SPARKS FLY OVER HORSE TRIPPING BILL

■(GIT) The Senate floor was the place for "a bunch of Perry Mason lawyer talk" Wednesday, said Sen. Lewis Long, D-Glenpool, as mostly Republican opposition arose to a section of **SB680**, the so-called "horse-tripping bill."

Through an earlier floor amendment, the bill was modified to include a provision relating to domestic violence. The measure, by Long, was originally aimed at preventing the sports of bear wrestling and horse-tripping, making them felonies.

In a debate that lasted nearly an hour, Senate lawmakers argued over several points of the bill's Conference Committee Report. An issue of some concern is a provision requiring convicted domestic abuse offenders to participate in counseling or treatment, as a condition of suspended sentence.

"This sounds to me like something that a bunch of counselors got together and wrote to generate business for themselves," said Sen. Mike Fair, R-Oklahoma City. "I cannot, in good conscience, industrialize counseling in the statute books."

The provision requires counseling for the defendant, who, at the discretion of the court, may be liable for the cost of those services.

"If both parties don't go to counseling, you have accomplished nothing," said Sen. Dave Herbert, D-Midwest City. "Believe it or not, there are women who incite their husbands so, after they take a beating, they have complete control because he is so apologetic."

Sen. Keith Leftwich, disagreed with the opposition to the provision, saying it was only an alternative to prison sentencing.

"This is just one option for a suspended sentence," he said. "We are not talking about angles here. We are not talking about normal, functioning families, this won't affect them."

Senate GOP Leader Gerald "Ged" Wright, R-Broken Arrow, said the provision was a way for courts to maintain jurisdiction over domestic violence offenders. He called it a "hammer to keep control."

Another provision in the bill includes "a person living in the same household as the defendant" in a list of victims that are protected under the domestic abuse provision of the bill. Those convicted under the provision would be guilty of a felony. It carries a fine of \$3,000. Concerns arose that the language is too broad in nature.

Aimed at such relationships as common law marriages, the provision faced resistance because it "winds up painting a wide brush stroke."

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DHS ASKS FOR OPPORTUNITY TO IMPROVE

■(GIT) An opportunity — That's what the Department of Human Service's executive director told members of the General Conference Committee on Appropriations' subcommittee on health and human services was needed for the agency to make improvements in its efficiency and performance.

"I hope if you don't hear anything else

today," George Miller, DHS executive director told the subcommittee members, "that you hear this — All we want is the opportunity to improve our efficiency and performance."

Miller appeared before the panel to discuss the recommendations contained in a recent study of the agency by the independent consulting firm of Peat-Marwick. A key component of the consultant's findings are the labeling of more than 200 DHS jobs as "questionable" and that those positions be considered for elimination.

Miller said the report was "a catalyst to utilize procedures to streamline, restructure and re-engineer" the department. Without the report, he added, some necessary changes might not otherwise be considered or accomplished.

Currently, Miller told the subcommittee, a committee from the Commission on Human Services, the department's governing

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"The provision puts pretty severe remedies on two college roommates who decide to duke it out," Sen. Douglass, a member of the bill's conference committee, said current law offers "ample provisions" for addressing domestic violence.

"The bottom line is everything he [Long] is trying to do is already in existing law."

Though his signature appears on the bill's conference committee report, he ultimately voted against the bill.

"The point is," said Sen. Angela Monson, D-Oklahoma City, "that those people do live together, so one person is trapped, resulting in one person potentially having to leave their residence." She said there is a distinction between roommates and "two friends who have a fight at the local bar."

The provision creates a more severe penalty than if the defendant was a stranger, said Sen. Howard Hendrick, R-Bethany. He said the provision created higher penalties for only certain types of assault.

Calling the provision "sloppy legislation," and "for political purposes," Sen. Jerry

Pierce, R-Tulsa, said it would "denigrate the quality of the law."

"You are creating a new category of assault and battery," he said. "Assault and battery is assault and battery — you don't need this bill to accomplish this." Pierce said current law was sufficient to handle the problem.

A clearly angry Sen. Penny Williams, D-Tulsa, author of the bill's domestic violence provision, blasted opposing parties, saying her amendment "puts things in balance."

"We seem to be treating the bears as victims rather than treating people as victims," she said, referring to the amendment's provision that increased the fine for domestic violence, which was originally lower than the fine for bear wrestling.

A one-time victim herself, Williams said victims of domestic violence, at one time or another, must eventually go home. She said

the bill would "give law enforcement the teeth it needs."

A source close to Williams said she was the victim of an assault and battery that occurred away from her home and by a stranger.

"Her point is she didn't have to fear going back to her home — If they [domestic abusers] are on a deferred sentence, and are coming back home, they need to go to counseling, or put the guy in jail and keep him away from her."

"I think it's shameful for people to get up and debate this," said Long in his closing remarks. "What we are trying to do is aim this at some two-bit bully who beats up on his wife."

Members voted 32 to 13 to adopt the conference committee report. The bill and its emergency clause passed with a vote of 35 to 9. Voting nay were Sens. Campbell, Cole, Douglass, Fair, Ford Gustafson, Hendrick, Herbert, Martin, Pierce, Rubottom, Snyder and Wright. Sens. Capps, Long (Ed) and Shedrick were excused from voting. Long lodged a motion to reconsider, allowing him to re-address the measure within three legislative days.

board, is examining the consultant's recommendations and meeting with department division heads to determine which recommendations would be implemented.

"I would like to use the report to the fullest extent possible to improve our efficiency," Miller said.

Miller said a number of steps had already been taken in that direction, including discussions with legislators over a possible severance package for DHS employees who lose their jobs, talks with representatives from Oklahoma's peer states over successful programs there, the creation of an administrative task force to develop a business plan for the department and talks with vendors over the possible outsourcing of certain "non-core" functions.

