EDUCATION LEADERS COMMENT ON MID-TERM FUNDING SOLUTION

■(GIT) Though most in the education community are pleased to have some type of solution to the mid-term funding problem, some have concerns about specific points of HB2055, the bill aimed at correcting school funding. The bill passed the House and Senate Thursday and is on its way to the governor's desk.

"We are pleased with most of it," said Vicki White-Rankin, legislative information officer for Oklahoma City Public Schools. "There are, however, some flaws that are not advantageous to the kids I represent."

White-Rankin pointed to one section of the bill that changes the maximum number of days a student may be absent before no longer being included in average daily membership figures. The bill reduces allowed absences from 20 to 10.

"This will potentially cause a fairly dramatic reduction in our student count," she said. "We have many many impoverished families, especially in the urban areas."

Many of poor families in the district often find it difficult to produce a doctors release for an extended illness, White-Rankin explained.

"Many of those families do not even have a phone."

Another point of concern is a provision requiring schools to show a student growth rate of 1.5 percent before being eligible for funding.

With some 40,000 students in the Oklahoma City public school system, a growth rate of 1.5 percent is equal to approximately 500 to 600 stu-

dents, the average size of most school districts in the state.

"We have had to grow a whole school district before we get a penny," White-

Rankin said. "In three years we have had approximately 2,500 new students."

She added that the 1.5 percent rate is expected to be phased out over the next three to four years.

"It looks worse when you have a larger district," said Education Secretary Floyd Coppedge, calling the concern a legitimate one. "The truth of the matter, however, is that larger districts have more schools. From my own perspective, it's (the 1.5 percent threshold) going to be washed out eventually — it's no worse for them (larger districts) than anyone else."

One point of the bill she did applaud was

LONG DELAY EXPECTED IN STATE'S SUIT AGAINST FORMER STIFEL EXECUTIVE

■(GIT) The state Attorney General's office plans to wait nearly a year before taking further action in its lawsuit against the former head of Stifel, Nicolaus' public finance office in Oklahoma, *Capitol Network News* has learned.

Gerald Adams, spokesman for the attorney general's office, said, "We're likely looking at 10 to 11 months or more before we begin discovery" in the state's lawsuit against

Robert Cochran.

The 48-year-old Cochran headed Stifel, Nicolaus and Company's public finance office in Oklahoma until his firing in 1994. The St. Louis-based firm, once considered the state's biggest and most powerful financing company, sold its Oklahoma operations in 1995.

Cochran and Stifel are accused "of a pattern of racketeering activity" in a \$23 million federal lawsuit filed by the attorney general in October.

The suit alleges wrongdoing in six deals — 1989, 1991 and 1992 bond issues for the Oklahoma Turnpike Authority, a 1991 Grand River Dam Authority issue, a 1992 Oklahoma City Airport Trust Authority deal and a 1990 Pottawatomie County Development Authority issue.

Adams said the delay is the result of fed-

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a section requiring ad valorem (property tax) funds to be chargeable one year sooner than before.

White-Rankin said cities like Norman, while they may not show a growth rate of 1.5 percent for a single year, would have two years worth of ad valorem growth to fall back on.

"Norman has had a lot of new ad valorem money," she said.

Kay Floyd, of the Oklahoma School Boards Association, called the measure "a good solution to a complex problem."

"It appears to be what we all had agreed to be the best solution," she said. "It takes midterm funding away as an issue every year. The plan is a permanent solution and funds the education of students wherever they are."

Coppedge said with the permanent solution in place, mid-term funding will no longer be the "political football" it has been in the past. He said the State Aid formula, however, will not go away as easily.

"People who know the most about this want to simplify the formula," he said, referring to numerous considerations, or weights, in the formula that make it somewhat complex.

Gifted students, sparsity of the school location, size of the school, economic situations of students and level of teacher experience all play into the amount of funding schools receive each year.

"You'll never have a system that is 100 percent acceptable to everyone," Coppedge said.

RESOLUTION COULD THREATEN THE INDIAN CHILD WELFARE ACT, BUREAU OF INDIAN AFFAIRS SAYS

■(GIT) A congressional resolution introduced into the House of Representatives last April would amend the Indian Child Welfare Act of 1978. "It would make it easier for non-Indians to adopt Indian children without tribal consent," said Ada E. Deer, assistant secretary for the Bureau of Indian Affairs. However, one Oklahoma Attorney believes that the Act is already too vague and sometimes misused.

The state Adoption Law Reform Committee created by HB1322 met early last November to start recodifying Oklahoma's adoption laws. During that meeting, Chairman, Rep. Russ Roach, D-Tulsa, told members that even though the Oklahoma Indian Child Welfare Act was both important and imperfect, the committee would already have their "hands full" trying to recodify the general laws. At that time, John O'Connor, a Tulsa attorney and committee member, suggested that the Act needed to be codified along with the general adoption laws. "If we are going to do a complete job, we should include it," he said.

Currently, the committee is still meeting, but O'Connor said the issues concerning the Act are "still on the back-burner."

"I personally believe that the Act was made too broad," O'Connor said. "Initially it was aimed at involuntary removal." He further explained those biological parents consisting of one Indian and one non-Indian run into problems when voluntarily giving their child or children up for adoption.

O'Connor gave an example of this by citing a case he had worked on. The unwed mother, a non-Indian, gave birth to an Indian man's child and decided to give the child up for adoption. The Indian man was notified twice and did not express opposition. However, before he could sign the papers for the legal adoption to be final, the tribe he belonged to sent their tribal police to take the baby because the baby's paternal grandmother decided she wanted to raise the baby. "The hospital wouldn't release the child without a district court order," O'Connor explained.

In fact, O'Connor said that not only did the man verbally consent to his child's adoption, his tribe also did a home-study visitation of the potential adoptive parents.

O'Connor said that some of the Nations are interpreting their role as parents, even if

the child is only 1 percent over 512 Indian. "They don't care, they are just coming in and taking over," he added.

O'Connor explained that the parents, not the tribe, should be the ultimate decision makers with adoption. "What gives Tribes more superiority than biological parents," O'Connor asserted. "Parental rights should predominate!"

O'Connor said the Oklahoma Supreme
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eral efforts to prosecute Cochran, who was found guilty May 6 by a federal jury of five counts of wire fraud, two counts of money laundering and one count of transporting illegal profits across state lines. The charges were tied to the airport trust authority bond issue and a deal involving the non-profit Sisters of St. Mary Healthcare Authority in Missouri.

Jurors also acquitted Cochran of 13 felony counts related to two of the turnpike deals, including the 1992 bond issue in which he was alleged to have hidden a \$6.5 million fee, and the Grand River Dam project.

Cochran has said he will appeal the convictions, which under federal sentencing guidelines could put him in prison for less than 10 years and require that he forfeit more than \$629,000 in hidden profits.

"We have been working closely with federal prosecutors and did not want to do anything that might jeopardize their case," Adams said. "That same line of thinking still applies."

Meanwhile, the embattled financier faces a host of other courtroom disputes:

✓ A US Securities and Exchange case pending in federal court in Oklahoma City accuses Cochran and two past aides of fraud;

✓ In a \$6.5 million suit of its own, the turnpike authority accuses Cochran and Stifel of fraud and deceit in the 1992 bond deal;

✓ Cochran, a former aide and Stifel are accused by the Pottawatomie County Development Authority of making \$302,000 in "secret profits" in a case pending in state court; and

✓ A case recent filed in state court by the Comanche County Hospital Authority alleges Stifel and Cochran lied to make a \$100,000 fee on a 1993 bond deal for the Lawton hospital.

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OKLAHOMA PUBLICATION GIVEN NATIONAL RECOGNITION

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) The Oklahoma Department of Human Services (DHS) publication, *Adopt a Black Child: One Church, One Child*, has been honored as a notable state publication by the *Journal of Government Information*. The October 1994 booklet featured 26 children who were available for adoption.

"One Church, One Child" is a nationally recognized adoptions recruitment program that was founded in 1980. It was designed to find parents for African-American children who need permanent homes. "One Church, One Child of Oklahoma" is sponsored by DHS in partnership with a statewide Ministerial Advisory Council in coop-

eration with the Urban League affiliates in Oklahoma City and Tulsa.

Churches in the African-American community are challenged by the "One Church, One Child" program to recruit, from their members, at least one family to adopt or foster a needy African-American child or set of siblings. Some of these children have special needs, but all of the children are truly unique and need a loving, single-parent, racially mixed, or black family to take them into their homes and hearts.

The booklet introduced the children, who range in ages from infants to teens with photographs and information about their backgrounds, interests, aptitudes and personalities.

"All of these children can benefit so much from the love and attention of a dedicated family or single adult," says Jane Morgan of the DHS Adoption Services Program. "We work very hard at matching children in DHS custody with families because a good placement is a lifetime investment for all concerned."

"Out of the 26 children promoted in October of 1994, 14 children have found really good homes through this program," says Morgan. "Interest from the African-American community has been terrific. But there were more than 1,000 children in DHS custody who need adoptive families. We continually need to be recruiting families who can provide a loving home for these children."

Court made a decision stating that if the adoptions were voluntary, the Oklahoma Indian Child Welfare Act did not apply. He added that the issue was a subject the committee could not avoid. "We have a tremendous Indian population, where some of the Nations are based. This question comes up a lot."

On the other hand, Deer, with the Bureau of Indian Affairs, said the federal legislation would set the provisions of the Act back 30 years and destroy all the progress Indian tribes have made in protecting their children.

At this time, the federal House Rules Committee will allow amendments to the resolution. This will provide an opportunity for an amendment to HR3268 to be introduced which will delete any reference to amending the Indian Child Welfare Act.

"It is very devastating for an Indian child to grow up in a non-Indian environment. An Indian child must know, feel and experience his culture. Isolated hardship stories cited by the Congress about non-Indian adoptive parents should not form the basis for an amendment to the Indian Child Welfare Act. An amendment should be considered only after the proper consultation with Indian tribal governments has occurred," Deer explained.

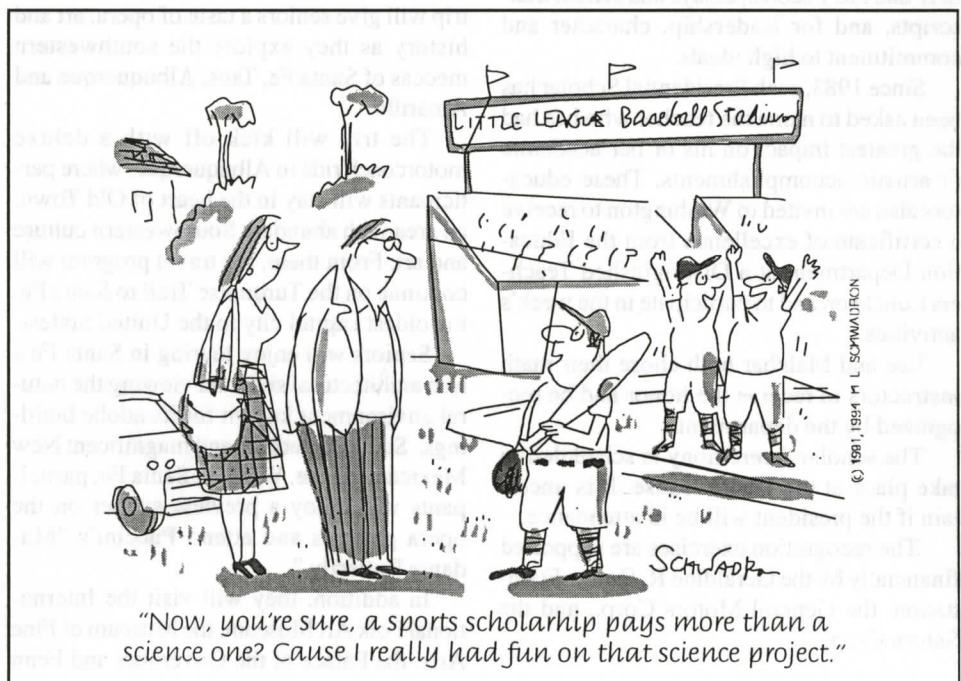
■(NORMAN) A week long intensive program for academically gifted and talented youth who have completed grades five, six, and seven will be offered this summer by the University of Oklahoma College of Continuing Education.

1996 PRESIDENTIAL SCHOLARS NAMED

■(GIT) President Clinton and U.S. Education Secretary Richard Riley this week announced the 33rd class of Presidential Scholars — 141 high school seniors recognized for their outstanding accomplishments in academics and the arts.

They will visit Washington June 19-23 for a week of activities, including a ceremony where each student will receive a Presidential Scholar Medallion. A highlight of the week's activities includes a performance by several Scholars in the Arts at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in "A Salute to 1996 Presidential Scholars."

