RURAL LEADERS HOPE TO 'REAP' REWARDS

■(GIT) A plan to pump \$17 million into rural economic development projects was much heralded by state government leaders this week.

And some local leaders in one rural community told *Capitol Network News* that there may be something to the promises being made at the state level.

"If you've got a new industry wanting to come to your town and it means you're going to have to build a new wastewater treatment plant that costs \$3 million, where is a smaller community going to get that kind of money?" McAlester city manager Randy Green asked. "Most smaller communities don't have access to that kind of cash.

"It's those kinds of issues that the small towns need help with."

It's those kinds of problems legislators and the governor said they hope will be addressed with the money they are planning to set aside for the so-called Rural Economic Assistance Program, 'REAP' for short.

A budget agreement announced earlier this week calls for \$17 million to be dedicated to rural road development, rural infrastructure improvements and rural economic development. Governor Frank Keating and others compared the rural economic development program to the state's Quality Jobs Program, a program which members of both political parties say has been effective in attracting jobs to the state.

"This is great news," Rep. Mike Mass, D-Hartshorne and a major proponent of rural economic development funding, said. "We worked long and hard with a lot of people in developing this program.

"If I could have it 'all my way,'" he added, "it would be ten times the investment. But this is a good be-

ginning and one I am personally committed to building on."

Mass' sentiments were echoed by Nashoba Democrat Rep. Randall Erwin.

"It has been 20 long years since any comprehensive rural economic development plan like

REAP was passed," Erwin said. "Rural Okla-

FROM THE TRENCHES — TRUTH IN SENTENCING ACT DRAWS COMMENTS

■(GIT) In addition to changing the way Oklahoma prisoners are sentenced, the proposed Truth in Sentencing (TIS) Act will also change the way the state's criminal justice and corrections systems operate. *Capitol Network News* asked some of Oklahoma's attorneys, judges and corrections officials what they thought about the initiative and how it would affect them.

"Overall, I look for it to be much more satisfactory than our present system," said District Judge Richard Freeman. "Right now, I will give someone 40 years and hope he serves four."

Under the system, convicted criminals would be required to serve at least 85 percent of their prison term before being eligible for parole.

"Overall, it's really going to level out the playing field and give us a more equitable system."

If the act is engaged, juries would no longer provide sentencing, except in capital cases. They would still determine guilt or innocence, but judges would be responsible for issuing sentences with the help of a sentencing grid, or matrix.

During a recent experiment, judges were asked how they would sentence various offenders using the grid as a guideline. Freeman said, while it would take time for judges to familiarize themselves with the system, the grids were, overall, fair.

"Some poor slob could come into my courtroom and get ten years," he said, "but he could go across the hall and end up getting 100 years."

Department of Corrections (DOC) officials are anticipating the measure will cause internal changes.

Jim Rabon, DOC spokesman, said, while the measure would not necessarily increase

homa is the backbone of this state, and it is time we shared in the economic growth of the big cities."

Like Green, Mass and Erwin, House Speaker Glen Johnson, D-Okemah, said many small rural communities lack money for infrastructure improvements needed to attract industries, as well as the expertise needed to apply for federal grant money for local development.

"Through this package," Johnson said on Thursday, "I think we will realize benefits in rural Oklahoma, as well as the rest of the state."

McAlester's city manager and the head of its economic development agency, McAlester Economic Development Service executive director Terry Heilig, are in the right position to see just how effective the plan will be. In the late 1980s and early 1990s, McAlester saw a sudden surge in new industries locating in the southeastern Oklahoma community of just under 19,000. In one year alone, some 1,500 new jobs were created.

But, Green admits, McAlester had an advantage over some communities.

Two industrial parks, one developed by the city with the aid of state and federal funding and another by private interests, already existed. Also, a local group, the McAlester Investment Group (MIG), was ready and willing to pump their money into some of the new companies considering McAlester for their home.

"Most communities don't have private groups like that," the city manager said, "and

they are going to need to be able to offer some incentives for a business or industry to locate in a town or city. Most just don't have a source of funding for that."

Today, McAlester is considered by many to be the economic hub of southeastern Oklahoma, evidenced by a growth in sales tax collections that has substantially outpaced statewide averages. Its industries employ people from a large radius surrounding the community and its retail stores benefit from sales to those people, as well as others living in neighboring small rural communities.

Now, Heilig notes, the investment group's plate is full. That means he has to find alternative sources of funding to use in attracting industries and businesses to the area. Meanwhile, voters in the community have become cautious when they go to the polls, forcing officials to fully justify any ballot issue affecting the city's sales tax or ad valorem collections.

Earlier this year, for example, Green found himself in exactly the position he described — Being considered by a chicken processing company as a site for future expansion, but faced with having to build a new wastewater facility if the plant chose his community. Unfortunately, Green noted, the company chose to locate elsewhere, but he was forced to ask himself a difficult question:

"Would the city's voters think 1,500 jobs was worth part of a sales tax to fund the new wastewater plant?"

"That's a tough question to answer," Green said. "But that's one of the problems towns our size and smaller have to face. Often times a city or some other group will give a company a site and then have to find a way to get city services, such as water and sewer, to that site. It's not always an easy proposition."

Heilig said he could see another possible benefit to the program — The elimination of some of the burden placed on other sources of economic development funding.

"I think the program could take the heat off other programs," Heilig explained, "such as the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program."

That program, Heilig explains, provides nearly \$25 million in federal funds to Oklahoma for use by cities and towns in community and economic development. But the program has what Heilig called a wish list some five years long.

"That's just crushing the program on the economic development side," Heilig said.

"Communities like McAlester and others in the rural areas need to be able to access that money, but it's just not possible right now because of the five-year list. Maybe this program can take some of that pressure off, either by funding some of those projects already out there or by making new money available to those who can't get on the list."

And, Heilig noted, there is always the chance the federal money could dry up depending on the mood in Washington.

Heilig said he was also hopeful the program will draw more attention to the rural areas, which he said have sometimes been slighted in the state's economic development efforts.

Specifically, Heilig pointed to marketing and site selection efforts at the Department of Commerce.

"In the six years that I've been in McAlester," he explained, "the Department of Commerce has only brought three prospects into McAlester. All the others have gone to larger communities. All their marketing efforts, too, are more geared for the big communities, such as Oklahoma City and Tulsa.

Unless more attention is paid to the rural areas, Heilig added, "I fear the gap between the rural areas and the urban areas, as far as economic development and growth are concerned, is just going to get wider and wider.

"Maybe a program like this will focus more attention on what's going on in rural Oklahoma and change some of that."

the prison population, it would create administrative conflicts.

"Internally, you will have inmates serving time under the old sentencing laws and inmates serving time under the new sentencing laws," he said. Keeping track of both, would "be like keeping two sets of books."

Other states, such as Washington and Oregon, have had success with a similar sentencing measure, Rabon said. Like those states, Oklahoma can expect a "leveling off" period in terms of prison population.

"Our projections show we are still going to have the need for more space as time goes on," he said. "I don't know that it [TIS] is going to change that."

If enacted, the system would not go into effect until 1998, allowing state officials time to assess any initial problems. Rabon said DOC would use the time to create related

GOALS 2000, "NO STRINGS ATTACHED"

■(GIT) Since October 20, 1995, local education agencies in states not participating in Goals 2000 could apply directly to the U.S. Department of Education for a portion of the state's allotment of the program's funds, subject to approval of the state education agency. After much confusion over Oklahoma's participation in the federal program, local school districts may now apply directly to the federal government for those grants. Gerald N. Tirozzi with the U.S. Department of Education said earlier this week that "local school districts receiving the funds would be required to use them for the development and implementation of a comprehensive education improvement plan, focused on preparing students to meet state or local academic standards for a program consistent with the state's overall plan for education improvement."

In April, the Goals 2000 program was briefly discussed by members of the state joint education committee. At that time, Wayne Rowley with the Tulsa Chamber of Commerce told members that appointees of the Executive Council on School-To-Work feared that the federal government would start putting their own "morality spin" on programs such as Goals 2000. He urged members that time was running out for participation and that the state could oppose

program provisions they did not agree with. "The feds may demand their money back, if we are not careful," he warned. "If you oppose school-to-work, just stand up and say I do not want that federal money."

In response to a letter from Tirozzi on May 7, 1996, State Superintendent of Public Instruction Sandy Garrett said that Oklahoma had no plans to develop a state plan. In fact, Garrett said she supported local school districts' participation in Goals 2000.

As a result of Garrett's approval, local school districts will now be able to apply for grants totaling \$4,396,613 for fiscal year 1995. In addition, program funds appropriated to Oklahoma for fiscal year 1996, bring the total to \$9,731,068.

Governor Frank Keating had originally opposed the program until he learned that funds available to Oklahoma from Goals 2000 could be used to improve the teaching of mathematics, science, reading and writing.

Keating especially endorsed the program after he learned that recent changes in federal law would allow local school districts to apply directly to the federal government for Goals 2000 funds. "This is purely and simply an issue of local control." He continued, "It is the best answer for Oklahoma's schools, which can, if they choose, apply directly to Washington for funds that come with no strings attached."

policies and procedures.

"It's a big impact in terms of keeping our staff trained."

Norman criminal defense attorney Robert Jackson said he anticipates the system will reduce the amount of plea bargaining in court cases.

"That will gum-up the system," he said. "When you start making people serve specific amounts of time without some type of release valve, you are going to have to start stacking prisoners on top of one another."

Jackson also said he was concerned about placing sentencing power in the hands of a judge. A strong advocate of jury sentencing, he said the provision could make a "political creature" out of issuing punishment.

"I believe that there is a possibility for individual judges that have sat on the bench for years and years to become jaded," he said. "Jury sentencing is the only way to keep the setting of punishments free from political consideration."

A spokesman for Governor Frank Keating said, while the governor has not seen a final version of the bill, he supports the Truth in Sentencing concept, calling it a step toward restoring public confidence in the justice system.

"The governor is supportive of making people serve the sentences they are given."

Currently, the bill containing the act (HB1138) is being addressed by its conference committee. The bill's author, Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore, said he expects conference committee members to make a decision on the matter later next week.

