BUDGET MOVES CONTINUE

■(GIT) Less than one day after a bipartisan group of lawmakers announced an agreement on a major budget and tax cut initiative, the budget momentum continued to move forward.

Members of the House of Representatives on Thursday voted overwhelmingly in favor of three budget measures designed to give certain agencies in need a financial boost and to re-fund two agencies originally set for elimination.

House members voted 80-19 in favor of **SB838**, making supplemental appropriations to several agencies; 82-17 for **SB843**, making an appropriation to the Liquefied Petroleum Gas Board; and 97-2 for **SB847**, making an appropriation to the Commission on Consumer Credit.

It was SB838 which generated the most debate during Thursday's session. Several House members expressed concern over what appeared to be conflicting, as well as confusing, fiscal year references. But as Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore, noted, the use of dates from the current fiscal year is the result of previous approval granted by the legislature for which there was not funding available.

In essence, Steidley explained, lawmakers were simply being asked to release money

for projects which they had already approved.

Specifically, the bill appropriates \$426,462 to the State Board of Education for the Early Intervention (Sooner Start) program; \$500,000 to the State Supreme Court for the computer system enhancement; \$124,458 to the Court of Criminal Appeals for computer system enhancements; and \$200,000 to the Office of the State Auditor and Inspector for moving costs and a shortfall in collections.

Other language in the bill clarifies problems in the general appropriations bill, Steidley said.

Without debate, the bill received its passing vote.

Also receiving passing votes without debate were funding bills for the Liquefied Petroleum Gas Board and the Consumer Credit Commission. Both agencies had been scheduled for elimination by Governor Frank Keating.

A total of \$405,590 was appropriated to the petroleum gas board and its FTE limited to 10, while the consumer credit commission was appropriated \$683,795 and given an FTE approval of 16.

The three measures were approved in the Senate on Wednesday, only minutes after receiving conference committee reports and recommendations from the General Conference Committee on Appropriations.

Governor Keating will be the next recipient of the measures for consideration.

RELIEF TO DROUGHT DISASTER A LITTLE TOO LATE FOR SOME

■(GIT) Dennis Howard with the State Department of Agriculture, said Thursday, that by January 1, 1997, five to ten thousand Oklahoma farmers will have to "fold" on their farms. U.S. Secretary of Agriculture, Dan Glickman announced a disaster declaration for Oklahoma earlier this week that will provide low interest loans to farmers. However, these loans only cover losses suffered by farmers in 1995.

Howard and Governor Keating both expressed their appreciation for the announcement by Glickman, and for the state budget agreement to take money from the Rainy Day Fund to help aid against the drought. But unfortunately, some of those funds are too late to help this year's crops. "Time is critical ... and the funds will help in time for fall planting," Keating said.

Howard explained that out of the approximately 70,000 farmers in the state, 50 percent are in critical trouble. This due to a combination of the drought and the drop in cattle prices. "These farmers are not bad managers, they cannot control the weather ... most of the farmers in trouble are young and don't have enough equity built up."

"Thousands of farmers will not be able to make their July 1 mortgage payments ... many were not able to make January 1 this year," Howard said.

Keating again said that most of the designated relief will not kick-in until late summer. The Governor said he would like to additionally help agriculture in the state by providing value-added tax credits. "Adding value, that's where the money is," he said.

REPORT CARDS ARE NOT JUST FOR STUDENTS

■(GIT) To ensure "open" communication between communities and school districts, the Secretary of Education, Dr. Floyd Coppedge, along with Governor Frank Keating, announced that schools will now have their own report cards, publicly proving their performance based on demographics and test scores.

Coppedge said the report cards have been sent to each school district for copying and distribution to parents and patrons before the end of the year. "This is an attempt to move Oklahoma back to parental and local involvement," he said. "This will also be used as a tool to show parents exactly how their school is doing."

Currently, elementary schools are above the national average in test scores. However, Oklahoma secondary students are below the national average based on ACT scores. "We have been making gains, but they are not adequate enough. Oklahoma students could be doing much, much better," Coppedge added. "I do not want to paint a dismal picture, but we ought to be concerned."

Coppedge offered suggestions for schools to improve themselves. He said that teachers needed to become personally accountable. For example, "just because a school district is located in a low-income area is no excuse for low test scores," Coppedge said.

In addition, Coppedge suggested that curriculum and programs be strengthened.

