

SUPREME COURT REFUSES TO HEAR KEATING, LAWMAKERS' SUIT

■(GIT) The Oklahoma Supreme Court on Tuesday rejected a bid by Governor Frank Keating and two state lawmakers to have the state's highest court decide whether the legislature has violated the concept of separation of powers by making appointments to executive boards and commissions.




Gov. Frank Keating

The 5-4 decision means the lawsuit, which pits the governor and two Republican representatives against the Speaker of the House, the Senate's President Pro Tempore, a handful of Democratic lawmakers and other state officials, will be handled in district court, rather than by the state Supreme Court.

Governor Keating said he had not yet had time to review the court's opinion in impromptu remarks at a bill signing on Tuesday. The governor added that absent losing the case in court, he considered the ruling a victory. The governor also said he would continue to veto legislation that contains the controversial appointment powers provision.

At issue is whether the state's constitutional separation of powers doctrine is violated when the legislature vests in itself or legislative leaders the authority to make ap-

pointments to executive branch boards and commissions whose function is the execution and administration of law.

Senate President Pro Tem Stratton Taylor said, "I'm pleased that the court accepted our arguments and de-

cided not to accept original jurisdiction in

the case. I think at this point, the best course of action for everyone involved, namely our state retirees, would be for Governor Keating to withdraw his lawsuit.

"Politicians of both parties," Taylor noted, "Democrat David Hall and Republican Claudette Henry, for example, have demonstrated what can happen when one person is in charge of huge amounts of state funds."

Writing for the five-member majority, Justice Robert E. Lavender said that the litigants showed no immediacy or urgency concerning the conflict which would justify the Supreme Court taking original jurisdiction over the case. Instead, the justice wrote, the court "must keep in mind its appellate na-

SPEED LIMITS IN THE SPOTLIGHT AGAIN

■(GIT) The bill that would statutorily set Oklahoma's speed limits was sent back to its conference committee Tuesday with attached instructions to set speed limits on the state's interstate system at 75 mph.

SB685, by Senate Transportation Committee Vice Chairman Keith Leftwich, D-Oklahoma City, would encase the state's speed limits within the Oklahoma statutes.

The matter was originally addressed in an executive order from Governor Frank Keating when Congress gave the right to set speed limits back to the states late last year.

The bill would set the limits at 75 mph on turnpikes, 70 mph on highways and interstates and 65 mph in other locations. The measure also sets limits for hard-surfaced county roads at 55 mph and 45 mph for all others, unless otherwise posted. It also abolishes night-time speed limits and addresses truck and car speed limit issues.

Other provisions in the bill provide penalties for the destruction or defacing of traffic signs and clarifies what is the right-of-way on county roads.

Dodging flack from some members, Leftwich said in changing the 70 mph provision, members would be "effectively killing the bill."


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AG ISSUES LOBBYING RULING; REP. WEBB REACTS, TRIES TO SAVE BILL

■(GIT) In reaction to an attorney general's opinion issued on Monday, state lawmakers on Tuesday attempted to resurrect a bill that would restrict the ability of groups which receive state funds to lobby the legislature.

Rep. Dan Webb, R-Oklahoma City, attempted to garner enough support from fellow lawmakers to have **HB3022** withdrawn from committee. The bill, which has been dormant in the House's Rules Committee since March, would pro-

hibit all agencies, boards, commissions, departments or other state government entities to use funds under its control to make payment to any state officer or state employee to support or oppose a political candidate or political office holders or for direct lobbying at the state or national level.

Webb's request followed the release of an attorney general's opinion on Monday that clears the way for the use of state provided money for lobbying efforts, but prohibits their use in efforts to support or oppose an initiative or referendum question.

"If we are not going to use the rules," Webb said, referring to the House rules governing the reassignment of bills from one committee to another, "let's get rid of them."

There are times when things happen that we need to address. That's why these rules are here."


Webb said rather than wait until the next legislative session to attempt to address the issue, lawmakers should act now, while there is still three weeks remaining in this legislative session.

Asked by Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore, whether there were other bills which could be used to address the issue, Webb responded, "Not necessarily. That's why we have this rule."

A two-thirds vote of the House, 68 votes, was needed to remove the bill from committee. Webb could muster only 41, while 58 cast votes against the motion. That means the bill will remain dormant in the Rules Committee.

The attorney general's opinion, which was requested by Webb, resulted from concerns expressed earlier this year that the Oklahoma State School Boards Association planned to raise and use funds from its member school boards to oppose State Question 669, the controversial ad valorem tax reform proposal that voters rejected in March.

Referring to the statutorily expressed duties of school boards, Attorney General Drew Edmondson wrote, "To execute these

powers it is apparent that school boards must be able to lobby the Legislature concerning the multitude of bills it considers and passes every session with respect to Oklahoma's 'system of free public schools.'

