HOUSE SUSTAINS THREE LINE-ITEM VETOES

■(GIT) House Democrats were unsuccessful in three attempts on Wednesday to override Governor Frank Keating's line-item vetoes.

The action came as the House, as well as the Senate, appeared to become acutely aware of Friday's sine die deadline and rushed through a number of pending measures.

Four votes was all that separated two of the attempts from success on **HB1812** and **HB1800**. Five votes was the gap on **HB1792**, when Rep. Charles Gray, D-Oklahoma City, broke ranks and voted with Republicans in sustaining the governor's veto of additional funding for the Merit Protection Commission.

The Democrats launched their attack before noon on Wednesday, targeting first **HB1812** and the governor's veto of sections one and four. The sections appropriated funds to the State Election Board and the State Ethics Commission. The effort would ultimately fail 64-36, reflecting a straight party-line vote.

In urging the override, House Democrats referred repeatedly to the process of writing the state budget, reiterating several times that attempts to override a gubernatorial veto were comparable to the recommendations

made by the governor concerning the budget. In urging that the veto be sustained, House Republicans accused the opposing party of "trying to spend every dime they could get their hands on."

Rep. Tommy Thomas, D-Atoka, argued that the legislature and the governor needed "to put the money where their mouth is," saying Keating and lawmakers had endorsed a state employee pay raise and that part of

the money in the sections vetoed by the governor was appropriated for those raises.

"I would encourage each one of you to step up to the plate and override this veto," Thomas said.

In arguing for the override, Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore, said he found the governor's veto message to be "not understandable." He added that the vetoed bill
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GOVERNOR ISSUES MORE LINE-ITEM VETOES

■(GIT) Only hours after House members sustained one veto and minutes before they would vote to sustain two others, Governor Frank Keating on Wednesday vetoed seven line items in five bills.

The vetoes included:

✓ **HB1809**, section eight, appropriating \$114,921 to the Physician Manpower Training Commission;

✓ **SB802**, section one, appropriating \$975,287 to the Attorney General, and section 10, appropriating \$919,155 to the Oklahoma Indigent Defense System;

✓ **SB810**, section nine, which reappropriates \$75,000 to the State Department of Health for a statewide trauma system, and section 32, appropriating \$1.4 mil-

lion to the University Hospital Authority;

✓ **SB812**, section one, appropriating \$313,140 to the State Banking Department; and

✓ **SB818**, section one, appropriating \$229,610 to the Alcoholic Beverage Law Enforcement (ABLE) Commission.

Echoing the message of his previous line item vetoes, the governor wrote that the sections were vetoed "because the appropriations contained in those items exceeded the Executive Budget. The excess funds must be preserved for future budgetary needs in order to avoid fiscally irresponsible levels of overall spending."

In a prepared statement released Wednesday afternoon, the governor said he is prepared to veto as many non-essential line items as necessary to make up for what he called "reckless spending practices of the legislature."

"It's a very simple concept. We can't be loading up this year's budget if we can't pay for it again next year. That's exactly what the legislative leadership has done with higher education and I want to make sure Oklahoma's colleges and universities aren't left with a huge budget hole next year," the governor said.

Ironically, the governor signed off on a provision of **HB1809** which contained an additional \$71.4 million for higher education. What the governor has yet to do, however, is to sign or to veto **HB1810**, which

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sections dealt with important issues with which he felt there was general support.

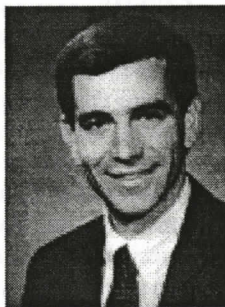
"This is an important part of the budget to insure that we have ethics and integrity in our elections," Steidley said, referring to the ethics commission appropriation. "This will send a bad message if we fail to override this veto.

"This seems like logical, common sense spending," Steidley added. "This may be a case where we need to save the governor from himself."

House Majority Leader Rep. Loyd Benson, D-Frederick, who also referred to the process involved in writing the state budget, turned some of his attention to the governor's advisors, some of whom were seated in the House gallery, arguing that the veto may have been the result of bad advice.

"If everyone stands up and votes their conscience," the majority leader said, "we can send a message to the governor's advisors. I don't think the governor would do this if he understood the consequences of his actions."

In response to the Democrats' arguments, Rep. Jim Reese, R-Narden, accused Democrats of packaging additional appropriations with the state employee pay raise in hopes of winning the governor's signature.

"If anyone had asked, the governor is

more than happy to pay for the pay raise, but he had no choice. He had to veto the entire package," Reese said.

"I know members on both sides of the aisle know we're spending all of the state's money and who know we shouldn't be doing it," Reese added.

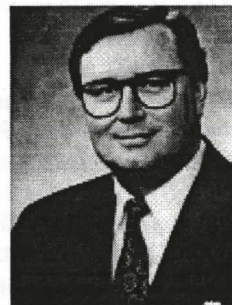
Asked whether Republicans might be portrayed negatively if they helped sustain a veto of ethics commission funding, Reese replied, "I don't think any one of us has anything to worry about. We've cast enough votes to prove we're for stronger ethics in government."

