WHAT A DIFFERENCE AN HOUR MAKES: HOUSE CONSIDERS 11 PIECES OF LEGISLATION IN FINAL HOUR

■(GIT) Members of the House of Representatives did anything but drag their feet Friday in the waning minutes of the second session of the 45th Legislature.

In the session's final 60 minutes, House members disposed of 11 pieces of legislation, including the education reform bill, truth in sentencing-community corrections, creation of the state infrastructure bank and an education bill that includes a school-to-work provision.

The lawmakers' final hour followed a sometimes contentious debate over House Democrats' efforts to override the governor's line-item veto of funding for the attorney general's office and Oklahoma Indigent Defense System included in **SB802**.

Republicans, too, found their efforts to address issues raised by the governor's vetoes scuttled in just under 15 minutes.

As the House's final hour got under way, members were asked to consider **HB2821**, a minor appropriations bill for expenses of various executive, legislative and judicial agencies. Continuing an effort begun on Thursday, Republicans attempted to have the bill sent back to conference committee with instructions that would have funded the em-

ployee pay raises vetoed by the governor.

Governor Frank Keating, as well as GOP members of both legislative houses, maintained throughout the week that they supported funding for the \$1,200 annual state employee pay raise despite the governor's line-item vetoes in several bills that included that funding.

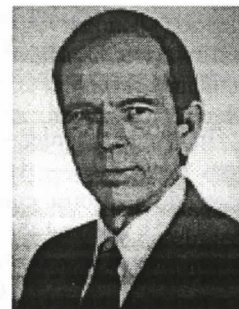
Rep. Chris Hastings, R-Tulsa, asked the bill's author, Rep. Jim Hamilton, D-Poteau, whether he was aware the pay raise instructions were on the clerk's desk for consideration. Hamilton told Hastings he was not aware of that, but then pressed the bill's con-

sideration.

Using a parliamentary maneuver, Hamilton successfully deterred Hastings' effort to have the bill discussed and the Republicans' effort to have the bill sent back to committee.

Faced with no other alternative, Republicans joined House Democrats and gave the bill a

SENATE OVERRIDES VETOES, HOUSE SUSTAINS

■(GIT) Senate lawmakers overrode seven of Governor Frank Keating's vetoes Friday, but the House did not follow suit. The bills appropriating, among other things, the mandated employee pay-raises passed earlier this year, were struck down by the governor recently. The actions are expected to force many state agencies to take cuts in operating expenses and furlough employees to come up with money to fund the required salary increases.

With the exception of one, the overrides became moot issues when the House of Representatives failed to take them up, leaving the governor's actions intact.

The one veto taken up by both House and Senate was the line-item veto of **SB802**, appropriating funds to the Office of the Attorney General and the Oklahoma Indigent Defense System. Though passed in the Senate, House members defeated the initiative.

One override attempt failed in the Senate, **SB800**, appropriating funds to various educational entities. The governor vetoed two sections pertaining to the Oklahoma Commission for Teacher Preparation and the State Board of Vocational Technical Education.

The Teacher Preparation Commission lost \$1.5 million in operating expenses.

"The governor authorized \$1.8 million," said Sen. Darryl Roberts, D-Ardmore, "and the Legislature approved \$1.5 million. It is a little hard to understand why he would veto this."

The State Vo-Tech board received a cut of \$1.4 million in operating expenses.

SB805 would have deposited funds from the State Judicial Retirement Fund into the Supreme Court Revolving Fund until such time as the contribution required to pay the

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98-0 passing.

The situation was repeated during the House's consideration of its next bill, **SB849**, which appropriates reserve funds to agencies receiving federal funds and calls for reimbursement of reserve funds when federal funds are received. Despite efforts by Rep. Jim Reese, R-Narden, to slow the bill's consideration and have it returned to committee with the pay raise instructions, the bill was considered after very few questions and no debate. The bill received a passing vote 73-25.

In very short order — with neither questions nor debate — House members then adopted two House concurrent resolutions, **HCR1123**, creating the Task Force on Prevention of Genetic Discrimination; and **HCR1124**, directing the Oklahoma Tax Commission to draft minimum standards for fair and equitable guidelines for assisting county assessors and county excise boards in determining a fair cash value of privately owned broiler houses, poultry barns and swine operations for ad valorem tax purposes.

With just over three-quarters of an hour remaining, the House turned its attention to **SB1100**, the once controversial education reform bill. Removed from the bill were its most eye-raising provisions, such as charter schools, textbook selection changes and most of the repealers. What was left, Rep. Calvin Anthony, D-Stillwater, told his fellow House members was a bill that gave local school boards greater control in running their districts.

As it became obvious that some points of contention remained and that adoption of

the bill's conference committee report would be a matter of possibly significant debate, an unsuccessful effort to limit debate to three minutes per side failed. That led Hamilton to move previous question — a vote on whether the House would vote on the previous question, the conference committee report, with no further questions or debate.

The maneuver worked and the bill's conference committee report was adopted by a 56-34 vote, with Republicans casting the negative votes.

Realizing their desire to mount an opposition to the bill was on the verge of being crushed, Republicans asked for unanimous consent to limit debate on the bill to three minutes per side. While permitting very little time for debate on the bill, the move did allow an opportunity for the bill's opponents to express their opposition if only briefly.

Three Republicans rose to speak against the bill, leaving each with one minute of debate. Rep. Reese argued that the early childhood provision of the bill would divert some \$48 million from common education, rather than a lower amount claimed by the bill's proponents. That, Reese said, was because estimates on the number of eligible children for the program were simply too low.

Reese also accused the Senate of forcing the measure "down our throats in the final

minutes of the session."

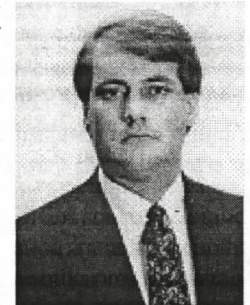
Rep. Mike O'Neal, R-Edmond, also expressed frustration with the way in which the bill was being handled and criticized the measure for falling short of his purported goal — education reform.

"There's not one reform in this bill," O'Neal charged. "All this bill does is let the government take responsibility away from kids' parents."

Rep. Richard Phillips, R-Warr Acres, used his one minute to not only condemn the bill up for consideration, but to chastise Democratic leaders in both houses for allowing so little time to the bill, as well as funding of the state employee pay raise.

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total normal cost for the year has been fully funded as determined by the system's actuary. The funds deposited into the Supreme Court Revolving Fund were to be used for the purposes of Supreme Court computer automation and security enhancements.

Keating declared the transfer to be unconstitutional, citing a section of the State Constitution that prohibits public retirement funds from being diverted for any other purpose other than providing benefits.

The governor also cut \$8.1 million from the State Department of Agriculture, contained in **SB814**, claiming the cuts were necessary to "avoid fiscally irresponsible levels of spending."

The funds were targeted to sustain such programs as the state employee pay-raise, the Rural Development Council and the Rural Fire Operations, which was to take \$1.6 million out of the state's Rainy Day Fund.

The governor's action on the bill also removed \$303,170 from the Horse Racing Commission.

By vetoing all of **SB816**, the governor cut \$29.4 million intended for the Oklahoma

Educational Television Authority (OETA), the Oklahoma Tourism and Recreation Department and the State Arts Council.

Section one of **SB818** was also vetoed, taking \$229,610 out of the operating budget of the Oklahoma Alcoholic Beverage Laws Enforcement (ABLE) Commission.

The funds were intended to provide additional secretarial support and to pay for data processing charges from the Office of State Finance.

"They have agents doing secretarial work over there," said Sen. Paul Muegge, D-Tonkawa.

By vetoing sections 9 of **SB810**, the governor removed \$75,000 from the State Department of Health's budget intended to implement a statewide trauma response system.

"Oklahoma does not have a comprehensive statewide trauma system," said Sen. Larry Dickerson, D-Poteau, a key figure in the measures creation. "That means that precious time is often lost for patients who've been injured in serious accidents. We are talking about life and death situations."

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kind of deal," Anthony said in response to the charges. "Members of the conference committee have sweated blood to make this thing work.

"This bill does contain reform — It gives local school districts the power they need to do the things they need to do."

Some 20 minutes after consideration of the bill had begun, the measure received a 72-23 passing vote.

That meant 27 minutes remained before the close of the legislative session — Enough time to deal with four more bills.

House members then considered **SB989**, a previously controversial measure creating a State Infrastructure Bank for the purpose of pooling available federal, state, and private moneys to be dedicated for transportation infrastructure improvements. The so-called bank will be part of a federal pilot program in which Oklahoma was one of 10 states chosen to participate. The bill received a 99-0 passing vote.

With less than 20 minutes remaining in the session, **SB1200** took center stage. Once written to implement a statewide community corrections program, the bill was rewritten Friday afternoon to include community corrections and a truth in sentencing proposal. The 93-page bill had already won Senate approval, but its fate would be different in

the House.

As opposition to the proposal appeared to be mounting during Duncan Democrat Rep. Jari Askins' brief explanation of the bill, a previous question motion was made upon her completion of the explanation. The motion passed and House members then summarily dismissed the bill's fourth conference committee report, giving it a 25-71 failing vote.

Action on the bill, which had taken an estimated three hours to rewrite in the early afternoon, took less than three minutes.

House members then turned their attention to **HB2823**, which implements the mid-term funding solution for the 1995-96 school year, and quickly adopted the bill by a vote of 91-4.

The final measure brought before the House might have been one of its more hotly debated had the circumstances surrounding its consideration been different. But with fewer than 15 minutes remaining before *sine die*, **SB801** which included a voluntary school-to-work proposal drew little more than a sideways glance from those on the floor.

Reese noted that the General Conference Committee on Appropriations sign out sheet for the bill, which primarily implements funding already approved for common education and had not been considered during a

meeting of the conference committee, lacked signatures from any of the committee's Republican members. That was because, GCCA chairman Hamilton said, the bill had been signed out on the floor.

As members quickly read through the provisions of the bill, Reese asked for an explanation of the bill's sixth section, the school-to-work provision. Rep. Jack Begley, D-Goodwell, revealed to boos from some members that the provision was in fact a school-to-work provision, requiring parental consent for a student's participation.

Democrats used the previous question maneuver to avoid debate of acceptance of the conference committee report and final passage of the bill. Acceptance of the conference committee report passed on a 64-30 vote, while final passage of the bill was won on a 64-31 vote.

An attempt to win passage of the bill's emergency clause failed, 65-32.

Three minutes remained in the session.

Once order was restored in the House chamber, which had grown through the afternoon to resemble the raucous British House of Commons, and House Majority Leader Rep. Loyd Benson, D-Frederick, had made a few final and brief remarks, the majority leader moved to adjourn "*sine-eeeeee die-eeeeee*."

The official time was 4:59.

Dickerson said that more than 2,000 Oklahomans die each year from serious injuries. He said that number could be reduced if the statewide trauma system was in place.

"Just from looking at other states that do have comprehensive trauma systems, we know we could reduce Oklahoma's trauma facilities by some 20 percent," he said. "When you look at the medical cost and productivity, we could save an estimated \$133 million.

"In light of all these facts, I don't see how the governor can justify this \$75,000 veto. It just doesn't make sense, especially when the money is there to do this."

By vetoing section 32 of **SB810**, just over \$1.4 million was cut from the University Hospitals Authority, part of which was to fund the state's Poison Control Center.

The Poison Control Center's budget was also vetoed last year by the governor. The University Hospitals Authority had to divert funds to carry the center another year.

The vetoed funds this year were to go toward hiring additional staff, which are des-

perately needed, one lawmaker said.

"In 1995, more than 19,000 phone calls went unanswered," said Sen. Ben Robinson, D-Muskogee. "When the calls can be answered promptly, we can save lives and save money in terms of emergency room costs for individuals and tax dollars, because often the person who's been exposed to a toxic substance doesn't have insurance."

Robinson added that the 4 out of every 10 calls to the center are related to cases involving children under the age of five.

All told, the Senate saw vetoes totaling \$37.1 million.

In the House, Democrats tried unsuccessfully to override gubernatorial line-item vetoes on three bills, in addition to the effort on **SB802**.

Democrats argued that the governor was keeping important funds from key state agencies, as well as reneging on his promise to fund the employee pay raise. Republicans countered that the governor was looking at what one lawmaker called "the big budget picture" and that he did not like what he was seeing.

