REPRESENTATIVES PUSH ACCESS IDEA

■(GIT) To the unprepared it might have looked like Super Bowl Sunday on the rotunda of the state capitol Wednesday—Groups of men and women gathered around televisions, talking, laughing and sometimes shouting.

That, however, was not the case.

Wednesday was Telecommunications Day at the capitol, and the rotunda was filled with various participants displaying and demonstrating various technologies, including telemedicine, telecommunication, distance learning and the latest in Internet technology. It was also the day chosen by representatives Abe Deuschendorf, D-Lawton, and Fred Perry, R-Tulsa, to unveil a plan to increase the public's computer access to the capitol.

Speaking before the House's Science and Technology Committee, Deuschendorf said, "We have a vision of making Oklahoma number one in technology infrastructure and technology."

Deuschendorf's sentiments were echoed by Perry, who said the committee and the House should not only talk about such a program, but should do something about it.

As a starting point, the Lawton Democrat said the House should look at itself and consider what it could do to improve public access to the House and its actions via computer modem.

Specifically, Deuschendorf and Perry said they believed the House should move toward adding short titles to the Capitol's Internet home page, and moving toward a day when complete bill texts, as well as the state's statutes, would be available on the Internet.

"That would be an incredible statement for the state of Oklahoma," he said. "We need to seize the moment."

Perry and Deuschendorf were joined before the committee by Steve Shieven, superintendent of Frontier Public Schools, and Frontier High School senior Jeffery Fillmore.

Shieven said the rural school, with some 400 students, was now a "technology based institution," relying on the Internet for a variety of services and educational programs.

Fillmore said the school's computer system, which includes computers with Internet access in every classroom, "made education more fun." He also encouraged other school systems to begin using similar technology.

Fillmore, who once attended another school, said his move to Frontier had provided him with a view of classrooms with and without computers.

"I would rather be on this side," he said, referring to Frontier and its computer system.

Lawmakers, various staff members and others, meanwhile, were in the rotunda, examining the various programs and services on display. Some watched as the Wednesday session of the Senate was broadcast to the rotunda and classrooms across the state. Others sampled teleconferences and various computer access programs.

In other business before the Science and Technology Committee, **SB1277** received a do pass recommendation. The bill, by Sen. Keith Leftwich, D-Oklahoma City, and Rep. Joe Hutchison, D-Jay, authorizes the Department of Transportation to engage in negotiations regarding contracts for the use of certain rights of way.

The measure, Hutchison told the committee, would allow the installation of fiber optic cable through the state. That cable, he noted, could be used as part of a technological link from Canada to Mexico.

BILL CHANGING ELECTORAL PROCESS PASSES SENATE COMMITTEE

■(GIT) Members of the Senate Committee on Government Operations and Agency Oversight passed a measure designed to change the way Oklahoma distributes its electoral votes. **HB2940**, by Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore, would require each of the state's eight presidential electoral votes to be won individually, instead of the current "winner takes all" method.

"I think it's going to create a partisan type vote within each district," said Sen. Mark Snyder, R-Edmond, who voted against the measure. "The president has to represent all of the people. The majority of the states elect their governor that way. The states should elect the president the same way."

Though she voted for the bill, Sen. Angela Monson, D-Oklahoma City, said it caused her concern. "It makes me nervous," she said, "to the extent that any time you are faced with substantial legislation you should be concerned."

"Democracy was built on the concept of one person one vote," she said. "Maybe this is the best way that Oklahoma's voting population would be equally represented."

Monson said she expects problems with the bill on the Senate floor, the bill's next stop. Unable to predict what kind of partisan flack it would draw, she expects the final vote will ultimately "boil down to a matter of personal preference."

Though she agreed the measure would probably see resistance on the floor, Committee Chairman Sen. Maxine Horner, D-Tulsa, said the bill would promote equity at the polls. "From the surface it presents fairness of representation," she said. "Republican or Democrat it will allow for that fairness."

Election Board Secretary Lance Ward said his main concern with the measure is how it will effect the state's election process. The measure would not affect the process, he said. "It really is a political decision," he said.

Though he was unable to speculate on possible partisan resistance, Ward said Oklahoma has not given any of its electoral votes to a Democratic presidential candidate since 1964, with the election of President Johnson.

"This issue is appropriately partisan," he said. "There is a time and a place for partisanship and politics and this is one of them."

Ward's statement rang true. With the support of committee Democrats and the opposition of Republicans, the measure was passed with a vote of 3 to 2. A vote is expected before the full Senate sometime next week.

Also addressed by the committee was **HB 2381**, by Sen. Dave Herbert, D-Midwest City, which modifies and limits the distribution of the Oklahoma Register. The bill was passed with a vote of 5 to 0.

