OFFICIALS REACT TO TANNEHILL VERDICT

■(GIT) In an unusual move, two top state officials commented on the acquittal Thursday of a defendant in a criminal trial.

After nearly 10 hours of deliberations, an eight-woman, four-man jury in McAlester acquitted 33-year-old Larry Tannehill of first-degree murder in the March 5, 1995, child abuse death of two-year-old Ryan Luke, resulting in harsh comments from Oklahoma's governor and attorney general.

"Like most Oklahomans," Governor Frank Keating said, "I am shocked at the verdict delivered today. This murder should never have happened and this verdict merely compounds an already terrible tragedy.

"Child abuse crimes such as this should never be permitted to recur in today's society," the governor added. "Society must have a no tolerance attitude toward any crime which victimizes and murders innocent children. Individuals who commit these heinous crimes must be swiftly identified, prosecuted and executed, however, that did not happen in this case and that is wrong.

"If the defendant didn't murder Ryan Luke, then who did?" Keating also asked. "Unfortunately today's verdict will do nothing

more than to continue to erode the public's confidence in the judicial system and for that I am angered."

Attorney General Drew Edmondson, who appointed Muskogee County assistant district attorney Janet Bickel to prosecute the case, said, "I am obviously disappointed by the jury's verdict in the Ryan Luke murder case. I commend Janet Bickel for conducting a vigorous prosecution. The jury apparently found that there was

reasonable doubt as to the guilt of Larry Tannehill. I disagree with the result, but acknowledge that our system provided him a fair trial."

The toddler's death drew statewide at-

tention and is considered the catalyst for **HB2053**, a child abuse prevention measure authored by Norman Democrat Laura Boyd.

Bickel would have sought the death penalty for Tannehill had he been convicted. It was Tannehill, Bickel claimed, that struck the blow that ultimately proved to be fatal to the two-year-old toddler. Bickel based much of her case on circumstantial evidence, such as the time Tannehill had spent in the company of only the two-year-old Luke and his own then-five-year-old biological son, as well as testimony from Tannehill's son that his father had "hurt" the toddler.

Tannehill's attorneys accused Ryan Luke's mother, Wendy Luke, of being responsible for the child's death. Tannehill also testified, telling jurors he did not kill the child and that he loved the toddler like he was his own son. Tannehill also raised the question

LUKE BILL BACKED UP, DELAYED AGAIN

Author Comments on Tannehill Acquittal

■(GIT) It will now be Tuesday before the House considers the so-called Ryan Luke child abuse prevention bill, its House author said on Thursday.

Rep. Laura Boyd, D-Norman, said the

additional one day delay was necessary so that a provision could be added to the bill to address some recently raised concerns about its costs.

Boyd said a new conference committee report, which will be released Monday, will make the

bill's continuing monitoring provision dependent on the availability of funding.

A House fiscal analysis indicated **HB2053** will cost approximately \$370,000 per year to implement, while a Department of Human services estimate puts the cost of implementation at \$1.4 million. The DHS estimate included the addition of 20 social workers and four supervisors to the DHS staff.

Boyd has called the DHS analysis inaccurate, noting, "We realize that DHS needs more caseworkers, and we're working on that. But their last estimate — that another

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of whether it was the child's mother who might be responsible for his death.

In a February plea bargain with Bickel, Wendy Luke pleaded guilty to first-degree manslaughter for failing to seek medical attention for her son the day before he died and agreed to testify against Tannehill, as well as her father, Don Luke, who faces a second-degree manslaughter charge in his grandson's death.

Following the child's death last year, the governor asked the Department of Human Services to provide a full report on its handling of the case. Accusations that the child had been abused first arose in January, 1995, leading to a child abuse investigation and then a hearing that gave Don Luke physical custody of the child. Although specific details of the report were not released because of confidentiality requirements, the department and the governor said the case was properly handled.

Luke's death also resulted in a grand jury investigation in Pittsburg County last year. As the jury, led by Bickel, neared the conclusion of its investigation, District Attorney Don Roberts and Assistant District Attorney Ron Boyer resigned from the district attorney's office. The grand jury also indicted and filed an accusation for ouster against Pittsburg County Sheriff Don Hass. The indictments and ouster petition focused on issues unrelated to the Luke case and were later dropped.