The attempt to override the governor's line item veto of section four of **HB1783** saw two Republicans defect from the ranks. Although the bid fell short of the two-thirds vote needed to override the veto, 66-32, Reps. Todd Heitt, R-Kellyville, and Tony Kouba, R-Yukon, broke ranks and voted with 64 Democrats in favor of overriding the veto.

The section would have provided additional funding to the State Fire Marshal's office, including approximately \$36,000 for the state employee pay raise and OPERS increase.

Also sustained by a 64-35 vote of the House was the governor's veto of sections 17 and 20 in **HB1795**. Section 17 would have provided \$176,688 for the Department of Mines, while section 20 allocated \$450,000 for the MESONET weather system.

Keating's line items vetoes of three sections of **SB814**, appropriations totaling \$380,000 to the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, were also sustained by the House 66-31, with two Republicans joining the effort.

ATTORNEY GENERAL LOSES FUNDING BATTLE

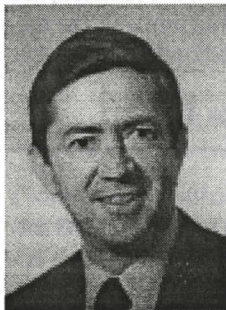
■(GIT) Attorney General Drew Edmondson lost an eleventh hour battle Friday to restore \$975,287 vetoed by Governor Frank Keating this week. Reportedly, the loss will represent a 20 percent reduction in staff.

The funds, contained in **SB802**, were designated to annualize the agency's FY '96 supplemental funding, provide additional funds for increased operating expenses and \$159,491 for the mandated state employee pay-raise.

Richard Wintory, with the Office of the Attorney General, said the earlier \$250,000 supplemental appropriation did not fund basic needs such as desks and other office equipment for some employees, making the additional \$350,000 in operating expense funding necessary.

"We have people working in the conference room, sharing one phone because we don't have desks for them."

In a last-minute letter to lawmakers Friday, Edmondson said he would embargo the difference of \$100,000 between the

governor's budget and what the Legislature approved, returning it to the State Treasury, in exchange for overriding the governor's veto.

"With the commitment contained above there would remain no fiscal reason to sustain the governor's veto," the letter states. "On the contrary, fiscal responsibility would dictate passage since the failure to properly fund this office would prolong appeals in death penalty cases, reduce our ability to defend the state against tort actions, necessitate state agencies resorting to private law firms for legal representation and limit our ability to recover moneys otherwise due the State of Oklahoma."

Edmondson added that the greater fiscal impact of the funding deficit would far exceed the amount vetoed by the governor.

The Executive Budget only allotted some \$600,000 for the Office of the Attorney General, 50 percent less than the figure approved by the Legislature.

Falling on deaf ears, lawmakers failed to override the governor's veto. Though the attempt was successful in the Senate, House

members killed the action with a vote of 65 to 32, three votes short of the needed two-thirds majority to reverse the governor's decision.

House Democrats blasted the governor, asking how a so-called law and order governor could veto a key law enforcement appropriation.

"What in the world are we doing," asked Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore, "when we say we want to be responsive to the public's concerns about crime and an appropriation like this gets vetoed?"

House Speaker Glen Johnson, D-Okemah, said that the governor's veto "will deprive the attorney general of the ability to discharge his duties."

Referring to the bill's initial passage in the House, Johnson said, "If every member will vote the same way we did eight days ago, we will override this veto. Nothing in this bill has changed. So, let's do the right thing. Let's override this veto."

Republicans countered that they and the governor supported the efforts of the Attorney General's office. What they objected to, they said, was some of the funding and the manner in which it was presented to the gov-

ernor. Because the pay raise appropriation, annualization of the supplemental appropriation and other funding were grouped into one line item, Republicans argued, the governor had no choice but to veto all of the agency's funding when he objected to a portion of it.

The most heated criticism of the appro-

priation and the veto override attempt came from Rep. Chris Hastings, R-Tulsa, who had met with Edmondson earlier in the day. Referring to the attorney general's offer to embargo \$100,000 if the veto was overridden, Hastings said, "The attorney general is telling this legislature that he doesn't need \$100,000 of the money that's been appropriated. He's admitting it."

Then, turning his attention to House Democrats, Hastings accurately predicted, "You know what's going to happen — You're not going to get this veto overridden."

COMMUNITY CORRECTIONS AND TRUTH IN SENTENCING DIE IN FINAL HOURS

■(GIT) The battle over how Oklahoma will sentence its criminal offenders is over. State lawmakers Friday defeated the measure that would not only have allowed first, second and non-violent offenders to serve their sentences in their own communities but also require those sentenced to prison to serve at least 85 percent of their sentence before being paroled.

SB1200, by Sen. Herb Rozell, D-Tahlequah, in the last hours of the Legislature, became a measure that combined the two initiatives. **HB1138**, containing the Truth in Sentencing Act, was incorporated into the Rozell Community Corrections Act bill.

Ninety-three pages in length, the combined measure was still in its final conference committee at 3:00 p.m. on Friday. By 4:15 p.m. it was on the Senate floor for dis-

cussion, where a hurried Rozell met with some resistance from fellow members.

Though he said he supported the effort, he was concerned about rushing such important legislation through at the last minute.

"I have a problem with us not having the time to read the bill and the potential to pass bad law. I think we we'll be sorry if we do this."

Senate lawmakers passed the measure with a vote of 31 to 11, sending it to the House, where the bill's conference committee report was rejected with a vote of 25 to 71.

It took only 29 minutes for the bill to be defeated by both houses of the Legislature.

STATE REGENTS ALLOCATE LARGEST APPROPRIATION IN HISTORY

From State Regents for Higher Education

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) The largest higher education appropriation in state history was allocated Friday by the Oklahoma Regents for Higher Education.

The \$636.2 million appropriation includes a \$71.4 million or 12.6 percent increase over higher education's fiscal year 1996 appropriation, making fiscal year 1997's appropriation the largest dollar and percentage increase ever received by Oklahoma higher education.

The funds will be used to support academics, student services, financial aid programs and other special programs for almost 229,000 students.

Colleges and universities will now budget the funds and submit their 1996-97 budgets to the State Regents for approval on June 28 for the new fiscal year that gets under way July 1.

"We commend the legislature and governor for recognizing the importance of higher education to Oklahomans and to all of Oklahoma," said Hans Brisch, higher education chancellor. "We will use the funds efficiently to meet rising costs and to offer Oklahomans needed programs and services that for the past several years we could not afford."

Of the \$71.4 million in new state funds, \$65.5 will go to colleges and universities, agencies, higher education programs and State Regents' operations, bringing the total for this group to \$595.4 million. The remaining \$6 million in new funds will support financial aid programs and special programs, bringing the total for these areas to \$40.8 million.

Allocations from the new funds include \$37.7 million for rising costs, such as \$12 million in contributions required by law for the Oklahoma Teachers Retirement System, and employee insurance, property insurance and utilities. Institutions will also use these funds for other institutional priorities, such as salary increases, new staff positions and

library funding.

The Regents also allocated \$4.9 million for utility, insurance and maintenance costs required to operate and maintain facilities opened as a result of the 1992 capital bond issue.

To more equitably fund the budget needs of higher education institutions and constituent agencies, \$6.5 million of the new funds will be directed to institutions and agencies which experience the greatest gap between identified needs and allocated state funding. On average, Oklahoma colleges and universities receive \$58 in state funds for every \$100 in identified needs.

Other allocations by the State Regents include:

- ✓ \$5.6 million for system improvements, such as the Sam Noble Oklahoma Museum of Natural History at the University of Oklahoma, the Food and Agriculture Product Research and Technology Center at Oklahoma State University and the new West Campus of Tulsa Community College;

- ✓ \$2.8 million to support the first year of a multi-year funding plan to strengthen teacher education by implementing 23 recommendations for improvement made by a review team of national education experts and state leaders;

- ✓ \$1.2 million to the Section 13 Offset Program, which funds capital improvements at two-year colleges and Rogers University; and

- ✓ Fees to enable institutions to access OneNet, the state's education and government telecommunications network; OneNet user fees, which cover operating costs, are \$28,800 per site for each college or university;

In addition, a total of \$3.85 million of the new funds will go toward ongoing financial aid programs, including:

- ✓ The Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Program, which provides scholarships to high school students with financial need who take the courses and make the grades for college;

- ✓ The Oklahoma Tuition Aid Grant Program, which awards need-based grants that cover part of the cost of attending college; and

- ✓ The Regional University Baccalaureate Scholarships, which fund the educations of academically outstanding students at Oklahoma's 10 regional universities.

Also, \$2 million was allocated to the State Regents' Research Matching Grant

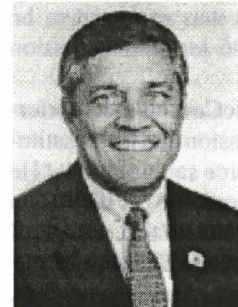
Program, which matches competitive research grants awarded to Oklahoma colleges and universities.

"Higher education has entered a new era in Oklahoma history," Brisch said. "The resources that higher education received this year will allow us to achieve a new level of quality and service for Oklahoma and its citizens."

"This is a promising first step in our five-year plan to achieve funding that is equal to the average funding at similar colleges and universities in other states. We are moving forward."

vote to override the veto, Sen. Darryl Roberts, D-Ardmore, blasted the governor's decision, calling it hypocritical.

"This is the height of hypocrisy," he said of the governor's vetoes in general. "In the governor's budget, was there an airplane or a \$23,000 increase in his operating budget?"

Roberts referred to the increase in the governor's budget increase for mansion expenses and the state jet with an estimated price tag of \$2.5 million.

"The worst vote I've made in years was to let the governor bust his budget to purchase an airplane," Roberts said.

Also vetoed by the governor was a section of SB802 allotting \$919,155 to the Oklahoma Indigent Defense System's (OIDS) operating budget.

Wintory said the veto has serious ramifications on the recently passed habeas corpus reform which limits the number of death row appeals prisoners can make.

Due to the funding shortfall, a shortage of attorneys to defend death row inmates will result in not being able to utilize the new reforms.

"Without OIDS," Wintory said, "we cannot follow the time lines set forth by the habeas corpus reform."

According to the message issued with the rejected legislation, the two sections of the bill were vetoed to prevent "fiscally irresponsible levels of overall spending."

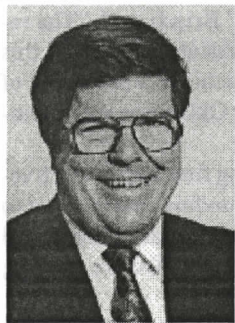

MCCORKELL TO ANNOUNCE FUTURE PLANS

■(GIT) Rep. Don McCorkell is expected on Tuesday to announce his plan to seek the US Senate seat currently held by Jim Inhofe.

Capitol Network News was the first to report in April that McCorkell was considering the race. At that time, a source close to McCorkell told Capitol Network News, the 48-

year-old attorney was "meeting with advisors" about entering the race, and any announcement concerning the Tulsa representative's plans was expected to be delayed until the 1996 legislative session concluded.

"Representative McCorkell's first priority is this legislative session and his constituents at home," the source said in April. "He was elected by the people of his district to do a job and he plans to fulfill that contract."

Since that time, McCorkell has filed papers with the Federal Election Commission, setting in place the framework for a campaign and fundraising effort. On Friday, the last day of the legislative session, a nearly-tearful McCorkell bid farewell to his fellow House members, reflecting on a myriad of events since he took office in 1978.

Ironically, Inhofe announced Friday that he will seek a second term in Congress. Inhofe must face Republican challenger Dan Lowe, of Tulsa, in the Republican primary. Lowe announced his plan to seek the seat last month.

Even before his Friday announcement, Inhofe was considered the odds-on favorite to win the Republican nomination for the office.

Inhofe won the seat in 1994, following a bitter campaign against former Fourth Dis-

trict Representative David McCurdy. Before winning a place in the Senate, Inhofe was a representative for the First Congressional District.

If he enters the race as expected, McCorkell will join Jeffrey Tollett and Jim Boren on the campaign trail to become the Democratic candidate for the Senate seat.

Tollet, a minister from Oklahoma City, unsuccessfully challenged US Representative Frank Lucas for the Sixth District Congressional seat in 1994. Jim Boren is the cousin of University of Oklahoma President David Boren, who held the seat until he resigned before the end of his term to become president of the university. Jim Boren is a professor at Northeastern Oklahoma State University in Tahlequah.

VETO SEVERE BLOW TO CATTLE INDUSTRY

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) By vetoing \$370,000 in SB814, intended for the Oklahoma's Center for International Trade, Governor Frank Keating may cost state cattle ranchers more than \$75 million, the chairman of the state Senate's Agriculture Committee said on Friday.

