PORNOGRAPHY ISSUE IN HIGHER ED FUNDING

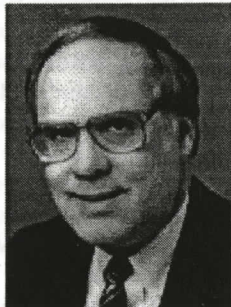

■(GIT) A state lawmaker on Thursday questioned the management of higher education institutions' by pointing to the discovery earlier this year of pornographic materials stored in a university computer system.

"Do you feel there is cause for the legislature to be concerned about how higher educational institutions are being managed," Rep. Fred Perry, R-Tulsa, asked Rep. Jack Begley, D-Goodwell, "when illegal pornography is discovered being stored in one of their computer systems? Doesn't that make you wonder how they're being managed?"

The question appeared to take Begley, author of **SB1809**, which provides funds to higher education, by surprise, and he attempted to shrug off the question. Perry did not relent, pressing Begley for an answer.

At issue was the discovery earlier of a number of files in a University of Oklahoma computer system containing obscene material reportedly downloaded from the Internet. The discovery and resulting outcry, includ-

ing that from some lawmakers, led the university to enact procedures restricting access from university computers to some Internet sites known to carry obscene materials.

When Begley suggested that the materials likely belonged to a student, Perry said, "You're missing my point. These materials were stored on the university's computer system. Isn't it cause for concern that such material is getting in there?"

Referring to actions taken at the university, Begley said that "management has taken control of the situation."

SECOND HALF OF PROPERTY TAX REFORM PASSED

■(GIT) Part two of a property tax relief package passed the House and Senate Thursday. The measure, **HB2198**, by Sen. Don Williams, D-Balko, is expected to save Oklahoma property owners millions in annual ad valorem taxes. The measure would amend the state constitution to accomplish the reform.

Under the measure:

✓ Increases in the assessed value of locally assessed real estate would be frozen at

five percent. Exceptions to the freeze would be in cases where a title is transferred or improvements are made.

✓ Oklahoma citizens over the age of 65 who earn less than \$25,000 each year would have their property valuations frozen after Jan. 1, 1997.

✓ Statewide tax assessment ratios would be set at 11 to 13.5 percent of fair cash value for land and buildings. Personal property including jewelry and large household items would be held at 10 to 15 percent.

Thirteen and one-half percent for real estate and 15 percent for personal property are the most the rates could ever reach under the measure. They may, however, be lowered.

The bill comes after the Senate passed a companion measure, **SB681**, which raises the maximum income allowed to receive a double homestead exemption and raises the minimum annual earning allowed to receive an income tax credit for property taxes exceeding one percent of that income to \$12,000 annually.

The proposed constitutional amendments passed the House with a vote of 99 to 0 and passed the Senate with a vote of 47 to 0. The bill's next stop is the governor's desk.

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BILL TO LIMIT TAX EXEMPT BONDS FOR POLITICIANS

■(GIT) A measure aimed at halting public officials' involvement in tax exempt bond negotiations passed the Senate Thursday, which sparked political dart throwing among members.

The bill, **HB1238**, by Sen. Kevin Easley, D-Broken Arrow, prevents elected officials and their spouses from participating in the bond transactions if they have a "direct or indirect financial interest in the project."

Calling the measure a "bullet," aimed at his professional livelihood, Sen. Charles Ford, R-Tulsa, said many elected officials in the state would be affected by its passage.

"It bothers me when we have people who have professions who chair committees who give life and death to legislation that directly affects their businesses," said the Tulsa real estate investor.

Other members felt the bill would hinder entrepreneurs from running for elected office.

"Don't vote for legislation that is going to hinder some young business men and women who want to run for office," said Sen. Dave Herbert, D-Midwest City.

Herbert, the focus of past media attention for a contract he once held with University Hospitals, suggested changing the bill to allow public officials to use the

tax-exempt bonds if they have not participated in related business dealings for four years.

"If someone is going lie, cheat and steal in a bond deal, then they are going to lie, cheat and steal whether it's illegal or not," he said.

Herbert said the measure would narrow public servants down to those who could afford to live on salaries paid by those who elected them. The former mayor of Midwest City reminded members he was only paid \$100 per month for that office.

GOVERNOR TO BE CONSIDERED FOR PAY RAISE

■(GIT) Governor Frank Keating or his successor could be paid more if lawmakers, as expected, consider and approve a bill increasing the office's salary.