The grand jury also made a series of recommendations concerning the handling of child abuse cases, many of which are included in Boyd's HB2053.

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REVERSE CERTIFICATION CLAUSE MAY COME OUT

■(GIT) The so-called "Reverse Certification" bill by Sen. Robert M. Kerr, D-Altus,

may change, becoming less restrictive, in the next week. The bill, **SB1184**, contains a provision that would allow 13 to 15 year-olds to be tried as adults in criminal cases, unless the court opts to try them as juveniles. Currently, juvenile offenders must be certified as adults before being tried as such. Kerr said the bill will be sent to conference some time next week, where he will consider removing the provision.

The Oklahoma Juvenile Affairs Board is opposed to the reverse certification provision. At a recent meeting, the board passed a resolution opposing any legislation involving the reverse certification of 13 to 15 year

olds, except in cases of first degree murder, which is current law.

"We have a great deal of concern about a bunch of 13 year-olds being in the Department of Corrections," said Dawn Byram, spokesperson for the Office of Juvenile Affairs (OJA). "What is DOC going to do with a bunch of 13 and 14 year-olds?"

Byram said, because OJA is a treatment-based system, she questions if the state prison system is the best place for young offenders who are "amenable to treatment."

Voicing similar thoughts, DOC spokesman Jerry Massie, said mixing juveniles with adult offenders is cause for concern.

"We are concerned about having very young people in with our general population," he said. "It is probably better that the juvenile system be equipped to handle those kids in a secure environment."

Massie said only about 100 of the nearly 7000 prisoners received by DOC last year were under 18 years old.

He suggests, like other states, placing juvenile offenders who reach the age of 18

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24 caseworkers and supervisors are needed besides what we're already negotiating plus their existing vacancies — was just excessive."

The conflicting schedules of the House and Senate also contributed to Boyd's delay in bringing the bill before the House. Boyd first asked on Wednesday that the bill's conference committee report be rejected and that it be returned to committee for further consideration. Soon after making that motion, however, Boyd withdrew it.

She made the motion again on Thursday and received unanimous consent for the action. However, the Senate had already adjourned for the day, making a similar action in that house of the legislature impossible.

Boyd said the request will be made of the Senate on Monday and that the conferees have already agreed to the proposed change.

That, she added, means the bill should be before the House on Tuesday.

In a related development, a Pittsburg County jury acquitted Larry Tannehill of first-degree murder in the death of two-year-old Ryan Luke. It was the death of the toddler that led Boyd and other members of the

legislature to propose the child abuse measure.

Upon learning of the verdict, Boyd said she was not surprised, particularly after hearing one of two alternate jurors say they believed Tannehill's testimony to be sincere and because of the speed with which the child's mother had agreed to a plea bargain.

The child's mother, Wendy Luke, agreed in February to plead guilty to first-degree manslaughter and to testify against Tannehill and her father, Don Luke, in exchange for a 30-year prison sentence.

Her father faces a second-degree manslaughter charge in the case.

In her testimony, Wendy Luke accused Tannehill, her former boyfriend, of being the one responsible for striking the blow that resulted in her son's death. Tannehill testified that he believed Wendy was responsible for the child's death and that she was trying to frame him for the murder.

Tannehill and special prosecutor Janet Bickel both cried as the verdict was read. Bickel said she was devastated by the verdict, adding, "I will always believe that Larry Tannehill killed Ryan Luke."

OKLAHOMA AFDC ROLLS CONTINUE TO DROP

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) March figures released by the Oklahoma Department of Human Services show Oklahoma's Aid to Families with Dependent Children program caseload dropped 1.7 percent from February and 14 percent from March one year ago, a state official has said.

"We hope these are good signs that there really is improvement in the Oklahoma economy and that more citizens who once needed help are finding jobs and becoming self-sufficient," said DHS Director George S. Miller. "I know our staff has been working with new clients from day one to let them know that AFDC is a short-term, temporary solution to a family's financial crisis. We want clients to know we're putting our energies into helping them find work and becoming independent."

"We are going to serve all who are eligible for public assistance. That's our mission as public servants, but we also have a mission to help people help themselves. We

have to believe the efforts our staff have put into reforming Oklahoma's welfare system through job training, education, job placement and other supportive efforts have contributed to a steady decline in the AFDC rolls."

