APPROPRIATIONS BILLS PASSED

■(GIT) Five appropriations bills received approval on Tuesday in both the House and the Senate, and the House moved forward on three more funding bills, as well.

Receiving approval in both legislative houses were:

✓ **HB1777**, appropriating \$66,267 to the office of the governor and \$14,923 the office of the lieutenant governor;

✓ **HB1787**, appropriating \$631,234 to the Office of the State Auditor and Inspector; \$200,858 to the Office of State Finance; \$1.8 million to the Oklahoma Tax Commission; and \$171,281 to the Office of the State Treasurer;

✓ **HB1800**, appropriating 233,779 to the Commission on Children and Youth; \$10,034 to the Office of Handicapped Concerns; \$57,013 to the Human Rights Commission; and \$33,044 to the Indian Affairs Commission;

✓ **SB806**, appropriating \$508,035 to the House of Representatives; \$1.8 million to the Legislative Service Bureau; and \$338,674 to the Senate.

The four bills were released late Monday afternoon by the General Conference

Committee on Appropriations.

Also approved by both houses, following its afternoon release from the appropriations conference committee, was **SB808**, appropriating funds to the Department of Libraries and the Secretary of State.

Included in the Department of Libraries' appropriations are:

- \$118,576 for the employee pay raise and OPERS increase;
- \$24,000 for a catalog update;

- \$125,000 for electronic databases; and
- \$132,424 for state aid to public libraries.

Some \$51,717 is appropriated under the terms of the bill to the Secretary of State for the employee pay raise and OPERS increase. Additionally, the bill repeals an \$119,340 appropriation included in the general appropriation bill for the Office of Volunteerism. Nearly half of that money — \$50,000 — is

OMBUDSMAN EFFORT FAILS AGAIN; ABORTION RULES TACKED ON NEW BILL

■(GIT) An effort to protect the state's long-term care ombudsman program failed again on Tuesday when the program was ruled not to be germane to the bill in which it had been included.

Most of the debate over **HB2393**, by Rep. Mark Seikel, D-Harrah, had focused on provisions in the bill dealing with the creation of the Early Identification and Service Support for Children and Families Act, when Rep. Scott Adkins, R-Broken Arrow, asked

whether the inclusion of the ombudsman program in the bill was germane.

After a lengthy consultation with Chief Clerk Larry Warden and a brief question of Adkins, Speaker Pro Tempore Rep. Jim Glover, D-Elgin, ruled that the ombudsman portion of the bill was not germane. That is because House rules require that conference committee additions to bills be consistent with the bill's original subject matter. In this case, that meant any addition would have to deal with children rather than the elderly.

Rep. Carolyn Coleman, R-Moore, then introduced instructions to return the bill to conference committee for further consideration and to strike the bill's first section, which dealt with the creation of the early identification program. Combined with the earlier ruling, Glover noted, the action would leave the House without a workable bill.

Coleman's motion was rejected by a 27-72 vote. Seikel then asked for and received unanimous consent to reject the conference committee report and to return the bill for

being appropriated to the Office of Civil Emergency Management, into which the office will be placed by **HB1783**.

Also approved by the House after their release from conference committee were **HBs 1783, 1792 and 1815**.

HB1783 appropriates funds to the Department of Civil Emergency Management, the State Fire Marshal and the Oklahoma Military Department.

Under the terms of the bill, the Department of Civil Emergency Management will receive the following appropriations in addition to the funds set aside for the agency earlier this year:

- \$10,780 for the employee salary increase and \$1,496 for the OPERS increase;
- \$15,916 for an Emergency Area Coordinator;
- \$8,985 for an Individual Assistance Officer; and
- \$50,000 for the Volunteerism Office transfer.

The Volunteerism Office is being transferred to the Civil Emergency Management Department from the Secretary of State's office. As a result, the secretary's office is losing the funding for the organization.

The bill also appropriates a total of \$227,326 to the State Fire Marshal's Office, including:

- \$32,886 for the employee salary increase and \$3,135 for the OPERS increase;
- \$141,305 to replace the office's carryover funds; and
- \$50,000 for a code enforcement officer.

The Oklahoma Military Department will receive an additional appropriation of

\$995,960 under the terms of the bill, including:

- \$127,540 for the employee pay raise and \$10,575 for the OPERS increase;
- \$200,000 for maintenance and repair;
- \$5,000 for operation of the 45th Museum;
- \$599,306 for the department's youth academy; and
- \$53,539 for Starbase.

In addition, the department will receive \$20,000 in reappropriated money from the treasurer's office for hosting the Adjutant General Association of the United States' annual conference. The money for maintenance and repair is being reappropriated from the State Election Board, according to the bill.

Appropriations in **HB1792** include \$96,392 to the Merit Protection Commission and \$527,718 to the Office of Personnel Management.

The bulk of the money appropriated to the Merit Protection Commission — \$81,039 — will be used to restore funds from last fiscal year's reduction. The remainder of the money will go toward the employee pay raise and associated OPERS increase.