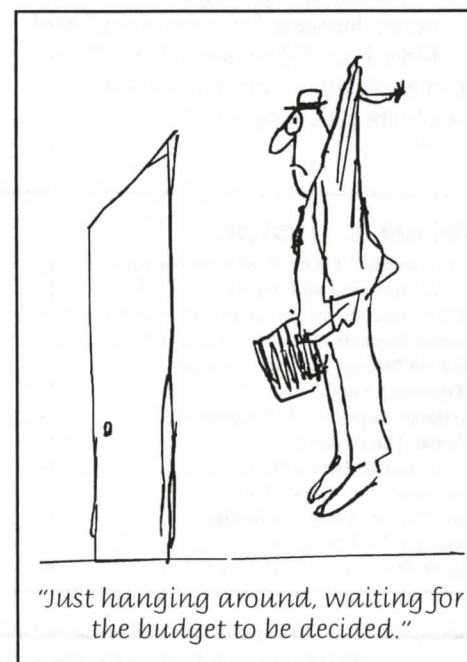
The outcome of any changes, Miller said, must keep in mind the goal of maintaining at the highest level possible the services mandated of the department.

"We can do better," Miller reiterated, "and we would like you to give us that opportunity."

Miller revealed that the department was currently examining the future elimination of some 295 field clerical positions. That,

he explained, would be made possible by the use of new technologies.

Asked what other positions might be eliminated, Miller said he would not know until the commission's committee had time to review the report and speak with division leaders.

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RYAN LUKE BILL PUT ON HOLD UNTIL MONDAY

■(GIT) The author of the so-called Ryan Luke child abuse prevention bill again on Wednesday withheld the bill from House consideration.

Rep. Laura Boyd, D-Norman, reiterated again that a discrepancy in projected costs and personnel associated with HB2053 was the reason behind the delay.

"We obviously aren't reading from the same page of the play book," said Boyd.

A House fiscal analysis indicated the bill will cost approximately \$370,000 per year to implement. A Department of Human Services analysis of the legislation, however, put the cost at nearly \$1.4 million and included 20 additional social workers and four supervisors to monitor child abuse cases.

Currently, Boyd noted, DHS has 600

caseworkers who investigate child abuse reports across the state. In addition, the legislature is considering an appropriation that would provide what the Norman Democrat called "a significant number" of additional caseworkers.

"The population of this state will be severely let down, if the governor vetoes this legislation because of a separate political struggle between the executive office and DHS."

Also, Boyd said, the department has 50 vacancies in its caseworker ranks that have already been budgeted by the legislature but have not been filled.

"We realize that DHS needs more caseworkers, and we're working on that," Boyd said. "But their last estimate — that another 24 caseworkers and supervisors are needed besides what we're already negotiating plus their existing vacancies — was just excessive."

Boyd said she expects to have the inconsistency resolved before next week and to present the bill to the full House for its con-

sideration on Monday.

In a related development, Boyd said Governor Frank Keating "appeared to be addressing the wrong measure" when he said on Tuesday he would sign the bill "as long as it addresses recommended changes in the structural system of DHS and the criminal system." The governor made the remark during his weekly press conference.

"The population of this state will be severely let down," Boyd said, "if the governor vetoes this legislation because of a separate political struggle between the executive office and DHS."

The governor, as well as some members of his cabinet, have been critical of DHS and what they have called excessive management. Specifically, the governor's office has endorsed some of the personnel cuts recommended by a private consultant, as well as the governor's own review panel.

The department is currently reviewing the consultant's recommendations, as well as those made by the governor's panel.

GCCA APPROVES MID-TERM FUNDING PLAN

■(GIT) The legislature's General Conference Committee on Appropriations on Wednesday approved a mid-term funding proposal, taking many at the capitol by surprise.

Considered one the most controversial issues of the legislative session, previously presented plans had taken a beating on the floor of the House and the Senate.

Part of the plan mirrors an allocation agreement announced last week by the legislature's Democratic leadership, calling for some \$13 million to be pulled from the Rainy Day fund for mid-term funding. Another \$1.5 million will be taken from the fund for the establishment of a student identification or tracking system. That plan was also part of the allocation agreement.

Specifically, the plan approved Wednesday calls for \$6,317,545 to be taken from the Rainy Day fund and combined with another \$6,317,545 from the state's general fund to cover mid-term funding costs for the 1994-95 school year.

For the 1995-96 school year, the legislature will again tap the Rainy Day fund for \$6,770,799. An equal amount will also be allocated from the general fund for a total of

\$13,541,598.

No Rainy Day money will be used for 1996-97 mid-term funding, but \$15,082,197 will be drawn from the general fund under the terms of a plan also approved on Wednesday.

The plan for distributing the 1996-97 money would be based on 1.5 percent growth over the highest of the two preceding year average daily membership, plus \$343 per student under 1.5 percent growth.

