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Special session on hold, Governor and legislative leaders say

■(GIT) The Oklahoma State Legislature will not enter into a special session, the governor and legislative leaders said Monday. Originally scheduled for Tuesday, Jan. 9, the session was intended to free up money from the state's rainy day account to temporarily fund several state agencies that receive federal funding.

"We have been in contact with various sources and have determined the immediate financial crisis facing several state agencies which receive federal funds has been averted," said Gov. Frank Keating. "Therefore there is no need for a special session at this time, but we will continue to monitor the situation very closely."

One state agency, the Oklahoma Employment Securities Commission (OESC), has been funded through a targeted continuing resolution from the U.S. Congress. Totally subsidized by federal funds, the commission's unemployment insurance division will continue to function.

"We have been provided with funding through Sept. 30, which is the end of our fiscal year," said OESC Deputy Director Dave Murrie. "If there was to be a special session, it would not apply to the OESC."

Murrie said, while the state's unemployment checks will be secure, the commission's veteran's employment services and the bureau of labor statistics will only be funded through Jan. 26., pending a federal budget agreement.

Also slated for emergency state funding, the Department of Rehabilitative Services, is in line for temporary federal funding as well, though department officials Monday could not definitely confirm those reports.

"We are waiting for our sources in Washington to confirm that fact," said the department's Public Information Officer, Jody Harlan. "We're cautiously optimistic."

Harlan said the department has funds available through a previous continuing resolution, but due to furloughed federal employees, the funds could not be transferred.

"We have enough funds to pay our Jan. 15 payroll and meet our January obligations to our vendors," she said. "We are hopeful of receiving clearance from Washington to be able to draw down more funds."

The department receives 78 percent of its funding from the federal government. It oversees educational and training services for disabled Oklahomans.

Legislative leaders said they are confident the agencies will be able to sustain operations while federal budget negotiations continue. "The Legislature stands ready to convene a special session at any time if it is necessary to keep state employees and Oklahomans eligible to receive federal benefits from being adversely affected by the federal government shutdown," said House Speaker Glen Johnson, D-Okemah. Should the Legislature call itself into special session, it is likely to be only a one day affair.

Prior to the adjournment of the most recent legislative session, members entered into an extraordinary session to address last minute appropriation measures. Constitutionally, when-

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ever the Legislature is called into special session to address an appropriation measure, it must be in session for at least five days. Since the Legislature never officially adjourned from the session, it is possible for any further appropriation measures to be addressed quickly.

"We are relieved there will not have to be a special session," said Senate President Pro Temore Stratton Taylor, D-Claremore. "The Oklahoma Employment Securities Commission and the Department of Rehabilitative Services appear to be in line for the funding necessary to keep them operating."

Prefiled bill to tax municipalities real-estate

■(GIT) "Municipalities that own land outside their counties should have to pay some kind of taxes," said Rep. Joe Hutchison, D-Jay, author of HB 2069, requiring municipalities owning real-estate outside of their counties to pay ad valorem taxes equal to similar land located within the county.

Hutchison said people in his district cannot build within 10 acres of the lake in their area. "Lake Eucha, (located in Delaware County), has a buffer zone around it. People cannot build within 10 acres of the lake," said Hutchison. "I want a compromise so that people can build nearer to the lake if they want to," he said.

However, Danny George, assistant executive director for the Oklahoma Municipal League, said cities and towns are prohibited from paying property tax.

"School, county or city owned property is exempt from paying ad valorem tax," he said. "It doesn't make sense for one government entity to tax another."

George said he believes this idea of taxing property owned by municipalities came from a recommendation from the Governor's Performance Team that suggested school property be taxed.

"Cities have to sometimes go outside their boundaries to retain a clean and adequate water supply mandated by the government," he said. "This property is used to supply water to Oklahoma citizens."

"The cost of the tax would ultimately go directly to the people, which if the legislation is passed, could end up costing taxpayers across the state millions of dollars," George said.

George said Hutchison only singles out municipalities. "In order to access water, the taxpayers would end up paying more than they already do," he said, referring to set recreational-type taxes.

George said this is a conflict between public and private entities that would benefit only a few

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"Does everyone want a tax increase, so a few individuals can own land," he said.