In addition to the \$158,772 set aside for the pay and OPERS increase for the Office of Personnel Management workers, the agency will receive \$175,000 for employee compensation reform, \$125,000 for its employee assistance program and \$68,946 for its agency service unit.

HB1815 appropriates nearly \$2.5 to the Department of Central Services, including \$308,708 for the employee pay raise and OPERS increase, \$1.7 million for debt service on 1995 bonds and \$400,000 for replacement of the agency's asbestos removal revolving funds.

The bill also allows the department to spend up to \$548,775 from the Motor Vehicle Liability Account to provide salaries and administrative expenses; \$274,637 from the Risk Management Participation Revolving Fund and \$42,666 from the Oklahoma Motor License Agent Indemnity Fund for salaries and administrative expenses of the Comprehensive Professional Risk Management Program. Exempted from budgetary limits by the bill are expenditures from the Risk Management Revolving Fund.

Those measures now move to the Senate for consideration.

More funding bills are expected to move from GCCA onto the House and Senate floors on Wednesday, possibly including the

long-awaited education appropriations. The House subcommittee for education appropriations went into a closed-door meeting following Tuesday's adjournment.

further conference committee consideration.

The dispute over the ombudsman program began earlier this month when Rep. Abe Deuschendorf, D-Lawton, first attempted to bring the bill containing the program out of conference. The conference committee report for that bill, **HB2407**, was rejected, and at the urging of Rep. Dan Webb, R-Oklahoma City, was returned to conference with instructions.

Additional wording included in the instructions called for the state health department to establish minimum safety standards for free-standing abortion clinics. The bill later died in conference.

Ironically, the same rules concerning free-standing abortion clinics were included in instructions for a conference committee report approved by the House on Tuesday.

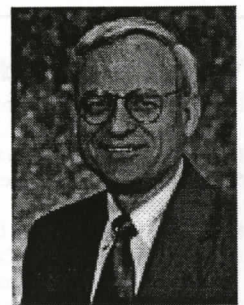
By voice vote, House members ordered **SB1290** returned to conference committee and instructed the committee to add language allowing the department of health to set minimum safety standards for abortion clinics and to set and enforce a penalty for those clinics violating the standards.

SB1290, by Rep. Calvin J. Anthony, D-Stillwater, would have directed the health department to establish rules regarding the establishment of provider service networks.

This time, it was Rep. Forrest Claunch, R-Midwest City, who proposed and won approval for the instructions concerning the abortion clinic rules.

And much like when the instructions were given for Deuschendorf's bill, House members asked whether Claunch was willing to see Anthony's bill die as a result of the instructions.

"I don't think the language the bill contains is more important than the language in this amendment," Claunch replied. "I don't see how rules for provider networks can be more important than the lives of women."

LEGISLATIVE LEADERS AGREE ON PROPERTY TAX PACT

From Oklahoma Legislature

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) The leaders of the Oklahoma House and Senate have announced a final agreement on property tax reform legislation, saying the resulting package will provide Oklahoma homeowners with an additional layer of protection against "unfair and excessive property tax increases."

The legislation will be voted on this week, either Wednesday or Thursday.

"Our citizens have expressed concerns about our property tax system and this package will address those concerns," said Senator Stratton Taylor, President Pro Tempore of the Oklahoma Senate. "Major fluctuations in property taxes will become a thing of the past under this legislation."

"This reform package injects some much-needed common sense into Oklahoma's property tax system," said House Speaker Glen D. Johnson. "Every Oklahoma homeowner — especially our senior citizens on a fixed income — wins with this bill."

The Speaker also expressed his gratitude to the members of the Citizens' Advisory Task Force on Property Taxation, the panel appointed by legislative leaders and the Governor last year to study the ad valorem system.

"Their hard work gave us a starting point," he related. "This bill is proof that citizens and elected officials, from both political parties, can work together to develop workable solutions to the complex problems facing our state."

Today's announcement is the culmination of several weeks of discussion by a joint, bipartisan committee on property taxes. The panel members agreed to adopt four of six recommendations from the Citizens' Task Force. The four proposals include:

- ✓ Cap property tax growth at 5 percent per year on locally assessed real property;
- ✓ Freeze assessment ratios at 1995 levels;
- ✓ Freeze valuations on properties of senior citizens earning less than \$25,000 per year; and
- ✓ Provide that a statement of how property tax dollars are spent be attached to all tax notices.

The legislative committee went above and beyond the citizens' task force recommendations in regard to the elderly and low-

income homeowners. It adopted a provision to raise the income level to \$20,000 to qualify for a double homestead exemption. That change will greatly reduce and in some cases, eliminate the property tax burden on working families and the elderly.

"We wanted to provide additional relief to the people who need it most, the working families and the elderly who are struggling to make ends meet," said Senator Penny Williams, a member of the legislative committee.

"I think we've managed to draft a package that will address everyone's concerns, from senior citizens to school patrons," said Representative Dwayne Steidley, also a committee member.

Even though the latest agreement represents more than a year of work by the citizens' task force and legislators, lawmakers say they will continue to closely monitor developments in the property tax system.

"We're going to keep a close eye on our property tax foundation, especially in respect to education," said Senator Williams. "We do not want to do anything that will hurt our public schools."