In March, AFDC rolls dropped to 39,272 cases with 106,164 persons in the caseload, of which 75,003 were children under age 19. That compares to 39,956 cases in February, with 108,237 persons in the caseload, of which

76,324 were children. In March 1995, there were 45,674 AFDC cases, with 125,918 persons in the caseload, of which 87,006 were children.

While the drop in AFDC rolls creates a cost savings for Oklahoma, Miller said it would be in the best interest of the program to apply some of those savings to a continuing effort to find ways to put people to work. "At some point, we will get those who have the fewest skills and abilities to work and it will take a more valiant effort on the part of

our workers to help these individuals."

Although each AFDC grant has to have an adult payee, Miller said staff is reminded the program has been designed since it started in 1936 to serve the children and they (the staff) should do what they can to help parents and guardians (the adult payees) get on their feet to do just that—feed and help their dependent children.

Health care, child care and transportation are still large stumbling blocks for many of these families. "And we shouldn't overlook the number one reason why most of these families come to us for help," Miller said. "It's the absent parents' failure to pay court-ordered child support to care for the children they helped bring into this world. Our staff, along with contracted services from district attorneys and community action agencies, are really working to get a handle on getting absent parents to pay."

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into the regular prison system. Currently, offenders in OJA custody are released at 18, though petitions may be made to hold the youth until age 19 if they are considered a threat or untreatable.

The bill's House author, Rep. Jari Askins, D-Duncan, said the reversed certification should be examined.

"Violent crime is being committed by younger citizens," she said. "Whether we need to change the law to try those people as adults — that needs more study."

The bill also creates the Alternative School Program, a residential facility aimed at 12 to 17 year-olds who are at risk of "penetrating deeper into the juvenile justice system."

OJA officials are uncertain how much the new facility will cost. Final figures will depend on exactly what type of facility it will be. A 24-hour, secured facility, Byram said, will cost considerably more.

"Obviously," Kerr said, "from looking at statistics, criminals are getting younger."

He said the provision would give courts the opportunity to look at each case individually. "It would give them the ability to say, 'this person is still a child.'"



SITES FOR TELECOMMUNICATIONS CENTERS SELECTED

From Okla. Commerce Dept.

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Dr. Leo Presley, executive-director of the Oklahoma Department of Commerce, announced today the names of 33 rural communities chosen as sites for new telecommunications centers across the state.

All of the community centers will be interconnected through the statewide, fiberoptic network called OneNet which will allow them access to the Internet, the Library of Congress, public libraries, universities, medical centers, and other resources.

"Developing a state-wide capability in telecommunications is absolutely essential to the future of economic development and education in Oklahoma, particularly in rural areas of the state," commented Presley. "Such a networking system will make an entire world of information, data and communications accessible to all Oklahomans."

According to Beth Rodriguez, director of programs for the Commerce Department's research and planning group, no other state has this system on such a large scale. "Most centers will have equipment in several locations — for example, a public library, cooperative extension office, and a school — creating a 'virtual,' rather than physical, community center," commented Rodriguez. The concept for the telecommunications centers originated from Oklahoma's 1993-98 Strategic Economic Development Plan.

A \$1.5 million grant to construct and operate a portion of the centers is funded through the Telecommunications and Information Infrastructure Assistance Program, U.S. Department of Commerce. Partners in the project include the Oklahoma Department of Commerce, State Regents for Higher Education, OSU Institute for Telecommunications and the State Data Processing and Telecommunications Advisory Committee. Southwestern Bell-Oklahoma recently gave \$1.4 million to the Commerce Department to help construct and maintain the remainder of the telecommunications centers across the state.

The Advisory Committee provided \$6.5 million in matching funds to construct OneNet. "The impact of OneNet is that it will launch Oklahoma into the 21st century and allow us to compete on a more global basis," said committee chairman Senator Ben Robinson, D-Muskogee. "Information will

be shared in a cost efficient manner and the benefits of these centers are enormous," added Representative Calvin Anthony, D-Stillwater, vice-chair of the Advisory Committee.