TWO NEW OKLAHOMA ROUTE 66 MUSEUM SATELLITE EXHIBITS ESTABLISHED

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Two new satellite exhibits of the Oklahoma Route 66 Museum have been completed in Miami and Yukon with the cooperation of local organization, it was announced by the Oklahoma Historical Society.

The new exhibits have been opened in the Coleman Theater of Miami and the Yukon's Best Railroad Museum of Yukon, said Project Director Sandy Stratton of the Oklahoma Historical Society.

"With Miami and Yukon, we now have six satellite exhibits open and three more planned in Claremore, El Reno and Elk City," Stratton said. The exhibits are designed as part of a coordinated plan for museums and historic sites along Historic Route 66 in Oklahoma.

"Each one features local scenes, artifacts and memories from the seven decades when Route 66 was the Main Street of America."

Satellite exhibits previously were opened in Arcadia, Chandler, Edmond and Sapulpa. The satellite exhibits are part of an overall project that included the establishment of the Oklahoma Route 66 Museum in Clinton last September with funds through the federal Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act.

"We are developing more than a new museum with the satellite exhibits," said Dr. Bob Blackburn, deputy executive director of the Oklahoma Historical Society. "It's a concept of tying historical places and events together across Oklahoma."

"This project reflects the effect of Route 66 on people and places along that 397-mile

route from the Kansas border to the Texas panhandle."

The Miami exhibit includes photos of the lead and zinc mine operations located in the Tri-State Mining District along Route 66; road maps of the 1930s and 1940s, photos of early drive-in theaters and promotional materials for the Meramec Caverns, Grand Lake and the National Route 66 Association.

The Yukon exhibit contains photos of early road-building near Yukon and El Reno, a window tray for curb service at the Model Drug Store, a metal finger bowl from Beverly's Restaurant, menus from Route 66 restaurants and a popular steering knob of the 1940s.

PRESIDENT STEPS IN TO HELP SETTLE RAILWAY DISPUTE

From The White House

■(WASHINGTON) The President has established, by Executive Order, Presidential Emergency Board No. 228 to make recommendations for the settlement of the current dispute between certain railroads represented by the National Railway Labor Conference and certain of its employees represented by the Transportation Communications International Union, effective May 8, 1996.

The National Mediation Board (NMB) has notified the President that this dispute is critical and a strike would have an immediate and adverse effect on the public. On this recommendation, the President has created the Emergency Board to investigate and report on the current dispute between over 50 railroad and railway companies and their employees. The Emergency Board must report its findings and recommendations for settlement to the President within 30 days.

The President appointed Rolf Valtin of Virginia to serve as chair of the Board, and Gil Vernon of Wisconsin and Herbert L. Marx, Jr., of New York to serve as members.

FUEL TAX ISSUE SHOULD BE SETTLED THIS SESSION

■(GIT) The speaker of Oklahoma's House of Representatives said this week that a resolution to the Indian fuel tax issue is possible during this legislative session.

Speaking to a group of reporters during his weekly press conference on Thursday, Johnson said, "We haven't arrived at a final resolution, but our discussions are ongoing. I believe there is a real possibility of a resolution to this situation, and personally, I think there will be one during this session."

Johnson had joked with reporters at the start of the gathering, saying he was glad to be facing them, rather than attending "one of the three meetings taking place in my office right now."

When asked about the fuel tax issue, Johnson smiled and told reporters, "That's what one of the meetings is about in my office."

The debate over the Indian fuel tax issue has already moved closer to resolution in conference committee.

A controversial bill, **HB2818**, died in

committee earlier this month. HB2818 started out as a shell bill designed to set state officers' salaries. But in a surprise move on the Senate floor in April, Sen. Dick Wilkerson, D-Atwood, offered a floor substitute to the bill, gutting its original intent and proposing a solution to the fuel tax issue.

The move struck a cord of discontent among House members. Johnson described the situation by saying, "The House and Senate are not necessarily on the same page."

Ironically, the move didn't sit well with Governor Frank Keating, who joined Johnson by throwing his support behind **HB2208**, another measure specifically designed to address the gas tax issue.

That bill survived the committee process and in a conference committee, the Senate was asked to recede from its amendment to the bill. That amendment struck the bill's title.

Pressed on Thursday for when the issue might make its appearance on the House floor, Johnson said he was not yet certain.

NCI REPORTS IMPROVEMENTS IN BREAST CANCER DEATH RATE

■(WASHINGTON) The National Cancer Institute announced today that the breast cancer death rate in American women continued to decline through 1993, a finding that suggests improved breast cancer management from early detection to treatment is having a beneficial effect.

Breast cancer mortality trends for white women in the United States have improved markedly in the 1990s compared with the 1980s. For black women, increases in mortality persist, especially among older women, but the overall increase has slowed significantly.

During the most recent 5-year period of available data, 1989 to 1993, the age adjusted breast cancer mortality rates fell approximately 6 percent in white women and rose about 1 percent in black women. By comparison, from 1980 to 1989, rates increased 3 percent in white women and 16 percent in black women, according to data from the National Center for Health Statistics.

"These finds are good news, but not good

enough," said HHS Secretary Donna E. Shalala. "The Clinton Administration will keep pursuing every opportunity for prevention, early detection and treatment, and an effective research agenda to fight breast cancer."

NCI Director Richard Klausner, M.D. said "The data suggest the trend is starting to move in a positive direction for African-American women as well as white women. Rates have declined among younger black women, although they are still higher than those of white women and are improving more slowly."

The overall rate in U.S. women has fallen about 5 percent in recent years, dropping from 27.5 per 100,000 women in 1989 to 25.9 in 1993. This year, an estimated 44,300 women will die of the disease nationwide, but that estimate could prove to be too high if the trend continues.

In both white and black women, the greatest improvements in mortality during the recent 5-year period were seen in younger age groups, but the changes were more modest in blacks than in whites of all ages.

THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

(GIT) The role of education has changed significantly since the days of the one-room school house. What was once state-of-the-art now seems like ancient history. Such changes, many of which often occur rapidly, have increased the challenges faced by those responsible for the oversight and management of education.

The State Department of Education continues to pursue and to meet the challenges posed by the ever-changing educational environment by focusing on efficiency and effectiveness at the local, as well as state, level.

In the last five years, the Department has reduced its budget by 22.8 percent, while continuing to serve more than 600,000 students and some 46,630 educators, as well as directly or indirectly assisting 211 public libraries, 13,680 adult General Education Development (GED) applicants, 550 school districts, 1,832 local schools and their 2,700 local school board members. Efforts designed to improve the state's educational system have been achieved by combining such factors as deregulation, local innovation and technology.

State Superintendent of Schools Sandy Garrett said these methods will help students be more successful and will provide Oklahomans with a stronger and broader knowledge base, helping Oklahoma's public schools meet the needs of today's students and building a foundation from which tomorrow's needs can also be met.

Deregulation

Reducing the role of state government in local decision making has been a rallying call for many in the Capitol's halls. Nowhere does that effort seem to be more clear than in the education arena.

The state Board of Education declared in 1992 that all its rules, except those pertaining to health and safety, were eligible for deregulation. Garrett said she believes that as more districts become aware of ways that deregulation could help them become more successful, more proposals will be developed.

During that first year, only 15 deregulation requests were approved by the board. That number increased to 33 during the 1993-94 school year and nearly tripled one year later to 95 during the 1994-95 school year.

For 1995-96, some 101 deregulation requests were approved by the state Board of Education.

The Legislature, with help from the State Department of Education, has created additional education-deregulation legislation, encouraging more school districts to take initiatives in developing tailor-made programs for their communities.

Local Innovation

Two school districts were not only able to take advantage of deregulation ideology, but have proven themselves pioneers in the area of innovative educational efforts in Oklahoma. As a result, many of their students' test scores sky-rocketed, resulting in statewide and national recognition.

Along with 54 elementary and secondary schools in low-income areas, U.S. Secretary of Education Richard W. Riley identified two Oklahoma schools, Emerson Elementary in McAlester and Roosevelt Elementary in Altus, that showed marked success in student achievement through the Title I program. Title I is the U.S. Department of Education's largest program to help children master the basics and more challenging subject matter, providing federal funding for direct instructional services to educationally disadvantaged children in schools and institutions with high concentrations of children from low-income families.

Emerson Elementary and Roosevelt Elementary were first recognized with 27 other top schools by the State Department of Education's Title I program as "Oklahoma Distinguished Schools." Those schools' students had consistent, above-average achievement test score gains in core curriculum areas over a three-year period.

"For the national recognition, Emerson and Roosevelt Elementary schools met the additional criteria of providing opportunities for all children to attain high levels of performance, working closely with their parents and communities, providing continuous professional development for their teachers and having consistent improvement in student achievement," said Garrett.

Superintendent of Roosevelt Elementary School O.D. Wikoff explained that their school implemented programs designed to make learning fun. The school established a resource information center for children, parents and teachers that provides hands-on instructional materials on core curriculum subjects. "We also have math carnivals and other school skills oriented type activities," he added.

Wikoff said that it takes a collaborative community effort and continual learning for their school to attain scholastic achievement. "I'm not reluctant to take from someone else's idea, and as a standard, I take my teachers to visit other schools to review their programs, but most of all, I listen to my community's needs."

The same sentiment was expressed by the principal at McAlester's Emerson Elementary. Jay White said that school districts need to "break away from the traditional mold."

White said that Emerson established a school science lab where students use the lab for combined subject, hands-on training.

He said that all subjects were interrelated, and the lab has helped students, teachers and parents think of them collectively.

"The lab also allows students to learn at their own pace."

White said through programs such as "Great Expectations" (a statewide program that instructs teachers as mentors), character education could build students' self-esteem. "We just need to get back to the basics of saying please and thank you. This program instills positive teaching methodology."

In testing, White explained that Emerson uses state and national tests. "You have to have diversity by using every tool available. Superintendent Garrett was on the cutting edge for establishing core curriculum testing for Oklahoma."

