an individual deduction on their state income taxes.

Among those committee members speaking to the measure, the common concern was that it would benefit larger producers, but do little to help smaller ones.

A motion to give the measure a do pass recommendation resulted in a tie vote and failed.

A similar measure, **HB2959**, by Sen. Bruce Price, D-Hinton, and Rep. Clay Pope, D-Loyal, received a do pass recommendation. The measure calls for tax credits to be granted against taxes imposed for direct investments in agricultural cooperative marketing associations in joint ventures created and designed to develop and advance the production, processing, handling and marketing of Oklahoma agricultural commodities.

In other matters before the committee, the following measures do pass recommendations:

**HB1621** (committee substitute) by Rep. Debbie Blackburn, D-Oklahoma City, and Sen. Penny Williams, D-Tulsa, modifying language related to the Ad Valorem Tax Code and providing an exemption for household earnings less than \$20,000;

**HB2102** (committee substitute) by Rep. Jack Begley, D-Goodwell, and Sen. Don Williams, D-Balko, providing for the loss of business and economic incentives for railroads and public service corporations upon protest of ad valorem taxes;

**HB2121** by Rep. Dale W. Wells, D-Cushing, and Sen. J. Berry Harrison, D-Fairfax, changing the fee and effective date of the special use fuel tax;

**HB2146** (committee substitute as amended with the enacting clause stricken) by Rep. Don McCorkell, D-Tulsa, and Sen. Ted Fisher, D-Sapulpa, creating the Economic Development Reform Act;

**HB2214** (as amended with the title stricken) by Rep. John Bryant, R-Tulsa, and Sen. Kevin Easley, D-Broken Arrow, permitting banks to establish unused branch banking rights and requiring agency relationship of bank holding companies, branches and affiliate banks to be consistent with banking practices and regulations;

**HB2338** by Rep. Howard Cotner, D-Altus, and Sen. Larry Dickerson, D-Poteau, stating that no assessment shall be required if a report or return, signed by a taxpayer, was filed and the liability evidenced by the report or return has not been paid;

**HB2360** by Rep. Robert E. Weaver, D-Shawnee, directing the Department of Public Safety and the Oklahoma Tax Commission to conduct a study relating to the regulation and licensing of jet skies and boat operators in the state;

**HB2559** by Rep. Robert E. Weaver, D-Shawnee, and Sen. Keith Leftwich, D-Oklahoma City, providing for investment of funds from prepaid funeral benefit contracts;

**HB2666** (committee substitute) by Rep. Don Ross, D-Tulsa, and Sen. Lewis Long, Jr., D-Glenpool, stating that dues and fees to YMCAs or YWCAs will be exempt from sales tax;

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**HB2725** by Rep. Ed Crocker, D-Norman, and Sen. James R. Maddox, D-Lawton, stating that taxpayers with a taxable income of at least \$1 million in at least one of the three last taxable years may compute tax on an annual basis;

**HB2748** (committee substitute) by Rep. Bob Plunk, D-Ada, and Sen. Dick Wilkerson, D-Atwood, allowing a tax deduction for the amount of tuition paid by a taxpayer to a public or private Oklahoma college up to \$1,000 with provisions exempting deductions for grants, scholarships, stipends or other forms of financial aid; and

**HB3006** by Rep. Weaver and Sen. Ben. Robinson, D-Muskogee, modifying required deadlines for authorization to establish branch banks.

### SENATE LABOR COMMITTEE PASSES ANTI-WORKPLACE VIOLENCE MEASURE

■(GIT) Members of the Senate Committee on Business and Labor passed a measure Monday creating the Workplace and Employee Protection Act. **HB2374**, a committee substitute by Sen. Angela Monson, D-Oklahoma City, passed with a stricken title.

According to the bill's language, the purpose of the measure is to "provide for safety in the workplace in this state through prohibition of threats of actual physical harm, harassment, stalking, harassing or obscene telephone calls, or violent acts against an employing entity or its employees, agents, contractors or business invitees." The measure also states the Act is meant to supplement, not replace current law.

The measure allows for the filing of petitions for protective orders for the purposes of seeking relief under the provisions of the act.

An amendment to the bill, by Monson, drew some fire from members. The change states that a petition for a protective order, provided for under the measure, shall not apply to striking employees. This includes those members who are part of a collective bargaining agreement.

"If you want to outlaw picketing, that is what you have done," said Sen. Gene Stipe, D-McAlester. "We passed an anti-stalking law and we passed Sen. Shurden's gun bill. What else can we do?"

Claiming the bill needed work, Sen. Ben Brown, D-Oklahoma City, said it also needed clarity.

Monson said the bill was an attempt to create a safer workplace environment.

Sen. Frank Shurden, D-Henryetta, said he would possibly bring a floor amendment to the measure, allowing for employees to carry a firearm in the event he or she received a death threat.

Shurden attempted to amend the bill by removing its section ten. The section reads "Actions taken in good faith by an employing entity pursuant to the Workplace and Employee Protection Act shall establish an affirmative defense for the employing entity in a civil action."

The amendment was defeated.

Other measures addressed by the committee include **HB1672**, a committee substitute by Long. The measure modifies terms in the Employment Security Act of 1980. It provides conditions under which an employee cannot be disqualified for benefits.

After removing section 12 of the measure, relating to liens against delinquent employers, and having its title stricken, the measure passed with a vote of 9 to 1.

**HB2310**, by Stipe created the classifications of journeyman plumber technician, journeyman electrical technician and journeyman mechanical technician. The categories represent sub-classifications of journeymen.

After members killed the measure with a vote of 4 to 6, Stipe asked that the vote be reconsidered.

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ered and offered a committee substitute, creating the Study Committee for Licensure of Plumbers, the Study Committee for Licensure of Electricians and the Study Committee for Mechanical Licensure. The three studies will continue through Dec. 31, 1997 and consist of members from the various fields. The committee substitute passed with a vote of 10 to 0.

**HB2456**, by Sen. Trish Weedn, D-Purcell, relates to insurance. It allows for the transmission of countersignatures via FAX. The measure passed with a vote of 10 to 0.

**HB2553**, a committee substitute by Sen. Brooks Douglass, R-Oklahoma City, changes licensing and continuing education requirements for insurance agents. It also creates a new class of license, the customer service representative license. Designed to aid rural counties with limited populations, the fully licensed agent would be responsible for the customer service representative's actions.

An amendment deleting section six of the bill was adopted. The deleted section provided requirements for becoming an adjuster. After having its enacting clause stricken, the measure passed with a vote of 7 to 4.

**HB2623**, by Sen. Howard Hendrick, R-Bethany, states that a group or combination of persons or risks shall not be considered a "fictitious" group. The measure passed with a vote of 10 to 0.

**HJR1078**, a committee substitute by Monson, putting to a vote of the people whether or not to prohibit paid police and firefighters hired by a city or town to strike or engage in any work stoppage or slowdown. It also allows the Legislature to pass laws that provide for collective bargaining agreements. The measure passed with a vote of 9 to 2.

■(GIT) The House Commerce Industry and Labor Committee gave do pass recommendations to the following bills Wednesday:

### PAWNSHOP BILL PASSES SENATE COMMITTEE

■(GIT) A measure that would limit the number of pawnshops in the state passed the Senate Committee on Small Business Thursday. **HB2172**, by Committee Chairman James Maddox, D-Lawton, would refuse a pawnshop license to anyone wishing to set up shop in a county with less than 11,000 people. The bill would also prohibit the shops from locating in a county where the number of existing pawnshops exceeds a ratio of one per every 11,000 people. Members passed the measure, 5 to 3, after striking its enacting clause.

Calling the business a form of banking, twelve-year pawnshop owner Andy Eckhard said "fly-by-night" pawnbrokers are taking advantage of customers. Many pawnshops open shop with minimal capital, stay in business a few months and leave town with their customer's merchandise.

"I go down the line and I can't think of any business that wouldn't like this kind of bill," said Sen. Mark Snyder, R-Edmond. He said the measure would limit competition among pawnbrokers. "If this passes, I don't want to see the onslaught of businesses that will be here next year saying 'we want the same protection as the pawnbrokers'."

According to Eckhard, Oklahoma has one pawnshop for every 6,200 people, making it the state with the most pawnshops per capita in the nation. The average amount loaned from a pawnshop is \$57.

The bill's House author, Rep. Ron Kirby, D-Lawton, said, though he has gotten flack because of it, he makes no apologies for carrying the bill.

The bill, he said, is no different than the state limiting the number of nursing homes, liquor stores or new car dealers.

Passing the House last month by only one vote, Kirby said he expects his bill to have problems in the Senate as well, which is the bill's next stop.

### EDUCATION IS EMPHASIS OF NEW JUVENILE JUSTICE MEASURE

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) A juvenile measure that emphasizes education as a deterrent to crime is advancing through the state Legislature.

**House Bill 2692** was endorsed 100-0 last month by the House of Representatives, received a "do pass" recommendation recently from the Senate Judiciary Committee and now awaits a vote by the full Senate.

The proposed law was introduced by House Majority Leader Loyd Benson, D-Frederick, and Sen. Ted Fisher, D-Sapulpa.

HB2692 would clarify and strengthen House Bill 2640, Benson's juvenile justice reform package signed into law in 1994.

A key feature of HB2692 is that it would deprive school drop-outs of the privilege to drive.

The bill would direct the state Department of Public Safety to deny or suspend a driver's license for anyone younger than 18 who cannot prove that he/she is enrolled in a public or private secondary school or vocation-technical school, is home schooled, has graduated from school or is enrolled in a general equivalency degree program.

Submitting false information about a student's school attendance would be deemed a misdemeanor crime.

When any youth between the ages of 14 and 18 drops out of school for any reason other than "circumstances beyond the control of the student," the school district's attendance office would be compelled by HB2692 to notify the Department of Public Safety.

The DPS then would be required to send a warning letter to the student, advising that his or her driver's license will be canceled within 30 days, for a period of at least two months, unless the student returns to school. The bill would accord a student a right to appeal a driver's license suspension or denial if the youth "had a legitimate reason to quit school," Benson added.

In a related vein, HB2692 would require schools to offer alternative education programs for disobedient and non-violent delinquent students. The bill decrees that any student who is suspended from school must be placed in "a supervised, structured environment in either an alternative school setting, another appropriate classroom, in-school suspension, or home-based instruction." The State Board of Education is directed to phase in a system of alternative education programs in schools throughout the state over the next five years.

Finally, another section of HB2692 would require a juvenile lawbreaker to make restitution to a victim, in an amount "not in excess of actual damages caused" by the minor, by working for the victim or by participating in public works programs and earmarking at least half of the juvenile's wages for the victim. The bill also stipulates that a supervised work program shall not interfere with the child's schooling.

## HOUSE JUDICIARY COMMITTEE ADVANCES 8 BILLS

■(GIT) The House Judiciary Committee on Tuesday gave do pass recommendations to eight bills:

**SB719** (amended) by Sen. Trish Weedn, D-Purcell, and Rep. Larry Rice, D-Pryor, modifying the definition of record as it relates to the Oklahoma Open Records Act to include data files created by or used with computer software and exempts the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation from furnishing criminal history information;

**SB1061** by Sen. Dick Wilkerson, D-Atwood, and Rep. Jari Askins, D-Duncan, stating that any order directing a defendant to pay costs of representation shall be a lien against all real and personal property of the defendant and may be filed against such property as provided by law;

**SB1185** (amended) by Sen. Jerry Smith, R-Tulsa, and Rep. Chris Hastings, R-Tulsa, allowing for the destruction of all paper records that have been microfilmed;

**SB1218** by Sen. Smith and Rep. Bill Settle, D-Muskogee, providing a procedure for the construction of duplicate sections of law related to statutes and reports;

**SB1240** (amended) by Sen. Smith and Rep. Hastings, modifying legal requirements related to child support;

**SB1261** by Sen. Smith and Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore, modifying statutory references pertaining to the Small Claims Procedure Act and the Oklahoma Pleading Code relevant to petitions to transfer to another docket of the district court;

**SB1294** by Sen. Smith and Rep. Steidley, exemption from jury service persons who have previously served within the previous two years; and

**SB1310** (as amended) by Sen. Bernice Shedrick, D-Stillwater, and Rep. Steidley, modifying statutory references to workers' compensation.

## SENATE JUDICIARY HOLDS LAST MEETING, MOVES HOUSE MEASURES

■(GIT) In its last meeting this year, the Senate Judiciary Committee moved several assigned House measures Tuesday.

**HB1507**, by Sen. Lewis Long, D-Glenpool, relates to homestead exemptions. It adds exemptions relating to child support obligations. With a vote of 2 to 7, the measure failed.

**HB1989**, a committee substitute by Sen. Jerry Smith, R-Tulsa, modifies duties of the district court judge in issuing instructions relating to acquisition of lands by purchase, donation or condemnation. The measure received a vote of 11 to 0, passing it out of committee.

**HB2053**, a committee substitute by Sen. Ben Brown, D-Oklahoma City, modifies requirements for those involved in child abuse and neglect cases. (See related story.)

**HB2056**, by Sen. Brooks Douglass, R-Oklahoma City, requires the Department of Corrections to provide a place within the walls of the state prison at McAlester so that members of the immediate family of any deceased victim of the defendant may witness the execution. It also requires the judge who presided at the trial and the chief of police of the municipality in which the crime occurred to witness the execution. The measure was passed out of committee with a vote of 8 to 0.

**HB2182**, by Sen. Gene Stipe, D-McAlester, states legislative intent to protect the rights of child witnesses. It states considerations that must be considered before deciding to accept the

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testimony of a child witness. With a stricken title, the measure was passed out of committee with a vote of 10 to 0.

**HB2255**, by Brown, creates the Defective Assistive Device Act. It states that any manufacturer who sells an assistive device shall provide the consumer with an express warranty for the device and provide for repair and replacement of said devices. The measure received a vote of 9 to 0, passing it out of committee.

**HB2361**, by Brown, allows for investments to be made by banking institution trust departments. The measure passed with a vote of 8 to 0.

**HB2362**, by Sen. Brad Henry, D-Shawnee, relates to financial privacy. It provides exemptions from notice and challenge procedures, provides for customer non-notification and sets standards for the calculation of reasonable fees.

An amendment by Roberts creates a new section 7, requiring a subpoena to be served on any person whose financial records have been requested to be seized. The person being served with the notification is granted fourteen days in which to file a motion to quash the subpoena.