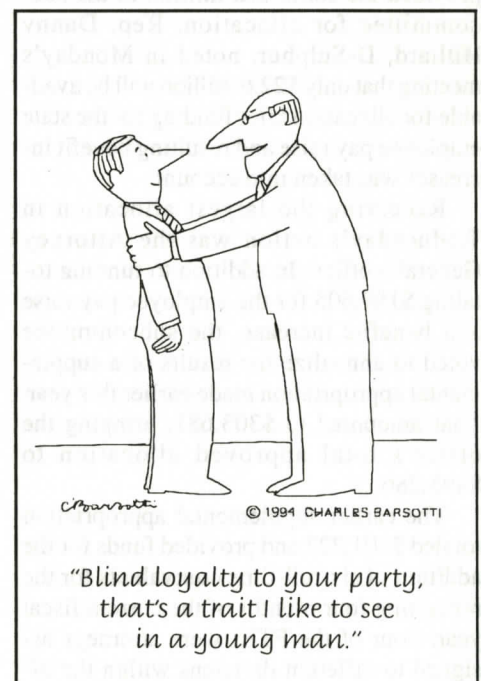
Under the terms of a permanent plan which will take effect with the 1997-98 school year, state aid would be based on the current year's growth and chargeable formula; funds will be set aside to pay for mid-year adjustments do to average daily membership growth; and districts will be allocated state aid beginning in August based on expected chargeable with state aid being adjusted during the year at the time of student growth adjustments on the basis of the most recent year's chargeable numbers.

Data used in the current year formula will take into account current year ad valorem chargeables and the highest of the first nine weeks audited average daily membership or the previous two years average daily membership.

Whether the plan is acceptable to Gov-

ernor Frank Keating is yet to be seen.

The governor indicated for the first time last month that he would consider tapping the Rainy Day fund in an attempt to address the mid-term funding issue. However, the governor cautioned, that move would require a permanent and acceptable solution to the mid-term funding problem.

GCCA SUBCOMMITTEE CHANGES APPROACH

■(GIT) The General Conference Committee on Appropriations' subcommittee on the judiciary, public safety and law enforcement services on Wednesday changed its approach to dealing with agency requests under its jurisdiction.

Subcommittee vice chair Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore, told the subcommittee's members and the agency directors in attendance that the panel would hear presentations from each agency, but would deal only with the appropriation matters related to the statewide employee pay raise and related benefits. That

meant, Steidley explained, that the subcommittee would consider other aspects of the agencies' requests at a later time.

The move brought no objections from the subcommittee's members.

It was the second meeting of the subcommittee, and the attention was on next year's additional revenue, rather than general appropriations.

Although a Democratic allocation accord provided the some \$52 million to the subcommittee for allocation, Rep. Danny Hilliard, D-Sulphur, noted in Monday's meeting that only \$22.6 million will be available for allocation after funding for the state employee pay raise and resulting benefit increases was taken into account.

Receiving the largest allocation in Wednesday's action was the Attorney General's office. In addition to funding totaling \$189,605 for the employee pay raise and benefits increase, the subcommittee voted to annualize the results of a supplemental appropriation made earlier this year. That amounted to \$303,681, bringing the office's total approved allocation to \$493,286.

The earlier supplemental appropriation totaled \$101,227 and provided funds for the addition of six full-time equivalents for the remaining four months of the current fiscal year. Four of the FTEs were attorneys assigned to different divisions within the of-

fice. The remaining two FTEs included a victim witness coordinator and a computer technician.

Attorney General Drew Edmondson told the subcommittee that those employees would have to be let go unless the supplemental appropriation was added to next year's budget.

Those agencies for which funding related to the employee pay raise was approved included the Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs, \$116,604; the Workers' Compensation Court, \$131,284; and the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigations, \$291,538.

SENATOR EXPANDS UNEMPLOYMENT TAX CUT Reduction Would Save Business \$30 Million

■(GIT) Saying Oklahoma's continued economic growth has cleared the way for an even larger unemployment tax cut, State Senator Lewis Long is expanding legislation that would reduce the unemployment taxes existing Oklahoma businesses pay.

"The surplus in the state unemployment insurance fund just keeps getting bigger and bigger because we keep putting more and more people back to work," said Senator Long. "I'm revising my bill to reflect the continued growth of our economy. I think we can give our existing businesses an even larger tax cut without damaging the integrity of the fund."

In its original form, **HB1672** would have cut the unemployment tax on existing businesses by approximately \$5 million. The latest version of Senator Long's legislation would increase the tax cut to approximately \$30 million. That amounts to about a 25 percent reduction in the amount of unemployment taxes that each business pays.

"I'm trying to put some money back into the hands of Oklahoma business people so they can create more jobs," said Senator Long. "There's no reason to ask them to pour more and more money into an unemployment fund that is overflowing, thanks to our record job growth."

If Senator Long is successful, this will mark the second year in a row that he has led the fight to cut unemployment taxes. Last year, legislation authored by the Glenpool legislator reduced unemployment taxes on new businesses by approximately \$20 million annually.

"Anyone who claims that we haven't cut taxes on Oklahoma businesses is ignoring the facts. When HB1672 is implemented, we will have reduced the unemployment taxes on business by a total of \$50 million over a two year period. That's a pretty substantial tax cut in my book, and I think business people will agree," said Senator Long.

"The Legislature has taken a proactive approach to create the best possible business climate in Oklahoma, and our economy has responded to our efforts. Quality Jobs, workers compensation reform and tax incentives have all played a role in our economic development strategy. The latest tax cut will give our economy an additional boost."

MEDICAL SAVINGS ACCOUNTS PRODUCE OPPOSING VIEWS

■(GIT) Currently, changes are taking place in the American health care system. Some of those changes could include the implementation of Medical Savings Accounts (MSAs). Accordingly, Oklahoma Congressman Don Nickles is urging others in Washington to join him in the adoption of legislation permitting the establishment of MSAs. However, John Burry Jr, chairman and CEO of Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Ohio, said that programs such as MSAs "pose a danger to the entire health care system."

Burry said that proponents of MSAs believe that individuals will act "wisely," when purchasing their own health care, and that, "overall national spending will drop dramatically."

"They believe that by simply switching people from low-deductible health insurance policies to high-deductible catastrophic policies, and by putting the cost difference in tax-free MSAs, Americans will magically become wiser consumers of health care." Burry continued, "If you accept the theory that people will do what is in their own self-interest, then you must accept the fact that MSAs will lead to a massive self-selection process, which will pull the healthy out of the larger insurance pool and drive up costs for those unable to profit from their own health."

