LEGISLATURE MEETS DEADLINE, NEARS ADJOURNMENT

■(GIT) The week concluded much the same way it began for lawmakers — on a fast pace.

Friday marked the deadline for fourth reading and final passage of measures containing appropriations and with the exception of one agency — the Department of Transportation — lawmakers successfully brought funding measures to the floor for consideration and passage.

The Department of Transportation will not be without money despite the failure of the bill to make it to the legislative floors for consideration, House General Conference Committee on Appropriations chairman Rep. Jim Hamilton, D-Poteau, said. That's because lawmakers need to hold one bill for final certification of next fiscal year's revenue by the Board of Equalization.

If there's more additional money than first believed, Hamilton said, it will likely make its way into the transportation bill. That bill, the appropriations chairman added, will include \$7.5 million in growth revenue, as well as \$6.5 million from the general appropriations bill approved earlier in the session and \$7.5 million from the Rural Economic Action Plan, **HB1434**, approved last week and signed by the governor.

While the bulk of lawmakers' attention was focused on state spending, other signifi-

cant matters also crossed their desks.

The Senate took up and passed two once controversial bills and passed them quickly and easily to the House for consideration.

SB1100, the massive education reform bill, passed by a significant margin after only a few questions about minute points of the bill. The measure resulted in the better part of a day's worth of Senate debate earlier in the session.

Similarly, **SB1200**, the community corrections bill, passed the Senate and is headed to the House. The bill would place offenders in the hands of authorities where the crime occurred. After extensive questioning that led to the rejection of the bill's confer-

ence committee report, the bill won Senate approval.

Both issues await House consideration sometime during the legislature's final four days next week.

Representatives also gave Senators an issue to consider next week in the form of **HB2670**. The bill, which passed the House without discussion or debate, increases to \$24 the Department of Corrections payments to county jails holding state inmates.

Two bills related to property tax reform are headed to the governor's desk — **SB681**, dealing with homestead exemptions, and **HB2981**, proposing three constitutional amendments related to property tax reform.

COMMUNITY CORRECTIONS ON HOLD IN HOUSE

■(GIT) The bill that will allow municipalities to provide alternative sentencing options for their local offenders is on hold this week. Still in its conference committee, the bill was expected to be heard by the House Friday after it passed the Senate late Thursday.

SB1200, by Sen. Herb Rozell, D-Tahlequah, creates the Oklahoma Community Corrections Act. It offers counties, through the creation of local community ac-

tion boards, the opportunity to sentence local first and second time non-violent offenders to a variety of community sentencing options, including community service projects and house arrest.

County sheriffs are opposed to sections of the bill that would, they say, place large financial and personnel requirements on county governments.

Prisoners sentenced under the bill would become the responsibility of the county they were sentenced in, not the state Department of Corrections, leaving medical costs to be paid by the county.

A document from the Oklahoma Sheriff's Association (OSA) states the bill would also create possible personal liability for members of the local advisory councils. Contracting for goods and services, hiring and firing personnel and renting or purchasing property top the list of potential problems for counties.

OSA officials are worried that, while the concerns may be covered in the bill, it may not be enough to remove counties from liability.

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LAWMAKERS DISPLEASED WITH RETIREMENT TAP

■(GIT) A plan to use funds from the state's judicial retirement fund for one-time improvement projects has drawn the wrath of several lawmakers.

SB805, Rep. Wayne Pettigrew, R-Edmond, said Friday "is a recreation of Frankenstein's monster. It could do to the State Judicial Retirement Fund what the legislature did to the Oklahoma Teachers Retirement System."

At issue is a plan to use money from the retirement fund for a statewide court automation program and a Supreme Court security project. The bill passed both the House and Senate on Thursday and is headed to the governor's desk for his consideration.

The judicial pension system provides retirement coverage for some 412 active and retired judges and their beneficiaries, records indicate, and the fund has reserves to meet 117 percent of its long-term obligations.

It is the only one of the state's six retirement systems whose actuarial soundness exceeds 100 percent, Pettigrew said.

Pettigrew and others claim the bill violates the state constitution, specifically the State Question 645 provision that requires "all proceeds, assets and income" of state retirement systems "to be held, invested or disbursed" only "to provide benefits, re-

funds, investment management and administrative expenses."

The system is underwritten with 10 percent of all receipts from court clerk offices across the state, coupled with retirement contributions from the participating judges. SB805 calls for those funds to be deposited

in the Supreme Court Revolving Fund for implementation of the computer system and security enhancements once the system is fully funded for the coming year.

Last year's surplus funding, according to state courts director Howard Conyers, exceeded \$1.2 million.

If one retirement system is overfunded, Pettigrew said, "the only place the excess funds would go to is to help other retirement

"We are concerned if the state can legislate away a county's liability," said OSA Executive Director John Walsh.

Rozell blasted Walsh Thursday from the Senate floor, accusing him of disseminating false information.

"I don't know where Mr. Walsh got his problems [with this bill]," Rozell said, further claiming he never received information he requested from Walsh.

"There may be a difference of interpretation," Walsh told *Capitol Network News*, "but I have had several attorneys knowledgeable in law enforcement look at that document and there is no misinformation in it."

In a letter sent to Rozell in November of 1995, one Rozell claims he never received, Walsh said, though his association has problems with specific points of the bill (then **SB671**), community corrections is a concept he supports.

"The difficulties we find..., although numerous, should not be construed as our being opposed to the concept," he said in the letter, which urges Rozell to adopt an earlier version of the bill originally proposed by the Truth in Sentencing Policy Advisory Com-

Governor Frank Keating was also busy this week, signing a number of important pieces of legislation. Among those signed by the governor were **HB1621**, giving private employer retirees a \$5,500 tax exemption phased in over five years; **HB2055**, the permanent midterm funding solution and **HB2824** which provides midterm funding and taps the Rainy Day Fund; **HBs 1434** and **2830**, creating and funding the so-called Rural Economic Action Plan; and **SB680**, banning bear wrestling, horse tripping and increasing the fines for certain kinds of assault and battery.

The governor has yet to veto any major bills. Keating has five days to sign or veto legislation sent to him by the legislature or the proposal automatically becomes law. The governor will have 15 days after the end of session to sign bills presented to him or they will be considered automatically vetoed.

After taking a holiday on Monday, only four legislative days remain in the session.

"It is sad that this has to become a personal attack instead of just dealing with the issue," Walsh said.

Sen. J.R. "Dick" Wilkerson, D-Atwood, supporter of the Rozell bill, also said misinformation had been distributed about the measure.

"I have never seen so much disinformation on a bill," he said. "It [the bill] gives us more tools to work with."

Wilkerson added that 57 percent of Oklahoma's prisoners are non-violent offenders.

After passing the House on Wednesday, the bill's House author, Rep. Jari Askins, D-Duncan, was seen throughout the day approaching fellow House members, role call card in hand, presumably attempting to drum up support for the bill.

The bill is scheduled to appear on the House floor for consideration next week. The measure will have to be addressed quickly, before the Legislature adjourns on Friday.

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ENERGY TAX INCENTIVES ADVANCED, LEGISLATION WILL PRESERVE JOBS, REVENUE

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) The Oklahoma Legislature is making good on its promise to deliver targeted tax incentives to the state's energy industry, reaching final agreement on legislation that will help preserve Oklahoma's existing oil and gas infrastructure.

"We've made a concerted effort to keep one of Oklahoma's most important industries alive and profitable," said Senator Stratton Taylor, President Pro Tempore of the Oklahoma Senate. "We don't want to see any more energy jobs lost or another well plugged because of an unrealistic tax code."

"This is consistent with our policy of tying targeted tax incentives directly to economic development," added House Speaker Glen D. Johnson. "The energy industry has been the backbone of the Oklahoma economy for so many years, and can continue to be a contributor if we give it the tools to grow."

SB911, dubbed "Project ALARM" (Adding Life to At-Risk Marginal wells) by its supporters, would provide tax incentives to marginal or low-producing oil wells. It would involve gross production tax refunds and other tax changes that would assist owners of marginal wells. The incentives will total \$14 million annually.

"The gross production tax should not be responsible for the plugging of a single well," said Sen. Kevin Easley, author of SB911. "Plugged wells mean lost jobs and lost revenue. If we can keep those wells operating by offering a few tax incentives, both the state and the energy industry will benefit."

Larry Rice, House author of SB911. "If we can maintain a strong oil and gas infrastructure, we can preserve thousands of jobs and millions of dollars in revenue for future generations in Oklahoma."

Some 2,000 oil and gas wells are abandoned in Oklahoma in 1994 alone. If those wells had remained active, according to the Interstate Oil and Gas compact commission, Oklahoma would have reaped a number of economic benefits including:

- ✓ 1.4 million more barrels of oil production;
- ✓ \$28 million in product revenues;
- ✓ \$2 million in gross production taxes;
- ✓ More than 250 jobs or the equivalent of a \$3 million a year payroll.

According to the Oklahoma Independent Petroleum Association, the oil and gas in-

dustry accounts for about 12 percent of the state gross product with an overall economic impact of \$8 billion. More than 35,000 Oklahomans work in the industry.

systems that are in danger of default — not to a computer system."

The issue was a point of heated discussion on Thursday, when House members voted 48-47 to adopt the bill's conference committee report and voted 58-38 in favor of the bill.

Rep. Larry Roberts, D-Miami, first brought the matter to the House's attention, comparing the bill to the state constitution's provision.

"This bill diverts those (retirement) funds," Roberts said, "and that's unconstitutional."

Rep. Howard Cotner, D-Altus, who moved from his usual speaking place at the side of his desk to the podium at the front of the House chamber, said the bill was an unconstitutional effort to divert the judicial retirement funds.

"It's not a unique thing to say we're violating the constitution," Cotner said. "We've done it time and time and time again whenever this body decided it wanted to help certain people. I really don't expect this to change your mind, but it's wrong, wrong, wrong."

Rep. Bill Settle, D-Muskogee, said it was court fees, not retirement contributions, that would be used for the plan.

"All this bill is saying is that once the retirement system's funding is at a certain that the court fees don't have to be remitted," Settle said.

He was supported in that view by Rep. Loyd Benson, D-Frederick, who authored much of the language in State Question 645.

"To say this would divert funds is inaccurate," Benson said. "The intent of this piece of legislation is to use the money generated by the court for the court system."

Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore and the House author of the bill agreed, comparing the points of disagreement to a glass of water:

"The constitution describes what you do with the water once it's in the glass," he said, "but this bill is different, telling us how to put the water in the glass."

"It's not wrong and it's not bad management."

SPEED LIMIT BILL PASSES SENATE

■(GIT) The long-awaited measure aimed at finalizing Oklahoma's speed limits passed the Senate Friday. Until now, legislators had been meeting on the bill, trying to iron out how fast Oklahoma motorists would be allowed to drive.

SB685, by Sen. Keith Leftwich, D-Oklahoma City, sets speed limits at 75 mph on turnpikes and rural segments of the state's intestates, as designated by the Transportation Commission. Two-lane superhighways and four-lane divided highways are also set at 75 mph. Other highways are set at 65 mph.

The bill also set speed limits on unmarked county roads at 55 mph, unless otherwise posted by the county. There was some concern that the cost of posting signs would be difficult for many counties to bear.

Counties are allowed to place signs at county line markers stating the maximum speeds within that county unless otherwise posted.

"This is something that the governor, the secretary of transportation and Sen. Stipe (Chairman of the Senate Transportation Committee) have all agreed on," Leftwich said Friday.

The bill also addresses an issue addressed in an earlier bill by Sen. Frank Shurden, D-Henryetta, regarding speed traps on state highways.

Under the measure, law enforcement officials will have authority over portions of federal aid primary highways located on the outskirts and within the boundaries of any municipality.

The bill clarifies that such authority is

STATE HOUSE LOWERS THE BOOM ON UNDERAGE DRUNK DRIVERS

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) The Oklahoma House of Representatives voted — without opposition — to lower the boom on drivers under the age of 21 who illegally use alcohol or other controlled dangerous substances.

The House approved **Senate Bill 1230** on a 97-0 vote Friday and sent the measure to the Governor. Rep. Laura Boyd, D-Norman, sponsored the measure along with Sen. Ben Brown, D-Oklahoma City, and Sen. Helen Cole, R-Moore.

"This bill seeks to stop underage drinking and driving, but more importantly, it seeks to prevent it in the first place," Boyd said. "This bill really is 'zero tolerance' for the first time."

Drivers under the age of 21 who have "any measurable quantity" of alcohol in their blood, or who exhibit evidence of being under the influence of any other intoxicating substance, would lose their license for six months.

A blood alcohol level of as low as .02 percent would be grounds for suspension. A single beer would register a .02 percent blood alcohol level.

On a first offense, violators of the law would be fined from between \$100 and \$500, or ordered to complete 20 hours of community service, or the complete a treatment program. The violator could be punished by any combination of the above sanctions.

On a second or subsequent offense, the fine could be as high as \$1,000 or by completion of 40 hours of community service, or treatment.

Boyd said the bill was important because even though drivers under the age of 21 make up only 9 percent of the population, they are involved in 16 percent of fatal traffic accidents. Eight of every 10 accidents involving drivers under the age of 21 are alcohol related.

Besides lowering the boom, Boyd said the treatment authorized under the bill could help a young person avoid destroying their life with drugs or alcohol.

"Anything we can do to turn a young person around pays huge dividends in the future," she said.

Passage of the measure also assures pro-

tection of \$11 million in federal funds allocated to Oklahoma for 1998. The federal government has mandated states pass a bill to curb underage drinking and driving or risk a portion of the dollars allocated to them.

Boyd said she expects Governor Keating to sign the bill into law.

FARM BUREAU COMMENDS BOARD OF AGRICULTURE

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) The Oklahoma Board of Agriculture's unanimous decision May 22 not to impose a ban on grain shipments or custom harvesters from states under Karnal bunt quarantine was commended by Oklahoma Farm Bureau.

"We appreciate the leadership Agriculture Secretary Dennis Howard and the Board of Agriculture exhibited by making the no quarantine decision," said Eldon Merklin, Farm Bureau president.

The Board of Agriculture adopted a resolution supporting the USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) efforts to control Karnal bunt. The resolution also omitted a state-imposed quarantine on grain or equipment from areas known to be infected with Karnal bunt.

"The imposition of an Oklahoma ban would have sent an erroneous message to our trading partners that our national system does not work to guarantee the safety and wholesomeness of the American food supply," said Merklin.

The United States exports in excess of \$4 billion worth of wheat annually, with much of the supply coming from Oklahoma hard red winter wheat producers.

Merklin also commended the Board of Agriculture for taking steps to compile a list of custom cutters who have been in Karnal bunt infected areas. Those cutters will be checked, and if approved, certified as Karnal bunt free.

"Oklahoma producers now can contact the state Department of Agriculture to make sure the custom cutter entering their field has been certified as Karnal bunt free," said Merklin.

"Farm Bureau also believes our state wheat growers should exercise caution when they purchase seed wheat for next year's crop," he concluded. "Producers should ask their suppliers where the seed was produced and obtain assurances it did not come from a Karnal bunt infected area."

SENATE ASSURES CONTINUED FUNDING FOR OMBUDSMAN CARE PROGRAM FOR ELDERLY

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Friday, the state Senate passed a measure designed to protect the rights of nursing home residents should the Congress in Washington DC cut the funding for Oklahoma's Long-Term Care Ombudsman Program.

The ombudsman program trains and supervises a network of more than 240 volunteers, who spend at least four hours a week monitoring nursing home care and serving as advocates for nursing home residents.

Senator Jim Maddox, author of the original ombudsman measure, said **Senate Bill 1177** guarantees full funding for the ombudsman program if its funds are cut at the federal level.

"Older Americans have made our country and our state what they are today," said Maddox, D-Lawton. "As our populations ages, our nursing homes are serving more people who are in more frail condition than in the past. We must fund the ombudsman program to ensure that these men and women receive the high-quality of care they need and deserve."

Maddox said Congress is considering cutting about \$50,000 from the funding of Oklahoma's ombudsman program.

Under SB1177, the state will replace any federal funds cut from the Ombudsman program.

"Fifty-thousand dollars is a small price to pay for the welfare of Oklahoma's seniors," said Maddox.

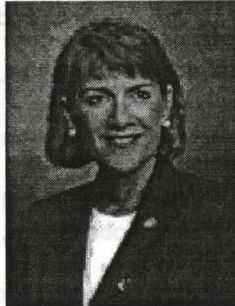
The bill now awaits final consideration in the House of Representatives.

limited to low land use density, absence of any school or residential subdivision requiring direct traffic flow from the highway, coupled with low highway traffic and a scarcity of retail and commercial businesses along the highway.

The commissioner of public safety is authorized to grant the special law enforcement authority.

Department of Transportation officials were unable to comment on the bill, stating it was a legislative matter that has yet to be resolved.

The bill is expected to appear before the House next week.



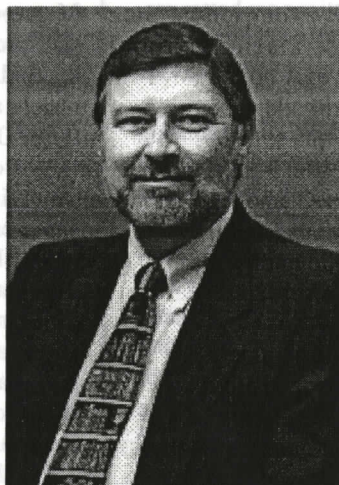

DEPARTMENT OF LIBRARIES MEETS TRADITIONAL, NEW NEEDS

Some cyberpunks and Internet surfers think the Information Age will lead to the death of public libraries. But that won't be the case according to Robert L. Clark, Jr., Director of the Oklahoma Department of Libraries (ODL), the state agency that assists with public library development and information sharing.

"I equate the idea that libraries are dying with the concept of the paperless society," Clark said. "We're actually generating more paper than ever now that computers have entered the workforce."

A REFUGE

Clark said bookstores never put libraries out business. "There will always be a need for a community repository of information in a democratic society," he said. "In fact, on-line information is simply giving libraries another tool to serve their patrons. Librarians are experts at organizing and finding information quickly. And the library may be the last refuge for citizens without a computer and modem."

But libraries are restructuring themselves to take advantage of the new information technology. And ODL is helping.

The Department has used federal funds to equip Oklahoma's public libraries with the necessary hardware and software to access and share electronic information. A library catalog listing the holdings of more than 800 libraries in the state has been available in CD-ROM format for the past three years, and made its on-line debut this spring.

"We're also investigating purchasing other on-line databases for use statewide," Clark said. "And ODL will have a site on the World Wide Web by this summer."

Meanwhile, the Department's library consultants are hosting more technology-oriented workshops and doing more technical training out in the field to help libraries utilize the Internet and other on-line databases.

The changing information scene, along with the increasing competition for government funds, has lead ODL to embark on an ambitious new strategic long range plan for serving its library and state government customers.

"We've spent the past year gathering information and conducting surveys, and we're now in the decision-making process," Clark said. "We are finding out how to meet our customers' demands in the most efficient and effective way."

FULFILLING ITS ORIGINAL MISSION

ODL, like other libraries, is walking a tightrope between traditional services and new information technologies. Libraries are expected to offer access to electronic information, but citizens still want books, magazines, reference services and library programs, such as storytimes for children. More than anything, it's causing a budget crunch for libraries.

"The cost of library materials is rising, but libraries are also expected to invest money in computer hardware, long distance phone charges, and expensive on-line services," said Clark.

Training staff and patrons in information access also adds to the burden, and libraries are having to make some tough choices.

Tough choices are not new to ODL. The agency has grown from a small library established by the Territorial Legislature in 1891. Today, the Department's Jan Eric Cartwright Memorial Law Library in the State Capitol Building continues the original mission of the first territorial library: To provide legislative and legal reference to Oklahoma's elected officials and government employees.

Other divisions and collections of the department include:

- ✓ The State Archives, which houses important historical documents for posterity, including papers of governors, the Supreme Court and Secretary of State records;
- ✓ The Records Management Division, responsible for assisting state agencies with storing, maintaining and disposing of state government records according to Oklahoma law;
- ✓ The US Government Information Division, a regional deposi-

ODL's AWARD WINNING LITERACY CAMPAIGN

The Oklahoma Department of Libraries successful state-wide literacy awareness campaign "Learn to Read and the World Opens Wide," is a winner in the 1996 John Cotton Dana Library Public Relations competition.

tory of federal government documents since 1891, and a point of access to electronic government information;

✓ The Oklahoma Publications Clearinghouse, which manages the state's depository library program, insuring the public access to state government publications and documents; and

✓ Information Services, which provides reference, book circulation and interlibrary loan to state government agencies and employees.