"Concluding otherwise," the attorney general added, "would result in prohibiting those who are in a position, and have indeed been elected, to know the facts concerning problems and needs of our public schools from providing useful and sometimes critical information to the Legislature ...

"From the express powers granted school boards, it may be implied that they have the implied power to communicate information and facts to the Legislature concerning education and school board issues. The presen-

ture in absence of such a showing."

In a special concurring opinion, Justice Robert D. Simms wrote, "(T)he parties seek an advisory opinion on an abstract question, and it has long been the rule that this court does not give advisory opinions or answer hypothetical questions."

Additionally, Justice Simms wrote, the litigants' request for a declaratory judgment fails to meet the necessary standards resulting from cases decided by district courts "in cases of actual conflict . . ."

In one of three dissenting opinions, Justice Yvonne Kauger, joined in part by justices Joseph Watts and Hardy Summers, called the dispute a "lively controversy that meets the judicial requirements" for consideration. Original jurisdiction, the justice wrote, "extends to matters of general, public interest and this controversy is clearly of public concern."

Kauger also noted that it appeared obvious that the Supreme Court would ultimately be asked to hear the case once the litigants had worked their way through the court system and would have to make a decision regarding it.

with the 75 mph provision," he said. "The argument for 75 mph is that everybody does it anyway."

Leftwich said 83 percent of the driving public drives less than 70 mph.

"We are giving guidance to ODOT (Oklahoma Department of Transportation)," he added. "ODOT can change this, but if they don't do anything, the statute would prevail."

Leftwich cited a previous "long-standing" section of law which allows the department to set the limits.

"If we don't do anything, I suppose the executive order would still be in effect," he said. "We did not feel it was wise to leave the executive order in place."

The motion to send the bill back to conference came from Senate Transportation Committee Chairman Gene Stipe, D-McAlester. Leftwich moved to table the motion, but was defeated with a vote of 18 to 23.

Capitol Network News attempted to contact Transportation Secretary Neal McCaleb. He was unable to be reached for comment.

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MORE FROM THE SENATE FLOOR, TUESDAY, MAY 14

■(GIT) The Senate considered the following additional measures on Tuesday, May 14, 1996:

HB2988, by Sen. Paul Muegge, D-Tonkawa, authorizes the State Board of Agriculture to establish fees and provides for other surety allowable for livestock markets by the U.S. Packers and Stockyards Act. It also provides penalties upon the suspension, revocation or expiration of livestock auction market licenses.

After adopting the bill's conference com-

mittee report, members passed the measure with a vote of 29 to 13.

SB1031, by Sen. Herb Rozell, D-Tahlequah, broadens the authority of the Oklahoma Used Motor Vehicle and Parts Commission to levy specified administrative fines against used car dealers.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure with a vote of 43 to 0.

SB1166, by Sen. Ed Long, D-Enid, requires disclosure of actual payments if co-payments are based on discounted or non-discounted charges. It requires explanation

of benefits and co-payments to clearly and accurately disclose actual amounts paid or due.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure with a vote of 43 to 0.

Members also confirmed several of Governor Frank Keating's executive nominations that had been approved in committee.

The Senate is scheduled to reconvene at 9:30 a.m. on Wednesday, May 15, 1996.

■(GIT) With some 13 working days remaining, representatives moved quickly through their Tuesday agenda, taking the following actions:

HB1185, by Rep. C. Michael Thornbrugh, R-Tulsa, which authorizes any sheriff's office or campus police agency to dispose of by public sale, destruction, donation, or transfer for use to a governmental subdivision, personal property which has come into its possession; and provides the procedure for the same; establishes special funds to hold proceeds of the sale of such property and authorizes expenditures from said fund, received a passing vote of 95-0 following the adoption of its conference committee report.

HB2182, by Rep. Mike Mass, D-Hartshorne, which states legislative intent to protect the rights of child witnesses; defines terms; states considerations that must be considered before deciding to accept the testimony of a child witness; establishes who can be present during the testimony of a child witness; and provides for accompaniment of a child witness during testimony, received a 98-0 passing vote after the adoption of its conference committee report.

House members gave **HB2408** a passing vote of 61-37 despite the urging of Rep. Frank Davis, R-Guthrie, to reject the bill's second conference committee report, as well as the bill.

The measure, by Rep. Randy Beutler, D-Elk City, allows the Oklahoma Water Resources Board to grant limited water rights without conducting public hearings, eliminates the anti-nepotism clause applying to

rural water management districts and removes the requirement that rural water management districts file a copy of their annual audit with their county clerk. Davis said removal of the two requirements would be detrimental to rural water districts and their customers.