Burry explained that although MSAs would be a "financial windfall" for approximately 70 percent of Americans, it would only benefit those who are relatively healthy. "For these people, the vast majority of Americans, an annual \$3,000 MSA paid by their employer would amount to a yearly \$2,000 tax-free bonus, for the rest, MSAs would turn the cost of health care and insurance into a living nightmare."

Others concurred with Burry's comments. Bruce Vladeck of the Health Care Financing Administration, agreed that MSAs were a "terrible idea." Adding, that MSAs "would only exacerbate the problem of private health insurers seeking to cover only people in good

nothing," Nickels explained. "This medical savings provision will extend favorable tax treatment to persons who wish to purchase a MSA, regardless of their employment status."

Also, Nickels explained that MSAs are portable. "They belong to you, not the company you work for, and you take your plan with you when you change jobs. That's true portability combined with maximum health care flexibility, which translates into savings for the employer and employee."

Nickels further explained that MSAs are "basically individual retirement accounts," used for medical rather than retirement purposes. "They permit individuals to accumulate tax deductible funds in a savings account which can be used only for medical expenses. Medical Savings Accounts are now used in 17 states, and by 3,000 businesses."

Nevertheless, Nickels said MSAs would provide choice and flexibility. "Medical savings accounts give individuals and families more control over their health care dollars, and when you spend your own dollars, you spend them more wisely than you would spend company dollars or government dollars."

"The present tax code discriminates against individuals who do not have a generous employer. Today, employers can deduct up to 100 percent of the cost of health insurance for their employees, but self employed individuals can deduct only 30 percent and unemployed individuals can deduct

— \$5,500 income tax exemption for private sector retirees, matching an existing exemption for government retirees ... passed but stuck in conference committee.

— Repeal of the burdensome franchise tax ... killed by Senate Finance Committee.

— Tax exemption for first \$25,000 in income for new businesses ... killed by Senate Finance Committee.

— Tax credits for computer upgrades by Oklahoma firms ... killed by Senate Finance Committee.

— Tax credit for hiring Oklahoma college graduates ... killed by Senate Finance Committee.

Sen. Cal Hobson, D-Lexington, and vice-chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee, responded to Keating's charges.

"I am glad Governor Keating has started to follow the legislative process, but I wish he would follow it a little more closely before he issues his next erroneous press release on the progress of tax reduction incentives," he said.

"For example, the proposed tax cut on marginal wells is not stuck in conference committee as Governor Keating believes, it has been reported out for floor action. The Governor also failed to mention another tax reduction, a \$30 million cut in unemployment taxes for existing Oklahoma businesses, that is currently moving toward passage. I am sure Governor Keating would

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GOVERNOR, LEGISLATOR AND CONGRESSMAN SPEAK OUT ON TAXES

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Wednesday, Governor Frank Keating urged the Oklahoma Legislature to honor Tax Freedom Day — the day when Oklahomans finally pay their federal, state and local tax bill and begin keeping the money they make — by passing three of his tax cuts still buried in conference committee and resurrecting four others previously killed by the Democratic majority.

"Since January 1, Oklahomans have been working full time to pay their taxes for

1996," Keating said. "Today is Tax Freedom Day for Oklahoma. After 122 days of working for government, our citizens finally get to keep the first dime. I would think the Democrats who control the Legislature might want to honor that day by moving on my proposed tax cuts."

The Governor listed his tax cuts and credits, noting action taken so far by the legislative leadership to delay or kill them:

— Tax credits for investing in agricultural co-ops and value added processing ... passed but stuck in conference committee.

— Gross production tax cuts on marginal

have highlighted the proposal if it was authored by a Republican, but it was not. Our magnanimous Governor just cannot force himself to admit that Democrats support tax cuts too. The difference is we've tried to tie our tax reductions to economic development, whereas the Governor has constructed his tax package for political gain ... his tax cuts would not create a single new job."

Oklahoma's Sen. Don Nickles also spoke out on Tax Freedom Day.

MORE FROM THE HOUSE FLOOR, MAY 1, 1996

■(GIT) With the deadline only hours away for the filing of conference committee reports, the House considered only a handful of measures in a two-hour session that included a recess of just more than 30 minutes.

Actions taken by the House Wednesday include:

HB2494, by Rep. Ray Vaughn, R-Edmond, modifying sections of the Prevention of Youth Access to Tobacco Act related to the age of purchasers of tobacco products, received a passing vote of 97-0 with its conference committee report adopted. The report, Vaughn noted, did little to alter the bill, only clarifying some of its language.

HB2547, by Rep. Mark Seikel, D-Harrah, faced a different fate. Efforts to adopt Senate amendments to the bill failed, 31-48. Rep. Frank Davis, R-Guthrie, urged the House reject the amendments, as well as the bill, because of the Senate's amendment related to land titles on page four of the bill.

After failure to adopt the Senate amendments, Seikel asked that the measure be sent to conference committee.

HB2603, by Rep. William R. Paulk, D-Oklahoma City, providing that any person who willfully or maliciously sets fire to,

causes to be burned or burns another person shall be guilty of first-degree arson, received a passing vote of 92-0 with an emergency clause and its conference committee report adopted. The conference committee report simply restored the title to the bill, Paulk noted.

The House also adopted by unanimous consent **HCR1107**, by Rep. Deborah Blackburn, D-Oklahoma City. The resolution withdraws from the governor's desk **HB3008**, directing the Department of Corrections to not house or process inmates at the facility located at 1411 North Classen Boulevard in Oklahoma City and stating that no inmate shall be allowed to enter or remain in the building or on the grounds of the building, unless the inmate is under the direct supervision of DOC personnel.