Of the honorees two were Oklahoma high school graduates — Chung Lee, of Norman High School, and Haley Malchar, of Shawnee Senior High.

"We pay a great deal of attention to athletes and stars," Riley said, "but rarely notice the personal victories in the classroom. thirty three years ago, President Johnson, a former teacher, had the notion that at least once a year the nation should acknowledge and honor good scholarship. It's marvelous tradition, and as secretary, a time I always look forward to."

A 32 member commission on Presidential Scholars made the final selection of scholars from among 2.6 million graduating high school seniors.

The 1996 scholars were selected for broad academic achievement, as reflected by SAT and ACT scores, essays and school transcripts, and for leadership, character and commitment to high ideals.

Since 1983, each Presidential Scholar has been asked to name the teacher who has had the greatest impact on his or her academic or artistic accomplishments. These educators also are invited to Washington to receive a certificate of excellence from the Education Department at a Distinguished Teachers Luncheon and to participate in the week's activities.

Lee and Malchar both chose their math instructors to receive the honor and be recognized by the department.

The scholars' ceremony is scheduled to take place at the White House. It is uncertain if the president will be in attendance.

The recognition exercises are supported financially by the Geraldine R. Dodge Foundation, the General Motors Corp., and the Saturn Corp.

DOE GRANT ENHANCES TRIBAL COLLEGE ENVIRONMENTAL INITIATIVE

■(WASHINGTON) Secretary of Energy Hazel R. O'Leary recently committed the Department of Energy (DOE) to fund the Tribal College Initiative (TCI) at \$500,000 annually for the next four years and has encouraged other federal agencies to join DOE in this effort. The initiative will help Native American students prepare for science and related environmental careers, contributing to the department's mission of enhancing scientific understanding and maintaining a national work force skilled in energy, environmental and other technical fields. The Secretary announced the funding at a meeting with Navajo Nation President Albert Hale and with Dr. Tommy Lewis, Jr., President of the Navajo Community College; Dr. James Tutt, President of the Crownpoint Institute of Technology; and Dr. Carolyn Elgin, President of the Southwestern Indian Polytechnic Institute.

Secretary O'Leary said, "The Tribal College Initiative is an exciting partnership in developing the science and technical potential of Native American students. This grant from our Office of Environmental Management continues the department's commitment to these three colleges, which began in fiscal year 1995 with an award of \$172,000

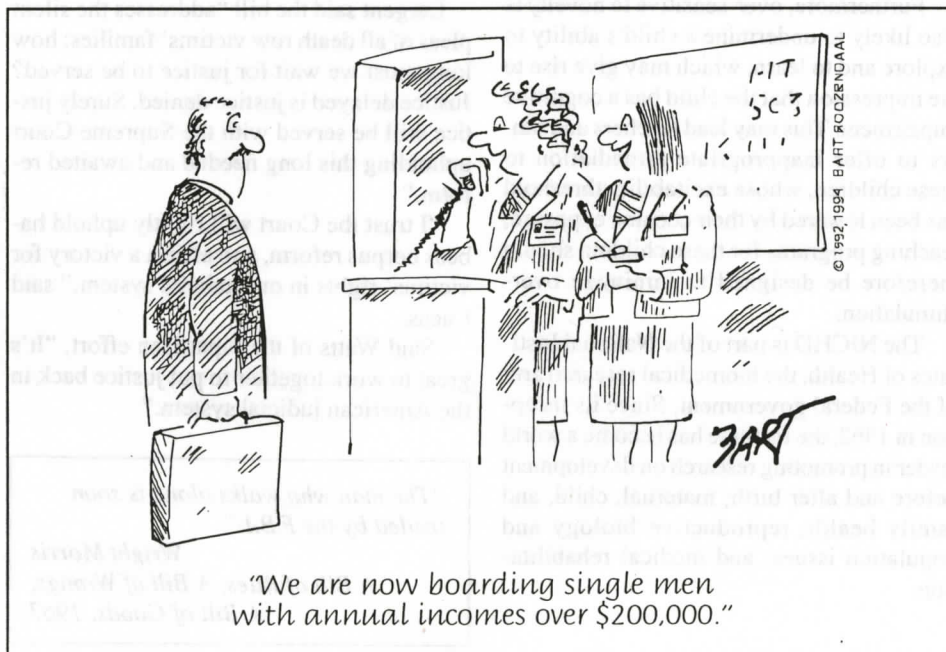
and has grown to reflect our enhanced understanding of the benefits to tribal education."

Secretary O'Leary committed DOE to seek assistance from other federal agencies in support of the initiative. In addition, she agreed to explore methods of enhancing TCI's ability to conduct nationally competitive research in areas that support DOE's mission requirements. This includes examining available opportunities in existing programs aimed at developing scientific and engineering manpower needed to satisfy the challenges awaiting DOE in the 21st century.

The TCI program was developed in cooperation with the Partnership for Environmental Technology Education. TCI's long-term goals are to enhance the educational science and technology programs within tribally controlled colleges and maintain educational pathways and scientific literacy within underrepresented groups such as American Indians, Alaska Natives and minority students. DOE's contribution to the initiative furthers the goals of the department's 1992 American Indian Policy and the 1994 Presidential Statement on government-to-government relationships with tribes.

GENE "KNOCKOUTS" REVEAL CRITICAL LINKS IN SYNAPSE FORMATION

■(WASHINGTON) New studies reveal exciting clues to the mystery of how synapses form between nerve and muscle cells. The findings shed new light on human development and may help reveal how molecular interactions are altered in muscular dystrophy.

Studies of mice with genes "knocked out" or inactivated reveal that two proteins, called agrin and muscle-specific receptor kinase (MuSK), are essential for motor nerves to form synapses with muscle. Mice missing either protein die shortly after birth due to profound defects in their neuromuscular synapses which leave them unable to move or breathe. The similar defects in the two mutants, with other findings from these studies, suggest that MuSK serves directly as a receptor for agrin.

"This new research is an important step forward in understanding how signaling mechanisms in the brain develop. These findings will be important for understanding both developmental disorders and regeneration after disease or injury," said D. Zach W. Hall, director of the national Institute of Neurological Disorders and Strokes (NINDS).

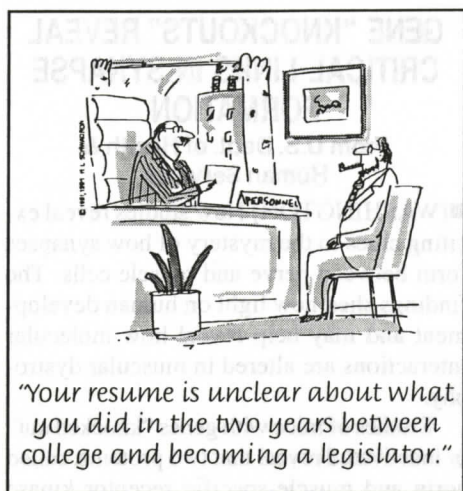
Synapses at the neuromuscular junction, where motor nerves signal to muscle, are crucial for normal movement and can serve as models for synapses in the brain and spinal cord. Researchers have identified many proteins found at neuromuscular synapses, but they are just beginning to describe how these molecules work. The severe defects seen in mice lacking either agrin or MuSK show that these molecules are critical links in development of motor nerve connections. The new studies are reported in the May 17 issue of *Cell* and were funded in part by NINDS.

The NINDS, one of the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda, Maryland, is the nation's leading supporter of research on the brain and nervous system and a lead agency for the Congressionally designated Decade of the Brain.

DELEGATION URGES COURT TO UPHOLD REFORMS

■(WASHINGTON) Oklahoma Senators Jim Inhofe and Don Nickles and Representatives Bill Brewster, Tom Coburn, Ernest Istook, Steve Largent, Frank Lucas and J.C. Watts, Jr., have joined Sen. Orrin Hatch, chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, in urging the Supreme Court to uphold the habeas corpus provisions of the recently passed Antiterrorism Bill.

In signing on to Hatch's friend-of-the-court brief, the Oklahoma Congressional delegation is calling on the justices to care-

fully consider the legal arguments on why the habeas corpus reforms do not violate the Constitution. The Court recently decided to hear a case, *Felker v. Warden*, in which the issue will be addressed.

Considered by many to be the most important part of the Antiterrorism Bill, the new habeas corpus provisions are designed to limit frivolous appeals by death row inmates and to help insure that death sentences in the most heinous crime cases are carried out in a timely manner.

"The Antiterrorism Bill," said Inhofe, "is designed to restore the concept of punishment as a deterrent to crime. This is what the families of the victims in Oklahoma City have worked so hard to achieve. I have every confidence that the Supreme Court will agree and uphold the constitutionality of these reforms."

Nickles said he was glad to join with other members of the Oklahoma delegation in the effort. "This hard won victory in Congress to end endless death row appeals has already been challenged in court. I am pleased to join my delegation colleagues and Sen. Hatch in this effort to preserve that victory for all the relatives and victims of the Oklahoma City bombing who worked so hard to make that victory possible."

Istook criticized what he called liberal groups "who run screaming to the courts whenever we try to get tougher on crime."

"These groups seem focused on coddling criminals. I wish instead they would focus on the rights of victims and of the citizens who want to avoid becoming victims."

Largent said the bill "addresses the silent pleas of all death row victims' families: how long must we wait for justice to be served? Justice delayed is justice denied. Surely justice will be served with the Supreme Court upholding this long needed and awaited reform."

"I trust the Court will rightly uphold habeas corpus reform, and affirm a victory for victims' rights in our judicial system," said Lucas.

Said Watts of the bipartisan effort, "It's great to work together to put justice back in the American judicial system."

INFANTS PRENATALLY EXPOSED TO COCAINE MAY BE MORE AFFECTED EMOTIONALLY THAN INTELLECTUALLY

■(WASHINGTON) Infants who were prenatally exposed to cocaine may be more affected emotionally than intellectually, according to collaborating teams of pediatricians and psychologists from the Yale Child Study Center, led by Linda Myers, and from the National Institute of Child Health and Human Development (NICHD), lead by Marc Bornstein. As infants, these children tend to be very easily over-stimulated and distressed by unfamiliar sights and sounds, but their ability to process information may not be as affected.

It is estimated that at least 50,000 and perhaps as many as 375,000 infants are born yearly in the United States to mothers who abuse cocaine or crack while pregnant. The investigators are studying the impact of cocaine on the mental and emotional development of these babies.

The work is described in several reports, the most recent of which appears in the current issue of *Development and Psychopathology*, which is devoted to and entitled "Regulatory Processes in Development." This article describes how researchers, who recruited women at Yale-New Haven Hospital, recorded the emotional reactions of 63 infants when they were presented with pictures of unfamiliar faces or objects. The mothers of 36 of these infants had used cocaine during pregnancy, and their babies' reactions were compared with those of 27 non-exposed infants from a similar socioeconomic background. The researchers conclude that cocaine exposed babies are more likely to respond to such novel images by fretting or crying than are children who are

not exposed to cocaine prenatally. In fact, some of the cocaine babies were so irritable that they couldn't be tested.

The Yale/NICHD teams believe that irritability and over-sensitivity to novelty have several important implications for the development of cocaine-exposed infants. Firstly, adults the world over, says Dr. Bornstein, in addition to comforting, often respond to crying infants by distracting them. This strategy is likely to make matters worse for cocaine-exposed babies. Secondly, a fretful, fussy baby is harder to care for and respond to, a problem that is compounded by the fact that these babies are not only born to but also often reared by substance-abusing mothers, whose addiction impairs their ability to interact with their infants.

Furthermore, over-sensitive to novelty is also likely to undermine a child's ability to explore and to learn, which may give rise to the impression that the child has a cognitive impairment. This may lead teachers and others to offer inappropriate remediation to these children, whose excitability threshold has been lowered by their cocaine exposure; teaching programs for these children should therefore be designed to minimize over-stimulation.

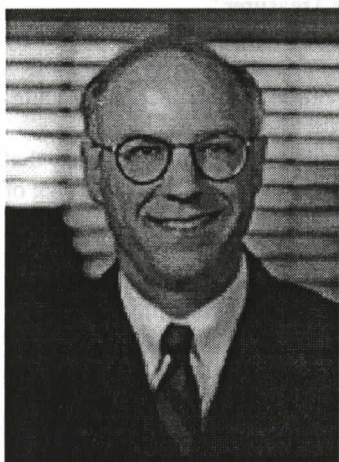

TREASURER STRESSES INTEGRITY, SAVING, MAKING MONEY

(GIT) "Integrity," Oklahoma Treasurer Robert Butkin said last month, "is our chief commodity."

Words similar to those were keystones to the Duncan man's campaign for what many consider one of the most, if not the most, controversial offices in state government.