Richard Wintory, of the office of the attorney general, said requiring such notification would be harmful to criminal investigations. He said inspection of financial records is the "only system for law enforcement to stop white collar crime, public corruption and organized drug trafficking."

With the amendment adopted, the measure was passed out of committee with a vote of 12 to 0.

**HB2469**, by Sen. Angela Monson, D-Oklahoma City, modifies language relating to workers' compensation insurance and deletes the requirement for entities to be insured by the State Insurance Fund. The measure passed with a vote of 11 to 0.

**HB2506**, by Smith, modifies language relating to pornographic materials, modifying the list of such prohibited materials. The measure passed with a vote of 9 to 0.

**HB2534**, by Sen. Larry Dickerson, D-Poteau, provides methods for political subdivisions to obtain legal representation. After having its enacting clause stricken, the measure was passed out of committee with a vote of 11 to 0.

**HB2603**, by Weedn, provides that any person who willfully or maliciously sets fire to, or causes to be burned, or burns another person, shall be guilty of arson in the first degree. The measure adds the burning of humans to the definition of arson. With a stricken title, the measure passed with a vote of 8 to 0.

**HB2617**, a committee substitute by Brown, provides for crimes against witnesses, persons attending official proceedings and informants.

An amendment to the measure removed the bill's section 1 which relates to the term "corruptly persuades. The amendment also removes section 6 which repeals Section 455 of Title 21.

The amended measure passed with a vote of 8 to 0.

**HB2669**, by Roberts, authorizes National Park Service rangers to make arrests with the same status as state or local law enforcement, provided it is believed the offender has committed a felony, misdemeanor or at the request of a law enforcement officer. The measure passed with a vote of 8 to 3.

**HB2930**, by Sen. Robert Kerr, D-Altus, would make a felony of second and subsequent charges of eluding or attempting to elude a police officer.

The original measure carried a penalty of at least one year in state prison and a maximum fine of \$2,000. An amendment to the bill reduced the penalty to a maximum of one year in county jail and a maximum fine of \$5,000.

The measure passed with a vote of 12 to 0.

**HB2975**, by Henry, prohibits the requirement for filing paternity affidavits when consent for adoption has been given. The measure passed with a vote of 11 to 0.

**HB2990**, by Sen. Bernest Cain, D-Oklahoma City, creates the Oklahoma Centralized Support Registry Act for the purpose of regulating the payment of all child support, spousal support and other related payments. With its enacting clause stricken, the measure passed with a vote of

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9 to 0.

**HJR1087**, by Weeden, creates the State Government Internal Affairs Investigation Review Committee. It was given a do pass motion.

### HOUSE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE PASSES MASTER BUSINESS LICENSE SYSTEM TASK FORCE

■(GIT) The House Economic Development Committee today passed a "one stop shopping" system for business licensing. **SB711**, authored by Rep. Mike Tyler, D-Sapulpa, creates the Master Business License System Task Force. This task force will examine the process of licensing and present to the Governor, the Speaker of the House, and the Senate Pro Tempore their findings of any possible problems.

The measure received a do pass vote.

**SB931**, authored by Rep. Gary Taylor, D-Dewey, creates the Oklahoma Clearinghouse for International Trade.

The measure received a do pass vote with the title restored.

**SB1024**, a shell bill authored by Vice Chairman Rep. Jack Bonny, D-Burns Flat, provides for Oklahoma Department of Commerce support of international trade relationships.

To aid the encouragement of international trade opportunities for Oklahoma businesses, according to this proposed law, the Department of Commerce will assist private efforts toward the development of business relationships between Oklahomans and those of nations around the globe.

The bill received a do pass vote, with the title restored.

**SB689**, authored by Chairman Don McCorkell, D-Tulsa, requires certain reports be submitted triennially relevant to the Quality Jobs Program, Saving Quality Jobs Act and Former Military Facility Development Act.

The measure received a do pass vote.

**SB1188**, also by McCorkell, modifies language pertaining to the Oklahoma Futures.

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The bill received a do pass vote with the title restored.

**SB1302**, a shell bill authored by Rep. Larry Adair, D-Stilwell, modifies language relating to the Oklahoma Department of Commerce.

After striking Section 3 of the measure and restoring its title, the bill received a do pass vote.

## ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT PASSES FOUR BILLS

■(GIT) Four House measures passed the Senate Economic Development Committee Thursday, including **HB2893**, by Sen. Ted Fisher, D-Sapulpa, which creates the Oklahoma Limited Liability Partnership Act.

The bill was amended, removing all language on page 6, lines 10 through 16.

The measure passed with a vote of 8 to 0.

**HB2899**, by Rep. M.C. Leist, D-Morris, modifies the powers, duties and responsibilities of the Oklahoma International Trade Development Council.

The measure passed with a vote of 8 to 0.

**HB3029**, by Sen. Howard Hendrick, R-Bethany, creates the Targeted Workforce Incentive Act.

The measure was amended, adding clarifying language and a new subsection. The new language places a time limit of three years for which a business is exempt from fees and taxes.

The measure passed with a vote of 8 to 0, after having its enacting clause stricken.

**HCR1066**, by Rep. Loyd Benson, D-Frederick, congratulates Project 1000 and encourages more businesses to participate. The measure is an attempt to recognize the importance of creating quality jobs. The measure passed with a vote of 7 to 0.

### SENATE EDUCATION MEMBERS VOTE TO APPROVE 14 HOUSE BILLS

■(GIT) Charter schools, student loans, kindergarten eligibility standards, privacy issues, medical insurance, due process, deregulation and juvenile justice education programs were the major issues discussed by members of the Senate Education Committee Monday.

The first bill to receive discussion was **HB2268**, the "Charter Schools Pilot Program Act."

The Senate author of the bill, Gerald Wright, R-Broken Arrow, explained that he did not necessarily agree with allowing 15 Charter Schools per year. He offered to strike the enacting clause of the bill and to continue to work on the measure in conference committee.

Wright assured members that a Charter school would be limited to its district. There was also some talk by members, of limiting the enrollment, even after the school was limited to its district.

Wright endorsed the bill and told members there were suggestions through research that Charter schools taught a higher number of minorities, and involved parents and teachers more often.

Some committee members were skeptical that the boards of school districts would not approve their own funds and students for starting Charter school programs.

Wright suggested an alternative. He said that universities and colleges could become sponsors for developing Charter schools and that an appeals process could be implemented to appease the process. However, he said this would be a key issue in conference.

Sen. Don Williams, D-Balko, said he wished every school could have the flexibility of a Charter school.

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Members voted unanimously to do pass the measure out of committee.

**HB2887**, authored by Don Williams, authorizes the State Regents for Higher Education to administer the student loan guarantee program under the federal Higher Education Act of 1965. It also authorizes the Regents to make collection efforts.

Larry LeVern, recoveries' manager for the Oklahoma Guaranteed Student Loan Program, said the problem with collections stems from individuals who "job hop" or are self-employed. This bill will allow the program to use methods similar to provisions passed in a law last year revoking drivers' and professional licenses for child support.

The measure received a do pass, and a stricken title.

**HB2317**, authored by Sen. Ed Long, D-Enid, was the first bill to receive debate. The measure deletes contextual requirements relating to the residence of a child for school purposes. It clarifies statutory reference. Long offered an amendment to strike the language in section four of the bill, addressing the disbursement of school lunch program funds. This language will be further addressed in conference.

Sen. Don Rubottom, R-Tulsa, debated in opposition of the bill, focusing on section two of the bill. "I know the privacy issue gets old, but when we establish a tracking system that an employer or political group could eventually gain access to, we could hurt a student's privacy," he explained.

Rubottom contended that students should get the same privacy rights given to juvenile delinquents and individuals who receive special education. Long said he was not pleased with how the bill ended up, but he was willing to work on it in conference committee. Members voted 10 to 1 to do pass the bill.

Kindergartners were discussed next in **HB2437**. The bill, also authored by Long, requires that underage students shall participate in developmental assessments to determine if the child is ready for admittance to kindergarten. It requires the Board of Education to develop and adopt a written plan outlining the kindergarten program being offered to the underage child. Long offered for the title and enacting clause to be stricken, and told committee members the measure should be added to SB1100.

The disagreement between lawmakers hinged on the testing requirements of four-year-olds and weight charges.

Members voted 10 to 2 in favor of the bill.

Medical insurance became the focus of **HB2192**, also authored by Long. The bill modifies language relating to the Oklahoma Youth Apprenticeship Committee. Long explained that the measure was a shell bill, and he intended to discuss the contents of the bill with Secretary of Education, Dr. Floyd Coppedge.

Rubottom tried to amend the bill with a bill he authored, **SB1159**. The amendment failed. It would have eliminated medical coverage for students participating in the program, assuming their parents retained private medical insurance.

The measure received a vote of 12 to 1 by committee members.

**HB2466** received minor discussion, however, there was concern from some committee members. The bill, by Long, amends language relating to a teacher's right to due process and compensation or benefits when a board of education receives a superintendent's recommendation for a teacher's dismissal unless the career teacher is convicted of a felony.

Long agreed that the bill needed additional work. In accordance, the enacting clause and title were stricken. Members voted unanimously in favor of the bill.

Education deregulation became another issue for members. **HB2720**, authored by Sen. Penny Williams, D-Tulsa, modifies statutory reference to the powers and duties of the State Board of Education. The provision addressing school choice received the most attention from members. Penny Williams offered to amend the bill by replacing the section on school choice with SB1100's version of school choice.

Hendricks tried to amend the amendment to restore the original language, however, his amendment failed to receive a second. The measure received a vote of 9 to 1.

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**HB2563**, by Long, also received a vote of 9 to 1. The measure provides alternative teaching certification for residential or treatment facilities. In a related alternative education issue, the Board of Juvenile Affairs met last Friday and discussed the need for more alternative education programs statewide. Currently, money for alternative education is appropriated by the Legislature to the Department of Education. The agency had told Superintendent of Public Instruction, Sandy Garrett, they wanted to come up with a permanent solution in this legislative session.

In another bill relating to juvenile affairs, **HB2755**, authored by Sen. Ben Brown, D-Oklahoma City, would require the Department of Juvenile Justice to provide reading assessments to juveniles upon placement in an institution or facility. Members voted unanimously in favor of the bill. The title was stricken.

**HB2726**, authored by Sen. Bernice Shedrick, D-Stillwater, authorizes local school districts and county or city-county health departments to enter into agreements assuring that a child who is returning to school after an absence due to head lice infection is no longer afflicted. Members voted unanimously in favor of the bill.

**HB2107** and **2291**, also received unanimous votes by members. **HB2107**, authored by Sen. Mark Synder, R-Edmond, modifies exemptions relating to school activity funds collected by junior achievement or parent teacher associations or organizations sanctioned by the Board of Education. It was amended by the author to authorize that each school district's board of education map out policies and procedures for their district.

**HB2291**, by Long, clarifies language relevant to the suspension, demotion or termination of education support employees. Long explained that the measure was merely a shell bill.

"I'm not sure how much thought went into this appointment, but I'm hoping that Governor Keating will take a closer look at it before he moves it forward," said Senator Long. "It might be in everyone's best interest for the Governor to withdraw the appointment."

## HOUSE EDUCATION COMMITTEE APPROVES 7 BILLS, 2 RESOLUTIONS

■(GIT) During a short meeting Tuesday, members of the House Education Committee approved seven bills and two resolutions. **HCR1073**, supports and encourages safety education in the classroom. The measure authored by Rep. Mark Seikel, D-Harrah, received an unanimous approval from members. In addition, **SCR36**, authored by Sen. Jerry Smith, R-Tulsa, also received unanimous approval. The resolution authorizes the Board of Regents of Tulsa Junior College to issue revenue bonds not to exceed the sum of \$12 million.

Bills approved by members included:

**SB425**, authored by Rep. Robert Weaver, D-Shawnee, prohibits adverse action against a student because of the student's service on jury duty.

**SB740**, authored by Rep. Bill Case, R-Midwest City, requires the State Department of Education to recognize for purposes of certification and salary increments, teachers certified in Oklahoma and employed by the Department of Human Services Child Study Center at University Hospital.

Committee substitute for **SB797**, authored by Rep. Michael Tyler, D-Sapulpa, allows school districts to prohibit dogs from running at large within one thousand feet of specified property.

**SB1070**, authored by Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore, authorizes boards of education to enter into contracts for the purpose of implementing energy conservation measures designed to reduce the energy consumption or operating costs of school facilities.

**SB1071**, authored by Rep. Larry Adair, D-Stilwell, lists student suspension options for students guilty of immorality or violation of school regulations. It states that the suspended pupil may not return to the teacher's classroom without the teacher's consent or unless a district appeals committee determines that placement is appropriate.

**SB1163**, authored by Rep. Don McCorkell, D-Tulsa, the Educational Deregulation Act. It removes some requirements for eligibility and state limits for deregulation. It also limits the number of districts and school sites subject to deregulation.

## COPPEDGE TO PRESENT '4 BY 4' GRADUATION PLAN TO BOARD

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Secretary of Education Floyd Coppedge will urge the State Board of Education on Thursday to adopt Gov. Frank Keating's plan to increase Oklahoma's high school graduation requirements to four years each of math, science, English, and social studies.

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The Governor's "4 by 4" plan would take effect for the entering high school freshman class of 1999, making the graduates of 2003 the first in Oklahoma's history to have completed four years in each of the core subjects.

Coppedge said Oklahoma's average ACT college entrance scores still lag behind national and regional averages, a deficit the 4 by 4 plan would do much to remedy.

He said Oklahoma's average score of 20.3 ranks 17th out of 25 states where half or more of high school seniors take the test.

Coppedge said the "4 by 4" curriculum would raise ACT scores, increase college enrollment, reduce the need for costly remedial classes for poorly prepared college freshmen, and better prepare graduates who do not plan to attend college for the workplace.

Current Oklahoma high school graduation requirements call for four years of English but only two each of math, science, and history. The Board has been considering increasing the math requirement to three years to match new college entrance requirements.

Coppedge said El Reno Public Schools have already implemented what they call a "four core" program.

"Superintendent Sandy Wisely says it is very successful," he said. El Reno has allowed exceptions for students enrolled in vocational technical classes and special education, which Coppedge said would be necessary for a statewide plan as well.

"The goal is a very basic one," he said. "As the Governor has said, if we ask more of our young people they will respond to the challenge and be better prepared to become Oklahoma's leaders of the future. I hope the Board will agree."