Rep. Leonard Sullivan, R-Oklahoma City, also accused House Democrats of irresponsible spending, saying they were waving a red flag in the governor's face.

"You're spending the state into bankruptcy," he said, "and we're looking at a shortfall next year. But the governor has given us an out, an opportunity to save face, but it looks like some of us would prefer to wave the red flag one more time."

Democrats, Sullivan added, were wanting to deny the governor his role in the governing process. "The governor has got to represent all of the three million people in the state," he said.

The most impassioned argument during the debate came from Speaker of the House Glen Johnson, D-Okemah, who also referred to the House effort as just another part of the budget process. Johnson also challenged Republican members to recall their vote on the bill last week, noting that it had passed by a 94-0 vote.

"This vote today is a vote on the process," Johnson emphasized. "When we brought this bill out here it did not result in a party line vote. It passed unanimously, 94-0.

"Today, I want to ask you, 'What has changed?'"

Additionally, Johnson said, "This vote is about commitment, about our commitment to the employees of this state and to the pay raise we have all gone on record in supporting."

Referring to the members of the governor's staff in the gallery, Johnson said that not only were they watching the outcome of the vote, "but the state of Oklahoma is

also watching.

"We voted unanimously for this bill last week, and not one word, not one line has changed," Johnson intoned. "Your vote today will say whether your vote is an independent vote or a vote subject to the whim of the governor when he decides he wants to veto something," Johnson said in conclusion and to applause from House Democrats.

Johnson's impassioned plea, however, was not enough, and along party lines, the House voted 64-36 on the override motion, four votes shy of the two-thirds vote needed to override the veto.

The vote was essentially the same late Wednesday evening when Democratic lawmakers set their sights on line-item vetoes in HB1800, where section 7 dealing with the Human Rights Commission and section 10 had been vetoed by the governor.

In launching what would become perhaps the most fiery speech of the legislative session, Rep. Don Ross, D-Tulsa, said, "I take this vote and the governor's veto personally. This is an absolute insult to a class of people in our state."

Picking out Republican members of the House by name, Ross reminded those on the

would take \$31.5 million from OSEEGIB to help provide the \$71.4 million for higher education.

The governor also pledged in his statement that his vetoes will in no way effect pay raises for state employees.

"All state employees will get their pay raises despite the dangerous and irresponsible spending practices of the legislative leadership. I have always been supportive of the raises and, in fact, fought the leadership to make sure the raises took effect July 1," the governor said.

"If the legislature sends me back bills with my budget recommendations plus the pay raise money in them and no additional spending, I will sign them" Keating added. "It's too bad the legislative leadership chooses to play pork barrel politics with state employees' pay raises."

Whether such bills will make it to the governor's desk is yet to be seen. When GCCA chairman Jim Hamilton, D-Poteau, was asked if there was any other vehicle in which the vetoed employee pay raises could be incorporated, he replied: "Why? We've already given you this bill."

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SENTENCING MEASURES' FATE UNCERTAIN

■ (GIT) The two measures designed to change the way Oklahoma sentences its convicted offenders, one containing the Community Corrections Act, and the other containing the Truth in Sentencing Act, are both on hold this week as the Legislature prepares to adjourn Friday.

SB1200, by Sen. Herb Rozell, D-Tahlequah, contains the Community Corrections Act. It would allow first and second-time non-violent offenders to be sentenced to a variety of community sentencing options, including house arrest.

The bill has met with resistance, specifically from the Oklahoma Sheriffs' Association, who claim the measure would place too much financial and administrative stress on the already burdened agency.

The bill's House author, Rep. Jari Askins, D-Duncan, has been rallying support for the measure all week, reportedly having difficulty gathering needed votes.

"I am still optimistic," Askins said Thursday. She said meetings with officials in the governor's office and the Senate were still underway, trying to come to a mutual agreement. "If we can get a new conference committee report or substitute that my [House] members and the governor's

office can agree on, then I am convinced we'll get it through."

Askins said part of the problem with the bill is the definition of "non-violent offender," which is not easily definable in the bill. She said if language from the Truth in Sentencing Act, **HB1138**, by Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore, were in place, the task would be much simpler.

"We can't seem to get first, second and non-violent offenders clarified."

Askins added that the interest in community corrections lies in the ability to remove the, what some call severe, Department of Corrections (DOC) overcrowding problem.

"We need to save that prison space for violent offenders," she said.

Steidley couldn't agree more. He said the Community Corrections Act is necessary before the Truth in Sentencing Act can be effective.

Since the Truth in Sentencing Act would require prisoners to serve a minimum of 85 percent of their sentence before being eligible for parole, the already serious prison overcrowding problem would become unmanageable.

Sentences would then be handed down by the presiding judge, using the appropriate grid, or matrix, to determine the severity of the judgment.

Steidley said the Community Corrections Act will act as a type of "release valve" for DOC, allowing prison space to be used for violent and dangerous offenders.

HB1138 is waiting to be dealt with in its conference committee. Steidley said he was hopeful a Thursday meeting with involved parties would yield progress.