In addition to serving state government and libraries, ODL also assists the general public through its unique collections. The agency is also responsible for publishing the Oklahoma Almanac, formerly called the Directory of Oklahoma, a major reference source on Oklahoma government and the state.

THE MORE THINGS CHANGE ...

While technology is affecting how ODL delivers its services and maintains its collections, Clark said some services will change little. Two cases in point: the Summer Reading Program for children, and the adult literacy program.

This summer, thousands of children will participate in Panda-Monium in the Library,

the 28th statewide reading program offered through the Department of Libraries. Storytimes, entertainment and reading contests will be featured.

"Many smaller libraries don't have the funds to purchase materials individually for summer programs," Clark said. "It's a lot cheaper to order large quantities of bookmarks, reading logs and posters and share them with libraries throughout the state."

Clark said children who continue to read during their summer vacations are better prepared for the school year. "And the summer program makes reading fun for kids, and kids love to have fun."

Adult literacy programs are benefiting from special computer tutorial programs, but the anchor of the program is the one-on-one tutoring between a volunteer and adult new reader. "Libraries have addressed the problems of adult functional illiteracy better than any other institution in America," Clark said.

"There is little funding for literacy, but generous people throughout the state are volunteering their time and skills to improve the lives of their fellow citizens. Almost 100 volunteer literacy councils are operating around the state, most of them through the local public library."

The ODL Literacy Office has been honored with a national library public relations award this year for its statewide campaign 'Learn to Read and the World Opens Wide.' More than 2,800 new tutors and adult new readers were recruited by councils around the state.

Clark said the literacy program is an example of the impact the agency is able to make with limited staff and resources.

"The Kentucky State Library and Archives has similar duties to the Oklahoma Department of Libraries. The Kentucky Library has 140 employees. We have 80 employees. I'm not saying we wouldn't benefit from having a larger staff, I'm saying the Oklahoma citizens get a lot of bang for their buck," said Clark.

Libraries, Clark said, are among the most efficient public institutions in the country. A 1993 Gallup Poll found that public libraries receive less than one percent of all tax dollars, but are used by more than 50 percent of the population.

By efficiently using that money to meet the traditional needs of library patrons and to rise to the challenge of rapidly changing technology, the Oklahoma Department of Libraries shows THAT'S GOOD FOR OKLAHOMA!

Robert Clark joined the Oklahoma Department of Libraries as Director in September, 1976. He was not a stranger to the ODL, as he had worked there from 1968 to 1973, first as Director of the Division of Archives and Records and then as Data Processing Coordinator. After leaving ODL, he worked in Mississippi, first for the Jackson Metropolitan Library System and then as Director of the Mid-Mississippi Regional Library System.

In addition to his duties as director of ODL, Clark also serves as Secretary of the Archives & Records Commission, Secretary of the Library Services & Construction Act Advisory Council, and is a member of the State-wide Data Processing and Telecommunications Committee.

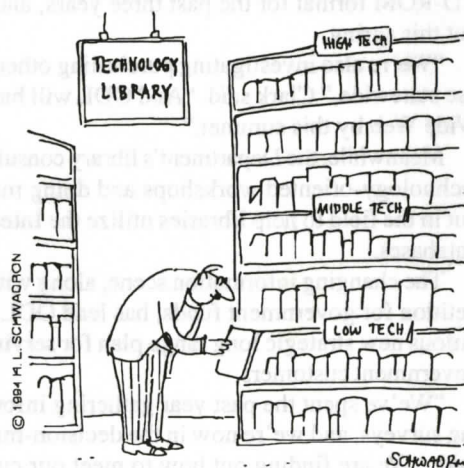

AGRICULTURE

MOISTURE BRINGS END TO BURNING BAN FOR MOST COUNTIES

■(GIT) Governor Frank Keating issued a proclamation Monday revoking the recent burning ban for all counties in Oklahoma except Beaver, Beckham, Cimarron, Harmon, Jackson, Kiowa, Texas and Washita. The proclamation was supported by information from the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture. The Department concluded that pasture conditions are improving, but above average temperatures and high winds continue to dry residual moisture.

Considering the weather, southwestern Oklahoma wheat farmers will begin harvest early this week.

Amid row crops, producers have started preparing seedbeds and planting sorghum, soybeans, peanuts, and cotton. However, corn planters have now completed their planting, ahead of schedule. In addition, alfalfa hay's first cutting progressed to 49 percent.

Changing to something sweeter, watermelons and strawberries were rated by the Department to be in fair condition. Watermelon planting remained active with 82 percent planted.

Cattle marketings continue below average, but they have shown an increase in movement. Livestock conditions are rated fair, and insect activities are light to moderate across the state.

Keating's proclamation will be distributed at the Department of Public Safety, the Oklahoma Department of Tourism and Recreation, the State Fire Marshal, the South Central Interstate Forest Fire Protection Compact, the Secretary of the Environment and to the sheriffs of Oklahoma's 58 counties, where the burning ban has been raised.

LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICIALS HONORED IN STATE SENATE

Senate on Monday.

Latimer's family has been recognized at the National Police Officers' Memorial in Washington DC where Deputy Latimer's name was placed on the memorial. Latimer's name has also been placed on the Oklahoma Police Officers' Memorial in Oklahoma City.

Attending the ceremony at the Senate were Latimer's wife Stacy, her mother Linda Stewart, Latimer's mother Brenda all from Geronimo and Cotton County Sheriff Melvin Copeland.

HOUSE GCCA ADVANCES FOUR BILLS

■(GIT) The House division of the General Conference Committee on Appropriations gave 'do pass' recommendations late Monday afternoon to four bills, moving a small step closer to completing its budget work.

The four bills receiving 'do pass' recommendations include **SB806**, **HB1777**, **HB1787** and **HB1800**.

SB806 makes appropriations to the House of Representatives and the Senate, as well as the Legislative Service Bureau. The House will see a 4.5 percent increase under the terms of the bill, while the Senate's increase will be 4.8 percent. Both increases are the result of the \$1,200 across-the-board annual pay raise approved for state employees earlier this year.

In addition to the pay raise for employees of the Legislative Service Bureau, an additional \$1.8 million will be appropriated to the agency with the bulk of the money — \$1.75 million — going toward computer hardware and software upgrades and the

balance being dedicated to intergovernmental association dues.

HB1777 appropriates funds to the offices of the governor and lieutenant governor. Through the general appropriation bill already approved, the governor's office will receive an additional \$298,000. **HB1777** will pump an additional \$66,267 earmarked for the state employees pay raise. The two bills combined will raise the appropriation to the governor's office by 18.5 percent.

The lieutenant governor's budget increases only 3.6 percent or \$14,923 under the terms of the bill. That money, too, is earmarked for the state employee pay raise.

In addition to funding the employee pay raise, **HB1787** appropriates \$200,000 for replacement of revolving funds, \$50,000 for moving expenses, \$35,000 for the County Government Commission and \$80,000 to data processing equipment upgrades to the Office of the State Auditor Inspector. The employee pay raise and other appropriations increase the auditor's budget by some 15.4 percent.

The same bill also reduces the appropriations to the Office of State Finance by 1.4 percent or by \$123,912. While adding some \$200,858 to the office's budget to cover the costs of the state employee pay raise, more than \$325,000 were cut from the office's budget in the general appropriations bill approved earlier in the session.

The bill increases funding to the Oklahoma Tax Commission by 4.2 percent or \$1.8 million. The bulk of that money — more than \$1.6 million — is dedicated to the state employee pay raise, while \$135,000 will be spent for the administration of **HB2102** and \$45,000 will be used to implement a fax-on-demand system.

HB1787 also provides for a 4 percent increase in the amount appropriated to the Office of State Treasurer. Some \$70,000 will be appropriated to the office under the terms of the bill in addition to more than \$100,000 for the employee pay raise.

HB1800 includes appropriations to the Commission on Children and Youth, the Office of Handicapped Concerns, the Human Rights Commission and the Indian Affairs Commission.

In addition to more than \$31,000 earmarked for employee pay, the Commission on Children and Youth will receive \$174,000 for expansion of the Court Appointed Spe-

cial Advocate (CASA) system mandated by **HB2053**, the so-called Ryan Luke child abuse prevention bill. Other appropriations in the bill included \$7,000 for the Child Death Review Board and \$20,900 for a child abuse medical examiner.

In addition to funds already appropriated to the Office of Handicapped Concerns, the bill appropriates \$10,034 to the office for the employee pay plan increase. Similarly, the Human Rights Commission would receive \$34,013 for the pay plan, as well as an additional \$23,000 to fund one full time equivalent.

Continued operating funds of \$26,000 will be appropriated to the Indian Affairs Commission under the terms of the bill, as well as \$7,044 for the state employee pay raise.

APPROPRIATIONS BILLS PASSED

■(GIT) Five appropriations bills received approval on Tuesday in both the House and the Senate, and the House moved forward on three more funding bills, as well.

Receiving approval in both legislative houses were:

✓ **HB1777**, appropriating \$66,267 to the office of the governor and \$14,923 the office of the lieutenant governor;

✓ **HB1787**, appropriating \$631,234 to the Office of the State Auditor and Inspector; \$200,858 to the Office of State Finance; \$1.8 million to the Oklahoma Tax Commission; and \$171,281 to the Office of the State Treasurer;

✓ **HB1800**, appropriating 233,779 to the Commission on Children and Youth; \$10,034 to the Office of Handicapped Concerns; \$57,013 to the Human Rights Commission; and \$33,044 to the Indian Affairs Commission;

✓ **SB806**, appropriating \$508,035 to the House of Representatives; \$1.8 million to the Legislative Service Bureau; and \$338,674 to the Senate.

The four bills were released late Monday afternoon by the General Conference Committee on Appropriations.

Also approved by both houses, following its afternoon release from the appropriations conference committee, was **SB808**, appropriating funds to the Department of Libraries and the Secretary of State.

Included in the Department of Libraries'

appropriations are:

- \$118,576 for the employee pay raise and OPERS increase;
- \$24,000 for a catalog update;
- \$125,000 for electronic databases; and
- \$132,424 for state aid to public libraries.