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BILL TO APPROPRIATE \$500,000 TO STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION FAILS

SB 707 Report Progress

■(GIT) **SB707**, would have appropriated over \$500,000 to the State Board of Education for a school district in Tulsa County, but the measure failed Wednesday in a House Appropriation and Budget Subcommittee on Education.

The bill's author, Rep. Don Weese, R-Broken Arrow, explained that a glass company located in Tulsa was overcharged. According to Weese, the Legislature passed a bill last session to direct the Tulsa County Treasurer to refund the money to the glass company over a five-year period. Weese said he feared the refund would, in turn, hurt the local district. "This bill (SB707), only seeks to keep the school district whole," he said. The bill states that the appropriation is an effort to keep the "preservation of the public peace, health and safety."

"There is no economic provision, it was simply an assessment error on the glass company's part...the taxes were paid in error," Weese explained. "Schools get this excess money, and they were not aware that this was an error."

Chairman of the committee, Rep. Jack Begley, D-Goodwell, told Weese he would amend the bill on the floor if it was approved by members. "I would be amiss if we did this and not take care of all the other tax protests around the state," Begley explained that the protests totaled over \$5 million statewide. Weese explained that Tulsa received the least aid (state) of any school district in the state. However, the bill with a vote of 4 to 4 failed, and received a motion for report progress by members.

■(GIT) Issues of Teacher Retirement Systems, and Police Benefits were the topic of discussion Wednesday in the House Retirement Law Committee. **SB1228**, authored by Rep. Clay Pope, D-Loyal, allows that current contributing members who withdrew their accumulated contributions may amortize the cost of returning the withdrawn contributions or unremitted contributions over a period not to exceed sixty (60) months.

Pope said this measure would allow those teachers who may have left the profession to return without any loss of benefits.

The bill received a do pass vote.

SB903, authored by Rep. Larry Roberts, D-Miami, clarifies language pertaining to the Oklahoma Public Employees Retirement System.

This shell bill was submitted as a committee substitute with the title restored, and amended on page 11, to add a new section 2.

SB905, also authored by Roberts, extends benefits of the Oklahoma Law Enforcement Retirement System to spouses married continuously for the 36 months immediately preceding the member's death.

The bill failed, and received a motion to report progress.

SB1032, authored by Rep. Joe Hutchinson, D-Jay, allows any eligible employer of a municipality that is a participating employer in the Oklahoma Public Employees Pension and Retirement System on July 1, 1996, to become a participating municipality of the Oklahoma Police Pension and Retirement System on Sept. 1, 1996, only if certified copy of a resolution approved by the governing body of the eligible employer or by any other body or officer authorized by law

or recognized by the State Board to approve such a resolution and assure that it is filed with the State Board by August 15, 1996.

This measure, which will affect 20 departments across the state, was amended on page 20, lines 12, 23, and 29 to delete the words "pension and". Also, on page 3, lines 4, and 5 by adding clarifying language.

The bill received a do pass vote.

SB941, authored by Rep. Roberts, clarifies language pertaining to the Teachers' Retirement System of Oklahoma.

The measure received a do pass vote with the title restored.

SB962, authored by Rep. Mike Mass, D-Hartshorne, provides for the withdrawal of membership of any participating employer delinquent more than 90 days in paying the Oklahoma Public Employees Retirement System the contribution due.

In presenting the bill, Chairman Rep. Roberts said the intent of the bill is to allow for a Lattimore County hospital to resign from OPERS.

The measure received a do pass vote.

BILL ALLOWING AGENCY TO PURCHASE EQUIPMENT WITHOUT COMPETITIVE BID REQUIREMENTS RECEIVES APPROVAL

■(GIT) Wednesday, members of the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on Human Services approved a bill to allow the Department of Rehabilitation Services to purchase equipment and other related items without competitive bid requirements. In **HB1555**, the agency would no longer be required to purchase these items through the Department of Central Services. Although, the agency would be required to promulgate purchasing procedures with Central Services approval.

Senate author of the bill, Herb Rozell, D-Tahlequah, explained why the agency needed the bill. He said disabled individuals were losing job opportunities due to a backlog at Central Services. They need special assistive technology equipment in order to perform required job-related duties.

Linda Parker, director for the agency, explained the adaptive technology equipment frequently arrived too late, often taking up to three months. "Jobs were passing people up, employers needed to fill those positions," she said. "This bill will help speed up the process."

Members voted to do pass the measure out of committee.