Senator Paul Muegge, D-Tonkawa, said the veto derailed a trade agreement that would have allowed the sale of 1.5 million head of breeding stock to Mexico's Confederacion Nacional Ganadera, their equivalent to the National Cattlemen's Beef Association.

"I guess the governor doesn't get out of the city enough to know that times are tough for Oklahoma cattlemen. He obviously didn't understand the implications of this veto," said Muegge.

Muegge said Oklahoma's Center for International Trade was chosen to run the project because of its association with Oklahoma State University and the center's access to satellite communications.

"Cattlemen, state trade officials and legislators have all worked very hard to develop the infrastructure to support this kind of foreign trade," he said. "After hearing his promises of concentrating on international development, it's disappointing that the governor chose not to support our efforts to expand the markets for agricultural exports and to bring new money into Oklahoma's economy."

TRIAL LAWYERS APPLAUD END TO ACCIDENT VICTIM SOLICITATION

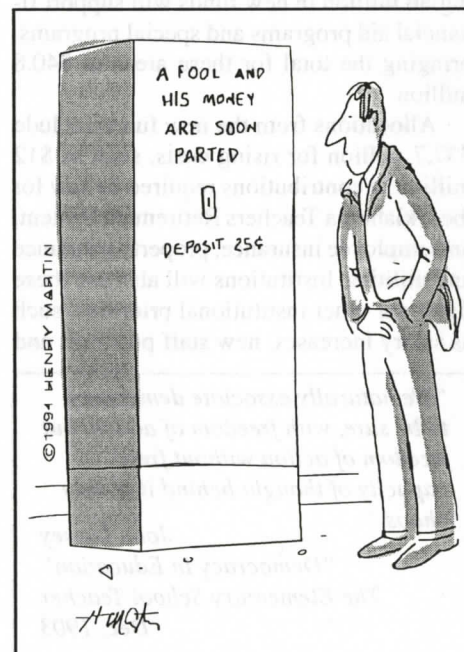

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) The Oklahoma Trial Lawyers Association Friday applauded the signing of SB1147 into law. The bill which takes effect Nov. 1, 1996, puts a stop to direct mail solicitation of accident victims in Oklahoma.

"Accident victims are receiving 15 or 16 pieces of solicitation from lawyers, chiropractors and others immediately following an accident," stated Ted Sherwood, president of the Oklahoma Trial Lawyers Association. "By passing SB1147, which prohibits the use of accident reports for solicitation, we are taking a step toward protecting the privacy of accident victims and their families at a time when they are least prepared to deal with such intrusive behavior."

SB1147, which was sponsored by Sen. Bernice Shedrick, D-Stillwater, and Rep. Loyd Benson, D-Frederick, makes it a misdemeanor to obtain or use information from an accident report for the purpose of commercial solicitation. The bill passed both houses of the Legislature and was signed by the governor on May 23rd.

"After Nov. 1, and hopefully before, individuals suffering great trauma following an accident will no longer find their mailboxes stuffed with unwanted pieces of solicitation at a time when they are least prepared to deal with such things," Sherwood concluded.

PRESERVATION OKLAHOMA LISTS 13 MOST ENDANGERED PROPERTIES

From Okla. Historical Society

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Six properties have been added to the Most Endangered Oklahoma Historic Properties List for 1996, and the Skirvin Hotel in Oklahoma City has been returned after slow rehabilitation progress it was announced by Preservation Oklahoma Inc.

These properties bring the total to 13, said President Hiram Champlin of Preservation Oklahoma. The most highly publicized added property was the Journal Record Building, which was damaged extensively in the April 19, 1995, bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City.

Other additions include the Ambassador Hotel and Tulsa Club in Tulsa; the 101 Ranch near Ponca City, the Black Middenmound Archaeological Site near Red Oak east of Wilburton, and the Neosho River Route 66 Bridge near Miami.

These joined six properties retained from the 1995 list, said Preservation Executive Director Robert K. Erwin of Oklahoma City. Retained from a year ago were the Beck-Hildebrand Mill near Colcord in Delaware

County, the Centre Theatre in Oklahoma City, Fort Reno near El Reno, the Mayo Hotel in Tulsa, the Washita Battlefield near Cheyenne and the 1842 Wheelock Academy and Mission in McCurtain County.

"These are not just old buildings. They are part of our heritage — of what makes us who we are."

homa, a statewide non-profit organization, established the list in 1993," said Erwin, "to focus attention on immediate threats to important historic and cultural resources in Oklahoma. All of the sites on this list are extremely important to our state and the communities in which they are located."

The Most Endangered list is a joint project with the State Historic Preservation Office of the Oklahoma Historical Society. They foster preservation of historic buildings and sites through advocacy, education, and technical and financial assistance. Erwin points to the rescue of Tulsa's Art Deco Warehouse Market building as a prime example of the program's impact.

"It is appalling," Erwin said, "to note that three of the 16 National Historic Landmarks in Oklahoma are on our list — including the 101 Ranch, the Washita Battlefield and the

DRS provides assistance to Oklahomans with disabilities through vocational rehabilitation, education, employment, Social Security disability determination and independent living programs.

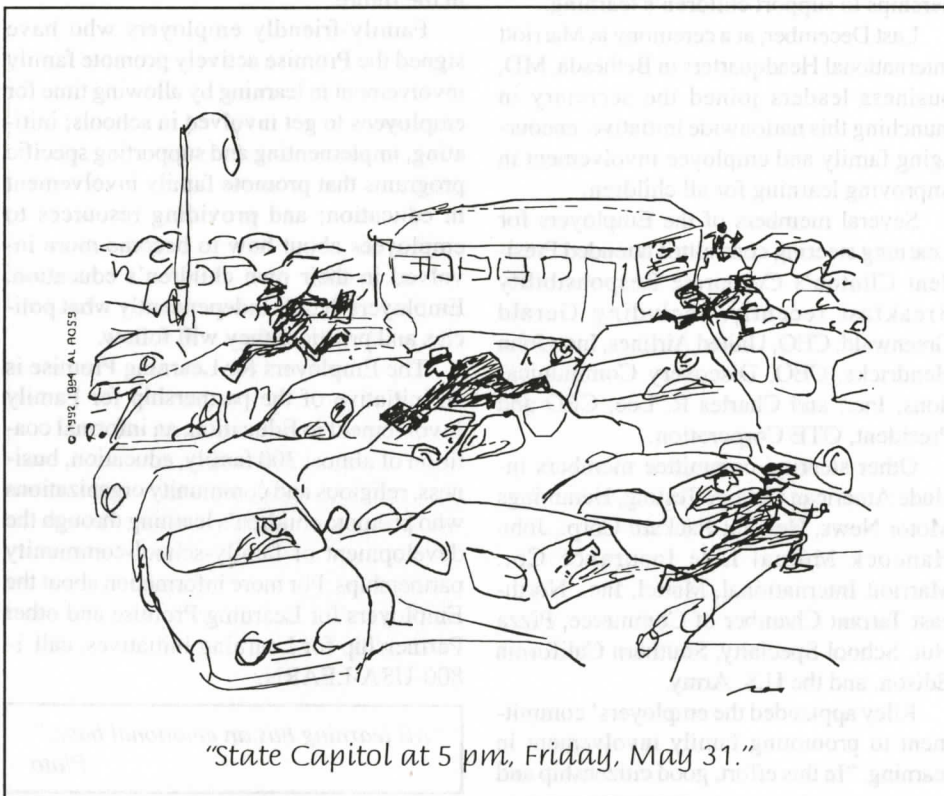
Prior to working for DRS, Howell specialized in employment training with the state Department of Human Services and once served as personnel director for a large metro area realtor.

ANNUAL MEDICARE RATE INCREASE PROPOSED FOR HOSPITALS

■ (WASHINGTON) The Department of Health and Human Services Thursday proposed an increase of 2.2 percent in Medicare payments to hospitals in the coming fiscal year. The new rate is derived from a formula provided in law.

Following a comment period and publications of a final rate, the increase would take effect Oct. 1 for the nation's 5,200 short-stay, acute care hospitals participating in the Medicare program. For another 2,000 non-acute care hospitals, the statutory proposed increase for FY 1997 is between 1.7 and 2.7 percent.

Medicare pays short-stay, acute care hospitals a predetermined rate for inpatient hospital services furnished to Medicare beneficiaries, using a prospective payment system (PPS). Under PPS, a base payment rate for each admission is multiplied by a measure, called a diagnosis related group, which reflects the nature of a patient's condition. Hospitals in large urban areas (cities with more than one million people) receive slightly higher base payment rates than those in other urban and rural areas.

Current law requires that the rate increases for PPS hospitals be based on projections of growth in the prices of goods and services purchased by hospitals, known as the hospital market basket, minus 0.5 percentage points. The market basket is currently estimated to be 2.7 percent for FY 1997.

President Clinton's budget for FY 1997 includes a proposed change in the update for PPS hospitals in both urban and other areas, in which the increase would be equal to the market basket rate of increase minus 1.5 percentage points. The proposal is part of the administration's broader plan for reducing spending growth in the Medicare program by \$124 billion over seven years.

Consistent with the administration's proposal, HHS Secretary Donna E. Shalala recommended that the increase in Medicare hospital payments should be only 1.2 percent in the coming fiscal year. However, this lower proposed rate increase would require Congressional action.

Under current law, 2,000 Medicare hospitals excluded from PPS — psychiatric, rehabilitation, long-term and children's facilities — would get a 1.7 percent increase in their rates, although the update can be higher for certain hospitals and units with

costs that are greater than their target amounts. The increase is based on an estimated 2.7 percent increase in the market basket calculated exclusively for these hospitals, minus one percentage point.

Also included in the proposed regulation, which will be published in Friday's Federal Register, is a 4.36 percent increase to the federal capital PPS rate. Medicare makes payments to hospitals for capital related costs on a prospective basis. The covered costs included depreciation, interest, taxes, insurance and similar expenses for plant and equipment.

"The regulation also explains the reasoning behind three options for reducing the federal capital rate," said HCFA Administrator Bruce C. Vladeck. "But we will wait

to see whether this summer Congress approves any adjustment to the capital PPS rate, before deciding whether to include a capital rate reduction in the final regulation."

Medicare paid \$78.9 billion to inpatient hospitals providing acute, short-term care in fiscal year 1995. Hospitals payments are expected to grow by 8.2 percent from \$84.5 billion in FY 1996 to \$90.8 billion in FY 1997.

"The growth in both hospital admissions and new Medicare beneficiaries, and an increase in the severity of cases hospitals treat are fueling the overall increase in Medicare's hospital payments," said Vladeck, who oversees the Medicare program. "The higher payments are not just a result of the increase in Medicare's payment rates."

MARY FALLIN — MAKING HISTORY FOR OKLAHOMA

Mary Fallin made history in November, 1994, when she became the first woman and the first Republican ever elected Lieutenant Governor in the State of Oklahoma. Her swearing in on the south steps of the State Capitol on January 9, 1995, made her the highest elected woman to public service in state history.

While that date marked a significant victory for Mary Fallin, it was only the beginning. With hard work and a vision for economic growth, Mary Fallin has built upon that first momentous occasion on the south steps to continue to make history for the State of Oklahoma.

In addition to her role as President of the Senate, the Lt. Mary Fallin describes herself as "her own woman" attacking her busy schedule deliberately and methodically. When asked how she works and interacts with the Governor she is very positive.

"We get along well. We have a good balance," Fallin said. "The Governor may ask me, from time to time, to work on a particular project, and that's certainly appropriate, but I don't ask, 'Can I work on this?' when I have an issue or a project that is important to me."

HOORAY FOR OKLAHOMA

When you combine the vision and energy of Fallin with the Oklahoma Film Commission and add in Hollywood, what do you get? *Twister*! Described by Fallin as a real "coup for Oklahoma," the feature film provided Hollywood and Oklahoma with two of their greatest successes.

For Hollywood, it was the opening of what has become Warner Brothers' summer blockbuster, starring Bill Paxton and Helen Hunt and directed by Jan DeBont, director of the box office smash *Speed*. *Twister* recorded the largest opening weekend box office haul ever taken in by a movie opening in May. This \$37.5 million box office assault even eclipsed any movie that had opened during Memorial Day weekend, traditionally the top opening weekend of the summer movie season.

Not ironically, Oklahoma's success was also related to the opening of *Twister*. But true to the tradition of the Sooners who made this state what it is today, Oklahoma got a bit of a jump on the rest of the nation.