Rep. Dwayne Steidley, D-Claremore, revealed late Thursday that a bill to increase the \$70,000 annual salary paid to the governor is likely to be brought before legislators.

"Some consideration is being given," Steidley told House members, "to introduction of legislation to increase the governor's salary and rightfully so."

The revelation came during questions concerning **SB804**, which appropriates money to the state's judicial system. A component of the bill gives judges from the associate district judge level to the justices on the Supreme Court a pay increase of 6.6 to 12 percent, Steidley said in response to a question from Rep. Wanda Jo Peltier, D-Oklahoma City.

And that means, Rep. Wayne Pettigrew, R-Edmond, said, that elected statewide office holders — such as the lieutenant governor, auditor and inspector, state treasurer and others — would receive a pay increase. That's because legislation passed in 1994 ties

Rep. Loyd Benson, D-Frederick, reiterated that the problem had been addressed, by both the university and the legislature which on Wednesday passed a resolution prohibiting obscene material on state computer systems.

"Sometimes," Benson said in reference to the OU situation, "people have to have things called to their attention before they can take action. That's what happened here."

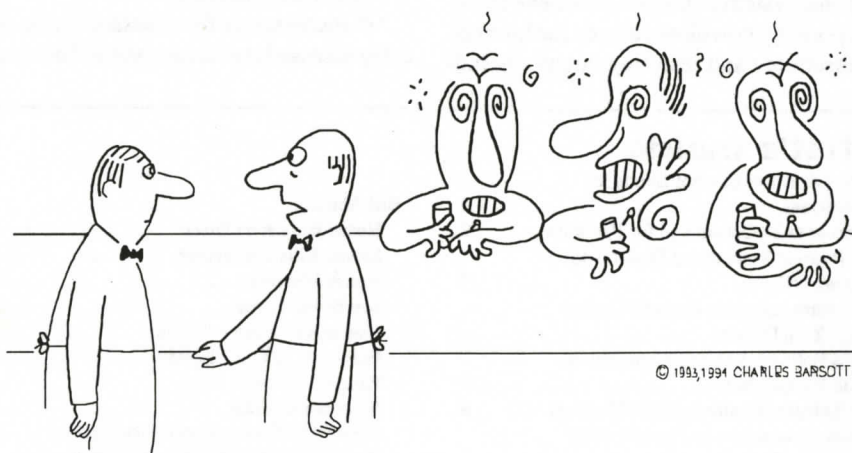
"I still think it's a question of management," Perry said before House members voted to approve the bill's conference report and gave the bill a 91-9 passing vote.

FIRST POSTWAR VIETNAMESE STUDENTS TO ATTEND OU

From Oklahoma University

■(NORMAN) Nine Vietnamese college students will be making history when they arrive at the University of Oklahoma May 25.

According to Vietnamese officials, they are the first postwar Vietnamese students who are not refugees or the children of refugees to attend a U.S. college or university.

The nine undergraduate students, all of whom speak English, have completed at least one year of college and are either employees or family members of employees of PetroVietnam, the national petroleum company headquartered in Hanoi. The students are being accompanied to the United States by a representative of the company.

"The University of Oklahoma is proud to provide new opportunities to help expand international understanding by admitting this

group of hard-working students to our university family," said OU President David L. Boren.

Their enrollment at OU came about through contacts made by state and university officials on an October 1995 trade mission to Vietnam. Principal facilitators were Oklahoma Sen. Billy Mickle of Durant; Dr. W. Darrell Gertsch, director of the OU Sarkeys Energy Center; Dr. Eddie Smith, OU vice president for research and dean of the Graduate College; and Dr. James Forgotson, OU geology professor.

Also as a result of the trip, research and training collaborations between the Energy Center and PetroVietnam have been negotiated and are under way.

The visit to Vietnam was the first for Gertsch since he served there as an Air Force pilot during the Vietnamese War.

Majors being pursued by the students include geophysics, business, economics, chemical engineering and petroleum engineering. The students will live in university housing and be encouraged to take part in university activities, Gertsch said. They are being welcomed to the United States with a Memorial Day picnic.

the salaries of statewide elected officials to those of certain judges.

The only exception in the law, however, is the governor's office, Steidley noted. The governor's office was left out of the 1994 law because Sens. Jerry Pierce, R-Bartlesville, and Bernice Shedrick, D-Stillwater, were then campaigning for the office.

The law also prevents an elected state official from receiving a pay increase enacted during their term in office. As a result, the increase for statewide elected officials would not take effect until after the 1998 statewide election.