Spreading their knowledge, Wikoff and White are always inviting other schools to visit and review their programs. "Quite a few have contacted me already," said White. Wikoff added, "Several schools, such as Lawton, have contacted me and are already in the process of reviewing our school."

Garrett said she was excited about the many new models of innovation being used by schools in the state. To date, she added that 244 school districts have been approved for deregulation from state rules.

Electronic Processing

While giving local school districts more flexibility in reaching their communities' educational goals, the State Department of Education has also undertaken efforts to improve its efficiency and effectiveness. In particular, the department has made sweeping advances in the area of technology in recent years with an eye on improving its overall efficiency at the state level.

And more advances are on the way. Lawmakers announced this week, for example, their plan to fund a statewide student monitoring system. Part of the midterm funding proposal endorsed by a bipartisan group of lawmakers and the governor, the program is designed to assist in efforts to make midterm funding adjustments more equitable.

Other programs have already been put in place. The Oklahoma Cost Accounting System (OCAS), developed in 1990 as a pilot project for ten school districts, now has all 550 school districts reporting all funds to the system. The data is used to meet a number of federal and state reporting requirements. OCAS was modified in 1995 within the State Education Department to make it more efficient and less labor intensive.

While the department already electronically transfers State Land Payments to schools' bank, it worked closely with the State Treasurer's Office to develop a system for direct deposit of State Aid allocations, as well. The system began operating last month. "Schools will now be able to receive their money earlier," said Garrett.

In addition, the annual "Child Count," conducted by the Special Education Services, can now be electronically provided through the use of a specialized computer program. "It will ultimately provide faster and more accurate data reporting from schools and eliminate much of the school staff data work required each spring for reports to the state agency and federal office," explained Garrett.

As for specialized electronic data collection for children's services, last year was the first full year to electronically collect Early Intervention Center (SoonerStart) data. The information is collected using the Department's first custom-developed micro-computer application that was featured at a national special education conference last spring. Also, an electronic claims reimbursement system for Child Nutrition Programs was designed last year by the staff and is being implemented. "This system will improve the speed and accuracy of reports and will contribute to overall efficiency," Garrett said of the system.

At the recommendation of Garrett's Paperwork Commission, future plans are to progressively convert all possible paper data collections to electronic collection. Garrett said the Department has achieved an overall savings of \$21.6 million to date.

"We went from a hierarchical system to a flat system that allows the Department staff to work as a team," she added.

State Superintendent Sandy Garrett was reelected to her second four-year term in 1994.

Born in Muskogee, the former first-grade teacher has almost 30 years experience in education and holds certification as a public school teacher and administrator. Former director of rural education and gifted/talented programs at the Department, she was appointed cabinet secretary for education by Governor Henry Bellmon in 1988, and reappointed by Governor David Walters in 1990. In 1995, she was elected chairperson of the board of the Southwest Educational Development Laboratory, a research and development consortium of five states headquartered in Austin, Texas.

As part of the constitutional responsibilities of her position, Superintendent Garrett is also chairperson of the State Board of Vocational and Technical Education, a member of the State Board of Equalization, School Land Commission, State Regents for Oklahoma Colleges and the Education Commission of the States.

HISTORY OF THE OKLAHOMA STATE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION

The State Education Department is responsible for all phases of state public school education under the direction of the State Board of Education which consists of seven members. The Superintendent of Public Instruction is elected to a four-year term by the people, or appointed by the Governor to fill an unexpired term, and serves as a voting member and president of the Board. The other six members are appointed by the Governor, and confirmed by the Senate and serve staggered six-year terms.

The Department operates numerous divisions such as Instructional Services, Planning and Information Services, Financial and Administrative Services, and Federal/Special Services Programs. Within the divisions are various sectional functions such as child nutrition programs, teacher evaluation, teacher testing, school finance, school transportation, school accreditation, school plant services, reading/student testing, gifted/talented, community and public relations, adult-community education/literacy, Indian education and multi-cultural equity programs.

RELIEF TO DROUGHT DISASTER A LITTLE TOO LATE FOR SOME

■(GIT) Dennis Howard with the State Department of Agriculture said Thursday, that by January 1, 1997 five to ten thousand Oklahoma farmers will have to "fold" on their farms. U.S. Secretary of Agriculture, Dan Glickman announced a disaster declaration for Oklahoma earlier this week that will provide low interest loans to farmers. However, these loans only cover losses suffered by farmers in 1995.

Howard and Governor Keating both expressed their appreciation for the announcement by Glickman, and for the state budget agreement to take money from the Rainy Day Fund to help aid against the drought. But unfortunately, some of those funds are too late to help this year's crops. "Time is critical ... and the funds will help in time for fall planting," Keating said.

Keating again said that most of the designated relief will not kick-in until late summer. The Governor said he would like to additionally help agriculture in the state by providing value-added tax credits. "Adding value, that's where the money is," he said.

GCCA SUBCOMMITTEE HEARS PAY PLEA AGAIN

■(GIT) State employee pay was again the main topic of discussion when the General Conference Committee on Appropriations' subcommittee on judicial, public safety and law enforcement service met on Monday.

Lawmakers heard presentations from the Court of Criminal Appeals, Supreme Court and District Courts, approving by unanimous consent provisions necessary to fund the state employee pay raise approved earlier in the session by the legislature and signed by the governor.

Making the presentation on behalf of the Supreme Court, Chief Justice Alma Wilson also addressed a requested 10 percent across the board pay raise for state judges and their

staffs.

Wilson was asked by Rep. Bill Settle, D-Muskogee, why court workers should be treated differently from other state employees.

Wilson noted that many in the state's judicial system are paid significantly less than those holding similar positions in other states. She also said salaries were a determining factor in the quality of people filling the various positions, many of which are elected.

Lawmakers took no action on the chief justice's request. Like other pay raises requested of the subcommittee, the request is expected to be taken up at a later time.

PLANE LEASE SURPRISES SOME LAWMAKERS

■(GIT) Some state lawmakers were surprised to learn on Wednesday that funds had been appropriated to the Department of Public Safety for the lease and operation of a new state airplane for the benefit of the executive branch and the legislature.

The revelation came during the meeting of the General Conference Committee on Appropriations' subcommittee on judicial, public safety and law enforcement issues. Sen. Gene Stipe, D-McAlester, noticed the twice-mentioned item on the agency's fiscal year 1997 budget analysis and questioned acting DPS commissioner Bob Ricks about the matter.

Funding for the lease and operation of the aircraft — \$602,000 — was included in **SB837**, the general appropriations bill, approved earlier this session by both legislative houses and signed by the governor on March 19.

Ricks said the aircraft, a KingAir 350, will be lease-purchased over the course of some four to five years. The plane, which can accommodate up to eight passengers and has a range of 1,200 to 1,500 miles, will be available for use by the governor, as well as members of the legislature, Ricks added.

"I've got no problem with that," Stipe said, "but it ought to be available for use by state agencies, too."

Other members of the subcommittee sat in stunned silence, quietly asking one another whether they were aware of having approved the funds for the aircraft.

Asked by a member of the subcommit-

tee whether the appropriation was "a done deal," vice chairman Rep. Danny Hilliard, D-Sulphur, said the funding had been approved when the legislature considered the general appropriation bill in March.

Ricks went on to add that the decision by former Governor David Walters to sell the executive branch's last aircraft "was probably a mistake." Walters sold the aircraft and then leased it back on an as-needed basis.

"I think it has probably ended up costing us more to lease it back than it did to own it," Ricks explained.

Asked how long it would take for the state to buy the new aircraft under the lease-purchase plan, Ricks estimated four to five years. At which time, Hilliard noted, a provision of the appropriations bill will prevent whoever is governor from selling the plane without legislative approval.

GCCA SUBCOMMITTEE ON HEALTH & SOCIAL SERVICES TALKS BUDGET ISSUES

■(GIT) In a small and informal meeting Tuesday, Sen. Ben Robinson, D-Muskogee, discussed budget issues with members of the GCCA Subcommittee on Health and Social Services.

The agencies discussed during the meeting include the Oklahoma Health Care Authority, the Oklahoma Health Department, the Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services (DMHSAS) and the Department of Human Services (DHS).

Pertaining to the Oklahoma Health Care Authority, a total of \$15.4 million constitutes the agency's additional funding requests for the fiscal year.

Among the higher items, are \$9.7 million for cost of living allowances (COLAs), \$4.8 million to replace money used to fund FY '96 and \$3.2 million to fund federal mandates.

Reported savings for the authority include \$5.1 million in managed care savings and \$1.9 million in additional HMO premium tax revenue.

Also included in the calculation is a figure of \$2 million to fund a UNISYS contract.

With total allocations at \$15.4 million, the authority has only been recommended to receive \$6.9 from the governor's office.

Sen. Howard Hendrick, R-Bethany, said such services provided by the Health Department, like its dialysis fund, would be better served by the authority.

The Health Department is asking for \$9.7 million for FY '97. Included in this figure is \$3.2 million for vaccines and immunizations. Up against the governor's proposed \$202,000, the department's goal is to raise its vaccination rate to 100 percent.

A proposed project called "Children First" is carrying a requested allocation of \$2 million. Patterned after a program in Hawaii called "Healthy Start," the program is aimed at Oklahoma counties with the highest child abuse rates, including Garvin and Tulsa Counties.

The funding request also includes \$1 million to fund teen pregnancy prevention and \$60,000 to fund the so-called Ryan Luke bill (**HB2053**).

DMHSAS is asking for \$8 million to fund such requests as \$1.1 million for psychotropic medication, a line-item request that is higher due to higher costs of new generations of drugs.

A request of \$395,919 would fund a workers' compensation premium increase which occurred when the mental health facility at Vinita downsized operations. Similar increases of \$250,000 were reported last year.

The \$40 million in DHS requests include \$21.9 million to restore Medicaid administration funds, \$15.1 million to replace FY '96 carryover funds and \$4.8 million to restore cuts from the governor's office. Total recommendations from the governor's office total \$860,000.

Each of the 14 agencies listed in the proposal have funds to cover employee pay raises given in **SB1128**, totaling \$21,820,085.

The total subcommittee allocations are \$62.8 million.