The 33 sites for the new centers were selected from a total of 63 communities' proposals submitted from throughout the state. A panel of judges composed of independent public and private sector leaders in community development and telecommunications rated the community center proposals on criteria such as community impact and design quality.

The cities selected are: Ada, Altus, Alva, Ardmore, Bartlesville (also serving Dewey), Chickasha, (also serving Ninnekah, Amber, Alex, Tuttle, Verden, Rush Springs), Clinton (also serving Weatherford, Concho and Arapaho), Coweta, Durant, El Reno, Enid, Fairview, Frederick, Hugo, Jay (also serving Grove), Lawton, Lindsay, Mangum, McAlester, Miami (also serving Afton), Muskogee, Okmulgee (also serving Henryetta), Perry, Ponca City (also serving Newkirk), Poteau, Pryor, Seminole (also serving Wewoka), Stigler (also serving Keota, McCurtain and Quinton), Stroud, Vinita (also serving Welch), Wilburton and Woodward. MORE FROM THE HOUSE FLOOR, MAY 2, 1996

■(GIT) The House gallery was filled during much of Thursday's session with those who had come to the capitol to take part in a "funeral" for **HB1896**. The measure would provide a \$5,500 tax exemption for private sector retirees.

Those in attendance saw:

House members adopt the conference committee report for **HB2170**. The measure, by Rep. Joe Hutchinson, D-Jay, which allows the Wildlife Commission to set the dates for quail season, received a passing vote of 57-21.

House members voted 85-8 to pass **HB2553**, by Rep. Mark Seikel, D-Harrah, deleting surplus line insurance brokers from licensing requirements, adding fraternal agents to licensing requirements, modifying language and fees and education requirements, after accepting its conference committee report.

Seikel said the conference committee substitute had the endorsement of various insurance associations, largely because it clarified language in existing law.

The House also gave a 93-1 passing vote to **HB3037**, by Rep. Fred Perry, R-Tulsa, requiring environmental agencies to promulgate rules to establish penalties to be imposed against any person who knowingly makes a false compliant or who knowingly misrepresents or omits material information relating to the complaint. Perry said the conference committee report, which was adopted, "calms the bill," giving jurisdiction over the matter to district court.

Rep. Laura Boyd, D-Norman, cast the only vote against the measure.

HR1058, by Rep. Forrest Claunch, R-Midwest City, declaring Thursday National Day of Prayer in Oklahoma, was adopted by unanimous consent and all representatives were made co-authors of the bill by unanimous consent.

SB786, by Rep. Gary Bastin, D-Del City, received a passing vote of 94-1, after accepting its conference committee report. Rep. Wanda Jo Peltier, D-Oklahoma City, cast the only vote against the bill, which authorizes the Oklahoma Real Estate Commission to prescribe fees by rules, removes power of the commission to have jurisdiction over persons who are not longer licensed and requires persons who have active management

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control over persons required to be licensed to also possess a license as a real estate broker.

Bastin said the bill was unchanged from its last appearance before the House.

Also receiving approval was **SCR59**, by Rep. Sean Voskuhl, D-Marshall, asking the Surface Transportation Board to place conditions upon the proposed merger of the Union Pacific Corporation and the Southern Pacific Rail Corporation.

A parliamentary move by Voskuhl prevented the consideration of some amendments to the measure, which he said were on the clerk's desk. Voskuhl moved "previous question," essentially asking that the measure be voted on immediately. The motion passed 64-21, effectively eliminating consideration of the amendments and debate on the resolution, and then the resolution received a 79-9 passing vote.

In other action on the House floor, the conference committee reports for the following measure was rejected and further conference requested: **HB1238**.

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HOUSE REPUBLICANS' "FUNERAL" FOR TAX CUT CALLED PREMATURE

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) A "funeral" staged by state House Republicans for the \$5,5000 exemption for private-sector retirees is premature and phony, according to a key lawmaker working on the proposal.

Rep. Ron Kirby, a Lawton Democrat, said the Republicans have apparently given up on the tax cut proposal.

"Either they have given up or they are more interested in playing political games than in getting an agreement on the exemption," Kirby said. "To paraphrase Mark Twain, 'The rumors of this bill's death are greatly exaggerated'."