"If we teach more, students know more."

The report card did not include data for national or regional comparisons. Coppedge and Keating, said that the school report card program was new and could be amended to include such items.

"The new school report card will allow parents and school patrons to measure how well their neighborhood school is doing, just

as they examine a child's report card as a measure of his or her progress," Keating said.

"I would encourage everyone to take a close

look at their school's report card. If a school is doing well, let's praise it. If a school is performing poorly, parents and patrons should ask why and offer to help make improvements."

The school report cards will be available to parents and communities through their local schools.

KEATING COMMENTS ON SCHOOL-TO-WORK

■(GIT) Governor Frank Keating said Thursday in a press conference, that he would still not sign a bill for school-to-work, as long as the state vocational-technical system was leading the program. Last week, Attorney General Drew Edmondson issued an opinion stating that the Executive School-To-Work Council created by the Governor would not continue to function beyond the last day of adjournment by the Legislature, unless during that session the Legislature statutorily creates the agency.

However, Keating said that any board that performs executive functions should always be appointed by the governor. Keating contended that it should be the responsibility of the Legislature and the governor to represent Oklahomans on the issue of school-to-work. "It is not the responsibility of career educators ... elected officials should be the voice for the people," he said.

"If this is a fundamental remake of the education system, then who's authorizing it ... vo-tech," Keating questioned. He added that children in grades K-6 did not need to think about careers, instead, they needed to learn the basics in core subjects. "At very young ages, children should learn a column of figures, not visit a fire station."

COMMISSION COMMITTEE ELIMINATES 70 POSITIONS

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) An Oklahoma Commission for Human Services committee met all day May 8 in Oklahoma City reviewing questionable positions identified in the recently released Peak Marwick study of the Department of Human Services Central administration.

Human Services committee chairman Joe Sam Vassar of Bristow said, "We were able to identify 70 of the 170 questionable positions as positions which could be eliminated. There are another 54 positions which may be eliminated; however, it would require help from the Oklahoma Legislature on providing retirement incentives."

Vassar, speaking for the committee said it would be important for the Legislature to also take action, giving DHS the right to identify positions whose incumbents could be offered separation plans. The positions targeted would not need to be replaced.

After the nine-hour meeting, the committee directed DHS Director George A. Miller to have additional meetings with DHS division heads to identify other questionable positions that may be eliminated in the near or not-too-distant future.

The 170 positions reviewed is an adjusted and more accurate questionable positions figure, reflecting the agency's organizational structure and is different from the previous number of 220 positions reported originally in the Peak Marwick report.

The committee membership included, Vassar, Steve Bailey of Bethany, Marvin K. Hambrick of Oklahoma City, and Commission Chairman Donald L. Benson of Alva.

The next meeting of the full Human Services Commission is scheduled for 9:30 a.m. May 21 in Oklahoma City.

NEW McALESTER DHS BUILDING APPROVED

■(GIT) A resolution approved Thursday by the House of Representatives clears the way for the construction of a new Department of Human Services office in McAlester.

SCR49, by McAlester lawmakers Sen. Gene Stipe and Rep. Lloyd Fields, authorizes the Commission for Human services to enter into a lease-purchase agreement for office space for local units of the Department of Human Services in Pittsburg County. The resolution was adopted Thursday by the House and has already received Senate approval.

The department's Pittsburg County building was an issue in last year's grand jury investigation related to the death of two-year-old Ryan Luke. Among the grand jury's numerous recommendations was that the department end its practice of leasing the building from a McAlester attorney and buy a building, either through the state or county, instead.

Late last year, state officials asked Pittsburg County Commissioners to buy the current McAlester DHS building so that the state could buy it in a lease-purchase agreement similar to the one approved by the House. But that plan was met with resistance in the form of a scathing report by DHS employees who called the current building a money trap.

The department's options, however, are limited. Under state law, it must first approach public trusts, such as those created by county commissioners, for lease or lease purchase agreements.

Pittsburg County Commissioners have said they would help the state with a building, but only if the country was not financially liable and only if bonds to finance the purchase were secured by a DHS lease-purchase contract, such as the one approved on Thursday.