Regardless of the fate of the legislation targeting the governor's office, the remainder of the statewide elected officials taking office after the 1998 election will receive a pay increase if SB804 is signed, several lawmakers noted. The bill passed both the House, 71-27, and the Senate, 38-4, on Thursday.

The amount of those increases will be dependent on the increase received by the judge to which the office is linked.

No legislation specifically addressing an increase in the governor's salary or its relation to other state officials' salaries currently exists, according to a Legislative Information Network search of active bills and active conference committee reports. That means the language would have to be added to a bill and presented as a conference committee substitute.

"We all know what this bill is about," said Sen. Helen Cole, R-Oklahoma City. "This bill is about J.C. Watts."

The bill's House Author, Rep. Ed Crocker, D-Norman, brought the legislation forward as a result of suspected impropriety surrounding Oklahoma Congressman J.C. Watts. Crocker is a candidate for Oklahoma's Fourth Congressional District, running against Watts.

The former Corporation Commissioner sits on the congressional oversight committee which regulates the country's banking and lending policies. He has been criticized for seeking tax-exempt funds for his private business dealings.

Cole called the bill a "gotcha" measure, saying it was aimed directly at Watts.

"Fair is fair," she said. "Under any other circumstances I'd probably be for this bill, but it is a means to getcha."

Easley said the bill was drafted last year.

"This bill was carried over from last year," he said. "This is not an election year bill."

He said those who choose political life should be prepared to "live in glass houses."

Members barely adopted the bill's conference committee report with a vote of 23 to 22. The bill ultimately passed with a vote of 27 to 19. It now goes to the House for its consideration.

LEGISLATURE APPROVES PARENTAL CONTROL OVER TEEN DRIVERS

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) The State Senate has given approval to a measure giving parents a say in whether their teenagers can get a driver's license.

"Having a driver's license is a privilege and a tremendous responsibility," said Senator Brad Henry, principal author of the bill.

"Unfortunately, some teenagers simply are not mature enough or responsible enough to handle it. But under current law, even if a parent has a real concern about their child, there's nothing they can do to stop them from getting a driver's license as soon as they turn 16," said Henry, D-Shawnee.

That would change if Governor Frank Keating signs **Senate Bill 1115** into law. Under SB1115, a parent would be able to file an objection with the local Department of Public Safety testing office to prevent their minor child from receiving a driver's license. Once a license is issued, parents would also have the ability to revoke a minor's driver's license until age 18. A revocation would re-

main in effect for at least three months.

"I believe this bill will give parents an important tool to help their teenagers become more responsible adults. If they have a real concern about a child's behavior, whether it's a matter of defying a curfew, skipping school, or drug or alcohol use, they should definitely have a say in whether this person would be allowed to drive. It may be the incentive some kids need to straighten up. It could save lives," said Henry.

Shawnee Representative Bob Weaver is House author of the bill.

"We're all very concerned about public safety, and about strengthening our families. I believe this bill will help address both those issues in a positive way. If we want parents and families to be more accountable for what their children are doing, then we need to make sure the law is on the parent's side. This is what SB1115 does," said Weaver.

The measure now awaits the Governor's signature.

FAA RELEASES CHALLENGE 2000 FINDINGS

■(WASHINGTON) The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) will streamline its rule making process, revamp its Regulation and Certification organization, and build world centers of excellence in aviation safety, as part of a plan to keep the agency apace with the rapidly evolving aviation industry as America enters the 21st century.

"Although the changes, in the long run, will be dramatic, we are taking a measured approach that will ensure our actions enhance aviation safety."

"The FAA must prepare now to meet the combined challenges of rapidly changing technologies, and unprecedented growth in air travel in the future," FAA Administrator David R. Hinson said recently while unveiling the findings of the Challenge 2000 project, an exhaustive review of how FAA responds to changing needs in the aviation industry. "That's why last year I asked two independent sources to take a top-to-bottom look at our safety regulation and certification operation."

"In the spirit of common sense government, the President's reinventing government effort, we are taking a hard look at how we can work better for our customers into the next century. The recommendations of Challenge 2000 will help us chart a course from where we are now, to where we need to be in the future," Hinson said. "I have established a leadership team from within the Regulation and Certification organization that will spend 120 days reviewing the recommendations and implementing those we decide to accept."

