TUITION SAVINGS ACCOUNTS PASSED

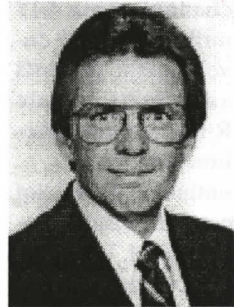
■(GIT) A bill creating tax-free savings accounts to pay the costs of college passed the House on Monday, despite a Republican-driven effort to use the bill to increase the standard deduction and exemption of state taxpayers.

HB2059, by Rep. Laura Boyd, D-Norman, allows Oklahoma residents to deposit up to \$5,000 in so-called tuition savings accounts. The money deposited in the accounts, as well as the interest earned by the accounts, will be exempt from taxation as adjusted gross income, Boyd told fellow House members.

Before acceptance of the bill's third conference committee report, it had to withstand an effort led by Rep. Dan Webb, R-Oklahoma City, to use the bill as a vehicle to double the standard deduction and exemption for state taxpayers, from \$1,000 to

\$2,000 each.

Webb reminded Boyd and other representatives that similar measures had been approved last year by the House, but that those bills had been killed by the Senate. Such a move, Webb said, could save the average family of four from \$300 to \$600 annually.

Boyd resisted the effort, agreeing with Webb that the Senate had killed the measures last year and adding that such an attempt this year might endanger the tuition savings account proposal.

"According to House staff," Boyd added, "the fiscal impact of your proposal is a minimum of \$103 million. That's minimum."

House members voted 56-41 to accept the conference committee report, with most Republicans joining Webb in opposing its adoption.

When asked to give final passage to the bill, it received a 99-0 passing vote.

HOUSE GCCA ADVANCES FOUR BILLS

■(GIT) The House division of the General Conference Committee on Appropriations gave 'do pass' recommendations late Monday afternoon to four bills, moving a small step closer to completing its budget work.

The four bills receiving 'do pass' recommendations include **SB806**, **HB1777**, **HB1787** and **HB1800**.

The bulk of the appropriations is earmarked for the state employee pay increase,

although some additional allocations are included in the bills.

SB806 makes appropriations to the House of Representatives and the Senate, as well as the Legislative Service Bureau. The House will see a 4.5 percent increase under the terms of the bill, while the Senate's increase will be 4.8 percent. Both increases are the result of the \$1,200 across-the-board annual pay raise approved for state employees earlier this year.

In addition to the pay raise for employees of the Legislative Service Bureau, an additional \$1.8 million will be appropriated to the agency with the bulk of the money — \$1.75 million — going toward computer hardware and software upgrades and the balance being dedicated to intergovernmental association dues.

HB1777 appropriates funds to the offices of the governor and lieutenant governor. Through the general appropriation bill already approved, the governor's office will receive an additional \$298,000. **HB1777** will pump an additional \$66,267 earmarked for the state employees pay raise. The two bills combined will raise the appropriation to the governor's office by 18.5 percent.

The lieutenant governor's budget in-

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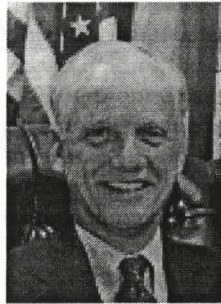
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GOVERNOR SIGNS RURAL DEVELOPMENT BILL

■ (BLANCHARD) Governor Frank Keating traveled to this McClain County community Monday to sign a bill that will channel some \$17 million to rural development projects and create a state Rural Economic Action Plan.

"I am pleased to continue a year-long effort to boost the economy in rural Oklahoma by signing **House Bill 1434**," the Governor said in a Main Street ceremony. "As I said in my State of the State speech in February, we cannot and we will not leave rural Oklahoma behind as we work to improve our state's economy."

The bill will allocate \$7.5 million for rural roads and bridges, \$4.5 million for water and sewer projects and \$5 million for a Rural Economic Action Plan administered through 11 regional planning districts. The state aid targets smaller Oklahoma commu-

nities.