LAWMAKERS, GOVERNOR REACH PARTIAL BUDGET, TAX CUT ACCORD

■(GIT) "Historic" was the term used by a bipartisan group of lawmakers and the governor on Wednesday as they announced an agreement on a series of tax cuts, midterm school funding adjustments and the use of the state's Rainy Day Fund.

"I am very proud of this historic agreement for the state of Oklahoma," Governor Frank Keating said at an afternoon press conference where he was flanked by legislative leaders from both houses and political parties. "I congratulate the leadership of both parties for their bipartisan efforts in reaching this budget agreement."

The plan, which still requires legislative implementation, is broken down into three components: Midterm funding/Rural Economic Assistance Programs (REAP), Rainy Day Fund appropriations, and tax cuts.

The midterm/REAP plan calls for funding midterm adjustments for the 1994-95 and 1995-96 school years with a mix of Rainy Day and General Revenue fund money. Midterm funding for the 1996-97 school year will be taken exclusively from the General Revenue Fund.

Some \$12.6 million will be needed to fund the 1994-95 adjustments, while \$13.5 million will be needed for the 1995-96 funding. A total of \$15 million will be needed for the 1996-97 school year.

In addition, \$1.5 million will be taken from the Rainy Day Fund in fiscal year 1997 to fund a student tracking program.

Rural economic development will also get a boost under the first component of the plan. Some \$17 million, all from the General Revenue Fund, will be dedicated to rural projects, including \$7.5 million of rural highway projects through the Department of Transportation; \$4.5 million of rural infrastructure improvements through the Water Resources Board; and \$5 million for the so-called Rural Economic Assistance Program.

The second component of the budget and tax cut program calls for some \$22.7 million of the anticipated \$30 million that will make its way into the Rainy Day Fund to be utilized next fiscal year.

In addition to the \$14.5 million which will go to fund 1994-95 and 1995-96 midterm adjustments, as well as \$1.5 million for the student tracking program, the governor and lawmakers have agreed to take \$1.6 million from the fund for rural fire departments; \$1 million for weather modification/cloud seeding; \$1 million for the governor's emergency fund to cover claims remaining from last year's floods and anticipated claims from this year's wildfires; \$2.9 million for up-front medical payments required as the state's Medicaid program converts to a man-

aged care system; \$320,428 for matching funds to obtain \$1.7 million in federal aid for maintenance of National Guard armories across the state; and \$1.19 million for an Oklahoma Highway Patrol trooper academy and vehicles for the new troopers.

Keating indicated on Wednesday that he would sign off on the proposed Rainy Day Fund expenditures.

The final component of the program calls for some \$45 million in annualized tax cuts, including a plan to give private sector retirees the same tax break afforded state and federal retirees. That plan gives retirees over the age of 65 and with an annual income of \$25,000 or less a \$5,500 tax break. The tax break will be implemented over five years at \$1,100 per year.

Additionally, the tax cut plan includes income tax credits for estate taxes paid on family farms and businesses; income tax credits for investing in agricultural processing facilities and income tax credits for taxes paid on marginal wells.

The cuts are expected to total some \$5.2 million in fiscal year 1997. Considered on an annual basis, the governor noted, the cuts represent "the largest in Oklahoma's history."

Keating is expected to issue an executive order on Thursday authorizing the tapping of the Rainy Day Fund.

In addition, both legislative houses will soon consider legislation appropriating money from the Rainy Day Fund and making the specified midterm funding appropriations. Lawmakers will also have to complete work on the REAP bill, **HB1434**, and **HB2055**, which sets in place the midterm funding plan.

The legislature will also have to identify and draft language to enact the agreed to tax cuts.

BUDGET MOVES CONTINUE

■(GIT) Less than one day after a bipartisan group of lawmakers announced an agreement on a major budget and tax cut initiative, the budget momentum continued to move forward.

Members of the House of Representatives on Thursday voted overwhelmingly in favor of three budget measures designed to give certain agencies in need a financial boost and to re-fund two agencies originally set for elimination.

House members voted 80-19 in favor of **SB838**, making supplemental appropriations to several agencies; 82-17 for **SB843**, making an appropriation to the Liquefied Petroleum Gas Board; and 97-2 for **SB847**, making an appropriation to the Commission on Consumer Credit.

HB838 appropriates \$426,462 to the State Board of Education for the Early Intervention (Sooner Start) program; \$500,000 to the State Supreme Court for the computer system enhancement; \$124,458 to the Court of Criminal Appeals for computer system enhancements; and \$200,000 to the Office of the State Auditor and Inspector for moving costs and a shortfall in collections.

Without debate, the bill received its passing vote.

Also receiving passing votes without debate were funding bills for the Liquefied Petroleum Gas Board and the Consumer Credit Commission. Both agencies had been scheduled for elimination by Governor Frank Keating.

A total of \$405,590 was appropriated to the petroleum gas board and its FTE limited to 10, while the consumer credit commission was appropriated \$683,795 and given an FTE approval of 16.

The three measures were approved in the Senate on Wednesday, only minutes after receiving conference committee reports and recommendations from the General Conference Committee on Appropriations.

AT & T APPROVED TO PROVIDE LOCAL TELEPHONE SERVICE

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) The Oklahoma Corporation Commission Tuesday approved an application by AT&T Communications of the Southwest to provide local-exchange telecommunications services in Oklahoma.

The federal Telecommunications Act of 1996 signed into law on Feb. 8 authorizes local-exchange telecommunications competition. AT&T is the first company to win approval to compete for local-exchange telephone customers in Oklahoma under terms of Corporation Commission local service competition rules adopted March 7.

The commission's rules are awaiting approval by the Oklahoma Legislature. They

are expected to become effective before June 1.

In its application, AT&T sought approval to compete in local-exchange territories served by Southwestern Bell Telephone and GTE Southwest.

Before offering local-exchange service, AT&T must negotiate agreements with Southwestern Bell and GTE Southwest regarding the purchase of services and interconnection of networks in the territories where AT&T plans to compete, and file proposed tariffs and proposed service territory designations with the Corporation Commission 90 days prior to offering local-exchange service.

Startup of local-exchange service by AT&T could be delayed further if objections are filed to AT&T's proposals.

DATA FOR NEW AND EXPANDED FIRMS LOOKING UP

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Data collected by the Oklahoma Department of Commerce shows investments announced by new and expanding manufacturers and processors in the first quarter of 1996 has jumped in comparison with the first quarter of 1995. Investments alone totaled nearly \$28 million.

The report uses the following four numbers to measure growth in manufacturing firms; number of companies making announcements, number of jobs created within 3 years, number of jobs created within the project lifetimes and investment made.

Within the next three years, over 1,900 jobs will be created and over 2,300 jobs will be created over the project lifetimes. Compared to the same time last year, over 300 more jobs are expected over the project lifetimes. In 1996, both the number of companies making announcements and the number of jobs created by them in first three years almost doubled. In addition, over \$6 million more in investment is planned.

In the service sector, over \$93 million in investment was announced in the first quarter of 1996. During the next three years, service providers plan to increase employment by more than 4,300. Over the lifetime of the companies' projects, over 5,200 jobs are planned.

Service sector numbers are also higher than the first quarter 1995 report. The number of companies making announcements has

doubled. There were 300 more jobs created in 1996 than in the same period of 1995 in both areas measured; those jobs created within three years and jobs created within the project lifetimes. Investment has increased over \$70 million.

TRUTH IN SENTENCING JUST AROUND THE CORNER

■(GIT) Levels, matrix, schedules and enhancers are some of the new terms that may soon become common in Oklahoma courtrooms if **HB1138** becomes law. The bill enacts the Truth in Sentencing Act, changing the way Oklahoma sentences its convicted criminals. Lawmakers and state officials gathered at the Oklahoma Bar Center Wednesday to hear a presentation from the Truth in Sentencing (TIS) Policy Advisory Commission on the finer points of the bill.

"This is a viable product," said the bill's author, Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore.

Under the measure, convicted criminals would be expected to serve a minimum of 85 percent of their prison term before being eligible for parole or some type of community corrections program such as electronic monitoring. Currently, Oklahoma prisoners serve only approximately 15 percent of their term before being paroled.

"That is what truth in sentencing is all about," said commission member Bob Ravitz, "you know how much time an individual will actually serve."

One of the key points of the bill removes the responsibility of sentencing from juries and gives it to trial judges, except in capital

cases, where judges would continue to set sentences. The judge would determine the sentence by referring to four grids, or matrices, which clearly outline punishments based on the severity of the crime and prior criminal activity.

The four matrices (general felonies, drug crimes, sex crimes and driving while under the influence [DUI]) are divided into "levels," which determine the length and type of punishment, and "schedules," which determine the severity of the crime. Punishments range from under 1 month of a deferred sentence for theft crimes involving amounts under \$500, to 31 years in prison for manufacturing drugs.

Prior convictions are treated as "enhancers" to the sentencing process.

Departures from any level of the grid may be made with the consent of the prosecution, defense and judge or to any level on the grid based upon substantial assistance of the offender.

For the first time, judges would be involved in the plea bargaining process, which traditionally has involved only the prosecution and defense attorneys.

Stressing community corrections as a key part of truth in sentencing, Paul O'Connell, executive director of the commission, urged passage of the proposed Community Corrections Act.

Under the Department of Corrections (DOC), communities would be able to establish local boards to coordinate and administer sentencing options and assess long-term community sentencing needs.

"This provides an option to establish local community action boards to provide resources to increase the availability of statutorily authorized sentencing options and determine the long-range sentencing and treatment needs of the local community," O'Connell said.

He also stressed the importance of passing the Oklahoma Preadjudication Services Act as another step towards truth in sentencing.

Under the act, every felony arrest would include a urinalysis test to identify possible drug use. Offenders would also be subject to criminal history checks and a drug assessment inventory to better determine the best course of action.

HB1138 also requires stronger financial impact statements to accompany related fu-

ture legislation "so that the Legislature is better able to manage available [prison] beds and appropriate for new ones," Ravitz said. Along with that, the TIS Commission would be required to review each piece of legislation that impacts the state's criminal justice system.