## BILL TO APPROPRIATE \$500,000 TO STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION FAILS

■(GIT) **SB707**, would have appropriated over \$500,000 to the State Board of Education for a school district in Tulsa County, but the measure failed Wednesday in a House Appropriation and Budget Subcommittee on Education.

The bill's author, Rep. Don Weese, R-Broken Arrow, explained that a glass company located in Tulsa was overcharged. According to Weese, the Legislature passed a bill last session to direct the Tulsa County Treasurer to refund the money to the glass company over a five-year period. Weese said he feared the refund would, in turn, hurt the local district.

Chairman of the committee, Rep. Jack Begley, D-Goodwell, told Weese he would amend the bill on the floor if it was approved by members. "I would be amiss if we did this and not take care of all the other tax protests around the state." Begley explained that the protests totaled over \$5 million statewide. However, the bill with a vote of 4 to 4 failed, and received a motion for report progress by members.

## UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT PENALIZED AGAIN BY HOUSE DEMOCRATS

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Democrat leaders in the House voted again Wednesday to take punitive action toward Union School District, GOP Rep. Don Weese of Broken Arrow charged.

The third-term lawmaker criticized the House leadership after a legislative subcommittee killed a measure that would have reimbursed the school district for the loss of more than half a million dollars in ad valorem taxes attributed to a refund which Tulsa County must make to a Tulsa Manufacturer that overpaid its property taxes.

Union School District received more than half of the approximately \$900,000 excess tax payment, Weese related.

Although the statute of limitations for the manufacturer to claim a rebate expired, Weese said, a mandate requiring the Tulsa County Treasurer to repay the entire overpayment in five equal annual installments was quietly slipped into a bill last year by a House Democrat from north central Tulsa.

The bill cleared both houses of the Legislature during the final, hectic days of last year's session and was signed into law by the governor, records reflect.

Consequently, Republican Sens. Charles Ford and Jerry Smith of Tulsa and Ged Wright of Broken Arrow, along with Weese, introduced **SB707**. It would have appropriated \$517,995 to the State Board of Education to defray the ad valorem tax loss to Union School District stemming from the refund.

The Senate endorsed the bill 43 to 0 on Feb. 28, but the House Appropriations and Budget Subcommittee on Education killed it Wednesday by a 4 to 4 tie vote. "The bill wasn't even debated," Weese said.

Opposing the bill were Rep. Jack Begley, D-Goodwell, chairman of the subcommittee; Rep. James Hager, D-Pawhuska, chairman of the House Committee on Education; Rep. Larry E. Adair, D-Stilwell, a former school teacher and administrator who chairs the House Transportation Committee; and Rep. Calvin Anthony, D-Stillwater, a member of the House Education Committee.

Voting in support of the bill were Rep. Betty Boyd, D-Tulsa; Rep. John Bryant, R-Tulsa; Rep. Jim Reese, R-Deer Creek; and House GOP Leader Larry Ferguson, R-Cleveland.

The vote on **SB707**, coupled with numerous other actions by Democratic House leadership, have cost Union School District several million dollars in state aid in recent years, Weese said.

Union filed a lawsuit against the Tulsa County Treasurer, but the proceedings were halted temporarily pending the outcome of **SB707**, Weese said.

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"The only way Union can get any justice is to challenge the constitutionality of a law that clearly was targeted at one county," he said.

### BILL CREATING DEPARTMENT OF ENERGY FAILS IN HOUSE ENERGY, ENVIRONMENT & NATURAL RESOURCES COMMITTEE

■(GIT) Stop-and-go efforts to create a Department of Energy and remove the regulation of the oil and gas industry from the Corporation Commission stopped again Tuesday when a do pass recommendation for the bill was defeated before the House Committee on Energy, Environment and Natural Resources.

While admitting "(I)t will take a lot of work to get this bill on the floor," Rep. Larry Rice, D-Pryor, said he felt the time was right to begin work on the **Senate Bill 793**.

The bill would have moved regulation of the oil and gas industry from the Corporation Commission, along with 304 of the commission's employees, and would have created a Department of Energy to oversee the two industries.

"Whether we do this or (oil and gas) stays in the Corporation Commission," Rice told the committee members, "we know there are going to be some budget problems."

In addition to concerns expressed by committee members, several citizens, particularly mineral rights owners, voiced their opposition to the proposal.

Referring to the proposed department's governing board, mineral owner Mary Piper said the bill "mentions industry and industry and industry," but not mineral owners.

"Without us, without our land and without our minerals, there would be no industry," Piper added. Her comments were supported by other mineral owners and mineral owners association members speaking before the committee.

Of the six audience members to address the committee, only one spoke in the measure's favor: Mike Cantrell, president of the Oklahoma Independent Petroleum Association.

Cantrell said the association has once opposed such a proposal, but had reversed that position in February, because he said, "The current system is flawed beyond repair."

Cantrell's support was not enough, and a do pass recommendation for the bill failed. Discussion of the measure ended with the committee agreeing to report its progress.

Tuesday's action was not the first time the bill had faced demise. Earlier this month, Sen. Kevin Easley, D-Broken Arrow, saw the measure fail on the Senate floor by two votes. The bill was reconsidered the next day and passed by a one-vote margin.

In other action before the committee on Wednesday, the following measures received do pass recommendations:

**HR1061** by Rep. Wanda Jo Peltier, D-Oklahoma City, praising the work of the Corporation Commission's public utility division in the implementation of the federal telecommunications act;

**SB232** by Sen. Easley and Rep. Rice, modifying references in 52 OS 1991, section 1.1, related to natural gas corporations;

**SB775** by Sen. Easley and Rep. Rice, related to the Oklahoma Energy Education and Marketing Act and Department of Central Services;

**SB777** by Sen. Easley and Rep. Rice, providing for reimbursement for persons engaged in

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voluntary environmental cleanup programs;

**SB875** by Sen. Gilmer Capps, D-Snyder, and Rep. Randy Beutler, D-Elk City, providing additional powers and duties to the Oklahoma Water Resources Board;**SB883** (title restored) by Sen. Frank Shurden, D-Henryetta, and Rep. M.C. Leist, D-Morris, establishing and clarifying guidelines for municipalities to deal with environmental problems;**SB911** (committee substitute) by Sen. Easley and Rep. Rice, defining "economically at-risk wells;"**SB974** (committee substitute) by Sen. Easley and Rep. Leist, requiring transporters of waste, wastewater or sludge to develop and maintain manifests;**SB1000** by Sen. Easley and Rep. Rice, modifying language and statutory references related to the Retail Electric Supplier Certified Territory Act; and**SB1225** by Sen. Easley and Rep. Rice, adding definitions related to environment and natural resources and expanding the jurisdiction of the Conservation Commission to include recipients of nonpoint pollution funds.No action was taken on **SB716** and **971**.

## SENATE COMMITTEE PASSES FREON BILL

■(GIT) A piece of legislation condoning the manufacture, sale and distribution of chlorofluorocarbons (CFCs), like the coolant Freon, passed the Senate Committee on Energy, Environmental Resources and Regulatory Affairs Thursday. **HB2155**, by Sen. Frank Shurden, D-Henryetta, also prohibits the Department of Environmental Quality from creating fines or penalties for its use.

Currently, federal law prohibits the sale and distribution of some CFCs.

"In the event that this bill moves forward," said Department of Environmental Quality Executive Director Mark Coleman, "put something in it to make sure that people understand that they would still be in violation of federal law."

An amendment to the bill, attempting to remove all references to the manufacturing of CFCs failed.

A narrow victory, the measure passed with a vote of 6 to 5.

Other measures addressed by the committee include **HB2197**, a committee substitute by Sen. Kevin Easley, D-Broken Arrow. The measure modifies language relating to the Rural Water, Sewer, Gas and Solid Waste Management District Act, expanding municipality limits to include any area included within the boundaries of any city, town or village as a result of incorporation, annexation, population growth or otherwise. The measure was given a do pass motion.

**HB2408**, a committee substitute by Sen. J. Berry Harrison, D-Fairfax, states that no district shall export water or gas outside the state without the consent of the Legislature. The measure, with a stricken title, received a do pass motion.

**HB2416**, by Easley, allows an equal number of years of employment with the Corporation Commission as a field inspector to qualify an applicant for employment with the Conservation Commission for positions requiring experience in the production of oil and gas. The measure's title was stricken and it was given a do pass motion.

**HB2856**, by Easley, creates the Oklahoma Underground Storage Tank Regulation Act and creates a separate program for its implementation. After having its enacting clause stricken, the measure received a do pass motion.

**HB2857**, by Easley, provides that the production of oil from each marginal well in the state that produces less than three barrels per day shall be exempt from gross production tax. After having its enacting clause stricken, the measure was given a do pass motion.

**HB2874**, by Easley, changes the membership of the Oklahoma Energy Resources Board. An amendment to the measure created an alternate refund mechanism, making it easier for customers to receive refunds. The bill was given a do pass motion.

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**HB2921**, by Easley, adds specific telecommunication companies to be subjected to the Corporation Commission public utilities assessment. The bill received a do pass motion.

**HB2972**, by Sen. Penny Williams, D-Tulsa, creates the Oklahoma voluntary Remediation and Redevelopment Act. The act encourages voluntary remediation of contaminated sites by limiting the liability of property owners. It also fosters reuse of property previously contaminated and establishes a voluntary site remediation program to assist property owners. After having its enacting clause stricken, the measure received a do pass motion.

## BURNING BAN LIFTED FOR MOST COUNTIES

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Governor Frank Keating announced Thursday the ban on outdoor burning in Oklahoma has been lifted for all but 19 counties. Those northwest Oklahoma counties where the ban remains in effect are: Alfalfa, Beaver, Beckham, Blaine, Cimarron, Custer, Dewey, Ellis, Garfield, Grant, Greer, Harmon, Harper, Major, Roger Mills, Texas, Washita, Woods and Woodward.

The statewide ban went into effect on February 22 at a time of extreme fire danger. Fire activity dropped almost immediately following the issuance of the ban and has remained at lower than average levels for most of the state.

Although the return of moisture to the state has been a big help in reducing the number of fires, it doesn't mean the drought is over. Some areas of the state need more than five inches of rain to bring an end to the drought. Fire danger still exists and caution in the use of fire is still needed.

The executive order lifting the burning ban for 58 counties was signed by Lt. Governor Mary Fallin for Governor Keating who is in New York attending an education summit.

## Firearms

### DEBATE OVER CONCEALED WEAPONS IN BANKS

■(GIT) Members of the House Rules Committee heard arguments Monday regarding **SB1050**, authored by Rep. Fred Stanley, D-Madill. This measure clarifies language relating to firearms as designated by **SB003**, authored by Sen. Frank Shurden, D-Henryetta, which was signed into law last year.

The new provisions of **SB1050**, deal with the problems of licensing requirements to carry a concealed weapon.

**SB1050** would allow a person who has successfully completed an Oklahoma background investigation, as well as a federal investigation, based on the individual's name and social security number, to be issued a license, even though the Federal Bureau of Investigations fingerprint investigation may not have come through.

The measure also specifies the circumstances in which retired law enforcement officers can carry a concealed weapon.

However, controversy sparked as Rep. Don Ross, D-Tulsa, proposed to amend the bill on page 4, sec 3, line 26, to include banks as a location where concealed weapons would be prohibited under Oklahoma statutes. If a person were to fail to comply under this amendment, they would be subject to Oklahoma trespassing laws.

A representative of the Bankers Association was in attendance to explain the reasoning of the amendment. He said because banks are federally insured through F.D.I.C, they come under cur-

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rent law of buildings in Oklahoma that excludes people from carrying such concealed weapons.

Rep. Don McCorkell, D-Tulsa offered an amendment to the amendment to allow those driving through nighttime depositories or using the ATM machines to be allowed to carry a weapon.

Rep. Jim Glover seconded the motion.

Before the passage of the amendments, Rep. Stanley argued against them.

"On the surface this may sound attractive, but it solves nothing. It singles out one business and makes one more important than the others."

"The 35,000 Oklahomans who have requested applications—what about them? They should have the opportunity for self-protection. Whether they are depositing his check or buying a gallon of milk at the grocery store, they deserve the same self-protection," Stanley said.

Ross then expressed his views in support of his amendment by saying, "People don't need to bring a gun into the bank because of the security, the cameras and what not. Obviously, the first bill had problems, or we wouldn't be here today. I just want to bar potential criminals from potential crimes."

The amendments failed by one vote.

The bill itself received a do pass vote.

### HOUSE RULES COMMITTEE TAKES UP 16 MEASURES

■(GIT) Room 412-C at the State Capitol Monday was filled wall to wall with lawmakers and observers for the House Rules Committee. Members took up 16 measures for consideration.

**SB782**, authored by Rep. Calvin Anthony, D-Stillwater, creates the Oklahoma Telecommunications Authority Board, as an entity to regulate the numerous telecommunication affiliates in the state. The measure received a do pass vote.

**SB1315**, also authored by Rep. Anthony, directs purchasing specifications and parameters relating to OneNet. The measure received a do pass vote.

**SJR24**, authored by Rep. Flint Breckenridge, R-Tulsa, calls for a vote of the people to approve or reject a Bill of Rights for Victims. The title was restored on the resolution, and the measure received a do pass vote..

**SB873**, authored by Rep. Danny Hilliard, D-Sulphur, states that the salaries and travel reimbursement of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and the Legislature shall be withheld for the period of time any state employee is furloughed as a direct result of he failure of the Governor and the Legislature to enact appropriations measures. The measure had the title restored and received a do pass vote.

**SB1050**, authored by Rep. Fred Stanley, D-Madill, modifies language relating to firearms.

Rep. Don Ross proposed to amend the bill on page 4, section 3 line 26, however the amendment failed by one vote. Another amendment, offered by Stanley, which amended page 5 line 3.5, was adopted. The bill did receive a do pass vote.

**SB1201** (committee substitute), authored by Rep. Russ Roach, D-Tulsa, modifies language relating to county commissioners. This measure would allow for a two-track system for counties to decide their views on home rule. This bill creates a formal study to examine each county and present the findings to the legislature. The bill failed to receive the necessary votes to pass out of committee.

**HR1054**, authored by Rep. Leonard Sullivan, R-Oklahoma City, is a resolution condemning certain actions by television station WSB-TV and the Atlanta, Georgia police force for the treatment of presidential candidate Alan Keyes. The resolution received a do pass motion.