But since taking office last year, the Butkin administration has been more than devoid of negative morning paper headlines. In fact, headlines concerning Butkin, his administration and office have headed in the opposite direction and stories about the treasurer's

office are now filled with praise from other state agency heads.

One newspaper's editorial page put it this way:

"Stated plainly, Butkin is bringing simple competence to an office renowned for its byzantine politics."

THE OPEN WINDOW

One of Butkin's earliest observations about his new office concerned the windows: "In the not so distant past," Butkin said, "an attitude of secrecy prevailed. Even the windows were covered."

Accessibility was a key part of Butkin's plan for improving the operation and perception of the treasurer's office. One of Butkin's first efforts was The Open Window, a homepage on the World Wide Web of the Internet.

"With the simple click of a button on your home computer, you can find out what the Treasurer's office is doing with your tax money," Butkin said when the page went on-line last September. "Complete monthly investment reports are on-line, along with my administration's investment and certificates of deposit policies."

In addition to investment reports, The Open Window gives a general overview of all Treasury operations, including investments, banking services and linked deposit programs. The homepage also allows users to send electronic mail questions and comments directly to the Treasurer.

"People can easily check with their banks to find out about their personal bank account. the people should have the same access to information about their tax dollars," the treasurer said. "It's a matter of restoring trust and confidence in the Treasurer's office. Easy access to complete information is a key component."

Another component of Butkin's accessibility plan calls for the installation of a user friendly computer in the lobby of the Treasurer's office so that visitors to the capitol can access the same information provided on the homepage.

SAVING MONEY

It takes more than a pen and a checkbook to be state treasurer.

Part of the job involves saving money.

Even before taking office," Butkin said, "I began a comprehensive review of all aspects of the State Treasurer's operations to determine ways we could save the taxpayers money and make government more efficient."

In October, Butkin announced an agreement with Governor Frank Keating's administration that would save approximately \$175,000 in state funds each year. "I realized early on that one area where significant savings could occur was in our computer operations.

"Why should Oklahoma taxpayers pay \$250,000 a year to private computer vendors, when right next door to the Treasurer's office is a mainframe computer already owned by the State of Oklahoma which might do the job just as well? I approached Tom Daxon (State Finance Director) with the idea of moving our computer operations to the Office of State Finance."

The agreement required the Democratic State Treasurer to work closely with Governor Frank Keating's Office of State Finance.

"Turf and partisanship were never issues," said Butkin. "Getting the best deal for the taxpayers of Oklahoma was our ultimate goal. My staff identified unnecessary duplication in computer operations — and thanks to the cooperation of all involved — we've now found a way to end it."

Daxon, too, praised the effort, saying, "We are pleased and excited about the opportunity to work with the Treasurer. We are committed to making this an example of what can happen when two agencies cooperate to reduce costs and increase service. Treasurer Butkin deserves praise for this initiative."

"It's quite a complex operation," Butkin said of the effort. "We process several million payment warrants each year and the mainframe is used to check and balance the entire process. Everything must be in place and working."

The final changeover is scheduled to occur on July 1. Once completed, it will reduce \$250,000 in annual external expenses for mainframe computer needs to less than \$75,000 to outside vendors.

In addition, Butkin found ways to save \$340,000 while generating an additional \$1.1 million in interest earnings during the 1995 fiscal year.

Specifically, Butkin said savings are being realized in three areas — elimination of unneeded banking services, special processing of deposits and improved cash management techniques.

"First, we were able to greatly reduce charges from banks by

eliminating duplication between services provided within our office and the banks," Butkin explained. "We provide special handling services for deposits made by our office which save banks time, trouble and money — and they are now passing that savings along to us. Also, we have changed the ways we manage our cash accounts to get rid of unnecessary fees."

For a number of years, Butkin said, "The Treasurer paid for bank services in part with cash and partially with compensating balances. The balances were invested by banks with the interest earnings used to offset the remaining bank service charges."

Beginning last July, the move freed up more than \$16 million for investment by the state, he said, and paying cash for all bank service charges. For the current fiscal year, the move is expected to translate into an additional \$1.1 million in interest revenue.

Another way Butkin's office is saving taxpayer's money is by reducing credit card processing costs for state agencies by almost 50 percent — a total savings of more than \$150,000 per year.

Only a few months after taking office, Butkin completed a contract drastically reducing the credit card handling charges for agencies participating in the Treasurer's credit card program, cutting the processing rates by nearly 50 percent.

"A total of 13 state agencies, including the Tax Commission and Tourism Department, are participating in the new contract, but I am strongly encouraging more agencies to participate," Butkin said. "The contract allows us to reopen rate negotiations if we get enough activity. In the end, we could save even more money for the state."

MAKING MONEY

With so much money saved, the Treasurer's office has more money to invest for the benefit of the state's coffers. Butkin and his staff have proven themselves in that arena, as well.

Interest earnings are an important part of state revenue, generating the sixth largest source of revenue to fund state government and by far the largest source of non-tax revenues.

Earlier this year, the office released a report showing interest earnings on state investments for the first half of fiscal year 1996 "far exceeded" original estimates.

The report showed interest earnings of the first half of the fiscal year of nearly \$36.7 million on investments of some \$1.5 billion. That's nearly \$5.4 million above original

estimates or more than 17 percent higher than projected.

The additional earnings, Butkin said, are enough money "to provide annual state education funding for more than 2,000 Oklahoma school children. It's also enough money to pay the annual salaries of more than 190 state troopers."

For fiscal year 1996, Butkin's first complete fiscal year as treasurer, the State Board of Equalization certified the treasurer's interest earning estimates at more than \$67 million. Butkin said projections, however, show the earnings will top \$73 million when the fiscal year ends June 30.

And more of the state's money is finding its way into state banks under a Certificate of Deposit policy that allows Oklahoma banks, savings and loans and credit unions to have access to as much in state deposits as they need.

"Historically, treasurers have failed to publicly outline what it takes for a bank to get state funds. My policy should leave no questions. If a bank, savings and loan, or credit union in Oklahoma wants state money, all it has to do is follow the rules outlined in the policy — and the rules create a level playing field for every financial institution."

The policy is simple, Butkin said: "Any Oklahoma financial institution can have as much money as it wants, so long as the public earns a fair interest rate, sufficient collateral is pledged and all the paperwork is filled out."

The funds, Butkin said, are an important element in helping state financial institutions meet local loan demand and promoting economic development.

More than \$200 million of state funds are invested with state banks, approximately 18 percent of the state's investment portfolio. The remaining 82 percent is invested in government securities and a cash management program.

WINNING PRAISE

Perhaps Butkin's highest marks come not from numbers on a balance sheet, but from the man and the office responsible for overseeing the proper handling of taxpayers' money across the state — State Auditor and Inspector Clifton Scott.

In April, Butkin's administration received a "clean" audit from Scott's office — the first report of its kind in at least eight years. The auditor's latest review of the office found "no reportable conditions."

"Internal controls are in place and operating properly to ensure the safety of the people's money," Butkin said.

Scott commended Butkin and his staff for their work. "Hopefully the citizens of Oklahoma realize the importance of having an efficient, well managed State Treasurer's office," said Scott. "Today, when most people only hear of what's wrong with their state government, we are pleased to issue this report and commend the genuine accountability which does, indeed, exist in the Office of State Treasurer."

Butkin responded to Scott's praise by saying, "My primary goal is to operate a Treasurer's office that the people of Oklahoma can trust and be proud of."

"The scandals of the past are exactly that — of the past. This audit is only one sign of the improvements we have made to keep the people's money safe."

Capital Network News congratulates the state treasurer and his staff for their efforts to live by Butkin's own words — "Integrity is our chief commodity."

Those efforts have opened the office to public access and scrutiny, have saved the state money that has then been invested with near-record results and have resulted in a praise-winning operation.

"In less than a year since he took office, he has — in his quiet, unassuming way — gone about restoring integrity and putting into place business practices that not only make Oklahoma taxpayers more money, but save money in the operation of the treasurer's office," said the Claremore Daily Progress. **AND THAT'S GOOD FOR OKLAHOMA!!**

Robert Butkin, a third generation Oklahoman, was elected State Treasurer in 1994, his first race for elective office.

He graduated magna cum laude from Yale University, and earned a law degree from the University of Pennsylvania.

In 1981 he began serving as a director of the Citizens Bank of Velma, later becoming Chairman, a position he resigned when he was elected State Treasurer.

Butkin began his public service career in 1987 as an Assistant Attorney General, where he fought for lower utility rates and argued the landmark Illinois River case before the U.S. Supreme Court.

PANEL PRESSES DAC FOR ACCOUNTABILITY

■(GIT) What was supposed to be a discussion of the fiscal needs of the state's district attorneys turned into a debate over the accountability of funding maintained by the District Attorneys Council.

Appearing before the General Conference Committee on Appropriations' subcommittee on judicial, public safety and law enforcement services, DAC director Bruce

Walker found himself having to defend the agency's handling of a variety of funds, including those appropriated by the state, in a sometimes heated exchange with some members of the panel.

Sen. Herb Rozell, D-Tahlequah, asked Walker how much money, including state and federal appropriations, the council had been responsible for handling during the most recent fiscal year.

As Walker began to detail the various appropriations made to the agency, Rozell interrupted, asking if the total amount was not close to \$56 million. Walker disagreed, saying a total of \$47.4 million had come into the council, including \$1.67 million in federal funds that went directly to district attorneys.

Rozell then pressed Walker for the total amount spent by the council on operations. Walker said the amount was \$755,104.90.

Perhaps the harshest questioning during the meeting came from Sen. Gene Stipe, D-McAlester, who asked, "Who decides which members of this committee you will denounce after we meet?"

When Walker said he did not understand the senator's question, Stipe said, "It happens every session. The council and individual district attorneys hold press conferences to denounce this committee because we do what you wanted us to do."

Walker agreed, saying it was not the council's practice to denounce the committee.

Stipe also pressed Walker for an accounting of money resulting from drug forfeitures and bogus check collections, saying he had repeatedly asked for such reports but that they had never been supplied. Walker immediately distributed a report concerning the funds from the 1995 fiscal year and added that he had made the reports available as required by statute.

As it has with other agencies, the subcommittee delayed consideration of the bulk of the council's request, approving only the state employee pay raise and associated benefits increase portions of the request.

The council asked the panel to consider allocating \$66,994 for an increase in district attorneys salaries mandated by law and effective Jan. 1, 1997; \$5.6 million to cover the cost of 140 FTEs in district attorneys offices to deal with increased workloads re-

sulting from violent crime; and \$114,000 to cover the increased cost of testimony from expert witnesses.

The subcommittee is expected to take up those requests, along with the requests from other agencies not related to the state employee pay raise, at a later meeting.

DOC REQUESTS ADDITIONAL \$96 MILLION

■(GIT) The Department of Corrections on Monday asked the General Conference Committee on Appropriations' subcommittee on judicial, public safety and law enforcement services for an additional \$96 million in its fiscal year 1997 budget.

Sen. Cal Hobson, D-Lexington, had called the department and its financial needs a monster during an earlier meeting of the subcommittee. On Monday, the Lexington Democrat challenged the analogy, but the message was much the same.

"We've tried to save back every dime we could," Hobson said, "but regardless of what we pour into the bucket, it's not going to get anywhere near the top."

Annualization of this year's supplemental appropriation to the department will cost an estimated \$18 million, allowing the continued leasing of some 969 private prison beds in Texas and Oklahoma, the continued employment of an additional 150 staff members, the purchase of additional security equipment for probation and parole staff and energy contract payments for the W.S. Key Correctional Center.

The supplemental appropriation became necessary when prison officials ran out of alternatives for housing inmates in the state and county facilities. In addition to contracting with private prisons in Texas, as well as with a new facility in Holdenville, the department has been forced to temporarily house inmates in condemned cellhouses at the Oklahoma State Reformatory in Granite and at the Oklahoma State Penitentiary in McAlester.

In a related request, Larry Fields, DOC director, asked the subcommittee to consider allocating \$26.5 million for the lease of additional private prison bed space.

Specifically, the department estimates it will exceed its population limit by some 866 inmates by the end of the current fiscal year. In addition to space to house those inmates,

Fields said, the department's projections show the need to phase in 1,530 more prison beds by the end of the 1997 fiscal year in order to handle the growing inmate population.

The department's request is more than double that recommended by the governor. Keating has proposed funding for 1,603 additional prison beds, including 1,383 private prison beds, 60 additional contract county jail beds and contracts for 160 beds in Mexico.

Asked by Sen. Gene Stipe, D-McAlester, what it would take to bring the prisoners housed in Texas back to Oklahoma, Fields and other DOC personnel pointed to the same thing: Money.