Rep. Bill Paulk, D-Oklahoma City, voiced concerns about the provision, saying it would give the commission power to approve or disapprove legislation.

If the bill becomes law, it would not go into effect until 1998. The two year delay is to allow the new system to have a "trial run," giving state officials a chance to work out any problems and to gauge its cost. Schedule A (first degree murder) provisions, however, would go into effect immediately.

"Right now," said Attorney General Drew Edmondson, "we don't know what the impact would be because sentences don't mean anything anymore."

Edmondson referred to a recent Court of Criminal Appeals ruling, upholding the 30,000 year sentence — the state's longest — of a man convicted for raping a three-year-old girl.

Steidley said he expects the bill's conference committee to act on the measure sometime next week, with final action being taken before the Legislature adjourns May 31.

REPORT CARDS ARE NOT JUST FOR STUDENTS

■(GIT) To ensure "open" communication between communities and school districts the Secretary of Education, Dr. Floyd Coppedge, along with Governor Frank Keating, announced that schools will now have their own report cards, publicly proving their performance based on demographics and test scores.

Coppedge said the report cards have been sent to each school district for copying and distribution to parents and patrons before the end of the year. "This is an attempt to move Oklahoma back to parental and local involvement," he said. "This will also be used as a tool to show parents exactly how their school is doing."

Currently, elementary schools are above the national average in test scores. However, Oklahoma secondary students are below the national average based on ACT scores. "We have been making gains, but they are not adequate enough. Oklahoma students could be doing much, much better," Coppedge added. "I do not want to paint a dismal picture, but we ought to be concerned."

In addition, Coppedge suggested that curriculum and programs be strengthened.

The report card did not include data for national or regional comparisons. Coppedge and Keating said that the school report card program was new and could be amended to include such items.

The school report cards will be available to parents and communities through their local schools.

KEATING COMMENTS ON SCHOOL-TO-WORK

■(GIT) Governor Frank Keating said Thursday in a press conference that he would still not sign a bill for school-to-work as long as the state vocational-technical system was leading the program. Last week, Attorney General Drew Edmondson issued an opinion stating that the Executive School-To-Work Council created by the Governor would not continue to function beyond the last day of adjournment by the Legislature, unless during that session the Legislature statutorily creates the agency.

However, Keating said that any board that performs executive functions should always be appointed by the governor. Keating contended that it should be the responsibility of the Legislature and the governor to represent Oklahomans on the issue of school-to-work. "It is not the responsibility of career educators ... elected officials should be the voice for the people," he said.

"If this is a fundamental remake of the education system, then who's authorizing it ... vo-tech," Keating questioned.

SENATE BUSINESS & LABOR CONFIRMS KEATING APPOINTEES

■(GIT) The Senate Committee on Business and Labor unanimously confirmed nine of Governor Frank Keating's appointees Monday. Each serving a minimum of a four year term, the executive nominations filled vacant spots on the Oklahoma Accountancy Board, the Commission on Consumer Credit, the Oklahoma Employment Securities Commission and the Oklahoma Motor Vehicle Commission.

Longtime independent insurance agent and former member of the Board of Regents for Higher Education, Dean Corder, of Oklahoma City, was confirmed to serve a five year term on the Commission on Consumer Credits. He fills a vacant position that expires Jan. 1, 2000. Corder's nomination was carried by Sen. Keith Leftwich, D-Oklahoma City.

Corder was confirmed with a vote of 7 to 0.

Also appointed to the Commission on Consumer Credit, Terry Wyatt, of Hollister, sponsored by Sen. Gilmer Capps, D-Snyder, was confirmed with a vote of 11 to 0.

MAPS — THE BUDGET NUMBERS GAME

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) The MAPS budget numbers game continued late Tuesday afternoon as a MAPS Citizens Oversight Board subcommittee voted to rearrange — again — budget numbers dealing with parking in Bricktown, building permits for all nine projects and the cost of adding a consultant requested by the mayor. The effect

of Tuesday's actions was that the budget went up by \$1.5 million, then down by \$819,000, with no final figure on what the final cost really will be.

Members of the MAPS Finance Subcommittee were divided in their voting and opinions on several budget items, but overall agreed that the ultimate goal was to build MAPS properly and if that means spending an additional \$12 million as called for in the latest budget estimate, so be it.

Specifically, the subcommittee voted to:

- Recommend that the full MAPS Board reinstate \$1.5 million that had been eliminated from the budget for a 1,200-space parking lot in Bricktown.

- Recommend the deletion of deduction of \$819,000 worth of building permits called for by City officials. Previously there was discussion that the city would exempt itself from having to pay for building permits for public buildings, but pending city council budget talks and private sector pressure is said to be responsible for the change. City officials don't want to be seen as excusing themselves from paying for a permit that any other developer would have to pay.

- Recommend the overall budget as presented with the above exceptions.

Mayor's Proposed Consultant Questioned

Members of the subcommittee also called into question the need for the mayor's office to hire yet another MAPS consultant, this one to report directly to the mayor and council.

The idea for an additional consultant came about after bids for the Ballpark at Bricktown came in extremely over budget and internal sniping between city staff and hired MAPS consultants caused Mayor Ronald Norick to step in with a promise to "take control" of MAPS.

While generally applauded by most city hall observers, the Mayor's idea was questioned Tuesday by MAPS Citizens Oversight Board Member David Sellars. Sellars questioned the additional cost to MAPS funds to pay for the consultant as well as the additional layer of bureaucracy.

Local Business Plan Future — Uncertain

Meanwhile, the highly touted Local Business Utilization Plan — put into place as a resource for small disadvantaged or minority businesses — is in danger of running out of funding.

City officials and MAPS consultants said Tuesday that the program only has about \$60,000 in funding left which should carry the program through another four months. MAPS officials said they may recommend that the City take over the LBU process, although City officials said nothing has been determined at this point. COALITION FILES SUIT AGAINST STATE OFFICIALS TO COMPEL COMPLIANCE WITH ABORTION REGULATIONS; AG SAYS SUIT MISDIRECTED

■(GIT) A coalition of state legislators, a doctor, and a woman who has had two abortions filed suit Monday against the state Attorney General and the state Board of Health, alleging they have abrogated their responsibility to enforce state laws on abortion. Upon learning of the lawsuit in a press release, Attorney General Drew Edmondson accused those involved of "grandstanding."

The lawsuit was filed in Oklahoma County District Court by Rep. Bill Graves, R-Oklahoma City, a persistent opponent of abortion. The plaintiffs include 21 GOP legislators and one Democrat lawmaker, an Oklahoma City physician and an Oklahoma City woman. The plaintiffs contend that state health administrators and the state's chief law enforcement officer have refused to enforce two statutes adopted in 1963 to regulate abortions, particularly those performed in abortion clinics.

One regulation decrees, "No person shall perform or induce an abortion upon a pregnant woman subsequent to the end of the first trimester of her pregnancy, unless such abortion is performed or induced in a general hospital." The other statute cited by the plaintiffs declares, "An abortion otherwise permitted by law shall be performed only in a hospital ... which meets standards set" by the Health Department. The statutory definition of hospital encompasses abortion clinics, the plaintiffs contend.

The defendants have refused to honor their legal obligations to enforce the two laws because of an opinion issued 12 years ago by then-Attorney General Mike Turpen, the plaintiffs allege.

In 1984, Turpen asserted that both statutes were unconstitutional in light of the US Supreme Court ruling in Roe v. Wade in 1973 and City of Akron v. Akron Center for Reproductive Health in 1983. Another attorney general preceding incumbent Drew

Edmondson issued an opinion embracing Turpen's interpretation, the plaintiffs related.

However, the plaintiffs insist, the same day the nation's high court announced its decision in the Ohio case it also held in *Simopoulos v. Virginia* that regulation of abortions performed in abortion clinics was constitutional and consistent with the provisions of *Roe*. Also, the plaintiffs claim, the US Supreme Court subsequently "opened wide the door for regulation of abortion" by modifying *Roe v. Wade* in 1992 in *Planned Parenthood v. Casey*.

The plaintiffs also note that the Oklahoma Supreme Court held in *York v. Turpen* in 1984 that an attorney general's opinion declaring an act of the Legislature unconstitutional "is advisory only and not binding upon state officials until finally so determined by an action in a court of competent jurisdiction."

The plaintiffs ask the district court to issue writs of mandamus to compel the defendants to comply with state law and enforce state regulations on abortion clinics.

Defendants in the lawsuit are Drs. Dan Fieker, Gordon H Deckert, Glen Diacon Jr., Brent Smith, Jay A. Gregson and John B. Carmichael, along with Frank W. Merrick, Walter Scott Mason III and Beth Anita Gordon, all of whom are members of the Oklahoma State Board of Health; Dr. Jerry Nida, the state health commissioner; and Attorney General Drew Edmondson.

"Not one of the people named in this lawsuit have the capacity to file a criminal charge against anybody for violation of abortion laws," Edmondson said after learning of the lawsuit. "Only the district attorney in the jurisdiction of the clinics has that capacity."

Edmondson added that none of those involved in the lawsuit had spoken with him about their concerns.

"Clearly, this is nothing more than grandstanding. But this is not a harmless lawsuit. It is offensive to me that they are using the courts and taking my staff away from real work to make a political point. In fact, we are researching the possibility of recovering costs of this action."

Greenwood and Carolyn Coleman, both R-Moore; Rep. John Smaligo and Sen. Grover Campbell, both R-Owasso; Reps. Wayne Cozort, Fred Perry, John Sullivan and Mike Thornbrugh, all R-Tulsa; Rep. Scott Adkins, R-Broken Arrow; Rep. Wayne Pettigrew, R-Edmond; Rep. Richard Phillips, R-Warr Acres; Rep. Doug Miller, R-Norman; Rep. Jim Reese, R-Deer Creek; and Rep. Mike O'Neal, R-Enid.

Other plaintiffs are Dr. Craig Evans and Sharon Golmoradi, both of Oklahoma City.

ABORTION RULE EFFORT SIDETRACKS OMBUDSMAN BILL

■(GIT) An effort to protect the state's long-term care ombudsman program from federal budget cuts was sidetracked on Monday when a state lawmaker pressed for the addition of new language setting rules for abortion facilities.