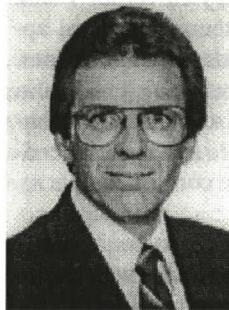
Before any additional action can take place, both Pittsburg County officials and the Commission on Human Services will have to react to the resolution.

The department has rented its 10,800-square-foot office building in McAlester for the past 14 years at an annual cost of \$83,000.

Field's amended Thursday's resolution to increase the term of the lease-purchase agreement from 10 years to 15 to 20 years.

WEBB SAYS OMBUDSMAN BILL KILLED BY AUTHOR, NOT AMENDMENT

■ (OKLAHOMA CITY) "If Rep. Abe Deutschendorf is looking for the person who killed his bill, he need only look in the mirror," Rep. Dan Webb, R-Oklaoma City, said on Thursday.

Webb was referring to his proposed amendments to a bill that would have preserved the state's Ombudsman program for nursing home residents.

The controversy between the lawmakers began Monday when Deutschendorf, D-Lawton, brought up **House Bill 2407**. The measure would have preserved the State Long-term Care Ombudsman Program, which trains volunteers who monitor the treatment of nursing home residents.

Webb moved to send the bill back to a conference committee with instructions to attach two provisions relating to the regulation of abortion by the state Health Department.

The first provision requires the Health Department to promulgate rules on the safe termination of pregnancies. The second provision allows the department to levy a \$100 fine on medical professionals who fail to report they have performed an abortion.

The House overwhelmingly agreed with Webb and returned the bill to the conference committee with the instructions.

The instructions threatened the bill, Deutschendorf said, because Senate members of the conference committee would not agree to attach the amendments. That would result in the bill remaining in conference committee, effectively killing it.

If that happened, Deutschendorf would have the option of asking the House to release the instructions. In a story published in the Lawton Constitution, the Lawton lawmaker said he would ask the House to do just that.

"I am not unreasonable about this," Webb said. "If there was no way for this bill to go forward with the amendment attached, I believe the House would have released the conferees from the instructions.

"The problem is that Thursday was the deadline for him to have that motion. He

didn't and if the bill dies, it is Abe Deutschendorf's fingerprints on the murder weapon."

Adding to the controversy was the personal animosity that developed between the lawmakers. Deutschendorf, according to a published report, was upset because Webb had not consulted him before sending the bill back with instructions. Webb countered that it was more important to "dot the right thing" than to worry about arcane protocol.

"I am sorry that Representative Deutschendorf felt slighted, but when he introduced that bill it became the property of the House to do with whatever it pleased," Webb said.

"Our colleagues voted for the instructions. If Abe is angry, it seems to me that he was more concerned with his own authorship of the bill than to simply do what everyone knows is the right thing."

Webb said he wants the bill to pass — with its original provisions and his amendments — and he encourages Deutschendorf to continue backing the bill.

"That would be the best option," he said. "I pledge to help him pass the bill, but under the rules, he has control of it. The ball, as they say, is in his court."

Webb added that he believes his amendments strengthen the bill because it expands the number of helpless people the bill would help.

"If Representative Deutschendorf allows this good bill to die because his feelings are hurt, he might need to re-evaluate whether he has the mettle to be in public service."

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT CONFIRMS NOMINATIONS

■(GIT) The Senate Committee on Economic Development met Thursday to confirm more of Governor Frank Keating's executive nominations.

Confirmed to both the Oklahoma Industrial Finance Authority and the Oklahoma Development Finance Authority, John D. Goad, of Edmond, will serve a six year term at each post, expiring Oct. 11, 2001.

Sponsored by Sen. Mark Snyder, R-Edmond, Goad was confirmed unanimously.

Former president of Xerox Canada Ron Mercer, of Bethany, was confirmed to the Oklahoma Futures. He will finish the remainder of an unexpired term, ending July 1, 1996, and then serve a four year term which ends July 1, 2000.

"Oklahoma Futures has the opportunity to set strategic direction for Oklahoma," he said.

Sponsored by Sen. Howard Hendrick, R-Bethany, Mercer was confirmed with a vote of 9 to 0.

"We are snagging him back from the private sector," was the comment from Sen. Bernice Shedrick, D-Stillwater, about Leo Presley, Keating nominee to be the director of the Oklahoma Department of Commerce. "He will be a great ambassador for Oklahoma in terms of economic development." Shedrick carried Presley's nomination, a requirement for the confirmation process.