Kirby said a bill he and Rep. Russ Roach, a Tulsa Democrat, are sponsoring is still alive. **House Bill 1088** is being held until an agreement is reached.

Apparently, the governor's budget does not contain enough money for the retiree issue. Kirby said that unlike the federal bud-

get, Oklahoma's budget must be balanced.

"It doesn't make sense to me why Republicans want to put on some media circus to try and bury a body that isn't dead yet," Kirby said. "That is, unless they plan on killing it themselves and try to blame the Democrats."

The lawmakers said they are working hard to get an agreement with the Governor's Office and that the Democratic leaders in the Legislature have set aside money to pay for the tax cut.

"I think all of us on this side of the aisle would welcome the GOP's help to get an agreement with the governor," Kirby noted. "If they are serious about seeing this tax cut enacted, I would encourage them to high-tail it to the governor's office to work on a viable agreement."

Kirby said there is likely one reason the Republicans would rather put on their show than do the nuts-and-bolts work of lawmaking.

"Behind-the-scenes hard work rarely gets the kind of media coverage a public spectacle does," he related. "It seems to me the Republicans would rather get press clippings than an agreement on this important issue."

COBURN HIV TESTING PROPOSAL APPROVED

■(WASHINGTON) US Rep. Tom Coburn said Wednesday that the lives of infants will be saved because of new HIV testing requirements approved by the US House on Wednesday.

The proposal, written by Coburn, would eventually require states to begin mandatory testing of newborns.

"There were 7,000 infants delivered to mothers who had the AIDS virus last year."

A compromise between House and Senate negotiators will require the mandatory testing if there is not a significant reduction in infants born with HIV.

"This is a caring approach that says public health policy should be about saving the lives of newborns. There were 7,000 infants delivered to mothers who had the AIDS virus last year.

"We now know that we can save the lives of infants whose mothers carry this deadly virus by giving the drug AZT before birth and up to six weeks after birth. We need to do everything possible to identify infants that have AIDS," Coburn said.

Coburn was the author of the House ver-

sion that required mandatory infant testing. The Senate version had only voluntary testing by the mother. A compromise has been reached that supports Coburn's position.

The measure will compel states to enact the Center for Disease Control guidelines re-

garding HIV and pregnant women. If the guidelines fail to make dramatic reductions in the number of AIDS babies within 18

months, states who received Ryan White Care Act funds would be required to enact mandatory HIV testing of newborns.

Coburn, a physician who specializes in obstetrics, has actually delivered babies with AIDS.

"There is nothing more heart-breaking than to deliver a new life that you know will be short-lived. We have an obligation to try to give these infants a chance for life," Coburn said.

There is \$10 million authorized to carry out these provisions. Also part of the Coburn amendment was a provision that requires that spouses of people with HIV are notified.

■(WASHINGTON) The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services priorities are preserved during negotiations with Congress.

— Congress passed a budget last week that restores \$5.1 billion in 1996 for health and social services, education and training, law enforcement, the environment and other key priorities.

— The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services won substantial gain-backs from the House markup of the appropriations bill last June. Total HHS discretionary spending for programs in the Labor/HHS/Education appropriation is \$29.4 billion. This is \$1.5 billion above the House mark of last June. This final amount represents an overall cut of 1.3 percent from the FY 1995 level for HHS — whereas under the June House mark, the proposed cut was 6.5 percent.

— Add-backs to the HHS budget account for a large percentage of all government add-backs that the Clinton Administration secured during negotiations with Congress.

SPECIFIC HIGHLIGHTS

— Head Start: The June House mark pro-

vided \$3.397 billion for Head Start. Under the budget agreement, Head Start funding was increased to \$3.570 billion, a 5 percent increase over the House mark.

— Battered Women Shelters: Under the budget agreement, funding for family violence programs and battered women's shelters was increased to \$37.6 million, a 32 percent increase over FY '95 levels.

— LIHEAP: The June House mark eliminated funding for the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program. Under the bipartisan agreement, LIHEAP will receive \$900 million in FY '96, plus up to \$420 million in emergency funding for FY 1997.

— Healthy Start: The June House mark for this program, designed to stem infant mortality, was \$50 million, more than a 50 percent cut from FY '95 levels. Under the budget agreement, Healthy Start will receive \$93 million, an 86 percent increase from the House mark.

