LAWMAKERS APPROVE MORE APPROPRIATIONS

■(GIT) Four appropriations bills cleared the House and the Senate on Wednesday as lawmakers near the deadline for their consideration of spending bills.

SB818, by Sen. Enoch Kelly Haney, D-Seminole, appropriates funds to the Oklahoma Alcoholic Beverage Laws Enforcement (ABLE) Commission, the Council on Law Enforcement Education and Training (CLEET), the State Bureau of Investigation (OSBI), the Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs, the Department of Public Safety (DPS) and the Board of Medicolegal Services.

Though every agency in the bill received additional funding for the Oklahoma Public Employees Retirement System (OPERS) contribution and the state employee pay raise, most agencies found themselves with no additional operating funds for the upcoming fiscal year.

Exceptions include an additional \$131,513 for data processing charges and secretarial support.

CLEET receives an additional \$19,000 to cover rent increases.

DPS funding increased by \$1,200,072 to support academy funding and intoxilizer equipment. In a separate appropriation, through the general appropriations bill (**SB837**) passed earlier this year, DPS received \$692,000 to fund a lease-purchase agreement for a new plane for the executive branch.

Though most appropriations bills addressed this year have gone smoothly, rarely sparking debate, Senate lawmakers Wednesday

objected to the measure's almost static funding for the Board of Medicolegal Investigations. The agency had asked for additional funds to staff an additional pathologist.

\$45 MILLION PROPOSED FOR DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS

■(GIT) Lawmakers are expected to consider appropriating some \$45 million to the Department of Corrections on Thursday — enough money to meet the department's immediate needs, but not enough to meet the anticipated growth in prison population, according to DOC estimates.

SB820 is expected to be moved from the

General Conference Committee on Appropriations to the House and Senate floors sometime Thursday. The bill was laid over by the House division of GCCA in a postadjournment meeting on Wednesday.

The bill appropriates \$45 million in growth money to the Corrections Department, as well as an additional \$90,708 to the Pardon and Parole Board.

Earlier this month, Department of Corrections Executive Director Larry Fields outlined a \$96.7 million request to the GCCA's subcommittee on judicial, law enforcement and public safety services. That request was nearly double the growth money available to the subcommittee for allocation.

Included in the proposal to be considered by the legislature is \$18 million to annualize the supplemental appropriation received by the department earlier this year. That money went to lease private prison space in Oklahoma and Texas for 969 inmates. Also included in the proposal is an additional \$12.8 million to provide 800 new private prison beds in fiscal year 1997.

That, however, may not be enough, according to DOC estimates provided to the

Senate Appropriations Committee Vice Chairman Cal Hobson, D-Lexington, said, while he understood the members' frustrations, to hold up the appropriations of six agencies was not feasible.

"We simply cannot make them move on this point," Hobson said of negotiations with the House. "It is not prudent to reject the conference committee report because we cannot come to an agreement on one agency."

Through a role call vote, the bill's conference committee report was adopted with a narrow vote of 27 to 17. The measure itself was passed with a vote of 44 to 0.

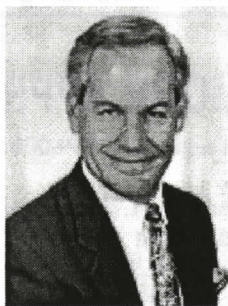
Without debate, the House adopted the bill's conference committee report and gave the bill a 95 to 0 passing vote.

HB1805, also by Haney, appropriates funds to the Department of Human Services (DHS), the Department of Rehabilitative Services and the Office of Juvenile Affairs.

A key point in DHS funding is \$983,691 for the funding of 97 new social workers to take on the agency's child welfare caseload, many coming from promotions within the agency.

Governor Frank Keating said previously he would closely examine any funding mechanisms for DHS and consider a veto if it failed to make "significant structural changes."

As senators considered the measure Wednesday, an emotional Sen. Bernest Cain, D-Oklahoma City, blasted Keating, saying he was neglecting the state's poor.

"I am frustrated that we can buy these big planes and give tax breaks to all these people, but that the chief administrator has chosen to go after poor people," he said. "I sometimes wonder why we are here if we can't defend the

poorest of the poor."

Echoing Cain's reaction, Long chastised state government for spending more money on the state's lodges and golf courses that "continue to lose money," than the less fortunate of the state.