HB3021, authored by Sen. Ben Brown, D-Oklahoma City, was also approved by members. It requires individual and group insurance policies to provide coverage for equipment, services and supplies for the treatment of diabetes. "Hopefully we can restore the title and get this bill to the full Appropriations Committee meeting today," Brown said. Senate staff explained that there were minor changes to the bill to help strengthen the language. The most significant changed any policies issued or renewed after Nov. 1, 1996, not policies withstanding, as previously stated in the bill.

The subcommittee did not hear the budget presentation from the Office of Juvenile Affairs.

SB701 by Sen. Helen Cole, R-Oklahoma City, and Rep. Frank Davis, R-Guthrie, prohibiting the sale, delivery or furnishing of low-point beer to an intoxicated person; and

SB702 (as amended) by Sen. Cole and Rep. Davis, providing for penalties for any person selling low-point beer between the hours of 2 a.m. and 6 a.m.

SB867, creating the Oklahoma Barbers Regulation Act, received report progress approval.

DEQ SHOULD ADOPT RULES, LAWMAKERS AGREE

■(GIT) Wednesday, members of the House Administrative Rule Review Committee and the Attorney General's Office met to discuss the Administrative Procedures Act as well as agency compliance with the act. Members also approved two bills. A third resolution on the committee's agenda was not heard.

Members quickly moved through the bills. **HJR1098**, authored by Rep. Larry Adair, D-Stilwell, relates to an emergency rule of the Wildlife Commission. It disapproves rule and directs distribution. The measure received a do pass from members. **SB703**, authored by Rep. Loyd Benson, D-Frederick, was also approved. The measure modifies the procedure for interpreting statutes and agency rules under the Administrative Procedures Act. The bill was amended to require that agencies document interpretations of rules. **HJR1097**, authored by Rep. Dan Webb, R-Oklahoma City, was not heard.

The Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) has enacted a policy on self-reporting in taking corrective action. Trish Koonce, counsel for the Committee, explained that the agency does not have statutory rules. As a result, she said any action they take could be meaningless if challenged.

Koonce explained that the Corporation Commission encouraged the agency to make the action a policy rather than a rule. "I would like to know what other policies are not being executed by rule," Chairman of the Committee, Rep. Charles Gray, D-Oklahoma City said.

Koonce said the only two options if the agency does not comply, would be to handle the issue through the Legislature or for the Attorney General to issue an opinion. "Anytime there is an interpretation of law, it should be determined by the state," said Victor Bird, chief deputy for the Attorney General's Office.

Gray urged Rep. Larry Rice, D-Pryor, to talk with the legal counsel for DEQ to resolve the issue. "If you do not, we might have to get them over here and beat them over the head with it," Gray said. Rice said to avoid a lawsuit, he would.

OKLAHOMA TOURISM AND RECREATION DEPARTMENT WILL REMAIN UNDER THE COMPETITIVE BID SYSTEM

■(GIT) Members of the House Tourism and Recreation Committee met today and approved two bills. **SB1028** received an amendment that altered the purpose of the bill. Rep. Bill Mitchell, D-Lindsay and author of the bill, said a provision in the bill allowing the agency to opt out of the competitive bid system would expedite construction projects, such as the Quartz Mountain construction project. The amendment to the bill, offered by Rep. M.C. Leist, D-Morris, deleted section 1 and 2. Those sections pertained to the competitive bid issue.

The measure also removed contracts entered into for specified purposes by the Department of Education from exclusion and mandated that the Oklahoma Film office remain in Tulsa. Rep. Ron Kirby, D-Lawton, tried to amend to bill to move the office back to Oklahoma City, however, the amendment failed.

Committee members also approved **SB929**, authored by Rep. Larry Adair, D-Stilwell. The measure authorizes a pilot entrance fee program at Dripping Springs State Park in Delaware County.

■(GIT) Members of the full Senate Appropriations Committee passed 47 of its assigned measures Wednesday. The bills are the last that will be passed out of the committee before the Legislature adjourns in May.

HB1555, by Sen. Herb Rozell, D-Tahlequah, relates to state government. The measure authorizes the purchase of nonmedical, assistive technology related items by the State Department of Rehabilitative Services without competitive bid requirements. The measure's effective date was updated and the measure was given a do pass motion.

HB2055, a committee substitute by Sen. Don Williams, D-Balko, modifies the determination, computation and procedures relating to the mid-term funding formula for schools.

Williams said the bill would most likely be the measure chosen to address the mid-term funding dilemma, though other pieces of shell legislation are available. The measure was given a do pass motion.

HB2059, by Sen. Ed Long, D-Enid, creates the Oklahoma Tuition Savings Account Act, providing aid and assistance in financing for post-secondary education. It allows residents to contribute a maximum amount of \$5,000 to a tuition savings account, while allowing that amount to be deducted from the contributor's state income tax. With a stricken title, the measure received a do pass motion.