Some \$51,717 is appropriated under the terms of the bill to the Secretary of State for the employee pay raise and OPERS increase. Additionally, the bill repeals an \$119,340 appropriation included in the general appropriation bill for the Office of Volunteerism. Nearly half of that money — \$50,000 — is being appropriated to the Office of Civil Emergency Management, into which the office will be placed by **HB1783**.

Also approved by the House after their release from conference committee were **HBs 1783, 1792 and 1815**.

HB1783 appropriates funds to the Department of Civil Emergency Management, the State Fire Marshal and the Oklahoma Military Department.

Under the terms of the bill, the Department of Civil Emergency Management will receive the following appropriations in addition to the funds set aside for the agency earlier this year:

- \$10,780 for the employee salary increase and \$1,496 for the OPERS increase;
- \$15,916 for an Emergency Area Coordinator;
- \$8,985 for an Individual Assistance Officer; and
- \$50,000 for the Volunteerism Office transfer.

The bill also appropriates a total of \$227,326 to the State Fire Marshal's Office, including:

- \$32,886 for the employee salary increase and \$3,135 for the OPERS increase;
- \$141,305 to replace the office's carryover funds; and
- \$50,000 for a code enforcement officer.

The Oklahoma Military Department will receive an additional appropriation of \$995,960 under the terms of the bill, including:

- \$127,540 for the employee pay raise and \$10,575 for the OPERS increase;
- \$200,000 for maintenance and repair;
- \$5,000 for operation of the 45th Museum;
- \$599,306 for the department's youth academy; and

- \$53,539 for Starbase.

In addition, the department will receive \$20,000 in reappropriated money from the treasurer's office for hosting the Adjutant General Association of the United States' annual conference. The money for maintenance and repair is being reappropriated from the State Election Board, according to the bill.

Appropriations in **HB1792** include \$96,392 to the Merit Protection Commission and \$527,718 to the Office of Personnel Management.

The bulk of the money appropriated to the Merit Protection Commission — \$81,039 — will be used to restore funds from last fiscal year's reduction. The remainder of the money will go toward the employee pay raise and associated OPERS increase.

In addition to the \$158,772 set aside for the pay and OPERS increase for the Office of Personnel Management workers, the agency will receive \$175,000 for employee compensation reform, \$125,000 for its employee assistance program and \$68,946 for its agency service unit.

HB1815 appropriates nearly \$2.5 to the Department of Central Services, including \$308,708 for the employee pay raise and OPERS increase, \$1.7 million for debt service on 1995 bonds and \$400,000 for replacement of the agency's asbestos removal revolving funds.

The bill also allows the department to spend up to \$548,775 from the Motor Vehicle Liability Account to provide salaries and administrative expenses; \$274,637 from the Risk Management Participation Revolving Fund and \$42,666 from the Oklahoma Motor License Agent Indemnity Fund for salaries and administrative expenses of the Comprehensive Professional Risk Management Program. Exempted from budgetary limits by the bill are expenditures from the Risk Management Revolving Fund.

Those measures now move to the Senate for consideration.

LAWMAKERS APPROVE MORE APPROPRIATIONS

■(GIT) Four appropriations bills cleared the House and the Senate on Wednesday as lawmakers near the deadline for their consideration of spending bills.

SB818, by Sen. Enoch Kelly Haney, D-Seminole, appropriates funds to the Oklahoma Alcoholic Beverage Laws Enforcement (ABLE) Commission, the Council on Law Enforcement Education and Training (CLEET), the State Bureau of Investigation (OSBI), the Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs, the Department of Public Safety (DPS) and the Board of Medicolegal Services.

Though every agency in the bill received additional funding for the Oklahoma Public Employees Retirement System (OPERS) contribution and the state employee pay raise, most agencies found themselves with no additional operating funds for the upcoming fiscal year.

Exceptions include an additional \$131,513 for data processing charges and secretarial support.

CLEET receives an additional \$19,000 to cover rent increases.

DPS funding increased by \$1,200,072 to support academy funding and intoxilizer equipment. In a separate appropriation, through the general appropriations bill (**SB837**) passed earlier this year, DPS received \$692,000 to fund a lease-purchase agreement for a new plane for the executive branch.

Though most appropriations bills addressed this year have gone smoothly, rarely sparking debate, Senate lawmakers Wednesday objected to the measure's almost static funding for the Board of Medicolegal Investigations. The agency had asked for additional funds to staff an additional pathologist.

Senate Appropriations Committee Vice Chairman Cal Hobson, D-Lexington, said, while he understood the members' frustrations, to hold up the appropriations of six agencies was not feasible.

Through a role call vote, the bill's conference committee report was adopted with a narrow vote of 27 to 17. The measure itself was passed with a vote of 44 to 0.

Without debate, the House adopted the bill's conference committee report and gave the bill a 95 to 0 passing vote.

HB1805, also by Haney, appropriates funds to the Department of Human Services (DHS), the Department of Rehabilitative Services and the Office of Juvenile Affairs.

A key point in DHS funding is \$983,691 for the funding of 97 new social workers to

take on the agency's child welfare caseload, many coming from promotions within the agency.

Members adopted the measure's conference committee report and eventually passed the bill with a vote of 45 to 0.

The bill drew little interest in the House, where members voted 62-29 to adopt the conference committee report and 89-3 to pass the bill.

Rep. Wayne Cozort, R-Tulsa, offered the only resistance to the bill, saying he believed the \$15.8 million appropriated to the Office of Juvenile Affairs for Community Youth Services was neither well spent nor well accounted for.

Also passing both houses on Wednesday were **HB1812** and **SB812**. The House bill appropriates funds to the State Election Board and Ethics Commission, while the Senate bill appropriates funding to the State Banking Department and Oklahoma Securities Commission.

Both measures passed the House without discussion or debate and no negative votes. The same was true in the Senate.

The Senate also passed two measures considered by the House on Tuesday — **HBs 1792** and **1815**.

Appropriations in **HB1792** include \$96,392 to the Merit Protection Commission and \$527,718 to the Office of Personnel Management. The bill received a 45 to 0 passing vote in the Senate. **HB1815**, which received a passing vote of 47-0 in the Senate, appropriates nearly \$2.5 to the Department of Central Services, including \$308,708 for the employee pay raise and OPERS increase, \$1.7 million for debt service on 1995 bonds and \$400,000 for replacement of the agency's asbestos removal revolving funds.

The bill also allows the department to spend up to \$548,775 from the Motor Vehicle Liability Account to provide salaries and administrative expenses; \$274,637 from the Risk Management Participation Revolving Fund and \$42,666 from the Oklahoma

\$45 MILLION PROPOSED FOR DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS

■(GIT) Lawmakers are expected to consider appropriating some \$45 million to the Department of Corrections on Thursday — enough money to meet the department's immediate needs, but not enough to meet the anticipated growth in prison population, according to DOC estimates.

SB820 is expected to be moved from the General Conference Committee on Appropriations to the House and Senate floors sometime Thursday. The bill was laid over by the House division of GCCA in a postadjournment meeting on Wednesday.

The bill appropriates \$45 million in growth money to the Corrections Department, as well as an additional \$90,708 to the Pardon and Parole Board.

Included in the proposal to be considered by the legislature is \$18 million to annualize the supplemental appropriation received by the department earlier this year. That money went to lease private prison space in Oklahoma and Texas for 969 inmates. Also included in the proposal is an additional \$12.8 million to provide 800 new private prison beds in fiscal year 1997.

That, however, may not be enough, according to DOC estimates provided to the subcommittee. Some 866 additional beds will be needed by the department by the end of the current fiscal year, according to those estimates. In addition, the department projects its total population will grow by another 1,530 inmates during fiscal year 1997. That means that while being funded for 800 beds, the agency is projected to need 2,396 additional beds.

Full funding for the department's Northeast Oklahoma Correctional Center at Vinita, \$1.5 million, and a work center in Frederick, \$511,500 are also proposed in the bill. Some \$885,800 is included in the bill for the creation of a reassessment unit to the Northeast Oklahoma facility. Additionally, \$3.2 million is proposed to increase the per diem rate

paid to county jails holding state prisoners to \$24 per inmate per day.

The bill also calls for \$136,245 to be appropriated for the supervision of added inmate work crews, as well as \$122,000 for expansion of the Joseph Harp mental health unit.

Lawmakers will also consider a \$1 million appropriation in the bill to fund the Community Corrections Act. That act, **SB1200**, was returned to conference committee for additional consideration by the Senate on Wednesday.

The remainder of the department's additional funding — \$7.1 million — will be used to fund the state employee pay raise, increased OPERS contribution and teachers' retirement contribution increase for teachers in the department's budget.

Funding for the Pardon and Parole Board would increase 5.3 percent under the terms of the bill, with more than one-half of the \$90,000 in additional funding being earmarked for the employee pay raise and increased OPERS contribution. Other additional funding in the bill includes:

- ✓ \$13,000 to restore funds removed in the general appropriations bill; and
- ✓ \$19,552 to cover the actual cost of certain benefits.

PORNOGRAPHY ISSUE IN HIGHER ED FUNDING

■(GIT) A state lawmaker on Thursday questioned the management of higher education institutions' by pointing to the discovery earlier this year of pornographic materials stored in a university computer system.

"Do you feel there is cause for the legislature to be concerned about how higher educational institutions are being managed," Rep. Fred Perry, R-Tulsa, asked Rep. Jack Begley, D-Goodwell, "when illegal pornography is discovered being stored in one of their computer systems? Doesn't that make you wonder how they're being managed?"

The question appeared to take Begley, author of **SB1809**, which provides funds to higher education, by surprise, and he attempted to shrug off the question. Perry did not relent, pressing Begley for an answer.

At issue was the discovery earlier of a number of files in a University of Oklahoma computer system containing obscene material reportedly downloaded from the Internet.

The discovery and resulting outcry, including that from some lawmakers, led the university to enact procedures restricting access from university computers to some Internet sites known to carry obscene materials.

Referring to actions taken at the university, Begley said that "management has taken control of the situation."

Rep. Loyd Benson, D-Frederick, reiterated that the problem had been addressed, by both the university and the legislature which on Wednesday passed a resolution prohibiting obscene material on state computer systems.

"Sometimes," Benson said in reference to the OU situation, "people have to have things called to their attention before they can take action. That's what happened here."

"I still think it's a question of management," Perry said before House members voted to approve the bill's conference report and gave the bill a 91-9 passing vote.