Rep. Dan Webb, R-Oklahoma City, successfully challenged the acceptance of the conference committee report for **HB2407** and succeeded in having the bill returned to conference committee where the abortion facility rules were directed to be made a part of the bill. The bill, by Rep. Abe Deutschendorf, D-Lawton, would specify the purpose of the State Long-term Care Ombudsman Program to improve the quality of life and the quality of care of elderly citizens residing in long-term care facilities in Oklahoma.

Supporters of the bill, fearful of federal budget cuts, say the measure is necessary to help keep the program alive.

But Webb said his proposal, which directs the Board of Health to set rules which establish minimum safety standards for all entities which perform abortions and for the inspection of abortion clinics by the state's Department of Health, was "a matter of life and death."

Webb said he had learned from the health department that current statutes did not go far enough in giving the department the language it needed to deal with abortion clinics.

That point contradicts a claim made by plaintiffs in a lawsuit filed on Monday against the attorney general and Department of Health. The plaintiffs in that case, which includes 22 lawmakers, said the state's statutory definition of hospital is also applicable

to abortion clinics.

Several House members also expressed concern that if the abortion-related language is added to the bill that it would kill the original legislation. That was the case, Webb noted himself, in a bill by Rep. Mark Seikel, D-Harrah, that died in committee after efforts to add similar language.

Despite the apparent opposition on the floor to Webb's proposal, House members voted 40-53 against accepting the conference committee report as presented. Webb then requested and won approval for the bill to be returned to the conference committee with instructions to add his proposed language.

If the conferees cannot agree on the language, Rep. Jim Glover, D-Elgin, said in response to a question, the conference committee report can be brought back before the House and Deutschendorf can ask that the original report be considered.

WEBB SAYS OMBUDSMAN BILL KILLED BY AUTHOR, NOT AMENDMENT

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) "If Rep. Abe Deutschendorf is looking for the person who killed his bill, he need only look in the mirror," Rep. Dan Webb, R-Oklahoma City, said on Thursday.

Webb was referring to his proposed amendments to a bill that would have preserved the state's Ombudsman program for nursing home residents.

The controversy between the lawmakers began Monday when Deutschendorf, D-Lawton, brought up **House Bill 2407**. The measure would have preserved the State Long-term Care Ombudsman Program, which trains volunteers who monitor the treatment of nursing home residents.

Webb moved to send the bill back to a conference committee with instructions to attach two provisions relating to the regulation of abortion by the state Health Department.

The first provision requires the Health Department to promulgate rules on the safe termination of pregnancies. The second provision allows the department to levy a \$100 fine on medical professionals who fail to report they have performed an abortion.

The House overwhelmingly agreed with Webb and returned the bill to the conference committee with the instructions.

The instructions threatened the bill, Deuschendorf said, because Senate members of the conference committee would not agree to attach the amendments. That would result in the bill remaining in conference committee, effectively killing it.

If that happened, Deuschendorf would have the option of asking the House to release the instructions. In a story published in the Lawton Constitution, the Lawton lawmaker said he would ask the House to do just that.

"I am not unreasonable about this," Webb said. "If there was no way for this bill to go forward with the amendment attached, I believe the House would have released the conferees from the instructions."

"The problem is that Thursday was the deadline for him to have that motion. He didn't and if the bill dies, it is Abe Deuschendorf's fingerprints on the murder weapon."

Webb said he wants the bill to pass — with its original provisions and his amendments — and he encourages Deuschendorf to continue backing the bill.

MURCER "ANTI-SMOKING" AMENDMENT COULD STILL BECOME LAW

■(GIT) In a press conference held by the Oklahoma Junior Chamber of Commerce (Jaycees), Sen. Ed Long, D-Enid, said an amendment to **HB2494**, inspired by former New York Yankees baseball legend Bobby Murcer, would allow municipalities to enforce harsher penalties on merchants who sell tobacco to minors. However, the amendment was excluded from the bill when it was considered by the Legislature, and although the bill has now been transmitted to the governor for approval, Long said he will try to include the amendment in other legislation.

Although the Jaycees and Long said **HB2494** is good legislation, they believe that municipalities should be given more options for enforcing anti-smoking legislation in their communities. The Jaycees, in accordance with their anti-youth smoking program, are asking merchants statewide to sign a pledge restricting the access of tobacco products to minors.

Jaycees President Teresa Mullican commented on the Murcer amendment, explaining that it would allow cities to prohibit

placement of tobacco vending machines and self-service displays in areas accessible to minors. "The amendment would also establish a licensing requirement subjecting tobacco retailers to a seven-day license suspension for reoccurring violations," she said.

Barbara Nickles, Jaycees project manager for the "Against Youth Smoking" program, said that 21 Jaycee chapters are participating in the "Responsible Merchant Pledge" campaign. "If merchants lock up liquor, then they should lock up tobacco, it is a drug too," she said.

Nickles said that over 300 stores in Oklahoma, such as Git-N-Go and Seven-Eleven, have already signed the pledge. She explained that the Jaycees did accept an "unrestricted" grant from the R.J. Reynolds tobacco company to help fund their anti-smoking programs.

Dean Henderson, a former smoker and current policy chair for the Tobacco Free Oklahoma Coalition, said that tobacco lobbyists were part of the problem. "We need to take laws away from tobacco lobbyists ... it is time for lawmakers to tell tobacco lobbyists to take a hike."

Henderson said, in addition to lobbyists, a certain segment of the Oklahoma Grocers' Association was not taking anti-minor smoking issues seriously enough. "Out of the \$400 daily tobacco product sales by store owners, **HB2494** would only fine them \$25. That fine is too easy."

In response, Nance said he was "extremely" supportive of **HB2494**. "That law will go a long way in keeping tobacco out of the hands of youth," he said. In fact, Nance explained that when he was in the Legislature, he was the first to endorse legislation that prohibited merchants from selling smokeless tobacco to youth.

CONFERENCE COMMITTEE CONSIDERS SERVICES

■(GIT) A group of lawmakers and employees from state agencies involved in providing various human services in Oklahoma meet on Monday to discuss ways to improve those efforts.

While no specific plan was adopted, those on the panel agreed to work together toward creating a plan that gives greater control to local agencies and unifies state agencies behind a common set of goals.

At issue is **SB1237**, by Rep. Sean Voskuhl, D-Marshall, and Sen. Penny Williams, D-Tulsa, which creates the Family Centered and Community Designed Services Act.

A similar piece of legislation was vetoed last year, those on the panel noted, and those involved this year hope to draft something that will be acceptable to the governor, as well as the heads of those state agencies involved.

A consensus of the group, however, is that state agencies have resisted efforts to be unified behind a common set of goals.

Tom Kemper, executive director of the Oklahoma Commission on Children and Youth, said Oklahoma, unlike a number of other states, does not have a cooperative effort at the state level. That means, he explained, there are no funding priorities set and political influence, rather than needs, determines which programs are pushed each year.

"Until the state decides to set its priorities," Kemper said, "we won't have coordinated efforts."

While that assessment was echoed by many in the meeting, Secretary of Human Services Ken Lackey noted, "I think we can come up with some broad, shared goals, but in terms of developing a statewide plan, I don't think we can do that."

Lackey urged the committee to guard against developing another layer of government involvement and to allow successful local programs to continue their work.

Members of the committee expressed a hope to review programs implemented by other states before moving forward in the writing of any further legislation.

The committee is expected to meet again next Monday.

RYAN LUKE BILL PASSES HOUSE

■(GIT) House members voted overwhelmingly on Tuesday in favor of the so-called Ryan Luke child abuse prevention bill, moving the matter to the Senate for its consideration.

Consideration of the measure, **HB2053**, by Rep. Laura Boyd, D-Norman, had been delayed nearly a week while its author and conference committee members worked out concerns over the possible costs of the pro-

posal.

Boyd reiterated on Tuesday that the difference in the figures resulted from DHS' contention that the agency would need to add 20 caseworkers and 4 supervisors in order to meet the continuing monitoring provisions in the bill.

"We have no intention of creating a new division within DHS to fulfill this requirement," the Norman lawmaker said. Instead, she explained, the General Conference Committee on Appropriations is examining DHS' 1997 fiscal year funding request and is considering whether it will fund additional caseworkers.

Because of that, Boyd noted, a provision was added to the bill that makes the continuing monitoring provision dependent on the availability of funding.

Boyd also fielded questions from Rep. Danny Hilliard, D-Sulphur, who asked how a provision dealing with Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) would work. Boyd said the plan would require an annual commitment of \$260,000 from the legislature. That money would be allocated to the program's county-level branches as needed, Boyd added.

The most harsh questioning came from Rep. Carolyn Coleman, R-Moore, who said a constituent was "insulted" by a provision

requiring criminal background checks of adults coming in contact with child care facilities.

The woman, Coleman explained, had operated a home-based day care facility for 13 years without having to submit to such a check. Boyd said the thought "it is better to err on the conservative side to protect children," rather than to err in a way that might endanger children.

The House gave the measure a 99-0 passing vote. The measure now heads to the Senate, where it is expected to be considered and voted on for the last time before going to Governor Frank Keating's desk.

RYAN LUKE PASSES NEXT PHASE

■(GIT) The highly publicized "Ryan Luke Bill" passed the Senate today with a vote of 47-1. However, the Senate author of the measure, Sen. Ben Brown, D-Oklahoma City, made the motion for a reconsideration, so it may be few days before the bill crosses the governor's desk.

HB2053, modifies the requirements for those involved in child abuse and neglect situations, requires criminal history investigations of foster parent applicants and provides for prompt medical treatment for

abused children.

The measure also provides for a special review application to be made after removing a child from custody, states that no child shall be placed in the custody of any individual subject to the Oklahoma Sex Offenders Registration Act, provides for legal representation for abused children, transfers responsibility for removed children to the Oklahoma Office of Juvenile Affairs and provides for review and approval of training curriculum.

After a brief explanation of the conference committee report, which Brown said simply cleaned up the measure, Sen. Jerry Pierce, R-Bartlesville, had a few words to say about the bill.