Jim East, assistant to the mayor of Tulsa, said he was not sure want Hutchison wanted to accomplish by the legislation. "We need to do more research on the issue. However, Tulsa has always acted as a good corporate citizen, ensuring high quality water," he said. "Southeastern Oklahoma also needs to ensure a high quality in water to attract economic development."

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Gov. Frank Keating and Dr. Leo E. Presley, executive director of the Oklahoma Department of Commerce, announced Monday that the city of Seminole is the recipient of a Community Development Block Grant - Economic Development Infrastructure Financing (CDBG-EDIF) grant and loan award totaling \$972,022. \$486,011 will be in the form of a grant and \$486,011 will be in the form of a loan.

The award will be used to construct five water wells and necessary improvements to support the expansion of Wrangler, Inc., in Seminole. Wrangler will become a regional distribution facility for denim work and casual clothing. Presley said the combination grant/loan award will permit Wrangler, Inc. to expand their labor forces by approximately 150 positions over the next 24 months.

"This combination CDBG-EDIF grant and loan will help support Oklahoma's continuing commitment to manufacturers that produce value added products and enhance the state's economic climate," said Presley, whose commerce department manages the federally funded CDBG-EDIF program in the state. Additional funding for the project will be provided by Wrangler, Inc., and the city of Seminole.

The CDBG-EDIF program helps eligible cities, towns, and counties with the financing of infrastructure improvements that support business expansions and start-ups. The purpose of the program is to stimulate long-term job creation and investment that primarily benefits persons defined as low and moderate income.

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Three Oklahoma City companies have been recommended by city staff to design the \$15.4 million bricktown Canal and to perform a major drainage study is to prepare for the eventual dams that will retain water and create a riverwalk as part of the \$285 million Metropolitan Area Projects plan.

Clowers Engineering Co. and Johnson Associates of Oklahoma City were selected by a three-member panel of city staff to design the \$106 million north and \$3.5 million south sections of the canal, which will wind its way through the Bricktown entertainment district, past the Ballpark at Bricktown and down to the river itself.

RGDC Inc. of Oklahoma City was chosen to perform a major study of on the effects placing three to four dams on the river will have on Oklahoma City's drainage system. RGDC is more than familiar with the river, having performed other studies on it for the Oklahoma City Riverfront Development Authority.

First licenses revoked for non-payment of child support

■(LAWTON) Oklahoma's first license revocations for failure to pay child support were made Friday in Lawton when five parents lost their driver licenses for not supporting their children.

In separate hearings at the Great Plains Child Support Office in Lawton, an administrative law judge issued driver license revocation orders against Richard Alt, Michael Baldwin and Todd Tillotson, all of Lawton; Gary Frizzell, Stillwater; and Timothy Huff, Sapulpa.

Paula Wood, administrator of Child Support Enforcement Division, Department of Human Services, said these were the first revocations made under a new law approved by the last Legislature and which went into effect Nov. 1.

"In November, we sent letters to more than 36,000 parents who were not paying monthly, court-ordered child support and informed them they were facing loss of driver license, professional license and any license issued by the state," Wood said.

"We are in the process of serving more than 250 non-paying parents with legal documents advising them of a date at which to appear before a judge to show cause why their license should not be revoked," Wood said.

She said CSED collections since the license revocation law went into effect have increased by \$1.4 million.

"These are cases in which the noncustodial parent had not made a payment in the previous 60 days. Not all of the increase is attributable to the license revocation law, but it has had a large impact," said Wood.

Oklahoma's Legislature has aided in child support enforcement efforts by providing stronger enforcement tools, including the remedy of revoking licenses. Another of these new enforcement tools allows district attorneys to file felony charges against a non-paying parent instead of civil charges.

"There have been several large past-due child support collections in recent months after our child support offices referred cases to the criminal divisions of local district attorney offices," Wood said.

Use of criminal charges has resulted in arrests, prosecutions, convictions and sentences of up to four years for parents who fail to provide support for their children.

Other parents facing criminal charges decided to pay past due support. Payments received by CSED offices include Stillwater, a \$20,000 payment; Tulsa, a \$16,000 payment; Norman, an \$11,000 payment and a \$29,000 payment; Wewoka, a \$2,500 payment; Sayre, payments of \$3,000, \$2,500 and \$1,100.