GOVERNOR TO BE CONSIDERED FOR PAY RAISE

■(GIT) Governor Frank Keating or his successor could be paid more if lawmakers, as expected, consider and approve a bill increasing the office's salary.

Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore, revealed late Thursday that a bill to increase the \$70,000 annual salary paid to the governor is likely to be brought before legislators.

"Some consideration is being given," Steidley told House members, "to introduction of legislation to increase the governor's salary and rightfully so."

The revelation came during questions concerning **SB804**, which appropriates money to the state's judicial system. A component of the bill gives judges from the associate district judge level to the justices on the Supreme Court a pay increase of 6.6 to 12 percent, Steidley said in response to a question from Rep. Wanda Jo Peltier, D-Oklahoma City.

And that means, Rep. Wayne Pettigrew, R-Edmond, said, that elected statewide office holders — such as the lieutenant governor, auditor and inspector, state treasurer and others — would receive a pay increase. That's because legislation passed in 1994 ties the salaries of statewide elected officials to those of certain judges.

The only exception in the law, however,

is the governor's office, Steidley noted.

The law also prevents an elected state official from receiving a pay increase enacted during their term in office. As a result, the increase for statewide elected officials would not take effect until after the 1998 statewide election.

Regardless of the fate of the legislation targeting the governor's office, the remainder of the statewide elected officials taking office after the 1998 election will receive a pay increase if **SB804** is signed, several lawmakers noted. The bill passed both the House, 71-27, and the Senate, 38-4, on Thursday.

No legislation specifically addressing an increase in the governor's salary or its relation to other state officials' salaries currently exists, according to a Legislative Information Network search of active bills and active conference committee reports. That means the language would have to be added to a bill and presented as a conference committee substitute.

GOVERNOR SIGNS RURAL DEVELOPMENT BILL

■(BLANCHARD) Governor Frank Keating traveled to this McClain County community Monday to sign a bill that will channel some \$17 million to rural development projects and create a state Rural Economic Action Plan.

"I am pleased to continue a year-long effort to boost the economy in rural Oklahoma by signing **House Bill 1434**," the Governor said in a Main Street ceremony.

The bill will allocate \$7.5 million for rural roads and bridges, \$4.5 million for water and sewer projects and \$5 million for a Rural Economic Action Plan administered through 11 regional planning districts. The state aid targets smaller Oklahoma communities.

Keating said the REAP program and other aid contained in the bill will "go hand in hand with the tax cuts and credits on agricultural projects, family farms and businesses and marginal oil wells." Those tax relief measures, which total some \$45 million in annual savings for taxpayers, formed a centerpiece of the Governor's 1996 economic stimulus package.

PERMANENT MIDTERM FIX TO BE ENACTED

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) After months of hard work and sometimes contentious debate, a permanent solution for the annual midterm funding problems has been found. Governor Keating will officially sign HB2055 Wednesday.

In addition to enacting a permanent solution to the midterm problem, Senator Don Williams and Representative Jack Begley were also instrumental in forging a budget agreement that delivered three years worth of midterm funding — a total of \$42 million — to growing districts.

FIRST POSTWAR VIETNAMESE STUDENTS TO ATTEND OU

■(NORMAN) Nine Vietnamese college students will be making history when they arrive at the University of Oklahoma May 25.

According to Vietnamese officials, they are the first postwar Vietnamese students who are not refugees or the children of refugees to attend a U.S. college or university.

The nine undergraduate students, all of whom speak English, have completed at least one year of college and are either employees or family members of employees of PetroVietnam, the national petroleum company headquartered in Hanoi. The students are being accompanied to the United States by a representative of the company.

Their enrollment at OU came about through contacts made by state and university officials on an October 1995 trade mission to Vietnam. Principal facilitators were Oklahoma Sen. Billy Mickle of Durant; Dr. W. Darrell Gertsch, director of the OU Sarkeys Energy Center; Dr. Eddie Smith, OU vice president for research and dean of the Graduate College; and Dr. James Forgotson, OU geology professor.

Also as a result of the trip, research and training collaborations between the Energy Center and PetroVietnam have been negotiated and are under way.

■(NORMAN) The University of Oklahoma Libraries now have a permanent endowment with the recent completion of the \$1.15 million Kerr Challenge Grant from the Kerr Foundation of Oklahoma City.

Initiated in 1986, the Kerr Foundation challenge grant issued \$115,000 annually for 10 years to the University Libraries, provided the libraries matched that amount from other private donations to create a perma-

OU AWARDED \$20 MILLION FOR FAA TRAINING

■(NORMAN) The University of Oklahoma College of Continuing Education has been awarded a 4½-year Federal Aviation Administration Air Traffic Instructional Services contract valued at approximately \$20 million.

Through the award, which continues more than 25 years of partnership between the FAA and OU, the university will assist the FAA in providing air traffic control training by supporting instructional, educational and programming services at the FAA Academy at the Mike Monroney Aeronautical Center in Oklahoma City.

OU collaborated with the American Systems Corporation (ASC), another provider of instructional development and delivery services to the FAA to successfully compete for the Air Traffic Instructional Services contract.

The FAA contract marks the third major award to the OU College of Continuing Education since October. Since that time, the College has received a \$19 million award from the U.S. Department of Education to form a regional educational resource center and a \$45 million contract from the U.S. Postal Service to provide instruction and technical assistance at the USPS's sole technical training center in Norman.

With the new contract, educational programs provided by OU will have trained

more than 38,500 air traffic controllers and other FAA personnel since the 1981 initiation of the Air Traffic Instructional Services program. The total awards to OU during this period have exceeded \$200 million.

The FAA Academy is the primary provider of air traffic control training in the United States and a substantive provider of air traffic control training around the world. At the Academy, air traffic controllers of all levels of expertise — from new hire to full performance level to facility managers — are trained with the most innovative instructional methodologies and state-of-the-art equipment available.

The program's training and development services are staffed with air traffic control instructors, instructional systems development specialists, education specialists, computer systems analysts and computer programmers and support and administrative staff. The program also provides consultants from the OU facility and from the Northwestern Kellogg School of Business.

In addition to providing quality air traffic instruction, the university assists the academy in developing and maintaining currency of all FAA resident and field facility training materials. Updated versions are sent periodically to FAA facilities for refresher and on-the-job training conducted at the facility sites.

The OU College of Continuing Education maintains a high involvement throughout the aviation industry. Other programs administered by the college include an aviation program and pilot certification, diversity and quality standards training to FAA employees, global positioning system research, and Partnership 21, an international forum to promote the development of a global approach to civil aeronautics and air commerce. Another effort is a program the college is forming to teach aviation English to aviation industry personnel worldwide.

OFB DIRECTOR SAYS FEDERAL RULES NEEDLESSLY INCREASE COSTS, VICTIMIZE FARMERS

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Oklahoma Farm Bureau director Charles Sloan testified before a U.S. House of Representatives sub-

committee field hearing investigating the hidden costs of government regulations.

The Subcommittee on National Economic Growth, Natural Resources and Regulatory Affairs held a hearing May 20 at Rogers State University in Claremore.

The Farm Bureau director addressed the high costs to farmers resulting from the ban on production of Freon in the United States and Canada.

Sloan told the committee that before Freon production was banned that he and most other farmers could re-charge air conditioning systems on tractors and equipment themselves.

Sloan said that scenario is not applicable today because of the government ban on Freon due to questionable studies linking it to ozone damage.

Sloan pointed out that government action put most fix-it men out of business due to the high cost of equipment. The required equipment includes expensive machinery to re-clean and clean old Freon taken out of units to be repaired.

The farmer told the committee the fix-it shops now have to store old Freon in steel containers due to government regulations. Different types must be kept separate. When a container is full, the fix-it shop must return it to the place of purchase and that dealer gives him an empty container. The Freon then is shipped to be incinerated.

He said the cost of the new coolant is \$13 to \$20 a pound compared to the 98-cents-a-pound cost for Freon.

He suggested that Freon should have been phased out gradually, since most pre-1993 vehicles and farm equipment use old Freon.

"This is what we in agriculture mean when we say compare the cost to the benefit. This is a great problem for us in agriculture because some of these tractors and combines will be around for a long time.

"All my representatives that have been made aware of the problem agree that the government acted in haste, but nothing gets done."

GAS CAP INTEGRITY BILL PASSES HOUSE

■(GIT) The House on Wednesday gave approval to the so-called gas cap integrity bill, a bill its author said is designed to help Tulsa and possibly Oklahoma counties deal with air quality issues.

Rep. Russ Roach, D-Tulsa and author of **HB2346**, called the proposal "the best option" for municipalities in trouble with the Environmental Protection Agency to deal with air quality issues.

Under the terms of the bill, local government entities would be able to enact ordinances mandating gas cap integrity tests. Those tests would determine whether a gas cap properly seals a gas tank and prevents the loss of ozone-damaging fumes.

Municipalities could only enact such ordinances, Roach told House members, when cited by the EPA for violations of air quality standards.

Without the proposed law, Roach also said, counties with air quality problems, most notably Tulsa County, could find themselves under orders from the EPA to sell only gasoline reformulated to diminish emissions or limited in their industrial development capabilities.

Rep. Forrest Claunch, R-Midwest City, joined Roach in support of the bill.

Rep. Richard Phillips, R-Warr Acres, disagreed with Claunch and Roach, warning that the bill could lead to conflicts between individual cities within one county and between city and county governments.

Those favoring the bill and its conference committee report outnumbered those against it by a nearly three-to-one margin, and a motion to adopt the bill's conference committee report received a passing vote of 70-29. The bill itself received a 70-28 passing vote and now heads to the Senate for consideration.

SENATE TOURISM CONFIRMS SIX, DEBATE OVER WEST

■(GIT) The Senate Committee on Tourism and Recreation met Monday, confirming six of Governor Frank Keating's appointments to related agencies. Debate and a motion to table the nomination of one appointee dis-

rupted the otherwise smooth flow of confirmations.

John West, of Elk City, was appointed by the governor to serve a six year term on the Oklahoma Tourism and Recreation Board. Succeeding himself, West met with resistance from Sen. Robert M. Kerr, D-Altus, who moved to table his nomination.

Kerr said, though he bears no ill will toward him, West had requested a study to consider alternative locations for the fire-ravaged Quartz Mountain. After the study was completed, West decided to rebuild the facility on its present site.

As a result of the study, considerable time and money was wasted, time and money that could have been invested in rebuilding the facility.