"There aren't sufficient beds in this state to bring them home," a DOC employee attending the meeting said.

Following the procedure set in its previous meetings, the subcommittee approved allocations to the department for the statewide employee pay raise at a cost of \$6.5 million and the associated OPERS contribution of \$558,375. Also approved was full funding of the department's contribution to the teacher's retirement system of \$22,500.

SENATOR, OIDS DIRECTOR EXPRESS CONCERNS

■(GIT) A state lawmaker and the director of the Oklahoma Indigent Defense System on Monday expressed concerns that the agency may be approaching a constitutional crisis because it does not have enough funding.

Responding to a question from Sen. Gene Stipe, D-McAlester and a member of the General Conference Committee on Appropriations' subcommittee on judicial, public safety and law enforcement services, Oklahoma Indigent Defense System Director Robert Ganstine said his staff is "getting to the point that they won't be able to provide adequate representation" to their clients.

To best meet those obligations, Ganstine said, the agency will need \$12.4 million in addition to the \$8.1 million already appropriated to the agency, including \$821,595 to annualize a supplemental appropriation approved earlier in the legislative session.

"My concern is that I don't want to see us become unconstitutional because you're underfunded and undermanned," Stipe said.

"I want to be confident you have enough money."

The concern, Ganstine told the subcommittee, is that federal supervision of the state's indigent defense system could cost the state as much as \$50 million to \$75 million if it were determined to be unconstitutional. That amount is more than double the agency's total funding request of approximately \$20.5 million.

Panel members questioned Ganstine repeatedly about whether it might be possible to reduce the number of cases by better determining which clients were truly indigent or by collecting the cost of defending those determined not to be actually indigent.

"That might reduce the number of applications," Ganstine replied, adding that he could not estimate what affect it would have on the agency's caseload.

The subcommittee took no action on the bulk of the agency's request, following the procedure it established with its first meeting. Instead, members approved the agency's allocations for the statewide employee pay raise and associated benefits increase.

The panel is expected to renew consideration of the agency's request at a later meeting.

KEATING, McCALEB LAUNCH MISINFORMATION CAMPAIGN, THREATEN ROAD PROJECTS, EDUCATION FUNDING

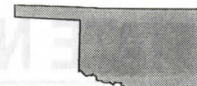
■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Gov. Keating's Transportation Secretary has been "shooting from the lip with little regard to accuracy" in his recent attacks on a legislative program for roads and highways, according to a Senate budget leader.

"I'm really surprised to see this kind of misinformation coming from Neal McCaleb," said Sen. Larry Dickerson, chairman of the Senate Appropriations Subcommittee on General Government and Transportation. "He knows what the real budget numbers are, but at Governor Keating's direction, he's deliberately trying to mislead Oklahomans on this point."

McCaleb has been traveling around the state in recent weeks, threatening to cancel local road projects and telling newspapers and civic clubs that legislators are advocating a standstill budget for the Transportation

tion Department. In reality, lawmakers are proposing a \$21 million increase for ODOT, \$6 million of which has already been delivered to the agency in the general appropriations bill passed earlier this session.

If enacted, the legislative program would represent the largest increase in state funds for the Department of Transportation since 1988.

In his recent statements, McCaleb has also decried the loss of federal highway funds, implying that state legislators should be responsible for offsetting any and all federal cuts handed down by the Republican Congress in Washington.

In their effort to discredit legislative attempts to increase road and highway funding, Governor Keating and Secretary McCaleb are promoting an alternative plan drafted by the executive branch. That proposal would use funding traditionally dedicated to schools, economic development initiatives and law enforcement to bolster the transportation agency's budget.

"We're going to do everything we can to boost our road construction program, but not at the expense of education and law enforcement. That's why the legislative proposal is far superior to the one drafted by the Governor," said Senator Dickerson.

McCaleb has suggested that ODOT's five year construction plan will be disrupted and local projects canceled if the Governor's program is not adopted, but Senator Dickerson says that statement is also untrue.

"The legislative budget proposal will keep everything on track with the five year program. Mr. McCaleb knows that, he's just trying to get his hands on every dollar he can."

"I think it's pretty ironic that Mr. McCaleb launched his misinformation campaign at the same time we were shaking hands with the Governor on a historic budget agreement. Apparently, he's out of the loop on the spirit of bipartisan cooperation at the State Capitol."

LAWMAKERS APPROVE MIDTERM FUNDING PLAN

■(GIT) State lawmakers on Thursday approved a plan designed to address one of the biggest disputes of the past two legislative sessions: Midterm school funding.

"Basically," Rep. Jack Begley, D-

Goodwell, chairman of the House's General Conference Committee on Appropriations' subcommittee on education, said, "this is a move toward current year funding, where there will no longer be a need for midterm adjustments."

Touted as a permanent solution to the midterm funding dilemma, which attempts to adjust allocations to state schools to accommodate growth in enrollment, **HB2055**, which passed the House and the Senate, includes the following provisions:

- ✓ Reduces from 20 to 10 the number of consecutive days a student can be absent without excuse after which a student will no longer be included in the average daily membership calculation for the school district;

- ✓ Stipulates that beginning with the 1996-97 school year that class size penalties shall not be applied if class size is exceeded beginning after the first nine weeks; if class size limitations are exceeded during the first nine weeks, then class size penalties will apply;

- ✓ Limits the current method of determining State Aid Formula allocations until the 1997-98 school year; provides for the calculation methodology for the 1996-97 supplemental funding to include funds for all student growth, membership greater than 1.5 percent receives full funding and membership growth less than 1.5 percent receives partial funding; also requires the department of education to develop and implement a student identification system specifically for the purpose of reporting enrollment data by school sites and school districts to establish a mobility rate and for the allocation of State Aid and midyear adjustments in funding student growth by July 1, 1998;

- ✓ Revises the State Aid Formula so that beginning with the 1997-8 school year, State Aid will be based on current year chargeable revenue and the highest weighted average daily membership for the first nine weeks of the current school year, the preceding school year or the second preceding school year; establishes the procedure for determining State Aid; applies the teacher experience and degree calculation to the Foundation Aid component of the State Aid Formula; requires the department of education to retain at least 1.5 percent of the funds appropriated for State Aid to pay for midyear adjustments due to increased enrollment; requires the Tax Commission and Commission of the

Land Office to make reports monthly to the Department of Education specifying the apportionment of state dedicated revenues and school land monies;

- ✓ Limits the current method of determining the weighted pupil grade level calculation, the weighted pupil category calculations, the weighted district calculation and the weighted teacher experience and degree calculation until the 1997-98 school year;

- ✓ Effective with the 1997-98 school year, establishes the new method for determining the weighted pupil grade level calculation, the weighted pupil category calculation, the weighted district calculation and the weighted teacher experience and degree calculation based on the highest weighted average daily membership for the first nine weeks of the current school year, the preceding school year or the second preceding school year;

- ✓ Expands the purposes for which a school district may request a student's Social Security number to include determining student enrollment, to establish a mobility rate for the allocation of State Aid Formula and midyear adjustments for student growth funding; and authorizes the department of education to develop an alternative accountability system for student identification for those purposes; and

- ✓ Requires the State Department of Education to provide written notification by July 10, 1996, to each school district describing the changes in State Aid funding provided in the bill.

"This is the agreement to the permanent fix," Sen. Don Williams, D-Balko, told fellow senators.

While there was no discussion of the measure in the House, questions were raised about language in the bill relating to the establishment of a mobility rate for students. Williams said the concept is to ensure students are only counted once in the funding formula.

"We're trying to make sure we're not paying for a student twice," he said.

The midterm funding proposal passed the House by a vote of 98-0. The bill also passed the Senate by a 44-1 vote.

In addition to approving the midterm funding plan, both houses of the legislature passed bills to make midterm money available for the past two academic years, as well

as for the 1996-97 school year.

Money for the 1996-97 school year — \$15 million — will come from the state's general revenue fund under the terms of **SB834**. The bill passed the House by a vote of 99-0 and cleared the Senate on a 42-0 vote.

The bill also includes general revenue fund appropriations of \$6.3 million for mid-term adjustments for the 1994-95 school year and \$6.7 million for the 1995-96 school year.

HB2824 provides the remaining funding for the 1994-95 and 1995-96 school years from the Rainy Day fund. Some \$6.3 million was appropriated from the account for the 1994-95 school year, while an additional \$6.7 million will be drawn from the Rainy Day account for the 1995-96 school year.

That bill was approved by the House in a 90-8 vote. The bill passed the Senate by a vote of 44-1.

RAINY DAY FUND APPROPRIATIONS APPROVED

■(GIT) Lawmakers in both houses gave their approval on Thursday to appropriations totaling \$22.6 million from the state's Rainy Day Fund.

The House voted 90-8 and the Senate followed with a 44-1 vote for **HB2824**. The bill makes appropriations to a variety of state agencies from the Rainy Day Fund.

The bill mirrors an agreement announced last week by legislative leaders from both houses and parties and Governor Frank Keating.

Appropriations in the bill include:

- ✓ \$6.3 million for 1994-95 midterm funding;
- ✓ \$6.7 million for 1995-96 midterm funding;
- ✓ \$1.5 million for a student tracking system;
- ✓ \$1.6 million for rural fire departments;
- ✓ \$1 million for weather modification;
- ✓ \$1 million for the governor's emergency fund;
- ✓ \$2.9 million to cover the costs of converting the Medicaid system to a managed care program;
- ✓ \$1.19 million for an Oklahoma Highway Patrol Academy and to purchase vehicle for the new troopers; and
- ✓ \$320,428 for National Guard armory

maintenance.

House speaker Glen Johnson, D-Okemah, hailed the bill's passage as another step in a bipartisan effort toward addressing the state's immediate financial needs and toward an orderly adjournment.

Members of the Senate also praised specific components of the bill.

Governor Frank Keating indicated his support for the Rainy Day proposal earlier this month when he and a bipartisan group of legislative leaders announced the terms of a three-part budget agreement.

GOODYEAR CEO PRAISES LAWTON FACILITY

■(GIT) Calling the Goodyear tire plant in Lawton the best in the world and the "crown jewel" of the company's operation, Goodyear President and CEO Samir F. Gibara said his Oklahoma visit Wednesday was to focus on positioning the Oklahoma facility for the future.

"We have a major commitment to Oklahoma...we have every intention of keeping it that way," Gibara said in a meeting with reporters. "The tire industry is becoming a global industry — we need to be in a position to compete with them."

He praised the Legislature for its economic development efforts, saying, however, that such areas as workers' compensation reform still needed some attention. "More can be done," he said.

Reasons for the success of the Lawton facility include its "very modern" equipment and systems personnel. The ability to work together and continuous education also play a key role, he said.

"We consider it a center of excellence."

He said skills, knowledge and talent were three keys to the plant's success.

When asked if right-to-work was an issue with Good Year, Gibara said it was not.

Calling Goodyear the last American owned tire company with worldwide interests, Gibara asked the U.S. Congress to "level the playing field" in terms of worldwide competitiveness. "Some other worldwide competitors get assistance from their governments," he said.

His message was much the same when

he spoke to a joint session of lawmakers in the House chamber.

"In the global economy, competition is not just North America against Japan against Europe. It is also Lawton against Topeka against Tokyo," he said.

"I think change is here to stay," Gibara said. "We need to not only be responsive to change, we need to preempt change."

Gibara visited the capitol while on his way to Lawton, where he was scheduled to attend the Lawton Chamber of Commerce and Industry's annual banquet Wednesday night.

HOUSE REJECTS PAWN SHOP CONFERENCE COMMITTEE REPORT

■(GIT) The House on Thursday rejected the second conference committee report for the so-called pawn shop bill.

Originally designed to limit the number of pawn shops in Oklahoma communities, the bill was reformed to require only a higher net asset value for those who apply for a pawn shop license, **HB2172**'s author Rep. Ron Kirby, D-Lawton, told the House.

It was that very element, however, that appeared to persuade a majority of House members to vote 37-59 against acceptance of the bill's second conference committee report.

Rep. Dan Ramsey, R-Chickasha, called the definition "one of the most unusual I have every seen." As defined by the proposed bill, net assets "include the investment made in cash, bank deposits, merchandise inventory, and loans due from customers excluding the pawn service charge." Excluded from the definition by the proposed measure were "investments made in fixed assets or real estate, furniture, fixtures, or equipment, investments made in stocks, bonds, or other securities, or investments made in prepaid expenses or other general intangibles."

The Lawton Democrat said the point of the bill was to protect pawn shop customers by establishing a minimum investment level that would insure the customers could recoup their property if the pawn shop was forced to shut its doors.

Rep. Richard Phillips, R-Warr Acres, told Kirby that he might actually be driving away those he was hoping to attract to the industry.