"I realize everyone will vote for this bill. I am explaining why I don't think it does anything to change the system. All this bill is, is political hype about a serious issue. You all think by passing this, people will think we're doing wonderful things," Pierce said.

"We made a mistake by creating a bureaucracy to deal with child abuse. We need to break this up by returning power to the local police and sheriff's offices."

Pierce said that the current social worker network is leading to more fraudulent accusations of child abuse cases.

Pierce also expressed a concern regarding the stipulation in the bill which would require judges involved with domestic violence cases to attend seminars relating to those issues.

Pierce said these seminars would serve a specific organization's agenda to "brainwash" the judges.

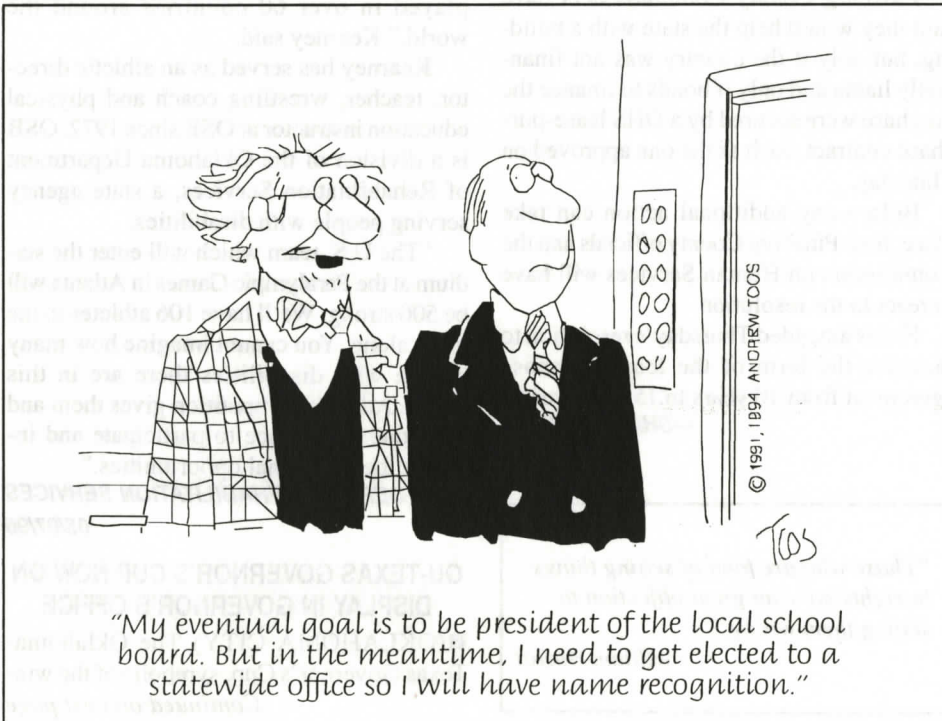
"Judges should be able to think for themselves and make judicial decisions based on their research, not some seminar," Pierce said.

Brown responded "This bill is not going to solve the problem, and I wish I could wave a magic wand and the problem would be gone. But it is to the point we have to do something, or nothing."

"There's a lot of good people doing the best they can to help these kids. I know there will be another year to address this problem, but in that year, how many kids will die? This is just one more piece of the puzzle."

Members of the Senate adopted the conference committee report and passed the measure with a vote of 47-1, with Pierce being the only opposing vote.

Later in session however, Brown made the motion to reconsider the vote in which the measure passed at a later legislative date. He has three days to bring the bill up again, or the bill will die.

DEPT. OF REHABILITATION SERVICES REOPENS SERVICES FOR NEW APPLICANTS

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) A \$1.5 million supplemental appropriation recently approved by the state House and Senate and signed by Governor Frank Keating has enabled the Oklahoma Department of Rehabilitation Services to reopen vocational rehabilitation and independent living services for applicants with severe disabilities, effective April 25.

As part of budget control measures implemented Dec. 12, 1995, Rehabilitation Services had been forced to place all eligible applicants for Visual and Rehabilitative Division services on waiting lists, based on the severity of their disabilities and dates of application. The agency has continued to provide services for more than 22,100 Oklahoma consumers who were receiving services on or before Dec. 12.

At this time, funds are not available to open services to all applicants. Individuals who do not meet the severe disability criteria will continue to be placed on waiting lists.

COMMISSION COMMITTEE ELIMINATES 70 POSITIONS

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) An Oklahoma Commission for Human Services committee met all day May 8 in Oklahoma City reviewing questionable positions identified in the recently released Peak Marwick study of the Department of Human Services Central administration.

Human Services committee chairman Joe Sam Vassar of Bristow said, "We were able to identify 70 of the 170 questionable positions as positions which could be eliminated. There are another 54 positions which may be eliminated; however, it would require help from the Oklahoma Legislature on providing retirement incentives."

Vassar, speaking for the committee said it would be important for the Legislature to also take action, giving DHS the right to

identify positions whose incumbents could be offered separation plans. The positions targeted would not need to be replaced.

After the nine-hour meeting, the committee directed DHS Director George A. Miller to have additional meetings with DHS division heads to identify other questionable positions that may be eliminated in the near or not-too-distant future.

The 170 positions reviewed is an adjusted and more accurate questionable positions figure, reflecting the agency's organizational structure and is different from the previous number of 220 positions reported originally in the Peat Marwick report.

NEW McALESTER DHS BUILDING APPROVED

■(GIT) A resolution approved Thursday by the House of Representatives clears the way for the construction of a new Department of Human Services office in McAlester.

SCR49, by McAlester lawmakers Sen. Gene Stipe and Rep. Lloyd Fields, authorizes the Commission for Human services to enter into a lease-purchase agreement for office space for local units of the Department of Human Services in Pittsburg County. The resolution was adopted Thursday by the House and has already received Senate approval.

Pittsburg County Commissioners have said they would help the state with a building, but only if the country was not financially liable and only if bonds to finance the purchase were secured by a DHS lease-purchase contract, such as the one approved on Thursday.

Before any additional action can take place, both Pittsburg County officials and the Commission on Human Services will have to react to the resolution.

Fields amended Thursday's resolution to increase the term of the lease-purchase agreement from 10 years to 15 to 20 years.

OSB ATHLETIC DIRECTOR TO COORDINATE PARALYMPIC AND OLYMPIC EVENTS

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Stephen Kearney, athletic director for the Oklahoma School for the Blind (OSB) in Muskogee, has been selected by the International Paralympic Committee to coordinate the sport of goalball for the 1996 Atlanta Paralympic Games.

The Paralympic Games are the country's second largest sporting event, bringing together over 4,000 athletes with disabilities from all over the world. The games have been held every Olympic year since 1960. This year, the city of Atlanta will host both the Paralympic Games as well as the 1996 Summer Olympics. The Paralympic Games are scheduled for August 15-25.

Kearney will work at both events; as competition manager for Paralympic's goalball and as an administrative staff assistant for the Olympiad's badminton games.

Goalball is a unique sport with a storied history. It was developed by two European men shortly after World War II as a way of encouraging recreational participation for the voluminous numbers of war veterans who were blind or severely visually impaired.

"The game (of goalball) has progressed every year since then. Right now, it's being played in over 60 countries around the world," Kearney said.

Kearney has served as an athletic director, teacher, wrestling coach and physical education instructor at OSB since 1972. OSB is a division of the Oklahoma Department of Rehabilitation Services, a state agency serving people with disabilities.

"The U.S. team which will enter the stadium at the Paralympic Games in Atlanta will be 500 strong. We'll have 106 athletes in the track alone. You cannot imagine how many people with disabilities there are in this world. Athletic competition gives them and everyone the chance to participate and increase their personal opportunities."

SQUIRREL SEASON RIGHT AROUND THE CORNER

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) May 15 is a date squirrel hunters know well. That's because it's the first day of Oklahoma's eight-month fox and gray squirrel season.

The season runs May 15 through Jan. 31, annually, and hunters are allowed 10 squirrels daily in aggregate, with 20 allowed in possession after the first day. Hunting hours are one-half hour before official sunrise to official sunset.

Most of the more than 70 Department-owned or managed wildlife management areas are open to squirrel hunting. Hunters considering a trip to one of these Department areas should consult the public hunting lands matrix in the 1995-96 Oklahoma Hunting Regulations booklet.

The Wildlife Department sells an 84-page atlas that contains maps of these public hunting and fishing areas. *Oklahoma Wildlife Management Areas* is available for \$5 if picked up at Department installations or \$7 by mail. DISASTER DECLARATION VITAL FOR OKLAHOMA

■(WASHINGTON) Oklahoma Senators Don Nickles and Jim Inhofe commented on the USDA disaster declaration announced Monday following their letter to Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman.

"This is good news for Oklahoma farmers," Nickles said. "Last year was one of the toughest years Oklahoma farmers have ever faced. ... The low interest loans provided by this long awaited declaration are badly needed to keep many Oklahoma farmers in business."

"I am pleased with the Administration's quick action in response to our request," Inhofe said. "This is good news for Oklahoma's farmers. Those who have suffered from drought related crop losses will now get the relief they so desperately need."

The declaration was announced Monday making low interest loans available for qualified Oklahoma farmers in all 77 Oklahoma counties.

USDA REFUNDS \$81.9 MILLION TO DAIRY FARMERS FOR REDUCED 1995 MARKETINGS

■(WASHINGTON) Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman said Monday that milk producers who reduced or did not increase their 1995 milk marketings from 1994 levels received refunds of their 1995 marketing assessments totaling \$81.9 million.

Eligible producers filed 37,896 applications and claimed refunds of \$81.9 million based upon reduced milk marketings of 52.0 billion pounds. Producers must have met eligibility requirements and claimed the refund by March 15, 1996.

The Federal Agriculture Improvement and Reform Act of 1996 terminated the authority to assess marketings of milk on and after May 1, 1996. Assessments collected through April 30, 1996, will be refundable. To be eligible for a refund, a dairy farmer must provide evidence that total milk marketed in 1996 did not exceed total marketing in 1995. However, if a producer quits dairying during 1996, the milk marketings for the months and days of production in the refund year, 1996, will be compared with

such milk marketings in the corresponding months and days of the base year, 1995.