Oklahoma pulled out all of the stops for the May 9 Oklahoma

premier of *Twister* and threw a party that would be the apple of any multi-million dollar movie mogul's eye. Including a pre-reception, a screening of the film, and a black-tie after-party, the gala event focused the attention of the world once again on Oklahoma.

"There was a premier in Hollywood the night before and a premier with Ted Turner the night after — but for Oklahoma to host a premier for such a major motion picture — the door for this state was thrown wide open for us with Hollywood," Fallin said.

Again, the 'Oklahoma Standard' shone like a beacon for all the world to see. Enhanced by the attendance of an ebullient Paxton, along with Hunt and De Bont, the premier was a great success.

But more than a good time was at stake. The people planning the premiere knew it, as did the communities who were involved in the filming and the citizens who attracted the production to the state in the first place. This film was about a subject as familiar to this state as are oil, football and the Sooners who settled here. Severe weather is so much a part of the tradition of Oklahoma, that no one was surprised when the night of the premier was scattered with storm warnings in the northern part of the state.

In the movie, and with its premiere, Oklahoma again set a benchmark for the nation to follow. The beautiful vistas shown in the movies' opening moments and the power of nature portrayed in the storm scenes are breathtaking. The film alone is a scouting location guide for producers who may want to come to the state in the future.

Reflecting on how *Twister* came to happen in Oklahoma, Fallin said Warner Bros. came to the state over a year ago and told her office they wanted to look at some locations around the state. "We're thinking about filming this movie called *Twister* here in Oklahoma they told us," Fallin said.

Economic Boost

The filming of a major motion picture brings with it a lot of money in addition to national recognition for the area. For example, Warner Bros. spent a little over \$11.3 million dollars in Oklahoma to film *Twister*.

That money is broken down as follows:

So representatives of the Film Office took the Warner Bros. people to various locations around the state. They looked for roads, for tractors, for the small town look. They looked for "just the right house" which they finally found in Waukita. They looked for a drive-in movie theater which they ended up building in Guthrie.

"We have great topography in Oklahoma," Fallin said. We have mountains, forests, sand dunes, lakes, flat lands and mesas as well as great four seasons. Just about anything a producer might be looking for can be found right here in Oklahoma," Fallin said.

But the biggest attraction for the film industry in Oklahoma is that "everything from dry cleaning to catering to movie extras is more affordable in Oklahoma," Fallin said. That means it costs much less to film in Oklahoma, Fallin said.

And in this particular film, a big urban renewal project was also taken on by Hollywood in Waukita. "There were some old dilapidated buildings in Waukita that they wanted down," Fallin said. The movie crew came in, blew them all down and cleaned up the mess, Fallin explained, leaving Waukita with the benefits of the film crew's work.

When asked if bringing the movie production to Oklahoma cost the state anything Fallin answered, "No. As a matter of fact when *Twister* came here they filmed for 133 days, spent more than \$11 million dollars, and employed over 2,500 people."

"We showed them (Warner Bros.) that Oklahoma can have a first class premier like you would have in Hollywood, that you can save money making the film in Oklahoma, and that you have great settings for film making in Oklahoma," Fallin said. Warner Bros. takes that information back to California with them and soon the word spreads through the movie-making community, she added.

Fallin revealed that the Film Office is currently meeting with a director who is

looking at filming another \$10 dollar movie in Oklahoma.

"He's looking for steam locomotives and old depots. The Film Commission is scouting for these things and is taking the Hollywood visitors to the locations," Fallin said. "We're very optimistic that *Twister* is just the first of many multi-million dollar projects in Oklahoma."

In addition to box office favorites, the Film Commission under Fallin's direction has generated more than \$1 million in revenue for Oklahoma with the filming of commercials for several major corporations including Phillips Petroleum, Hardee's, Southwestern Bell, AT&T, and Integris.

OTHER INTERESTS PURSUED

Mary Fallin doesn't just have "stars in her eyes" for the movie industry. Making movies in Oklahoma makes money for Oklahoma. During her tenure in the House of Representatives, Mary Fallin was presented the "Guardian of Small Business" Award by the National Federation of Independent Business. In her role as Lieutenant Governor, Fallin continues to work at helping to expand Oklahoma businesses.

Fallin created the Lt. Governor's Business Round Table. She describes it as one of her "major projects." "The Business Round Table is designed to bring Oklahoma business people in so we can learn what we can do to help the Oklahoma economy grow," Fallin said.

"We've learned that the number one issue for Oklahoma business, regardless of what some legislators may say, is workers' compensation. The premiums are still too high," Fallin said. "Workers' comp rates is the number one issue and we're going to try to solve it."

The Lt. Governor is also working with Oklahoma's Tourism and Recreation Commission to re-focus on the tourism industry in Oklahoma, reviewing the operation of state lodges and looking at optimizing the state's investment in tourism.

The Lt. Governor's office is knowledgeable of the issues and listens to the people. Under Fallin's leadership, Oklahoma has established its place as a major contributor to the motion picture industry. Making a difference to business in Oklahoma; making improvements in the tourism industry in Oklahoma; making movies in Oklahoma; making millions for the state's economy; Mary Fallin is making history. Raised in Tecumseh, Oklahoma, Mary (Copeland) Fallin went on to attend Oklahoma State University and completed some of her graduate work at the University of Central Oklahoma. APPROPRIATIONS

GOVERNOR ISSUES LINE-ITEM VETOES

■(GIT) Appropriations of 'new money' to six state agencies were vetoed by the governor on Tuesday.

Governor Frank Keating vetoed the appropriations "because the appropriations contained in those items exceed the Executive Budget. The excess funds must be preserved for future budgetary needs in order to offset fiscally irresponsible spending in other parts of the budget," he wrote in his veto message for each of the bills containing a line item veto.

Agencies having their funding vetoed include the Office of the Auditor and Inspector and Oklahoma Tax Commission, **HB1787**; the Human Rights Commission and the Indian Affairs Commission, **HB1800**; and the State Election Board and State Ethics Commission, **HB1812**.

Earlier in the session, the governor signed legislation increasing state employees' pay by \$1,200 annually. Lawmakers chose to fund that pay increase with this year's so-called new money or additional revenue.

Base funding for all six agencies was included in a bill approved by both houses of the legislature and signed by the governor earlier in the session. The governor and legislative leaders touted the bill as a way to avoid a state government shutdown should budget matters become a stumbling block for lawmakers and the executive branch.

HOUSE SUSTAINS THREE LINE-ITEM VETOES

■(GIT) House Democrats were unsuccessful in three attempts on Wednesday to override Governor Frank Keating's line-item vetoes.

Four votes was all that separated two of the attempts from success on **HB1812** and **HB1800**. Five votes was the gap on **HB1792**, when Rep. Charles Gray, D-Oklahoma City, broke ranks and voted with Republicans in sustaining the governor's veto of additional funding for the Merit Protection Commission.

The Democrats launched their attack before noon on Wednesday, targeting first **HB1812** and the governor's veto of sections one and four. The sections appropriated

funds to the State Election Board and the State Ethics Commission. The effort would ultimately fail 64-36, reflecting a straight party-line vote.

In urging the override, House Democrats referred repeatedly to the process of writing the state budget, reiterating several times that attempts to override a gubernatorial veto were comparable to the recommendations made by the governor concerning the budget. In urging that the veto be sustained, House Republicans accused the opposing party of "trying to spend every dime they could get their hands on."

Rep. Tommy Thomas, D-Atoka, argued that the legislature and the governor needed "to put the money where their mouth is," saying Keating and lawmakers had endorsed a state employee pay raise and that part of the money in the sections vetoed by the governor was appropriated for those raises.

In arguing for the override, Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore, said he found the governor's veto message to be "not understandable." He added that the vetoed bill sections dealt with important issues with which he felt there was general support.

House Majority Leader Rep. Loyd Benson, D-Frederick, said "If everyone stands up and votes their conscience, we can send a message to the governor's advisors. I don't think the governor would do this if he understood the consequences of his actions."

In response to the Democrats' arguments, Rep. Jim Reese, R-Narden, accused Democrats of packaging additional appropriations with the state employee pay raise in hopes of winning the governor's signature.

"If anyone had asked, the governor is more than happy to pay for the pay raise, but he had no choice. He had to veto the entire package," Reese said.

Asked whether Republicans might be portrayed negatively if they helped sustain a veto of ethics commission funding, Reese replied, "I don't think any one of us has anything to worry about. We've cast enough votes to prove we're for stronger ethics in government."

Rep. Leonard Sullivan, R-Oklahoma City, also accused House Democrats of irresponsible spending, saying they were waving a red flag in the governor's face.

"You're spending the state into bankruptcy," he said, "and we're looking at a shortfall next year. But the governor has

given us an out, an opportunity to save face, but it looks like some of us would prefer to wave the red flag one more time."

The most impassioned argument during the debate came from Speaker of the House Glen Johnson, D-Okemah, who also referred to the House effort as just another part of the budget process. Johnson also challenged Republican members to recall their vote on the bill last week, noting that it had passed by a 94-0 vote.

"This vote today is a vote on the process," Johnson emphasized. "When we brought this bill out here it did not result in a party line vote. It passed unanimously, 94-0."

"Today, I want to ask you, 'What has changed?'"

"We voted unanimously for this bill last week, and not one word, not one line has changed," Johnson intoned. "Your vote today will say whether your vote is an independent vote or a vote subject to the whim of the governor when he decides he wants to veto something," Johnson said in conclusion and to applause from House Democrats.

Johnson's impassioned plea, however, was not enough, and along party lines, the House voted 64-36 on the override motion, four votes shy of the two-thirds vote needed to override the veto.

The vote was essentially the same late Wednesday evening when Democratic lawmakers set their sights on line-item vetoes in **HB1800**, where section 7 dealing with the Human Rights Commission and section 10 had been vetoed by the governor.

In launching what would become perhaps the most fiery speech of the legislative session, Rep. Don Ross, D-Tulsa, said, "I take this vote and the governor's veto personally. This is an absolute insult to a class of people in our state."

Picking out Republican members of the House by name, Ross reminded those on the north side of aisle of the success of some of their programs and the money involved.

"But when it comes to my people," he said, "you've got a problem with \$53,000."

Ross said he and other legislative leaders had met with the governor and his advisors and that they had expressed no concerns about the appropriations. "Now he comes along and vetoes a bill that's even less than we said we were going to spend," Ross said.

After listing Republican House members who had voted for the bill's passage last

week, Rep. Jim Hamilton, D-Poteau and chairman of the General Conference Committee on Appropriations, said, "This bill didn't develop in a vacuum someplace. It's not good one day and then bad the next."

"You may think it's funny to take a few select agencies and say they're not going to get the pay raise we promised them. I can assure you it's not."

Hamilton concluded, "You can't have it both ways. You've got to say what you mean and mean what you say, and now you've got to do the right thing."

Speaking in favor of sustaining the veto, Rep. Reese said the issue was not just the specific agencies, but the entire budget.

"You've spent last year's, this year's and you're making a big commitment with next year's money," Reese said.

When the votes were counted, Republicans were again victorious, staving off the Democrats effort by a 64-32 vote.

Without debate, the governor's veto of additional funding for the Merit Protection Commission was sustained by a 63-35 vote with Gray joining Republicans in upholding the governor's action.

GOVERNOR ISSUES MORE LINE-ITEM VETOES

■(GIT) Only hours after House members sustained one veto and minutes before they would vote to sustain two others, Governor Frank Keating on Wednesday vetoed seven line items in five bills.

The vetoes included:

✓ **HB1809**, section eight, appropriating \$114,921 to the Physician Manpower Training Commission;

✓ **SB802**, section one, appropriating \$975,287 to the Attorney General, and section 10, appropriating \$919,155 to the Oklahoma Indigent Defense System;

✓ **SB810**, section nine, which reappropriates \$75,000 to the State Department of Health for a statewide trauma system, and section 32, appropriating \$1.4 million to the University Hospital Authority;

✓ **SB812**, section one, appropriating \$313,140 to the State Banking Department; and

✓ **SB818**, section one, appropriating \$229,610 to the Alcoholic Beverage Law Enforcement (ABLE) Commission.

Echoing the message of his previous line item vetoes, the governor wrote that the sections were vetoed "because the appropriations contained in those items exceeded the Executive Budget. The excess funds must be preserved for future budgetary needs in order to avoid fiscally irresponsible levels of overall spending."

In a prepared statement released Wednesday afternoon, the governor said he is prepared to veto as many non-essential line items as necessary to make up for what he called "reckless spending practices of the legislature."