"Earlier this year, I convened a rural economic summit," the Governor said. "One of the primary concerns expressed by leaders from our rural communities was the infrastructure problem — how to attract jobs and business when the roads and water systems are in poor shape. This bill begins to address that problem."

Keating said the REAP program and other aid contained in the bill will "go hand in hand with the tax cuts and credits on agricultural projects, family farms and businesses and marginal oil wells." Those tax relief measures, which total some \$45 million in annual savings for taxpayers, formed a centerpiece of the Governor's 1996 economic stimulus package.

SENATE TOURISM CONFIRMS SIX, DEBATE OVER WEST

■ (GIT) The Senate Committee on Tourism and Recreation met Monday, confirming six of Governor Frank Keating's appointments to related agencies. Debate and a motion to table the nomination of one appointee disrupted the otherwise smooth flow of confirmations.

John West, of Elk City, was appointed by the governor to serve a six year term on the Oklahoma Tourism and Recreation Board. Succeeding himself, West met with resistance from Sen. Robert M. Kerr, D-Altus, who moved to table his nomination.

Kerr said, though he bears no ill will toward him, West had requested a study to consider alternative locations for the fire-ravaged Quartz Mountain. After the study was completed, West decided to rebuild the facility on its present site.

As a result of the study, considerable time and money was wasted, time and money that could have been invested in rebuilding the facility.

"He [West] really pushed for studying alternative sites," Kerr said after the meeting. "It was my honest belief that the site where the lodge burned was the most beautiful and isolated site in the park."

Kerr said the Tulsa architectural firm who assisted with the study took several weeks. He could not comment on the total cost of the study.

creases only 3.6 percent or \$14,923 under the terms of the bill. That money, too, is earmarked for the state employee pay raise.

In addition to funding the employee pay raise, **HB1787** appropriates \$200,000 for replacement of revolving funds, \$50,000 for moving expenses, \$35,000 for the County Government Commission and \$80,000 to data processing equipment upgrades to the Office of the State Auditor Inspector. The employee pay raise and other appropriations increase the auditor's budget by some 15.4 percent.

The same bill also reduces the appropriations to the Office of State Finance by 1.4 percent or by \$123,912. While adding some \$200,858 to the office's budget to cover the costs of the state employee pay raise, more than \$325,000 were cut from the office's budget in the general appropriations bill approved earlier in the session.

The bill increases funding to the Oklahoma Tax Commission by 4.2 percent or \$1.8 million. The bulk of that money — more than \$1.6 million — is dedicated to the state employee pay raise, while \$135,000 will be spent for the administration of **HB2102** and \$45,000 will be used to implement a fax-on-demand system.

HB1787 also provides for a 4 percent increase in the amount appropriated to the Office of State Treasurer. Some \$70,000 will be appropriated to the office under the terms of the bill in addition to more than \$100,000 for the employee pay raise.

HB1800 includes appropriations to the Commission on Children and Youth, the

Office of Handicapped Concerns, the Human Rights Commission and the Indian Affairs Commission.

In addition to more than \$31,000 earmarked for employee pay, the Commission on Children and Youth will receive \$174,000 for expansion of the Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) system mandated by **HB2053**, the so-called Ryan Luke child abuse prevention bill. Other appropriations in the bill included \$7,000 for the Child Death Review Board and \$20,900 for a child abuse medical examiner.

In addition to funds already appropriated to the Office of Handicapped Concerns, the bill appropriates \$10,034 to the office for the employee pay plan increase. Similarly, the Human Rights Commission would receive \$34,013 for the pay plan, as well as an additional \$23,000 to fund one full time equivalent.

Continued operating funds of \$26,000 will be appropriated to the Indian Affairs Commission under the terms of the bill, as well as \$7,044 for the state employee pay raise.

The House could considered the four bills as early as Tuesday.

"It was both costly in time and money," he said.