Praising the impressive U.S. aviation safety record, the Challenge 2000 report notes that if the present accident rate remains constant while demand for air travel grows at a rate of approximately five percent annually over the next decade, there will be an increase in the number of aviation accidents in the next 10 to 15 years. Achieving the FAA's "zero accident rate" will require a new sense of purpose on the part of the FAA and the industry it regulates, the report states.

Hinson emphasized that any changes in the Regulation and Certification organization will be done methodically, over a period of three to six years. "The Regulation and Certification organization has done a

MAPS BALLPARK REVISED PLANS DUE IN JUNE FOR JULY BIDS; MAYOR TO HOLD SPECIAL MEETING WITH BOARD COMMITTEE IN JUNE

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Members of the MAPS Citizens Oversight Board were told Thursday that the final, revised plans for the Bricktown Ballpark will be delivered in June and that the second round of construction bids will be taken in July. Board Member Bert Cooper said Mayor Ron Norick told a special "Mayor's Committee" yesterday about the plans and said the Construction Review Subcommittee will hold a special meeting on June 14 to consider the plans and be briefed by the mayor. The entire MAPS Citizens Oversight Board will also hold a special meeting on June 17 to consider the plans which will then be presented to the City Council for consideration on Tuesday the 18th. That timeline left one board member wondering if the citizens board was a "rub-

ber stamp" since the full board will have only one day to consider the revised plans.

The board was also told — for the third time — that funding for the highly-touted Local Business Utilization Plan was running out and would be gone in four months. This plan was devised as a way to encourage local, small, minority-owned business to participate in MAPS. Project Coordinator FSB said it has no plans to continue the LBU past its contractually-required cut-off date, but suggested the city take over the LBU process and apply it to all city projects. City officials said there were no plans to continue or expand the LBU at this time.

tremendous job in ensuring the safety of skies for the traveling public," Hinson said. "But we must always strive to be better."

"Although the changes, in the long run, will be dramatic, we are taking a measured approach that will ensure our actions enhance aviation safety. This is the next phase in our approach to aviation safety — working hand-in-hand with the aviation community to reach the goal of zero accidents."

Hinson said he was gratified to learn that some of the key recommendations in Challenge 2000 are efforts that the FAA already has begun. He noted that the recommendation to create teams comprised of experts in a special area to expedite rule making echoes the approach that was taken in publishing the "one level of safety" Commuter Rule Safety Initiative in a record 11 months. He noted that the task force recommendations also call for strengthening the partnerships between FAA and air carriers and manufacturers, which complements the FAA's philosophy that zero accidents can only be achieved through a shared responsibility with all segments of the aviation community. Listed below are highlights of the task force's recommendations.

Best Practices: The Regulation and Certification organization (AVR), working with industry, would identify industry practices that promote a safe operating environment. AVR would encourage adoption of such "best practices" by industry and assist with their implementation.

Centers of Excellence: AVR would create centers of excellence (COE), which would serve as repositories of expertise and become the recognized authorities on specific areas, thus increasing the efficiency and consistency of information provided to other FAA officers and to industry.

Expedite Rulemaking: The FAA would improve the rulemaking function by providing additional high-level attention, moving from the present step-by-step sequential process to creating integrated rulemaking teams. Such an approach was used in creating the "one-level of safety" commuter Safety Rule in record time — approximately one year. The integrated teams would include all necessary FAA resources and would coordinate closely with the Aviation Rulemaking Advisory Committee (ARAC). ARAC is comprised of 64 organizations representing all facets of the aviation community. The new approach to rulemaking would focus attention on the outcome rather than the bureau-

FEDERAL GOVERNMENT TO PROMOTE JOBS AND PRIVATE SECTOR INVESTMENT IN LOCAL COMMUNITIES

■(WASHINGTON) In a continuing effort to strengthen the economy and create greater opportunity, President Clinton Tuesday signed two executive orders that will make the federal government a more effective partner in promoting jobs and private-sector investment in our central cities and distressed rural heartlands.

An executive order on federal contracting launches the President's Empowerment Contracting program, providing a supplement, not a replacement, to existing federal procurement programs. The program will offer special incentives for government contracting awards to businesses in distressed communities. Under the empowerment contracting order, large businesses that hire a significant number of residents and that will generate significant economic activity in low-income areas will be eligible to participate in the program. Small businesses may participate if they meet either test.

A second executive order encourages federal agencies to locate offices in the historic districts of our central cities. The order also attempts to ease the regulatory burdens that impede the government's ability to establish or maintain a presence in these districts.