"We will continue to refer cases to the criminal division of the district attorney's offices and to request courts revoke licenses for those parents who fail to support their children," Wood said.

President signs sixth continuing resolution

■(WASHINGTON) "I signed into law H.R. 1643, the Sixth Continuing Resolution for fiscal 1996, which puts all Federal workers back on the job with pay from December 16 until January 26 and also funds a limited number of Federal activities until September 30, 1996.

This bill is a step in the right direction — but only a step. It does not end the partial shutdown of the Federal Government that continues to seriously impair the activities of the Departments of Commerce, Education, Health and Human Services, Housing and Urban Development, Interior, Justice, Labor, State, and Veterans Affairs; the Environmental Protection Agency; the National Aeronautics and Space Administration; the Small Business Administration; and many smaller agencies.

Most importantly, H.R. 1643 enables Federal workers to return to the job and to be paid — both the 480,000 who have been working without pay and the 280,000 furloughed workers.

The bill also funds a limited number of Federal functions for the rest of fiscal 1996. They include nutrition services for the elderly; grants to States for child welfare services; Federal Parent Locator Service activities; State unemployment insurance administration activities; general welfare assistance payments and foster care payments to Indians; the Federal subsidy to the rail industry pension and certain other expenses of the Railroad Retirement Board; visitor services of the national Park System, National Wildlife Refuges, National Forests, Smithsonian Institution, National Gallery of Art, John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, and United States Holocaust Memorial; and State Department visa, passport, and U.S. citizen services. In addition, family support payments to States and payments to States for foster care and adoption assistance are provided through March 15, 1996.

The bill ensures, through Sept. 30, 1996, benefit payments to about 3.3 million veterans and their survivors. It also provided for payments to contractors of the Veterans Health Administration for services related to the health and safety of patients in Veterans Affairs medical facilities.

the measure provides authority for the District of Columbia to continue full operations, using District funds, through Sept. 30, thereby extending the authority provided by the Fifth Continuing Resolution for fiscal 1996, which expires Jan. 25. Regrettably, the measure contains an objectionable provision that would single out poor women by prohibiting the use of District funds for providing abortion services. I oppose including this provision in the regular fiscal 1996 District of Columbia appropriations bill, and I urge the Congress to send that bill to me — in a form I can sign — as soon as possible.

The measure also provides for reimbursement to States for State funds used to implement Federal programs and to pay furloughed State employees whose compensation is advanced or reimbursed, in whole or in part, by the Federal Government during any 1996 lapse in appropriations and it makes interest payable on the State funds that were used.

The problem with this bill is in what it does not do. It does not end the inconvenience, if not suffering, that millions of Americans continue to experience because of the partial government shutdown. It does not provided funds to help put 100,000 more police officers on the streets of U.S. cities; funds for Head Start; funds for the States for social services and job training; funds to help U.S. businesses with export financing; and funds to continue the Space Station program and other key initiatives at the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. Nor does the bill provide needed funds for contracts vital to protecting the environment."

President signs House Resolution 1358

■(WASHINGTON) "I have signed into law H.R. 1358, the seventh Continuing Resolution for fiscal 1996, which provides funds for a long list of Federal activities through Sept. 30.

This continuing resolution builds upon H.R. 1643, which I signed earlier, and put all Federal workers back on the job with pay from Dec. 16 to Jan. 26 and provided funding for a limited list of Federal activities.

This bill provides full-year funding for allowances to Peace Corps volunteers, their spouses and minor children; activities, including administrative expenses, needed to process single-family mortgage loans and refinancing for low-income and moderate-income families; projects and activities directly related to the security of U.S. diplomatic posts and facilities abroad; the Federal Emergency Management Agency's emergency food and shelter program; retirement pay and medical benefits for Public Health Service Commissioned Officers, payments under the Retired Serviceman's Family Protection Plan and Survivor Benefit Plan and for medical care of dependents and retired personnel, and payments to the Social Security trust funds, which the Secretary of Health and Human Services deemed necessary because of Commissioned Officer pay raises; and projects and certain activities of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Drug Enforcement Administration, Organized Crime Drug Enforcement, Federal Prison System, U.S. Attorneys, U.S. Marshals Service, Support of U.S. Prisoners, Fees and Expenses of Witnesses, Immigration and Naturalization Service, and the Executive Office of Immigration Review.