**SB899**, authored by Rep. Lloyd Fields, D-McAlester, adds definitions for "progressive game"

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and "special promotional game" to the Oklahoma Charity Games Act, exempts religious, charitable, labor, fraternal and educational organizations from the definition of "organization" and states the price for an employee license shall be \$5.00. The measure also states that an organization licensed to conduct charity games may remit a monthly equivalent amount of tax to the Oklahoma Tax Commission in lieu of paying the distributor for taxes levied.

The bill was amended on page 8, section 5 line 21; page 3 section 1, line 16; and pages 4 and 5, section 1. These amendments were provided to clarify that these acts were not class III gaming. The bill received a do pass vote.

**SB910**, also authored by Rep. Fields, clarifies language pertaining to the Oklahoma State and Education Employees Group Insurance Act, the Oklahoma State Employees Benefits Act, and the Oklahoma Health Care Authority Act. The bill received a do pass vote, with the title restored.

**SB791**, authored by Rep. Jari Askins, D-Duncan, removes the prohibition against transporting a concealed rifle or shotgun in a vehicle. The measure received a do pass vote with the title restored.

**SB694**, authored by Rep. Joe Hutchinson, D-Jay, adds county boards and public trust authorities to provisions allowing dual office holdings. The measure received a do pass vote.

**SB922**, authored by Rep. Larry Roberts, D-Miami, transfers the State Employee Assistance Program from the Office of Personnel Management to the State and Education Employees Group Insurance Board effective July 1, 1996. The bill received a do pass vote with the title restored.

**SB1106**, also authored by Rep. Roberts, modifies sections pertaining to the Oklahoma State and Education Employee Group Insurance Board and the Oklahoma State Employees Benefits Council and prohibits the Board from offering a health plan which is owned or operated by the state and which utilizes a capitated payment plan for providers which uses a primary care physician as a gatekeeper to any specialty care provided by physician-specialists, unless specifically authorized by the Legislature. The bill received a do pass vote with the title restored.

**SB1167**, authored by Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore, provides regulations relating to simulcast races and fair associations licensed to conduct race meeting and clarifies days considered racing days. The measure also provides for percentage of winnings to be received from wagering and provides for distribution of such moneys. It also states Oklahoma does not conduct live racing. The measure received a do pass vote.

**SB1040**, authored by Rep. James Dunlap, R-Bartlesville, establishes criteria for setting premiums within the State and Education Employees Group Insurance Act. The measure received a do pass vote with the title restored.

**HCR1071**, authored by Rep. Frank Davis, R-Guthrie, proclaims the Legislature's support of a Sports Museum in the City of Guthrie. The resolution received a do pass vote.

**SB1260**, authored by Rep. Jim Glover, was pulled from the agenda.

## SENATE GENERAL GOVERNMENT APPROVES FOUR HOUSE BILLS, ONE FAILS

**HB2213**, authored by Rep. Howard Cotner, D-Altus, modifies the description of geographic areas represented by the Red River Boundary Commission.

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**HB2547**, authored by Rep. Mark Seikel, D-Harrah, deletes limitations on expenditures for salaries and wages of county officers.

**HB2704**, authored by Rep. Larry Rice, D-Pryor, modifies language relating to the Oklahoma Municipal Code. Senate staff assigned to the committee reported the legislation listed above received a do pass by members.

Only one measure failed. **HB2545**, also by Seikel, clarified references to county treasurers.

## OKLAHOMA PUBLIC EMPLOYEES ASSOCIATION URGES KEATING TO DROP LAWSUIT, FEARS FUTURE SCANDALS

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Citing scandal involving the Kansas retirement system for its state employees, the Oklahoma Public Employees Association is urging Governor Keating to withdraw a lawsuit asking the courts to give him sole control of the appointments to state pension boards. The appointments are now divided between the Governor and the Legislature.

"It took a financial crisis and scandal in Kansas, before they realized the seriousness of their mistake," said Faye Waits, President of the 11,000 member OPEA.

Waits was referring to a situation where Kansas public pension board appointments used to be made solely by the Governor. During his term, former Kansas Governor John Carlin began urging that the Kansas Public Employee Retirement System (KPRS) invest hundreds of millions of dollars in local business ventures. A serious number of those investments proved to be bad decisions and KPRS has so far had to write off nearly \$140 million in losses. The pension board members who approved those investments were appointed exclusively by Carlin.

Because of the scandal, Kansas changed the way it appointed pension board members, taking the sole appointment power away from the Governor and dividing it with the Legislature and other entities.

Waits noted that Kansas now has an appointment system that is modeled after Oklahoma's.

Waits affirmed that OPEA has filed a "friend of the court" brief opposing Governor Keating's lawsuit.

"This issue is not about Governor Keating's ability to appoint qualified people to pension boards, it's about changing from a successful pension management system to one which will be wide open to future abuses of power and mismanagement," said the OPEA President.

## HOUSE PASSES LICENSE PLATES BILLS

The measure passed with a vote of 100-0.

**SCR50**, authored by Rep. Fred Stanley, D-Madill, praises the life and achievements of the late Bill Vinson.

The resolution was adopted.

## SENATE VOTES — MARCH 26, 1996

■(GIT) The following measures were addressed Tuesday on the Senate floor:

**HB2082**, by Sen. Gilmer Capps, D-Snyder, et al., designates the black swallowtail as the state butterfly of Oklahoma. The measure passed with a vote of 46 to 0.

**HB2085**, by Sen. Gene Stipe, D-McAlester, changes the limitation to commence prosecution of financial crimes to five years. It also changes the limitation to commence prosecution for lewd or indecent proposals against children to seven years. The measure passed with a vote of 47 to 0.

**HB2112**, by Sen. Trish Weedn, D-Purcell, modifies the penalty for defacing, stealing or possessing road signs or markers. The measure passed with a vote of 47 to 0.

The measure was amended to include the option of sentencing offenders to both fines and imprisonment in addition to community service.

**HB2122**, by Sen. Brad Henry, D-Shawnee, modifies requirements for attorneys relating to subpoenas, depositions and witnesses. The measure passed with a vote of 32 to 14.

**HB2152**, by Sen. Jerry Smith, R-Tulsa, adds other areas used for court functions to the acceptable list of expenses court funds may incur. The measure passed with a vote of 44 to 2.

The measure was amended, renumbering applicable paragraphs within the measure.

**HB2223**, by Sen. Frank Shurden, D-Henryetta, prohibits county commissioners from spending funds for any purpose other than normal operating expenditures. The measure passed, with an emergency clause, with a vote of 46 to 0.

**HB2227**, by Sen. J.R. "Dick" Wilkerson, D-Purcell, provides that a judge may issue a search warrant for an occupied dwelling if he finds that evidence is located on the premises between 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m., the search is a crime scene search or the subject of the warrant is a fugitive or the subject of an outstanding warrant. It also states search warrants for other than occupied dwellings may be served at any time without special direction. The measure passed with a vote of 43 to 4.

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**HB2232**, by Weedn, requires that within 20 days after a proposed charter from a board of freeholders, a municipal governing body shall publish the proposed charter and an announcement of the date of the charter election in a newspaper of general circulation within the municipality once per week for three consecutive weeks. The measure passed with a vote of 46 to 0.

**HB2252**, by Sen. Keith Leftwich, D-Oklahoma City, changes the required measurement for motorcycle headlamps from not more than 54 inches nor less than 22 inches. The measure passed with a vote of 35 to 10.

**HB2336**, by Sen. Robert Kerr, D-Altus, allows for university and college supporting license plates to include those of private universities. The measure passed with a vote of 45 to 0.

**HB2530**, by Sen. Ed Long, D-Enid, states that a partial term of not more than eighteen months for a member of the board of trustees of a library system shall not be considered a full term. The measure and its emergency clause passed with a vote of 45 to 1.

**HB2541**, by Smith, modifies requirements of nonlawyer judges as they relate to the filing of traffic violation reports with the Department of Public Safety. It also reduces the number of hours of continuing legal education required from twelve hours to six hours, which includes attendance of at least one day of state judicial conference from a judge. The measure passed with a vote of 46 to 0.

**HB2561**, by Weedn, deletes the requirement that a lien entry form be prescribed by the Oklahoma Tax Commission. The measure passed with a vote of 46 to 0. Weedn filed a motion to reconsider, giving her three legislative days to readdress the measure.

**HB2604**, by Wilkerson, modifies references relating to driving across highway dividing spaces, the installation of blue lights on vehicles other than authorized emergency vehicles and covering or otherwise overlaying vehicle license plates. The measure and its emergency clause received a vote of 46 to 0.

**HB2745**, by Stipe, directs the Department of Transportation County Advisory Board to establish a maximum purchase allocation for participating in counties. It also directs the board to establish an interest rate that may be charged on all leases or lease-purchase agreements. The measure passed with a vote of 47 to 0.

**HB2918**, by Smith, provides for assistant and special assistant district attorneys to be named state officers and details the responsibilities of the position. The measure and its emergency clause passed with a vote of 46 to 0.

**HB3000**, by Sen. Don Rubottom, R-Tulsa, declares "Oklahoma My Native Land" as the official children's song of the state. The measure passed with a vote of 45 to 0.

**HB3028**, by Wilkerson, states that any written bill of sale, timber deed or timber contract shall be preserved by the owner or operator of a logging or timber harvesting operation for at least a period of three years. Within that period, law enforcement personnel may inspect records. The measure and its emergency clause passed with a vote of 45 to 0.

**HJR1077**, by Sen. J. Berry Harrison, D-Fairfax, designates U.S. Highway 64, from Pawnee west, to U.S. 177 as the Pawnee Bill Memorial Highway. The measure was adopted with a vote of 45 to 0.

**HCR1064**, by Sen. Kevin Easley, D-Broken Arrow, states legislative intent concerning the creation of the Oklahoma International Bluegrass Festival. The measure was adopted.

## LEGISLATIVE PROCESS FAILS OKLAHOMANS, WEBB SAYS; TAXPAYER PROTECTION MEASURE 'DIES IN THE DARK'

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) State Rep. Dan Webb said he "has had it with liberal lawmakers who put the interests of big government over those of the people they were elected to represent."

Webb, an Oklahoma City Republican, made that comment in response to action by the Senate

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Finance Committee to kill **House Joint Resolution 1066** without even the courtesy of a complete hearing. The committee took the action on the motion of Sen. Don Williams, D-Balko.

The measure, which was sponsored by Webb and Sen. Frank Shurden, D-Henryetta, would have given Oklahoma voters the option to place in the state constitution a provision that would protect taxpayers from the federal government and the Internal Revenue Service.

Under the amendment, the state government would challenge in the US Supreme Court any attempt by the federal government to place a lien on any homestead to pay for unpaid federal taxes.

The House of Representatives passed the measure on an overwhelming 82-11 vote earlier this month.

Webb, a vocal critic of the legislature's committee process, says the liberal Democrat leadership in both the House and the Senate use their committees to smother good legislation without public knowledge or scrutiny. Republicans often complain Democrat leaders often target GOP-sponsored bills to "die in the dark."

"They should have the courage to let every serious proposal — no matter who brings it — be fully debated," he said. "It is a shame the liberal Democrats do not believe enough in their ideals to let them stand on their own without parliamentary trickery and out-of-date rules of procedure."

## BILL CHANGING ELECTORAL PROCESS PASSES SENATE COMMITTEE

■(GIT) Members of the Senate Committee on Government Operations and Agency Oversight passed a measure designed to change the way Oklahoma distributes its electoral votes. **HB2940**, by Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore, would require each of the state's eight presidential electoral votes to be won individually, instead of the current "winner takes all" method.

"I think it's going to create a partisan type vote within each district," said Sen. Mark Snyder, R-Edmond, who voted against the measure. "The president has to represent all of the people. The majority of the states elect their governor that way. The states should elect the president the same way."

Though she voted for the bill, Sen. Angela Monson, D-Oklahoma City, said it caused her concern. "It makes me nervous," she said, "to the extent that any time you are faced with substantial legislation you should be concerned."

"Democracy was built on the concept of one person one vote," she said. "Maybe this is the best way that Oklahoma's voting population would be equally represented."

Though she agreed the measure would probably see resistance on the floor, Committee Chairman Sen. Maxine Horner, D-Tulsa, said the bill would promote equity at the polls.

Election Board Secretary Lance Ward said his main concern with the measure is how it will effect the state's election process. The measure would not affect the process, he said. "It really is a political decision," he said.

With the support of committee Democrats and the opposition of Republicans, the measure was passed with a vote of 3 to 2. A vote is expected before the full Senate sometime next week.

Also addressed by the committee was **HB 2381**, by Sen. Dave Herbert, D-Midwest City, which modifies and limits the distribution of the Oklahoma Register. The bill was passed with a vote of 5 to 0.

## DEQ SHOULD ADOPT RULES, LAWMAKERS AGREE

■(GIT) Wednesday, members of the House Administrative Rule Review Committee and the Attorney General's Office met to discuss the Administrative Procedures Act as well as agency compliance with the act.

Members quickly moved through the bills. **HJR1098**, authored by Rep. Larry Adair, D-Stilwell, relates to an emergency rule of the Wildlife Commission. It disapproves rule and directs distribution. The measure received a do pass from members. **SB703**, authored by Rep. Loyd Benson, D-Frederick, was also approved. The measure modifies the procedure for interpreting statutes and agency rules under the Administrative Procedures Act. The bill was amended to require that agencies document interpretations of rules. **HJR1097**, authored by Rep. Dan Webb, R-Oklahoma City, was not heard.

The Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) has enacted a policy on self-reporting in taking corrective action. Trish Koonce, counsel for the Committee, explained that the agency does not have statutory rules. As a result, she said any action they take could be meaningless if challenged.

Koonce explained that the Corporation Commission encouraged the agency to make the action a policy rather than a rule.

Koonce said the only two options if the agency does not comply, would be to handle the issue through the Legislature or for the Attorney General to issue an opinion.

Gray urged Rep. Larry Rice, D-Pryor, to talk with the legal counsel for DEQ to resolve the issue.

**HB2120**, by Sen. Gerald "Ged" Wright, R-Broken Arrow, changes the name of military security guards to police officers. The measure passed with a vote of 40 to 1.

**HB2128** by Sen. Jerry Smith, R-Tulsa, modifying the definition of bogus checks, failed with a 22-22 vote.

**HB2132**, by Sen. Dick Wilkerson, D-Atwood, provides for the destruction of liens after five years. The measure passed with a vote of 40 to 0.