HB2072, by Sen. Angela Monson, D-Oklahoma City, expands membership of the Oklahoma Law Enforcement Retirement System (OLERS) to include park managers and supervisors of the Tourism and Recreation Department. The measure was given a do pass motion.

HB2080, by Rep. Jack Begley, D-Goodwell, is a shell bill designed to address the State Aid Formula. The measure had its enacting clause stricken and was given a do pass motion.

HB2088, a committee substitute by Rep. Larry Roberts, D-Miami, modifies language relating to the State and Education Employees Group Insurance Plan. It states that any person wishing to continue with their life insurance policy after retirement shall pay the full cost of that insurance at the rate established by the board. With a stricken title, the measure was given a do pass motion.

HB2090, a committee substitute by Monson, modifies payments of death benefits for members of the Oklahoma Firefighters Pension and Retirement System. It states that benefits shall be paid to the spouse of the insured, providing that the marriage has existed for at least 30 months. The measure received a do pass motion.

HB2094, a committee substitute by Monson, clarifies references relating to the Oklahoma Law Enforcement Retirement System. By unanimous consent, Monson restored the bill's title. It was given a do pass motion.

HB2115, by Sen. Jerry Smith, R-Tulsa, modifies the conditions which constitute murder in the first degree. The measure received a do pass motion.

HB2147, a committee substitute by Sen. Larry Dickerson, D-Poteau, creates the Procurement Procedures Act. With a stricken title, the measure was given a do pass motion.

HB2164, a committee substitute by Sen. Penny Williams, D-Tulsa, requires Oklahoma state higher education facilities to annually publish all tuition and fees free of charge to any person requesting the information. The measure received a do pass motion.

HB2179, by Sen. Howard Hendrick, R-Bethany, authorizes the Oklahoma Health Care Authority to accept federal grants. The measure was given a do pass motion.

HB2188, a committee substitute also by Hendrick, modifies the definition of "medical savings account" to include that which is offered by the State and Education Employees Group Insurance Board. It allows any funds remaining in a medical savings account at the end of the tax year to remain in the account for future medical expenses. The measure received a do pass motion.

HB2189, a committee substitute by Penny Williams, requires the State and Education Employees Group Insurance Board to pay for medical services and treatment rendered by out-of-state hospitals. It requires the treatment be set at the same level paid to an in-state hospital if the insured employee was referred by a physician and it was the closest hospital to the employee's place of residence, unless otherwise contracted with another out-of-state hospital. The measure received a do pass motion.

HB2271, by Sen. Brooks Douglass, R-Oklahoma City, increases the minimum assessment for the sexual assault victims examination fund to \$40. With a stricken enacting clause, the measure received a do pass motion.

HB2279, by Sen. Ben Brown, D-Oklahoma City, exempts persons over the age of 65 from paying a fee for a traffic record summary. With a stricken title, it received a vote of 18 to 14, passing it out of the committee.

HB2323, a committee substitute by Sen. Brad Henry, D-Shawnee, creates the School District Budget Act. The measure received a do pass motion.

HB2335, by Sen. Ed Long, D-Enid, allows a school board to create policies regarding the food expenses incurred during travel of employees of the district. With a stricken title, the measure received a do pass motion.

HB2403, a committee substitute by Smith, modifies deposits to the Attorney General's Revolving fund, allocating 25 percent of each deposit as follows: three-fourths to the Attorney General's Evidence Fund and one-fourth to the Attorney General's Revolving fund. The measure received a do pass motion.

HB2407, by Sen. James Maddox, D-Lawton, specifies the purpose of the State Long-Term Care Ombudsman Program. It states legislative intent to strengthen and fund the program. With a stricken title, the measure received a do pass motion.

HB2422, by Monson, is a shell bill which modifies sections of law pertaining to the calculation of retirement benefits within the Teacher's Retirement System. With its enacting clause stricken, the measure received a do pass motion.

HB2470, by Sen. Sam Helton, D-Lawton, creates the Oklahoma Prison Industry Marketing Development Advisory Task Force. It provides a sunset date for the task force of July 1, 2002. With a stricken title, the measure was given a do pass motion.

HB2475, a committee substitute by Rep. Larry Roberts, D-Miami, directs the transfer of

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\$25,000,000 from the Health and Dental Insurance Reserve Fund to the Teachers' Retirement System of Oklahoma. A shell bill, the measure received a do pass motion.

HB2480, by Sen. Dave Herbert, D-Midwest City, declares the Friday following Thanksgiving Day as a state holiday. It also states if a holiday falls on a Saturday, the previous Friday shall be designated a holiday in its place. Similarly, if a holiday falls on a Sunday, the next Monday shall be declared. The measure received a do pass motion.