Steidley said he was going to push for the bill's passage, removing the specific sentences from all of the matrices and directing the Truth in Sentencing Policy Advisory Commission and the DOC to conduct a study to determine the financial impact of the measure.

He said he was optimistic about the bill's future.

Both measures will have to be passed and sent to the governor's desk before Friday at 5:00 p.m., when the Legislature is scheduled to adjourn until next year.

north side of aisle of the success of some of their programs and the money involved.

"But when it come to my people," he said, "you've got a problem with \$53,000."

Ross said he and other legislative leaders had met with the governor and his advisors and that they had expressed no concerns about the appropriations.

"Now he comes along and vetoes a bill that's even less than we said we were going to spend," Ross said.

Pointing to individual Republican House members, Ross reiterated, his voice shaking, "I've been fair to you guys. You know that."

"This veto is irresponsible; \$53,000 is chump change in a \$4 billion budget."

After listing Republican House members who had voted for the bill's passage last week, Rep. Jim Hamilton, D-Poteau and chairman of the General Conference Committee on Appropriations, said, "This bill didn't develop in a vacuum someplace. It's not good one day and then bad the next."

"You may think it's funny to take a few select agencies and say they're not going to get the pay raise we promised them. I can assure you it's not."

Hamilton concluded, "You can't have it both ways. You've got to say what you mean and mean what you say, and now you've got to do the right thing."

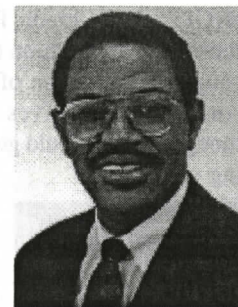
Speaking in favor of sustaining the veto, Rep. Reese said the issue was not just the specific agencies, but the entire budget.

"You've spent last year's, this year's and you're making a big commitment with next year's money," Reese said.

The governor, Reese said, "is just trying to preserve some money."

When the votes were counted, Republicans were again victorious, staving off the Democrats effort by a 64-32 vote.

Without debate, the governor's veto of additional funding for the Merit Protection Commission was sustained by a 63-35 vote with Gray joining Republicans in upholding the governor's action.

Rep. Dwayne Steidley



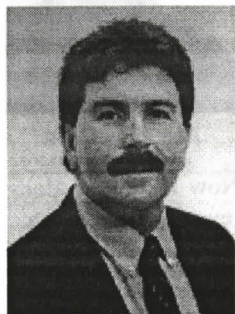

TAX CREDIT DRAWS REPRESENTATIVES IRE

■(GIT) A tax credit for companies using more than 750 million tons of coal annually caught the attention of and drew the ire of some representatives on Wednesday, although the bill would go on to receive a passing vote.

SB911, by Rep. Larry Rice, D-Pryor, defines economically at-risk oil leases, provides an exemption from gross production and sales taxes for such leases and creates the Energy Administration Reform Task Force. While

no House members voiced objections to those provisions of the bill, it was a provision inserted into the bill in conference committee that drew some representatives' ire.

The new provision allows companies which use 750 million tons of Oklahoma coal to receive a tax break equal to \$3 per ton. At present, Rice admitted during heated questioning from several representatives, only one facility in the state qualifies for that credit, which the Oklahoma Tax Commission estimated could cost the state up to \$3.6 million in revenue.

In addition, Rep. Howard Cotner, D-Altus, pointed out, the provision also allows the tax credit to be transferred or sold to practically any taxpayer in the state.

In debating against the bill, Cotner said he agreed with it in concept, but had to oppose it philosophically because of the transfer provision.

"That one phrase," he said, "could be disastrous to the state. It could set a precedent for future situations."

In defending his bill, Rice said the provision was added as a way to encourage coal-using companies to purchase Oklahoma coal, rather than out-of-state coal, which he said tended to be cheaper in price.

"The issue," Rice said, "is whether they're going to buy their excess coal from Oklahoma or Wyoming."

Questioned further about the provision,

"Data data everywhere but not a thought to think."

Rice said a similar provision allowed for the transfer of the venture capital tax credit, and that the transfer provision included in the bill was a way to further make Oklahoma coal a competitive commodity.

"This will level the playing field," Rice said, "with out-of-state coal by helping the company's bottom line."

After the adoption of the bill's third conference committee report, the measure received a 78-20 passing vote.

BINGO BILL NARROWLY PASSES

■(GIT) Its author said it would give the little guy a break, but House opponents to a bingo proposal unsuccessfully argued on Wednesday that the measure would benefit big hall operators and lead to more corruption.

Rep. Lloyd Fields, D-McAlester, told House members that **SB899** was designed to give small bingo hall operators, particularly those operating bingo halls for charities, the ability to keep their doors open. The bill allows bingo halls to use bingo cards or faces for up to five games and allows smaller halls to delay payment of bingo card taxes.

Rep. Wanda Jo Peltier, D-Oklahoma City and a long time proponent of stringent bingo regulation, questioned Fields extensively about what she claimed was his desire to give both large and small bingo operators a significant tax break, as well as the ability to dodge taxes.