Ironically, the governor signed off on a provision of HB1809 which contained an additional \$71.4 million for higher education. What the governor has yet to do, however, is to sign or to veto **HB1810**, which would take \$31.5 million from OSEEGIB to help provide the \$71.4 million for higher education.

The governor also pledged in his statement that his vetoes will in no way effect pay raises for state employees.

"If the legislature sends me back bills with my budget recommendations plus the pay raise money in them and no additional spending, I will sign them" Keating added.

Whether such bills will make it to the governor's desk is yet to be seen. When GCCA chairman Jim Hamilton, D-Poteau, was asked if there was any other vehicle in which the vetoed employee pay raises could be incorporated, he replied: "Why? We've already given you this bill."

HOUSE REPUBLICANS PUSH PAY PLAN PROPOSAL

■(GIT) Republicans in the House plan on Friday to push a proposal designed to fund the state employee pay raises vetoed by the governor, a Republican representative told Capitol Network News.

"We'll try to do it by inserting it into one of the three Senate appropriations bills scheduled for consideration on Friday," Rep. Jim Reese, R-Narden, said, referring to a proposal advanced twice on Thursday by Re-

publicans that would appropriate money for the pay raise to 14 agencies.

Those agencies had funding for the pay raise vetoed earlier in the week in a series of line-item vetoes issued by Governor Frank Keating.

Rep. Tim Pope, R-Mustang, first raised the issue on Thursday during consideration of **SB832**, which appropriates funds to the State Board of Vocational and Technical Education. Pope tried unsuccessfully to have the bill's conference committee report rejected so that language could be added to "(P)rovide appropriations for the state employee pay raise as authorized by **SB1128** and provide appropriation for the employer's contribution increase for the Oklahoma Public Employees Retirement System ..." for 14 agencies whose money for those expenses had been vetoed by the governor.

A motion to adopt the bill's conference committee report received a passing vote of 55-41, leading to a passing vote on the bill of 54-43.

Rep. Wayne Pettigrew, R-Edmond, raised the issue later on Thursday when the House considered **SB811**, which specifies budget limitations for health services agencies. Pettigrew asked the bill's author, Rep. Jim Hamilton, D-Poteau, whether he was aware the Edmond lawmaker had instructions on the table to fund the pay raise and related expenses. Hamilton said he was not, and asked House Speaker Glen Johnson, D-Okemah, to rule on the germaneness of the instructions.

After consulting with the chief clerk, Johnson ruled the instructions were not germane because the bill dealt with substantive language, while the instructions made appropriations.

The House adopted the conference committee report by unanimous consent and the bill received a passing vote of 87-10.

Reese said the proposed instructions are germane to the three Senate bills up for consideration on Friday — **SBs 819, 825 and 1254** — which each make appropriations.

Meanwhile, the governor also challenged legislative leaders to "stop playing end-of-session politics" with funds earmarked for state employee pay raises.

The governor reiterated a position expressed by House members of his party during an attempted veto override on Thursday:

Some of the appropriations approved by lawmakers have included unrelated spending that exceeded the executive budget requests presented in February.

"They knew precisely what they were doing by lumping money to fund the raises with other budget-busting items," he said. "By tying them together, they made it impossible to separate the raise money from other funds. To safeguard the public from irresponsible spending, I had no choice but to use the veto."

Keating said legislative leaders have adequate time to revise the vetoed sections of the appropriations bills to include the raise money and exclude additional spending.

Maintaining the position they staked out on Wednesday, Democratic lawmakers reiterated that they would not resubmit bills containing the pay raise for the legislature and governor's consideration.

"We have no plans to bail the governor out of the dilemma he has created," said Senate Pro Tempore Stratton Taylor, D-Claremore.

Also on Thursday, Keating issued the following line-item vetoes:

✓ **HB1795**, section 12, decreasing DEQ's appropriation level by \$3,047,663; section 14, references decrease noted in section 12; section 17, appropriates \$178,688 to Department of Mines; section 20; appropriates \$450,000 to MESONET via the Water Resources Board; and section 23, appropriating \$ 50,000 to complete Mangum Reservoir Project of the Water Resources Board;

PUBLIC EMPLOYEES OUTRAGED BY VETOES

■(GIT) "This association is not playing the game of Democrats and Republicans, we just want to address the issue," was the comment from Oklahoma Public Employees Association (OPEA) Executive Director Gary Jones

Thursday, blasting Governor Frank Keating and the Legislature for their failure to enact legislation that would, they say, give some \$7.1 million in mandated pay raises and related employee expenditures to state employees.

Jones responded to the numerous vetoed bills containing the state employee pay increases set forth in **SB1128**, signed into law last month. Attempts to override the governor's vetoes failed late Wednesday in the House.

"How can you on one hand vote for a piece of legislation and then turn around and not vote to override the governor's veto," Jones asked. "If there was a problem with the budget, they [the Legislature] have had four months to fix it."

Jones estimates some 1,500 employees could possibly be affected by the cuts. Since the pay raise has been signed into law, agencies would be required to somehow find the money to fund the salary increases. Layoffs and furloughs may be necessary to meet the, what Jones calls, unfunded mandate.

Jones said agencies anticipating employee reductions include the Merit Protection Commission, the Indian Affairs Commission and the Human Rights Commission.

Jones also said that the Office of the State Auditor and Inspector stands to lose an estimated 10 auditors as a result of the cuts.

Conversations with the governor's office and Office of State Finance Director Tom Daxon yielded some hope. Daxon is reported to have said that if lawmakers would present legislation listing specific line-item expenditures, the governor would be able to line-item veto specific sections of the measures, saving the pay-raises.

The issue must be addressed by 5:00 p.m. Friday when the Legislature will adjourn for the last time until 1997, unless the governor exercises his right to call the Legislature back into special session where the matter could possibly resurface.

\$1.8 million allocated to the Oklahoma Tax Commission were at issue on Thursday when House members considered overriding Governor Frank Keating's line-item vetoes in **HB1787**.

The 63-35 vote to sustain the governor's veto came despite praise from both sides of the aisle for State Auditor and Inspector Clifton Scott and the work performed by his office.

"He may have the toughest job in all of state government," Rep. Tommy Thomas, D-Atoka, told fellow House members during debate on the motion to override the governor's line-item veto. But, Thomas said, the veto was inconsistent with Keating's claim of being a law and order governor and protector of the public's interest.

House Majority Leader Rep. Loyd Benson, D-Frederick, also praised the auditor and his staff, reading off a long list of investigations conducted by the auditor's office, as well as a list of criminal convictions that have resulted from the probes.

The veto, Benson added, could lead the office to cut 10 auditors if funds for the state employee pay raise are not made available. That, Benson said, would devastate an office already involved in seven investigations and with more than a dozen requests waiting.

Republican lawmaker Leonard Sullivan, of Oklahoma City, said the veto represented part of "a new era in state government."

"This and the other vetoes show that the Republicans and governor are part of the process. This is like a training program for you, because you may be in the minority next year."

That idea did not sit well with Rep. Jim Glover, D-Elgin, who argued the Republicans should have been active in the process last week when the appropriations bills were considered.

"The right thing to do," Glover said, "was to stand up when the bills were out here."

Rep. James Dunlap, R-Bartlesville, also said the vetoes represented a change in the status quo.

"But these bills put all the appropriations together into one lump sum. That doesn't give the governor the ability to line-item veto those things he feels are inappropriate or excessive," Dunlap said.

Speaker of the House Glen Johnson, D-Okemah, concluded debate on the unsuccessful effort to override the governor's veto, saying the Republicans' idea of affecting the budget process "was a good idea — one week ago when the bills first came through."

"What has changed in this bill?" Johnson asked. "Not one word. But what has changed

is that the governor has decided he didn't like this bill.

"You've got a chance to exercise your best judgment," Johnson added, "or to let someone else decide what is your will. You were elected to cast your vote, not to vote the way the governor decides is best.

"This," Johnson concluded, "is the right thing to do."

Like the three override attempts before Thursday's, the final vote reflected a strict party-line decision and the attempt failed.

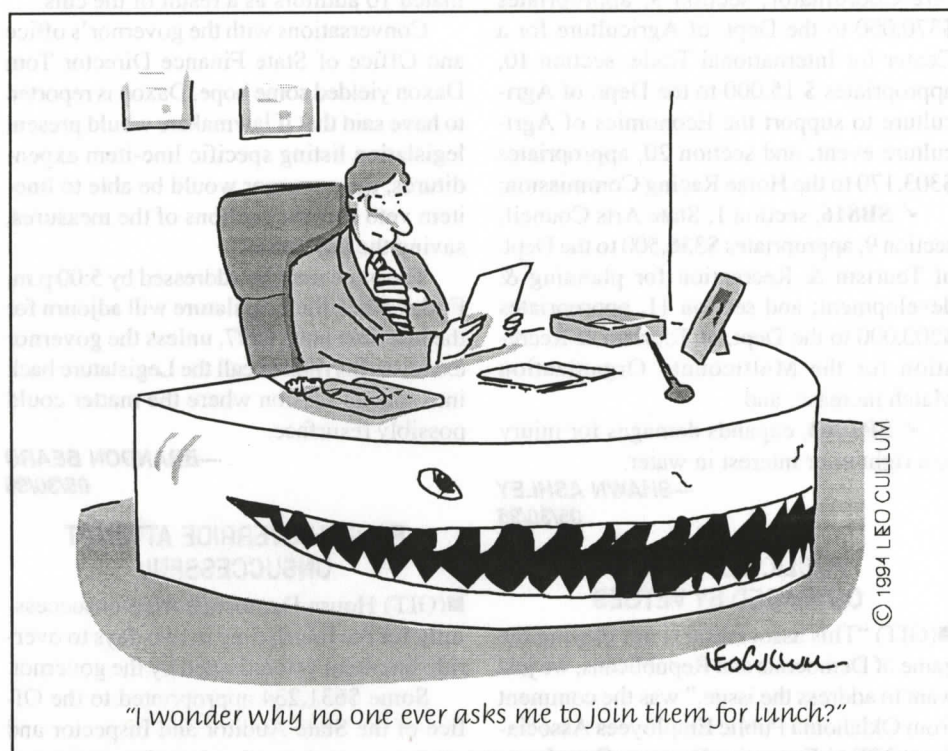

"Those attending are strongly encouraged to bring ceramic items for examination and identification," Gettys said. The public is invited without charge, said Mitchell.

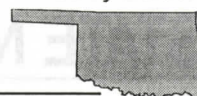

WORKERS COMPENSATION REFORM MEASURE PASSES SENATE

■(GIT) A measure reforming the Oklahoma Workers' Compensation Act passed the Senate Tuesday. The bill, **SB1310**, by Sen. Bernice Shedrick, D-Stillwater, received unanimous support, despite early opposition from a handful of members.

The bill is the result of a House interim study conducted late last year concerning the State Insurance Fund.

Under the measure, insurers, except for the State Insurance Fund, must provide access to a certified workplace medical plan. After 60 days written notice to its insurance carrier, insurers may choose a plan of choice and contract for one year.

Also, if the State Insurance Fund fails to contract with at least three certified workplace medical plans, each covering at least 50 counties in the state, then the insured may contract for one year with a carrier of choice.

If an employee elects not to enroll in the certified workplace medical plan, they may choose from a list of physicians who meet certain requirements.

The measure also authorizes the state commissioner of health to authorize a workplace medical plan other than that recommended by the administrator of the Physician Advisory Committee if the administrator fails to choose a plan.

The measure provides that workers' compensation carriers may use present value discounting at a rate of four percent for claims involving disability and death.

A provision of the bill provides that any person not required to carry workers' compensation insurance may apply to the commissioner of labor for a Certificate of Non-Coverage Under the Workers' Compensation Act. The certificate, for a fee of \$10.00, would excuse the bearer from the requirement to carry the coverage.

A "reasonable inquiry" will determine if the application is legitimate. The labor commissioner along with the workers' compen-

sation fraud unit of the office of the attorney general are responsible for conducting the investigation.

The measure also exempts the State Insurance Fund from any future hiring freezes implemented by the governor.

The bill's conference committee report was adopted with a vote of 40 to 7. The measure itself passed as an emergency measure with a vote of 46 to 0.

Shedrick lodged a motion to reconsider, normally giving her three legislative days to re-address the issue. Under a Tuesday suspension of Senate rules, however, all motions to reconsider must be addressed that same day. The measure was not brought up again. It now goes to the House for its consideration.