Members adopted the measure's conference committee report and eventually passed the bill with a vote of 45 to 0.

The bill drew little interest in the House, where members voted 62-29 to adopt the conference committee report and 89-3 to pass the bill.

Rep. Wayne Cozort, R-Tulsa, offered the only resistance to the bill, saying he believed the \$15.8 million appropriated to the Office of Juvenile Affairs for Community Youth Services was neither well spent nor well accounted for.

Also passing both houses on Wednesday were **HB1812** and **SB812**. The House bill appropriates funds to the State Election Board and Ethics Commission, while the Senate bill appropriates funding to the State Banking Department and Oklahoma Securities Commission.

Both measures passed the House without discussion or debate and no negative votes. The same was true in the Senate.

The Senate also passed two measures considered by the House on Tuesday — **HBs 1792** and **1815**.

Appropriations in **HB1792** include \$96,392 to the Merit Protection Commission and \$527,718 to the Office of Personnel Management. The bill received a 45 to 0 passing vote in the Senate. **HB1815**, which received a passing vote of 47-0 in the Senate, appropriates nearly \$2.5 to the Department of Central Services, including \$308,708 for the employee pay raise and OPERS increase, \$1.7 million for debt service on 1995 bonds and \$400,000 for re-

placement of the agency's asbestos removal revolving funds.

The bill also allows the department to spend up to \$548,775 from the Motor Vehicle Liability Account to provide salaries and administrative expenses; \$274,637 from the Risk Management Participation Revolving Fund and \$42,666 from the Oklahoma Motor License Agent Indemnity Fund for salaries and administrative expenses of the Comprehensive Professional Risk Management Program. Exempted from budgetary limits by the bill are expenditures from the Risk Management Revolving Fund.

Corrections, continued from page 1 subcommittee. Some 866 additional beds will be needed by the department by the end of the current fiscal year, according to those estimates. In addition, the department projects its total population will grow by another 1,530 inmates during fiscal year 1997. That means that while being funded for 800 beds, the agency is projected to need 2,396 additional beds.

In his presentation to the subcommittee, Fields put the cost of fully funding the needed bed space at \$26.5 million. The governor's office had recommended allocating only \$11.5 million for additional bed space.

Full funding for the department's Northeast Oklahoma Correctional Center at Vinita, \$1.5 million, and a work center in Frederick, \$511,500 are also proposed in the bill. Some \$885,800 is included in the bill for the creation of a reassessment unit to the Northeast Oklahoma facility. Additionally, \$3.2 million is proposed to increase the per diem rate paid to county jails holding state prisoners to \$24 per inmate per day.

The bill also calls for \$136,245 to be appropriated for the supervision of added inmate work crews, as well as \$122,000 for expansion of the Joseph Harp mental health unit.

Lawmakers will also consider a \$1 million appropriation in the bill to fund the Community Corrections Act. That act, **SB1200**, was returned to conference committee for additional consideration by the Senate on Wednesday.

The remainder of the department's additional funding — \$7.1 million — will be used to fund the state employee pay raise, increased OPERS contribution and teachers' retirement contribution increase for teach-

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PROPERTY TAX RELIEF PART ONE PASSES SENATE

■ (GIT) Senate lawmakers Wednesday passed a the first half of a two-part property tax relief package designed to reduce many Oklahoma property owners' ad valorem taxes.

SB681, by Sen. Penny Williams, D-Tulsa, would change the annual income limit allowed for a double homestead exemption of \$2,000 to \$20,000 per year from \$10,000.

In addition, the bill raises the minimum income allowed to receive an income tax credit if property taxes reach more than one percent of the owner's annual earnings. Under the measure the minimum would be raised to \$12,000 from \$10,000 annually.

When asked why she was bringing the legislation in light of the recent State Question 669 defeat, which if passed, would have rolled the state's property taxes back to the 1993 level, Williams said the measure is an attempt to correct problems that are still present in the ad valorem system. She added that just because Oklahomans voted against 669, does not mean problems with the system do not still exist.

"There are many Oklahomans who are working as hard as they possibly can, yet do not earn a lot of money," she said. "We want to make it easier for those families and individuals to make ends meet."

Under the bill, counties would be reimbursed by the state for the loss of revenue resulting from the raised income limits. Though the measure would be revenue neutral to the state this year, two years from now the bill could carry a projected \$2.6 million price tag, unless funds are placed back into the system to cover the loss.