With a vote of 9 to 0, Presley was confirmed.

Ronnie Rosenfeld was confirmed as Keating's cabinet secretary of commerce, also with a vote of 9 to 0.

A lawyer by education, though he never practiced, Rosenfeld has done business in investment banking and shopping center and apartment development.

Formerly with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), Rosenfeld met Governor Keating at a political function for former presidential candidate Jack Kemp.

Calling Presley and Rosenfeld "a dynamic team," Senate President Pro Tempore Stratton Taylor, D-Claremore, offered his "personal recommendation" for the two men in a rare committee room appearance.

The next step in the process is the full Senate, as all confirmations must go before the entire body before becoming final.

Charlotte Dobson, 70, of Oklahoma City, Kathryn Richardson, 45, of Harrah, Linda Frazier, 55, Tulsa, Dr. Patrick Lester, 56, of Tulsa, and Fran Merrick, 40, of Oklahoma City were named to the State Arts Council of Oklahoma to serve terms ending July 1, 1999. Dodson replaces Josephine Hinojosa. Richardson succeeds Ludmila Robson. Frazier succeeds Alice Goebel. Lester succeeds Mary Watson. Merrick succeeds Djelal Kadir. Senate confirmation is re-

quired.

Clifton Taulbert, 50, of Tulsa was named to the Oklahoma Educational Television Authority to serve a term ending June 30, 2002. He succeeds Eddie Gates. Senate confirmation is required.

Carl Lyons, 65, of Tulsa was reappointed to the State Board of Pharmacy to serve a term ending June 30, 2001. Senate confirmation is required.

Curt Hamburger, 33, of Weatherford, Ralph Reynolds of Norman and Gary Robbins of Idabel were named to the Oklahoma Used Motor Vehicle and Parts Commission to serve terms ending June 30, 2002. Hamburger succeeds Sandy Beard. Reynolds succeeds Harold Coffelt. Robbins succeeds Jack McGahey. Senate confirmation is required.

Governor Keating also named Derek McCammon, 46, of Oklahoma City to the Real Estate Appraiser Board to serve a term ending July 1, 2001. He succeeds Dorset Story.

FROM THE SENATE FLOOR, THURSDAY, MAY 9

■(GIT) The Senate considered the following measures Thursday:

HB2170, by Sen. Frank Shurden, D-Henryetta, changes the quail season hunting dates to the first Saturday in November to Jan. 31.

The adopted conference committee report removed a provision that would have allowed the hunting dates to be set by the Legislature. Under the new bill, the Oklahoma Wildlife Conservation Commission would set the dates.

"I have had more calls on this piece of legislation than anything we've done this year," said Sen. Dave Herbert, D-Midwest City. "I urge you to defeat this thing and let's let the people who are closest to the people back home set the dates for quail season in the state of Oklahoma."

With a narrow vote of 26 to 17, the measure passed. Shurden lodged a motion to reconsider, giving him three days to re-address the measure. Later in the day, he brought the bill back up on the same motion, which was immediately tabled.

HB2323, by Sen. Brad Henry, D-

Shawnee, creates the School District Budget Act.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure and its emergency clause with a vote of 42 to 3.

HB2348, by Sen. Penny Williams, D-Tulsa, provides additional coverage requirements for health benefit plans as they relate to maternity coverage.

The bill requires every health benefit plan in the state that offers maternity benefits to provide coverage for a minimum 48 hours of inpatient care for the mother of a child born through vaginal birth and 96 hours for delivery by cesarean section.

The measure has been nicknamed the "drive-through delivery" bill, as currently, most insurance policies only offer coverage for a 24 hour hospital stay.

Questions arose relating to the effect of the new requirements on insurance premiums, an area not covered in the bill.

"It is totally irresponsible to bring this to the floor without knowing how much an extra day will cost," said Sen. Charles Ford, R-Tulsa.

He said once families sign up for maternity coverage in a health care plan, it is impossible to remove the coverage, even if the family decides not to have any further children.

"If you are going to provide a second day, everybody's going to have to pay for it — your premiums are going to go up."

In defense of the measure, Sen. Bernice Shedrick, D-Stillwater, said the measure allows doctors to make the determination if mother and child need the additional coverage. She called the first 48 hours after birth a "critical" time.

"I don't think there is one of us on this floor who would trade a \$400 premium for the life of a little baby child," she said.