The problem for small halls, Peltier said, was not that they must pay the taxes before they have the opportunity to collect revenue from the cards, but that those selling bingo cards sold them only in large lots, typically of 3,000 or 9,000 cards.

the Oklahoma City Democrat said, "we should force the distributors to sell the cards to them in smaller lots."

The bill, Peltier added, would encourage bingo hall operators, particularly larger ones, to try to get under the \$50,000 annual revenue limit to delay their tax payments. That would mean, she said, they would use counterfeit or out-of-state, untaxed cards in their halls.

"Where are the safeguards?" Peltier asked. Unless people are forced to pay the taxes up front, she said, "They won't pay them. We've seen that before."

Before bingo card taxes were collected from the distributors, Peltier explained, the taxes totaled approximately \$4.5 million. Once the taxes were paid up front when operators purchased the cards, that amount increased to \$12.5 million, she said.

"This is a sorry, sorry bill carried by a fine, fine legislator," she concluded.

Rep. Sean Voskuhl, D-Marshall, joined with Fields in urging support of the bill.

Voskuhl pointed to Covington, a small community in his district, in which the senior citizens center uses its bingo hall to support its feeding program for the elderly.

"It would be a crying shame," Voskuhl said, "if we didn't help these little towns and their senior citizens centers that help people."

Fields concluded the debate simply, saying once again that the bill was tailored to help small bingo facilities whose main goal was to support local projects.

"Just like everything," Fields said in response to Peltier's comments, "we've got some who aren't going to do these legally. All we can do is try to see that those laws are enforced."

The bill passed the House by a 51-49 vote. The bill's emergency clause, however, failed by a vote of 48-52.

LEGISLATIVE LEADERS AGREE ON TRANSPORTATION FUNDING

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Legislative leaders have reached a budget agreement Wednesday that will pump an additional \$28.3 million into Oklahoma roads and highways in the coming fiscal year.

"This represents one of the largest funding increases for Oklahoma roads and highways in state history," said Sen. Stratton Taylor, President Pro Tempore of the Oklahoma Senate. "Coupled with our investment in education, the transportation increase will

be a great boost to Oklahoma's job creation efforts."

The agreement was announced Wednesday after several weeks of budget negotiations between House and Senate leaders.

"Every member of the Legislature, regardless of political party, has a strong commitment to improving Oklahoma's transportation system," said House Speaker Glen D. Johnson. "Any suggestion to the contrary simply is not true.

"Transportation is absolutely essential as

we work to further improve this state's growing economy."

The additional transportation funding is divided into several different pieces of legislation. For example, an additional \$6.6 million was sent to the Oklahoma Department of Transportation in the general appropriations bill earlier this session. Another \$7.5 million was earmarked for rural road projects in the REAP program approved earlier this month.

The latest agreement will send another \$14.2 million to ODOT—\$11.2 for general highway maintenance and construction, an additional \$2.5 million for rural roads, \$500,000 for rural mass transit—for a total increase of \$28.3 million.

"We identified roads and highways as a top priority before the session began, and we're keeping our commitment to an improved infrastructure. The investment will make our roads and highways safer, and send the signal to economic development prospects that we're serious about building the most business friendly state in the country," said Sen. Taylor.

Speaker Johnson said the economic growth the state has enjoyed in recent years can only be continued if Oklahoma's commitment to transportation is renewed.

"This agreement signals just such a commitment," he said. "We have made a huge step into the 21st century. The transportation improvements this money will help fund will ensure quality roads and increased economic growth."

ONENET FUNDING AND EXPANSION APPROVED

■(GIT) In a decision to expand OneNet service and access statewide, the Contingency Review Board (CRB), with members consisting of Governor Frank Keating, Senate President Pro Tempore Stratton Taylor and House Speaker Glen D. Johnson, met Wednesday and approved allocating approximately \$5.8 million to further upgrade the system out of 1992 remaining capital bond monies.

Last October, the CRB voted and approved an expenditure totaling approximately \$8 million from the \$14 million Oklahoma Building Bonds Fund to upgrade OneNet (the telecommunications information network for local government and education). As a result of that approval, 33 hub sites for the network were installed across the state. With today's approval, an additional 26 to 28 hub sites will be installed. "OneNet services will now be virtually available to all school districts statewide," said Tom Daxon, secretary of Finance and Revenue for the Office of State Finance. "This represents good investment for the state of Oklahoma because there is no additional tax money being spent."

The approval came after a recommendation by the State Data Processing and Telecommunications Advisory Committee. Rep. Calvin Anthony, D-Stillwater and co-chairman of the committee endorsed the move. "This is a wonderful partnership for the state of Oklahoma between public and private interests," he said.

"I am excited to be adding additional hub

sites for OneNet. It is particularly important to rural Oklahoma and will allow rural areas to greatly improve in the areas of education and economic development," Keating said.