West said additional money should be spent on the facility. He added, also, that the state should consider looking into private industry funding for the state's lodges, saying it would be better to look to people who would be willing to spend "more money than we [the state] would."

Additional resistance came from Sen. Maxine Horner, D-Tulsa. She cited reports from sources in Elk City that point to West's tendency to "micro-manage" staff members.

West denied the reports, saying no one from Elk City had ever contacted him on any issue related to tourism.

Senate Majority Leader Billy Mickel, D-Durant, was present to support the West nomination, casting his vote against the tabling motion.

After receiving only three votes, from Kerr, Sen. Gerald "Ged" Wright, R-Broken Arrow, and Committee Chairman Sen. Dave Herbert, D-Midwest City, the tabling motion was defeated. Horner abstained from the vote.

Sponsored by Sen. Gilmer Capps, D-Snyder, West was confirmed to the post. His term ends July 1, 2002. He succeeds himself.

Other Keating appointees include Joanna Champlin, of Oklahoma City. She was confirmed to a position on the State Arts Council. Sponsored by Sen. Brooks Douglass, R-Oklahoma City, she will serve a three year term, ending July 1, 1999.

EDUCATION SECRETARY SAYS OEA FLYER CLAIMS FALSE CREDIT FOR KEATING VICTORIES

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Secretary of Education Floyd Coppedge said Wednesday he is "astonished" that a flyer distributed by the Oklahoma Education Association this week apparently claims OEA credit for two vital pieces of school legislation that originated with the Keating administration.

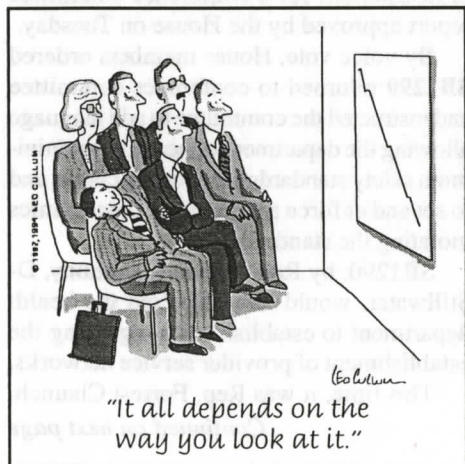
"I was really astonished to see the OEA trying to take credit for the midterm school funding solution and our efforts to save the teacher retirement fund from insolvency," Dr. Coppedge said. "They know very well those were central parts of the Governor's education agenda from day one of the legislative session."

On Wednesday, the Governor signed a midterm bill, **HB2055**, that included most of his original proposals, and funding for teacher retirement is expected to emerge from the Legislature during final budget votes.

The OEA flyer, headlined "Here's what we've done," claims OEA efforts led to the midterm bill. It also claims that "OEA has secured an additional \$45 million" for teacher retirement.

"As I recall, Governor Keating was out front on these two issues long before the OEA, and the OEA played very minimal roles in winning legislative passage," Dr.

BILL TO LIMIT TAX EXEMPT BONDS FOR POLITICIANS

■(GIT) A measure aimed at halting public officials' involvement in tax exempt bond negotiations passed the Senate Thursday, which sparked political dart throwing among members.

The bill, **HB1238**, by Sen. Kevin Easley, D-Broken Arrow, prevents elected officials and their spouses from participating in the bond transactions if they have a "direct or indirect financial interest in the project."

Calling the measure a "bullet," aimed at his professional livelihood, Sen. Charles Ford, R-Tulsa, said many elected officials in the state would be affected by its passage.

Other members felt the bill would hinder entrepreneurs from running for elected office.

Sen. Dave Herbert, D-Midwest City, said the measure would narrow public servants down to those who could afford to live on salaries paid by those who elected them. The former mayor of Midwest City reminded members he was only paid \$100 per month for that office.

"We all know what this bill is about," said Sen. Helen Cole, R-Oklahoma City. "This bill is about J.C. Watts."

The bill's House Author, Rep. Ed Crocker, D-Norman, brought the legislation forward as a result of suspected impropriety surrounding Oklahoma Congressman J.C. Watts. Crocker is a candidate for Oklahoma's Fourth Congressional District, running against Watts.

The former Corporation Commissioner sits on the congressional oversight committee which regulates the country's banking and lending policies. He has been criticized for seeking tax-exempt funds for his private business dealings.

"Fair is fair," she said. "Under any other circumstances I'd probably be for this bill, but it is a means to getcha."

Easley said the bill was drafted last year.

Members barely adopted the bill's con-

ference committee report with a vote of 23 to 22. The bill ultimately passed with a vote of 27 to 19. It now goes to the House for its consideration.

MAPS BALLPARK REVISED PLANS DUE IN JUNE FOR JULY BIDS; MAYOR TO HOLD SPECIAL MEETING WITH BOARD IN JUNE

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Members of the MAPS Citizens Oversight Board were told Thursday that the final, revised plans for the Bricktown Ballpark will be delivered in June and that the second round of construction bids will be taken in July. Board Member Bert Cooper said Mayor Ron Norick told a special "Mayor's Committee" yesterday about the plans and said the Construction Review Subcommittee will hold a special meeting on June 14 to consider the plans and be briefed by the mayor. The entire MAPS Citizens Oversight Board will also hold a special meeting on June 17 to consider the plans which will then be presented to the City Council for consideration on Tuesday the 18th. That timeline left one board member wondering if the citizens board was a "rubber stamp" since the full board will have only one day to consider the revised plans.

The board was also told — for the third time — that funding for the highly-touted Local Business Utilization Plan was running out and would be gone in four months. Project Coordinator FSB said it has no plans to continue the LBU past its contractually-required cut-off date, but suggested the city take over the LBU process and apply it to all city projects. City officials said there were no plans to continue or expand the LBU at this time.

OMBUDSMAN EFFORT FAILS AGAIN; ABORTION RULES TACKLED ON NEW BILL

■(GIT) An effort to protect the state's long-term care ombudsman program failed again on Tuesday when the program was ruled not to be germane to the bill in which it had been included.

Most of the debate over **HB2393**, by

Rep. Mark Seikel, D-Harrah, had focused on provisions in the bill dealing with the creation of the Early Identification and Service Support for Children and Families Act, when Rep. Scott Adkins, R-Broken Arrow, asked whether the inclusion of the ombudsman program in the bill was germane.

After a lengthy consultation with Chief Clerk Larry Warden and a brief question of Adkins, Speaker Pro Tempore Rep. Jim Glover, D-Elgin, ruled that the ombudsman portion of the bill was not germane.

Rep. Carolyn Coleman, R-Moore, then introduced instructions to return the bill to conference committee for further consideration and to strike the bill's first section, which dealt with the creation of the early identification program. Combined with the earlier ruling, Glover noted, the action would leave the House without a workable bill.

Coleman's motion was rejected by a 27-72 vote. Seikel then asked for and received unanimous consent to reject the conference committee report and to return the bill for further conference committee consideration.

The dispute over the ombudsman program began earlier this month when Rep. Abe Deutschendorf, D-Lawton, first attempted to bring the bill containing the program out of conference. The conference committee report for that bill, **HB2407**, was rejected, and at the urging of Rep. Dan Webb, R-Oklahoma City, was returned to conference with instructions.

Additional wording included in the instructions called for the state health department to establish minimum safety standards for free-standing abortion clinics. The bill later died in conference.

Ironically, the same rules concerning free-standing abortion clinics were included in instructions for a conference committee report approved by the House on Tuesday.

By voice vote, House members ordered **SB1290** returned to conference committee and instructed the committee to add language allowing the department of health to set minimum safety standards for abortion clinics and to set and enforce a penalty for those clinics violating the standards.

SB1290, by Rep. Calvin J. Anthony, D-Stillwater, would have directed the health department to establish rules regarding the establishment of provider service networks.

This time, it was Rep. Forrest Claunch,

R-Midwest City, who proposed and won approval for the instructions concerning the abortion clinic rules.

RYAN LUKE BILL WON'T SOLVE ALL THE PROBLEMS

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) The Oklahoma Public Employees Association (OPEA) is confident that the Ryan Luke bill will improve the state's child welfare system, but according to OPEA Executive Director Gary Jones, **HB2053** won't solve all the problems that currently haunt the system.

Jones is calling on legislative leaders and Governor Frank Keating to create a blue ribbon panel that will be charged with compiling a comprehensive plan to cure what ails Oklahoma's child welfare system.

"While OPEA believes **HB2053** will be helpful, the Association is putting Oklahomans on notice that it will not resolve all Oklahoma's child welfare problems," Jones commented this week. "While the bill addresses several important problems that must be resolved, many more issues still require attention and action."

Jones pointed out that OPEA has sent letters to the Governor, Speaker of the House Glen Johnson and President Pro Tem of the Senate Stratton Taylor, asking state leaders to take appropriate action.

GOVERNOR KEATING SIGNS RYAN LUKE BILL

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Governor Frank Keating signed **HB2053**, commonly called the Ryan Luke bill.

Among the key provisions of the law:

- ✓ Requiring monitoring by the court for one year after a child involved in an abuse or neglect situation is returned to parental custody

- ✓ Requiring training in child and domestic abuse issues for all judges involved in such cases

- ✓ Requiring court-appointed special advocates to be available in all judicial districts and appointment of an attorney to represent the interests of children in abuse cases

- ✓ Removing confidentiality from cases involving deaths and providing information to foster parents, law enforcement and child welfare agencies

- ✓ Requiring DHS to conduct criminal history investigations of prospective foster family members, and prohibiting placement of a child with any convicted sex offender or domestic abuser

- ✓ Permitting postponement of child placement rulings and reviewing when a child's welfare is endangered

"Growing up in this world is difficult enough for a child without having to worry about being abused by those who are supposed to love and care for you. I feel this new law goes a long way in making the system work on behalf of Oklahoma's children," the Governor said.

ZERO TOLERANCE BILL PASSES SENATE

■(GIT) "This is an effort at prevention," said Sen. Ben Brown, D-Oklaoma City, defending a measure he authored, creating a zero tolerance law for those under the age of 21 who drive while intoxicated. Members passed the measure, **SB1230**, Wednesday.

The bill states that persons under the age of 21 who have "any measurable quantity of alcohol" in their blood stream or breath may have their license suspended or revoked.

In addition, the measure allows for possible installation of ignition interlock devices in vehicles of offenders and requires the State Department of Education to administer drivers education programs in all schools in the state designed to increase awareness of drinking and driving dangers.