Blackburn followed adoption of the resolution with a unanimous consent motion for the House to recede from its fourth-reading vote on the measure and to reject Senate amendments to the bill and return it to conference committee. The motion was granted.

Senate amendments to **HB2748** were also rejected by unanimous consent and conference requested, while further conference was granted for **HB2294** after the House agreed to reject its conference committee report.

MORE FROM THE SENATE FLOOR, MAY 1, 1996

■(GIT) Senate members considered the following pieces of legislation during Wednesday's floor activity:

HB2336, by Sen. Robert M. Kerr, D-Altus, allows for university and college supporting license plates to include those of private universities.

Concerns from Sen. Charles Ford, R-Tulsa, that the measure did not contain a provision pertaining to Olympic license plates caused Kerr to reject the bill's conference committee report and request further conference.

HB2494, by Sen. Ed Long, D-Enid, modifies sections of the Prevention of Youth Access to Tobacco Act relevant to the age of the purchaser of tobacco products.

Long said the Conference Committee Report simply cleans up the bill by removing amendments previously offered. Long said the Conference Committee Substitute regulates the penalty for employees who sell

tobacco products to minors by suspending their drivers licenses until that fine is paid.

Long also said the measure gives more freedom to municipalities to enforce the illegal sale of tobacco products, so long as the enforcement stays within the guidelines set forth by the ABLE Commission.

The CCR was adopted and the measure passed with a vote of 35-10.

HB2332, by Sen. Penny Williams, D-Tulsa recodifies the Oklahoma Breast Cancer Act.

Williams said the only changes the Conference Committee Substitute of the "Breast Cancer Bill" makes are to clean up modifications which delete redundant language.

The CCR was adopted and the measure was passed with a vote of 43-0.

HB2603, by Sen. Trish Weedn, D-Purcell, provides that any person who willfully or maliciously sets fire to, causes to be burned, or burns another person shall be guilty of arson in the first degree.

The CCR which restores the title of the bill was adopted by members, and the measure received a passing vote of 41-5.

SB7, by Sen. Ben Brown, D-Oklahoma City, creates refueling service for the disabled, requires service stations and like facilities to offer self-serve prices to the disabled, and requires the Corporation Commission to provide notices and rules.

Brown said the Conference Committee Substitute requires any gas station which offers full-service gasoline to pump the gas for the handicapped (as designated on their car) for the same price as self-service.

The CCR was adopted and the measure received a passing vote of 33-12.

SB682, by Sen. Howard Hendrick, modifies property exemptions from ad valorem taxation.

The adopted conference committee report stipulates that a non-profit organization may lease property it owns to another non-

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profit group without having to pay property tax on that property. However, if the property is leased to a for-profit organization, ad valorem taxes would be assessed.

With a vote of 45 to 0, the measure and its emergency passed.

SB730, by Sen. Ted Fisher, D-Sapulpa, modifies language and statutory references relating to the assessment and valuation of property; requires county assessors to assess specified improvements based on fair market value.

The CCR, which relates to the valuation and assessment of real property as related to fair cash value was adopted. The measure received a passing vote of 45-1.

SB747, by Sen. Mark Snyder, was brought up again on a motion to reconsider. The measure modifies voting requirements of a beneficiary which is a county in order to waive certain competitive bidding requirements to two-thirds of the governing body.

A motion to table the reconsideration motion was lodged. The motion passed and the bill was not heard.

SB765, by Sen. Trish Weedn, D-Purcell, authorizes the Department of Transportation to purchase individual safety recognition awards for its employees.

The House Amendments, which restore the stricken title, were accepted and the measure received a passing vote of 45-0.

SB836, by Sen. Enoch Kelly Haney, D-Seminole, appropriates funds to the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education from the Cash Flow Reserve Fund.

Haney said the Conference Committee Report submits a conference Committee Substitute which changes the name of Seminole Junior College to Seminole State College.

The CCR was adopted and the measure passed with a vote of 46-0 with an emergency clause.

SB871, by Sen. Sam Helton, D-Lawton, states that the governing body of a municipality may authorize the CEO of the municipality to respond to any request from any other jurisdiction within one state for law enforcement assistance in cases of emergency.

After adopting the conference committee report, members passed the measure with a vote of 45 to 0.

SB886, by Sen. Sam Helton, D-Lawton, provides for special license plates for police officers.

The House Amendment, which restores

the title of the bill was accepted, and measure received a passing vote of 46-0.

SB914, by Sen. Frank Shurden, D-Henryetta, prohibits the headlighting of feral animals.

The House Amendment, which restores the title of the measure was accepted, and the bill received a passing vote of 46-0 with an emergency clause.

SB981, by Sen. Frank Shurden, D-Henryetta, deletes weight limit provisions pertaining to vehicles delivering agricultural commodities weighed as a single draft.

The adopted conference committee report places limits of 90,000 pounds for longer combination vehicles.

Members passed the measure and its emergency clause with a vote of 45 to 0.

SB1002, by Sen. Ben Robinson, D-Muskogee, provides an additional basis for the issuance of a specified certificate from the Oklahoma Corporation Commission.

Members moved to lay over the conference committee report which relates to the requirements for public telephone construction and requires residential rates to be assessed for phone services to church proper.

SB1017, also by Shurden, states that troop commanders in charge of a highway patrol troop may designate specified portions of federal aid to primary highways and the state highway system in the service area of the troop.

The adopted conference committee substitute to the bill prevents those troops from regulating traffic in municipalities outside their service area.