West said additional money should be spent on the facility. He added, also, that the state should consider looking into private industry funding for the state's lodges, saying it would be better to look to people who would be willing to spend "more money than we [the state] would."

Additional resistance came from Sen. Maxine Horner, D-Tulsa. She cited reports from sources in Elk City that point to West's tendency to "micro-manage" staff members.

West denied the reports, saying no one from Elk City had ever contacted him on any issue related to tourism.

Senate Majority Leader Billy Mickle, D-Durant, was present to support the West nomination, casting his vote against the tabling motion.

After receiving only three votes, from Kerr, Sen. Gerald "Ged" Wright, R-Broken Arrow, and Committee Chairman Sen. Dave Herbert, D-Midwest City, the tabling motion was defeated. Horner abstained from the vote.

Sponsored by Sen. Gilmer Capps, D-Snyder, West was confirmed to the post. His term ends July 1, 2002. He succeeds himself.

Other Keating appointees include Joanna Champlin, of Oklahoma City. She was confirmed to a position on the State Arts Council. Sponsored by Sen. Brooks Douglass, R-Oklahoma City, she will serve a three year term, ending July 1, 1999.

Charlotte Dodson, of Oklahoma City, was also confirmed to the State Arts Council. Sponsored by Sen. Keith Leftwich, D-Oklahoma City, she will serve a three year term, ending July 1, 1999.

Linda Frasier, of Tulsa, was also appointed to the Arts Council. Sponsored by Sen. Penny Williams, D-Tulsa, she will serve a three year term, ending July 1, 1999.

Also sponsored by Williams, Patrick D. Lester, of Tulsa, was appointed to the State Arts Council. He will serve a three year term, ending July 1, 1999.

Kathryn Walker, of Richardson, will also serve a three year term on the Arts Council. Sponsored by Herbert, her term will expire July 1, 1999.

Frank Merrick, of Oklahoma City, withdrew his nomination to the Arts Council.

SENATE EDUCATION CONFIRMS KEATING APPOINTEES

■(GIT) Members of the Senate Committee on Education met Monday to confirm several of Governor Frank Keating's appointees to related agencies. The confirmations came in two parts, as the committee met in the morning and again in the afternoon.

Brad Barron, of Talala, was confirmed to a position on the Board of Regents of University Center at Tulsa and Rogers State College. Sponsored by Sen. Stratton Taylor, D-Claremore, he will serve a nine year term, ending June 30, 2005.

Beverly Carter, of Oklahoma City, was confirmed to the board of Regents for the University of Science and Arts of Oklahoma. Sponsored by Sen. Brooks Douglass, R-Oklahoma City, she will serve a seven year term, ending June 30, 2003.

Mary Gates, of Stigler, was confirmed to a position on the Board of Regents of Carl Albert State College. Sponsored by Sen. Gene Stipe, D-McAlester, she will serve a seven year term, ending July 1, 2003.

David R. Guthery, of Tulsa, was confirmed to the Board of Regents of Tulsa Junior College. Sponsored by Sen. Penny Williams, D-Tulsa, he will serve an unexpired term, ending June 30, 1997.

Ernest Hellwege, of Kingfisher, was confirmed to a position on the Board of Regents of Redlands Community College. Sponsored by Sen. Bill Gustafson, R-El Reno, he will serve a seven year term, ending April 22, 2003.

William Miligan, of McAlester, was confirmed to a position on the Board of Regents

of Eastern Oklahoma State College. Also sponsored by Stipe, he will serve a seven year term, ending June 1, 2003.

Raymond Ray Polk, of Lawton, was confirmed to a position on the Oklahoma Board of Private Vocational Schools. Sponsored by Sen. Jim Maddox, D-Lawton, he will serve an unexpired term, ending July 1, 2000.

Tulio Ramirez, of Norman, was confirmed to a position on the Oklahoma Board of Private Vocational Schools. Sponsored by Sen. Trish Weedn, D-Purcell, he will serve an unexpired term, ending July 1, 2000.