Calling Oklahoma the number one state per capita in the nation in terms of uninsured citizens, Williams said even if the measure resulted in higher premiums, the preventative aspect of it would save a baby being placed in a neo-natal unit at a cost of roughly \$1,000 per day.

After adopting the conference committee report, members passed the measure and its emergency clause with a vote of 42 to 3.

SB703, by Sen. Howard Hendrick, R-Bethany, modifies procedures for interpreting statutes and agency rules under the Administrative Procedures Act.

After adopting the conference committee report, members passed the measure with a vote of 39 to 1.

SB976, by Sen. Jack Bell, D-Idabel, promotes the goals of the Oklahoma Recycling Initiatives. It prohibits government units from restricting donations or sales of recoverable materials.

After adopting the conference committee report, members passed the measure and its emergency clause with a vote of 38 to 4.

Members also adopted **SCR63**, by Sen. Trish Weedn, D-Purcell, after removing its emergency clause and advancing it direct to the calendar. Also **HCR1102**, by Sen. Enoch Kelly Haney, D-Seminole, was adopted.

Members voted to reject the conference committee report to **HB2361**, requesting further conference.

The Senate is scheduled to reconvene at 9:30 a.m. on Monday, May 13, 1996.

■(GIT) The floor of the House was not the only place proposals were being made on Thursday.

As the day's short session drew to a close, Rep. Jim Glover, D-Elgin, recognized Ryan Hawkins, a runner from the Chief Clerk's office, and his girlfriend in the House's north gallery.

"I think he has something he wants to ask her," Glover said as the pair stood side-by-side.

Without hesitation, Hawkins dropped to one knee, pulled a ring from his pocket and asked the young woman to marry him.

Her answer was obvious.

So, too, were the answers of representatives to the following proposals put before them on the House floor:

HB2100, by Rep. Larry Rice, D-Pryor,

authorizing the retention of certain weapons by law enforcement officers upon retirement, received a passing vote of 94-0 after the adoption of the bill's conference committee report. Rice told the House that the bill had returned in the same form in which it had left.

House members also adopted by unanimous consent **SCR 61**, by Rep. Bill Mitchell, D-Lindsay, praising the life and achievements of the late Matthew Brent Hatcher, a rural firefighter who lost his life in the line of duty.

By unanimous consent, also, the conference committee reports on the following **House measures** were rejected and further conference requested and granted: **2172**, **2501** and **2796**.

HR1068 was assigned to the House Transportation Committee.

TOURISM WEEK BRINGS RECOGNITION TO TULSA RESIDENT

■(GIT) Governor Frank Keating, along with Cabinet Secretary of Tourism and Recreation, Ed Cook recognized Tulsa resident Marty Benson for 11 years of volunteer service to Sequoyah State Park. Last week, Keating had declared May 5 through 11, "Tourism Week."

In addition, Cook cited many statistics showing the benefits of tourism to the state of Oklahoma. Those included an increase in travel expenditures of 17 percent. "Travelers in Oklahoma spent \$3 billion in 1995," he added.

Cook said that the tourism industry provides for 65,000 jobs in the state. The tourism industry contributed \$148 million in state tax receipts. "That's enough to fund one year of education for approximately 55,000 Oklahoma children."

In 1995, Cook said that 15.7 million people traveled through Oklahoma's 53 state parks. On the national front in 1995, he explained that travelers to the U.S. spent \$380 billion.

"Travel and tourism dollars mean jobs for our friends and neighbors, additional sales for local businesses and greater tax revenues to support our state," Keating added.

TRADITIONS REFLECTED IN WORK OF SONJA AYRES FOR MAY 18 ART SHOW AT SEQUOYAH HOME

■(SALLISAW, OK) The life-long research of Native American customs and traditions by Sonja K. Ayres will be evident May 18, when her works will be featured in a one-woman art show at the historic home of Sequoyah.

The show will be open to the public without charge from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m., said Stephen Foster, who manages the historic home for the Oklahoma Historical Society. Signed and number prints will be offered,

he said.

"Sonja is a self-taught artist," said Foster, "and she has been pursuing her art since childhood. In her extensive research, she has specialized in designs of the mound builders, including those of eastern Oklahoma."

Her knowledge of customs and traditions is reflected in works such as the "Four Seasons" about the four major seasons of a woman's life, the "Trail of Tears" in water colors, and "Keeper of Traditions."