"We're not taking any money away from education," she said, addressing concerns about losses to the state's primary educational funding source. "I think we can afford \$2.6 million to reimburse the counties."

Supporting the measure, Sen. Keith Leftwich, D-Oklahoma City, said the measure was proof that legislators do listen to the people of Oklahoma.

The measure also contains a provision

requiring an itemized statement of how ad valorem taxes are being spent to accompany all tax notices.

"Oklahomans want and deserve greater accountability from the public institutions they support," Williams said. "This provision gives them the information they need to understand how their tax dollars are being used."

The second half of the property tax reform initiative is expected in upcoming days in the form of a joint resolution. The measure will aim to:

- ✓ Cap property tax growth at a rate of five percent annually on locally assessed real property.

- ✓ Roll assessment ratios back to the 1995 level, permanently.

- ✓ Hold valuations on properties of senior citizens earning less than \$25,000 per year.

The resolution will make necessary constitutional changes to implement the reform.

"Major fluctuations in property taxes will become a thing of the past under this legislation," said Senate President Pro Tempore Stratton Taylor, D-Claremore.

ers in the department's budget.

Combined, the proposed funding increase would represent a 22.5 percent increase in the department's funding.

Funding for the Pardon and Parole Board would increase 5.3 percent under the terms of the bill, with more than one-half of the \$90,000 in additional funding being earmarked for the employee pay raise and increased OPERS contribution. Other additional funding in the bill includes:

- ✓ \$13,000 to restore funds removed in the general appropriations bill; and

- ✓ \$19,552 to cover the actual cost of certain benefits.

GAS CAP INTEGRITY BILL PASSES HOUSE

■ (GIT) The House on Wednesday gave approval to the so-called gas cap integrity bill, a bill its author said is designed to help Tulsa and possibly Oklahoma counties deal with air quality issues.

Rep. Russ Roach, D-Tulsa and author of **HB2346**, called the proposal "the best option" for municipalities in trouble with the Environmental Protection Agency to deal with air quality issues.

Under the terms of the bill, local government entities would be able to enact ordinances mandating gas cap integrity tests. Those tests would determine whether a gas cap properly seals a gas tank and prevents the loss of ozone-damaging fumes.

Municipalities could only enact such ordinances, Roach told House members, when cited by the EPA for violations of air quality standards.

Without the proposed law, Roach also said, counties with air quality problems, most notably Tulsa County, could find themselves under orders from the EPA to sell only gasoline reformulated to diminish emissions or limited in their industrial development capabilities.

Rep. Forrest Claunch, R-Midwest City, joined Roach in support of the bill, saying, "It's the simplest way to effectively remedy an unfortunate situation."

Rep. Richard Phillips, R-Warr Acres, disagreed with Claunch and Roach, warning that the bill could lead to conflicts between individual cities within one county and between city and county governments.

"The EPA's rules have not stayed the same," Phillips also argued, referring to the provision in the proposed law that makes the tests dependent on an EPA citation. "They've changed, and when people

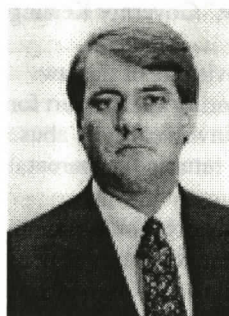

ZERO TOLERANCE BILL PASSES SENATE

■(GIT) "This is an effort at prevention," said Sen. Ben Brown, D-Oklahoma City, defending a measure he authored, creating a zero tolerance law for those under the age of 21 who drive while intoxicated. Members passed the measure, **SB1230**, Wednesday.

The bill states that persons under the age of 21 who have "any measurable quantity of alcohol" in their blood stream or breath may have their license suspended or revoked.

In addition, the measure allows for possible installation of ignition interlock devices in vehicles of offenders and requires the State Department of Education to administer drivers education programs in all schools in the state designed to increase awareness of drinking and driving dangers.

Maintaining the Education Department requirements only applied to schools that already have drivers education courses in place, Brown met with quick resistance.

"We can't have pay raises when we continue to mandate things to our schools that cost them more money," said Sen. Jerry Pierce, R-Tulsa.