"If you're looking to attract prudent

people to the industry, I don't think you're going to do it by saying they have to take their \$50,000 or \$100,000 and put it in the bank and get three percent interest."

Kirby's arguments to the contrary failed to sway a majority of the House's members and the conference committee report was rejected.

COMMERCE DEPARTMENT WELCOMES NEW TRADE REPRESENTATIVE

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) The Oklahoma Department of Commerce Thursday officially welcomed Guillermo Mondlak as its new trade representative in Mexico in ceremony in Mexico City.

PREDATORY SEX OFFENDER LEGISLATION BEING REFINED FOR CONSIDERATION

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) While President Clinton considers whether to sign "Megan's Law," state legislators are refining a similar proposal that would authorize public disclosure of sexual predators, the principal au-

thor of the measure said Monday.

"Recent televised reports that our legislation is dead were erroneous," said Rep. Bill Paulk and Sen. Ben Brown.

House Bill 2617 by the two Oklahoma City Democrats is in the hands of a House/Senate conference committee that has been fine-tuning the measure.

The bill is a composite of at least three pieces of legislation introduced this year: **House Bills 2610** and **2617**, both filed by Paulk, plus **House Bill 3005** by Rep. Jack Bonny, D-Burns Flat, and Sen. Gilmer Capps, D-Snyder.

"Megan's Law"—federal legislation named for a 7-year-old New Jersey girl raped and murdered two years ago by a twice-convicted molester who lived on her block—would require notification of local officials whenever dangerous child molesters or rapists are released from prison and move into their communities.

Similarly, **HB2617** would loosen restrictions on revealing the identification of sex offenders, Paulk and Brown related.

Sex offenders who exhibit characteristics indicating "a tendency to victimize or injure others" would be publicly identified as "predators."

Every convicted sex offender who remains in Oklahoma would be compelled to register with the state Corrections Department for 10 years, and with local law enforcement agencies for five years.

Under current law, a convict who completes a sex offender treatment program is required to register with the Department of Corrections for only two years after his release from custody.

Convicts whose names appear on sex offender registries would have to supply their street address, as well. Some have been circumventing the intent of the law by listing only a post-office box, Paulk explained.

Sex offender rosters maintained by local law enforcement agencies would be made available to "any parent using a child care provider" and to area churches, as well as to all public and private elementary schools and child care facilities in their vicinity, and state agency that licenses individuals to work with children, and to other entities that provide services to children.

Any violation of the Sex Offender Registration Act would be considered a felony, as would hiring any sex offender to work in

a child care facility or day care center.

"Senator Brown and I don't intend to let this session end without passage of a tougher sex-crimes law," Paulk vowed.

LEGISLATURE APPROVES RURAL ECONOMIC ACTION PLAN

■(GIT) A plan to pump \$17 million into rural economic development efforts passed the House and the Senate on Thursday, nine days after legislative leaders and the governor announced their agreement on the proposal.

HB1434, by Reps. Randall Erwin, D-Nashoba, and Mike Mass, D-Hartshorne, and Sen. Frank Shurden, D-Henryetta, establishes the so-called Rural Economic Action Plan, or REAP, a program designed to enhance economic development in communities of less than 7,000 residents. The bill won House approval by a 91-6 vote and passed the Senate by a vote of 40-6.

The funding mechanism for the program, **HB2830**, by Reps. Jim Hamilton, D-Poteau, and Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore, and Sens. Cal Hobson, D-Claremore, and Enoch Kelly Haney, D-Seminole, also passed the House by a vote of 91-7 and the Senate by a vote of 42-4.

The \$17 million included in the funding bill — \$5 million to the State Treasurer for general economic development; \$4.5 million to the Water Resources Board for water and sewer improvements and \$7.5 million to the Department of Transportation for road and highway improvements — will be divided equally among ten regions within the state as defined by the so-called COGS, or local government organizations.

That means, Erwin noted, small towns within each of the ten areas will divide \$1.7 million among them.

While a part of the legislative-executive budget agreement announced a little more than one week ago, passage of the bills, particularly in the House, followed some contentious debate.

Rep. Wayne Pettigrew, R-Edmond, led the charge against adoption of the measure's conference committee report in the House. Urging members to consider the intent of the bill — "to bring jobs to rural Oklahoma" —

Pettigrew argued that larger rural communities, such as Miami, Guymon, Weatherford, McAlester and others, would be able to do more with the money than would communities of 7,000 people or less.

"The question is whether you just want to put some money out there or whether you're looking to pass a true economic development bill," the Edmond Republican said, suggesting that the population limit be increased from 7,000 to 20,000.

For Rep. Robert Worthen, R-Oklahoma City, the concern was how the money might otherwise be used.

"If you think \$17 million is too big of an investment in rural Oklahoma, I don't know what to tell you," Erwin replied.

As would later be reflected in their votes, however, the vast majority of the representatives supported the bill, and many spoke out in favor of it.

Rep. Tommy Thomas, D-Atoka, told his fellow House members that many communities find themselves desperately in need of funds. "Then, \$12,000 might as well be \$12 million," he said. "This gives them access to some money, money that's not going to be available any other way."

Thomas also reminded those in the Legislature that they had helped the urban areas, such as Tulsa and Oklahoma City, in the past. "Now we're asking for something for the smaller communities," he said.

Also urging the adoption of the conference committee report was Mass, who told members, "To watch a small community die over a period of 20 or 30 years is a bad thing."

The co-author of the bill added that if he could, he would have lowered the size of the communities eligible for the program even more, perhaps in the 3,000 resident range. "I want to help people having the hardest time helping themselves."

House majority leader Rep. Loyd Benson, D-Frederick, said, too, that small communities would suffer if larger communities were allowed to compete for the funds.

Responding to Pettigrew's argument to

increase the ceiling for those communities eligible for the funding, Erwin said in his closing that one needed only to visit the larger rural communities "to see that they are doing well, because they are able to get other money to address their needs."

"What we want to do now," he concluded, "is to help the smaller communities."

And the vast majority of representatives agreed, adopting the conference committee report by an 87-11 vote. Passage of the bill followed by a 91-6 vote, with mostly Oklahoma City Republicans voting against the measure.

There was no debate among House members of the funding bill, HB2830, which received easy passage.

The concerns about HB1434 were somewhat different in the Senate, where Sen. Dave Herbert, D-Midwest City, voiced the most objection to the bill.

Referring to the \$4.5 million to be administered through the Water Resources Board, Herbert said the legislature was on the verge of creating a massive bureaucracy.

But Herbert's position was countered by Sen. Gene Stipe, D-McAlester, who said, "This is local government at its best."

Herbert said he was going to vote for the bill and "keep an eye on it." He did indeed vote for it, but then cast one of only four Senate votes against the program's funding mechanism, HB2830.

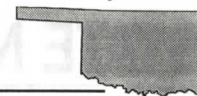

SENATE WILDLIFE HOLDS BRIEF MEETING

■(GIT) Members of the Senate Committee on Wildlife met briefly Monday to confirm two of Governor Frank Keating's executive nominations and to adopt one House Joint Resolution.

William C. Crawford, of Frederick, was confirmed to another term on the Oklahoma Wildlife Conservation Commission.

Sponsored by Sen. Gilmer Capps, D-Snyder, Crawford will serve an 8 year term, ending July 1, 2003. He was confirmed with a vote of 7 to 0.

Also confirmed to the Wildlife Commission, though he was not present for his confirmation, was John Groendyke, of Enid.

Also before the committee was HJR1098, by Shurden. The resolution disapproves an emergency rule of the Oklahoma Wildlife Conservation Commission because it does not reflect the intent of the Legislature.

The problem stems from the commission charging \$11 for special Bobcat-Raccoon-Gray Fox Licenses. The Legislature had originally allowed the commission to charge only \$10 for the license. The commission

began charging the increased fee in an attempt to compensate for the \$1 it loses for each license that is retained by the entity selling the license.

SUPREME COURT REFUSES TO HEAR KEATING, LAWMAKERS'S SUIT

■(GIT) The Oklahoma Supreme Court on Tuesday rejected a bid by Governor Frank Keating and two state lawmakers to have the state's highest court decide whether the legislature has violated the concept of separation of powers by making appointments to executive boards and commissions.

The 5-4 decision means the lawsuit, which pits the governor and two Republican representatives against the Speaker of the House, the Senate's President Pro Tempore, a handful of Democratic lawmakers and other state officials, will be handled in district court, rather than by the state Supreme Court.

Governor Keating said he had not yet had time to review the court's opinion in impromptu remarks at a bill signing on Tuesday. The governor also said he would continue to veto legislation that contains the controversial appointment powers provision.

At issue is whether the state's constitutional separation of powers doctrine is violated when the legislature vests in itself or legislative leaders the authority to make appointments to executive branch boards and commissions whose function is the execution and administration of law.

Senate President Pro Tem Stratton Taylor said, "I'm pleased that the court accepted our arguments and decided not to accept original jurisdiction in the case."

Writing for the five-member majority, Justice Robert E. Lavender said that the litigants showed no immediacy or urgency concerning the conflict which would justify the Supreme Court taking original jurisdiction over the case. Instead, the justice wrote, the court "must keep in mind its appellate nature in absence of such a showing."

In a special concurring opinion, Justice Robert D. Simms wrote, "(T)he parties seek an advisory opinion on an abstract question, and it has long been the rule that this court does not give advisory opinions or answer

hypothetical questions.”

Additionally, Justice Simms wrote, the litigants’ request for a declaratory judgment fails to meet the necessary standards resulting from cases decided by district courts “in cases of actual conflict ...”

In one of three dissenting opinions, Justice Yvonne Kauger, joined in part by justices Joseph Watts and Hardy Summers, called the dispute a “lively controversy that meets the judicial requirements” for consideration. Original jurisdiction, the justice wrote, “extends to matters of general, public interest and this controversy is clearly of public concern.”

Kauger also noted that it appeared obvious that the Supreme Court would ultimately be asked to hear the case once the litigants had worked their way through the court system and would have to make a decision regarding it.

AG ISSUES LOBBYING RULING; REP. WEBB REACTS, TRIES TO SAVE BILL

■(GIT) In reaction to an attorney general’s opinion issued on Monday, state lawmakers on Tuesday attempted to resurrect a bill that would restrict the ability of groups which receive state funds to lobby the legislature.

Rep. Dan Webb, R-Oklahoma City, attempted to garner enough support from fellow lawmakers to have **HB3022** withdrawn from committee. The bill, which has been dormant in the House’s Rules Committee since March, would prohibit all agencies, boards, commissions, departments or other state government entities to use funds under its control to make payment to any state officer or state employee to support or oppose a political candidate or political office holders or for direct lobbying at the state or national level.

Webb’s request followed the release of an attorney general’s opinion on Monday that clears the way for the use of state provided money for lobbying efforts, but prohibits their use in efforts to support or oppose an initiative or referendum question.

Webb said rather than wait until the next legislative session to attempt to address the issue, lawmakers should act now, while there is still three weeks remaining in this legislative session.

A two-thirds vote of the House, 68 votes, was needed to remove the bill from com-

mittee. Webb could muster only 41, while 58 cast votes against the motion. That means the bill will remain dormant in the Rules Committee.

The attorney general’s opinion, which was requested by Webb, resulted from concerns expressed earlier this year that the Oklahoma State School Boards Association planned to raise and use funds from its member school boards to oppose State Question 669, the controversial ad valorem tax reform proposal that voters rejected in March.

Referring to the statutorily expressed duties of school boards, Attorney General Drew Edmondson wrote, “To execute these powers it is apparent that school boards must be able to lobby the Legislature concerning the multitude of bills it considers and passes every session with respect to Oklahoma’s ‘system of free public schools.’”

“Concluding otherwise,” the attorney general added, “would result in prohibiting those who are in a position, and have indeed been elected, to know the facts concerning problems and needs of our public schools from providing useful and sometimes critical information to the Legislature ...”

“From the express powers granted school boards, it may be implied that they have the implied power to communicate information and facts to the Legislature concerning education and school board issues. The presentation of such facts and information is included under our broad definition of ‘lobbying.’ Accordingly, we find that school boards have the implied power to lobby the Legislature.”

The opinion notes that certain statutes also impact the position, particularly that law which requires certain individuals to register to be a lobbyist in Oklahoma and exempts public officials “acting in [their] official capacity” and public employees “acting on behalf of the governmental entity by which [they are] employed.”

Referring back to Webb’s original question — whether a private association representing school board members can lobby the legislature regarding school board or other education issues and in doing so expend

funds partially derived from membership dues paid with state funds — the opinion states, “...a school board may lawfully pay membership dues to a private association that then uses such funds to engage in lobbying.”