Don S. Reynolds, of Del City, was confirmed to the Board of Regents of Rose State College. Sponsored by Sen. Ben. Brown, D-Oklahoma City, he will serve a seven year term, ending July 1, 2003.

All nominees were confirmed unanimously and will go before the full Senate for final confirmation.

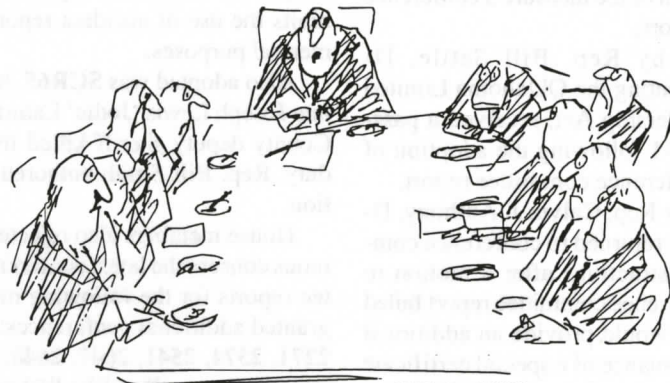
SENATE AGRICULTURE CONFIRMS ONE

■(GIT) House members considered and took action on the following measures during Monday's session:

Rep. Bill Graves, R-Oklahoma City, expressed concerns over a provision of **HB2143**, that would create the Advisory Commission on Latin American and Hispanic Affairs. The bill, by Rep. Gary Taylor, D-Dewey, modifies the sunset date from July 1, 1996, to July 1, 2002, for the Plumbing Examiners, Water and Wastewater Works Advisory Council; recreates the Advisory Council on Alcohol and Drug Abuse, and OETA; stating legislative intent; provides for appointments and responsibilities; and codification, in addition to creating the commission.

The commission, Taylor said, was created first in 1994 and reaffirmed in 1995. Graves challenged the germaneness of the commission's inclusion in the bill, saying it was not a part of the original legislation.

The provision was ruled germane, and the bill's conference committee report was adopted by a 61-29 vote. The bill then received a passing vote from the House of 67-28.

HB2483, by Rep. M.C. Leist, D-Morris, updating language pertaining to the powers of the State Board of Agriculture, received a passing vote of 77-19 following the adoption of its conference committee report. Despite a significant number of nay votes, no one debated against the measure.

The House also gave a 96-0 passing vote to **HB2701**, by Rep. Shelby Satterfield, D-Tulsa, modifying the acceptable bell types for locomotives to include air horns, following the adoption of the measure's conference committee report.

HB2893, by Rep. Bill Settle, D-Muskogee, creating the Oklahoma Limited Liability Partnership Act, received a passing vote of 96-1 following the adoption of its second conference committee report.

SB1002, by Rep. Calvin J. Anthony, D-Stillwater, was returned to conference committee with instructions after a motion to adopt the conference committee report failed 9-88. The bill would provide an additional basis for the issuance of a special certificate from the Oklahoma Corporation Commission for telecommunication services.

What was in the bill, as well as what was not, led to the report's demise. Rep. Wanda Jo Peltier, D-Oklahoma City, objected to the

report because it repealed a section of law giving the Corporation Commission the authority to enforce certain regulations over cable television companies offering local phone service. Rep. Mark Seikel, D-Harrah, objected because a provision requiring churches to be charged residential phone rates rather than commercial phone rates had been dropped.

Instructions for the bill's return to conference committee call for the repealer to be dropped and for Seikel's concern to be included.

SB1031, by Rep. Al Sadler, D-Ardmore, broadening the authority of the Oklahoma Used Motor Vehicle and Parts Commission to levy specified administrative fines against used car dealers, defining consignment sales and redefining used car salesmen, was returned to conference committee with instructions by unanimous consent.

A motion to adopt the bill's second conference committee report failed by a vote of 13-76 after objections were raised about the elimination of a \$1,000 bond for individual used car salesmen.