Sen. Mark Snyder, R-Edmond, echoed

Pierce, calling the measure an unfunded mandate.

"Our kids are already being taught drivers education in school," Snyder said, "and those schools that don't have a drivers education program will be forced to create one, whether they have the money or not."

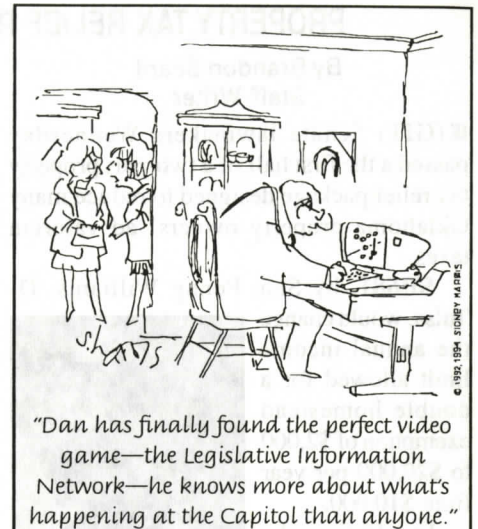
Citing 1991-93 statistics, Sen. Helen Cole, R-Oklahoma City, said the recent study of 507 alcohol related accidents showed 117 of them involved persons under the age of 17.

Brown said the ratio of under aged drunk drivers was two to one.

"This is a serious problem, that deserves serious measures," said Sen. Keith Leftwich, D-Oklahoma City, commenting that the bill is an attempt to change public attitudes that have traditionally been lax about drinking and driving.

After adopting the measure's second conference committee report with a vote of 40 to 7, members passed the bill with a final vote of 42 to 5.

Brown lodged a motion to reconsider, giving him three legislative days to readdress the measure.

realize these tests can become a profit center, they're going to be lobbying to increase these regulations."

Tulsa Republican Rep. Fred Perry countered that Tulsa, with what he called a unique situation because of its environment, industry and air quality problems, "is dangerously close to being put on the blacklist to keep it from being able to bring in industry."

Rep. Bill Graves, R-Oklahoma City, contended that wording in the bill could be used to force all state municipalities to accept certain federal mandates. "What's good for Tulsa is not necessarily good for the rest of Oklahoma," he said before launching into an attack on the EPA.

"I don't think the answer to this problem is this piece of legislation," Graves concluded. "I think it's Congress and getting them to abolish the EPA, and that's what we should be telling our constituents."

Graves was joined by Rep. Howard Cotner, D-Altus, in taking the position that municipalities throughout the state would be affected by the law. "I don't believe it won't affect everyone who lives within the boundaries of the state of Oklahoma," Cotner said, refusing then to yield to questions.

Rep. Chris Hastings, R-Tulsa, said, "This bill is enabling legislation to insure that if Tulsa is found in non-compliance it won't be given the death penalty."

Those favoring the bill and its conference committee report outnumbered those against it by a nearly three-to-one margin, and a motion to adopt the bill's conference committee report received a passing vote of 70-29. The bill itself received a 70-28 passing vote and now heads to the Senate for consideration.

GOVERNOR KEATING SIGNS RYAN LUKE BILL

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Governor Frank Keating signed **HB2053**, commonly called the Ryan Luke bill.

"Even though this bill was named for little Ryan Luke, its signing is dedicated to all Oklahoma children who suffer abuse. While a state law can't stop abuse, it certainly can establish a system that protects children as much as possible. I congratulate legislators of both parties who worked to write this important law," Governor Keating said.

Among the key provisions of the law:

- ✓ Requiring monitoring by the court for one year after a child involved in an abuse or neglect situation is returned to parental custody
- ✓ Requiring training in child and domestic abuse issues for all judges involved in such cases
- ✓ Requiring court-appointed special advocates to be available in all judicial districts and appointment of an attorney to represent the interests of children in abuse cases
- ✓ Removing confidentiality from cases

involving deaths and providing information to foster parents, law enforcement and child welfare agencies

✓ Requiring DHS to conduct criminal history investigations of prospective foster family members, and prohibiting placement of a child with any convicted sex offender or domestic abuser

✓ Permitting postponement of child placement rulings and reviewing when a child's welfare is endangered

"Growing up in this world is difficult enough for a child without having to worry about being abused by those who are supposed to love and care for you. I feel this new law goes a long way in making the system work on behalf of Oklahoma's children," the Governor said.