**HB2156**, by Sen. Bernest Cain, D-Oklahoma City, providing for physically disabled parking privileges under certain circumstances, received a passing vote of 47-0.

**HB2193**, by Sen. Ed Long, D-Enid, modifying the content of educational improvement plans and the allowable exemptions, passed by a vote of 45-0.

**HB2233** by Sen. Robert M. Kerr, D-Altus, requiring the Oklahoma Tax Commission to pursue collection from certain persons, received a passing vote of 42-4.

**HB2277**, by Sen. Dave Herbert, D-Midwest City, modifying the areas in which cities and town may enforce traffic ordinances, passed by a vote of 33-13.

**HB2300**, by Sen. Jack Bell, D-Idabel, authorizing the establishment of a forestry cost-share program, received a passing vote of 46-0.

**HB2320** (floor substitute) by Sen. Herbert, modifying the authority of municipalities to compensate elected officials, received a passing vote of 44-0.

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**HB2359**, by Sen. Brad Henry, D-Shawnee, relating to the amount of public assistance a person shall receive and increasing limitations related to certain irrevocable contracts, irrevocable account and designated accounts or cash value for funeral benefits, received a passing vote of 47-0 with an emergency clause.

**HB2385**, by Sen. Bernest Cain, D-Oklahoma City, requires confidentiality for review of ethical complaints for determining qualified corporation. The measure failed with a vote of 20 to 22.

**HB2391**, by Sen. Cain, relating to the Adult Health Care Act, received a passing vote of 45-0.

**HB2456** by Sen. Trish Weedn, D-Duncan, modifying the resident agent requirement, providing an exemption for certain insurers and allowing a facsimile of the required cosignature, received a passing vote of 43-0.

**HB2499**, by Sen. Jim Maddox, D-Lawton, providing an exemption from certain load limits for public utility vehicles, received a passing vote of 42-3 as amended.

**HB2549** by Sen. Weedn, creating the Coordination of Services for Older Oklahomans Act, received a passing vote of 44-2 with an emergency clause.

**HB2574**, by Sen. Howard Hendrick, R-Bethany, provides that rules of the State Board of Health shall not require euthanasia and disposal of domesticated wild animals with rabies, or suspected to be infected with rabies, without consideration of specified criteria. The measure passed with a vote of 40 to 1.

**HB2622** by Sen. Smith, related to self-proved wills and codicils, modifying execution formalities for self-proved instruments and deleting requirement for formal acknowledgments, passed by a vote of 45-1.

**HB2623**, also by Hendrick, states that a group or combination of persons or risks will not be considered "fictitious," upon meeting provided conditions. The measure passed with a vote of 42 to 0. Hendrick filed a motion to reconsider, giving him three legislative days to re-address the matter.

**HB2697**, by Sen. Wilkerson, bringing OSBI agents under the licensing provisions of the Polygraph Examiners Act, passed on a vote of 46-0 with an emergency clause.

**HB2701**, by Sen. Herbert, requiring activation or sounding of train bell or whistle, received a passing vote of 44-0 as amended.

**HB2796**, by Sen. Smith, providing for recorded instruments to meet certain guidelines, received a passing vote of 46-0 with its enacting clause stricken.

**HB2812**, by Sen. Gilmer Capps, D-Snyder, clarifies language relating to the issuance of and qualification for a restricted commercial vehicle driver's license to persons under the age of seventeen for custom harvest purposes.

The measure was amended on page three, lines seven and eleven. In both instances, the word custom was removed. The measure passed with a vote of 40 to 0.

**HB2946** by Sen. Smith, correcting a statutory citation in the Oklahoma Indigent Defense Act, received a passing vote of 43-3 with an emergency clause.

## EDMONDSON APPLAUDS SUPREME COURT DECISION

■(GIT) Two years ago in district court, Judge Ralph Thomspon ruled that an Oklahoma Ponca Tribe could not sue the state over a gaming compact. The compact would have allowed the tribe to install slot machines on their property.

Wednesday, Attorney General Drew Edmondson announced that the Supreme Court has also ruled in favor of the state's position.

Edmondson said the major impact of the decision defeats the primary argument for those pushing casino gaming.

Edmondson also said the 5 to 4 ruling by the justices was historical. "The direction of the court has generally been in favor of state's rights, however it was close," he said.

Another constitutional issue will hit the state next year when a federal statute becomes effective. Under the statute, only private investigators would be able to obtain drivers' license information on individuals. Edmondson explained that the statute was a product of crimes related to stalking. The state complies with other federal measures to receive federal funding, but not for driving records. "The statute will most likely be challenged," he said.

## DHS BUDGET STRIPPED OF \$23 MILLION OPEA URGES IMMEDIATE ACTION BY EMPLOYEES

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) This last week saw the passage of **SB837**, which dealt a severe blow to the Department of Human Services budget. The issue is this: Governor Keating's advisors propose cutting nearly \$23 million from the DHS Medicaid budget.

Both sides are at a stalemate. Rather than hold up the entire appropriations process, through, the legislature and Governor have taken the \$22.6 million in question, and have put it aside in a special account called the "Medicaid Administrative Cost Fund". Under this arrangement, the Governor can't spend the money and neither can the legislature.

Fortunately, there will be at least one more DHS appropriation bill passed later in the session which could add the \$22.6 million back into DHS budget. For that reason, the Association is calling up every DHS employee to write or call the Governor's office to tell Keating's staff that the \$22.6 million budget cut is not workable and explain that the loss of 400 to 600 field staff will be a disaster not only for Medicaid assistance, but AFDC, Food Stamps and other programs, as well.

## EMPLOYEE PAY RAISE BILL PASSES IN HOUSE SESSION

■(GIT) After a great deal of debate Thursday, House members voted 95 to 4 in favor of **SB1128**, authored Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore. The measure is an act that would raise the salaries of all state employees. The fiscal impact of this move would cost \$21.4 million over a period of six months. The bill was amended by Rep. Loyd Benson, D-Frederick, to begin administering raises January 1 opposed to June 1, 1996. This changes the provision from a fiscal to calendar year. The amendment was adopted by a vote of 53 to 46.

Other measures passed by members today included:

**SB876**, authored by Rep. Bob Ed Culver, D-Tahlequah, authorizes the Scenic Rivers Commission to acquire additional property for the development and maintenance of scenic river areas. Members voted 76 to 22 in favor of the bill, the emergency clause also passed.

**SB907**, authored by Rep. Don McCorkell, D-Tulsa, modifies definition and statutory references pertaining to the Oklahoma Jobs Program Act. Members voted 95 to 4 in favor of the bill. However, Rep. Fred Stanley, D-Madill, asked for the bill to be reconsidered. McCorkell tried to suspend the rules and asked for the bill to be reconsidered today, but his motion failed 49 to 50.

**SB1147**, authored by Benson, prohibits the use of accident reports for commercial purposes. Members voted 98 to 0 in favor of the bill.

Rep. James Hamilton, D-Poteau, motioned to strike all Senate amendments on **HB1138**, and the measure was assigned to General Conference Committee on Appropriations.

## MAPS COMMITTEE CONCERNED AT LACK OF TOTAL MYRIAD RENOVATION; SAYS SERIOUS BUDGET PROBLEMS ON HORIZON

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Members of the MAPS Citizens Oversight Board Wednesday raised concerns over the planned \$26 million facelift for the Myriad Convention Center and suggested city residents are going to be unhappy with the job because the entire center won't be renovated.

Committee members said even if the Myriad renovations "go over budget, that's something we should look at to make sure it's a first class facility."

Members also complained that only the "convention" space in the center is undergoing renovating while no money will be spent on the parking facilities and restrooms located in other areas. Another major concern is the extremely deteriorated Myriad roof which officials are considering replacing — at least in part.

"It's a great event center, but it is not a convention facility and it was important to address the exhibit halls and convention space," said Jim Bruza, a principal with Frankfurt-Short-Bruza, the architectural firm hired by Oklahoma City as the MAPS Program Coordinator.

Board member Eric Groves replied "that the public is expecting something different and it's possible that the public will not be satisfied with the renovations and will be very surprised and very disappointed. We need to face up to that and we need to see if the city will find money somewhere else...probably not in the police budget."

Bruza agreed and said the maintenance on the Myriad has been neglected and "we certainly don't want to do the (\$26 million) renovations with a bad roof over our heads."

Assistant City Manager Jim Thompson said "if we had \$20 million more we could spend it."

The committee may have been laying the ground work for the forthcoming budget figures that are due in two weeks from Frankfurt-Short-Bruza. The firm has been recalculating the entire MAPS budget in the aftermath of the ballpark bids which came in millions over the estimates put forth by MAPS developers.

## OKLAHOMA MANUFACTURING TAXES AMONG LOWEST

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Manufacturing companies in Oklahoma face one of the lowest tax burdens in the region, according to a study by a national, non-partisan research organization.

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"Our business taxes are among the lowest in the nation, especially when it comes to manufacturing," said Senator Cal Hobson, Vice-chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee. "That makes our state especially attractive to the kind of companies that traditionally create the best jobs."

The Lexington legislator says the latest study was compiled on the advice of visiting economist Steven Gold of the Urban Institute.

The study by the Public Affairs Research Council (PAR) examined 11 southern states, all of which are among the 20 lowest tax states in the country. PAR used a model that applied actual tax burdens to hypothetical manufacturing concerns. In that comparison, Oklahoma consistently ranked among the states with the lowest manufacturing tax burdens.

"The numbers tell us that Oklahoma's tax structure is very competitive when it comes to attracting manufacturing, the most sought after industry. This is further evidence that Oklahoma is a low tax state with a very business friendly environment," said Senator Hobson.

Oklahoma also fares well in overall comparisons of business taxes. Oklahoma is 48th in property taxes and 43rd in corporate taxes. In overall per capita state and local taxes, Oklahoma ranks 44th.

"The lesson of all these statistics is that Oklahoma is already in good shape when it comes to taxes. If we really want to improve our state, we have to focus our energies and resources elsewhere, namely on education," said Senator Hobson.

"Every expert we've heard from has said Oklahoma needs to beef up its education system to be economically competitive," said Senator Hobson.

## Health & Human Services

### HOUSE PUBLIC HEALTH COMMITTEE MOVES BILLS

■(GIT) The House Committee on Public Health met Monday, passing several of its assigned measures.

**SB587**, by Rep. Gary Bastin, D-Del City, includes advanced practice nurses in a list of medical practitioners. It also allows those nurses, and others, to dispense professional drug samples and allows them to diagnose, prescribe, distribute and administer medicines or treatments as defined by the Board of Nursing. It also requires the nurses to accept responsibility to practice in an accepted manner for their profession. The measure received a do pass motion.

**SB745**, by Rep. Calvin J. Anthony, D-Stillwater, requires licensure of out-of-state physicians who regularly provide diagnostic evaluations to in-state physicians or patients. The measure was amended to exclude armed forces physicians and medical officers of the U.S. Public Health Service of the Veterans Administration of the United States. The measure received a do pass motion.

**SB788**, a committee substitute by Rep. Laura Boyd, D-Norman, creates the Licensed Perfusionists Act and the State Board of Examiners of Perfusionists. The measure received a do pass motion.

**SB896**, a committee substitute by Rep. Larry Roberts, D-Miami, transfers various powers and authorities of the State Employees Benefits Council from the Health Care Authority to the Council itself. The measure received a do pass motion.

**SB1223**, by Anthony, states that the Oklahoma Health Care Authority shall have the power and the duty to review and evaluate State Medicaid Program eligibility and enrollment guidelines in relation to federal regulations. The measure received a do pass motion.

**SB1290**, by Anthony, directs the State Board of Health to promulgate rules regarding the establishment of provider service networks. The measure received a do pass motion.

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**SB1314**, by Anthony, authorizes the granting of home health aid certification under specified circumstances. An amendment to the measure deletes lines 10 through 15 of page two, and replaces it with language requiring competency certification until July, 1997 for those persons under contract with the State Medicaid Agency. The measure received a do pass motion.

**SB737**, by Rep. Charles Gray, D-Oklahoma City, was laid over.

**SB851**, by Rep. Dale Wells, D-Cushing, was withdrawn and will not be addressed.

## 50 ORGANIZATIONS PARTICIPATE IN PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES AWARENESS DAY AT STATE CAPITOL MARCH 28

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Nearly 50 consumer groups, non-profit organizations and several state agencies joined over 500 Oklahomans with disabilities for the second annual People with Disabilities Awareness Day at the State Capitol on Thursday, March 28. The event, which was coordinated by the Oklahoma Department of Rehabilitation Services (DRS), began at 10:00 a.m. with a concert on the south plaza by the award-winning Oklahoma School for the Blind jazz band from Muskogee.

Awareness day participants and visitors found assistive technology equipment demonstrations and disability-related information at exhibits located inside the Capitol Building on the second and fourth floors.

According to census-based estimates from DRS, approximately 216,000, or 10.8% of working-age Oklahomans living outside institutions have disabilities that impact employment. Only 20 percent of these Oklahomans with disabilities, or 42,500, are employed full-time.

## RYAN LUKE BILL PASSES SENATE COMMITTEE

■(GIT) "We lost thirty-four children to death last year...something in our system isn't working," was the comment from Sen. Ben Brown, D-Oklahoma City, Senate Author of **HB2053**, also known as the Ryan Luke bill. The measure, a committee substitute, modifies requirements for those involved in child abuse and neglect situations. Members passed the measure with a vote of 11 to 0 on Tuesday.

A section of the bill drawing debate related to court monitoring of a family with a case before a court prior to its dismissal. An amendment by Sen. Howard Hendrick, R-Bethany, attempted to change the requirement to only when deemed necessary by the court.

Concerns that allowing judges such discretion could result in children being placed back into harmful situations in cases where courts decided not to monitor the family.

Hendrick said the amendment was necessary in order "to get resources where we really need them and not requiring a bunch of social workers performing a bunch of ... tasks that are unnecessary."

With the estimated thousands of cases of child abuse and neglect last year, Hendrick said such a requirement would require thousands of social worker visits, even if each family was only visited once a year.

With a vote of 6 to 5, the Hendrick amendment failed.

Another section sparking concern among some members allows DHS, the Oklahoma Commission on Children and Youth or the district attorney to release information about those persons criminally charged in child abuse cases.