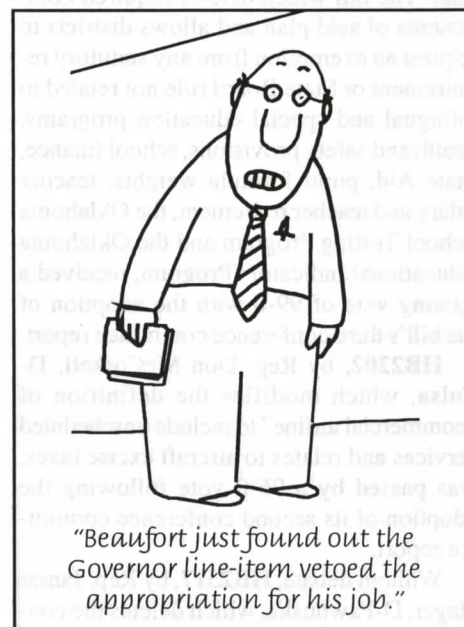
To be exact, allocations of \$2,708,112 will go to enhance hub sites, \$387,859 for

security, \$2,346,920 for switching and conversion and \$332,458 for other enhancements, totaling \$5,775,349.

OneNet uses and services include:

- ✓ Sharing library resources statewide, nationwide and worldwide
- ✓ Access to government services
- ✓ Access to public documents
- ✓ Distance learning applications
- ✓ Electronic correspondence between courts
- ✓ Video services (full motion, compressed, video teleconferencing and conversion of video formats)
- ✓ Data services (access to the Internet, high-speed dedicated connections, electronic mail distribution, LISTSERV, USENET news feed, dial-up access, domain name services, access to the World Wide Web, Gopher and Lotus notes)
- ✓ Network Security (Firewall and Encryption)

Original hub sites are located at colleges, universities, vocational-technical schools and county seats. The additional hub site locations are Anadarko, Antlers, Atoka, Burns Flat, Drumright, Eufaula, Fairview, Frederick, Hobart, Holdenville, Hugo, Jay, Medford, Nowata, Okemah, Pawnee, Pawhuska, Perry, Ponca City, Purcell, Pryor, Sapulpa, Stigler, Stilwell, Vinita and Wetumka.

■(GIT) House members considered and took action on the following measures during Wednesday's nearly marathon session:

HB1788, by Rep. Jim Hamilton, D-Poteau, relating to the Office of State Finance, received a passing vote of 92-0 following the adoption of the bill's conference committee report.

Receiving a 91-5 passing vote was **HB1819**, also by Hamilton, codifying the prohibition of disposing of any airplane acquired by the Department of Public Safety without approval of the legislature. The action followed the adoption of the bill's conference committee report.

HB2063, by Rep. Al Sadler, D-Ardmore, which changes permissive language as it relates to special license plates for disabled veterans, received a passing vote of 97-3 following the adoption of its second conference committee report.

HB2094, by Rep. Larry D. Roberts, D-Miami, which modifies references to the Oklahoma Law Enforcement Retirement System, received a passing vote of 99-0 after the adoption of the bill's third conference committee report.

HB2147, by Rep. Don McCorkell, D-Tulsa, which creates the Procurement Procedures Act, saw the adoption of its second conference committee report before receiving a passing vote of 71-24.

HB2193, by Rep. James Hager, D-Pawhuska, which allows school districts to create their own educational improvement plan. The bill which deletes required components of said plan and allows districts to request an exemption from any statutory requirement or State Board rule not related to bilingual and special education programs, health and safety provisions, school finance, State Aid, pupil formula weights, teacher salary and teacher retirement, the Oklahoma School Testing Program and the Oklahoma Educational Indicators Program, received a passing vote of 99-0 with the adoption of the bill's third conference committee report.

HB2202, by Rep. Don McCorkell, D-Tulsa, which modifies the definition of "commercial airline" to include unscheduled services and relates to aircraft excise taxes, was passed by a 96-0 vote following the adoption of its second conference committee report.

Without debate, **HB2317**, by Rep. James Hager, D-Pawhuska, which deletes the con-

textual requirement relating to the residence of a child for school purposes and clarifies statutory reference, received a passing vote of 97-0 following the adoption of the bill's second conference committee report.

HB2416, by Rep. Larry Rice, D-Pryor, which allows an equal number of years of employment with the Corporation Commission as a field inspector to qualify an applicant for employment with the Conservation Commission for positions requiring experience in the production of oil and gas, was adopted by a 63-33 vote following the unanimous consent adoption of its third conference committee report. An emergency clause for the bill also received a 68-26 passing vote.

HB2437, Rep. Joe Eddins, D-Vinita, which requires that underage students shall participate in developmental assessments to determine if the child is ready for admittance to kindergarten and requires the board of education to develop and adopt a written plan outlining the kindergarten program being offered to the underaged child, was passed by a 98-1 vote with an emergency clause following the adoption of the measure's second conference committee report.

HB2972, by Rep. Russ Roach, D-Tulsa, creates the Oklahoma Voluntary Remediation and Redevelopment Act, which encourages voluntary remediation of contaminated sites by limiting the liability of property owners; fosters reuse of property previously contaminated and establishes a voluntary site remediation program to assist property owners received an 88-10 passing vote following the adoption of its second conference committee report.