■(GIT) House members again appeared aware that sine die will soon be upon them and considered a number of measures on Wednesday, including:

HB1238, by Rep. Ed Crocker, D-Norman, requiring the disclosure of the identity of any public official or spouse that is an owner or operator or who is a principal of any legal entity which owns or operates a project or who has any financial interest, whether direct or indirect, in the project that no conflict of interest exists because of the public official's or any person who was a public official during the immediately preceding 24 months and requiring that a list of all political campaign contributions made in Oklahoma during the 48 months immediately preceding the submission of the application of all persons that will have a financial interest in the project, received a passing vote of 70-23 after the acceptance of the bill's third conference committee report.

Crocker told House members that the third conference committee report was identical to the second, and that the matter was before them again because it had been "mis-handled" in the Senate, which rejected the bill's second conference committee report on Tuesday. The bill now returns again to the Senate.

HB2374, by Rep. Jari Askins, D-Duncan, creating the Workplace and Employee Protection Act, received a passing vote of 96-0 following the adoption of its second conference committee report.

HB2512, by Rep. John Bryant, R-Tulsa, transferring the authority over the Oklahoma Office of Volunteerism from the Office of the Secretary of State to the Department of Civil Emergency and creating the Oklahoma Commission on Volunteerism, received a 96-4 passing vote with an emergency clause after the adoption of its conference committee report.

HB2698, by Rep. Mike Ervin, D-Wewoka, authorizing the Department of Human Services to collect and deposit certain payments, received a passing vote with an emergency clause of 90-0 following the adoption of the bill's second conference committee report.

HB2704, by Rep. Larry Rice, D-Pryor, requiring the State Auditor and Inspector to provide certain notification to municipalities of audit requests and prohibiting certain persons from entering into agreements or ac-

cepting payments or discriminating against occupants relating to receiving video services, was passed by the House by a 90-3 vote following the adoption of its second conference committee report.

HB3008, by Rep. Debbie Blackburn, D-Oklahoma City, received a passing vote of 100-0 following the adoption of its second conference committee report. The bill puts restrictions on the housing of Department of Corrections inmates near schools.

HCR1097, by Rep. Bill Paulk, D-Oklahoma City, directing all state agencies and state educational institutions to immediately remove from their computer systems all illegal obscene material, especially child pornography, received a passing vote of 98-0 following the adoption of the Senate's amendments to the measure.

HCR1103, commending Peggy Smith for being selected as the 1996 National Financial Services Advocate of the year, was adopted by unanimous consent.

Also adopted by unanimous consent was **HCR1113**, by Rep. Betty Boyd, D-Tulsa, creating the Task Force on Prevention of Genetic Discrimination.

HCR1114, by Rep. Danny Hilliard, D-Sulphur, congratulating the Oklahoma As-

sociation of Independent Insurance Agents was adopted by unanimous consent.

HJR1104, by Rep. Dan Webb, R-Oklahoma City, received a passing vote of 97-0. The resolution disapproves certain rules proposed by the Office of Personnel Management.

HJR1105, disapproving certain rules proposed by the Oklahoma State Credit Union Board, also by Webb, received a passing vote of 73-26.

HJR1106, also by Webb, disapproving certain rules proposed by the Oklahoma State Board of Education, received a passing vote of 99-0.

HJR1108, by Rep. Adair, disapproving certain rules of the Wildlife Conservation Commission, received a passing vote of 95-0 with an emergency clause.

Without discussion or debate, House members gave a 70-28 passing vote to **SB694**, by Rep. Joe Hutchison, D-Jay, adding county boards and public trust authorities to provisions allowing dual office holding, following the adoption of the bill's conference committee report.

SB976, by Rep. Randall Erwin, D-Nashoba, stating the ownership of recover-

■(GIT) The Senate considered the following measures on Wednesday, May 22, 1996:

HB2362, by Sen. Brad Henry, D-Shawnee, provides exemptions from notice and challenge procedures as they relate to financial privacy and provides for customer non-notification.

The measure was laid over for further questioning.

HB2374, by Sen. Angela Monson, D-Oklahoma City, creates the Workplace and Employee Protection Act.

The measure was laid over by Monson, at the request of Sen. Gene Stipe, D-McAlester, for further questioning.