Maintaining the Education Department requirements only applied to schools that already have drivers education courses in place, Brown met with quick resistance.

"We can't have pay raises when we continue to mandate things to our schools that cost them more money," said Sen. Jerry Pierce, R-Tulsa.

"Before you can become a statesman you first have to get elected, and to get elected you have to be a politician pledging support for what the voters want."

Sen. Mark Snyder, R-Edmond, echoed Pierce, calling the measure an unfunded mandate.

After adopting the measure's second conference committee report with a vote of 40 to 7, members passed the bill with a final vote of 42 to 5.

Brown lodged a motion to reconsider, giving him three legislative days to readdress the measure.

LEGISLATURE APPROVES PARENTAL CONTROL OVER TEEN DRIVERS

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) The State Senate has given approval to a measure giving parents a say in whether their teenagers can get a driver's license.

"Unfortunately, some teenagers simply are not mature enough or responsible enough to handle it. But under current law, even if a parent has a real concern about their child, there's nothing they can do to stop them from getting a driver's license as soon as they turn 16," said Sen. Brad Henry, D-Shawnee, principal author of the bill.

That would change if Governor Frank Keating signs **Senate Bill 1115** into law. Under **SB1115**, a parent would be able to file an objection with the local Department of Public Safety testing office to prevent their minor child from receiving a driver's license. Once a license is issued, parents would also have the ability to revoke a minor's driver's license until age 18. A revocation would remain in effect for at least three months.

The measure now awaits the Governor's signature.

TUITION SAVINGS ACCOUNTS PASSED

■(GIT) A bill creating tax-free savings accounts to pay the costs of college passed the House on Monday, despite a Republican-driven effort to use the bill to increase the standard deduction and exemption of state taxpayers.

HB2059, by Rep. Laura Boyd, D-Norman, allows Oklahoma residents to deposit up to \$5,000 in so-called tuition savings accounts. The money deposited in the

accounts, as well as the interest earned by the accounts, will be exempt from taxation as adjusted gross income, Boyd told fellow House members.

Before acceptance of the bill's third conference committee report, it had to withstand an effort led by Rep. Dan Webb, R-Oklahoma City, to use the bill as a vehicle to double the standard deduction and exemption for state taxpayers, from \$1,000 to \$2,000 each.

House members voted 56-41 to accept the conference committee report, with most Republicans joining Webb in opposing its adoption.

When asked to give final passage to the bill, it received a 99-0 passing vote.

LEGISLATIVE LEADERS AGREE ON PROPERTY TAX PACT

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) The leaders of the Oklahoma House and Senate have announced a final agreement on property tax reform legislation, saying the resulting package will provide Oklahoma homeowners with an additional layer of protection against "unfair and excessive property tax increases."

Tuesday's announcement is the culmination of several weeks of discussion by a joint, bipartisan committee on property taxes. The panel members agreed to adopt four of six recommendations from the Citizens' Task Force. The four proposals include:

- ✓ Cap property tax growth at 5 percent per year on locally assessed real property;
- ✓ Freeze assessment ratios at 1995 levels;
- ✓ Freeze valuations on properties of senior citizens earning less than \$25,000 per

year; and

- ✓ Provide that a statement of how property tax dollars are spent be attached to all tax notices.

The legislative committee went above and beyond the citizens' task force recommendations in regard to the elderly and low-income homeowners. It adopted a provision to raise the income level to \$20,000 to qualify for a double homestead exemption. That change will greatly reduce and in some cases, eliminate the property tax burden on working families and the elderly.

Even though the latest agreement represents more than a year of work by the citizens' task force and legislators, lawmakers say they will continue to closely monitor developments in the property tax system.

One of the task force proposals rejected by the legislative committee would have given county voters the option of removing the caps on millage.

Committee members did recommend that the millage proposal be part of a later examination of overall budget and finance options. They said that before any new funding mechanisms are adopted, the future needs of education and county governments must be examined.

SENATE APPROVES TAX BREAK FOR ADOPTIONS

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) The Senate has approved a measure which would give a state income tax deduction of up to \$10,000 to Oklahomans who adopt a child.

"I think it's very important that we do all we can as policy makers to encourage adoptions," said Senator Brad Henry, Senate author of HB1088.

"This measure will have little fiscal impact for the state, but it can make a huge difference for couples who'd like to adopt," said Henry, D-Shawnee.

"This measure allows families to deduct most of the expenses associated with adoption, including adoption fees, medical expenses, court costs, attorney fees and other expenses directly related to the adoption process up to a maximum of \$10,000," said Henry.

The measure would apply beginning in tax year 1996. It applies to all adoptions, whether through private or public agencies.

The House has also approved the bill,

which must now be signed by Governor Frank Keating before it can become law.

PROPERTY TAX RELIEF PART ONE PASSES SENATE

■(GIT) Senate lawmakers Wednesday passed a the first half of a two-part property tax relief package designed to reduce many Oklahoma property owners' ad valorem taxes.

SB681, by Sen. Penny Williams, D-Tulsa, would change the annual income limit allowed for a double homestead exemption of \$2,000 to \$20,000 per year from \$10,000.

In addition, the bill raises the minimum income allowed to receive an income tax credit if property taxes reach more than one percent of the owner's annual earnings. Under the measure the minimum would be raised to \$12,000 from \$10,000 annually.

Under the bill, counties would be reimbursed by the state for the loss of revenue resulting from the raised income limits. Though the measure would be revenue neutral to the state this year, two years from now the bill could carry a projected \$2.6 million price tag, unless funds are placed back into the system to cover the loss.

The measure also contains a provision requiring an itemized statement of how ad valorem taxes are being spent to accompany all tax notices.

The second half of the property tax reform initiative is expected in upcoming days in the form of a joint resolution. The measure will aim to:

- ✓ Cap property tax growth at a rate of five percent annually on locally assessed real property.
- ✓ Roll assessment ratios back to the 1995 level, permanently.
- ✓ Hold valuations on properties of senior citizens earning less than \$25,000 per year.

The resolution will make necessary constitutional changes to implement the reform.

■(GIT) Part two of a property tax relief package passed the House and Senate Thursday. The measure, HB2198, by Sen. Don

Williams, D-Balko, is expected to save Oklahoma property owners millions in annual ad valorem taxes. The measure would amend the state constitution to accomplish the reform.

Under the measure:

✓ Increases in the assessed value of locally assessed real estate would be frozen at five percent. Exceptions to the freeze would be in cases where a title is transferred or improvements are made.

✓ Oklahoma citizens over the age of 65 who earn less than \$25,000 each year would have their property valuations frozen after Jan. 1, 1997.

✓ Statewide tax assessment ratios would be set at 11 to 13.5 percent of fair cash value for land and buildings. Personal property including jewelry and large household items would be held at 10 to 15 percent.

Thirteen and one-half percent for real estate and 15 percent for personal property are the most the rates could ever reach under the measure. They may, however, be lowered.

The proposed constitutional amendments passed the House with a vote of 99 to 0 and passed the Senate with a vote of 47 to 0. The bill's next stop is the governor's desk.

NATIONAL SAFE BOATING WEEK RECOGNIZED BY OKLAHOMA'S DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY

■(GIT) As summer and Memorial Day approach, many Oklahomans will take their boats and start heading to the state's lakes. However enjoyable and relaxing, boating is not without risk. President William J. Clinton, proclaimed the week of May 18 through 24, as "National Safe Boating Week." In accordance, Oklahoma's Depart-

ment of Public Safety is gearing up for Memorial Day and summer by advising Oklahomans on safety measures when boating.

Lt. Bob Sanders, commander of the Department's Lake Patrol, explained that ninety percent of boaters drink alcohol, including passengers and operators. "Of course, most operators and passengers are of-age, but alcohol affects your judgment, which is compounded by the sun and the water hitting the boat," he said.

"In Oklahoma, it's legal to drink and operate a boat," Sanders said.

Sanders further explained that the Department of Public Safety does have the authority to arrest a boat operator suspected of drinking, but most arrested operators are released from jail in a couple of hours and are back on the lake.

Sanders said that until Oklahoma has something like a boat operator license, it will be "hard to keep drunks out of the water."

In addition to alcohol being a factor in most boating accidents, according to national studies, out of 77 percent of recreational boating fatalities, the victim was not wearing a life jacket. Sanders reinforced that statement. "Half of those lives would be saved if operators and passengers wore a life jackets."

Currently, when operating water vessels such as "wet bikes," life jackets must be worn at all times. However, in boats, life jackets are merely required to be readily accessible.

Overall, Sanders explained that most accidents occur because of "bad judgment or no judgment."

"Don't put yourself in a bad situation and don't leave your common sense on the shore," Sanders asserted. Last year in Oklahoma, approximately 15 boating fatalities occurred, "most of those happened, because individuals were not paying attention," Sanders said.

Rep. Barbara Staggs, D-Muskogee, authored a bill, **HB2957**, earlier this session, that would have stipulated that any person operating a water vessel while under the influence of any intoxicant or with a blood alcohol concentration of 0.10 could be in violation of the law and subject to punishment. However, the bill was left at second reading by the Senate Judiciary Committee. However, language of the bill that included an alcohol testing provision by blood or through a breathalyzer, was included in **SB1215**,

authored by Sen. Kevin Easley, D-Broken Arrow. The conference committee report has been submitted to the Senate.

Also at this time, Rep. Robert Weaver, D-Shawnee, has initiated legislation that would require the Oklahoma Department of Public Safety, the Oklahoma Tax Commission, the Oklahoma Tourism and Recreation Department and the Oklahoma Department of Commerce to study issues related to personal watercraft and boat operators. **HCR1110** passed the House Tourism and Recreation Committee on May 1.

STATES POISED TO RECEIVE \$3.5 BILLION FOR JOB AND TRAINING PROGRAMS

■(WASHINGTON) States will soon be receiving nearly \$3.5 billion in grants from the U.S. Department of Labor for Americans who have lost their jobs and need training or help finding new jobs.

The grants, which will be available beginning July 1, 1996, are the foundation for the nation's network of job training programs and public employment offices to serve job seekers, dislocated workers, disadvantaged adults and at-risk youth.

The funds, distributed to states under the Job Training Partnership Act (JTPA) and the Wagner-Peyser Act, are allocated according to formulas which take into account such factors as civilian labor force, unemployment and proportion of economically disadvantaged citizens in each state.