HB2531, by Rozell, creates the Oklahoma Public Funds Investment Practices Reform Act of 1996. A shell bill, the measure's enacting clause was stricken and it was given a do pass motion.

HB2548, by Sen. Bernest Cain, D-Oklahoma City, modifies language relating to the Department of Human Services, specifically claims and payroll. The measure's title was stricken and it was given a do pass motion.

HB2620, a committee substitute by Maddox, creates the Construction Division within the Department of Corrections. The division is slated to be used for construction projects, an effort to better utilize prison labor. The measure was given a do pass motion.

HB2621, by Dickerson, creates the State Employees Fair Labor Relations Act. The measure is an effort to provide a "fair workplace that is responsive to the needs of state employees," the bill states. Even with eleven opposing votes, the measure was given a do pass motion.

HB2667, by Sen. Keith Leftwich, D-Oklahoma City, reapportions the fees, taxes and penalties received from the Oklahoma Vehicle License and Registration Act to the General Revenue Fund and State Transportation Fund. Currently the Transportation Fund only receives 0.03 percent of the state's motor vehicle tax collections, just over \$1.5 million. The measure would increase that funding to 5.3 percent. After having its enacting clause stricken, the measure was given a do pass motion.

HB2670, by Senate President Pro Tempore Stratton Taylor, D-Claremore, provides for county reimbursement of inmate medical expenses. The measure, after having its enacting clause stricken, was given a do pass motion.

HB2671, also by Taylor, creates the State Employee Pay Evaluation Act of 1996. With a stricken enacting clause, the measure received a do pass motion.

HB2690, a committee substitute by Leftwich, creates the Oklahoma Ethics in Privatization Functions Act. The measure is designed to set guidelines for privatization of state services and contracts. It seeks, the measure states, to ensure such privatization is cost effective and "in the best interest of the citizens of this state."

An amendment to the bill deleted all of section 14. The section was an attempt to prevent candidates from accepting donations from Jan. 1 to June 30 of each year.

The amended measure was given a do pass motion. It received 5 nay votes.

HB2735, by Sen. Mike Fair, R-Oklahoma City, relates to persons eligible for parole. It provides for prisoners who are illegal aliens to be paroled into the custody of Immigration and Naturalization Services.

An amendment by Brown removed section 3 of the measure. The section directed the Department of Corrections to determine the place of birth of all in their custody.

"This is an attempt at controlling prison overcrowding and to get someone else to pay for it," Fair said of his measure.

"This sort of racism has to stop in America," Stipe said. "You know and I know that the Pardon and Parole Board has all the power they want to parole anybody they want to and we don't need this bill ... it just causes suspicions."

After having its title stricken, the amended measure was given a do pass motion.

HB2782, a shell bill by Monson, creates the State Employee Compensation System Reform Act. Its enacting clause stricken, the measure was given a do pass motion.

HB2971, a committee substitute by Henry, amends the Oklahoma Firefighters Pension and Retirement System and the Oklahoma Police Pension and Retirement System to allow adopted children to be included as beneficiaries. The measure was given a do pass motion.

HB3008, a committee substitute by Cain, states that the Department of Corrections shall not use its facility at 1411 N. Classen Blvd., in Oklahoma City, for the purposes of inmate custody. The measure was given a do pass motion.

HB3021, a committee substitute by Brown, requires health insurance policies to provide related coverage for diabetics. The measure was given a do pass motion.

HJR1084, a committee substitute by Dickerson, would require a constitutional amendment to clarify language relating to the Pardon and Parole Board. The measure was given a do pass motion.

EDMONDSON APPLAUDS SUPREME COURT DECISION

■(GIT) Two years ago in district court, Judge Ralph Thompspon ruled that an Oklahoma Ponca Tribe could not sue the state over a gaming compact. The compact would have allowed the tribe to install slot machines on their property.

Wednesday, Attorney General Drew Edmondson announced that the Supreme Court has also ruled in favor of the state's position. "The state has negotiated several compacts with tribes to conduct gaming that is lawful in Oklahoma. This decision should in no way obviate the duty of states to continue to negotiate in good faith with tribes and nations within their borders," he said.

Edmondson said the major impact of the decision defeats the primary argument for those pushing casino gaming. He also explained that anyone has the right to sue the state if the state agrees to be sued. However, in this case, the state prevailed.

Edmondson also said the 5 to 4 ruling by the justices was historical. "The direction of the court has generally been in favor of state's rights, however it was close," he said.