The President said, "Together, these orders will help breathe life into our central cities, providing yet another example of the new partnership my Administration has forged between Washington, the private sec-

tor, and local communities. Through these orders — and other community empowerment initiatives like our Empowerment Zones and Enterprise Communities program and our Community Development Financial Institutions Fund — we are stressing the need for private-sector investment and broad partnerships to revitalize communities that have been left behind despite our economic recovery."

Vice President Gore initiated the orders in his role as Chair of the Community Empowerment Board, the Cabinet-level group which coordinates the Administration's community empowerment initiatives. "We recognize that the private sector must be the driver of economic opportunity. However, as these orders make clear, the government can be an effective partner by helping distressed communities attract private-sector investment and providing these communities with the tools to solve their own problems," said Gore.

OU LIBRARIES MEET \$1.15 MILLION CHALLENGE

■(NORMAN) The University of Oklahoma Libraries now have a permanent endowment with the recent completion of the \$1.15 million Kerr Challenge Grant from the Kerr Foundation of Oklahoma City.

Initiated in 1986, the Kerr Foundation challenge grant issued \$115,000 annually for 10 years to the University Libraries, provided the libraries matched that amount from other private donations to create a permanent endowment.

"The University of Oklahoma is proud to announce that the Kerr Foundation's initial challenge grant has been fulfilled for the University Libraries," said OU President David L. Boren. "These funds have helped to provide much-needed resources for the Libraries, including the purchase of books and special stipends for library assistants. The OU Libraries — the largest library system in the state — are the central resource for our educational mission of teaching and research."

Matching funds raised by the University Libraries were placed in an endowment that will continue to support the programs funded by the Kerr Foundation during the past 10

cratic process of developing a rule.

Restructure AVR: AVR would be restructured to accommodate the new model — the centers of excellence. To accommodate these centers, AVR will review its present organizational structure with an eye toward streamlining whenever possible.

Upgrade information management capabilities: The FAA should continue to improve and upgrade information management capabilities.

In July 1995, Hinson announced the Challenge 2000 Project and chose the McLean, VA-based firm of Booz Allen and Hamilton to conduct the review and provide recommendations for positioning the agency's Regulation and Certification organization to continue providing effective oversight in the future.

OU AWARDED \$20 MILLION FOR FAA TRAINING

■(NORMAN) The University of Oklahoma College of Continuing Education has been awarded a 4½-year Federal Aviation Administration Air Traffic Instructional Services contract valued at approximately \$20 million.

Through the award, which continues more than 25 years of partnership between the FAA and OU, the university will assist the FAA in providing air traffic control training by supporting instructional, educational and programming services at the FAA Academy at the Mike Monroney Aeronautical Center in Oklahoma City.

OU collaborated with the American Systems Corporation (ASC), another provider of instructional development and delivery services to the FAA to successfully compete for the Air Traffic Instructional Services contract.

The FAA contract marks the third major award to the OU College of Continuing Education since October. Since that time, the College has received a \$19 million award from the U.S. Department of Education to form a regional educational resource center and a \$45 million contract from the U.S. Postal Service to provide instruction and technical assistance at the USPS's sole technical training center in Norman.

"The awarding of this major training contract to our University of Oklahoma College of Continuing Education demonstrates once again that OU is a major player in attracting federal contracts, whether for training our nation's postal workers, or, as in this case, training our country's air traffic controllers," said OU President David Boren.

With the new contract, educational programs provided by OU will have trained more than 38,500 air traffic controllers and other FAA personnel since the 1981 initiation of the Air Traffic Instructional Services program. The total awards to OU during this period have exceeded \$200 million.

The FAA Academy is the primary provider of air traffic control training in the United States and a substantive provider of air traffic control training around the world. At the Academy, air traffic controllers of all levels of expertise — from new hire to full performance level to facility managers — are trained with the most innovative instructional methodologies and state-of-the-art equipment available.

"We are pleased to be continuing our instructional partnership with the FAA," said

James P. Pappas, vice provost for continuing education. "Our technical staff worked especially hard to develop educational service models that would be effective in the changing world of electronic delivery systems and new approaches to learning."

The program's training and development services are staffed with air traffic control instructors, instructional systems development specialists, education specialists, computer systems analysts and computer programmers and support and administrative staff. The program also provides consultants from the OU facility and from the Northwestern Kellogg School of Business.

Initial qualification training, designed for the beginning student, includes the fundamentals of basic aviation, weather, communications and Federal Aviation Regulations, equipment operations and procedures and critical air traffic control job tasks. The Radar Training Facility and the Automated Flight Service Station lab realistically simulate conditions in field facilities.