FEDERAL GOVERNMENT TO PROMOTE JOBS AND PRIVATE SECTOR INVESTMENT IN LOCAL COMMUNITITES

■(WASHINGTON) In a continuing effort to strengthen the economy and create greater

opportunity, President Clinton Tuesday signed two executive orders that will make the federal government a more effective partner in promoting jobs and private-sector investment in our central cities and distressed rural heartlands.

An executive order on federal contracting launches the President's Empowerment Contracting program, providing a supplement, not a replacement, to existing federal procurement programs. The program will offer special incentives for government contracting awards to businesses in distressed communities. Under the empowerment contracting order, large businesses that hire a significant number of residents and that will generate significant economic activity in low-income areas will be eligible to participate in the program. Small businesses may participate if they meet either test.

A second executive order encourages federal agencies to locate offices in the historic districts of our central cities. The order also attempts to ease the regulatory burdens that impede the government's ability to establish or maintain a presence in these districts.

Vice President Gore initiated the orders in his role as Chair of the Community Empowerment Board, the Cabinet-level group which coordinates the Administration's community empowerment initiatives. "We recognize that the private sector must be the

driver of economic opportunity. However, as these orders make clear, the government can be an effective partner by helping distressed communities attract private-sector investment and providing these communities with the tools to solve their own problems," said Gore.

PRACTITIONER ENROLLMENT IN MEDICARE PROGRAM INCREASES FOR 1996

■(WASHINGTON) More than three-quarters of the physicians and other practitioners who serve Medicare beneficiaries have enrolled in the Medicare participating physician program for 1996, HHS Secretary Donna E. Shalala announced recently. Participation ranges from a high of 92.2 percent in North Dakota to a low of 60.1 percent in Idaho.

The overall rate of participation is 77.5 percent this year, up from 72.3 percent in 1995. The number of enrollees in the program has increased to 627,000 in 1996 from 620,000 last year. Participation rose in 45 states, as well as the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.

Participation has risen every year since the program started in 1984. The overall rate includes medical doctors (MDs), limited license practitioners and non-physician practitioners:

✓ For MDs and doctors of osteopathy, the participation rate increased to 80 percent in 1996, up from 74.6 percent in 1995.

✓ For limited license practitioners, who are optometrists, podiatrists, chiropractors or oral surgeons, the participation rate rose to 50.3 percent, compared with 44.6 percent in 1995.

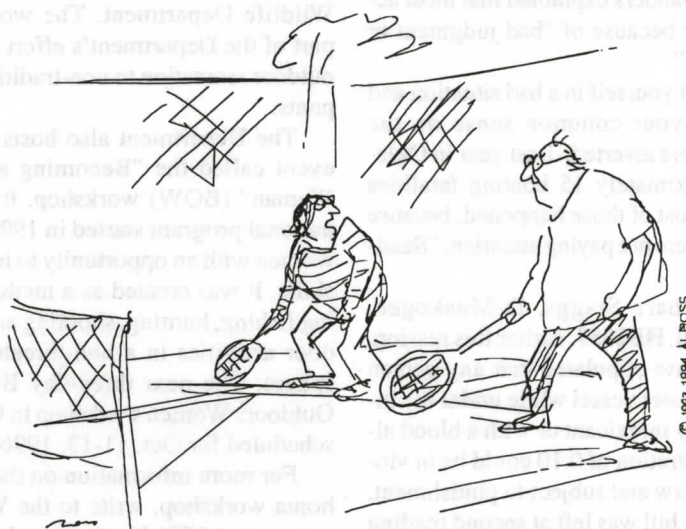
✓ For non-physician practitioners, the participation rate increased to 93.1 percent in 1996 from 91.6 percent in 1995.

Physicians are advised that participating in the program creates the following advantages:

✓ Their Medicare fee schedule is 5 percent higher than that of non-participating physicians.

✓ They are provided with toll-free lines if they submit claims electronically.

✓ Their names are listed in the Medicare Participating Physician/Supplier Directory, which is furnished to senior citizen groups.

Non-participating providers are advised they can charge beneficiaries no more than 115 percent of the Medicare allowance.

In January of 1995, 72.3 percent of Oklahoma's physicians were participating in the program, now as of January 1996, that number has climbed to 76.1 percent.

FHWA IDENTIFIES NATIONAL HIGHWAY SYSTEM CONNECTIONS TO INTERMODAL TERMINALS IN ALL STATES

■(WASHINGTON) Rodney E. Slater, Administrator of the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), Tuesday announced that National Highway System (NHS) connections to major passenger and freight intermodal terminals have been identified for all 50 states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico.

"Once we submitted our proposed NHS map to Congress, the department embarked on additional work to ensure that the system would include important highway linkages with all major passenger and freight intermodal terminals," said Slater.

The National Highway System Designation Act of 1995, signed by President Clinton last November, includes 161,108 miles of important rural and urban roads, including some connections to major intermodal terminals. Congressional approval is needed to modify the NHS to include the additional 1,925 miles of rural and urban roads that will provide the connections to other major intermodal terminals.

GOVERNMENT/INDUSTRY COALITION FORMED FOR AIR BAG SAFETY

■(WASHINGTON) Secretary of Transportation Federico Pena Tuesday announced the formation of an unprecedented coalition of

automobile manufacturers, air bag suppliers, insurance companies, safety organizations and the federal government to prevent injuries and fatalities which may be inadvertently caused by air bags, especially to children.

Coalition members have pledged almost \$10 million to pursue a three-point program:

✓ An extensive national effort to educate drivers, parents and care-givers about seat belt and child safety seat use in all motor vehicles, with special emphasis on those equipped with air bags.

✓ A campaign to convince states to pass primary seat belt use laws. Under such a primary law, police officers need no other reason to stop a driver and issue a ticket than failure to use a seat belt. Only 12 states have primary laws. Thirty-seven states currently have secondary belt laws, meaning that police may cite belt law offenders only if first stopped for some other violation.

✓ Activities at state and local levels to increase enforcement of all seat belt and child seat use laws, such as increased public information and use of belt checkpoints.

Air bags are an important safety advance that have saved some 1,500 lives since the late 1980s, said Secretary Pena. However, NHTSA is aware of at least 19 cases in which a child either in a rear-facing infant seat or riding improperly belted was killed by a deploying air bag.

"Infants in rear-facing child safety seats should never be placed in the front seat if the vehicle has a passenger-side air bag," said Ricardo Martinez, M.D., administrator of the department's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA).

All passenger cars must offer dual front air bags by model year 1998, and light trucks the following year. Virtually every new passenger vehicle sold today comes equipped with at least a driver-side air bag, and many already offer dual air bags in the front seat.

FAA RELEASES CHALLENGE 2000 FINDINGS

■(WASHINGTON) The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) will streamline its rule making process, revamp its Regulation and Certification organization, and build world centers of excellence in aviation safety, as part of a plan to keep the agency apace with the rapidly evolving aviation industry as America enters the 21st century.

"The FAA must prepare now to meet the combined challenges of rapidly changing technologies, and unprecedented growth in air travel in the future," FAA Administrator David R. Hinson said recently while unveiling the findings of the Challenge 2000 project, an exhaustive review of how FAA responds to changing needs in the aviation industry. "That's why last year I asked two independent sources to take a top-to-bottom look at our safety regulation and certification operation."

Praising the impressive U.S. aviation safety record, the Challenge 2000 report notes that if the present accident rate remains constant while demand for air travel grows at a rate of approximately five percent annually over the next decade, there will be an increase in the number of aviation accidents in the next 10 to 15 years. Achieving the FAA's "zero accident rate" will require a new sense of purpose on the part of the FAA and the industry it regulates, the report states.

Hinson said he was gratified to learn that some of the key recommendations in Challenge 2000 are efforts that the FAA already has begun. He noted that the recommendation to create teams comprised of experts in a special area to expedite rule making echoes the approach that was taken in publishing the "one level of safety" Commuter Rule Safety Initiative in a record 11 months. He noted that the task force recommendations also call for strengthening the partnerships between FAA and air carriers and manufacturers, which complements the FAA's philosophy that zero accidents can only be achieved through a shared responsibility with all segments of the aviation community.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: (04/29/96) This is to advise you that on this date, pursuant to the powers vested in me, I have VETOED HB2239. This bill encourages infringement on personal property rights of citizens. In addition, the provisions of this legislation could result in an adverse effect on certain streams in our state.

If not strictly adhered to, our nepotism laws could become meaningless. Creating exceptions to nepotism laws sends the wrong message.

It has been necessary on more than one occasion for me to Veto provisions of law which grant individual private entities special privileges not available to all private entities. HB2621 grants the right to use state property for non-state purposes by a non-governmental entity. Such requirement violates constitutional restrictions. Currently, there exists private entities that have state employee members and that appear and lobby for state

employees. State employees can join or no, and participate or not as they choose. By this action a state employee will not be prevented from participating in these or other types of private organizations.

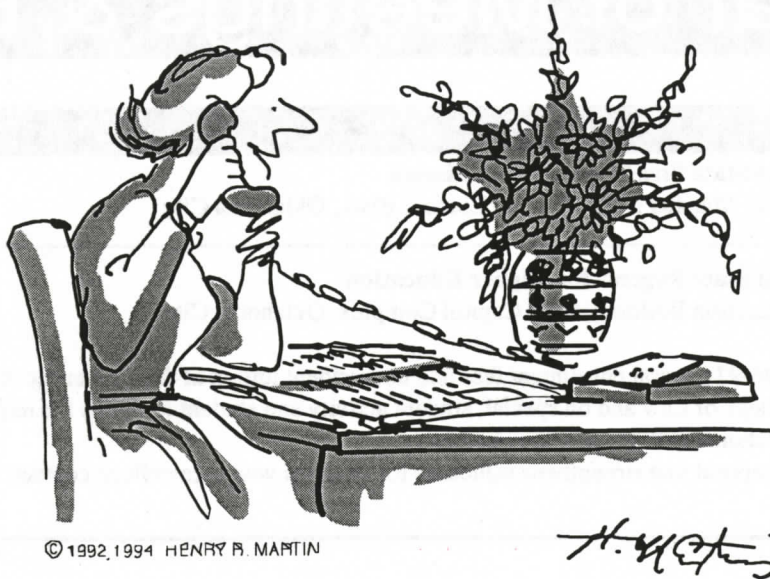