HCR1090, by Rep. Calvin Anthony, D-Stillwater, which authorizes the Board of Regents for the Oklahoma Agricultural and Mechanical Colleges, acting on behalf of Oklahoma State University, to issue revenue bonds, was adopted by unanimous consent.

Also adopted by unanimous consent was **HCR1108**, by Rep. Fred Perry, R-Tulsa, which directs state agencies and other entities to begin planning and budgeting for appropriate computer conversions for the millennium.

HCR1111, by Rep. Gary Taylor, D-Dewey, which authorizes the Commission for Human Services to enter into a certain lease/purchase agreement for certain office space, was adopted by unanimous consent.

HR1071, by Rep. Ray Vaughn, R-

Edmond, which praises Oklahoma's Special Olympics and commends Greg Ashworth and the Paynter family, was adopted.

SB823, by Rep. James Hamilton, D-Poteau, which appropriates funds and sets budgetary limitations for the Department of Commerce, was passed by a 82-14 vote following the adoption of its conference committee report.

SB846, by Rep. James Hamilton, D-Poteau, which appropriates funds and provides lapse date for unexpended funds received a passing vote of 97-0 following the adoption of its conference committee report.

SB891, by Rep. Larry Roberts, D-Miami, which provides additional years of participating service for employees terminated due to a reduction in force due to privatization or loss of federal revenue, received a passing vote of 93-5 following the adoption of the bill's third conference committee report.

■(GIT) The Senate considered the following measures on Wednesday, May 29, 1996:

HB2214, by Sen. Kevin Easley, D-Broken Arrow, permits acquiring banks to establish unused branch banking rights. Requires agency relationship of bank holding companies, branches, and affiliates banks to be consistent with banking practices and regulations.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure and its emergency clause with a vote of 38 to 0.

HB2317, by Sen. Ed Long, D-Enid, deletes contextual requirements relating to the residence of a child for school purposes.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure and its emergency clause with a vote of 48 to 0.

HB2445, by Sen. Kevin Easley, D-Broken Arrow, develops extended area telephone service and wide area calling plans where arbitrary boundaries divide communities and school districts.

Bruce Price, D-Hinton, provides a tax credit against taxes imposed for direct investment by agricultural cooperative marketing associations in agricultural joint ventures created and designed to develop and advance the production, processing, handling and marketing of agricultural commodities grown, made or manufactured in Oklahoma.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure with a vote of 47 to 1.

HB2969, by Sen. Angela Monson, D-Oklahoma City, directs the Oklahoma Health Care Authority to amend the state Medicaid plan to provide a funding source for payment of temporary managers or state monitors in facilities certified to provide long-term care services and community-based service provider facilities under Medicaid.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure and its emergency clause with a vote of 46 to 0.

HB2975, by Sen. Brad Henry, D-Shawnee, prohibits the requirement of filing paternity affidavits when consent for

adoption has been given.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure and its emergency clause with a vote of 47 to 0.

HCR1113, by Sen. Penny Williams, D-Tulsa Creates the Task Force on Prevention

of Genetic Discrimination.

Members adopted the resolution.

HJR1102, by Rep. Odilia Dank, R-Oklahoma City; approves certain rules adopted by the Oklahoma Housing Financing Agency.

after the sale. It also modifies duties of the Oklahoma Tax Commission and motor license agents and requires training of personnel authorized to perform inspections and examinations. The bill also modifies the time at which certain fees are required to be paid and modifies apportionment thereof and prohibits suit against certain agencies and persons liable for certain acts. In addition, it requires the Department to promulgate rules and provides an effective date and declares an emergency, was returned to conference committee for further consideration.

The action came after House members adopted the bill's second conference committee report, but voted 37-59 against bill. The vote was then reconsidered, the bill's conference committee report rejected and the bill returned to committee.

SB1032, by Rep. Joe Hutchison, D-Jay, which allows any eligible employer of a municipality which is a participating employer in the Oklahoma Public Employees Pension and Retirement System on July 1, 1996 to become a participating municipality of the Oklahoma Police Pension and Retirement System on Sept. 1 1996, only if a certified copy of a resolution approved by the governing body of the eligible employer or by any other body or officer authorized by law or recognized by the State Board to approve such a resolution and assure that it is filed with the State Board by August 15, 1996. Such election shall be irrevocable. It also states additional eligibility requirements. The bill received a passing vote of 72-26 following the adoption of its second conference committee report.

SB1123, by Rep. Ron Kirby, D-Lawton, which modifies list of prescription and non-prescription drugs to be included under Section IV and Section II of the Uniform Controlled Dangerous Substance Act, received a passing vote of 98-0. The action followed a 58-40 vote to accept the bill's conference committee report.

SB1177, by Rep. Don McCorkell, D-Tulsa, which provides that any license holder

of a nursing home who has been cited more than three times for deficiencies which lead to enforcement action and penalties, or found to be out of substantial compliance with the requirements of any statute or rule, will not be deemed a person responsible or suitable to operate or direct such a facility, received a 96-2 passing vote with an emergency clause following the adoption of the bill's conference committee report.