One of the task force proposals rejected by the legislative committee would have given county voters the option of removing the caps on millage.

Committee members did recommend that the millage proposal be part of a later examination of overall budget and finance options. They said that before any new funding mechanisms are adopted, the future needs of education and county governments must be examined.

PERMANENT MIDTERM FIX TO BE ENACTED

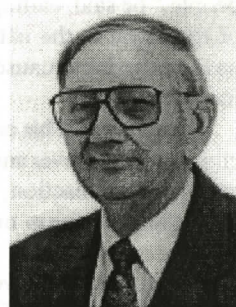
■(OKLAHOMA CITY) After months of hard work and sometimes contentious debate, a permanent solution for the annual midterm funding problems has been found. Governor Keating will officially sign HB2055 Wednesday.

"Basically, we've done away with an annual headache that's plagued both our growing schools and state lawmakers," said Senator Don Williams, one of the chief architects of HB2055. "We've created a system that will get our schools the money when they need it, making it easier for them to budget and meet the needs of their students."

"I think it's especially significant that this Legislature was able to solve a school funding problem that has haunted Oklahoma for years," noted Representative Jack Begley, House author of the legislation. "We were able to bring all the competing parties to the table and hammer out a compromise. It wasn't easy, but judging from the final product, it certainly was worth the effort."



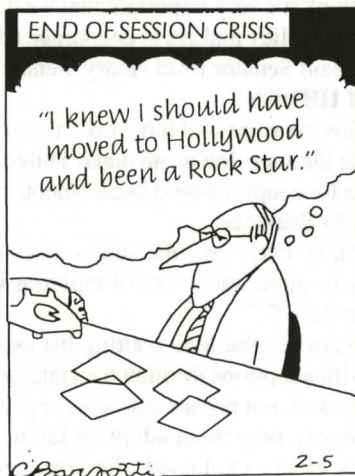

In addition to enacting a permanent solution to the midterm problem, Senator Williams and Representative Begley were also instrumental in forging a budget agreement that delivered three years worth of midterm funding — a total of \$42 million — to growing districts.

"Growing schools are going to be fairly compensated for their new students and the additional expenses they entail," said Representative Begley.

"Everyone is paid up in full. Every district has gotten every penny it deserves," said Senator Williams.

To cover a portion of the midterm costs for the two previous school years, the constitutional reserve fund was tapped for approximately \$13 million. Under the permanent solution, all future midterm adjustments will come from the general revenue fund.

SENATE JUDICIARY COMMITTEE CONFIRMS RICKS, OTHERS

■(GIT) Despite rumors of possible problems with the confirmation of Keating appointee Bob Ricks to the post of commissioner of public safety and cabinet secretary of safety and security, the Senate Judiciary Committee effortlessly confirmed the Edmond man to the two positions Tuesday.

With a unanimous vote on both accounts, Ricks will serve both positions at the pleasure of the governor.

Ricks has already served for just over seven months in the position, but required Senate confirmation to firm-up the post.

"As the commissioner and cabinet secretary, I have been pleased with what I have learned about the professionalism of the men and women of the Department of Public Safety (DPS)."

In an impromptu gathering with the media following the Senate hearing, Ricks dispelled rumors that, once confirmed, he would remove many DPS personnel from the positions to correct a reported "wide-spread problem" within the department.

"I will not go in and arbitrarily replace people," he said, calling the department one of the finest in the nation. "The point is, I have no desire to cause harm to the department."

When asked if his confirmation was anticlimactic, "It's never anti-climactic when you get a positive reaction," commenting on the unanimous decision made by the committee.

Ricks, and others, were later unanimously confirmed by the full Senate.

Other Keating appointees confirmed to their posts include:

Keith B. Aycock, of Lawton, to the Oklahoma State Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs Control Commission, to serve a seven year term ending Dec. 31, 2002, sponsored by Sen. Jim Maddox, D-Lawton.

Bill Burkett, of Oklahoma City, to the Oklahoma Indigent Defense System, to serve a five year term ending July 1, 2001, sponsored by Sen. Howard Hendrick, R-Bethany.

Bryan B. Close, of Jenks, to the Alcoholic Beverage Laws Enforcement Commission, to serve two consecutive terms ending June 23, 2001, sponsored by Sen. Don Rubottom, R-Tulsa.

Stanley Glanz, of Tulsa, to the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation Commission, to serve a seven year term ending July 1, 2002, sponsored by Sen. Lewis Long, D-

Glenpool.

Warren K. Jordan, of Oklahoma City, to the Oklahoma State Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs Control Commission, to serve an unexpired term ending Dec. 31, 2000, sponsored by Sen. Gerald "Ged" Wright, R-Broken Arrow, in lieu of Sen. Brooks Douglass, R-Oklahoma City, who was unavailable.

Joe Lester, of Norman, to the Oklahoma State Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs Control Commission, to serve an unexpired term, ending Dec. 31, 1996, sponsored by Sen. Trish Weedn, D-Purcell.