"I'm trying to keep municipalities from making their revenue off the poor motorist traveling down the road," Shurden said. "If you are for speed traps, vote against this bill."

With a vote 36 to 8, the measure and its emergency clause passed.

SB1053, by Sen. Dave Herbert, D-Midwest City, deletes all confidentiality and sealing requirements relating to juvenile records.

Members moved to return the measure to conference to further work out possible problems.

SB1062, by Sen. Dick Wilkerson, D-Atwood, allows for the establishment of a crimes information unit within the Oklahoma Bureau of Investigation.

After accepting the House Amendments, the measure received a passing vote of 42-2.

SB1080, by Sen. Mark Snyder, R-Edmond, requires that a complete disclosure of name, mailing address and finding address

of every stockholder with at least five percent ownership shall be included with each hospice license application.

After adopting the conference committee substitute, members passed the measure and its emergency clause with a vote of 45 to 0.

SB1097, by Sen. Ben Robinson, D-Muskogee, modifies and defines language pertaining to Group Homes for Persons with Developmental Disabilities.

The bill's House amendments further clarify the definitions and related language.

After adopting the House amendments, members passed the measure with a vote of 39 to 1.

SB1175, by Sen. Bernest Cain, D-Oklahoma City, excludes the collection of child support from the statute of limitations. The measure also provides for liens against property and prevents child support from becoming dormant for any purpose.

Members adopted the conference committee substitute, and passed the measure with a 35-11 vote.

SB1270, by Sen. Lewis Long, D-Glenpool, defines "wireless telephone company" and "other telephone service company" as it applies to the Nine-One-One Emergency Number Act.

Members accepted the House Amendment which on page 1, section 1, line 20 inserts the language "the Advisory Committee shall also consider minimum standards for certification of call takers for 911 emergency service."

The measure received a passing vote of 45-1 with an emergency clause.

SB1315, by Sen. Ben Robinson, D-Muskogee, directs purchasing specifications and parameters relating to OneNet.

Robinson said the conference committee substitute exempts the State Board of Regents from the Oklahoma Central Purchasing Act.

Members adopted the substitute, and passed the measure with a 42-2 vote with an emergency clause.

Members also adopted **HCR1107**, which recalls **HB3008** from the governor's desk for further discussion. The bill directs the Department of Corrections to not house or process inmates at the facility located at 1411 N. Classen Blvd. in Oklahoma City. The bill was signed and transmitted to the governor on April 29.

The bill was then rescinded from fourth reading and final passage.

Also adopted was SCR36, by Sen. Jerry Smith, R-Tulsa, which authorizes the Board of Regents of Tulsa Junior College to issue revenue bonds, not to exceed the sum of \$12 million.

SCR54, by Sen. Bruce Price, D-Hinton, memorializes the US Congress to enact laws or otherwise cause the IRS to provide relief for farmers regarding agricultural production deferral agreements and directing distribution.

The resolution was adopted.

SJR37, by Sen. Keith Leftwich, D-Oklahoma City, designates a twenty mile radius emanating from the relative intersection of I-35, I-40 and I-44 as "America's Corner."

Members adopted the House amendments which on page 1, line 26 after the number "69", and before the letter "U." insert "U.S. 81,"

The resolution was also adopted.

The conference committee report to SB622 was rejected and further conference requested.

INHOFE TESTIFIES ON CHILD PILOT SAFETY

From U.S. Senator James Inhofe, R-Okla.

■(WASHINGTON) U.S. Senator James M. Inhofe, R-Oklahoma, told the House Aviation Subcommittee Wednesday that existing regulations concerning pilot qualifications were adequate to address legitimate safety concerns which had been raised in the wake of the recent crash which took the life of seven-year-old Jessica Dubroff and two others.

"We cannot legislate pilot error because pilots are humans and humans make mistakes."

Inhofe, a former member of the Subcommittee, is an active commercial pilot who has been involved in aviation for more than 30 years. In his testimony, he said he would not oppose HR3267, The Child Pilot Safety Act, which seeks to stop non-pilots from manipulating the controls of an airplane in an attempt to set an aeronautical record. He pointed out, however, that the public perception of young Jessica as being a "pilot" with full responsibility for the airplane was incorrect.

"Despite public perception, Jessica was not flying that airplane," Inhofe said. "Her instructor...was the pilot in command and Jessica was a passenger who manipulated the

controls when the pilot determined the conditions were safe to do so.

"I suspect that the investigation will conclude, as I believe the

evidence suggests, that the cause of the crash was pilot error. We cannot legislate pilot error because pilots are humans and humans make mistakes. HR3267 will not prevent this kind of tragedy, but it may help prevent a more restrictive bill from passing. My concern is that we not push young people away from pursuing their interest in flying."

"My interest is to enhance the safest mode of transportation—flying. I do not want Jessica's tragedy to make the public believe our regulations are inadequate because they are not."

STATE REGENTS CHAIRMAN SPEAKS OUT ON ENID HIGHER EDUCATION

From Regents for Higher Education

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Stating that the time had come to set the record straight, Frederick McCann, Chairman of the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education, Wednesday released a statement clarifying the role of the state's higher education system relating to higher education in Enid.

"Two separate proposals relating to higher education in Enid have been brought forward. The first would abolish the Enid Higher Education Program and create a campus of Northwest Oklahoma State University in its place. The NWOSU-Enid campus would be housed in the current Enid Higher Education Program facility and would be a sister campus to the campus in Alva.

"This proposal would require approval by the Oklahoma Legislature.

"A second and totally separate proposal has been brought forward by the City of Enid. The City has stated that it is prepared to purchase the Phillips University campus, should the university not be able to overcome its current financial difficulties. If the sale were approved, the City of Enid would own the

Phillips University campus.