The same is not true, however, for efforts to support or oppose an initiative or referendum question if the dues were paid and received with this intent. Additionally, the attorney general notes in the opinion, a public officer and an individual who conspire for such a purpose may both be subject to criminal prosecution for conspiracy.

That’s because, the attorney general explains in the opinion, school boards and other public officials are prohibited by statute from directing or authorizing the use of public funds to be used in support of or in opposition to “any measure which is being referred to a vote of the people by means of the initiative or referendum ...”

LAWMAKER SAYS TAX-EXEMPT FINANCING NOT FOR POLITICIANS

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) The state House of Representatives will consider a bill Wednesday that would prevent elected officials from using tax-exempt bond financing to line their own pockets.

State Rep. Ed Crocker, D-Norman, said he wrote **House Bill 1238** because of concerns expressed to him by many Oklahomans about possible abuse of the program by a public official.

As written, the measure would force disclosure of participation by any federal, state or local official in a project that benefits from tax-exempt financing. Almost any interest by an elected official in a legal entity seeking tax-exempt funds would disqualify the entity seeking the financing.

Crocker said the proposed law would not prevent elected officials from participating in business deals in which there is no conflict of interest.

The lawmaker acknowledged his bill would place a higher standard on elected officials.

“This does make it tougher on those of us elected to office,” he said. “Our constituents didn’t elect us to office to get rich. We were elected to conduct the people’s business in an honest, aboveboard manner. Any failure to do that, as the allegations suggest,

erodes public confidence in their government."

"Elected officials should not put themselves above average citizens," he asserted. "The power of government comes from the people, and the people are the most important component of our system."

SENATE HUMAN SERVICES CONFIRMS NOMINATIONS

■(GIT) The Senate Committee on Human Resources met Tuesday to confirm still more of Governor Frank Keating's executive nominations.

Dr. Dan Fieker, of Tulsa, was confirmed to another nine year position on the State Board of Health. His second term, he has served as president of the organization this year.

POLITICS BECOMES ISSUE IN BILL'S DEFEAT

■(GIT) Politics took center stage on Wednesday when House members were asked to consider a bill designed to prohibit the involvement of public officials in tax exempt bond issues.

Rep. Dan Webb, R-Oklahoma City, asked that **HB1238**, by Rep. Ed Crocker, D-Norman, be sent back to conference committee for further consideration. If that hap-

pened, Webb indicated, he would ask that the committee be instructed to add provisions that would prohibit the chair and vice chair of state recognized political parties from participating in certain programs, such as the Ag Link and Business Link loan programs.

The proposal drew immediate negative response from members of the House, particularly Democrats.

Tulsa Democrat Russ Roach asked Webb what authority, if any, lawmakers had to apply a law to specific private entities.

"We would be skating on thin ice," Webb admitted. "But the question is if we are going to err, is it better to err for the benefit of taxpayers or those involved in the political process?"

"I believe it's in the best interest to err in the interest of taxpayers."

Asked by Roach why his proposal targeted four specific people, Webb said, "They wield the greatest influence on the process. If you want to include others, I would certainly go along with you."

A comparatively subdued Crocker told House members that the bill had been before them for some 15 months in an effort to address what he said he felt was a serious problem. Webb, he said, "is just trying to hitch a ride."

When the issue of accepting the bill's second conference committee report was put to a vote, House members voted 63-36 along party lines and the bill was put before them for final consideration.

Without further debate, the bill received a 93-6 passing vote.

VETOED BILLS MAY LIVE AGAIN IN SPEED LIMIT MEASURE

■(GIT) Two bills vetoed by Governor Frank Keating this week may reappear before the Legislature adjourns. The two bills, **SB988**, by Sen. Ted Fisher, D-Sapulpa, and **SB1017**, by Sen. Frank Shurden, D-Henryetta, may be incorporated into **SB685**, the measure that would statutorily set the state's speed limits, among other things.

The Fisher measure, **SB988**, would direct the Oklahoma Department of Transportation (ODOT) to issue permits for multi-state oversize and overweight vehicles. It would also designate specific routes for vehicles operating under those permits.

Keating vetoed the measure, he said, be-

cause it violates the state constitution, as it delegates the authority to regulate the special permits to a non-governmental entity.

Fisher urged the matter to be handled quickly. He said trucks in Louisiana were granted the special permits by ODOT, in anticipation of the problem being fixed by the bill. But, with the measure being vetoed, the vehicles are essentially "trapped."

Transportation Secretary Neal McCaleb told *Capitol Network News*, "If the bill's language were permissive and not imperative, I think it would find favor with the governor."

The other measure, **SB1017**, by Shurden, was designed to eliminate speed traps on the state's highways. The bill states that the troop commander in charge of a highway patrol troop may designate specified portions of federal aid primary highways and the state highway system to be in the service area of the troop.

Though Keating said he was opposed to speed traps, the bill removed local law enforcement control.

A meeting with Shurden and the governor has been scheduled for Monday to discuss alternative language. Shurden said he would consider giving the commissioner of public safety the authority to designate where the Oklahoma Highway Patrol would have jurisdiction over state highways.

In a move Tuesday, Sen. Gene Stipe, D-McAlester, was successful in sending **SB685** back to conference committee with instructions to change the bill's interstate speed limit to 75 mph. Thursday, however, he removed those instructions, though the bill is still in conference.

McCaleb said, referring to a letter sent to Leftwich from Dr. Alan Soltani, ODOT chief traffic engineer, that he supports the 75 mph limit on rural highways, but not in the metropolitan areas or on four-lane highways.

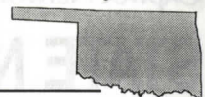
The letter states that, nationally, speed limits are set based on the 85th percentile speed, representing the percentage of people driving below a certain speed.

"In Oklahoma," McCaleb said, quoting the letter, "the 85th percentile speed for rural interstate highways, posted 65 mph, was 75 mph and for urban interstates, posted 55 mph, this figure was reduced to 68 mph."

Soltani further states in his letter, "...that while 75 mph speed may be warranted in

some locations (e.g., rural interstate highways), a 75 mph statewide maximum speed limit for all highways is not advisable."

Leftwich said his bill will likely be addressed by lawmakers next week.

SENATE VETS COMMITTEE CONFIRMS EXECUTIVE NOMINATIONS, ADOPTS RESOLUTIONS

■(GIT) The Senate Committee on Veterans and Military Affairs met Thursday, confirming five of Governor Frank Keating's executive nominations. Members also adopted two concurrent resolutions before adjourning.

Eldrige Colston, of Marietta, was confirmed to the War Veterans Commission of Oklahoma.

A World War II veteran, Colston was sponsored by Sen. Darryl Roberts, D-Ardmore. He will serve a three year term. He succeeds himself to the position.

Thomas Howell, of Duncan, was also confirmed to the commission. Sponsored by Sen. Bill Gustafson, R-El Reno, in place of the absent Sen. Carol Martin, R-Comanche, he will serve a three year term, succeeding Harold Pinney, who was also nominated to the commission.

Pinney, of Eufaula, will also serve a three year term. He was sponsored by Sen. Frank Shurden, D-Henryetta.

Bill Paxton, of Lookeba, also nominated to the commission, was sponsored by Sen. Bruce Price, D-Hinton. He too will serve a three year term.

Though not scheduled for confirmation until next week, James C. Morton was confirmed to the commission. Also sponsored by Gustafson, in place of Martin, he will serve a three year term.

All nominees were unanimously confirmed. Their terms all end on July 1, 1999.

Committee members also adopted **HCR1079**, presented by Roberts. It memorializes Congress to support the State Veterans Home Program. After all committee members were made co-authors, the measure passed with a vote of 6 to 0.

SCR57 was also adopted. It relates to atomic test veterans. It too passed with a vote of 6 to 0.

SPEED LIMITS IN THE SPOTLIGHT AGAIN

■(GIT) The bill that would statutorily set Oklahoma's speed limits was sent back to its conference committee Tuesday with attached instructions to set speed limits on the state's interstate system at 75 mph.

SB685, by Senate Transportation Committee Vice Chairman Keith Leftwich, D-Oklahoma City, would encase the state's speed limits within the Oklahoma statutes. The matter was originally addressed in an executive order from Governor Frank Keating when Congress gave the right to set speed limits back to the states late last year.

The bill would set the limits at 75 mph on turnpikes, 70 mph on highways and interstates and 65 mph in other locations. The measure also sets limits for hard-surfaced county roads at 55 mph and 45 mph for all others, unless otherwise posted. It also abolishes night-time speed limits and addresses truck and car speed limit issues.

Other provisions in the bill provide penalties for the destruction or defacing of traffic signs and clarifies what is the right-of-way on county roads.

Dodging flack from some members, Leftwich said in changing the 70 mph provision, members would be "effectively killing the bill."

"I don't believe this legislation will pass with the 75 mph provision," he said.

"We are giving guidance to ODOT (Oklahoma Department of Transportation)," he added. "ODOT can change this, but if they don't do anything, the statute would prevail."

"If we don't do anything, I suppose the executive order would still be in effect," he said.

The motion to send the bill back to conference came from Senate Transportation Committee Chairman Gene Stipe, D-McAlester. Leftwich moved to table the motion, but was defeated with a vote of 18 to 23.

Capitol Network News attempted to contact Transportation Secretary Neal McCaleb. He was unable to be reached for comment.

RETIREEES' TAX CUT PASSES HOUSE

■(GIT) Private sector retirees are a step closer to equality with public sector retirees after passage on Thursday of **HB1621** by the House of Representatives.

Authored by Lawton Democrat Ron Kirby, the bill phases in a \$5,500 tax exemption for private sector retirees at the rate of \$1,100 per year over five years. At the end of that period, private sector retirees will be entitled to the same tax exemption afforded public sector retirees.

The proposal was one of several planned tax cuts announced last week by Governor Frank Keating and a bipartisan group of lawmakers from both legislative houses.

Although endorsed by every member voting in Thursday's House session, the bill's trip across the floor was less than easy.

A second conference committee report for the bill was on the verge of adoption when Kirby asked without explanation that the report be rejected and the bill returned to committee for further conference. The re-

quest was granted by unanimous consent.

The bill returned to the House floor sometime later, and Kirby said the delay was necessary to correct some wording in the bill. The new wording in the third conference committee report (page 19, lines 2-6) allows public sector employees to also take advantage of the tax exemption as long as their combined exemption does not exceed \$5,500.

House members readily accepted the third conference committee report and gave the bill a 97-0 passing vote.

AG PROCESSING TAX CUT PASSES HOUSE

■(GIT) House members voted 96-0 on Thursday to advance another portion of the tax cut program agreed to by a bipartisan group of lawmakers and the governor.

HB2959, by Rep. Clay Pope, D-Loyal, provides the so-called value added tax cut. The bill exempts certain investments in value added agricultural processing from taxes.

Specifically, the tax exemptions include:

- ✓ An exemption equal to 15 percent of the investment by the owner in the new or expanded processing facility; and
- ✓ An exemption equal to 30 percent of the investment by Oklahoma agricultural producer-owned cooperatives, processing venture or marketing associations.

In an unusual chain of the events, the bill actually passed the House twice in the same day. House members had to reject their first vote on the bill after what was called a minor wording problem was found. That sent the bill back to conference committee.

After the problem was corrected, a third conference committee report was produced, accepted and the bill was passed.

The bill is expected to receive easy passage in the Senate, where leaders there have endorsed the proposal, and a signature from the governor, who has also praised the tax cut idea.

GOVERNOR SIGNS SIMULCASTING BILL

■(GIT) Governor Frank Keating on Wednesday praised the efforts of some state

lawmakers and the state's horse racing industry for being able to fashion an agreement for racetracks to carry full-card simulcasts.

The comments came during a special ceremony in which the governor signed **SB1167**, by Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore, and Sen. Lewis Long, D-Glenpool.

"I think this is extremely important for the horse industry of Oklahoma and certainly for the racing industry," Keating said, calling the measure a prosperity issue.

Under the terms of the measure, Oklahoma horse tracks can offer up to six full-card simulcasts during a racing day. Two of those cards can be offered while the track is holding its own races.

When there is no live racing, tracks can simulcast six full-card, out-of-state races for up to one-half the number of days the track holds live races.

AMERICAN AIRLINES TO RESTORE DFW JET SERVICE

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) American Airlines has decided to restore jet service between Oklahoma City and Dallas-Fort Worth, according to two leaders of the Oklahoma Senate.

"We have it on good authority that the official announcement will be forthcoming very soon," said Senator Stratton Taylor, President Pro Tempore of the Oklahoma Senate. "This is going to be a great boost to our economic development efforts."

"A lot of people have been working very hard to bring jet service back, and it looks like that hard work has paid off," said Senator Taylor.

According to American Airlines, jet service will resume between Oklahoma City and DFW on August 1, 1996.