Another constitutional issue will hit the state next year when a federal statute becomes effective. Under the statute, only private investigators would be able to obtain drivers' license information on individuals. Edmondson explained that the statute was a product of crimes related to stalking. "Instead of a stalker getting information on a person from the Department of Motor Vehicles, they could go to a private investigator." Edmondson continued, "Information would be cloaked, but in my opinion, the state certainly ought to have the right to make their own decision on the issue." The state complies with other federal measures to receive federal funding, but not for driving records. "The statute will most likely be challenged," he said.

STATE TREASURER'S AG-LINK PROGRAM HAS HELP FOR FARMERS STRUGGLING WITH DROUGHT

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) State Treasurer Robert Butkin doesn't have any rain for Oklahoma family farmers, but he does have money—\$19 million ready to loan. The low-interest money is available through the Treasurer's Agricultural Linked Deposit program.

"All Oklahomans hope the drought will end soon," said Butkin. "In the meantime, our farmers should know there is a program that may be able to help."

Butkin said the Ag-Link program provides low-interest loans to qualified family farmers by linking certificates of deposit with loans at participating financial institutions. Individual farmers may qualify for up to \$350,000.

"The Ag-Link program is designed for just this kind of crisis," he said. "Qualifying farmers will have two years on the initial term—with the option to renew the loan for up to six more years. Hopefully this will help get struggling farmers back on their feet following this terrible dry spell."

To qualify, Butkin said the applicant must have a debt-to-asset ratio of at least 55 percent and must earn at least 60 percent of his or her gross income from farming or ranching. The interest rate charged on loans is reduced by up to three percent.

"The best place to invest the people's tax dollars is in Oklahoma," Butkin said. "Ag-Link is a unique way for us to invest in what makes Oklahoma great—its family farmers. My staff and I are ready to help."

Butkin said farmers who believe they might qualify for an Ag-Link low-interest loan should contact their local financial institution or call the Treasurer's Office at 405-521-3191.

SOUTHWESTERN BELL HELPS FUND OKLAHOMA TELECOMMUNICATION CENTERS

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Dr. Leo Presley, executive director of the Oklahoma Department of Commerce, received a \$1.4 million check Wednesday from Southwestern Bell-Oklahoma president, Dave Lopez, to help construct and maintain telecommunications centers across the state.

"Developing a statewide capability in telecommunications is absolutely essential to the future of economic development and education in Oklahoma, particularly in rural areas of the state," commented Presley in accepting the check. "Such a networking system will make an entire world of information, data and communications accessible to all Oklahomans. Southwestern Bell's contribution is a vital part of making that capability happen."

The money from SWB will be added to a \$1.5 million grant awarded last year to the Commerce Department funded by the Telecommunications and Information Infrastructure Assistance Program of the U.S. Department of Commerce. Partners in the project include the Oklahoma State Data Processing and Telecommunication Advisory Committee, OSU Institute for Telecommunications and the State Regents for Higher Education.

According to Beth Rodriguez, director of programs for the Commerce Department's research and planning group, the concept for the telecommunications centers originated from Oklahoma's 1993-98 Strategic Economic Development Plan. "Most centers will have equipment in several locations—for example, a public library, cooperative extension office, and a school—creating a 'virtual,' rather than physical, community center," commented Rodriguez.

REMINGTON PARK DESERVES BLAME FOR DEATH OF SIMULCASTING BILL, STANLEY SAYS

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Remington Park race track deserves a large share of the blame for withdrawal of a bill that would have allowed state horse racing tracks to simulcast out-of-state races, according to Rep. Fred Stanley.

Stanley, a Democrat from Madill, held a State Capitol news conference to discuss the bill, shed more light on this controversy and clear up questions about a story on the bill in Wednesday's edition of *The Daily Oklahoman*.

"Remington Park made it absolutely clear to me and just about everyone else that they would withdraw their support from the bill if my amendment was attached," said Stanley. "Remington officials preferred to see the bill withdrawn instead of passed with an amendment that would have prevented them from reducing the number of quarter horse races."

Most Oklahoma horsemen are in the quarter horse business. Further reductions in quarter horse races at Remington Park, the state's largest track, would put a huge dent in the state's horse industry, Stanley said.

"Remington Park has already cut 90 races from their annual quarter horse meet," he said.

"Cutting any more quarter horse races is unacceptable to Oklahoma's horsemen."

"Remington apparently is so adamant about cutting the number of quarter horse races that they would encourage the death of a bill that might have attracted more money to the track. It just does not make sense."

The amendment Stanley was proposing would also have allowed all three Oklahoma horse tracks—Remington Park in Oklahoma City, Fair Meadows in Tulsa, and Blue Ribbon Downs in Sallisaw—to have their races televised to off-track wagering facilities.