Sen. Darryl Roberts, D-Ardmore, called the section an opportunity for "trial by press release."

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"There is a problem and we want to fix," Brown said.

Anne Roberts, executive director for the Oklahoma Institute for Child Advocacy said the bill represents the culmination of years of work, which, she said, began in 1989, with the creation of the Child Abuse Study Commission.

"Part of their recommendations have been carried out," she said. "The Child Death Review Board and the Child Abuse Training and Coordinating Council both came from that commission."

The bill's next stop is the Senate floor.

## LAWMAKERS PASS "PEOPLE FRIENDLY" BILL

■(GIT) Lawmakers passed legislation out of the House Human Services Committee Tuesday that modifies language regarding developmental disabilities, to define "people friendly" wording, according to author Barbara Staggs, D-Muskogee. **SB1097**, modifies and defines language pertaining to Group Homes for Persons with Developmental Disabilities. This measure also creates an interdisciplinary team to determine on-site staffing requirements.

The bill was amended to include stricken language on pages 20 and 39 and did receive a do pass vote.

**SB0977**, authored by Rep. Michael Tyler, D-Sapulpa, requires the Department of Human Services (DHS) to take into consideration rate increases necessary for the adequate treatment of developmentally disabled clients when setting reimbursement rates.

The measure received a do pass vote with the title restored.

**SB1135**, authored by Rep. Jari Askins, D-Duncan, clarifies references pertaining to food stamp fraud.

The bill received a do pass vote.

**SB1177**, authored by Rep. Don McCorkell, D-Tulsa, provides that any license holder of a nursing home who has been cited more than three times for deficiencies which lead to enforcement action and penalties, or found to be out of substantial compliance with the requirements of any statute or rule, will not be deemed a person responsible or suitable to operate or direct such a facility.

The measure received a do pass vote with the title restored.

**SB1303**, authored by Rep. Sean Voskuhl, modifies membership of the Advisory Committee on Medical Care for Public Assistance Recipients.

The measure received a do pass vote.

## BILL ALLOWING AGENCY TO PURCHASE EQUIPMENT WITHOUT COMPETITIVE BID REQUIREMENTS RECEIVES APPROVAL

■(GIT) Wednesday, members of the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Human Services approved a bill to allow the Department of Rehabilitation Services to purchase equipment and other related items without competitive bid requirements. In **HB1555**, the agency would no longer be required to purchase these items through the Department of Central Services. Although, the agency would be required to promulgate purchasing procedures with Central Services approval.

Senate author of the bill, Herb Rozell, D-Tahlequah, said disabled individuals were losing job opportunities due to a backlog at Central Services.

Linda Parker, director for the agency, explained the adaptive technology equipment frequently arrived too late, often taking up to three months.

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Members voted to do pass the measure out of committee.

**HB3021**, authored by Sen. Ben Brown, D-Oklahoma City, was also approved by members. It requires individual and group insurance policies to provide coverage for equipment, services and supplies for the treatment of diabetes. Senate staff explained that there were minor changes to the bill to help strengthen the language. The most significant changed any policies issued or renewed after Nov. 1, 1996, not policies withstanding, as previously stated in the bill.

The subcommittee did not hear the budget presentation from the Office of Juvenile Affairs.

## **PREVENTION KEY IN FIGHT AGAINST CHILD ABUSE, HOUSE CHILDREN, YOUTH AND FAMILY SERVICES COMMITTEE TOLD**

■(GIT) Efforts aimed at preventing child abuse are the key in the fight against what the leader of a national organization told the House's Committee on Children, Youth and Family Services is an ever growing problem in the United States.

"Prevention is the only direction we can go if we are going to deal with this serious problem," Dr. Terri Gallmeier, vice president of the National Committee to Prevent Child Abuse, told the committee members Thursday.

That, Gallmeier explained, differed from early efforts at addressing child abuse and neglect, which focused on intervention with families after the abuse occurred.

A conference last year, Gallmeier said, reexamined the problem of child abuse and came to the conclusion that while more is known, the problem is still growing, particularly the more serious forms of abuse and neglect.

Among the other conclusions drawn by the panel, Gallmeier said, were that defining child abuse is a complex problem, particularly when attempting to delineate between positive parenting in different cultural settings; that abuse statistics alone are not an effective way to measure the amount of abuse in a community, state or in the nation; that while enacting laws aimed at preventing child abuse may feel good, there is no certainty the laws impact families and decrease child abuse; that intense intervention, rather than long-term efforts, are more affective; and that it is best to start intervention programs as early as possible, including prenatal efforts.

Additionally, Gallmeier told the committee, recent studies have been able to classify families into three groups and determine what type of prevention efforts are effective for them.

The first group, she said, are the consumers, families who know they have problems and need help and know where to go to get that help.

"It is with these families," Gallmeier said, "that prevention programs have been most effective."

It is in the other two groups — the dependents and the broken families — that the increases in child abuse instances are attributed, Gallmeier said.

According to Gallmeier, "The dependents may know they are struggling, but they don't know why or how to get services or how to access the services that are available for them.

"They are an at-risk group. They are not going to read a pamphlet, go home and change their behavior."

An effective prevention effort for this group, Gallmeier explained, involves modeling in both a home visit and group-based setting.

The third group, Gallmeier said, are the ones incapable of forming a parental relationship with their children and are also incapable of raising a child. While this group was once thought to make up only 10 percent of the population, Gallmeier added, that number is now believed to be growing.

"These are the people for whom none of our existing programs will have an effect," Gallmeier said.

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But one of the things that still puzzles those involved in child abuse research and prevention programs, Gallmeier added, is that people from similar backgrounds, with what might be considered similar at-risk elements in their lives, don't necessarily become abusers.

That dilemma, she added, is now a major focus of study.

Gallmeier also told the committee, efforts at child abuse prevention should be presented as part of a broader public health package which addresses many other concerns, as well.

Additionally, Gallmeier said, prevention efforts should be community based, "giving people what they need, not necessarily just what you have."

## EARLY IDENTIFICATION BILL RAISES CONCERNS IN SENATE COMMITTEE ON HUMAN RESOURCES

■(GIT) A bill designed to help identify so-called at-risk families faced some criticism Tuesday during a meeting of the Senate's Human Resources Committee.

The committee substitute for **HB2393** is designed to help identify infants and their families who might benefit from existing social services and to encourage voluntary home visits, Senate author Angela Monson, D-Oklahoma City, told the committee.

Monson added that the screening process would hopefully be conducted at the time of birth of a child.

That raised the eyebrows of Sen. Howard Hendrick, R-Bethany, who expressed concern that implementing the plan might increase the cost of giving birth.

Monson replied that administering the proposed survey would take only a few minutes.

While her answer appeared to satisfy Hendrick, it did little to allay the fears of Sen. Carol Martin, R-Comanche, who expressed concern over the possible intrusiveness of the survey and its results.

Several members, however, argued that the measure was, as Hendrick said, "a great way to make parents aware of a problem that they might otherwise not know existed. I see a real value to doing this type of screening."

Hendrick went on to reiterate his earlier concern, adding that survey should be as simple as possible.

The measure received a do pass recommendation with the bill's title being stricken.

In other business before the committee, the following measures also received do pass recommendations:

**HB2231** (committee substitute), by Sen. Penny Williams, D-Tulsa, and Rep. Sean Voskuhl, D-Marshall, creating the Family Centered and Community Designed Services Act;

**HB2251** (committee substitute with its title stricken), by Sen. Keith Leftwich, D-Oklahoma City, and Rep. William Paulk, D-Oklahoma City, modifying language in the Oklahoma Emergency Medical Services Act related to ambulances and mediserve transport vehicles;

**HB2261** (committee substitute as amended), by Sen. Angela Monson, D-Oklahoma City, and Rep. Laura Boyd, D-Norman, requiring all individual and group health insurance policies providing coverage for women over the age of 45 to include coverage for routine bone density tests;

**HB2501** (committee substitute as amended), by Sen. Bernest Cain, D-Oklahoma City, and Rep. Calvin Anthony, D-Stillwater, modifying the powers and duties of the Department of Human Services, the Oklahoma Health Care Authority and the Oklahoma Medicaid Program Integrity Act;

**HB2648** (committee substitute), by Sen. Monson and Rep. Bill Mitchell, D-Lindsay, requiring the Oklahoma Department of Health to establish and enforce standards and requirements for the Home Health Care Act;

**HB2802** (enacting clause stricken), by Sen. Rick Littlefield, D-Grove, and Rep. Mark Seikel, D-Harrah, establishing the levels of care given to residents of nursing facilities, specialized facilities and residential care homes;

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**HB2806**, by Sen. Gene Stipe, D-McAlester, and Rep. Jim Glover, D-Elgin, modifying definitions related to the Health Care Freedom of Choice Act and requiring that certain policies be brought into compliance;

## Retirement Law

### HOUSE RETIREMENT LAWS COMMITTEE DISCUSSES TEACHERS, POLICE RETIREMENT

■(GIT) Issues of Teacher Retirement Systems, and Police Benefits were the topic of discussion Wednesday in the House Retirement Law Committee. **SB1228**, authored by Rep. Clay Pope, D-Loyal, allows that current contributing members who withdrew their accumulated contributions may amortize the cost of returning the withdrawn contributions or unremitted contributions over a period not to exceed sixty (60) months.

The bill received a do pass vote.

**SB903**, authored by Rep. Larry Roberts, D-Miami, clarifies language pertaining to the Oklahoma Public Employees Retirement System.

This shell bill was submitted as a committee substitute with the title restored, and amended on page 11, to add a new section 2.

**SB905**, also authored by Roberts, extends benefits of the Oklahoma Law Enforcement Retirement System to spouses married continuously for the 36 months immediately preceding the member's death.

The bill failed, and received a motion to report progress.

**SB1032**, authored by Rep. Joe Hutchinson, D-Jay, allows any eligible employer of a municipality that is a participating employer in the Oklahoma Public Employees Pension and Retirement System on July 1, 1996, to become a participating municipality of the Oklahoma Police Pension and Retirement System on Sept. 1, 1996, only if certified copy of a resolution approved by the governing body of the eligible employer or by any other body or officer authorized by law or recognized by the State Board to approve such a resolution and assure that it is filed with the State Board by August 15, 1996.

This measure, which will affect 20 departments across the state, was amended on page 20, lines 12, 23, and 29 to delete the words "pension and". Also, on page 3, lines 4, and 5 by adding clarifying language.

The bill received a do pass vote.

**SB941**, authored by Rep. Roberts, clarifies language pertaining to the Teachers' Retirement System of Oklahoma.

The measure received a do pass vote with the title restored.

**SB962**, authored by Rep. Mike Mass, D-Hartshorne, provides for the withdrawal of member-

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ship of any participating employer delinquent more than 90 days in paying the Oklahoma Public Employees Retirement System the contribution due.

The measure received a do pass vote.

## Revenue & Taxation

### HOUSE REVENUE AND TAXATION APPROVES 15 BILLS

■(GIT) Tuesday, members of the House Revenue and Taxation Committee met and swiftly approved 15 Senate bills. Members did not debate any of the measures.

**SB682**, authored by Rep. Odilia Dank, R-Oklahoma City, modifies property exemptions from ad valorem taxation. Dank said the bill was specifically geared towards non-profit groups such as churches. The bill received a do pass from committee members.

Rep. Bill Settle, D-Muskogee, had concern regarding a provision in **SB699**, authored by Rep. Howard Cotner, D-Altus. The provision was an amendment by Rep. Ray Vaughn, R-Edmond. It exempts non-profit groups such as churches from paying sales tax. The measure exempts taxation on sales to or by organizations that take court-adjudicated juveniles for purposes of rehabilitation. Vaughn explained that other non-profits are already doing this. The measure received a do pass from committee members.

Other bills receiving approval from members included:

**SB681**, authored by Rep. Debbie Blackburn, D-Oklahoma City, modifies the amount of annual household income required for additional homestead exemptions to \$15,000 from \$10,000. It also clarifies gender references. Settle tried to amend the bill to reduce the \$15,000 amount to \$12,000, however, the amendment failed.

**SB687**, authored by Rep. Don McCorkell, D-Tulsa, modifies the definition pertaining to aircraft excise taxes to include unscheduled service in the definition of "commercial airline." McCorkell said the bill was similar to one passed in the Senate.

**SB723**, authored by Rep. Clay Pope, D-Loyal, increases advanced accreditation standard for county assessors from 20 to 30 hours per year.

**SB725**, authored by Rep. Mark Seikel, D-Harrah, provides procedures for payment of ad valorem taxes by mortgage servicers. The bill was a clarification effort to comply with federal law.

**SB727**, authored by Vaughn, modifies language relating to the Uniform Tax Procedure Code to include judgments. It also requires that notice be sent to debtors and clarifies statutory reference. The bill was amended with clarification language and the title was restored.

**SB730**, authored by Rep. Wayne Cozort, R-Tulsa, modifies language and statutory references relating to assessment and valuation of property. It requires county assessors to assess specified improvements based on fair market value.

**SB859**, also by Pope, includes weather modification in a list of designated purposes for county sales tax. Cotner told Pope the language of the bill was too vague. Pope explained that he intended to strike the title of the measure, but that the bill was simply a precautionary vehicle in the event of a severe drought.

**SB921**, authored by Rep. Robert Weaver, D-Shawnee, repeals various sections pertaining to sales and income taxes. "The repealed three sections of law are sunset," he explained. The title was also restored.

**SB999**, authored by Rep. Randy Beutler, D-Elk City, authorizes cities, towns and counties to jointly create a hospital authority. It allows the authorities to levy a two percent tax on the gross proceeds or gross receipts derived from all sales or services in the cities, towns or counties that comprise the authority.

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**SB1111**, by Pope, modifies estate tax deduction for the estate of a decedent who dies before Jan. 1, 1997. The exemption shall be \$175,000. The amount increases by \$100,000 each year up to the year 2001. The bill was amended to clarify Oklahoma law, and the title was restored.

**SB1133**, also by McCorkell, exempts sales of tangible personal property or services to certain organizations from sales taxes.

**SB679**, authored by Rep. Jack Bonny, D-Burns Flat, gives a tax credit to individuals who convert their automobiles to electric.

The last bill, **SB1258**, authored by Rep. Loyd Benson, D-Frederick, provides for direct payment of sales tax to the Oklahoma Tax Commission. The bill received several amendments, mostly clarification. One amendment restored the bill's title. All were offered by Cotner.