Instructions to the conference committee call for that portion of the law to be reinstated.

SB1080, requiring that a complete disclosure of name, mailing address and finding address of every stockholder with at least five percent ownership shall be included with each hospice license application, by Rep. Mark Seikel, D-Harrah, receiving a passing vote of 92-0 following the adoption of its conference committee report.

House members also gave **SB1147**, by Rep. Loyd Benson, D-Frederick, a passing vote following the adoption of its second conference committee report. The bill prohibits the use of accident reports for commercial purposes.

Also adopted was **SCR65**, honoring the late Joseph Lewis 'Jodie' Latimer, a Cotton County deputy sheriff killed in the line of duty. Rep. Bill Smith authored the resolution.

House members also rejected by unanimous consent the latest conference committee reports for the following measures and granted additional conferences: **HBs 2164, 2271, 2374, 2541, 2647, 2648, 2698, 2969** and **3008**, as well as **SBs 854** and **1071**.

■(GIT) The Senate considered the following measures on Monday, May 20, 1996:

HB1238, by Sen. Kevin Easley, D-Broken Arrow, prevents elected officials from participating in tax exempt bond transactions.

Brought about as a result of suspected impropriety with Oklahoma Congressman J.C. Watts.

"When you run for office, you give up a lot of your rights," Easley said.

"Anytime somebody takes away some of my rights for belonging to this body, I get a little nervous," said Sen. Dave Herbert, D-Midwest City.

Division was requested on the adoption of the bill's conference committee report, resulting its rejection. The bill was sent back for further conference.

HB2143, by Sen. J. Berry Harrison, D-Fairfax, modifies the sunset date for the Plumbing Examiners, Water and Wastewater Works Advisory Council. It also recreates the Advisory Council on Alcohol and Drug Abuse and the Oklahoma Educational Television Authority. It creates the Advisory Commission on Latin American and Hispanic Affairs.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure with a vote of 46 to 2.

HB2483, by Sen. Frank Shurden, D-Henryetta, updates language relating to the State Board of Agriculture.

The bill was laid over for further questioning.

HB2701, by Sen. Dave Herbert, D-Midwest City, modifies acceptable bell types for locomotives to include air horns.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure with a vote of 48 to 0.

HB2893, by Sen. Ted Fisher, D-Sapulpa, creates the Oklahoma Limited Liability Partnership Act.

The difference in the latest version of the bill is language requiring \$1 million in liability insurance to be a limited liability partnership.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure with a vote of 44 to 2.

SB1123, by Sen. Sam Helton, D-Lawton, modifies the list of prescription and non-prescription drugs.

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NATIONAL SAFE BOATING WEEK RECOGNIZED BY OKLAHOMA'S DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY

■(GIT) As summer and Memorial Day approach, many Oklahomans will take their boats and start heading to the state's lakes. However enjoyable and relaxing, boating is not without risk. President William J. Clinton, proclaimed the week of May 18 through 24, as "National Safe Boating

Week." In accordance, Oklahoma's Department of Public Safety is gearing up for Memorial Day and summer by advising Oklahomans on safety measures when boating.

Lt. Bob Sanders, commander of the Department's Lake Patrol, explained that ninety percent of boaters drink alcohol, including passengers and operators. "Of course, most operators and passengers are of-age, but alcohol affects your judgment, which is compounded by the sun and the water hitting the boat," he said.

"In Oklahoma, it's legal to drink and operate a boat," Sanders added, "and testing doesn't work, because unlike a car, boat operators do not have to have a license."

Sanders further explained that the Department of Public Safety does have the authority to arrest a boat operator suspected of drinking, but most arrested operators are released from jail in a couple of hours and are back on the lake. "We could also give alco-

hol tests, but they are not admissible in court," he said.

Sanders said that until Oklahoma has something like a boat operator license, it will be "hard to keep drunks out of the water." He explained, "Losing a license is more of a deterrent...people will pay fines and sit in jail for a couple of hours."