SENTENCING MEASURES' FATE UNCERTAIN

■(GIT) The two measures designed to change the way Oklahoma sentences its convicted offenders, one containing the Community Corrections Act, and the other containing the Truth in Sentencing Act, are both on hold this week as the Legislature prepares to adjourn Friday.

SB1200, by Sen. Herb Rozell, D-Tahlequah, contains the Community Corrections Act. It would allow first and second-time non-violent offenders to be sentenced to a variety of community sentencing options, including house arrest.

The bill has met with resistance, specifically from the Oklahoma Sheriffs' Association, who claim the measure would place too much financial and administrative stress on the already burdened agency.

The bill's House author, Rep. Jari Askins, D-Duncan, has been rallying support for the measure all week, reportedly having difficulty gathering needed votes.

Askins said part of the problem with the bill is the definition of "non-violent offender," which is not easily definable in the bill. She said if language from the Truth in Sentencing Act, **HB1138**, by Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore, were in place, the task would be much simpler.

Askins added that the interest in community corrections lies in the ability to remove

the, what some call severe, Department of Corrections (DOC) overcrowding problem.

"We need to save that prison space for violent offenders," she said.

Steidley couldn't agree more. He said the Community Corrections Act is necessary before the Truth in Sentencing Act can be effective.

Since the Truth in Sentencing Act would require prisoners to serve a minimum of 85 percent of their sentence before being eligible for parole, the already serious prison overcrowding problem would become unmanageable.

Steidley said the Community Corrections Act will act as a type of "release valve" for DOC, allowing prison space to be used for violent and dangerous offenders.

HB1138 is waiting to be dealt with in its conference committee. Steidley said he was hopeful a Thursday meeting with involved parties would yield progress.

Steidley said he was going to push for the bill's passage, removing the specific sentences from all of the matrices and directing the Truth in Sentencing Policy Advisory Commission and the DOC to conduct a study to determine the financial impact of the measure.

Both measures will have to be passed and sent to the governor's desk before Friday at 5:00 p.m., when the Legislature is scheduled to adjourn until next year.

ANOTHER JUVENILE JUSTICE MEASURE IS SIGNED INTO LAW

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Legislation by a Tillman County lawmaker that would deprive school drop-outs of the privilege to drive was signed into law recently.

HB2692 by House Majority Leader Loyd Benson clarifies and strengthens **HB2640**, a 1994 juvenile justice reform package by the Frederick Democrat that established juvenile detention centers across the state, including Manitou.

A key feature of **HB2692** is that, effective July 1, it will deprive school drop-outs of the privilege to drive. Approximately 8,000 students quit public schools in Oklahoma each year, Benson said.

The new law directs the State Department of Public Safety to deny a new driver's license application or revoke an existing driver's license — for a minimum of two months — whenever anyone younger than 18 cannot prove that he or she is enrolled in a public or private secondary school or vocational-technical school, is home schooled, has graduated from school or is enrolled in a general equivalency degree program.

Submitting false information about a student's school attendance will be a misdemeanor crime.

In a related vein, HB2692 will require schools to offer alternative education programs for disobedient and non-violent delinquent students.

HB2692 directs the State Board of Education to phase in alternative education programs in schools throughout the state over the next five years.

Implementing these programs ultimately will cost an estimated \$30 million, Benson said. The Legislature appropriated \$6.4 million to introduce the project in 100 school districts during the next school year, he added.

HB2692 also allows the Juvenile Justice Department to contract with private service providers to create jobs that will enable juvenile lawbreakers to make restitution to their victims. At least 75 percent of a juvenile lawbreaker's net earnings from a job will be earmarked for restitution, the bill decrees.

The bill stipulates that a supervised work program must not interfere with the child's schooling.

USAO REGENTS DISCUSS BRIGHT FUNDING PROSPECTS

■(CHICKASHA) Prospects for better funding in state appropriations were discussed this week when the University of Science and Arts of Oklahoma Board of Regents met to consider a light agenda of business. USAO President Roy Troutt, in his monthly report to the board, outlined the State Legislature's announced plans to put \$71 million new dollars into the State System of Higher Education.

Troutt also discussed USAO's advancing telecommunications projects. He intro-

duced Dr. Alan Todd, who completed a Telecommunication Training Institute at Oklahoma State University earlier this month. Todd shared insights on "distance learning" and how USAO might maximize the use of its new interactive-video-classroom under construction in Nash Library.

USAO's new telecom classroom will serve numerous functions in delivering and receiving educational programs from across the state. Scheduled for completion in July, the classroom is important for USAO, which has been designated as one of 33 hubsites across the state to send and receive courses and other programs.

Troutt also recognized Regent Loretta Jackson, who was named recently to the Democratic Women's Hall of Fame in Oklahoma.

In other business, Regents approved a revised Student Association Constitution.

Regents also approved a revised Student Handbook.

New to the handbook this year is a statement on academic progress and a policy banning handguns, which was enacted by the school following a new state law allowing concealed weapons for licensed individuals.

Regents learned that a new member has been named by Gov. Frank Keating to the USAO Board. Former Chickasha resident Beverly Carter, now of Oklahoma City, will join the board in July. She will fill a vacancy to be left by Regent Lillian Boland, who is completing nine years of service.

In personnel matters, the board approved the retirement of Dr. Pauline Hook, associate professor of speech pathology, and the appointment of Allison Fahsl as special adjunct faculty member in education.

Regents also approved the reappointment of Vaughn Groom, instructor in computer science, and the appointment of Jeffery Martin, student life counselor and intramural sports coordinator.

Eleven members of the physical plant staff were reappointed for 1996-97: Earl

INFANT SCREENING BILL BACK IN COMMITTEE

■(GIT) A bill creating the Early Identification and Support for Infants Act was returned to conference committee for the third time

by the House on Tuesday with instructions to include a provision banning so-called partial birth abortions.

HB2393, by Rep. Mark Seikel, D-Harrah, would allow, "with the consent of the parent or legal guardian of the infant, a voluntary screening procedure for the early identification of infants who may require or benefit from health or other community infant support services that shall be conducted for each infant."

Seikel took a chance on the bill's future when during debate over acceptance of the third conference committee report he asked what it would take to adopt the instructions proposed by Rep. Joan Greenwood, R-Moore. Greenwood asked that a provision be added to the bill protecting parents who refused the services recommended as a result of the proposed screenings.

The Moore Republican said she had documentation from other states with similar laws that showed parents being penalized, even losing custody of their children, when they had refused the services recommended by screenings similar to the one proposed by Seikel.

Lying on the desk at the time, however, were instructions from Rep. Bill Graves, R-Oklahoma City. Those instructions had been submitted ahead of Greenwood's, and as a result, were due to be heard first. The instructions call for the addition of a provision banning so-called partial birth abortions.

Pressed by Rep. Ron Kirby, D-Lawton, about the number of partial birth abortions performed in Oklahoma, Graves said he did not know, adding that current law does not require such records to be kept.

"One time is too many," Graves, who has proposed regulations allowing the health department to set minimum safety standards for abortion clinics that would include keeping such records, added.

Greenwood proposed that her instructions for the bill be considered as an amendment to those of Graves', and by unanimous consent, the instructions were adopted as an amendment.

Graves' amended instructions, which then included the partial-birth abortion ban and parents' protection clause, were also adopted by unanimous consent.

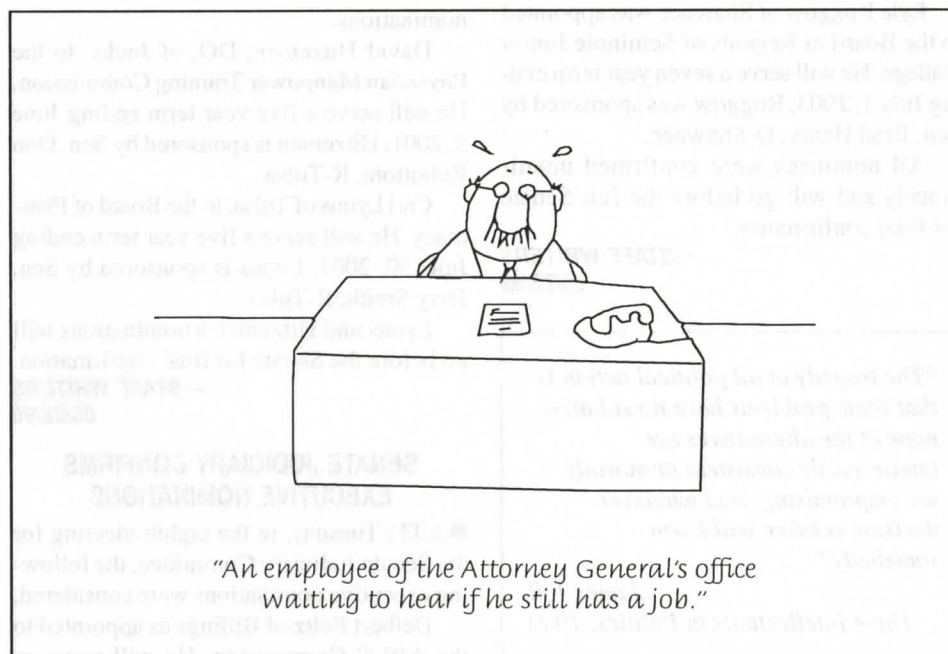

OKLAHOMA GAS PRODUCTION ALLOWABLE CONTINUES AT 50%

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) The Oklahoma Corporation Commission Thursday continued the production allowable for Oklahoma unallocated gas wells at the greater of 50 percent of wellhead absolute open flow potential or 1 million cubic feet per day for the

third quarter of 1996.

The production allowable is the same as for the second quarter of 1996.

Unallocated wells are not regulated by production allocations for specific fields. About 95 percent of Oklahoma gas wells are unallocated.

The commission staff recommended continuation of the present production allowable to help replenish a below-average supply of gas in storage, caused in part by extremely cold weather last winter in eastern and upper midwestern states.

Industry spokesmen at a Corporation Commission public hearing supported the commission staff's recommendation. No one opposed it.

The production allowable cap affects fewer than 1,000 of about 29,000 producing gas wells since most wells are not capable of producing enough gas to reach the allowable limit.

PARENTAL CONTROL FOR TEEN DRIVERS BECOMES LAW

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Parents will soon be able to have a say in whether their teenagers are able to get a driver's license. That's according to Sen. Brad Henry, principal author of the bill.

"I'm very pleased that the Governor has signed **Senate Bill 1115**. This measure gives

parents an important tool for ensuring their children's responsibility and safety," said Henry, D-Shawnee.

Under Senate bill 1115, a parent will be able to file an objection with the local Department of Public Safety testing location. They would also have the ability to get a minor's driver's license revoked until age 18. A revocation would remain in effect for at least three months.

Rep. Bob Weaver co-authored the measure in the House of Representatives.

The parental control law goes into effect November 1, 1996.

TAX EQUITY BILL SIGNED INTO LAW

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Calling it a victory for Oklahoma retirees, Sen. Brad Henry, D-Shawnee, announced today that his tax equity bill has been signed into law.

Governor Frank Keating signed **HB1621** during a Tuesday afternoon ceremony at the State Capitol.

Henry is senate author of the measure which extends the same tax deductions government retirees already enjoy to the private sector.

Under HB1621, private sector retirees with Oklahoma adjusted gross income of \$25,000 or less would be allowed a deduction of retirement income of up to \$5,500. The deduction would be phased in over a five-year period. Social Security income is fully exempted.

"Married retirees filing joint returns can also take advantage of the deduction if their Oklahoma adjusted gross income was \$50,000 or less," said Henry. "They would be able to deduct a total of \$11,000."

Oklahoma retirees can begin taking advantage of the new deduction in tax year 1997, for a total of \$1,100. The amount they can deduct will increase by \$1,100 each year after that until it reaches a total of \$5,500.

TAX CREDIT DRAWS REPRESENTATIVES' IRE

■(GIT) A tax credit for companies using more than 750 million tons of coal annually caught the attention of and drew the ire of

some representatives on Wednesday, although the bill would go on to receive a passing vote.

SB911, by Rep. Larry Rice, D-Pryor, defines economically at-risk oil leases, provides an exemption from gross production and sales taxes for such leases and creates the Energy Administration Reform Task Force. While no House members voiced objections to those provisions of the bill, it was a provision inserted into the bill in conference committee that drew some representatives' ire.

The new provision allows companies which use 750 million tons of Oklahoma coal to receive a tax break equal to \$3 per ton. At present, Rice admitted during heated questioning from several representatives, only one facility in the state qualifies for that credit, which the Oklahoma Tax Commission estimated could cost the state up to \$3.6 million in revenue.