House members voted 53-44 to accept the measures second conference committee report before giving the bill a passing vote. The bill's emergency clause also received a passing vote of 74-24.

Rep. Bill J. Mitchell, D-Lindsay, asked for and received unanimous consent to reject the conference committee report for his measure, **HB2414**, and to return the bill for further conference.

HB2890, by Rep. Bill Settle, D-Muskogee, which modifies authorized expenditures pursuant to the State Travel Reimbursement Act as it pertains to various state agencies, received a passing vote of 98-1 following the adoption of its conference committee report.

Also receiving a passing vote was **SB791**, by Rep. Jari Askins, D-Duncan, which removes the prohibition against transporting a concealed rifle or shotgun in a vehicle, following the acceptance of its conference committee report. Under the terms of the bill, which passed by a 98-0 vote, the rifle or shotgun must be unloaded.

Another weapons-related measure, **SB1050**, by Rep. Fred Stanley, also received a passing vote. The measure, which passed by a vote of 99-0 following the adoption of its second conference committee report, modifies certain language relating to firearms, particularly those provisions related

tation of such facts and information is included under our broad definition of 'lobbying.' Accordingly, we find that school boards have the implied power to lobby the Legislature."

The opinion notes that certain statutes also impact the position, particularly that law which requires certain individuals to register to be a lobbyist in Oklahoma and exempts public officials "acting in [their] official capacity" and public employees "acting on behalf of the governmental entity by which [they are] employed."

Referring back to Webb's original question — whether a private association representing school board members can lobby the legislature regarding school board or other education issues and in doing so expend funds partially derived from membership dues paid with state funds — the opinion states, "...a school board may lawfully pay membership dues to a private association that then uses such funds to engage in lobbying."

The same is not true, however, for efforts to support or oppose an initiative or referendum question if the dues were paid and received with this intent. Additionally, the attorney general notes in the opinion, a public officer and an individual who conspire for such a purpose may both be subject to criminal prosecution for conspiracy.

That's because, the attorney general explains in the opinion, school boards and other public officials are prohibited by statute from directing or authorizing the use of public funds to be used in support of or in opposition to "any measure which is being referred to a vote of the people by means of the initiative or referendum ..."

While the statute applies to individuals and not associations, an effort to divert funds for such a purpose would constitute conspiracy, according to the opinion, and would be punishable under the statute.

to the carrying of a weapon on college campuses. In those instances, according to the bill, weapons must be left in the owner's vehicle, and can only be carried on the college campus with the permission of the university president.

SB1315, by Rep. Calvin Anthony, D-Stillwater, which directs purchasing specifications and parameters related to OneNet, received a passing vote of 97-0 following the adoption of its conference committee report.

House members also adopted **SCR62**, congratulating Clifton Talbert, of Tulsa, for his accomplishments. Talbert is the author of the novel *Once Upon A Time When We Were Colored* for which he was awarded an Image Award by the NAACP and was the basis for an award winning film by the same name. The book details Talbert's life while growing up in Mississippi as a black man. Talbert's follow up novel, *The Last Train North*, was nominated for a Pulitzer Prize.

By unanimous consent, the conference committee reports for the following **House measures** were rejected and further conferences were requested and granted: **2059** and **2393**.

AMERICAN AIRLINES TO RESTORE DFW JET SERVICE

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) American Airlines has decided to restore jet service between Oklahoma City and Dallas-Fort Worth, according to two leaders of the Oklahoma Senate.

"We have it on good authority that the official announcement will be forthcoming very soon," said Senator Stratton Taylor, President Pro Tempore of the Oklahoma Senate. "This is going to be a great boost to our economic development efforts."

American Airlines suspended jet service between Oklahoma City and DFW last year, citing market reasons. It replaced the jets with turbo prop planes, a move that upset business leaders and airline customers in Oklahoma City. Since that time, the State Department of Commerce and other officials have been working with American to restore jet service.

"A lot of people have been working very hard to bring jet service back, and it looks like that hard work has paid off," said Senator Taylor.

According to American Airlines, jet service will resume between Oklahoma City and

DFW on August 1, 1996.

"I think this is great news for Oklahoma City and the entire state," said Senator Keith Leftwich, Majority Whip and Vice-chairman of the Senate Transportation Committee. "Having full jet service to Dallas will make our city and our region that much more economically competitive."

At a meeting of the Senate Transportation Committee late last year, Senator Leftwich and others heard testimony from the local business leaders on the importance of jet service between the two metropolitan areas.

Reports indicate that American will initially add three jets to its Oklahoma City/DFW route in August, followed by another two in September.



LAWMAKER SAYS TAX-EXEMPT FINANCING NOT FOR POLITICIANS

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) The state House of Representatives will consider a bill Wednesday that would prevent elected officials from using tax-exempt bond financing to line their own pockets.