Sonja's first love is portraiture, he said, and "capturing exact likenesses" in pastel, colored pencil, graphite, charcoal, acrylics and water colors. For her sculpture, she collects clay in Oklahoma and Arkansas.

"In fashioning her native clay pieces," said Foster, "she uses ancient methods of hand building, stone polishing and outdoor open pit firing with native barks and woods. She combines her passion for painting with a sculptural sense of clay."

The works of Ayres have been collected in Europe as well as across the United States. Her work is featured in "Night of the First Americans" at the John F. Kennedy Center and the Smithsonian Institute in Washington, DC

Listed in the Who's Who Encyclopedia of Native Americans, Ayres has won numerous awards. They have included the Civilized Tribes Museum Art Show in Muskogee, Trail of Tears Art Show in Tahlequah, Red Cloud Indian Art Show in Pine Ridge, SD, and the Museum of the Cherokee Indian Show in Cherokee, NC

Sequoyah's Home is located 11 miles northeast of Sallisaw on State Hwy. 101. The cabin was built in 1829 by Sequoyah, who invented the Cherokee Alphabet, and it is now managed by the Oklahoma Historical Society. For further information, contact Foster at (918) 775-2413.



OKLAHOMA ENTERS SIX NOMINATIONS IN NATIONAL HISTORY AWARD REGIONAL

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) The successful opening of the new Oklahoma Route 66 Museum in Clinton has led to a nomination for a national award by the American Association for State and Local History.

Also nominated were writers Glenda Carlile and ArVel White, a video documentary on the *Last Raid at Cabin Creek*, two volumes on north central Oklahoma, and the centennial celebration of the McClain County Court, said Oklahoma Awards Chairman Bruce Joseph of the Oklahoma Historical Society.

"These six state winners will be judged at the regional level this spring," said Joseph, "with regional winners going to the national finals. The national winners will be announced in July."

The Route 66 Museum was opened last September as a \$1 million project with more than \$250,000 raised by the Clinton community. It features the seven decades in which U.S. Hwy. 66 extended 397 miles through Oklahoma as "The Main Street of America."

Details of the other nominations are:

— Carlile of Oklahoma City has completed three books on Oklahoma women, including most recently, *Petticoats, Politics and Pirouettes* on women from 1900-1950. Previous books included *Bucskin, Calico and Lace*, and *Oklahoma Territorial Women*.

— White, who lives in Hooker, was nominated for her three volumes on Hooker and the Oklahoma Panhandle. The latest, *Main Street Memories*, followed *Hooker History, Volumes I and II*.

— *Last Raid on Cabin Creek*, a 90-minute documentary, was produced by Richard L. Harding of Tulsa on the Civil War Second Battle of Cabin Creek near what is now Vinita. The nomination was by Steven Warren of Tulsa.

— *North Central Oklahoma: Rooted in the Past, Growing for the Future* was produced in two volumes by the North Central Oklahoma Historical Association with stories and photos of families who settled and built Ponca City and other north central communities.

— The McClain County Court Centennial was led by District Judge Candace Blalock. She headed the organization for the event, which resulted in a refurbished court house.

HB2293 Provides authority for Wildlife Conservation to enter into contracts and agreements for food, lodging, and other authorized expenses necessary to host, conduct, sponsor or participate in conferences, meetings, or training sessions.

HB2300 Authorizes the establishment of a forestry cost-share program. Creates the Forestry Cost-Share Fund. Prohibits the use of the fund for state agency purposes. Provides for eligibility criteria for basis of approval or denial of applications. Provides the appointment of an advisory committee.

HB2310 Modifies language pertaining to the Plumbing License Law of 1955. Defines the terms "plumbing contractor" and "journeyman plumber technician". Allows the State Department of Health to renew licenses.

HB2320 States that compensation of all elective city officers shall be fixed by ordinance.

HB2335 Allows a school board to create a policy regarding the food expenses of employees of the district incurred during travel.

HB2725 States that taxpayers with a taxable income of at least One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) in at least one (1) of the three (3) last taxable years may compute tax on an annual basis.

HB2726 Authorizes local school districts and county or city-county health departments may enter into agreements related to assuring that a child who is returning to school after an absence due to head lice infection is no longer afflicted.