Oklahoma's predominantly rural environment is particularly benefited by the development of various technologies.

"One fact that most people might not know is that Oklahoma has one of the largest telemedicine networks in the country. This fact alone helps attract businesses to rural communities, because they know that their employees can receive quality health care via telemedicine technology," Fallin said.

### REPRESENTATIVES PUSH ACCESS IDEA

■(GIT) To the unprepared it might have looked like Super Bowl Sunday on the rotunda of the state capitol Wednesday—Groups of men and women gathered around televisions, talking, laughing and sometimes shouting.

That, however, was not the case.

Wednesday was Telecommunications Day at the capitol, and the rotunda was filled with

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various participants displaying and demonstrating various technologies, including telemedicine, telecommunication, distance learning and the latest in Internet technology. It was also the day chosen by representatives Abe Deutschendorf, D-Lawton, and Fred Perry, R-Tulsa, to unveil a plan to increase the public's computer access to the capitol.

Speaking before the House's Science and Technology Committee, Deutschendorf said, "We have a vision of making Oklahoma number one in technology infrastructure and technology."

Deutschendorf's sentiments were echoed by Perry, who said the committee and the House should not only talk about such a program, but should do something about it.

Specifically, Deutschendorf and Perry said they believed the House should move toward adding short titles to the Capitol's Internet home page, and moving toward a day when complete bill texts, as well as the state's statutes, would be available on the Internet.

Perry and Deutschendorf were joined before the committee by Steve Shieven, superintendent of Frontier Public Schools, and Frontier High School senior Jeffery Fillmore.

Shieven said the rural school, with some 400 students, was now a "technology based institution," relying on the Internet for a variety of services and educational programs.

Fillmore, who once attended another school, said his move to Frontier had provided him with a view of classrooms with and without computers.

"I would rather be on this side," he said, referring to Frontier and its computer system.

Lawmakers, various staff members and others, meanwhile, were in the rotunda, examining the various programs and services on display. Some watched as the Wednesday session of the Senate was broadcast to the rotunda and classrooms across the state.

In other business before the Science and Technology Committee, **SB1277** received a do pass recommendation. The bill, by Sen. Keith Leftwich, D-Oklahoma City, and Rep. Joe Hutchison, D-Jay, authorizes the Department of Transportation to engage in negotiations regarding contracts for the use of certain rights of way.

The measure, Hutchison told the committee, would allow the installation of fiber optic cable through the state. That cable, he noted, could be used as part of a technological link from Canada to Mexico.

## **SOUTHWESTERN BELL HELPS FUND OKLAHOMA TELECOMMUNICATION CENTERS**

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Dr. Leo Presley, executive director of the Oklahoma Department of Commerce, received a \$1.4 million check Wednesday from Southwestern Bell-Oklahoma president, Dave Lopez, to help construct and maintain telecommunications centers across the state.

The money from SWB will be added to a \$1.5 million grant awarded last year to the Commerce Department funded by the Telecommunications and Information Infrastructure Assistance Program of the U.S. Department of Commerce. Partners in the project include the Oklahoma State Data Processing and Telecommunication Advisory Committee, OSU Institute for Telecommunications and the State Regents for Higher Education.

According to Beth Rodriguez, director of programs for the Commerce Department's research and planning group, the concept for the telecommunications centers originated from Oklahoma's 1993-98 Strategic Economic Development Plan. "Most centers will have equipment in several locations—for example, a public library, cooperative extension office, and a school—creating a 'virtual,' rather than physical, community center," commented Rodriguez.

### OKLAHOMA TOURISM AND RECREATION DEPARTMENT WILL REMAIN UNDER THE COMPETITIVE BID SYSTEM

■(GIT) Members of the House Tourism and Recreation Committee met Wednesday and approved two bills. **SB1028** received an amendment that altered the purpose of the bill. Rep. Bill Mitchell, D-Lindsay and author of the bill, said a provision in the bill allowing the agency to opt out of the competitive bid system would expedite construction projects, such as the Quartz Mountain construction project. The amendment to the bill, offered by Rep. M.C. Leist, D-Morris, deleted section 1 and 2. Those sections pertained to the competitive bid issue.

The measure also removed contracts entered into for specified purposes by the Department of Education from exclusion and mandated that the Oklahoma Film office remain in Tulsa. Rep. Ron Kirby, D-Lawton, tried to amend to bill to move the office back to Oklahoma City, however, the amendment failed.

Committee members also approved **SB929**, authored by Rep. Larry Adair, D-Stilwell. The measure authorizes a pilot entrance fee program at Dripping Springs State Park in Delaware County.

### REMINGTON PARK DESERVES BLAME FOR DEATH OF SIMULCASTING BILL, STANLEY SAYS

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Remington Park race track deserves a large share of the blame for withdrawal of a bill that would have allowed state horse racing tracks to simulcast out-of-state races, according to Rep. Fred Stanley, D-Madill.

"Remington Park made it absolutely clear to me and just about everyone else that they would withdraw their support from the bill if my amendment was attached," said Stanley. "Remington officials preferred to see the bill withdrawn instead of passed with an amendment that would have prevented them from reducing the number of quarter horse races."

Most Oklahoma horsemen are in the quarter horse business. Further reductions in quarter horse races at Remington Park, the state's largest track, would put a huge dent in the state's horse industry, Stanley said.

The amendment Stanley was proposing would also have allowed all three Oklahoma horse tracks—Remington Park in Oklahoma City, Fair Meadows in Tulsa, and Blue Ribbon Downs in Sallisaw—to have their races televised to off-track wagering facilities.

Presently, Remington Park will not allow any other track access to monitors in off-track wagering facilities. That violates the spirit of the original agreement among the three state tracks for off-track betting, the lawmaker related.

"There is a lot more at stake here than simply making Remington Park happy," he said. "We have to boost the entire horse industry, from Remington Park all the way down to the regular Oklahomans who depend on the horse industry for their livelihoods."

"If the state's entire horse industry is to continue growing, then passage of this legislation—with the Horseman's Association amendment attached—is vital."

## SENATE TOURISM PASSES THREE MEASURES

■(GIT) The Senate Tourism and Recreation Committee passed a measure Thursday, creating the Oklahoma Recreation and Development Act. Though it contains no figures, **HB2114**, by Sen. Kevin Easley, D-Broken Arrow, is an initiative to fund the state's parks in the absence of federal funding.

The measure received a do pass motion, passing with a vote of 7 to 0.

**HB2084**, by Committee Chairman Dave Herbert, D-Midwest City, clarifies language relating to the selling of advertising in *Oklahoma Today* magazine. It states negotiations for such advertising will not fall under the Public Competitive Bidding Act of 1974 or the Administrative Procedures Act. The measure, with a restored title, passed with a vote of 7 to 0.

**HCR1070**, by Sen. Ben Robinson, D-Muskogee, declares the City of Muskogee as the seat of the Oklahoma Music Hall of Fame and recognizing it as a focal point for tourism in eastern Oklahoma.

One senator found fault with the measure, saying it was contradictory to work being done with the Oklahoma Jazz Hall of Fame in Tulsa. Sen. Maxine Horner, D-Tulsa, amended the measure, limiting the Muskogee facility's scope to country music only.

In what some staff members are calling a first for a resolution, the measure's title was stricken. It passed with a vote 7 to 1.

## Transportation

### SENATE TRANSPORTATION PASSES OVERSIZED SHIPPING BILL

■(GIT) Members of the Senate Transportation Committee passed a measure Tuesday prohibiting oversized vehicles to move on any state highway at night unless proper lighting is attached.

**HB2414**, by Sen. Robert Kerr, D-Altus, is an attempt to correct an existing conflict in state law. According to Scott Bulling, Oklahoma Farm Bureau, an earlier section of Chapter 14 of the Oklahoma Statutes states that nothing within that chapter shall apply to farm equipment.

The bill was amended, deleting section one. The section contained language relating to protocol when approaching an intersection with a county section line road. It was deemed unclear by committee members.

Another amendment states that the fee for qualifying equipment registered in other states and utilized for emergency or temporary service shall be calculated for no longer than 30 days.

The measure passed with a vote of 15 to 0.

**HB1860**, by Sen. Rick Littlefield, D-Grove, doubles the fine for speeding in a construction zone. It passed with a vote of 11 to 0.

**HB1215**, by Rep. Joe Hutchison, D-Jay, designates the stretch of roadway from the intersection of State Highways 20 and 82 (Spavinaw "Y") south to Spavinaw Creek as the Mickey Mantle Memorial Highway. The measure passed with a vote of 10 to 0.

### SPEED LIMITS, PASSENGER RAIL SERVICE AND DEREGULATION LEGISLATION RECEIVE APPROVAL

■(GIT) Thursday, members of the House Transportation Committee approved seven measures involving issues relating to speed limits, passenger rail service and the abolishment of the Transportation division of the Corporation Commission, as well as the Motor Vehicle Enforcement

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Division of the Oklahoma Tax Commission.

The committee substitute for **SB685**, authored by Chairman of the Committee, Larry Adair, D-Stilwell, sets maximum speed and minimum speed limits for interstate and four-lane divided highways. Adair offered an amendment to delete turnpikes out of a section of the bill. The amendment was adopted.

Adair offered a second amendment. "Rep. Dusty Rhodes, D-Chicotah, told me that in some parts of the state the highway system routes through state parks, and my amendment would lower the speed limit of those sections of road to 45 m.p.h." The amendment was adopted.

Rep. Dale Wells, D-Cushing, offered an amendment to raise the speed limits of 2-lane roads from 60 to 65 m.p.h. The amendment was adopted. Members voted 23 to 1 to do pass to the measure out of committee.

Two measures were approved pertaining to passenger rail service. **SB693**, authored by Rep. Randall Erwin, D-Nashoba, adds passenger rail service within the state to allowable deposits of revenue generated from motor fuels excise tax. Members voted 24 to 0 to do pass the bill out of committee.

**SB1192**, also by Adair, creates the Oklahoma Tourism and Passenger Rail Act. The bill received two amendments. Adair offered an amendment to include Tulsa and Oklahoma City for rail passenger service. The amendment was adopted. The second amendment by Rep. James Dunlap, R-Bartlesville, offered to limit the number of projects. The amendment was adopted. The bill received a do pass vote of 21 to 2.

**SB1059** received considerable debate. The measure, by Adair, abolishes the Transportation Division of the Corporation Commission and the Motor Vehicle Enforcement Division of the Oklahoma Tax Commission. Adair explained that the consolidation of these divisions would create a one-stop shop process for truckers and others. Adair offered an amendment to the bill that clarified language relating to the transfer of employees.

Rep. Leonard Sullivan, R-Oklahoma City, was in favor of the bill. "This bill will streamline and modernize the system." Adair agreed. "Other states are doing this to eliminate bureaucracy," he said. "I plan to strike the title and enacting clause on the floor." The bill received a do pass vote of 21 to 3.

Other measures approved by members included:

**SB989**, authored by Rep. Ray Vaughn, R-Edmond, authorizes the Transportation Commission to create a State Infrastructure Bank for the purpose of pooling available federal, state and private funds to be dedicated for transportation projects. The bill was amended three times by members. The first amendment by Rep. Don Weese, R-Broken Arrow, ensured that there was no possibility the Turnpike Authority could build free roads in larger metropolitan communities, in an effort to prevent the Department of Transportation and the Turnpike Authority from contracting with each other. The second, offered by Rep. Dan Ramsey, R-Chickasha, restricted projects to highways. The last amendment, offered by Dunlap, would restrict bond money from being added to the fund.

**SB988**, authored by Rep. James Dunegan, D-Calera, requires to the Department of Transportation to issue permits for multi-state oversize and overweight vehicles. It designates specific routes for vehicles operating under such permits. It was amended by the author to allow the Department to adopt rules. The bill received a do pass vote of 24 to 0.

One resolution was approved. **SJR35**, authored by Rep. Sean Voskuhl, D-Marshall, designates a portion of Oklahoma State Highway 74 as "The John N. 'Happy' Camp Memorial Highway." The resolution received a do pass vote of 24 to 0.

■(GIT) The House Veterans and Military Affairs members met Monday to hear Senate legislation before the committee.

**SB720**, (committee substitute) authored by Rep. Dale Wells, D-Cushing, creates the Southern Regional Emergency Management Assistance Compact.

The measure received a do pass vote.

**SB722**, authored by Rep. M.C. Leist, D-Morris, adds the positions of therapeutic recreational specialist, physical therapy assistant, certified occupational therapy assistant and nurse practitioner to a list of unclassified service positions at the Department of Veterans Affairs.

The bill received a report progress motion.

**SB0749**, (committee substitute) authored by Rep. Al Sadler, D-Ardmore, requires the Department of Veterans Affairs to competitively bid any contract for the purpose of purchasing Part B Medicare products.

The bill received a do pass vote.

**HCR1079**, authored by Speaker of the House, Rep. Glen Johnson, D-Okemah, Rep. Darryl Roberts, D-Miami, and Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore, memorializes Congress to Support the State Veterans Home Program.

The resolution received a do pass motion.

**SJR40**, authored by Rep. Ron Kirby, D-Lawton, directs the Executive Director of the Oklahoma Department of Veterans Affairs to study the feasibility of locating a state veterans center in Comanche County.

The resolution received a report progress motion.

## Wildlife

### SENATE WILDLIFE PASSES QUAIL BILL

■(GIT) Monday, members of the Senate Wildlife Committee passed **HB2170**, by Sen. Frank Shurden, D-Henryetta. The popular "quail bill" would allow the Oklahoma Wildlife Commission to set the dates for quail hunting in the state, taking the power away from the Legislature.

With a stricken title, the measure passed with a vote of 7 to 0.

**HB2177**, by Shurden, allows for written notification to the Department of Wildlife Conservation when a person wishes to hold an animal pelt for longer than ten days. It also states that any antlers or horns that are sold or traded shall be removed so as to not leave any portion of the skull attached. It also puts a size limitation of twelve inches on horn cuttings.

The measure was amended by merging it with **HB2482** which standardizes fur dealer's fees to \$68 for both residents and nonresidents.

**HB2177**, with its new language, passed with a vote of 6 to 0, but not before Shurden was able to restore its title.

**HB2239**, by Sen. Jack Bell, D-Idabel, modifies language relating to the issuance of turtle buying and harvesting licenses. The measure passed with a vote of 6 to 0.