Presently, Remington Park will not allow any other track access to monitors in off-track wagering facilities. That violates the spirit of the original agreement among the three state tracks for off-track betting, the lawmaker related.

"This is another good feature to the amendment," Stanley asserted. "All the tracks should have equal access to off-track wagering."

The lawmaker concluded by saying the horse industry is important to the Oklahoma economy.

"There is a lot more at stake here than simply making Remington Park happy," he said. "We have to boost the entire horse industry, from Remington Park all the way down to the regular Oklahomans who depend on the horse industry for their livelihoods."

"If the state's entire horse industry is to continue growing, then passage of this legislation—with the Horseman's Association amendment attached—is vital."

KEATING SPOKESMAN STATEMENT REGARDING OPEA PRESS RELEASE

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Rick Buchanan, Press Secretary for Governor Frank Keating, Wednesday responded to a press release by the Oklahoma Public Employees Association.

"Our lawsuit is about the separation of powers between the Executive Branch of government and the Legislative Branch of government and we are not going to politicize this discussion. It is a constitutional question for the Supreme Court to decide. Out of respect for the judicial process, we will not comment beyond that point. Oral arguments are scheduled to be heard on April 10," said Buchanan.

UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT PENALIZED AGAIN BY HOUSE DEMOCRATS

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Democrat leaders in the House voted again Wednesday to take punitive action toward Union School District, GOP Rep. Don Weese of Broken Arrow charged.

The third-term lawmaker criticized the House leadership after a legislative subcommittee killed a measure that would have reimbursed the school district for the loss of more than half a million dollars in ad valorem taxes attributed to a refund which Tulsa County must make to a Tulsa Manufacturer that overpaid its property taxes.

Union School District received more than half of the approximately \$900,000 excess tax payment, Weese related.

Although the statute of limitations for the manufacturer to claim a rebate expired, Weese said, a mandate requiring the Tulsa County Treasurer to repay the entire overpayment in five equal annual installments was quietly slipped into a bill last year by a House Democrat from north central Tulsa.

The bill cleared both houses of the Legislature during the final, hectic days of last year's session and was signed into law by the governor, records reflect.

Consequently, Republican Sens. Charles Ford and Jerry Smith of Tulsa and Ged Wright of Broken Arrow, along with Weese, introduced **SB707**. It would have appropriated \$517,995 to the State Board of Education to defray the ad valorem tax loss to Union School District stemming from the refund.

The Senate endorsed the bill 43 to 0 on Feb. 28, but the House Appropriations and Budget Subcommittee on Education killed it Wednesday by a 4 to 4 tie vote. "The bill wasn't even debated," Weese said.

Opposing the bill were Rep. Jack Begley, D-Goodwell, chairman of the subcommittee; Rep. James Hager, D-Pawhuska, chairman of the House Committee on Education; Rep. Larry E. Adair, D-Stillwell, a former school teacher and administrator who chairs the House Transportation Committee; and Rep. Calvin Anthony, D-Stillwater, a member of the House Education Committee.

Voting in support of the bill were Rep. Betty Boyd, D-Tulsa; Rep. John Bryant, R-Tulsa; Rep. Jim Reese, R-Deer Creek; and House GOP Leader Larry Ferguson, R-Cleveland.

The vote on SB707, coupled with numerous other actions by Democratic House leadership, have cost Union School District several million dollars in state aid in recent years, Weese said. For example:

- Union School District received barely 88 percent of the state average in per-pupil funding from the State Department of Education.

- The Democrat-dominated Legislature appropriated supplemental "mid-term adjustments" to growing school districts such as Union at only two-thirds of the full requirement in 1991-92, barely over one-half in 1992-94, and not at all the past two years. At a full-funding level, Union School District would be due \$1.54 million in supplemental state aid for last year and this year, Weese said.

- A Democrat-sponsored bill that passed the House and is pending in the Senate proposes a permanent solution to the mid-term funding crisis that "would be worse than doing nothing," Weese asserted.

The proposal would require growing school districts such as Union, which has approximately 11,000 students, to deduct growth in local ad valorem tax revenues from their supplemental appropriations.

Because of steady growth in student enrollment, Union School District "is at 100 percent of its legally allowable bonding capacity and is exempt from such requirements as class-size limitations," Weese said. "We need every dime we can get to build new classrooms, buy desks, hire teachers and provide textbooks," for students.

"The leaders of the Legislature say that education is important to them, but it's just hollow

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rhetoric," Weese said. Patrons of Union School District are paying dearly from their own pockets, but the state is not contributing its fair share, he asserted.

Union filed a lawsuit against the Tulsa County Treasurer, but the proceedings were halted temporarily pending the outcome of SB707, Weese said.