Also funded are projects and activities of the Judiciary; Health Care Financing Administration State surveys and certifications; trade adjustment assistance benefits and North American Free Trade Act benefits; payments to health care trust funds; expenses of Medicare contractors; grants to States for Medicaid contractors; grants to States for Medicaid; the general business loan guaranty program and section 504 certified development company program; surety bond guarantees revolving fund; visitor services on public lands managed by the Bureau of Land Management; disease control, research, and training; Indian self-determination and self-governance projects and activities of tribes or tribal organizations; expenses of the Kendall Demonstration Elementary School and the Model Secondary School for the Deaf; and payments for benefits and interest on advances, and expenses of operation and administration, for black lung disabilities and disabled coal miners.

This measure also extends, from December 31, 1995, to June 30, 1996, the Yavapai-Prescott Indian Tribe Water Rights Settlement Act of 1994 and extends the San Carlos Apache Tribe Water Rights Settlement Act of 1992 from December 31, 1995, to December 31, 1996. The bill also includes fisheries related provisions.

Even with H.R. 1643 and H.R. 1358 in place, however, the Congress has not funded significant activities covered by the six appropriations bills that not enacted. The Congress has not provided funds to help put 100,000 more police officers on the streets of our communities; funds for the States for social services and job training; funds for Head Start; funds to help U.S. businesses with export financing; funds to help the Environmental Protection Agency enforce environmental laws; and funds to continue the Shuttle program and other key initiatives at the National Aeronautics and Space Administration."

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Many people who don't hunt or fish, and even some that do, think that the Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation is funded by general state tax revenues. That's the perception but the reality is that the Wildlife Department, even though it is a state agency, receives no Legislative appropriations. It is funded by hunters, anglers and other wildlife enthusiasts through hunting and fishing license fees, revenue from product sales, and to some degree, direct donations from generous citizens and corporations. "On behalf of every sportsman and wildlife enthusiast in Oklahoma, I want to thank everyone who contributed money, land or materials to the Wildlife Department in 1995," said Greg Duffy, Department Director. "It would be impossible to list every individual, sportsman's organization or company that donated something to the Department but we do want them to know that their gift is appreciated and will be put to good use."

Duffy said that the Department receives donations in many forms, from \$10 anonymous donations to \$100 memorials to thousands of acres of land.

"The Wildlife Department is very fortunate that the people Department employees work for, the hunters, anglers, and wildlife enthusiasts of the state, care very deeply about wildlife populations and habitat," Duffy said. "The gifts we receive go to enhance and protect Oklahoma's great wildlife legacy, a legacy that owes its very existence to the people who care so deeply about it."

In 1995, The Wildlife Department received more than \$65,000 in direct donations from sportsmen's organizations, private citizens, memorials and corporate contributions. The Department's Nongame Wildlife Program received another \$12,000 in direct donations (fund earmarked for the Nongame Program) from around 100 individuals and corporations and almost \$90,000 from more than 12,000 contributors through the Nongame Program's check-off on state tax forms.

The contributions don't stop there, though. The Department also received a number of generous corporate contributions in 1995. Those contributions included funding for habitat conservation efforts and donations of materials and supplies to be used in developing wildlife habitat.

"Many of our habitat development efforts at our wildlife management areas have been helped by corporate donations of materials and money," said Duffy. "I think that's a really positive statement about these companies' attitudes toward wildlife and wildlife resources. They should be ap-

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plauded for their actions." The Oklahoma Wildlife Habitat Donor Program is another example of how private citizens contribute to the conservation of wildlife habitat. Through the program, people who donate \$5 receive a Habitat Conservation Patch and people who donate \$10 receive an American-made hat with the patch attached. All funds received through the Habitat Donor Program are earmarked for acquiring public hunting and fishing access. Oklahoma sportsmen contributed more than \$30,000 to this program during the last fiscal year.