Red Uphoff, of Norman, to the Oklahoma Indigent Defense System Board, to serve a five year term ending July 1, 2000, also sponsored by Weedn.

SENATE HUMAN RESOURCES COMMITTEE CONFIRMS KEATING NOMINATIONS

■(GIT) The Senate Committee on Human Resources unanimously confirmed 14 of Governor Frank Keating's executive nominations Tuesday.

L. Dwight Holden, of Tulsa, was confirmed to the Board of Mental Health and Licensure.

Sponsored by Sen. Don Rubottom, R-Tulsa, Holden's term expires Dec. 31, 2002.

Phillip E. Davis, of Oklahoma City, was confirmed to the Board of Licensed Social Workers.

Sponsored by Sen. Angela Monson, D-Oklahoma City, he will serve an unexpired term, ending Oct. 1, 1996.

Bill Follis, of Miami, was confirmed to the Oklahoma Indian Affairs Commission.

Follis is chief of the Modok Tribe and a member of the Oklahoma State University Alumni Association.

He was sponsored by Sen. Rick Littlefield, D-Grove, and will serve a three year term, ending Aug. 15, 1997.

Odell Gunter, of Lawton, was confirmed to the Oklahoma Human Rights Commission.

Gunter has been serving on the commis-

SENATE APPROVES TAX BREAK FOR ADOPTIONS

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) The Senate has approved a measure which would give a state income tax deduction of up to \$10,000 to Oklahomans who adopt a child.

"I think it's very important that we do all we can as policy makers to encourage adoptions," said Senator Brad Henry, Senate author of **HB1088**.

"This measure will have little fiscal impact for the state, but it can make a huge difference for couples who'd like to adopt," said Henry, D-Shawnee.

"It may even save the state money if it results in more adoptions of children who receive AFDC."

Because of the long waiting list associated with adoptions through the state, some couples seek out private agencies or private attorneys to help them adopt children. But Senator Henry explained, the cost can be

staggering.

"For those families trying to adopt through private lawyers or agencies, they're often looking at a cost of \$10,000 to \$20,000. I'm sure it makes some families decide not to adopt. For those who decide to go ahead, it's definitely a major financial hardship," said Henry.

"This measure allows families to deduct most of the expenses associated with adoption, including adoption fees, medical expenses, court costs, attorney fees and other expenses directly related to the adoption process up to a maximum of \$10,000," said Henry.

The measure would apply beginning in tax year 1996. It applies to all adoptions, whether through private or public agencies.

The House has also approved the bill, which must now be signed by Governor Frank Keating before it can become law.

■(GIT) Efforts to move bills from the House to the Senate and ultimately to the governor's desk picked up steam in the House on Tuesday with members considering a wide range of issues, including:

HB1088, by Rep. Russ Roach, D-Tulsa, providing for the deduction from state adjusted gross income any medical expenses incurred in the process of adoption of a minor, received a 97-0 passing vote following the adoption without debate of its conference committee report.

House members also gave a 62-34 passing vote without debate to **HB2101**, by Rep.

Jack Begley, D-Goodwell, allowing officers or employees of a municipality with a population of more than 2,500 to conduct business with said municipality; allowing members of any board of education of a municipality with a population of over 2,500 to furnish materials or supplies to said municipality; and allowing members of any board of education within a municipality with a population of more than 2,500 to vote on contracts between area vocational-technical schools and the entity by which the member is employed. The vote followed the adoption of the bill's second conference committee report.

HB2294, by Rep. Larry Adair, D-

Stilwell, authorizing Wildlife Conservation to sell advertising in any publication, media production or other informational material it produces, received a passing vote of 99-0 following the adoption of its second conference committee report.

HB2362, by Rep. Fred Morgan, R-Oklahoma City, received a passing vote of 93-7 following the adoption of its second conference committee report. The bill provides exemptions from notice and challenge procedures, provides for customer non-notification and sets standards for the calculation of reasonable fees by banks.

House members adopted the second conference committee report for and gave a 99-0 passing vote to **HB2501**, by Rep. Calvin Anthony, D-Stillwater, modifying the powers and duties of the Department of Human Services, the Oklahoma Health Care Authority and the Oklahoma Medicaid Program Integrity Act.

Receiving a 99-1 passing vote following the adoption of its second conference committee report was **HB2692**, by Rep. Loyd Benson, D-Frederick. The bill places the Juvenile Justice Advisory and Oversight Committee under the supervision of the Office of Juvenile Affairs; states that the amount of a juvenile's earnings designated for restitution to victims shall be placed in the Juvenile Restitution Revolving Fund; states that acquisitions or purchases of clothing for juveniles or acquisitions of food for group homes under the custody of the Office of Juvenile Affairs shall be exempt from the Oklahoma Central Purchasing Act; and expands provisional scope to include purchases from such funds received by offices administered by the Office of Juvenile Affairs.

HB2755, by Rep. Carolyn Coleman, R-Moore, requiring the Department of Juvenile Justice to provide a uniform system of assessment of the reading ability of each juvenile upon initial placement in an institution or facility, received a passing vote of 97-2 following the adoption of its conference committee report.