State Rep. Ed Crocker, D-Norman, said he wrote **House Bill 1238** because of concerns expressed to him by many Oklahomans about possible abuse of the program by a public official.

The lawmaker said there are allegations that U.S. Rep. J.C. Watts is using his influence as an elected official to secure millions of dollars in tax-exempt financing for business deals.

Watts is a freshman Republican member of Congress who sits on the congressional committee charged with oversight of the nation's banking and lending policy. The former state corporation commissioner has drawn criticism before because of his zealous efforts to secure tax-exempt financing for his private business.

A recent series of investigative reports by KTOK Radio in Oklahoma City has raised even more questions about Watts' financial deals and campaign ethics. Though Watts is threatening legal action against KTOK, the latest revelations have given the bill a boost, Crocker said.

As written, the measure would force disclosure of participation by any federal, state or local official in a project that benefits from tax-exempt financing. Almost any interest by an elected official in a legal entity seeking tax-exempt funds would disqualify the entity seeking the financing.

Crocker said the proposed law would not prevent elected officials from participating in business deals in which there is no conflict of interest.

"But politicians wouldn't have access to this very limited pool of funds," he said. "They would have to find some other form of financing."

The lawmaker acknowledged his bill

would place a higher standard on elected officials.

"This does make it tougher on those of us elected to office," he said. "Our constituents didn't elect us to office to get rich. We were elected to conduct the people's business in an honest, aboveboard manner. Any failure to do that, as the allegations suggest, erodes public confidence in their government."

Crocker concluded by saying it is far more important to preserve public trust in government than it is for politicians to get rich.

"Elected officials should not put themselves above average citizens," he asserted. "The power of government comes from the people, and the people are the most important component of our system."

Crocker is a candidate for Watts' congressional seat. State House records indicate, however, he filed this bill long before he became a candidate for Congress.

SENATE HUMAN SERVICES CONFIRMS NOMINATIONS

■(GIT) The Senate Committee on Human Resources met Tuesday to confirm still more of Governor Frank Keating's executive nominations.

Dr. Dan Fieker, of Tulsa, was confirmed to another nine year position on the State Board of Health. His second term, he has served as president of the organization this year.

Fieker said some of his goals include getting the board "more involved in the legislative process."

Sponsored by Sen. Don Rubottom, R-Tulsa, Fieker was unanimously confirmed.

Dr. Jay Gregory, of Muskogee, was also unanimously confirmed to the State Board of Health. Past president of the Oklahoma State Medical Association, he said he is confident his experience will serve him well in the position.

"I do have my hand on the pulse of health care in Oklahoma," he said.

The State Board of Health is the authority responsible for writing the rules and regulation for the state's health maintenance organizations (HMO's).

Gregory said 75 percent of all Muskogee hospital patients are Medicare and Medicaid patients.

"PHO's (physician hospital organizations) are failing because hospitals are more concerned about profit and doctors are more concerned about the patients," he said, commenting that with all the changes in health care, patients will still be the main concern.

"The laying on of hands, where the doctor meets the patient, will never change. It can't change. If it does, I am no longer a doctor."

Sponsored by Sen. Ben Robinson, D-Muskogee, Gregory will serve a nine year term.

Grace Goodeagle, of Quapaw, was confirmed to the Oklahoma Indian Affairs Commission. She will serve a three year term, ending August 15, 1998.

Sponsored by Sen. Rick Littlefield, D-Grove, she was confirmed unanimously.

Keating nominee to the State Board of Licensed Social Workers Phillip Davis, was not present for his confirmation. He has rescheduled for another date.

ART THERAPY SESSION SET FOR JUNE AT OU

■(NORMAN, OK) Art therapists and others employed in the helping professions are invited to attend a summer intensive art therapy session June 8 through 28 on the University of Oklahoma Norman campus.

Sponsored by the OU College of Continuing Education, the graduate-level courses are offered in a flexible, condensed format designed especially for working professionals interested in furthering their training and achieving continuing education units in art therapy. Participants can attend all or selected parts of the institute.

This summer's courses include Group Art Therapy, Media and Techniques in Art Therapy and Developmental Art Therapy; Professional Issues and Ethics in Art Therapy, Non-Clinical Applications of Art Therapy and Using Art in Assessment and Evaluation; Multicultural Perspectives in Art Therapy, Art Therapy in Educational Settings and Women's Issues in Art Therapy.

All summer session instructors are practicing art therapists registered with the Art Therapy Credentials Board. In addition, all have extensive clinical and teaching experience and are appointed adjunct graduate faculty at OU.

Cost for the courses is \$91.40 per credit hour for Oklahoma residents and \$251.40 per credit hour for non-residents. All students must be admissible to the OU Graduate College to participate in these courses.