SB1310, by Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore, which modifies statutory references relating to workers' compensation, received a passing vote of 98-2 with an emergency clause following the adoption of the bill's second conference committee report.

SCR38, by Rep. Bill Settle, D-Muskogee, which authorizes the Board of Regents for Oklahoma Agricultural and Mechanical Colleges to issue revenue bonds on behalf of Connors State College, was adopted by unanimous consent.

SCR52, by Rep. Opio Toure, D-Oklahoma City, which authorizes the Board of Regents for the University of Oklahoma to issue certain revenue bonds pursuant to Section 4002.1 of Title 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes and directing distribution, was adopted.

SCR53, by Rep. Opio Toure, D-Oklahoma City, which expresses appreciation to the people of Iowa for demonstrating their support for Oklahoma; salutes Iowa on its 150th anniversary and directs distribution, was adopted.

SCR72, by Rep. Randy Beutler, D-Elk City, which authorizes the Commission on Human Services to construct a building in Greer County, was also adopted by unanimous consent.

Conference committee reports for the following measures were rejected and further conference was requested and granted: **HBs 1374, 2102, 2146, 2189, 2268, 2422, 2466, 2475, 2547, 2782, 2856; and SBs 989 and 1111.**

By unanimous consent, Joint Rule 10f, related to the filing of conference committee reports, was waived for **HBs 2250 and 2374.**

NATIONAL HEALTH EXPENDITURES, 1994

From the Health Care Financing Administration

■(WASHINGTON) The National health expenditures rose to \$949.4 billion in 1994, a 6.4 percent increase from 1993, the Health Care Financing Administration reported. In 1994, health spending amounted to a stated average of \$3,510 per person, \$179 more than in the previous year.

The 1994 increase in health expenditures was the slowest growth rate recorded in more than three decades. Between 1988 and 1992, double digit and near double digit growth occurred in aggregate health care spending. However, health expenditure growth slowed to 7 percent in 1993 and 6.4 percent in 1994.

Slower growth in health spending, combined with healthy growth in the gross domestic product (GDP), led to only a small increase in health care spending as a share of GDP: from 13.6 percent in 1993 to 13.7 percent in 1994. GDP is the total value of goods and services produced in the United States.

Public spending:

In 1994, the public share of health spending increased to 44.3 percent from 43.4 percent in 1993. Medicare accounted for 40.2 percent of the public share and Medicaid (including state funds) for 30.7 percent.

From 1969 to 1993, growth in spending for benefits by the two largest private and public payers—private health insurance and Medicare—was comparable. However, in 1994, private health insurance grew 4 percent, while Medicare expenditures increased 11.8 percent. However, when enrollment growth, benefit coverage and policy effect are factored in, Medicare's growth rate is more comparable to that of private payers.

Medicare:

While private and Medicare benefit

growth rates appear unusually far apart, certain factors tended to exaggerate the growth rate of Medicare benefits, especially in 1994. These factors include enrollment growth, benefit coverage, and government regulatory and policy effects.

When adjustments are made for these factors, the difference between Medicare and private health insurance growth narrows considerably, to 5.6 percent per enrollee for Medicare and 3.6 percent per enrollee for private health insurance.

In 1994, the Medicare program spent \$166.1 billion for benefits, accounting for 20 percent of total personal health care spending. Medicare provided health coverage for 36.9 million aged and disabled persons.

Medicaid:

Combined federal and state spending on Medicaid totaled \$122.9 billion for personal health care in 1994, which accounted for 14.8 percent of total personal health care spending. Since 1992, growth in Medicaid spending has been decelerating, slowing to 7.7 percent in 1994. The federal share of Medicaid spending for personal health care was \$78.4 billion in calendar year 1994, while the state and local share was \$44.5 billion. Legislation that imposed state limits on disproportionate share hospital payments and recent deceleration in beneficiary growth seem to have helped control growth in Medicaid program expenditures.

This exception to the legal prohibition against dual office holding as with the nepotism exceptions would send a wrong message to the citizens of this state. Every effort should be made to instill confidence in the quality and integrity of government employees. Allowing municipal officers and school board members to also sit on county boards and public trust authorities could create potential conflicts to the detriment of local governmental entities. The integrity of local governmental entities must be preserved.

SB802 Principal Author(s): Haney, Enoch Kelly, Hamilton, James E.; Appropriates funds to the Attorney General and the Attorney General for the purpose of the District Attorneys Council; appropriates funds to the Oklahoma Indigent Defense System. Governor Action - Veto (05/29/96)

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: This is to inform you that on this date, pursuant to the authority vested in me, I have VETOED two sections of SB802 because the appropriations contained in those items exceed the Executive Budget. The excess funds must be preserved for future budgetary needs in order to avoid fiscally irresponsible levels of overall spending. The items vetoed can be found in Sections 1 and 10 of SB802.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: This is to advise you that on this date, pursuant to the authority vested in me, I have VETOED one section of SB812 because the appropriations contained in those items exceed the Executive Budget. The excess funds must be preserved for future budgetary needs in order to avoid fiscally irresponsible levels of overall spending. The items vetoed can be found in Section 1 of SB812.