In addition, Rep. Howard Cotner, D-Altus, pointed out, the provision also allows the tax credit to be transferred or sold to practically any taxpayer in the state.

In debating against the bill, Cotner said he agreed with it in concept, but had to oppose it philosophically because of the transfer provision.

In defending his bill, Rice said the provision was added as a way to encourage coal-using companies to purchase Oklahoma coal, rather than out-of-state coal, which he said tended to be cheaper in price.

Questioned further about the provision, Rice said a similar provision allowed for the transfer of the venture capital tax credit, and that the transfer provision included in the bill was a way to further make Oklahoma coal a competitive commodity.

After the adoption of the bill's third conference committee report, the measure received a 78-20 passing vote.

BINGO BILL NARROWLY PASSES

■(GIT) Its author said it would give the little guy a break, but House opponents to a bingo proposal unsuccessfully argued on Wednesday that the measure would benefit big hall operators and lead to more corruption.

Rep. Lloyd Fields, D-McAlester, told House members that **SB899** was designed to give small bingo hall operators, particu-

larly those operating bingo halls for charities, the ability to keep their doors open. The bill allows bingo halls to use bingo cards or faces for up to five games and allows smaller halls to delay payment of bingo card taxes.

Rep. Wanda Jo Peltier, D-Oklahoma City and a long time proponent of stringent bingo regulation, questioned Fields extensively about what she claimed was his desire to give both large and small bingo operators a significant tax break, as well as the ability to dodge taxes.

The problem for small halls, Peltier said, was not that they must pay the taxes before they have the opportunity to collect revenue from the cards, but that those selling bingo cards sold them only in large lots, typically of 3,000 or 9,000 cards.

The bill, Peltier added, would encourage bingo hall operators, particularly larger ones, to try to get under the \$50,000 annual revenue limit to delay their tax payments. That would mean, she said, they would use counterfeit or out-of-state, untaxed cards in their halls.

Before bingo card taxes were collected from the distributors, Peltier explained, the taxes totaled approximately \$4.5 million. Once the taxes were paid up front when operators purchased the cards, that amount increased to \$12.5 million, she said.

Rep. Sean Voskuhl, D-Marshall, joined with Fields in urging support of the bill.

Voskuhl pointed to Covington, a small community in his district, in which the senior citizens center uses its bingo hall to support its feeding program for the elderly.

"It would be a crying shame," Voskuhl said, "if we didn't help these little towns and their senior citizens centers that help people."

Fields concluded the debate simply, saying once again that the bill was tailored to help small bingo facilities whose main goal was to support local projects.

The bill passed the House by a 51-49 vote. The bill's emergency clause, however, failed by a vote of 48-52.

HOUSE, SENATE PASS INDIAN GAS TAX BILL

■(GIT) Calling it a reasonable solution to a complex problem, state lawmakers late Thursday gave their approval to a bill designed to address the Indian motor fuel tax question.

HB2208, by Rep. Howard Cotner, D-Frederick, and Sen. Ed Long, D-Enid, was passed by both houses of the legislature. The bill is expected to be sent to the governor, who has voiced his support for the measure, on Friday.

Key provisions of the bill include:

- ✓ Procedures for the exemption for sales of motor fuel to eligible government entities, including Indian tribes, and procedures for motor fuel tax refunds for certain tax exempt users;

- ✓ Precollection of motor fuel taxes by the supplier; and

- ✓ Procedures for Indian tribes to enter into a contract with the state providing that the tribe will not challenge the constitutionality of the act and in return the state will apportion quarterly to the tribes a portion of the state motor fuel tax revenues.

Under the terms of the bill, tribes entering into a contract with the state would receive three percent of the total fuel tax revenues during fiscal year 1997; four percent in fiscal year 1998; and 4.5 percent in fiscal year 1998 and in following years.

Despite the anticipated annual appropriations to the Indian tribes, estimates from legislative staffs indicate, the state should see an increase in gas tax revenue due to increased compliance with the tax requirements.

The agreement was necessary after the US Supreme Court ruled last June that Indian tribes do not have to pay taxes on motor fuels. In the case, *Oklahoma Tax Commission v Chickasaw Nation*, the court unanimously upheld a ruling by the Tenth Circuit court of Appeals in invalidating Oklahoma's excise tax on motor fuel and diesel fuel sold by Chickasaw Nation retail stores in Indian Country, rejecting Oklahoma's argument that the proper approach to evaluate a direct state imposed tax on Indian tribes or on tribal members inside Indian Country is to employ a balancing test and weigh the relevant state and tribal interests.

Rep. Howard Cotner, D-Frederick and chief architect of the bill, and other House members described the bill as the best possible solution to what one representative said was "a sticky situation."

Some of the bill's opponents, however, claimed it would make the state a hostage to the Indian nations.

Rep. Larry Ferguson, R-Cleveland, urged the rejection of the bill's conference com-

mittee report out of what he said was concern that the governor might be veto the bill. He said he based his position on the governor's statement that the state should have the ability to audit tribe's use of the money they could receive under the terms of the bill. That provision, he said, was not specifically included in the bill.

Rep. Jim Hamilton, D-Poteau, called the agreement historic:

"This is the first time the Indian tribes have waived their sovereign immunity to enter a contract with the state of Oklahoma."

Hamilton added, "It's time to put our trust in them as they've put their trust in us by being willing to waive their sovereign immunity."

Cotner's motion to adopt the bill's second conference committee report received a 63-34 passing vote, followed by a 64-33 passing vote for the bill.

The measure then moved to the Senate.

Senate Minority Leader Gerald "Ged" Wright, R-Broken Arrow, under limited debate, said he was disappointed with the final version of the bill. He said agreements reached earlier in the day were not represented in the bill.

He cited two issues that particularly "offended" him, one being the question of whether or not the state has the right to audit tribal nations to assure agreements are being adhered to. Wright, an attorney, said such audits are perfectly legal.

"I don't understand how citizens of our state who drive our roads shouldn't have to pay for it," he said. "We've got some people in the state that aren't part of us anymore."

Sen. Cal Hobson, D-Lexington, a key figure in negotiations with tribal and state officials, said the state must respect the fact that the tribes are indeed sovereign nations.

Though he called Native Americans "probably the most persecuted race on the face of this earth," Sen. Frank Shurden, D-Henryetta, opposed the measure, saying it would destroy Oklahoma's tax base.

Shurden said the "mom and pop" gas stations across the state would be ruined as a result of the compact.

Other members offered other solutions to the bill. Sen. Don Rubottom, R-Tulsa, suggested that the matter be deferred to the Oklahoma Tax Commission for them to address on an issue-by-issue basis. He ques-

tioned the legality of the state entering into contracts for more than one year at a time, which is prohibited by state law.

Hobson assured that officials, including the Attorney General's Office, were in agreement that the compact was perfectly legal.

The bill now heads to the governor.

"This is a win-win agreement. It strengthens the ties between Oklahoma and its tribes and ensures this important funding to help the tribes and to help rural Oklahoma," Governor Frank Keating said only hours before the bill's passage.

PETTIGREW MOVES TO STOP UNNOTICED TAX SALES

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Jim and Dee Stottlemire thought it was a bad joke the evening a stranger approached them saying he had purchased their home at a sheriff's sale. During the course of the following days, their bad joke turned into painful reality.

According to recent information uncovered by Rep. Wayne Pettigrew, the Stottlemires' predicament is not an isolated incident.

"In visiting with the county treasurers of Oklahoma and Canadian counties, I discovered that as many as 20 or 30 properties are sold each year at sheriff's sales because of delinquent tax bills," the Edmond Republican said. "Yet of these sales, there is always the chance an owner may not be aware that action is being taken by the county to recover back taxes."

In response to the situation, Pettigrew, a first-term legislator, amended **Senate Bill 682** to require physical notification of the imminent sale of homestead property to be posted on the front door of the home in question at least 30 days before the sale.

Governor Keating signed the bill into law May 14.

Stottlemire says neither she, her husband nor the mortgage company which financed the house was notified of the sale until it was too late.

"Our home was literally sold from underneath us," she said. "We had paid our taxes for 1992, 1993 and 1994; the back taxes were just an oversight."

Written notice of the Stottlemire sale was published in the El Reno newspaper, a town 15 miles away, which they neither take nor read, she said. Personal correspondence of

the impending action was mailed to a post office box which they closed in 1992.

Within days, the Stottlemires found themselves out of the home she had occupied for 19 years — all for an unpaid tax bill amounting to about \$189. Adding insult to injury, their home, valued at \$45,000, was sold as sheriff's sale for \$501.

The Stottlemires are appealing the court's decision that the sheriff's sale was valid. In a separate lawsuit, the Farmers Home Administration, which financed the purchase of the house, is suing for improper notification.

Pettigrew said that although his amendment may be too late for Jim and Dee Stottlemire, it may save another family from the heartache they have experienced.

ONENET FUNDING AND EXPANSION APPROVED

■(GIT) In a decision to expand OneNet service and access statewide, the Contingency Review Board (CRB), with members consisting of Governor Frank Keating, Senate President Pro Tempore Stratton Taylor and House Speaker Glen D. Johnson, met Wednesday and approved allocating approximately \$5.8 million to further upgrade the system out of 1992 remaining capital bond monies.

Last October, the CRB voted and approved an expenditure totaling approximately \$8 million from the \$14 million Oklahoma Building Bonds Fund to upgrade OneNet (the telecommunications information network for local government and education). As a result of that approval, 33 hub sites for the network were installed across the state. With today's approval, an additional 26 to 28 hub sites will be installed.

The approval came after a recommendation by the State Data Processing and Telecommunications Advisory Committee. Rep. Calvin Anthony, D-Stillwater and co-chairman of the committee endorsed the move.

"I am excited to be adding additional hub sites for OneNet. It is particularly important to rural Oklahoma and will allow rural areas to greatly improve in the areas of education and economic development," Keating said.

To be exact, allocations of \$2,708,112

will go to enhance hub sites, \$387,859 for security, \$2,346,920 for switching and conversion and \$332,458 for other enhancements, totaling \$5,775,349.

LEGISLATIVE LEADERS AGREE ON TRANSPORTATION FUNDING

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Legislative leaders have reached a budget agreement Wednesday that will pump an additional \$28.3 million into Oklahoma roads and highways in the coming fiscal year.

"This represents one of the largest funding increases for Oklahoma roads and highways in state history," said Sen. Stratton Taylor, President Pro Tempore of the Oklahoma Senate. "Coupled with our investment in education, the transportation increase will be a great boost to Oklahoma's job creation efforts."

The agreement was announced Wednesday after several weeks of budget negotiations between House and Senate leaders.

"Every member of the Legislature, regardless of political party, has a strong commitment to improving Oklahoma's transportation system," said House Speaker Glen D. Johnson. "Any suggestion to the contrary simply is not true."

The additional transportation funding is divided into several different pieces of legislation. For example, an additional \$6.6 million was sent to the Oklahoma Department of Transportation in the general appropriations bill earlier this session. Another \$7.5 million was earmarked for rural road projects in the REAP program approved earlier this month.

The latest agreement will send another \$14.2 million to ODOT—\$11.2 for general highway maintenance and construction, an additional \$2.5 million for rural roads, \$500,000 for rural mass transit—for a total increase of \$28.3 million.

AGRICULTURE

USDA BUYS MORE THAN 4 MILLION POUNDS OF GROUND BEEF

■(WASHINGTON) Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman last week announced that the U.S. Department of Agriculture is purchasing 4.3 million pounds of bulk frozen ground beef at a delivered cost of approximately \$4.1 million. The purchases will be used for distribution in the National School Lunch Program and other federal food assistance programs.

Glickman said this purchase includes USDA beef purchases for the 1995-96 school year under Announcement LS-43, which is nearing an end. However, beef purchases will continue on a weekly basis for the 1996-97 school year.

GLICKMAN ANNOUNCES TRANSFER OF FUND TO EMERGENCY FARM LOANS

■(WASHINGTON) Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman last Friday ordered the transfer of \$16.4 million into the emergency farm loan account so that loans can continue to be made to family farmers and ranchers to help them overcome natural disasters which are affecting wide areas of the country this year. The \$16.4 million will allow the Department to make or guarantee \$56 million of emergency loans.

"The emergency loan fund was exhausted this year for the first time," Glickman said. "All \$109.3 million that was available was loaned out with nearly five months left in the fiscal year. To meet this unusually heavy demand, I have exercised the Secretary's emergency transfer authority to move funds that otherwise would not have been used from the Conservation Reserve Program to the Emergency Loan Program.