"These two proposals are not linked. The approval or implementation of one is not dependent upon the other. Unfortunately, because these two proposals came forward at approximately the same time, some impressions have been given that each depends upon the other. That's just not the case.

"I want to stress that neither of these proposals recommends that Phillips University — as an institution — become a part of NWOSU or of the state system of higher education.

"It is my understanding that Phillips University supporters are attempting to identify funds to support the university. We hope they are successful and that Phillips University will be able to continue its long and noteworthy tradition of providing a well rounded liberal arts education.

"The State's system of higher education is also dedicated to providing quality education and to ensuring that the citizens of Enid and North-Central Oklahoma have access to the programs and courses that will enable them to fulfill their personal and professional goals."

"Two separate proposals relating to higher education in Enid have been brought forward. ... These two proposals are not linked."

HB2255 Creates the Defective Assistive Device Act; defines terms; states that any manufacturer who sells an assistive device shall provide the consumer with an express warranty for the device; provides for repair and or replacement of said vehicle; provides for disputes.

HB2261 Requires all individual and group health insurance policies providing coverage to women over the age of forty-five (45) to include coverage for a routine bone density test; defines terms.

HB2292 Directs Wildlife Conservation to keep confidential certain personal information provided with permit and license applications.

HB2293 Provides authority for Wildlife Conservation to enter into contracts and agreements for food, lodging, and other authorized expenses necessary to host, conduct, sponsor or participate in conferences, meetings, or training sessions.

HB2300 Authorizes the establishment of a forestry cost-share program. Creates the Forestry Cost-Share Fund. Prohibits the use of the fund for state agency purposes. Provides for eligibility criteria for basis of approval or denial of applications. Provides the appointment of an advisory committee.

HB2310 Modifies language pertaining to the Plumbing License Law of 1955. Defines the terms "plumbing contractor" and "journeyman plumber technician". Allows the State Department of Health to renew licenses.

HB2320 States that compensation of all elective city officers shall be fixed by ordinance.

HB2335 Allows a school board to create a policy regarding the food expenses of employees of the district incurred during travel.

HB2338 Relates to revenue and taxation; states that no assessment shall be required if a report or return, signed by the taxpayer, was filed and the liability evidenced by the report or return has not been paid.

HB2349 Authorizes the Wildlife Conservation Commission to establish a special use permit required by all persons who hunt or fish on private land leased by the Department of Wildlife Conservation; establishes a Twenty-Five Dollar (\$25.00) maximum annual fee for such license.

HB2351 Modifies language relating to nonresident hunting licenses.

HB2381 Modifies and limits the distribution of the Oklahoma Register.

HB2391 Modifies language and definitions relating to the Adult Day Care Act, excluding retirement centers and senior citizen centers from the definition of the terms adult day care center and center.

HB2428 Modifies, merges, and consolidates duplicative language pertaining to DHS, Health Care Authority, OSBI, courts, basic health benefits boards, etc.

HB2435 Modifies powers and duties of Urban Renewal Authority relating to condemnation of property.

HB2456 Clarifies language relating to the Insurance Commissioner's ability to adopt reasonable rules; exempts insurers which do not employ agents or employ agents which represent only the company of the insurer; allows for the transmission of countersignatures via FAX.

HB2469 Modifies language related to certified workplace medical plans.

HB2480 Designates the Friday after the fourth Thursday in November as a legal state holiday.

HB2487 States that the Board of Agriculture shall have jurisdiction over the importation of exotic livestock.

HB2499 Provides exemptions for utility collection vehicles.

HB2506 Modifies language relating to pornographic materials and the display of said materials to children; provides definitions.

HB2519 Recreates the Interagency Council for Services to Mentally Ill Homeless Persons until Feb. 1, 1997.

HB2530 States that a partial term of not more than eighteen months (18) for a member of the Board of Trustees of a library system shall not be considered a full term.

HB2535 Modifies language relating to the Cash Management and Investment Oversight Commission.

HB2549 Creates the "Coordination of Services for Older Oklahomans Act," which directs certain state agencies to design and implement a certain coordinated

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system of information, referral and follow up services for older citizens.

HB2556 Provides a Twenty-Five Dollar (\$25.00) filing fee for members of a church or religious organization wishing not to be incorporated; modifies contents of the certificate of incorporation; modifies statutory reference; modifies requirements for partnerships.

HB2561 Requires motor license agents to perfect the lien of a vehicle title that is presented to a motor license agent for transferring or registering when the documents reflect a lien holder.

HB2725 States that taxpayers with a taxable income of at least One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) in at least one (1) of the three (3) last taxable years may compute tax on an annual basis.

HB2726 Authorizes local school districts and county or city-county health departments may enter

into agreements related to assuring that a child who is returning to school after an absence due to head lice infection is no longer afflicted.

HB2754 Modifies membership qualifications of the Board of Trustees of the Oklahoma School of Science and Mathematics.

HB2798 Stipulates that at renewal the Oklahoma Linked Deposit Review Board may approve an increase in the amount of principal if the business is expanding and additional jobs will be created.

HB2807 Establishes April 19th of every year as Oklahoma City Bombing Remembrance Day.

HB2813 Permits counties to submit sealed bids to purchase equipment from the state or any agency or political subdivision of this state.

HB2899 Modifies the powers, duties and responsibilities of the Oklahoma International Trade Development Council.

HB2901 Allows counties reimbursement for volunteer training expenses. Allows a county sheriff to charge \$5.00 per card for fingerprinting individuals. Allows sheriff to deduct money from the Inmate Trust Fund Checking Account to cover medical co-payment's for medical services rendered while incarcerated and for copies requested by an inmate from the Inmate Trust Fund Checking Account.