SB818 Principal Author(s): Haney, Enoch Kelly; Hamilton, James E.; Appropriates funds and sets budgetary limitations for various financial regulatory entities. (05/29/96) Governor Action - Veto.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: This is to advise you that on this date, pursuant to the authority vested in me, I have VETOED one section of SB818 because the appropriations contained in those items exceed the Executive Budget. The excess funds must

be preserved for future budgetary needs in order to avoid fiscally irresponsible levels of overall spending. The items vetoed can be found in Section 1 of SB818.

SB 876 Principal Author(s): Culver, Bob Ed; Rozell, Herb; Authorizes the Scenic Rivers Commission to acquire additional property for the development and maintenance of scenic river areas. It requires the Oklahoma Scenic Rivers Commission and the Oklahoma Tourism and Recreation Department to give certain public notice; removing requirement for obsolete Commission rules; modifying Scenic Rivers Commission election procedures and appointments. 05/07/96, Governor Action - Veto.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: (05/07/96) This is to advise you that on this date, pursuant to the authority vested in me, I have VETOED SB 876. This bill fails to address the problem of the violation of the Oklahoma Constitution that provides for legislative appointments to an executive board which performs administrative duties. This bill does not correct that constitutional infirmity.

SB 987 Principal Author(s): Adair, Larry; Stipe, Gene; Provides exception for the Department of Transportation pursuant to disclosure of terms of bids. Requires the department to publish all engineering estimates at least 10 days prior to the bid submission closing date. Effective Date: 07/01/96; 05/01/96 Governor Action - Veto.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: (05/01/96) This is to advise you that, pursuant to the powers vested in me, I have VETOED SB987. The procedure provided for in this bill creates an exception, applicable only to the Department of Transportation, to the safeguards relating to the bidding process in this State. The awarding of multi-million tax dollar contracts by a state agency is a serious responsibility which must be carefully regulated and monitored. It is in the best interest of the citizens and taxpayers of this state to

keep in place all procedures which assure an equitable and ethical bidding process.

SB 988 Principal Author(s): Dunegan, James; Stipe, Gene; Requires the Dept. of Transportation to issue permits for multi-state oversize and overweight vehicles. Designates specific routes for vehicles operating under such permits. 05/07/96, Governor Action - Veto.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: (05/07/96) This is to advise you that on this date, pursuant to the authority vested in me, I have VETOED SB 988. This bill violates the provisions of the Oklahoma Constitution that delegates authority to regulate certain types of truck permits to a private non-governmental entity. This legislation mandates the Department of Transportation to accept truck weight load limits set by the private entity without regard to concerns about the effect such limits may have on Oklahoma streets, roads, bridges, and highways. Current law authorizes the Department of Transportation to enter into regional truck permit agreements when it is practical and feasible for the state.

SB 1017 Principal Author(s): Leist, M.C.; Shurden, Frank; States that the Troop Commander in charge of highway patrol troop may designate specified portions of federal aid primary highways and the state highway system in the service area of the troop.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: (05/15/96) This is to advise you that on this date, pursuant to the authority vested in me, I have VETOED SB1017 because it would remove local law enforcement control. This bill would create pockets of the state which would be abandoned by local law enforcement due to lack of authority. The vetoing of this bill is not intended to encourage local governmental entities to act irresponsibly in their annexing practices or in their law enforcement efforts. I am expressing my confidence in responsible local government control.

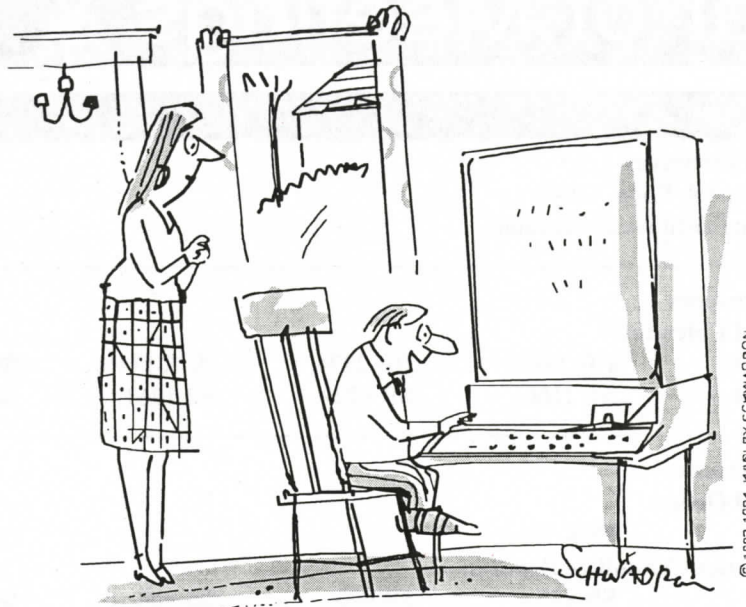

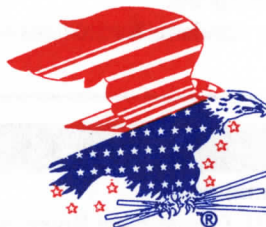