"The only way Union can get any justice is to challenge the constitutionality of a law that clearly was targeted at one county," he said. "Obviously we can't get a fair hearing in the Legislature."

DHS BUDGET STRIPPED OF \$23 MILLION OPEA URGES IMMEDIATE ACTION BY EMPLOYEES

From Oklahoma Public Employees Association

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) This last week saw the passage of SB837, which dealt a severe blow to the Department of Human Services budget. The issue is this: Governor Keating's advisors say DHS spends too much on Medicaid administrative costs. His advisors propose cutting nearly \$23 million from the DHS Medicaid budget.

Both sides are at a stalemate. Rather than hold up the entire appropriations process, through, the legislature and Governor have taken the \$22.6 million in question, and have put it aside in a special account called the "Medicaid Administrative Cost Fund". Under this arrangement, the Governor can't spend the money and neither can the legislature. Efforts are underway by both OPEA and DHS to educate the Governor's advisors that DHS administrative costs are NOT excessive.

Fortunately, there will be at least one more DHS appropriation bill passed later in the session which could add the \$22.6 million back into DHS budget. For that reason, the Association is calling up every DHS employee to write or call the Governor's office to tell Keating's staff that the \$22.6 million budget cut is not workable and explain that the loss of 400 to 600 field staff will be a disaster not only for Medicaid assistance, but AFDC, Food Stamps and other programs, as well.

NICKLES CALLS FOR TAX EQUITY AMENDMENT TO HEALTH CARE BILL

From U.S. Senator Don Nickles, R-Oklahoma

■(WASHINGTON) Oklahoma Senator Don Nickles today announced a plan to make the health care tax deduction more fair for all Americans.

"Right now, the tax code only allows a partial health insurance deduction for the self-employed, but gives corporations a 100 percent write-off," Nickles said. "That isn't fair."

"We use the tax code to encourage people to buy a home by providing a mortgage interest deduction. But we don't design the home. We don't say it has to be a big house or a little house. Everybody gets this deduction. And it's not dependent on whether you work on your own or for someone else. But with health care, it is dependent on where you work and that doesn't make any sense."

"My amendment is the first step toward equalizing the tax code by raising the deduction rate to 50 percent for the self-employed," Nickles said. "This is a positive step toward a more fair tax code for all Americans."

EDUCATION CRACKDOWN ON HIGH-DEFAULT SCHOOLS SHOWS RESULTS; TRADE SCHOOL RATES DROP SHARPLY

■(WASHINGTON) The U.S. Education Department's ongoing campaign to crack down on postsecondary schools with high student loan default rates has produced a sharp drop in historically high defaults at for-profit trade schools, U.S. Secretary of Education Richard W. Riley report Wednesday.

Proprietary schools saw rates decline from 30.2 percent in fiscal year 1992 to 23.9 in FY '93, a drop of 20.8 percent.

The department released the FY '93 student loan default rates of some 8,000 colleges, universities, and other institutions in federal student loan programs. The FY '93 default rate is the most current data available, representing a snapshot in time of borrowers scheduled to begin loan payments in FY '93, and who defaulted in either that year or the following year.

Riley attributed the decline to a number of factors, including stronger oversight of "high-risk" schools, an improved process for granting eligibility and certification of schools and programs, and the department's default reduction initiatives. For example, schools are now required to provide financial counseling to student borrowers upon enrollment and at graduation.

The Higher Education Amendments of 1992 (P.L. 102-325) mandate that schools with default rates of 25 percent or greater for three consecutive years face loss of eligibility in the Federal Family Education Loan Program (FFEL). This year, 432 schools are affected by this provision. Historically Black colleges and universities are exempt from sanctions until July 1998.

In addition, under department regulations, a total of 222 schools (including some of the 432 that face loss of FFEL) with FY '93 rates of 40 percent or greater may have their eligibility for all federal student aid programs, including the Federal Pell Grant Program, restricted or terminated. Schools have the right to appeal adverse actions by the department.

Riley also credited modern technology with helping to lower the default rate, citing the department's ability to verify immigration status and identify applicants who provide false information, previously defaulted on a student loan or received an overpayment. Last year, the National Student Loan Data System blocked the issuance of \$230 million in loans to some 140,000 ineligible applicants. Riley said new incentives for guaranty agencies will also help students avoid default and should reduce defaults further.

"These results show our increased commitment to accountability is paying off," Riley said. "We'll keep working to cut defaults further and protect taxpayers' investment in higher education."

"As Charles Lamb says, there is nothing so nice as doing good by stealth and being found out by accident, so I now say it is even nicer to make heroic decisions and to be prevented by 'circumstances beyond your control' from ever trying to execute them."