HB2918 Provides for assistant and special assistant district attorneys to be named state officers and details responsibilities of the position.

HB2921 Adds certain types of telecommunication companies to subject to the Corporation Commissions public utilities assessment.

HB2930 Modifies penalties relating to eluding or attempting to elude a peace officer.

HB2934 Modifies definitions relating to the Health Care Freedom of Choice Act. Requires certain policies be brought into compliance and clarifies compliance.

HB2950 Modifies language pertaining to private prison facilities.

HB2962 Clarifies language within the Oklahoma Children's Code to address compulsory school attendance.

HB3000 Declares "Oklahoma My Native Land" the official children's song of the state.

HB3006 Modifies required deadlines for authorization to establish branch banks.

HB3021 Requires individual and group insurance policies to provide coverage for equipment, services and supplies for treatment of diabetes.

HB3024 Modifies various sections of the Oklahoma Self Defense Act.

HB3027 Modifies various sections pertaining to the Oklahoma Consumer Protection Act and the Perpetual Case Fund Act.

HB3028 States that any written bill of sale, timber deed or timber contract shall be preserved by the owner or operator of a logging or timber harvesting operation for at least a period of three (3) years. Within said time frame, law enforcement personnel may inspect records.

HJR1074 Designates Dec. 7 of each year as "Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day."

HJR1077 Designates US Hwy 64 from Pawnee west to US Hwy 177 shall be designated as the "Pawnee Bill Memorial Highway."

HJR1087 Creates the State Government Internal Affairs Investigation Review Committee.

HJR1100 Provides for state employees affected by the April 19, 1995 bombing to be excused from job related duties on April 19, 1996.

SB73 Creates the Oklahoma Child Visitation Registry Act; authorizes the district judge in each county in the state to authorize one or more public or private agencies to provide a child visitation registry program and allows participating agency to charge a fee not to exceed two dollars per parent, per visit.

SB 425 Prohibits adverse action against a student because of the student's service on jury duty.

SB 689 Requires certain reports be submitted triennially relevant to the Quality Jobs Program, Saving Quality Jobs Act, and Former Military Facility Development Act.

SB692 Changes the name of the Governor's Committee on Employment of the Handicapped to the Governor's Advisory Committee on Employment of People with Disabilities.

SB 693 Adds passenger rail service within the state to allowable deposits of revenue generated from motor fuels excise tax.

SB 711 Creates the Master Business License System Task Force.

SB 718 Creates a Three Hundred Dollar (\$300) petty cash fund for the Office of the Secretary of State.

SB 723 Increases advanced accreditation standard for county assessors from twenty (20) hours per year to thirty (30) hours every three (3) years.

SB 725 Provides procedure for payment of ad valorem taxes by mortgage servicers.

SB 733 States that time limits for the disposition of records of a municipal governing body may be determined by that body.

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SB 739 States that money market funds regulated by the Securities Exchange Commission may be purchased and invested in by a city or county treasurer.

SB 740 Requires the State Dept. of Education to recognize for purposes of certification and salary increments teachers certified in Oklahoma employed by DHS Child Study Center at University Hospital.

SB 752 Modifies language relating to special license plates; creates a United States Air Force Association License Plate.

SB 753 Modifies language and statutory references relating to the Waterworks and Wastewater Works Operator Certification Act

SB 775 Modifies statutory and gender references relating to the Oklahoma Energy Education and Marketing Act and the Department of Central Services; removes responsibility from said department for any buildings, rooms or space under the management or control of the University Hospitals Authority.

SB 783 Requires the Department of Agriculture to establish planting and harvesting seasons for the purpose of meeting the maximum driving and on-duty time exemptions set forth in the National Highway System Designation Act of 1995.

SB 797 Allows school districts to prohibit dogs from running at large within five hundred (500) feet of specified property.

SB 837 Appropriates funds for the expenses of various agencies of the executive, legislative and judicial branches of the state including, but not limited to, the State Arts Council, the State Board of Education, the State Regents, the Department of Libraries, the Board of Private Vocational Schools, OCAST, the State VoTech Board, the Oklahoma Commission for Teacher Preparation, the Office of the State Auditor and Inspector, the Ethics Commission, the Election Board, and offices of the Governor, the House of Representatives, the Legislative Service Bureau, OMPC, OPM, the Tax Commission, the Office of the Treasurer and others.

SB 946 Updates statutory references pertaining to the Oklahoma Mining Commission; clarifying positions of mining commission member appointments, stating terms of appointments; ratifying certain appointments.

SB 962 Provides for withdrawal of membership of any participating employer delinquent more than 90 days in paying the Oklahoma Public Employees Retirement System the contributions due.

SB 982 Directs the Department of Agriculture and the Oklahoma Department of Commerce to establish a strategic plan relating to value-added agricultural products.

SB 984 Creates the Foreign Animal Diseases Act.

SB 995 Restricts the power of certain boards to bring a declaratory ruling against any person or entity other than the licensees of that board or persons holding themselves out as licensees of that board.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: (04/09/96) This is to advise you that on this date, pursuant to the authority vested in me, I have VETOED HB2360 because the provisions of this bill would limit which state agencies would be eligible to be involved in efforts to address a problem that involves several areas of state concern including not only the need for regulatory fees and regulation of water safety, but also potentially environmental concerns and the Oklahoma tourism industry. Limiting participation could result in less than accurate and complete recommendations for resolution of the problem to be addressed.

In addition, there is an additional cost to the Oklahoma Public Employees Retirement System which has not been contemplated in the submitted proposed budget placed.

The item vetoed is found in Section 14 of the bill.

The current law provides for a majority of legislative appointment to an executive board which performs administrative duties. This bill does not correct that constitutional infirmity.