Much of the debate, led by Rep. Ron Kirby, D-Lawton, focused on whether the program was needed, rather than on a provision that allows phonics based programs to be used. The latter provision sparked considerable debate earlier in the session.

HB2806, by Rep. Debbie Blackburn, D-Oklahoma City, received a passing vote of

Ruth Ann Harp, of Tulsa, was also confirmed to the Oklahoma Human Rights Commission.

Also sponsored by Rubottom, she will serve a three year term, ending July 15, 1997.

Dr. John Huser, of Weatherford, was also confirmed to the Physicians Manpower Training Commission.

Sponsored by Sen. Robert M. Kerr, D-Altus, Huser will serve an unexpired term, ending June 5, 2000.

Ammon P. Jenkins was confirmed to the State Board of Licensed Social Workers.

Sponsored by Sen. Angela Monson, Jenkins will serve a three year term, ending June 1, 1999.

LaVersa Holder Lowerance, of Blackwell, was confirmed to the Oklahoma State Board of Examiners for Nursing Home Administrators.

She has been appointed to the board's education committee. She also served a previous term on the board under former Governor Henry Bellmon.

Sponsored by Sen. Paul Muegge, D-Tonkawa, she will serve a three year term, ending July 1, 1998.

Elmer Manatowa, of Sulphur, was confirmed to the Oklahoma Indian Affairs Commission.

Manatowa has been attending the commission's meetings since December and spoke briefly about free trade zones and the environment.

Sponsored by Sen. Darryl Roberts, D-Ardmore, Manatowa will serve a three year term, ending Aug. 15, 1998.

Netty Rogers, of Oklahoma City, was confirmed to the Oklahoma Human Rights Commission.

Sponsored by Sen. Howard Hendrick, R-Bethany, Rogers will serve a three year term, ending July 15, 1998.

Tim Tallchief, of Jones, was confirmed to the Oklahoma Indian Affairs Commission.

Sponsored by Sen. Enoch Kelly Haney, D-Seminole, Tallchief will serve a vacant position, ending Aug. 15, 1997.

Dr. Mark Woody, of Oklahoma City, was confirmed to the Board of Examiners for Speech Pathology and Audiology.

Also sponsored by Hendrick, Woody will serve an unexpired term, ending Aug. 17, 1997.

Curtis Zunigha, of Bartlesville, was confirmed to the Oklahoma Indian Affairs Commission.

Chief of the Delaware Tribe, he said he wants to strive for more communication between the tribes and the Legislature and the governor.

Sponsored by Sen. Jerry Pierce, R-Bartlesville, Zunigha will serve a three year term, ending Aug. 15, 1998.

The names of the nominees will now go before the full Senate for confirmation there.

100-0 after the adoption of its conference committee report. The bill allows any consumer reporting agency to contact the Department of Human Services to request information as to whether a specified person is required to pay child support.

House members gave **HB2812** a passing vote of 92-7 following the adoption of its second conference committee report. The bill, by Rep. Randy Beutler, D-Elk City, clarifies language pertaining to the issuance of and qualification for a restricted commercial vehicle driver's license to persons under seventeen years of age for custom harvest purposes.

HCR1109, by Rep. Terry Matlock, D-Garvin, was adopted without debate. The resolution recreates the Oklahoma State Tribal Economic Development Task Force.

HCR1110, by Rep. Robert Weaver, D-Shawnee, requiring the Oklahoma Department of Public Safety, Oklahoma Tax Commission, Oklahoma Tourism and Recreation Department and the Oklahoma Department of Commerce to study issues related to personal watercraft and boat operators, was adopted. A similar measure, Weaver told House members, was vetoed by the governor, who said certain agencies had been omitted. Those agencies, the representative said, were included in the resolution.

HJR1103 and **SCR63** by Rep. Charles Gray, D-Oklahoma City, disapproving certain rules of the Board of Governors of the Registered Dentists of Oklahoma, were also adopted by the House on Tuesday. The Senate Concurrent Resolution was adopted by a voice vote, while the House Joint Resolution passed by a 95-4 vote.

SB679, by Rep. Jack Bonny, D-Burns Flat, received a passing vote of 98-2 following the adoption of its conference committee report. The bill provides a one-time tax credit for investment in qualified electric motor vehicle property placed in service after December 31, 1995.

SB703, by Rep. Benson, modifying the procedure for interpreting statutes and agency rules under the Administrative Procedures Act, received a passing vote of 98-0 following the adoption of its conference committee report.

SB729, by Rep. Dwayne Steidley, modifying language related to licensure of used motor vehicle dealers and manufactured home dealers and modifying insurance requirements, received a passing vote of 85-10 following the adoption of its second con-

HB1088, by Sen. Brad Henry, D-Shawnee, provides for the deduction from Oklahoma's adjusted gross income any medical expenses incurred in the process of adoption of a minor.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure with a vote of 45 to 0.

HB1777, by Sen. Enoch Kelly Haney, D-Seminole, makes appropriations to the offices of the governor and the lieutenant governor.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure with a vote of 45 to 0.