— Ryan White AIDS Programs: The June House mark for Ryan White funding was \$656 million, a full \$67 million less than the President's request. This level would

have severely impacted communities already facing an overwhelming demand for services. Subsequent to the original budget request, the President also proposed a \$52 million amendment to defray costs of new AIDS drugs. As a result of the President's ongoing resolve to protect HIV/AIDS services, the Ryan White funding was increased to \$738.5 million, a 13 percent increase from the initial House mark.

— Substance Abuse Demonstrations: The June House mark proposed \$127.7 million for substance abuse demonstrations, a devastating 72 percent reduction from FY '95 levels. Under the budget agreement, the Administration secured a partial restoration of the funding to \$180 million.

— AHCPR Appropriations: The June House mark for AHCPR was \$65.5 million, representing an 59 percent cut from FY '95 levels. Under the budget agreement, Congress has added back \$59.8 million to bring the FY 96 level to \$125.3, a 91 percent increase from the House mark.

HB2243 Adds detention centers operated by or through contract with a county to applicable facilities which listed circumstances where the use of physical force related to children housed in those facilities shall be allowed.

HB2252 Changes the required measurement for motorcycle headlamps from not more than 54 inches nor less than 22 inches.

HB2255 Creates the Defective Assistive Device Act; defines terms; states that any manufacturer who sells an assistive device shall provide the consumer with an express warranty for the device; provides for repair and or replacement of said vehicle; provides for disputes.

HB2261 Requires all individual and group health insurance policies providing coverage to women over the age of forty-five (45) to include coverage for a routine bone density test; defines terms.

HB2292 Directs Wildlife Conservation to keep confidential certain personal information provided with permit and license applications.

HB2293 Provides authority for Wildlife Conservation to enter into contracts and agreements for food, lodging, and other authorized expenses necessary to host, conduct, sponsor or participate in conferences, meetings, or training sessions.

HB2300 Authorizes the establishment of a forestry cost-share program. Creates the Forestry Cost-Share Fund. Prohibits the use of the fund for state agency purposes. Provides for eligibility criteria for basis of approval or denial of applications. Provides the appointment of an advisory committee.

HB2310 Modifies language pertaining to the Plumbing License Law of 1955. Defines the terms "plumbing contractor" and "journeyman plumber technician". Allows the State Department of Health to renew licenses.

HB2320 States that compensation of all elective city officers shall be fixed by ordinance.

HB2335 Allows a school board to create a policy regarding the food expenses of employees of the district incurred during travel.

HB2338 Relates to revenue and taxation; states that no assessment shall be required if a report or return, signed by the taxpayer, was filed and the liability evidenced by the report or return has not been paid.

HB2349 Authorizes the Wildlife Conservation Commission to establish a special use permit required by all persons who hunt or fish on private land leased by the Department of Wildlife Conservation; establishes a Twenty-Five Dollar (\$25.00) maximum annual fee for such license.

HB2351 Modifies language relating to nonresident hunting licenses.

Executive Action – Signed

HB2381 Modifies and limits the distribution of the Oklahoma Register.

HB2391 Modifies language and definitions relating to the Adult Day Care Act, excluding retirement centers and senior citizen centers from the definition of the terms adult day care center and center.

HB2428 Modifies, merges, and consolidates duplicative language pertaining to DHS, Health Care Authority, OSBI, courts, basic health benefits boards, etc.

HB2435 Modifies powers and duties of Urban Renewal Authority relating to condemnation of property.

HB2456 Clarifies language relating to the Insurance Commissioner's ability to adopt reasonable rules; exempts insurers which do not employ agents or employ agents which represent only the company of the insurer; allows for the transmission of countersignatures via FAX.

HB2469 Modifies language related to certified workplace medical plans.

HB2480 Designates the Friday after the fourth Thursday in November as a legal state holiday.

HB2487 States that the Board of Agriculture shall have jurisdiction over the importation of exotic livestock.

HB2499 Provides exemptions for utility collection vehicles.

HB2506 Modifies language relating to pornographic materials and the display of said materials to children; provides definitions.

HB2519 Recreates the Interagency Council for Services to Mentally Ill Homeless Persons until Feb. 1, 1997.