INHOFE SAYS CLINTON VETO BLOCKS "BIGGEST JOBS BILL IN DECADES"

■(WASHINGTON) U.S. Senator James M. Inhofe (R-Okla.) said today that President Clinton stopped "the biggest jobs bill in decades" when he vetoed the Product Liability Reform bill last Thursday.

"Product liability reform is the biggest job creating bill to come up in years, if not decades," Inhofe said. "It means ending frivolous lawsuits and unleashing real economic growth. By vetoing this bill, President Clinton has sacrificed thousands of jobs and helped stifle what the American people desperately want: the resurgence of our domestic manufacturing base and our international competitiveness."

Inhofe, an original co-sponsor of product liability reform legislation in the Senate, had previously pushed through a similar aviation liability reform bill in the House. That measure, which was enacted into law, helped put America back in the aviation manufacturing business after years of decline. It was also one of the first bills to benefit from Senator Inhofe's successful effort in 1993 to end secrecy in the House's discharge petition rule.

The Product Liability Reform bill passed Congress with strong bipartisan votes: 59-40 in the Senate and 259-158 in the House. Opposition to the bill was spearheaded largely by one special interest group—the trial lawyers—which has contributed heavily to Clinton's campaigns. Recently, Clinton's threat to veto the bill was sharply criticized by a Democrat Senator who said: "Unfortunately, special interests and raw political considerations in the White House have overridden sound policy judgment."

Inhofe said he will help lead efforts in the Senate to override the President's veto.

CLINTON DECLARES MAY LABOR HISTORY MONTH

■(WASHINGTON) In the early 1900s, millions of Americans left their farms to begin new lives as factory workers. Sadly, many of these citizens found neither secure employment nor higher wages at their new jobs, and the industrial economy brought them exploitation, continued poverty, and the risk of injury and death. No student of American history can forget the images of filthy children emerging from mills and mines, the stories of terrible fires and explosions, or the grim legacy of the slums that grew up in factory towns.

Although child labor, sweatshops, and workplace disasters are largely horrors of the past, efforts to eliminate them began to succeed only after workers organized and spoke with a united, independent voice. The American labor movement helped the first generation of industrial employees to express their aspirations and insecurities, empowering them with the necessary tools to define the terms and conditions of their employment and to expand the role of labor in the larger society.

As we approach the 21st century, our Nation's economy is undergoing a transformation as momentous as the change that spurred the exodus from farms to factories 100 years ago. And in facing the challenges posed by global competition and rapid technological advances, the workers of the Information Age need the same effective leadership that allowed their forbears to succeed. Each new generation of workers must embrace the activism that has characterized labor's rich history, and all Americans should recognize the role that labor has played in the continuing progress of our democracy.

Now, therefore, I, William J. INHOFE SAYS PROPOSED DEFENSE BILL GOOD FOR OKLAHOMA

■(WASHINGTON) U.S. Senator James M. Inhofe, R-Okla., praised the Senate Armed Services Committee's work on the 1997 Defense Authorization bill, saying it wisely sought to correct serious deficiencies in the inadequate Clinton budget. Inhofe also said that strong consensus exists to fund important defense related projects in Oklahoma.

"The Senate Armed Services Committee has acted boldly to provide needed improvements to our national security posture," Inhofe said. "Oklahoma can be proud of the vital role it continues to play in our national defense. I am pleased that military facilities in our state can look forward to moving forward on important defense work in the coming years."

The proposed bill will next go to the Senate floor for debate and final action. A similar bill is working its way through the House. NICKLES SPONSORS BILL DEFENDING MARRIAGE

■(WASHINGTON) Oklahoma Senator Don Nickles announced Wednesday he will introduce legislation which defines the words "marriage" and "spouse" for purposes of federal law and allows each state to decide for itself with respect to so-called same-sex "marriages."

Nickles made the announcement at a news conference in Washington at which introduction of the Defense of Marriage Act was announced with House sponsors Rep. Steve Largent (R-OK) and Rep. Bob Garr (R-GA).

"This bill does two simple things," Nickles said. "First, the bill says marriage for federal purposes is the legal union between one man and one woman, and a spouse is a husband or wife of the opposite sex.

Second, it allows each state to decide for itself about same-sex marriages without other states' laws interfering.

"This bill merely reaffirms what Americans have meant for more than 200 years when using the word marriage and spouse. This common sense legislation is important and timely because of action currently underway at the state level to legalize marriages between persons of the same sex, which could have significant implications for other states and the federal government. This has extraordinary significance because of the definition of the words marriage and spouse determine how hundreds of rules and regulations dealing with income taxes, immigration, and federal employee or health benefits are administered."

COBURN PRAISES MOVE BY OKLAHOMA STATE MEDICAL ASSOCIATION

■(MUSKOGEE, OK) U.S. Rep. Tom Coburn on Friday praised a resolution by the state medical association which calls for "mandated HIV testing for pregnant women." He said Oklahoma is taking the lead in saving the lives of infants.

The move by the Oklahoma State Medical Association comes on the heels of congressional approval of the Coburn amendment, which may lead to mandatory testing of newborn infants.

Mandatory infant testing will occur if states fail to meet the stringent requirements set forth by the conference. The amendment was part of the Ryan White Care Act, which funds AIDS research.

"I think the move by the state medical association in Oklahoma demonstrates where health care policy is moving in this nation. It needs to move as quickly as possible so we can save the lives of as many infants as possible."

"With the President's signature of the Ryan White Care Act, and with these new requirements, I think we will see many state medical associations follow suit," Coburn said.

In a May 2 memorandum from Mary Anne McCaffree, vice-president of the Oklahoma State Medical Association, she wrote

that the group's original resolution recommended "routine" rather than "mandated" testing.

"The evidence that AZT given to HIV positive mothers reduces the incidence of infected babies from 25 percent to eight percent proved very compelling to the OSMA House of Delegates. Therefore, the resolution was amended into its current form which calls for mandatory testing for HIV in all pregnant women," McCaffree wrote.

DOE AGREES TO HELP KEEP OIL FLOWING

■(WASHINGTON) In a deliberate action to prevent a prolonged disruption in the flow of crude oil to 32 major refineries in America's mid-continent, the Clinton Administration Tuesday agreed to help an ARCO subsidiary resolve a temporary problem with a plugged pipeline.

The Department of Energy (DOE) has agreed to supply up to 1 million barrels from its Strategic Petroleum Reserve to ARCO under a short-term lease agreement. The crude oil will be used to help fill the Seaway System, a major interstate service that ARCO is expanding to ship crude oil from the Texas Gulf Coast to Cushing, Okla., a key distribution center to Midwest refineries.

ARCO is working to accelerate the flow of oil into the 30-inch Seaway pipeline because a smaller, companion pipeline it was using to supply the Cushing terminal has become temporarily blocked. This 20-inch pipeline is currently out of service, interrupting oil deliveries to Cushing.

Cushing is the distribution center to two refineries in Texas, nine refineries in Oklahoma and Kansas and 21 refineries in Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky. Maintaining an adequate supply of crude oil to these refineries at this time of year is especially crucial to meeting the higher summer demand for gasoline and avoiding additional upward pressure on gasoline prices.

Before ARCO can fully utilize the larger 30-inch Seaway pipeline, it must "pack," or fill, the line with approximately 2.5 million barrels of crude oil. To meet this need, the company approached DOE with an offer to

obtain up to 1 million barrels from the 60 million barrels of oil that the Government is storing at its Bryan Mound Strategic Petroleum Reserve site near Freeport, Texas.

DOE agreed to supply the oil under a lease arrangement. Under terms of the lease, ARCO will pay the Federal Government a fee for leasing the crude oil. Within the next six months, ARCO will replace the oil with an equivalent grade of crude, plus pay any price differential if oil prices fall during the lease term.

ARCO Pipe Line Co. operates Seaway Pipeline Company, which is a partnership between subsidiaries of Los Angeles-based ARCO and Phillips Petroleum Company of Bartlesville, Okla.

The Century recall involves 11,000 Century SmartMove Model 4750 convertible child safety seats manufactured between Nov. 27, 1995 and Feb. 13, 1996. They are being recalled because a mismatch of latching components could allow the buckle to release during a crash.

By this action a state employee will not be prevented from participating in these or other types of private organizations.

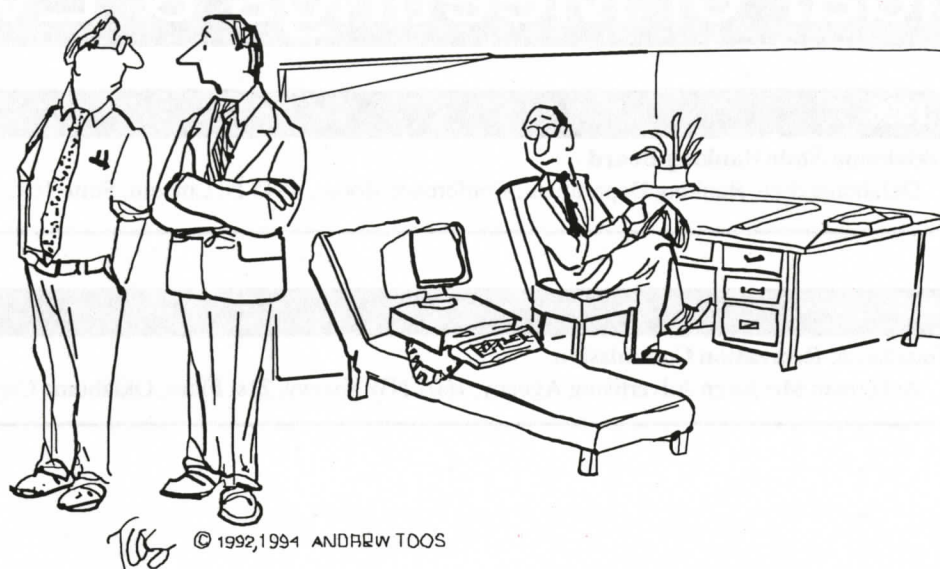