"I think this is great news for Oklahoma City and the entire state," said Senator Keith

Leftwich, Majority Whip and Vice-chairman of the Senate Transportation Committee.

Reports indicate that American will initially add three jets to its Oklahoma City/DFW route in August, followed by another two in September.

BUSINESSES, CITY CHAMBER AND GOVERNOR BRING AMERICAN AIRLINES JET SERVICE BACK TO OKLAHOMA CITY

■(GIT) After a series of meetings between officials of the Oklahoma City Chamber of Commerce, Governor Frank Keating and representatives of American Airlines, an announcement was made Thursday by the airline to restore jet service to Oklahoma City.

Lieutenant General Richard Burpee from the Chamber, along with efforts of Keating's office and the State Department of Commerce, had asked local businesses "What increased level of business would American Airlines receive if they restored jet service to Oklahoma City?" Apparently, the response was positive. "We received pledges from high-ranking officials that revenue performance would improve," Jack Williams, American's vice president and general sales manager added, "Those leaders, including Burpee, came to us with specific business plans that show genuine support for American jet service on the Oklahoma City-Dallas/Fort Worth route. It's a decision based on solid business principles and we are excited about bringing service back."

The new jet service flight schedule will begin August 1, with American initially offering three round-trip flights each day, using its 97-seat Fokker F-100 jets. Later, on September 4, the airline will add two more round-trips, making a total of five round-trip flights a day between Oklahoma City and Dallas-Fort Worth.

Williams explained that American Eagle will continue to serve the route with 16 round-trips to Dallas. However, he said that initial plans call for that number to be reduced as jets are re-introduced on the route.

In addition to reinstating jet service, American will provide 200 round-trip tickets to Denver for families of the Oklahoma City bombing to attend the upcoming trial.

PROMISING FIRST YEAR FOR "OPERATION RESTORE TRUST" INITIATIVE

■(WASHINGTON) Health and Human Services Secretary Donna E. Shalala marked the first-year anniversary of HHS' anti-fraud initiative, Operation Restore Trust, saying new approaches in the pilot program have already produced \$42.3 million in recoveries. This constitutes a return of \$10 in recoveries for every \$1 spent on the project.

"Operation Restore Trust has pioneered new partnerships within the federal government, new cooperation with states, and new ways of targeting and stopping fraud in the Medicare and Medicaid programs," Secretary Shalala said. "In its first year, Operation Restore Trust has proved its value, and the President wants to extend its reach to every state in the nation."

With first-year targeted demonstration project funds of \$4.09 million, Operation Restore Trust has produced \$42.3 million in restitutions, fines, settlements and recovery of overpayments. This includes \$24.5 million returning to the Medicare Trust Fund from criminal restitutions, fines and recoveries; \$14.1 million returning to the Trust Fund as a result of civil judgments, settlements and penalties; and \$3.7 million returned to the Treasury as a result of services inappropriately billed or medically unnecessary services rendered.

HHS Inspector General June Gibbs Brown said that out of 272 Medicare and Medicaid cases currently under investigation in the three targeted payment areas, 244 are new cases that were opened as a result of the Operation Restore Trust initiative. She said 64 of the cases are joint efforts with other law enforcement agencies.

Operation Restore Trust is focused on five states (New York, Florida, Illinois, Texas, and California) which account for 38.5 percent of Medicaid beneficiaries and 34 percent of Medicare beneficiaries.

The HHS Office of Inspector General, The Health Care Financing Administration and the Administration on Aging are the three agencies within HHS which are jointly carrying out the Operation Restore Trust initiative. The project has also involved an intergovernmental team comprised of federal

and state personnel, including the Department of Justice and the United States Attorneys' offices across the country.

ENVIRONMENTALLY FRIENDLY CORNSTARCH CUTLERY DEMONSTRATED

■(WASHINGTON) There was something new on the menu Thursday in the U.S. Department of Agriculture's cafeteria — but it wasn't something to eat. Cutlery made of environmentally-friendly cornstarch was available in the cafeteria line, part of a one-day demonstration of the cutlery, developed with the help of the USDA.

The Cooperative State Research, Education, and Extension Service provided research funds for the cornstarch-based cutlery through special research grants to Michigan State University for Michigan Biotechnology Institute to modify the starch into a thermoplastic product. The utensils are

manufactured by a joint venture between the Institute and Japan Corn Starch, called Evercorn. The water repellent utensils hold up as well as conventional polystyrene knives, forks, and spoons, and are fully biodegradable in a composting system.

These utensils are not yet in the marketplace because they currently do not compete in cost with petroleum-based plastic utensils. However, with growing interest in environmentally friendly products, it is anticipated that there will be demand for these items, which in turn will bring down the cost.

KEATING, NICKLES: DOLE MADE RIGHT CHOICE

■(GIT) Oklahoma Governor Frank Keating and Senator Don Nickles joined other Republicans from across the nation in supporting Senator Bob Dole's decision to leave his seat in the US Senate and to devote himself full-time to his presidential campaign.

"If Bob Dole wants to be president," Keating told reporters in an impromptu news conference, "then he needs to be out there speaking, talking one-on-one with people and traveling around the country. This was a necessary step for Dole to give viability to his presidential campaign."

The governor, who is the honorary state chair of Dole's campaign, said without the move, the Republican candidate for president was "treading water."

Dole had been expected to give up his post as Senate Majority Leader. His decision to step down from the Senate took many by surprise, including the governor.

"The Senate," Nickles said, "is losing a great legislator, but the nation will be the winner. "Bob Dole has done a remarkable job as majority leader and he will make a remarkable president. This is a bold and courageous move on the part of Senator Dole. He's going to invest everything he's got in this campaign and I like that. It's the right thing to do."

Nickles, ironically, is considered one of the leading candidates to fill Dole's seat as Senate majority leader. Choosing Nickles, the governor said, would be a smart move for Republicans, many of whom consider the

INHOFE INTRODUCES BILL TO REFORM CONGRESSIONAL PENSIONS

■(WASHINGTON) U.S. Senator James M. Inhofe (R-Okla.) announces the introduction of SB 1776, legislation to limit pension benefits for members of Congress.

"This bill addresses the two most frequent appeals people make to Congress," Inhofe said. "First, that we have term limits, and second, that we have meaningful reform of the pension system. This bill does both and resolves these appeals forever. By limiting pensions, it will take away the financial incentive members have to stay insulated in Washington without going out and making a living in the real world."

The Inhofe bill would limit a new House or Senate member's ability to accrue pension benefits to a maximum of 12 years in each body. Current members would be limited to a maximum of 12 years of pension accrual in addition to what they already have. If passed, the bill would take effect in 1997 at the beginning of the new 105th Congress.

Inhofe pointed out that the current average Congressional pension is \$46,789, while some pensions for very long-serving members are in the \$100,000 range and more. Under this new bill, the pension benefit for a new member would be \$27,254.

REID-NICKLES BILL DENIES PENSIONS TO FELONS

■(WASHINGTON) U.S. Senators Harry Reid, D-NV, and Don Nickles, R-OK, are sponsoring legislation to cut off federal pensions to members of Congress convicted of felonies committed while in office.

"Those who created the institution of the Congress of the United State would have been shocked to learn that former members convicted of felonies continue to draw their taxpayer-financed pensions," Nickles said.

The Reid-Nickles Pension Forfeiture Act would halt the disbursement of pensions to members of Congress convicted of felonies related to their official duties. Crimes that would result in a loss of retirement benefits

under this Act include bribery, perjury, and fraud. All crimes listed under the act are punishable by prison terms of more than one year.

Since 1980, there have been 18 congressional convicts.

Reid is chairman of the Democratic Policy Committee and Nickles chairs the Republican Policy Committee. Nickles and Reid intend to use their Senate leadership positions to gain bipartisan support and move their bill through the Senate. Companion legislation to the Pension Forfeiture Act is pending in the House.

Under current law, pensions can be taken away upon conviction of certain felonies involving national security, such as treason or espionage while in office. The Reid-Nickles bill expands the list of felonies to include crimes relating to the abuse of public office.

■(WASHINGTON) Oklahoma Senator Don Nickles announced Thursday he is seeking the Assistant Majority Leader position in the Senate Republican Leadership.

"This is a decision that I have been considering for quite some time," Nickles said. "Being a member of the Senate leadership

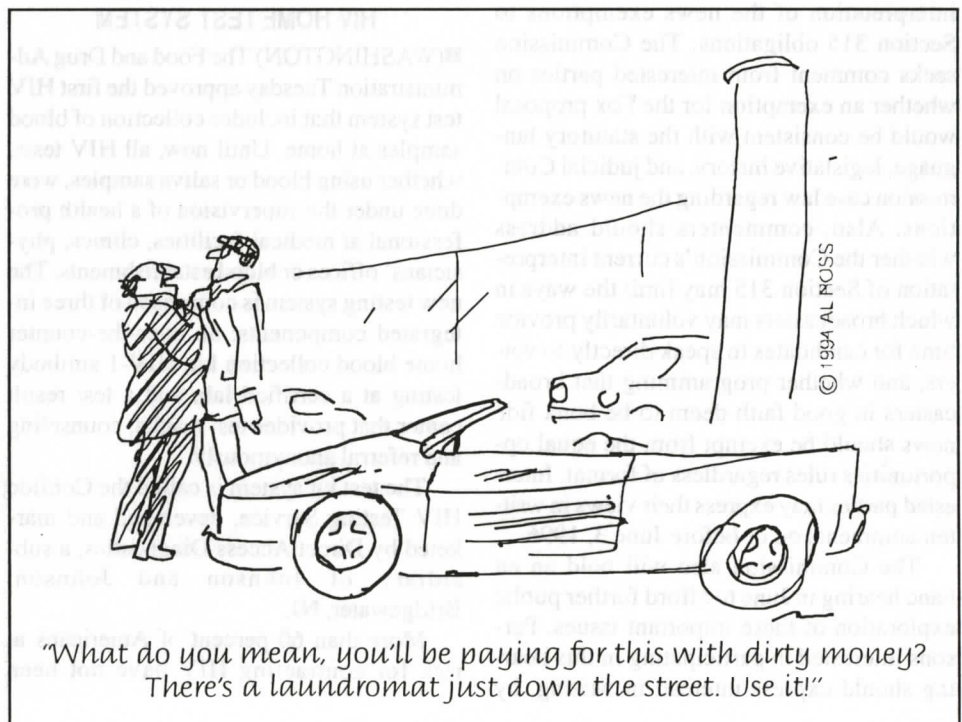

FCC Seeks Comment on Issues Relating to Broadcaster Proposals to Provide Time to Presidential Candidates

■(WASHINGTON) On April 25, 1996, the Fox Broadcasting Company filed with the Commission a Request for Declaratory Ruling regarding a proposal to present statements by Presidential candidates over the network prior to the November 5, 1996 general election. Fox has proposed to offer news event coverage of back-to-back statements by the major presidential candidates, as determined by the Commission on Presidential Debates, in a one-hour block of time on

Election Eve, and of ten 60 second position statements by each candidate in a seven-week period before the election. ABC, NBC, PBS and CNN also have announced plans to provide broadcast time to candidates.

Fox seeks a Commission ruling that its proposed programming would be exempt from the "equal opportunities" provision of Section 315 of the Communications Act as bona fide news programming. Section 315 requires that when a legally qualified candidate appears on a broadcast station outside the context of bona fide news programming, the station must afford equal opportunity to all legally qualified opponents. The statute exempts the following news programming from the requirement: 1) bona fide newscasts; 2) bona fide news interview programs; 3) bona fide news documentaries; and 4) on-the-spot coverage of bona fide news events. Also before the Commission is a letter dated April 16, 1996 from the Free TV for Straight Talk Coalition requesting that the Commission hold a public hearing to "better enable the Commission to discharge its important function of affording guidance as to the application of the equal opportunities requirement and exemptions thereto."

The Fox Request raises important issues regarding broadcasters' ability under the Communications Act and the Commission's rules to provide time to political candidates and, specifically, regarding the Commission's interpretation of the news exemptions to Section 315 obligations. The Commission seeks comment from interested parties on whether an exemption for the Fox proposal would be consistent with the statutory language, legislative history, and judicial Commission case law regarding the news exemptions. Also, commenters should address whether the Commission's current interpretation of Section 315 may limit the ways in which broadcasters may voluntarily provide time for candidates to speak directly to voters, and whether programming that broadcasters in good faith deem to be bona fide news should be exempt from the equal opportunities rules regardless of format. Interested parties may express their views in written comments on or before June 3, 1996.

The Commission also will hold an en banc hearing in June to afford further public exploration of these important issues. Persons interested in participating in this hearing should express interest, in writing, by

June 3, 1996, in a letter to Jonathan Cohen, Assistant Chief, Mass Media Bureau, Room 314, 1919 M Street, N.W., Washington, DC 20554. A date and an agenda for this hearing will be announced in a subsequent Public Notice.