Specialized and advanced training for Full Performance Level air traffic controllers and supervisory staff is also offered at the Academy and includes courses in such widely diverse areas as automation, traffic management, airspace management and quality assurance.

Air traffic courses can be tailored by the OU College of Continuing Education to meet the needs of international air traffic students who enroll through the joint efforts of their country, the State Department and the FAA.

In addition to providing quality air traffic instruction, the university assists the academy in developing and maintaining currency of all FAA resident and field facility training materials. Updated versions are sent periodically to FAA facilities for refresher and on-the-job training conducted at the facility sites.

Resident training materials are used for students who come from FAA facilities throughout the United States to the academy for advanced training. An increasingly cost-effective format for these field courses is Computer-Based Instruction (CBI), the foundation of the FAA's Computerized Air Traffic Training System. The OU staff specializes in CBI development techniques and has converted a large number of courses to that format.

The OU College of Continuing Education maintains a high involvement throughout the aviation industry. Other programs

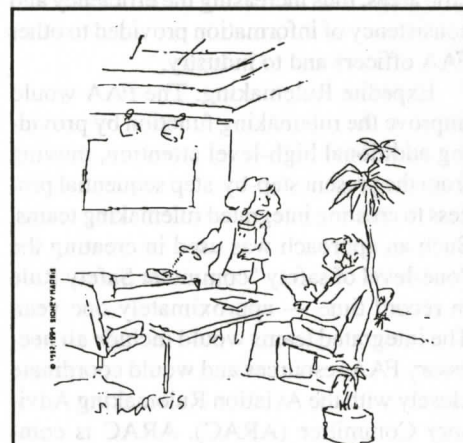
administered by the college include an aviation program and pilot certification, diversity and quality standards training to FAA employees, global positioning system research, and Partnership 21, an international forum to promote the development of a global approach to civil aeronautics and air commerce. Another effort is a program the college is forming to teach aviation English to aviation industry personnel worldwide.

"The continuation of the long-standing partnership between the FAA and OU is an exciting prospect," said "C" Edwards, project manager at OU. "It will provide a valuable opportunity for bold and innovative education and development processes to be implemented by this dynamic team into the 21st century."

years. At the completion of the Kerr Challenge Grant, the Kerr Endowment held \$1.15 million.

Sul Lee, dean of University Libraries, noted the large number of people who contributed to the challenge grant program, enabling it to be completed slightly ahead of schedule. More than 1,100 individual donors, 67 corporate gifts and 30 foundations helped make the effort a success.

If not strictly adhered to, our nepotism laws could become meaningless. Creating exceptions to nepotism laws sends the wrong message.

By this action a state employee will not be prevented from participating in these or other types of private organizations.

This bill fails to address the problem of the violation of the Oklahoma Constitution that provides for legislative appointments to an executive board which performs administrative duties. This bill does not correct that constitutional infirmity.

SB 987 Principal Author(s): Adair, Larry; Stipe, Gene; Provides exception for the Department of Transportation pursuant to disclosure of terms of bids. Requires the department to publish all engineering estimates at least 10 days prior to the bid submission closing date. Effective Date: 07/01/96; 05/01/96 Governor Action - Veto.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: (05/01/96) This is to advise you that, pursuant to the powers vested in me, I have VETOED SB987. The procedure provided for in this bill creates an exception, applicable only to the Department of Transportation, to the safeguards relating to the bidding process in this State. The awarding of multi-million tax dollar contracts by a state agency is a serious responsibility which must be carefully regulated and monitored. It is in the best interest of the citizens and taxpayers of this state to keep in place all procedures which assure an equitable and ethical bidding process.

SB 988 Principal Author(s): Dunegan, James; Stipe, Gene; Requires the Dept. of Transportation to issue permits for multi-state oversize and overweight vehicles. Designates specific routes for vehicles operating under such permits. 05/07/96, Governor Action - Veto.

GOVERNOR'S VETO MESSAGE: (05/07/96) This is to advise you that on this date, pursuant to the authority vested in me, I have VETOED SB 988. This bill violates the provisions of the Oklahoma Constitution that delegates authority to regulate certain types of truck permits to a private non-governmental entity. This legislation mandates the Department of Transportation to accept truck weight load limits set by the private entity without regard to concerns about the effect such limits may have on Oklahoma streets, roads, bridges, and highways. Current law authorizes the Department of Transportation to enter into regional truck permit agreements when it is practical and feasible for the state.