**HB2292**, by Shurden, directs Wildlife Conservation to keep confidential personal information provided with permit and license applications. The measure was passed out of committee with a vote of 6 to 0.

**HB2294**, by Shurden, authorizes the Wildlife Conservation Commission to sell advertising

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in any publication, media production or other informational material it produces. With a stricken title, the measure passed with a vote of 5 to 1.

**HB2349**, by Shurden, authorizes the Wildlife Conservation Commission to establish a special use permit required by all persons who hunt or fish on private land leased by the Department. It also establishes a maximum fee of \$25 for the license. The measure passed with a vote of 6 to 0.

**HB2351**, by Shurden, states that general unrestricted hunting licenses shall not be issued to those hunters whose home states do not allow Oklahomans to do the same. The measure passed with a vote of 6 to 0.

**HB2637**, by Rep. Bill Smith, D-Ringling, extends and renames former programs, outlines hunting license fees, and donation designation requirements. The measure passed with a vote of 6 to 0.

**HB2293**, by Shurden, provides authority for Wildlife Conservation Commission to enter into contracts and agreements for food, lodging, and other authorized expenses necessary to host, conduct, sponsor or participate in conferences, meetings or training sessions. The measure passed with a vote of 6 to 0.

## DROUGHT HAS NOT EFFECTED WILDLIFE POPULATIONS AS OF YET

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Wildlife biologists with the Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation do not believe the current drought has harmed wildlife population, but they caution that if drought conditions persist through spring, wildlife could suffer.

"Late winter and early-spring are the most critical periods for wildlife," said Mike Shaw, wildlife research supervisor for the Wildlife Department.

Shaw said fresh, green growth and insect availability are vital to bird growth and survival during spring. Since birds rely on these two items for almost all of their nutritional requirements during the early spring months, reduced rainfall could mean reduced growth of green plant material and decreased numbers of insects.

"Mammals also depend on fresh, spring growth for much of their nutritional requirements so persistent drought could result in decreased health of adults and reduced birth weights for offspring born in late-spring and early-summer. Low birth weights put the young at risk because they can't escape predators as easily," said Shaw.

Wildlife biologists can't predict what Oklahoma's springtime weather holds in store, but they can predict what might happen to wildlife if the rains don't return.

## INTENT OF RESOLUTION SUPPRESSED BY AMENDMENT

■(GIT) A Senate concurrent resolution heard by members of the House Wildlife Committee Thursday, received an amendment that changed the measure's intent. **SCR46**, authored by Rep. Wayne Pettigrew, R-Edmond, and Rep. Jack Bonny, D-Burns Flat, requests the Department of Wildlife Conservation to reconsider the decision to cease the production of bobwhite quail at the Darlington Game Farm.

However, Rep. Randall Erwin, D-Nashoba, offered an amendment to maintain the facility, only if it receives appropriate funding from the state. The amendment was adopted and the resolution received a do pass by members.

Bills that received a do pass by members included:

**SB914**, authored by Rep. Bill Smith, D-Ringling, prohibits the head-lighting of feral animals. The measure was amended to restore the title.

**SB928**, authored by Rep. Joe Hutchison, D-Jay, modifies the mussel harvest boundary on Grand Lake of the Cherokees to exclude that portion of the lake from twin bridges north to the Kansas state line.

One bill was motioned for report progress. **SB762**, authored by Rep. Gary Taylor, D-Dewey, modified language and statutory references relating to hunting and fishing licenses. It also modified the percentage of disability required for resident veterans to be exempt from licensing requirements to fifty percent from sixty percent.

### EDUCATION CRACKDOWN ON HIGH-DEFAULT SCHOOLS SHOWS RESULTS; TRADE SCHOOL RATES DROP SHARPLY

(WASHINGTON) The U.S. Education Department's ongoing campaign to crack down on secondary schools with high student loan default rates has produced a sharp drop in default rates at trade schools, U.S. Secretary of Education Richard W. Riley says Wednesday.

Trade school default rates have fallen from 36.5 percent in fiscal year 1992 to 23.9 in FY 93, a drop of 35 percent.

Riley said that the decline in default rates is a result of a number of factors, including stronger oversight of "high-risk" schools, an increase in the number of schools providing training, eligibility and certification of schools and programs, and the department's default reduction initiative.

Riley also credited the department's use of technology with helping to lower the default rate, citing the department's ability to verify loan disbursements and identify applicants who provide false information. Payments defaulting on a student loan or received an overpayment. Last year, the National Student Loan Data System showed the average of \$250 million in loans to some 140,000 students. Riley said new initiatives for guaranty agencies will also help students avoid default and thereby reduce default rates.

### USDA HOLDS MEETING ON BOVINE SPONGIFORM ENCEPHALOPATHY

■(WASHINGTON) The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service facilitated a meeting held today to review current U.S. policies and regulations dealing with BSE (bovine spongiform encephalopathy), also known as the "mad cow" disease.

BSE does not exist in the United States. British cattle and processed beef have been prohibited from being imported into the U.S. since 1989.

USDA's intent in calling together about 70 international, federal and state animal health representatives, public health officials, industry representatives, and members of the scientific community is to review current policies to ensure that the United States maintains a coordinated, science-based, and effective approach that will keep the U.S. free of BSE.

### EDUCATION CRACKDOWN ON HIGH-DEFAULT SCHOOLS SHOWS RESULTS; TRADE SCHOOL RATES DROP SHARPLY

■(WASHINGTON) The U.S. Education Department's ongoing campaign to crack down on postsecondary schools with high student loan default rates has produced a sharp drop in historically high defaults at for-profit trade schools, U.S. Secretary of Education Richard W. Riley report Wednesday.

Proprietary schools saw rates decline from 30.2 percent in fiscal year 1992 to 23.9 in FY '93, a drop of 20.8 percent.

Riley attributed the decline to a number of factors, including stronger oversight of "high-risk" schools, an improved process for granting eligibility and certification of schools and programs, and the department's default reduction initiatives.

Riley also credited modern technology with helping to lower the default rate, citing the department's ability to verify immigration status and identify applicants who provide false information, previously defaulted on a student loan or received an overpayment. Last year, the National Student Loan Data System blocked the issuance of \$230 million in loans to some 140,000 ineligible applicants. Riley said new incentives for guaranty agencies will also help students avoid default and should reduce defaults further.

"These results show our increased commitment to accountability is paying off," Riley said. "We'll keep working to cut defaults further and protect taxpayers' investment in higher education."

### CONTINUING THE PRESIDENT'S COMMITTEE ON MENTAL RETARDATION AND BROADENING ITS MEMBERSHIP AND RESPONSIBILITIES

■(WASHINGTON) The President's Committee on Mental Retardation established by Executive Order No. 11280 on May 11, 1966, as superseded by Executive Order No. 11776 on March 28, 1974, has organized national planning, stimulated development of plans, policies and programs, and advanced the concept of community participation in the field of mental retardation.

National goals have been established to:

1. promote full participation of people with mental retardation in their communities;
2. provide all necessary supports to people with mental retardation and their families for such participation;
3. reduce the occurrence and severity of mental retardation by one-half by the year 2010;
4. assure the full citizenship rights of all people with mental retardation, including those rights secured by such landmark statutes as the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, Public Law 101-336 (42 U.S.C. 12101 et seq.);
5. recognize the right of all people with mental retardation to self-determination and autonomy, to be treated in a nondiscriminatory manner, and to exercise meaningful choice, with whatever supports are necessary to effectuate these rights;
6. recognize the right of all people with mental retardation to enjoy a quality of life that promotes independence, self-determination, and participation as productive members of society; and
7. promote the widest possible dissemination of information on models, programs, and services in the field of mental retardation.

The achievement of these goals will require the most effective possible use of public and private resources.

### HHS ISSUES FINAL RULE TO REQUIRE MEDICARE AND MEDICAID MANAGED CARE ORGANIZATIONS TO DISCLOSE PHYSICIAN INCENTIVE PLANS

■(WASHINGTON) The Department of Health and Human Services Tuesday announced a regulation designed to protect beneficiaries enrolled in Medicare and Medicaid Managed care plans by placing certain limitations on physician incentive arrangements that could influence physicians' care decisions.

Many managed care organizations use financial incentives to deter inappropriate and unnecessary care, including unnecessary referrals of plan members to specialists or for expensive procedures.

The final rule, to be published in Wednesday's Federal Register, requires plans to disclose physician incentive plans to HHS' Health Care Financing Administration or to the state Medicaid agency, and to provide a summary of the plan to enrollees, if requested.

For example, some plans pay their physicians a fixed fee per patient per month. This arrangement, known as capitation payment, makes the primary care physician liable for any costs the patient incurs for specialty care made at the referral of the primary care physician.

In addition, the regulation outlines the requirements for managed care plans with physician incentive plans that put physicians at substantial financial risk for referral services. Such man-

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aged care plans will be required to put limits on financial losses for their physicians, as well as to conduct annual beneficiary surveys.

"The final rule addresses some of the concerns of Congress and the public about the pressures and incentives HMOs create for physicians' care decisions," said HCFA Administrator Bruce C. Vladeck.

The regulation applies to physicians providing medical care through health maintenance organizations, competitive medical plans and health insuring organizations. Under the regulation, HCFA may impose intermediate sanctions and HHS' Office of the Inspector General may impose civil monetary penalties upon Medicare or Medicaid managed care contractors who fail to comply.

## **NICKLES CALLS FOR TAX EQUITY AMENDMENT TO HEALTH CARE BILL**

■(WASHINGTON) Oklahoma Senator Don Nickles today announced a plan to make the health care tax deduction more fair for all Americans.

"Right now, the tax code only allows a partial health insurance deduction for the self-employed, but gives corporations a 100 percent write-off," Nickles said. "That isn't fair."

"My amendment is the first step toward equalizing the tax code by raising the deduction rate to 50 percent for the self-employed," Nickles said. "This is a positive step toward a more fair tax code for all Americans."

## **HCFA BEGINS NEW FLEXIBLE SURVEY PROCESS FOR SOME CLINICAL LABS**

■(WASHINGTON) The Health Care Financing Administration has begun using a new flexible survey process which is in effect for some clinical laboratories with excellent performance records.

The self-evaluation procedure, called the Alternate Quality Assessment Survey, is designed to be used by certain laboratories for recertification purposes under the Clinical Laboratory Improvement Amendments of 1988 (CLIA) in lieu of an on-site survey. HCFA has begun recertifying laboratories with exceptional past performance by allowing them to complete a self-survey questionnaire.

To supplement the new survey process, no laboratory will go longer than four years without an on-site survey. HCFA also will perform, every two years, random on-site surveys of a 5 percent sample of laboratories that are using the new survey process to verify its effectiveness.

CLIA sets uniform quality standards for clinical laboratories. The laboratories that conduct moderately or highly complex tests must be surveyed and recertified by HCFA every two years and must participate in proficiency testing. Until now, all surveys have been conducted on-site.

Currently, HCFA is responsible for implementing federal quality assurance standards for 152,000 laboratories. Of these laboratories, 59 percent are exempt from surveys because they do only simple tests. The remaining 41 percent are subject to routine surveys under CLIA.

Under the new survey process, a laboratory's completed self-assessment form and supplemental documentation are reviewed. If no problems are identified, the laboratory will be recertified for two years, the duration of the CLIA certification cycle.

## PUBLIC SAFETY IS BIG CONCERN FOR AMERICANS

■(WASHINGTON) "Regardless of any statistics on crime rate, too many Americans fear for the safety of themselves, their homes and their families. It's an accumulation of multiple factors, including lack of regard for human life, lack of respect for others and their property, lenient court rulings, early prison releases, terrorism, and even hundreds of thousands of illegal aliens who end up in U.S. prisons (one fourth of the inmates in those prisons). Congress is confronting these concerns with a multipronged attack on crime. The anti-terrorism legislation (now in a House Senate conference) cracks down on both domestic and international terrorism, including first ever authority for victims of terrorism to sue (in American courts) nations which harbor and aid terrorists, and the ability to attach the assets those nations have in the U.S. The bill also limits the currently unlimited appeals for convicted murderers, so they no longer can avoid the death penalty for years and years. The bill also streamlines the deportation process of aliens who commit crimes in the U.S., and toughens the entrance visa standards, to stop dangerous foreigners from ever entering America. Also, those who commit acts of burning or bombing federal property will face stiffer penalties.

A separate bill on immigration reform has passed the House. It redoubles efforts by authorizing 5,000 additional border agents through the year 2000. Overlooked by some are the tougher sentencing provisions included with the House passed measure to repeal President Clinton's 1994 ban on so called assault weapons. Rather than using a ban that is high on pretense and short on results, the measure instead cracks down on ALL crimes committed with a firearm. It establishes mandatory minimum prison sentences for those convicted.

We need laws (and judges) to be tough on crime and terrorism, and prisons that keep the dangerous locked away, to isolate them from menacing our homes and families. Congress is making those efforts. And, because most law enforcement is at the state and local level, our states must continue to make them, too.

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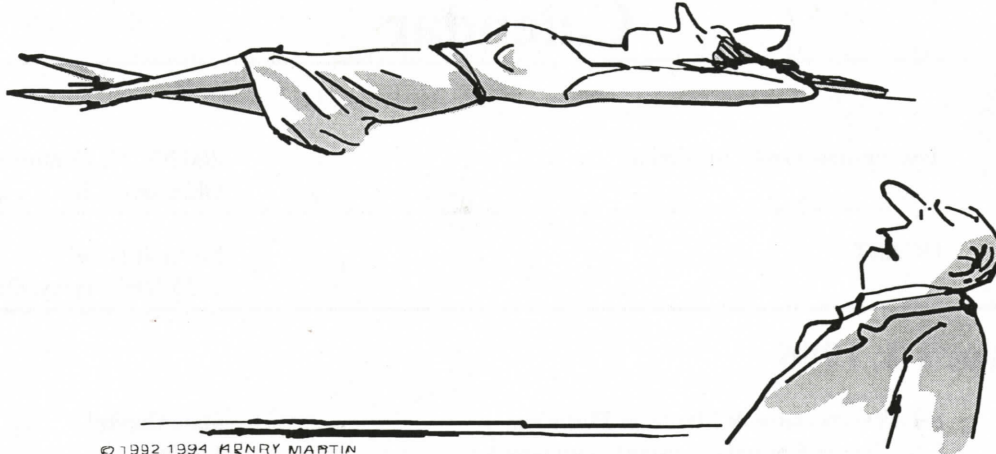