SB788, by Rep. Laura Boyd, D-Norman, received a passing vote of 74-24 following the adoption of its conference committee report. The bill creates the License Perfusionists Acts and the State Board of Examiners of Perfusionists.

SB859 received a passing vote of 97-2 following the adoption of its conference committee report. The bill, by Rep. Clay Pope, D-Loyal, includes weather modification in a list of designated purposes for county sales tax.

SB981, also by Rep. Beutler, received a passing vote of 94-0 after the House adopted the measure's conference committee report. The bill deletes weight limit provisions pertaining to vehicles delivering agricultural commodities weighed as a single draft.

SB983, by Rep. Ron Langmacher, D-Carnegie, sets standards for signs in business areas, authorizes rotating sign faces and setting length and frequency of rotation, received a passing vote of 100-0 after the adoption of its conference committee report.

House members accepted the conference committee report for and gave a 100-0 passing vote to **SB1106**, by Rep. Larry Roberts, D-Miami, modifying sections of law pertaining to the Oklahoma State and Education Employee Group Insurance Board and the Oklahoma State Employees Benefits Council.

SB1175, excluding child support from statutes of limitations, providing for liens against property and preventing child support from becoming dormant for any pur-

HB1787, by Haney, makes appropriations to state revenue administration entities.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure with a vote of 43 to 2.

HB1800, also by Haney, makes appropriations to the Oklahoma Commission on Children and Youth, the Office of Handicapped Concerns, the Human Rights Commission and the Indian Affairs Commission.

After being laid over briefly for additional questioning, members adopted the bill's conference committee report and ultimately passed the measure with a vote of 42 to 1.

HB2294, by Sen. Frank Shurden, D-Henryetta, authorizes the Wildlife Conservation Commission to sell advertising in any

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure and its emergency with a vote of 44 to 0.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure and its emergency clause with a vote of 47 to 0.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure with a vote of 42 to 0.

HB2501, by Sen. Bernest Cain, D-Oklahoma City, modifies powers and duties of the Department of Human Services, the Oklahoma Health Care Authority and the Oklahoma Medicaid Program Integrity Act.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure with a vote of 44 to 0.

HB2553, by Sen. Ben Robinson, D-Muskogee, deletes surplus line insurance brokers from licensing requirements.

Already on Fourth Reading, members passed the measure and its emergency clause with a vote of 42 to 0.

HB2692, by Sen. Ted Fisher, D-Sapulpa, places the Juvenile Justice Advisory and Oversight Committee under the supervision of the Office of Juvenile Affairs.

The bill was laid over for further questioning.

HCR1059, by Sen. Sam Helton, D-Lawton, authorizes the Board of Regents for the University of Oklahoma acting on behalf of Cameron University to issue revenue bonds.

Helton made a motion to withdraw the

measure from committee and move it directly to the floor. The motion adopted, the measure was laid over for further questioning.

SB806, by Haney, appropriates funds to the Oklahoma House of Representatives, the Legislative Service Bureau and the Oklahoma State Senate.

After adopting the measure's conference committee report, members passed the bill and its emergency clause with a vote of 44 to 0.

SB808, also by Haney, appropriates funds to the Oklahoma Department of Libraries and the Secretary of State.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure with a vote of 42 to 0.

SB1152, by Sen. Kevin Easley, D-Broken Arrow, creates the Substance Abuse Prevention Program and provides guidelines for children in need of supervision or those who are delinquent.

Under the measure, adjudicated minors who are found to have substance abuse problems could be made to witness the ramifications of such abuse.

The measure provides for such minors to tour a medium or maximum security prison, witness a corpse, or spend time in an emergency ward of a hospital to witness the effects of substance abuse.

"This has clearly worked in other states," Easley said, citing California as an example.

The program would be implemented with the consent of the defendant in the case at a cost of \$50 to \$80.

Sen. Carol Martin, R-Comanche, disagreed with Easley, saying statistics clearly

prove such programs are ineffective.

"If we pass this, you are going to pat yourselves on the back, when judges can already do this," she said.

While Sen. Bernest Cain, D-Oklahoma City, agreed with Martin, he said the decision to participate in such a program should be made by those involved.

"There is no data that shows this program is more effective than any other," he said, "but that is between them, the parents and the judge. I don't have any objection to them trying to do it this way."

The measure also provides for visitations with persons who have contracted the AIDS virus or with a person who has a child with a drug or alcohol condition.

The measure also requires a 1,000 word essay relating to the experiences and states that the county, court or facility involved in the program cannot be held liable for any resulting civil damages.

"This is nothing more than a politically correct statute," said Sen. Jerry Pierce, R-Tulsa, referring to the language relating to AIDS. "This bill is so bad that they place a limit of liability on those who participate in it."

Sen. Lewis Long, D-Glenpool, related a story from his childhood, stating that he once witnessed an automobile accident caused by the driver being intoxicated. Both the driver and the passenger were dead as a result.

"I assure you," he stressed, "as a teenager, that made an impression on me."

"We are talking about kids that are already in the system," Easley said in closing.

After adopting its House Amendments, members adopted the measure.