HB2403, by Sen. Jerry Smith, R-Tulsa, modifies the percentage of deposits to the Attorney General's Revolving Fund.

The measure was laid over for further questioning.

HB2512, by Sen. Gerald "Ged" Wright, R-Broken Arrow, transfers authority of the Oklahoma Office of Volunteerism from the Office of the Secretary of State to the De-

partment of Civil Emergency Management.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure and its emergency clause with a vote of 45 to 2.

HB2692, by Sen. Ted Fisher, D-Sapulpa, places the Juvenile Justice Advisory and Oversight Committee under the supervision of the Office of Juvenile Affairs.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure and its emergency clause with a vote of 46 to 0.

HB2755, by Sen. Ben Brown, D-Oklahoma City, requires the Department of Juvenile Justice to provide a uniform system of assessment of the reading ability of each juvenile upon initial placement in an institution or facility.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure and its emergency clause with a vote of 48 to 0.

HB2806, by Sen. Bernest Cain, D-Oklahoma City, allows any consumer reporting

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agency to contact DHS to request information as to whether a specified person is required to pay child support.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure with a vote of 39 to 6.

HB3008, by Sen. Bernest Cain, D-Oklahoma City, directs the Department of Corrections not to allow any inmate under their care to come within 1,000 feet of any public or private school.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure with a vote of 47 to 0.

HCR1059, by Rep. Loyd Benson, D-Frederick, authorizes the Board of Regents for the University of Oklahoma acting on behalf of Cameron University to issue revenue bonds.

The measure was adopted.

HCR1089, by Sen. Penny Williams, D-Tulsa, memorializes Congress to enact legislation exempting annual mammograms from the Medicare deductible.

The measure was adopted.

SB658, by Sen. Howard Hendrick, D-Bethany, creates the Oklahoma Prudent Investor Act.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure with a vote of 47 to 0.

SB782, by Sen. Ben Robinson, D-Muskogee, creates the Oklahoma Telecommunications Authority Board.

Put to a roll call vote, the bill's conference committee report failed with a vote of 16 to 29.

SB921, by Sen. J.R. "Dick" Wilkerson, D-Atwood, repeals various sections pertaining to sales and income taxes.

After adopting the bill's second conference committee report, members passed the measure and its emergency clause with a vote of 46 to 0.

SB1071, by Sen. Ed Long, D-Enid, lists student suspension options for students guilty of immorality or violation of school regulations.

After adopting the bill's second conference committee report, members passed the measure and its emergency clause with a vote of 43 to 0.

SB1087, by Sen. Jerry Smith, R-Tulsa, makes a \$40 per month fee for persons with

a deferred prosecution program supervised by the Probation and Parole Division of the Department of Corrections.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure and its emergency clause with a vote of 48 to 0.

SCR68, by Sen. Mark Snyder, R-Edmond, congratulates the Edmond North High School boys golf team.

The measure was adopted.

Members also rejected the conference committee reports to **SBs 513, 896, 899, 903, 910, 993, 1130, 1177, 1200, 1209 and 1215**, requesting further conference.

Members also rejected the conference committee reports to **HBs 2090, 2094, 2812, 2887** (on a motion to reconsider), **2959** and **2969**, requesting further conference.

Further conference was granted on **HBs 2164 and 2393**.

The Senate is scheduled to convene at 9:30 a.m. on Thursday, May 23, 1996.

able materials, received a 99-1 passing vote following the adoption of the bill's conference committee report.

The only bill to fail the House on Wednesday was **SB1043**, by Rep. Bill Settle, D-Muskogee, expanding damages for injury to a right to or interest in water. House members voted 41-56 against passage of the bill following the adoption of the its conference committee report.

SB1061, by Rep. Askins, stating that any order directing a defendant to pay costs of representation shall be a lien against all real and personal property of the defendant and may be filed against such property as provided by law, received a passing vote of 94-5 after the House adoption of its conference committee report.

Following the adoption of its second conference committee report, **SB1071**, by Rep. Adair, establishing a Safe School Committee at all school sites, received a passing vote of 87-3 with an emergency clause.

Receiving a 94-6 passing vote following the adoption of its second conference committee report was **SB1115**, by Rep. Robert Weaver, D-Shawnee. The bill modifies statutory references related to drivers licenses.