"To help correct the problem, boat operators need more education, informing them of Oklahoma's rules... maybe in a written test form," Sanders added. "Now, all they have to know is how to put a boat in the water."

In addition to alcohol being a factor in most boating accidents, according to national studies, out of 77 percent of recreational boating fatalities, the victim was not wearing a life jacket. Sanders reinforced that statement. "Half of those lives would be saved if operators and passengers wore a life

LOCAL LEGISLATOR WARNS OF DOOR TO DOOR FUND-RAISERS

■ (OKLAHOMA CITY) After receiving a number of complaints and questions from Surrey Hills residents Senator Mike Fair warned of the dangers of donating money to door to door fund-raisers who may mislead the

public about their fundraising efforts.

Fair, R-Oklaoma City, said individuals have called him about a group called Oklahomans United Inc. that has been canvassing the Surrey Hills area and telling local residents that a percentage of donations will go to Fair's re-election campaign.

"This is just not true. First, I have never heard of this group and second, it is illegal for corporations to donate to any political candidate," said Fair. "People should be wary of anyone who comes to their door asking for money. From what I've heard, these fund-raisers get about one-half of the money they raise."

Fair offered these tips to ensure donations are used as they are intended:

- ✓ at your door only donate to a well-known organization, such as the March of Dimes or American Heart Association;
- ✓ only donate to someone you know and trust, like a neighbor; and,
- ✓ feel free to ask questions about the charity and your contribution, such as how much of your contribution will actually go to the cause and how much will be used for the organization's overhead.

Fair said he has contacted Oklahomans United Inc., and been assured that they will no longer use his name in their fundraising efforts.

scription drugs to be included under Section IV and Section II of the Uniform Controlled Dangerous Substance Act.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure and its emergency clause with a vote of 47 to 1.

SB1209, by Helton modifies reverence relating to vehicle inspection fees.

The bill was laid over for further questioning.

SB1230, by Sen. Ben Brown, D-Oklaoma City, establishes a zero-tolerance standard for persons under the age of 21 who operate a vehicle while intoxicated.

Among its provisions, the measure would require an ignition interlock system be installed on vehicles belonging to drivers who are found guilty of a second or subsequent DUI offense before a driver's license would be reissued to them. With the mechanism in place, the car's engine would not start unless the driver passed the breathalyzer located near the driver.

Sen. Herb Rozell voiced concerns about the system's cost. He said the system costs roughly \$600 to install and approximately \$300 every few months to test.

Sen. Jerry Pierce, R-Tulsa, labeled the bill as "overkill." He said, when he was a practicing attorney, most of the DUI cases he saw involved people over the age of 21.

Additional points he opposed included a section directing the State Department of Education to instruct students on the dangers of drinking and driving.

"No wonder our kids' test scores aren't going up," Pierce said, "because we are not teaching them anything and we are teaching them more and more social policy."

Sen. Frank Shurden, D-Henryetta, objected to the measure, espousing his disagreement with the state's drinking age being set at 21.

"If you are 18, you can go die for your country," he said, "but you had better not take one swallow of beer or we're going to take your license away from you."

Shurden also objected to the bill's language on drinking "alcohol."

"If you are between the ages of 16 and 21 you better not drink any cough syrup while you are driving," he said. "We are making criminals out of these young people."

Members voted to reject the bill's conference committee report and request further conference.

Further conference was also requested for **SB1184**. **Senate Bill 149** had its conference committee report rejected and further conference was requested.

Members also adopted **SCRs 49, 65, 66** and **HCR1097**.

The Senate is scheduled to reconvene at 10:30 a.m. on Tuesday, May 21, 1996.

STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION TO HONOR SCHOOLS RECOGNIZED BY A.C.T.

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) State Superintendent Sandy Garrett announced last week that during the State Board of Education meeting on Thursday, May 23, sixteen schools whose students scored higher than expected on the American College Test (ACT) will be recognized.