MOISTURE BRINGS END TO BURNING BAN FOR MOST COUNTIES

■(GIT) Governor Frank Keating issued a proclamation Monday revoking the recent burning ban for all counties in Oklahoma except Beaver, Beckham, Cimarron, Harmon, Jackson, Kiowa, Texas and Washita. The proclamation was supported by information from the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture. The Department concluded that pasture conditions are improving, but above average temperatures and high winds continue to dry residual moisture.

Considering the weather, southwestern Oklahoma wheat farmers will begin harvest early this week. "Thirty-six percent of the wheat has reached the soft dough stage compared with 32 percent last year and 39 percent for the five year average," the Department reported.

Amid row crops, producers have started preparing seedbeds and planting sorghum, soybeans, peanuts, and cotton. However, corn planters have now completed their planting, ahead of schedule. In addition, alfalfa hay's first cutting progressed to 49 percent. "Hay is rated as mostly fair to good," the Department noted.

Changing to something sweeter, water-

melons and strawberries were rated by the Department to be in fair condition. Watermelon planting remained active with 82 percent planted.

Cattle marketings continue below average, but they have shown an increase in movement. Livestock conditions are rated fair, and insect activities are light to moderate across the state. "Feeder cattle prices were \$1.00 to \$2.00 cwt. higher," the Department recorded.

Keating, in the past several months has expressed his concern for "drought ridden" weather conditions on Oklahoma's agricultural industry. Earlier this month, U.S. Secretary of Agriculture, Dan Glickman announced a disaster declaration for Oklahoma. The move will provide the means for low interest loans to save and replant Oklahoma farmers' crops.

Keating's proclamation will be distributed at the Department of Public Safety, the Oklahoma Department of Tourism and Recreation, the State Fire Marshal, the South Central Interstate Forest Fire Protection Compact, the Secretary of the Environment and to the sheriffs of Oklahoma's 58 counties, where the burning ban has been raised.

OFB DIRECTOR SAYS FEDERAL RULES NEEDLESSLY INCREASE COSTS, VICTIMIZE FARMERS

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Oklahoma Farm Bureau director Charles Sloan testified before a U.S. House of Representatives subcommittee field hearing investigating the hidden costs of government regulations.

The Subcommittee on National Economic Growth, Natural Resources and Regulatory Affairs held a hearing May 20 at Rogers State University in Claremore.

"I feel as though I am being robbed and can do nothing to stop it!" declared Sloan.

The Farm Bureau director addressed the high costs to farmers resulting from the ban on production of Freon in the United States and Canada.

"There is very little scientific evidence that proves the product (Freon) damages the ozone," the OFB district six director told the hearing. "The scientists disagree. Who knows?"

Sloan told the committee that before Freon production was banned that he and most other farmers could re-charge air con-

ditioning systems on tractors and equipment themselves.

"Before the regulations, I kept Freon on hand that I paid 98 cents a pound for. I keep a set of gauges in my truck to safely install Freon in my equipment. If the job was bigger than me or my son could handle, there were a couple of fix-it-all men in town who could be in my field in 30 minutes or so to fix the problem."

Sloan said that scenario is not applicable today because of the government ban on Freon due to questionable studies linking it to ozone damage.

"Who cares if on a hot, dusty day in June combining wheat that my air conditioner quits cooling. A quick inspection reveals I am low on refrigerant, R-12 Freon, in my system.

"The system holds four pounds. I am probably less than one pound low, but it stops me from cutting wheat, stops my trucks, stops my sprayer and, most importantly, stops my

LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICIALS HONORED IN STATE SENATE

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) The late Joseph Lewis "Jody" Latimer and all other law enforcement officials who have given their lives to protect Oklahoma's citizens were honored in a resolution passed by the state Senate on Monday.

"In our busy day to day lives it is easy to forget the law enforcement officials who work so hard to keep us safe. These men and women go to work every day and put their lives on the line to ensure that ours are a little safer," said Senator Sam Helton, author of **Senate Concurrent Resolution 65**.

Latimer served as deputy sheriff in Cotton County until he was killed in an auto accident as he rushed to the scene of a drive-by-shooting to assist another officer.

"I knew Jody. He was an outstanding young man and a fine deputy. Nothing gave him more pleasure than being able to help others. All of those who knew him miss him deeply," said Helton, D-Lawton. "Men and women like Jody are special people. By wearing a badge they put themselves in harm's way and show that they are willing to make the ultimate sacrifice for the citizens they serve."

Representatives Loyd Benson and Bill Smith, the resolution's House authors, said they were proud to sponsor a resolution honoring Oklahoma's lawmen and women.

Latimer's family has been recognized at the National Police Officers' Memorial in Washington DC where Deputy Latimer's

Sloan pointed out that government action put most fix-it men out of business due to the high cost of equipment. The required equipment includes expensive machinery to re-clean and clean old Freon taken out of units to be repaired.

"Recycle, that's the American way," said Sloan. "But now, they have to put new refrigerant in the system because warranties on new replacement parts will be voided if recycled Freon is put back in the system."