SB1192, creating the Oklahoma Tourism and Passenger Rail Act, by Rep. Larry Adair, D-Stillwell, received a passing vote of 95-3 following the adoption of its conference committee report.

EDUCATION SECRETARY SAYS OEA FLYER CLAIMS FALSE CREDIT FOR KEATING VICTORIES

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Secretary of Education Floyd Coppedge said Wednesday he is "astonished" that a flyer distributed by the Oklahoma Education Association this week apparently claims OEA credit for two vital pieces of school legislation that originated with the Keating administration.

"I was really astonished to see the OEA trying to take credit for the midterm school funding solution and our efforts to save the teacher retirement fund from insolvency," Dr. Coppedge said. "They know very well those were central parts of the Governor's education agenda from day one of the legislative session."

In his State of the State message and budget presented on February 5, Governor Keating asked for \$40 million in additional funding to strengthen the common education portion of the Oklahoma Teachers Retirement System. He also pressed for a permanent solution to the annual midterm funding crisis faced by growing school districts. On Wednesday, the Governor signed a midterm

bill, HB2055, that included most of his original proposals, and funding for teacher retirement is expected to emerge from the Legislature during final budget votes.

The OEA flyer, headlined "Here's what we've done," claims OEA efforts led to the midterm bill. It also claims that "OEA has secured an additional \$45 million" for teacher retirement.

"As I recall, Governor Keating was out front on these two issues long before the OEA, and the OEA played very minimal roles in winning legislative passage," Dr. Coppedge said. "In fact, the midterm problem has been with us for 30 years and I never heard OEA say much about it. It was Senator Charles Ford and Representative Don Weese and the other Republicans in the House and Senate who joined the Governor in insisting that midterm funding be addressed once and for all this year."

The education secretary said OEA, which claims to represent Oklahoma's teachers, "ought to insist on higher standards of honesty than this."

FHWA IDENTIFIES NATIONAL HIGHWAY SYSTEM CONNECTIONS TO INTERMODAL TERMINALS IN ALL STATES

From US Dept. of Transportation

■(WASHINGTON) Rodney E. Slater, Administrator of the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), Tuesday announced that National Highway System (NHS) connections to major passenger and freight intermodal terminals have been identified for all 50 states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico.

"This is another important step toward reaching President Clinton's and Transportation Secretary Federico Pena's goal to establish the seamless transportation network necessary to meet America's growing transportation needs," Slater said, while participating in a regional forum on reauthorization of the Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act of 1991 (ISTEA) in Chicago. "Once we submitted our proposed NHS map to Congress, the department embarked on additional work to ensure that the system would include important highway linkages with all major passenger and freight intermodal terminals."

The National Highway System Designation Act of 1995, signed by President Clinton

last November, includes 161,108 miles of important rural and urban roads, including some connections to major intermodal terminals. Congressional approval is needed to modify the NHS to include the additional 1,925 miles of rural and urban roads that will provide the connections to other major intermodal terminals.



PRACTITIONER ENROLLMENT IN MEDICARE PROGRAM INCREASES FOR 1996

■(WASHINGTON) More than three-quarters of the physicians and other practitioners who serve Medicare beneficiaries have enrolled in the Medicare participating physician program for 1996, HHS Secretary Donna E. Shalala announced recently. Participation ranges from a high of 92.2 percent in North Dakota to a low of 60.1 percent in Idaho.

The overall rate of participation is 77.5 percent this year, up from 72.3 percent in 1995. The number of enrollees in the program has increased to 627,000 in 1996 from 620,000 last year. Participation rose in 45 states, as well as the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.

"Under the participating physician program beneficiaries do not pay charges above

Medicare-approved limits," Shalala said. "Medicare beneficiaries have found this to be a valuable program for more than 10 years."

Participation has risen every year since the program started in 1984. The overall rate includes medical doctors (MDs), limited license practitioners and non-physician practitioners:

✓ For MDs and doctors of osteopathy, the participation rate increased to 80 percent in 1996, up from 74.6 percent in 1995.

✓ For limited license practitioners, who are optometrists, podiatrists, chiropractors or oral surgeons, the participation rate rose to 50.3 percent, compared with 44.6 percent in 1995.

✓ For non-physician practitioners, the participation rate increased to 93.1 percent in 1996 from 91.6 percent in 1995.