HB2754 Modifies membership qualifications of the Board of Trustees of the Oklahoma School of Science and Mathematics.

HB2798 Stipulates that at renewal the Oklahoma Linked Deposit Review Board may approve an increase in the amount of principal if the business is expanding and additional jobs will be created.

HB2807 Establishes April 19th of every year as Oklahoma City Bombing Remembrance Day.

HB2813 Permits counties to submit sealed bids to purchase equipment from the state or any agency or political subdivision of this state.

HB2899 Modifies the powers, duties and responsibilities of the Oklahoma International Trade Development Council.

HB2901 Allows counties reimbursement for volunteer training expenses. Allows a county sheriff to charge \$5.00 per card for fingerprinting individuals. Allows sheriff to deduct money from the Inmate Trust Fund Checking Account to cover medical co-payment's for medical services rendered while incarcerated and for copies requested by an inmate from the Inmate Trust Fund Checking Account.

HB2918 Provides for assistant and special assistant district attorneys to be named state officers and details responsibilities of the position.

HB2921 Adds certain types of telecommunication companies to subject to the Corporation Commissions public utilities assessment.

HB2930 Modifies penalties relating to eluding or attempting to elude a peace officer.

HB2934 Modifies definitions relating to the Health Care Freedom of Choice Act. Requires certain policies be brought into compliance and clarifies compliance.

HB2950 Modifies language pertaining to private prison facilities.

HB2962 Clarifies language within the Oklahoma Children's Code to address compulsory school attendance.

HB3000 Declares "Oklahoma My Native Land" the official children's song of the state.

HB3006 Modifies required deadlines for authorization to establish branch banks.

HB3021 Requires individual and group insurance policies to provide coverage for equipment, services and supplies for treatment of diabetes.

HB3024 Modifies various sections of the Oklahoma Self Defense Act.

HB3027 Modifies various sections pertaining to the Oklahoma Consumer Protection Act and the Perpetual Case Fund Act.

HB3028 States that any written bill of sale, timber deed or timber contract shall be preserved by the owner or operator of a logging or timber harvesting operation for at least a period of three (3) years. Within said time frame, law enforcement personnel may inspect records.

HJR1074 Designates Dec. 7 of each year as "Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day."

HJR1077 Designates US Hwy 64 from Pawnee west to US Hwy 177 shall be designated as the "Pawnee Bill Memorial Highway."

HJR1087 Creates the State Government Internal Affairs Investigation Review Committee.

HJR1100 Provides for state employees affected by the April 19, 1995 bombing to be excused from job related duties on April 19, 1996.

SB 73 Creates the Oklahoma Child Visitation Registry Act; authorizes the district judge in each county in the state to authorize one or more public or private agencies to provide a child visitation registry program and allows participating agency to charge a fee not to exceed two dollars per parent, per visit.

SB 425 Prohibits adverse action against a student because of the student's service on jury duty.

SB 537 Relates to nursing; includes delegation of tasks to advanced unlicensed assistive persons in the definition of duties of registered nursing and licensed practical nursing; defines advanced unlicensed assistive persons as persons who have completed a training program approved by the State Board of Nursing; gives the board the power to certify advanced unlicensed assistive persons.

SB 689 Requires certain reports be submitted triennially relevant to the Quality Jobs Program, Saving Quality Jobs Act, and Former Military Facility Development Act.

SB 711 Creates the Master Business License System Task Force.

SB 718 Creates a Three Hundred Dollar (\$300) petty cash fund for the Office of the Secretary of State.

SB 723 Increases advanced accreditation standard for county assessors from twenty (20) hours per year to thirty (30) hours every three (3) years.

SB 725 Provides procedure for payment of ad valorem taxes by mortgage servicers.

SB 727 Modifies language relating to the Uniform Tax Procedure Code to include judgements; requires that notices be sent to debtors; clarifies statutory reference.

SB 733 States that time limits for the disposition of records of a municipal governing body may be determined by that body.

SB 739 States that money market funds regulated by the Securities Exchange Commission may be purchased and invested in by a city or county treasurer.

SB 740 Requires the State Dept. of Education to recognize for purposes of certification and salary increments teachers certified in Oklahoma employed by DHS Child Study Center at University Hospital.

SB 745 Requires licensure of out-of-state physicians who regularly provide diagnostic evaluations to in-state physicians or patients through electronic communications.