HB2530 States that a partial term of not more than eighteen months (18) for a member of the Board of Trustees of a library system shall not be considered a full term.

HB2535 Modifies language relating to the Cash Management and Investment Oversight Commission.

HB2549 Creates the "Coordination of Services for Older Oklahomans Act," which directs certain state agencies to design and implement a certain coordinated system of information, referral and follow up services for older citizens.

HB2556 Provides a Twenty-Five Dollar (\$25.00) filing fee for members of a church or religious organization wishing not to be incorporated; modifies contents of the certificate of incorporation; modifies statutory reference; modifies requirements for partnerships.

HB2561 Requires motor license agents to perfect the lien of a vehicle title that is presented to a motor license agent for transferring or registering when the documents reflect a lien holder.

HB2563 Provides for alternative teaching certification for residential or treatment facilities.

HB2574 Provides that rules of the State Board of Health shall not require euthanasia and disposal of domesticated wild animals with rabies or suspected to be infected with rabies without consideration of specific criteria.

HB2588 States that the Oklahoma Historical Society may sponsor and administer state participation in the annual National History Day competition.

HB2604 Modifies various references including those pertaining to driving across highway dividing spaces; the installation of blue lights on vehicles other than authorized emergency vehicles; and covering or otherwise overlaying vehicle license plates.

HB2622 Provides criminal penalty for any person falsely executing a written declaration as a witness or misrepresenting his or her identity with the intent to defraud, relevant to the execution of self-proved wills and codicils.

HB2623 States that a group or combination of persons or risks shall not be considered a "fictitious" group upon meeting the conditions provided within this section.

HB2666 States the dues and fees to YMCA's or YWCA's for the use of facilities or services for persons under age 16 are exempt from sales tax.

HB2669 Authorizes National Park Service rangers to make arrests with the same status as state or local law enforcement if it is believed the offender has committed a felony, misdemeanor or at the request of a law enforcement officer.

HB2697 Removes Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation employees from exemption from the Polygraph Examiners Act; requires OSBI polygraphers to be licensed under the Act.

HB2725 States that taxpayers with a taxable income of at least One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) in at least one (1) of the three (3) last taxable years may compute tax on an annual basis.

HB2726 Authorizes local school districts and county or city-county health departments may enter into agreements related to assuring that a child who is returning to school after an absence due to head lice infection is no longer afflicted.

HB2754 Modifies membership qualifications of the Board of Trustees of the Oklahoma School of Science and Mathematics.

HB2798 Stipulates that at renewal the Oklahoma Linked Deposit Review Board may approve an increase in the amount of principal if the business is expanding and additional jobs will be created.

HB2807 Establishes April 19th of every year as Oklahoma City Bombing Remembrance Day.

HB2813 Permits counties to submit sealed bids to purchase equipment from the state or any agency or political subdivision of this state.

HB2899 Modifies the powers, duties and responsibilities of the Oklahoma International Trade Development Council.

HB2901 Allows counties reimbursement for volunteer training expenses. Allows a county sheriff to charge \$5.00 per card for fingerprinting individuals. Allows sheriff to deduct money from the Inmate Trust Fund Checking Account to cover medical co-payment's for medical services rendered while incarcerated and for copies requested by an inmate from the Inmate Trust Fund Checking Account.

HB2918 Provides for assistant and special assistant district attorneys to be named state officers and details responsibilities of the position.

HB2921 Adds certain types of telecommunication companies to subject to the Corporation Commission's public utilities assessment.

HB2930 Modifies penalties relating to eluding or attempting to elude a peace officer.

HB2934 Modifies definitions relating to the Health Care Freedom of Choice Act. Requires certain policies be brought into compliance and clarifies compliance.

HB2950 Modifies language pertaining to private prison facilities.

HB2962 Clarifies language within the Oklahoma Children's Code to address compulsory school attendance.

HB3000 Declares "Oklahoma My Native Land" the official children's song of the state.

HB3006 Modifies required deadlines for authorization to establish branch banks.

HB3021 Requires individual and group insurance policies to provide coverage for equipment, services and supplies for treatment of diabetes.

HB3024 Modifies various sections of the Oklahoma Self Defense Act.

HB3027 Modifies various sections pertaining to the Oklahoma Consumer Protection Act and the Perpetual Case Fund Act.