"Two principal factors contribute to the increases in the physician participation program," said Bruce C. Vladeck, administrator of the Health Care Financing Administration, which manages Medicare. "We continue to remind beneficiaries about the program's benefits and we enforce the limits placed on charges made by non-participating physicians."

A participating physician agrees to accept Medicare fee schedule amounts as full payment for Medicare service.

"Services provided by participating physicians now account for just over 90 percent of Medicare-allowed charges for physician services," Vladeck said.

Medicare pays 80 percent of the fee schedule amount for a physician's service. For a Medicare-covered service provided by a participating physician, the beneficiary is responsible for 20 percent of the fee schedule amount. A non-participating physician, however, may charge a beneficiary more, up to a limit defined by law.

Some non-physician practitioners are required by law to "accept assignment" for all covered services. (That is, they accept the Medicare fee schedule amount as full payment.) They are certified registered nurse anesthetists, physician assistants, nurse practitioners, nurse midwives, clinical nurse specialists, clinical psychologists and clinical social workers. Non-physician practitioners who do not have to accept assignment are audiologists, physical therapists, psychologists and occupational therapists.

Physicians are advised that participating in the program creates the following advantages:

✓ Their Medicare fee schedule is 5 percent higher than that of non-participating physicians.

✓ They are provided with toll-free lines if they submit claims electronically.

✓ Their names are listed in the Medicare Participating Physician/Supplier Directory, which is furnished to senior citizen groups.

Non-participating providers are advised they can charge beneficiaries no more than 115 percent of the Medicare allowance.

In January of 1995, 72.3 percent of Oklahoma's physicians were participating in the program, now as of January 1996, that number has climbed to 76.1 percent.

GOVERNMENT/INDUSTRY COALITION FORMED FOR AIR BAG SAFETY

From US Dept. of Transportation

■(WASHINGTON) Secretary of Transportation Federico Pena Tuesday announced the formation of an unprecedented coalition of automobile manufacturers, air bag suppliers, insurance companies, safety organizations and the federal government to prevent injuries and fatalities which may be inadvertently caused by air bags, especially to children.

"Safety is President Clinton's top transportation priority," Secretary Pena said. "Together, business and government will work to alert the public to the proper role of air bags and to ensure that seat belts are always used with an air bag. In addition, we will educate parents about the best way to install a child safety seat in a car that has a passenger side air bag."

Coalition members have pledged almost \$10 million to pursue a three-point program:

✓ An extensive national effort to educate drivers, parents and care-givers about seat belt and child safety seat use in all motor vehicles, with special emphasis on those equipped with air bags.

✓ A campaign to convince states to pass primary seat belt use laws. Under such a primary law, police officers need no other reason to stop a driver and issue a ticket than failure to use a seat belt. Only 12 states have primary laws. Thirty-seven states currently have secondary belt laws, meaning that po-

lice may cite belt law offenders only if first stopped for some other violation.

✓ Activities at state and local levels to increase enforcement of all seat belt and child seat use laws, such as increased public information and use of belt checkpoints.

Air bags are an important safety advance that have saved some 1,500 lives since the late 1980s, said Secretary Pena. However, NHTSA is aware of at least 19 cases in which a child either in a rear-facing infant seat or riding improperly belted was killed by a deploying air bag.

"Infants in rear-facing child safety seats should never be placed in the front seat if the vehicle has a passenger-side air bag," said Ricardo Martinez, M.D., administrator of the department's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA). "The safest place for children of all ages is the back seat. If riding in the back seat is not an option, toddlers and older children may ride in the front seat of a vehicle with a passenger-side air bag, but only if buckled up properly and with the seat moved as far back as possible," he added.

All passenger cars must offer dual front air bags by model year 1998, and light trucks the following year. Virtually every new passenger vehicle sold today comes equipped with at least a driver-side air bag, and many already offer dual air bags in the front seat.

Currently, there exists private entities that have state employee members and that appear and lobby for state employees. State employees can join or no, and participate or not as they choose. By this action a state employee will not be prevented from participating in these or other types of private organizations.

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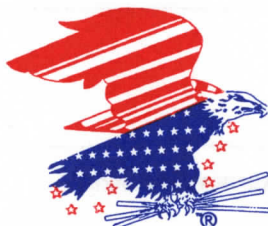
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