The farmer told the committee the fix-it shops now have to store old Freon in steel containers due to government regulations. Different types must be kept separate. When a container is full, the fix-it shop must return it to the place of purchase and that dealer gives him an empty container. The Freon then is shipped to be incinerated.

"A lot of cost is involved," Sloan said, who lives in Vian and farms about 1,1000

acres, producing primarily black-eyed peas and green beans.

He said the cost of the new coolant is \$13 to \$20 a pound compared to the 98-cents-a-pound cost for Freon.

"The mechanic will charge me \$40 to put his gauges on my machine, and my machine is in the field, impossible to road to town. If the mechanic will come to my field, he has to shut his shop down and irritate his regular customers."

Sloan said the scenario worsens if he calls his equipment dealer to come to his field to repair the machine.

"He charges me \$1.25 per mile, both directions, 100 miles, \$250. Plus \$40 an hour from the time he leaves his shop 'til he gets back. Minimum three hours, \$120 plus mileage \$250, equals \$370 plus parts."

"I may have been able to fix the problem myself for less than \$1 before regulations," Sloan said. "But now it is illegal for me to purchase Freon."

He suggested that Freon should have been phased out gradually, since most pre-1993 vehicles and farm equipment use old Freon.

"Those vehicles will not be around forever. Most of what is left would be farm and construction equipment."

Sloan said he has seven pre-1993 vehicles that use Freon. The cost to convert is about \$1,000 per vehicle.

"This is what we in agriculture mean when we say compare the cost to the benefit. This is a great problem for us in agriculture because some of these tractors and combines will be around for a long time."

"All my representatives that have been made aware of the problem agree that the government acted in haste, but nothing gets done."

RYAN LUKE BILL WON'T SOLVE ALL THE PROBLEMS

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) The Oklahoma Public Employees Association (OPEA) is confident that the Ryan Luke bill will improve the state's child welfare system, but according to OPEA Executive Director Gary Jones, **HB2053** won't solve all the problems that currently haunt the system.

Jones is calling on legislative leaders and Governor Frank Keating to create a blue ribbon panel that will be charged with compiling a comprehensive plan to cure what ails Oklahoma's child welfare system.

"While OPEA believes HB2053 will be helpful, the Association is putting Oklahomans on notice that it will not resolve all Oklahoma's child welfare problems," Jones commented this week. "While the bill addresses several important problems that must be resolved, many more issues still require attention and action."

Jones pointed out that the state needs additional child welfare workers and increased emphasis on prevention services. He said child welfare workers across Oklahoma have been "crying out to those who will listen" that the system does not work the way it should. He said they believe that even with the passage of the Ryan Luke bill, the system's inadequacies will still put children in harm's way.

"I'm frustrated and angry when I'm not able to do the things that I need to do, whether it's because I have too many referrals that I have to investigate or because of a judicial system that, in some cases, doesn't put a premium on resolving issues related to children and their families," said Elizabeth Norton, who has been a child welfare worker for eight years. "Whatever it is, I see children placed in situations where I really don't know if we have improved their lives."

"We're doing all we can, but the system needs to be changed," child welfare worker Emetta Jennings added. "The process needs to be streamlined so child welfare cases can be resolved immediately.

We're also concerned that more money and effort need to be spent in prevention. Many families and children become involved with DHS because we do not have prevention services that give them the help they need to resolve family problems."

Jones pointed out that OPEA has sent letters to the Governor, Speaker of the House Glen Johnson and President Pro Tem of the Senate Stratton Taylor, asking state leaders to take appropriate action.

"The Oklahoma Public Employees Association has been involved in a series of efforts over the past eight years concerning child welfare problems," Jones said. "Many have resulted in changes and modifications, but they have all been Band-Aids and not the major surgery we believe is necessary if the system is going to be fixed. No solution will resolve all the problems, but OPEA believes that based on what is happening in other states, the Oklahoma system could be improved to better meet the needs of Oklahoma's endangered children."

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) The Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation held a one-day outdoor skills workshop for women May 11 at the Department's northeast regional office in Porter.

Although windy, wet weather made some outdoor activities more difficult, participants seemed to thoroughly enjoy the day's events. More than 40 participants attended the one-day workshop, taking classes such as archery, game calling, basic shotgun shooting, map and compass, beginning fishing and survival.

It was created as a method of teaching fishing, hunting, shooting and other outdoor activities in a non-threatening atmosphere. The next three-day Becoming an Outdoors Women workshop in Oklahoma is scheduled for Oct. 11-13, 1996.

Two researchers from the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point, where the BOW program began, recently completed a study that addressed whether or not BOW workshop participants increased the use of the outdoor skills they learned. The study also intended to determine if participants' attitudes towards outdoor recreation became more positive or negative since attending a workshop.

More than 750 survey forms were sent to BOW participants and the results showed significant differences between workshop participants and a control group. Workshop participants showed an average increase of almost 20 percent in their participation in outdoor recreation activities. The researchers concluded that the increase in some of these activities was almost certainly attributable to the workshops.

It is in the best interest of the citizens and taxpayers of this state to keep in place all procedures which assure an equitable and ethical bidding process.