Executive Action – Signed

HB3028 States that any written bill of sale, timber deed or timber contract shall be preserved by the owner or operator of a logging or timber harvesting operation for at least a period of three (3) years. Within said time frame, law enforcement personnel may inspect records.

HJR1074 Designates Dec. 7 of each year as "Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day."

HJR1077 Designates US Hwy 64 from Pawnee west to US Hwy 177 shall be designated as the "Pawnee Bill Memorial Highway."

HJR1087 Creates the State Government Internal Affairs Investigation Review Committee.

HJR1100 Provides for state employees affected by the April 19, 1995 bombing to be excused from job related duties on April 19, 1996.

SB73 Creates the Oklahoma Child Visitation Registry Act; authorizes the district judge in each county in the state to authorize one or more public or private agencies to provide a child visitation registry program and allows participating agency to charge a fee not to exceed two dollars per parent, per visit.

SB 425 Prohibits adverse action against a student because of the student's service on jury duty.

SB 723 Increases advanced accreditation standard for county assessors from twenty (20) hours per year to thirty (30) hours every three (3) years.

SB 725 Provides procedure for payment of ad valorem taxes by mortgage servicers.

SB 733 States that time limits for the disposition of records of a municipal governing body may be determined by that body.

SB 739 States that money market funds regulated by the Securities Exchange Commission may be purchased and invested in by a city or county treasurer.

SB 740 Requires the State Dept. of Education to recognize for purposes of certification and salary increments teachers certified in Oklahoma employed by DHS Child Study Center at University Hospital.

SB 752 Modifies language relating to special license plates; creates a United States Air Force Association License Plate.

SB 753 Modifies language and statutory references relating to the Waterworks and Wastewater Works Operator Certification Act

SB 775 Modifies statutory and gender references relating to the Oklahoma Energy Education and Marketing Act and the Department of Central Services; removes responsibility from said department for any buildings, rooms or space under the management or control of the University Hospitals Authority.

SB 783 Requires the Department of Agriculture to establish planting and harvesting seasons for the purpose of meeting the maximum driving and on-duty time exemptions set forth in the National Highway System Designation Act of 1995.

SB 797 Allows school districts to prohibit dogs from running at large within five hundred (500) feet of specified property.

SB 837 Appropriates funds for the expenses of various agencies of the executive, legislative and judicial branches of the state including, but not limited to, the State Arts Council, the State Board of Education, the State Regents, the Department of Libraries, the Board of Private Vocational Schools, OCAST, the State VoTech Board, the Oklahoma Commission for Teacher Preparation, the Office of the State Auditor and Inspector, the Ethics Commission, the Election Board, and offices of the Governor, the House of Representatives, the Legislative Service Bureau, OMPC, OPM, the Tax Commission, the Office of the Treasurer and others.

SB 946 Updates statutory references pertaining to the Oklahoma Mining Commission; clarifying positions of mining commission member appointments, stating terms of appointments; ratifying certain appointments.

HB2239 Principal Author(s): Bell, Jack; Erwin, Randall L. Modifies language relating to fishing and game licenses.; Effective Date: 11/01/96. 04/29/96 Governor Action - Veto

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: (04/29/96) This is to advise you that on this date, pursuant to the powers vested in me, I have VETOED HB2239. This bill encourages infringement on personal property rights of citizens. In addition, the provisions of this legislation could result in an adverse effect on certain streams in our state.

HB2360 Principal Author(s): Henry, Brad; Weaver, Robert E.; Directs the Department of Public Safety and the Oklahoma Tax Commission to conduct a study relating to the regulation and licensing of jet ski and boat operators in the state; requires a report of the findings to be submitted to the Speaker of the House, the President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Governor.; Effective Date: 11/01/96. 04/09/96, Governor Action - Veto.

is to advise you that on this date, pursuant to the authority vested in me, I have VETOED HB2360 because the provisions of this bill would limit which state agencies would be eligible to be involved in efforts to address a problem that involves several areas of state concern including not only the need for regulatory fees and regulation of water safety, but also potentially environmental concerns and the Oklahoma tourism industry. Limiting participation could result in less than accurate and complete recommendations for resolution of the problem to be addressed.