Duffy said the Department also received more than 3,000 acres of land in 1995 from individuals. "Places where the public can go to hunt, fish and enjoy wildlife will always be important," he said. "The land donations we received last year are special because they will remain forever as a lasting legacy to the extreme generosity some have for wildlife."

Brown trout fair game at Mountain Fork River

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Thanks to stocking efforts by the Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation and new regulations that took effect Jan. 1, trout anglers fishing in the Lower Mountain Fork River designated trout area now have the opportunity to catch, and keep, a brown trout.

The Wildlife Department began stocking brown trout in the Lower Mountain Fork in 1991. Biologists were hopeful that the trout would grow and eventually reproduce. So far the overall growth rate for the browns has been a good 1/2 inch per month. Although reproduction has not yet been confirmed, biologists are still hopeful that it will take place within the next few years.

"Brown trout are well-known for their savvy and fighting ability," said Barry Bolton, assistant chief of fisheries for the Wildlife Department. "They are considered by many to be one of the most desirable fish species that inhabits fresh water and anglers can now fish for them right here in Oklahoma."

There is a 20-inch minimum size limit on brown trout at the Lower Mountain Fork and anglers are allowed to keep one brown per day.

Anyone fishing in the designated trout area must possess a trout license, no exceptions. Anglers also should remember that the use of bait or barbed hooks is prohibited from the State Park Dam downstream to the reregulation dam.

Free bird nest boxes available

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Phillips Petroleum Foundation, Inc. and the Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation's Project WILD are again teaming up to offer free bird nesting boxes to Project WILD trained educators.

The Birdbox Program provides easy-to-assemble nest boxes made of wax impregnated cardboard which are designed to last one nesting season. Distribution of nest boxes to Project WILD trained educators will begin January 29, 1996, and continue through April 19, 1996.

A summary form for educators to use in compiling their students' results is included in each classroom set along with a nesting report form which is to be copied and distributed to students. Each set of nest boxes also includes an Oklahoma Nesting Birds poster.

The Birdbox Program, now in its seventh year, has distributed more than 40,000 nest boxes to educators in Oklahoma and almost 134,000 have been sent to educators outside the state. The boxes are available nationally for purchase with out-of-state orders being handled throughout the year.

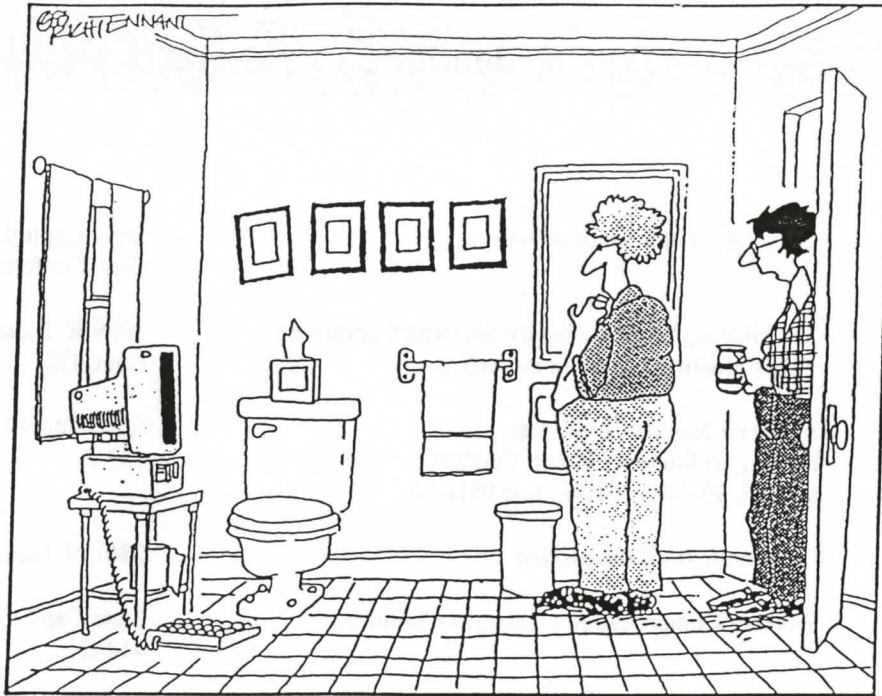