"Considering the economic difficulties these students have faced," Supt. Garrett said, "their accomplishments are extraordinary and speak well of their parents, their schools, and themselves."

Each of these high school met certain criteria in order to receive the ACT School of Excellence honor. The criteria included the following:

- ✓ at least 10 students from the Class of 1995 needed to have taken the ACT;
- ✓ at least 22 percent of the ACT-tested students reported annual incomes of less than \$18,000; and
- ✓ the average ACT score of those students needed to be equal to or greater than the Oklahoma average of 20.3 on the ACT Composite.

STATES POISED TO RECEIVE \$3.5 BILLION FOR JOB AND TRAINING PROGRAMS

From US Dept. of Labor

■(WASHINGTON) States will soon be receiving nearly \$3.5 billion in grants from the U.S. Department of Labor for Americans who have lost their jobs and need training or help finding new jobs.

The grants, which will be available beginning July 1, 1996, are the foundation for the nation's network of job training programs and public employment offices to serve job seekers, dislocated workers, disadvantaged adults and at-risk youth.

"In today's economy it is critical that we have necessary funds for job-search assistance, training and other employment services," said Secretary of Labor Robert B. Reich. "Whether you are seeking a first job, a new job or a better job, you must have access to solid labor market data and job and training programs to keep pace with the changes and demands of the workplace."

The funds, distributed to states under the Job Training Partnership Act (JTPA) and the Wagner-Peyser Act, are allocated according

to formulas which take into account such factors as civilian labor force, unemployment and proportion of economically disadvantaged citizens in each state.

Under JTPA, states receive money to operate training programs for disadvantaged and dislocated workers: \$850 million for disadvantaged adults; \$625 million for summer jobs and \$126.7 million for year-round programs for disadvantaged youth.

Summer jobs money was almost lost completely in this year's budget debates but was saved in negotiations between Congress and the White House.

States will also receive about \$1 billion to help dislocated workers get the training, support and assistance they need to find new jobs in the labor force.

Finally, about \$762 million will be made available to states under the Wagner-Peyser Act to operate the nation's 1800 public employment offices and America's Job Bank, which is now on the Internet.

jackets."

Currently, when operating water vessels such as "wet bikes," life jackets must be worn at all times. However, in boats, life jackets are merely required to be readily accessible. "In my opinion, people do not like to wear them because they are hot and bulky," Sanders said. This fall, the U.S. Coast Guard will approve inflatable life preservers. "This will help out a lot... people will most likely use those," Sanders said.

Overall, Sanders explained that most accidents occur because of "bad judgment or no judgment. Two-thirds of accidents could be avoided every year, if people would use common sense."

"Don't put yourself in a bad situation and don't leave your common sense on the shore," Sanders asserted. "It's like the old saying, always be aware of what the other guy's doing." Last year in Oklahoma, approximately 15 boating fatalities occurred, "most of those happened, because individuals were not paying attention," Sanders said.

Rep. Barbara Staggs, D-Muskogee, authored a bill, **HB2957**, earlier this session, that would have stipulated that any person operating a water vessel while under the influence of any intoxicant or with a blood alcohol concentration of 0.10 could be in violation of the law and subject to punishment. However, the bill was left at second reading by the Senate Judiciary Committee. "That's where the bill died," Staggs said. However, language of the bill that included an alcohol testing provision by blood or through a breathalyzer, was included in **SB1215**, authored by Sen. Kevin Easley, D-Broken Arrow. The conference committee report has been submitted to the Senate. "The jail time was taken out of the bill, but harsher fines were added," Staggs said. "This would also make alcohol tests admissible in court."

Also at this time, Rep. Robert Weaver, D-Shawnee, has initiated legislation that would require the Oklahoma Department of Public Safety, the Oklahoma Tax Commission, the Oklahoma Tourism and Recreation Department and the Oklahoma Department of Commerce to study issues related to personal watercraft and boat operators. **HCR1110** passed the House Tourism and Recreation Committee on May 1.
