profit group without having to pay property tax on that property. However, if the property is leased to a for-profit organization, ad valorem taxes would be assessed.

With a vote of 45 to 0, the measure and its emergency passed.

SB730, by Sen. Ted Fisher, D-Sapulpa, modifies language and statutory references relating to the assessment and valuation of property; requires county assessors to assess specified improvements based on fair market value.

The CCR, which relates to the valuation and assessment of real property as related to fair cash value was adopted. The measure received a passing vote of 45-1.

SB747, by Sen. Mark Snyder, was brought up again on a motion to reconsider. The measure modifies voting requirements of a beneficiary which is a county in order to waive certain competitive bidding requirements to two-thirds of the governing body.

A motion to table the reconsideration motion was lodged. The motion passed and the bill was not heard.

SB765, by Sen. Trish Weedn, D-Purcell, authorizes the Department of Transportation to purchase individual safety recognition awards for its employees.

The House Amendments, which restore the stricken title, were accepted and the measure received a passing vote of 45-0.

SB836, by Sen. Enoch Kelly Haney, D-Seminole, appropriates funds to the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education from the Cash Flow Reserve Fund.

Haney said the Conference Committee Report submits a conference Committee Substitute which changes the name of Seminole Junior College to Seminole State College.

The CCR was adopted and the measure passed with a vote of 46-0 with an emergency clause.

SB871, by Sen. Sam Helton, D-Lawton, states that the governing body of a municipality may authorize the CEO of the municipality to respond to any request from any other jurisdiction within one state for law enforcement assistance in cases of emergency.

After adopting the conference committee report, members passed the measure with a vote of 45 to 0.

SB886, by Sen. Sam Helton, D-Lawton, provides for special license plates for police officers.

The House Amendment, which restores

the title of the bill was accepted, and measure received a passing vote of 46-0.

SB914, by Sen. Frank Shurden, D-Henryetta, prohibits the headlighting of feral animals.

The House Amendment, which restores the title of the measure was accepted, and the bill received a passing vote of 46-0 with an emergency clause.

SB981, by Sen. Frank Shurden, D-Henryetta, deletes weight limit provisions pertaining to vehicles delivering agricultural commodities weighed as a single draft.

The adopted conference committee report places limits of 90,000 pounds for longer combination vehicles.

Members passed the measure and its emergency clause with a vote of 45 to 0.

SB1002, by Sen. Ben Robinson, D-Muskogee, provides an additional basis for the issuance of a specified certificate from the Oklahoma Corporation Commission.

Members moved to lay over the conference committee report which relates to the requirements for public telephone construction and requires residential rates to be assessed for phone services to church proper.

SB1017, also by Shurden, states that troop commanders in charge of a highway patrol troop may designate specified portions of federal aid to primary highways and the state highway system in the service area of the troop.

The adopted conference committee substitute to the bill prevents those troops from regulating traffic in municipalities outside their service area.

"I'm trying to keep municipalities from making their revenue off the poor motorist traveling down the road," Shurden said. "If you are for speed traps, vote against this bill."

With a vote 36 to 8, the measure and its emergency clause passed.

SB1053, by Sen. Dave Herbert, D-Midwest City, deletes all confidentiality and sealing requirements relating to juvenile records.

Members moved to return the measure to conference to further work out possible problems.

SB1062, by Sen. Dick Wilkerson, D-Atwood, allows for the establishment of a crimes information unit within the Oklahoma Bureau of Investigation.

After accepting the House Amendments, the measure received a passing vote of 42-2.

SB1080, by Sen. Mark Snyder, R-Edmond, requires that a complete disclosure of name, mailing address and finding address

of every stockholder with at least five percent ownership shall be included with each hospice license application.

After adopting the conference committee substitute, members passed the measure and its emergency clause with a vote of 45 to 0.

SB1097, by Sen. Ben Robinson, D-Muskogee, modifies and defines language pertaining to Group Homes for Persons with Developmental Disabilities.

The bill's House amendments further clarify the definitions and related language.

After adopting the House amendments, members passed the measure with a vote of 39 to 1.

SB1175, by Sen. Bernest Cain, D-Oklahoma City, excludes the collection of child support from the statute of limitations. The measure also provides for liens against property and prevents child support from becoming dormant for any purpose.

Members adopted the conference committee substitute, and passed the measure with a 35-11 vote.

SB1270, by Sen. Lewis Long, D-Glenpool, defines "wireless telephone company" and "other telephone service company" as it applies to the Nine-One-One Emergency Number Act.

Members accepted the House Amendment which on page 1, section 1, line 20 inserts the language "the Advisory Committee shall also consider minimum standards for certification of call takers for 911 emergency service."

The measure received a passing vote of 45-1 with an emergency clause.

SB1315, by Sen. Ben Robinson, D-Muskogee, directs purchasing specifications and parameters relating to OneNet.

Robinson said the conference committee substitute exempts the State Board of Regents from the Oklahoma Central Purchasing Act.

Members adopted the substitute, and passed the measure with a 42-2 vote with an emergency clause.

Members also adopted **HCR1107**, which recalls **HB3008** from the governor's desk for further discussion. The bill directs the Department of Corrections to not house or process inmates at the facility located at 1411 N. Classen Blvd. in Oklahoma City. The bill was signed and transmitted to the governor on April 29.

The bill was then rescinded from fourth reading and final passage.