SB 747 Modifies vote required of beneficiary which is a county in order to waive certain competitive bidding requirements to two two thirds of the governing body.

SB 749 Requires the Department of Veterans' Affairs to competitively bid any contract for the purpose of purchasing Part B Medicare products.

SB 752 Modifies language relating to special license plates; creates a United States Air Force Association License Plate.

SB 753 Modifies language and statutory references relating to the Waterworks and Wastewater Works Operator Certification Act

SB 765 Authorizes the Department of Transportation to purchase individual safety recognition awards for its employees.

SB 775 Modifies statutory and gender references relating to the Oklahoma Energy Education and Marketing Act and the Department of Central Services; removes responsibility from said department for any buildings, rooms or space under the management or control of the University Hospitals Authority.

SB 783 Requires the Department of Agriculture to establish planting and harvesting seasons for the purpose of meeting the maximum driving and on-duty time exemptions set forth in the National Highway System Designation Act of 1995.

SB 797 Allows school districts to prohibit dogs from running at large within five hundred (500) feet of specified property.

SB 837 Appropriates funds for the expenses of various agencies of the executive, legislative and judicial branches of the state including, but not limited to, the State Arts Council, the State Board of Education, the State Regents, the Department of Libraries, the Board of Private Vocational Schools, OCAST, the State VoTech Board, the Oklahoma Commission for Teacher Preparation, the Office of the State Auditor and Inspector, the Ethics Commission, the Election Board, and offices of the Governor, the House of Representatives, the Legislative Service Bureau, OMPC, OPM, the Tax Commission, the Office of the Treasurer and others.

SB 858 Establishes the Oklahoma Bedding Regulation Act; providing for the promulgation of rules by the State Board of Health; authorizing tagging of of unlawful bedding; providing for notice, embargo, detaining and warnings; requiring certain permits.

SB 872 Provides for emergency payment of invoices if an election cannot be held within ninety (90) days in accordance with state law, until successors to at least a majority of the governing body offices have been elected and qualified.

HB2239 Principal Author(s): Bell, Jack; Erwin, Randall L. Modifies language relating to fishing and game licenses.; Effective Date: 11/01/96. 04/29/96 Governor Action - Veto

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: (04/29/96) This is to advise you that on this date, pursuant to the powers vested in me, I have VETOED HB2239. This bill encourages infringement on personal property rights of citizens. In addition, the provisions of this legislation could result in an adverse effect on certain streams in our state.

HB2360 Principal Author(s): Henry, Brad; Weaver, Robert E.; Directs the Department of Public Safety and the Oklahoma Tax Commission to conduct a study relating to the regulation and licensing of jet ski and boat operators in the state; requires a report of the findings to be submitted to the Speaker of the House, the President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Governor.; Effective Date: 11/01/96. 04/09/96, Governor Action - Veto.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: (04/09/96) This is to advise you that on this date, pursuant to the authority vested in me, I have VETOED HB2360 because the provisions of this bill would limit which state agencies would be eligible to be involved in efforts to address a problem that involves several areas of state concern including not only the need for regulatory fees and regulation of water safety, but also potentially environmental concerns and the Oklahoma tourism industry. Limiting participation could result in less than accurate and complete recommendations for resolution of the problem to be addressed.

HB2621 (05/07/96) Principal Author(s): Dickerson, Larry; Paulk, William; Enacts the State Employees Fair Labor Relations Act. 05/07/96, Governor Action - Veto. **GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE:** (05/08/96) This is to advise you that on this date, pursuant to the authority vested in me, I have VETOED HB2621. It has been necessary on more than one occasion for me to Veto provisions of law which grant individual private entities special privileges not available to all private entities. HB2621 grants the right to use state property for non-state purposes by a non-governmental entity. Such requirement violates constitutional restrictions. Currently, there exists private entities that have state employee members and that appear and lobby for state employees. State employees can join or no, and participate or not as they choose. By this action a state employee will not be prevented from participating in these or other types of private organizations.

In addition, there is an additional cost to the Oklahoma Public Employees Retirement System which has not been contemplated in the submitted proposed budget placed.

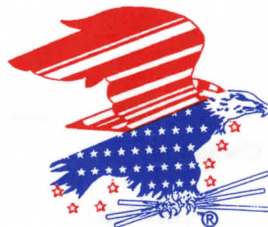