"These additional funds should be sufficient to take care of loan applications on

hand and those expected by the end of the fiscal year in September. Ample funding will be left for any needs that might arise in the Conservation Reserve Program."

At latest count, 2,260 of the nation's 3,218 counties had been designated as disaster areas, and designation requests for another 317 counties were being considered. Since last summer, most states have suffered from drought, flooding, unseasonable freezes or other weather disasters.

Family farmers and ranchers in designated counties are eligible for low-interest loans from the Farm Service Administration to help them recover from the disasters.

The most severely affected states are in the southwest, especially in the winter wheat region. Much of this year's wheat crop has dried up from lack of moisture and the harvest is expected to be seriously affected. Other states, in the midwest and elsewhere, have had excessive rain, often accompanied by severe storms, and spring freezes that damaged fruit and vegetable crops.

DOE APPROVES SALES OF MORE THAN 1 MILLION BARRELS OF STRATEGIC PETROLEUM RESERVE CRUDE OIL

■(WASHINGTON) The U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) last Friday completed its second sales cycle for Strategic Petroleum Reserve crude oil, approving offers from three companies to purchase nearly 1.1 million barrels of oil.

DOE decided to end the second cycle Friday when the latest round of "best and finals" did not produce additional offers that met the Government's acceptable price threshold. Last Wednesday, the Department said that three bids met the price requirements and that the agency hoped to attract additional acceptable offers by extending the bid cycle another day.

The oil is part of approximately 12 million barrels being offered to the market following President Clinton's April 29 directive to begin the oil sale. Last week's sale brought more than \$21 million in revenue to the Government, approximately one-tenth of the \$227 million that Congress — as part of the recent 1996 budget agreement — directed be obtained from selling oil from the

Government's 587-million-barrel emergency oil stockpile.

The crude oil will be sold to Basis Petroleum Inc. (formerly Phibro Energy USA), Houston, Texas; Exxon Company USA, Houston; and Coastal States Trading Inc., Houston.

CLINTON NAMES JEANNE GIVENS TO THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE INSTITUTE OF AMERICAN INDIAN AND ALASKA NATIVE CULTURE AND ARTS DEVELOPMENT

■(WASHINGTON) The President last Friday announced his intent to nominate Jeanne Givens to the Board of Trustees of the Institute of American Indian and Alaska Native Culture and Arts Development.

Jeanne Givens of Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, is a member of the Coeur d'Alene Tribe and was the first Native American woman elected to the Idaho House of Representatives in 1984 and 1986. She was appointed by Idaho Governor John Evans to serve on the Idaho Humanities Council from 1980 to 1984.

The Board of Trustees of the Institute of American Indian and Alaska Native Culture and Arts Development is responsible for the direction and control of the Institute of American Indian Arts. The mission of the Institute is to promote the preservation and development of American Indian and Alaska Native arts and culture through programs of education and outreach to students, tribal communities and the public. The Institute is the only educational institution in the World devoted solely to the study and practice of the artistic and cultural traditions of all American Indians.

INHOFE RATES AMONG BEST IN FISCAL RESPONSIBILITY

■(WASHINGTON) U.S. Senator James M. Inhofe, R-Oklahoma, ranks near the top of the U.S. Senate in fiscal responsibility, according to a detailed legislative analysis prepared by the non-partisan National Taxpayers Union. Only seven out of 100 senators ranked better than Inhofe in the NTU's an-

nual report which adds up the total spending proposed in every bill which is sponsored or co-sponsored by each member of Congress.

"I am very proud of my efforts to save taxpayers money and keep government spending in check," Inhofe said. "Few things are more important than getting control of runaway federal spending. Oklahomans didn't send me to Washington to run up the national credit card and increase the national debt. They sent me to help balance the budget, reduce the size of government and restore fiscal responsibility. I take this mandate seriously because it is right for America's future."

The NTU's annual "BillTally" report is a comprehensive evaluation of the cost implications of all the bills which members of Congress either propose or support which affect federal spending. This year's report covered 346 Senate bills introduced from January 1995 through February 1996, and co-sponsored through April 16, 1996. For each member of Congress, the NTU added up the cost estimates for all the bills that a member sponsored and co-sponsored. It then reported that totals of how much each members had proposed to increase spending and to decrease spending. By subtracting the proposed decreases from the increases, it determined the net spending impact of each member's legislative proposals.

The report showed that Inhofe had supported over \$27 billion in total spending reductions and only about \$9 billion in in-

creases. His almost \$18 billion in net spending reductions was eighth best in the entire Senate. At the other end of the scale was one senator who had proposed net spending increases of over \$45 billion.

NATIONAL HEALTH EXPENDITURES, 1994

■(WASHINGTON) The National health expenditures rose to \$949.4 billion in 1994, a 6.4 percent increase from 1993, the Health Care Financing Administration reported. In 1994, health spending amounted to a stated average of \$3,510 per person, \$179 more than in the previous year.

The 1994 increase in health expenditures was the slowest growth rate recorded in more than three decades. Between 1988 and 1992, double digit and near double digit growth occurred in aggregate health care spending. However, health expenditure growth slowed to 7 percent in 1993 and 6.4 percent in 1994.

Slower growth in health spending, combined with healthy growth in the gross domestic product (GDP), led to only a small increase in health care spending as a share of GDP: from 13.6 percent in 1993 to 13.7 percent in 1994. GDP is the total value of goods and services produced in the United States.

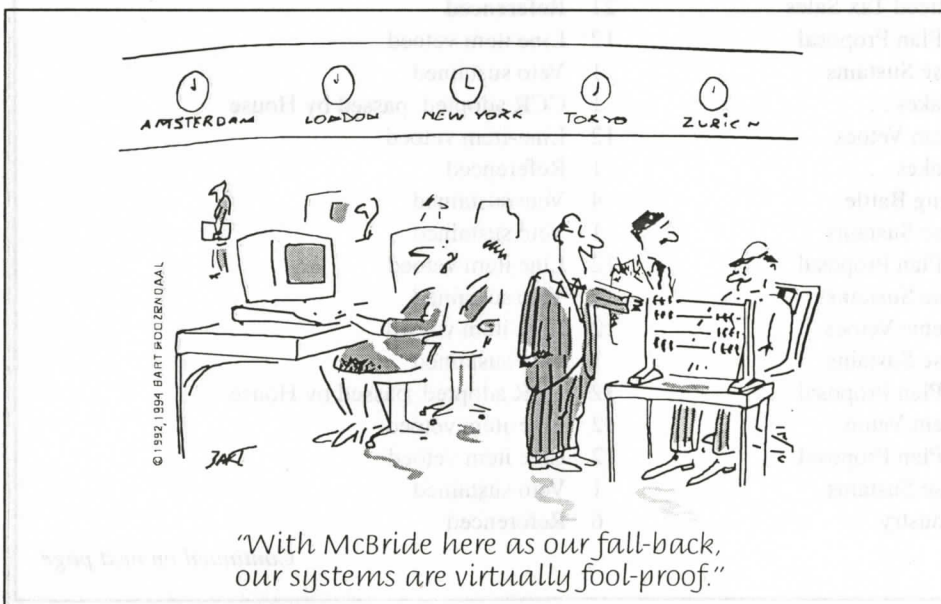

Limiting participation could result in less than accurate and complete recommendations for resolution of the problem to be addressed.

HB2408 Principal Author(s): Beutler, Randy; Harrison, J. Berry; Modifies language relating to Rural Water, Sewer, Gas, and Solid Waste Management Districts Act.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: (05/22/96) This is to advise you that on this date, pursuant to the authority vested in me, I have VETOED HB2408. This exception to the nepotism laws would send a wrong message to the citizens of this state. Every effort is being made to instill confidence in the quality and integrity of government employees. Once one exception is made, although it is probably well intentioned, there would be the inescapable potential for opening the floodgates for other exceptions, equally well intentioned. If not strictly adhered to, our nepotism laws could become meaningless. Creating exceptions to nepotism laws sends the wrong message.

HB2483 Principal Author(s): Leist, M.C.; Shurden, Frank; Updates language pertaining to the powers of the State Board of Agriculture. (05/28/96) Governor Action - Veto

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: (05/28/96) This is to advise you that on this date, pursuant to the authority vested in me, I have VETOED HB2483, because the Oklahoma State Board of Agriculture may promulgate rules pursuant to the Administrative Procedures Act to accomplish the apparent purpose of the statutory amendments contained in this bill. Such rules could be more sensitive to individual case by case needs resulting in less restriction on the growth of the agriculture industry in Oklahoma.

HB2621 (05/07/96) Principal Author(s): Dickerson, Larry; Paulk, William; Enacts the State Employees Fair Labor Relations Act. 05/07/96, Governor Action - Veto.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: (05/08/96) This is to advise you that on this date, pursuant to the authority vested in me, I have VETOED HB2621. It has been necessary on more than one occasion for me to Veto provisions of law which grant individual private entities special privileges not available to all private entities. HB2621 grants the right to use state property for non-state purposes by a non-governmental entity.

Such requirement violates constitutional restrictions. Currently, there exists private entities that have state employee members and that appear and lobby for state employees. State employees can join or no, and participate or not as they choose. By this action a state employee will not be prevented from participating in these or other types of private organizations.

HB2707 Principal Author(s): Monson, Angela; Roberts, Larry D.; States that prior to Jan. 1, 1997 the Board of Trustees of the Oklahoma Public Employees Retirement System shall establish rules and procedures enabling any participating employer to also participate in the Oklahoma Public Employees Deferred Compensation Plan; restricts multiple deferred compensation plans.; Effective Date: 07/01/96 Emergency. 04/23/96, Governor Action - Veto.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: (04/23/96) This is to advise you that on this date pursuant to the authority vested in me, I have VETOED HB2707. This bill places an unnecessarily restrictive limit on the ability of local governmental entities to participate in deferred compensation plans. In addition, there is an additional cost to the Oklahoma Public Employees Retirement System which has not been contemplated in the submitted proposed budget placed.

HB2822 Principal Author(s): Hamilton, James E.; Haney, Enoch Kelly; Hobson, Cal; Steidley, Dwayne; Authorizes the Department of Corrections to spend \$1,000,000 of the interest earned from investment of the proceeds of specified bonds for the payment of specified infrastructure repairs.; Emergency. 04/01/96, Governor Action - Line Item Veto.

GOVERNOR'S (LINE ITEM) VETO MESSAGE: (04/01/96) This is to advise you that on this date pursuant to the authority vested in me, I have VETOED one section in HB2822 because the item in this bill appropriating funds for "...addressing additional needs in the Appellate Program..." lacks sufficient details to support the amount stated. The item vetoed is found in Section 14 of the bill.

HB2982 Principal Author(s): Cain, Bernest; Thomas, Tommy Abolishes the Oklahoma Basic Health Benefits Board. Transfers authority of OK Basic Health Benefits Board to the Oklahoma Health Care Authority after July 1, 1996. Provides for membership of the Oklahoma Health Care Authority Board.; Effective Date: 09/01/96. 04/29/96 Governor Action - Veto

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: (04/29/96) This is to advise you that, pursuant to the powers vested in me, I have VETOED HB2982. This bill fails to address the problem of the violation of Section 1 of Article IV of the Oklahoma Constitution. The current law provides for a majority of legislative appointment to an executive board which performs administrative duties. This bill does not correct that constitutional infirmity.

SB694 Principal Author(s): Easley, Kevin, Hutchison, Joe J.; Adds county boards and public trust authorities to provisions allowing dual office holding. 05/29/96 Governor Action - Veto.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: (05/29/96) This is to advise you that, pursuant to the authority vested

in me, I have VETOED SB694. This exception to the legal prohibition against dual office holding as with the nepotism exceptions would send a wrong message to the citizens of this state. Every effort should be made to instill confidence in the quality and integrity of government employees. Allowing municipal officers and school board members to also sit on county boards and public trust authorities could create potential conflicts to the detriment of local governmental entities. The integrity of local governmental entities must be preserved.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: (05/01/96) This is to advise you that, pursuant to the powers vested in me, I have VETOED SB987. The procedure provided for in this bill creates an exception, applicable only to the Department of Transportation, to the safeguards relating to the bidding process in this State. The awarding of multi-million tax dollar contracts by a state agency is a serious responsibility which must be carefully regulated and monitored. It is in the best interest of the citizens and taxpayers of this state to keep in place all procedures which assure an equitable and ethical bidding process.