FDA APPROVES FIRST HIV HOME TEST SYSTEM

■(WASHINGTON) The Food and Drug Administration Tuesday approved the first HIV test system that includes collection of blood samples at home. Until now, all HIV tests, whether using blood or saliva samples, were done under the supervision of a health professional at medical facilities, clinics, physicians' offices or blood establishments. The new testing system is comprised of three integrated components: an over-the-counter home blood collection kit, HIV-1 antibody testing at a certified lab, and a test result center that provides test results, counseling and referral anonymously.

The test kit system is called the Confide HIV Testing Service, developed and marketed by Direct Access Diagnostics, a subsidiary of Johnson and Johnson, Bridgewater, NJ.

More than 60 percent of Americans at risk for contracting HIV have not been

tested, according to estimates by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

"Too many Americans do not know their HIV status. Knowledge is power, and power leads to prevention," said HHS Secretary Donna E. Shalala. "The availability of a home test should empower more people to learn their HIV status and protect themselves and their loved ones."

"We are confident that this new home system can provide accurate results while assuring patient anonymity and appropriate counseling," said Commissioner of Food and Drugs David A. Kessler, M.D. "Science and technology have evolved to the point where we believe the benefits of this new product outweigh the risks."

Initially, the company will make the kit available for over-the-counter purchase in the state of Texas. The kits will also be sold through a toll-free number in two states, Texas and Florida, for people who would prefer having the kits mailed confidentially to their homes.

STUDY OFFERS NONSURGICAL OPTION FOR TREATING GUM DISEASE

■(WASHINGTON) Persons with severe periodontal disease may be able to avoid surgery by taking antibiotics, a new study shows. Dental scientists report that scaling and root planing (deep cleaning of teeth above and below the gum) combined with short-term use of oral and locally applied antibiotics dramatically reduced the need for gum surgery and tooth extractions by 88 percent. The regimen spared 690 of 783 teeth initially recommended for surgery or extraction.

In a study supported by the national Institute of Dental Research, Dr. Walter J. Loesche of the University of Michigan School of Dentistry, Dr. James Giordano at the University of Detroit/Mercy School of Dentistry, and their colleagues used debridement plus antibiotics to significantly decrease levels of these damaging bacteria and reverse the majority of what were inevitable surgical cases. Dr. Loesche commented about the findings, "This antimicrobial regimen not only provides a treatment option for severe periodontal disease, but also brings such treatment into the realm of greater accessibility for many individuals."

At the outset of the study, 783 teeth had been identified as needing extraction or surgery around the tooth. At its conclusion, only 93 teeth (12 percent) actually needed such treatment. Debridement plus the antimicrobial regimens reduced the need for periodontal surgery by 93 percent, sparing 595 teeth from surgery; and decreased by 67 percent the need for tooth extraction, saving 95 teeth. Significantly 81 percent of the study participants moved to the maintenance phase without needing any gum surgery or extractions.

The study also showed that doxycycline and metronidazole were comparably effective in reducing the need for gum surgery.

Follow-up examinations one year later indicated that the benefits of the antimicrobial treatment continued. The research team will follow these patients for five to eight years to determine the long-term benefit of this nonsurgical approach.

These findings were reported in the May issue of the *Journal of Oral Surgery, Oral Medicine, Oral Pathology, Oral Radiology, and Endodontics*. The research was supported by a grant from the National Institute of Dental Research, one of the federal National Institutes of Health.

MORE INTERNATIONAL FLIGHTS SMOKE-FREE, SECRETARY PENNA NOTES

■(WASHINGTON) As a result of actions by the Clinton administration and both U.S. and foreign airlines, approximately 80 percent of non-stop scheduled U.S. airline flights between the United States and foreign destinations will be smoke-free as of June 1, Secretary of Transportation Federico Pena said last week. This complements the ban on smoking on domestic flights, which are 100 percent smoke-free.

The Secretary added that the Department of Transportation, in order to better serve customers seeking smoke-free travel, plans to establish a site on the Internet's World Wide Web listing countries served by non-smoking flights.

Secretary Pena said that at an April 10-

12 meeting in Santiago, Chile, Western Hemisphere transportation ministers agreed to strive to achieve the goal of the International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO) to ban smoking on all international flights by July 1, 1996. He also noted that Continental Airlines recently banned smoking on all of its flights within the Western Hemisphere.

In November 1994, the United States, Canada and Australia agreed to ban smoking on flights operated by their airlines among the three countries. In January 1995, the department granted antitrust immunity to eight U.S. and foreign airlines to discuss a mutual smoking ban on transatlantic flights.

Delta Air Lines has adopted a worldwide smoke-free policy and Trans World Airlines recently decided to ban smoking on flights to France, Germany and the United Kingdom. As of June 1, the following carriers will introduce no-smoking flights as follows:

USAir will prohibit smoking on all flights.

American Airlines will ban smoking on all of its flights to and from Europe, the Caribbean and a number of destinations in Mexico.

United Airlines will prohibit smoking on all of its flights across the Atlantic and within Europe except for those between Washington's Dulles Airport and Milan, Italy. United also will provide smoke-free services to all of its destinations across the Pacific and within Asia, except for selected flights through Tokyo.

In addition, Lufthansa German Airlines recently prohibited smoking on flights between Germany and the United States and Finnair on all U.S. — Finland services.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: (04/29/96) This is to advise you that on this date, pursuant to the authority vested in me, I have VETOED HB1066. This bill diminishes the current safeguards to assure the protection of the public and the mentally ill from potentially inaccurate mental health evaluation by underqualified persons.

HB2239 Principal Author(s): Bell, Jack; Erwin, Randall L. Modifies language relating to fishing and game licenses.; Effective Date: 11/01/96. 04/29/96 Governor Action - Veto

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: (04/29/96) This is to advise you that on this date, pursuant to the powers vested in me, I have VETOED HB2239. This bill encourages infringement on personal property rights of citizens. In addition, the provisions of this legislation could result in an adverse effect on certain streams in our state.

HB2360 Principal Author(s): Henry, Brad; Weaver, Robert E.; Directs the Department of Public Safety and the Oklahoma Tax Commission to conduct a study relating to the regulation and licensing of jet ski and boat operators in the state; requires a report of the findings to be submitted to the Speaker of the House, the President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Governor.; Effective Date: 11/01/96. 04/09/96, Governor Action - Veto.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: (04/09/96) This is to advise you that on this date, pursuant to the authority vested in me, I have VETOED HB2360 because the provisions of this bill would limit which state agencies would be eligible to be involved in efforts to address a problem that involves several areas of state concern including not only the need for regulatory fees and regulation of water safety, but also potentially environmental concerns and the Oklahoma tourism industry. Limiting participation could result in less than accurate and complete recommendations for resolution of the problem to be addressed.

HB2621 (05/07/96) Principal Author(s): Dickerson, Larry; Paulk, William; Enacts the State Employees Fair Labor Relations Act. 05/07/96, Governor Action - Veto.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: (05/08/96) This is to advise you that on this date, pursuant to the authority vested in me, I have VETOED HB2621. It has been necessary on more than one occasion for me to Veto provisions of law which grant individual private entities special privileges not available to all private entities. HB2621 grants the right to use state property for non-state purposes by a non-governmental entity. Such requirement violates constitutional restrictions. Currently, there exists private entities that have state employee members and that appear and lobby for state employees. State employees can join or no, and participate or not as they choose. By this action a state employee will not be prevented from participating in these or other types of private organizations.

HB2707 Principal Author(s): Monson, Angela; Roberts, Larry D.; States that prior to Jan. 1, 1997 the Board of Trustees of the Oklahoma Public Employees Retirement System shall establish rules and procedures enabling any participating employer to also participate in the Oklahoma Public Employees Deferred Compensation Plan; restricts multiple deferred compensation plans.; Effective Date: 07/01/96 Emergency. 04/23/96, Governor Action - Veto.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: (04/23/96) This is to advise you that on this date pursuant to the authority vested in me, I have VETOED HB2707. This bill places an unnecessarily restrictive limit on the ability of local governmental entities to participate in deferred compensation plans. In addition, there is an additional cost to the Oklahoma Public Employees Retirement System which has not been contemplated in the submitted proposed budget placed.

HB2822 Principal Author(s): Hamilton, James E.; Haney, Enoch Kelly; Hobson, Cal; Steidley, Dwayne; Authorizes the Department of Corrections to spend \$1,000,000 of the interest earned from investment of the proceeds of specified bonds for the payment of specified infrastructure repairs.; Emergency. 04/01/96, Governor Action - Line Item Veto.

GOVERNOR'S (LINE ITEM) VETO MESSAGE: (04/01/96) This is to advise you that on this date pursuant to the authority vested in me, I have VETOED one section in HB2822 because the item in this bill appropriating funds for "...addressing additional needs in the Appellate Program..." lacks sufficient details to support the amount stated. The item vetoed is found in Section 14 of the bill.

HB2982 Principal Author(s): Cain, Bernest; Thomas, Tommy Abolishes the Oklahoma Basic Health Benefits Board. Transfers authority of OK Basic Health Benefits Board to the Oklahoma Health Care Authority after July 1, 1996. Provides for membership of the Oklahoma Health Care Authority Board.; Effective Date: 09/01/96. 04/29/96 Governor Action - Veto

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: (04/29/96) This is to advise you that, pursuant to the powers vested in me, I have VETOED HB2982. This bill fails to address the problem of the violation of Section 1 of Article IV of the Oklahoma Constitution. The current law provides for a majority of legislative appointment to an executive board which performs administrative duties. This bill does not correct that constitutional infirmity.

SB 876 Principal Author(s): Culver, Bob Ed; Rozell, Herb; Authorizes the Scenic Rivers Commission to acquire additional property for the development and maintenance of scenic river areas. It requires the Oklahoma Scenic Rivers Commission and the Oklahoma Tourism and Recreation Department to give certain public notice; removing requirement for obsolete Commission rules; modifying Scenic Rivers Commission election procedures and appointments. 05/07/96, Governor Action - Veto.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: (05/07/96) This is to advise you that on this date, pursuant to the authority vested in me, I have VETOED SB 876. This bill fails to address the problem of the violation of the

Oklahoma Constitution that provides for legislative appointments to an executive board which performs administrative duties. This bill does not correct that constitutional infirmity.

SB 987 Principal Author(s): Adair, Larry; Stipe, Gene; Provides exception for the Department of Transportation pursuant to disclosure of terms of bids. Requires the department to publish all engineering estimates at least 10 days prior to the bid submission closing date. Effective Date: 07/01/96; 05/01/96 Governor Action - Veto.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: (05/01/96) This is to advise you that, pursuant to the powers vested in me, I have VETOED SB987. The procedure provided for in this bill creates an exception, applicable only to the Department of Transportation, to the safeguards relating to the bidding process in this State. The awarding of multi-million tax dollar contracts by a state agency is a serious responsibility which must be carefully regulated and monitored. It is in the best interest of the citizens and taxpayers of this state to keep in place all procedures which assure an equitable and ethical bidding process.

SB 988 Principal Author(s): Dunegan, James; Stipe, Gene; Requires the Dept. of Transportation to issue permits for multi-state oversize and overweight vehicles. Designates specific routes for vehicles operating under such permits. 05/07/96, Governor Action - Veto.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: (05/07/96) This is to advise you that on this date, pursuant to the authority vested in me, I have VETOED SB 988. This bill violates the provisions of the Oklahoma Constitution that delegates authority to regulate certain types of truck permits to a private non-governmental entity. This legislation mandates the Department of Transportation to accept truck weight load limits set by the private entity without regard to concerns about the effect such limits may have on Oklahoma streets, roads, bridges, and highways. Current law authorizes the Department of Transportation to enter into regional truck permit agreements when it is practical and feasible for the state.

SB 1017 Principal Author(s): Leist, M.C.; Shurden, Frank; States that the Troop Commander in charge of highway patrol troop may designate specified portions of federal aid primary highways and the state highway system in the service area of the troop.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: (05/15/96) This is to advise you that on this date, pursuant to the authority vested in me, I have VETOED SB1017 because it would remove local law enforcement control. This bill would create pockets of the state which would be abandoned by local law enforcement due to lack of authority. The vetoing of this bill is not intended to encourage local governmental entities to act irresponsibly in their annexing practices or in their law enforcement efforts. I am expressing my confidence in responsible local government control.

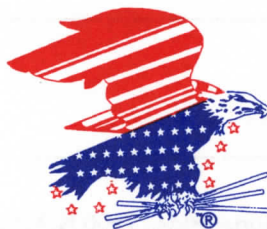
