HOUSE, SENATE PASS INDIAN GAS TAX BILL

■(GIT) Calling it a reasonable solution to a complex problem, state lawmakers late Thursday gave their approval to a bill designed to address the Indian motor fuel tax question.

HB2208, by Rep. Howard Cotner, D-Frederick, and Sen. Ed Long, D-Enid, was passed by both houses of the legislature. The bill is expected to be sent to the governor, who has voiced his support for the measure, on Friday.

Key provisions of the bill include:

- ✓ Procedures for the exemption for sales of motor fuel to eligible government entities, including Indian tribes, and procedures for motor fuel tax refunds for certain tax exempt users;

- ✓ Precollection of motor fuel taxes by the supplier; and

- ✓ Procedures for Indian tribes to enter into a contract with the state providing that the tribe will not challenge the constitutionality of the act and in return the state will apportion quarterly to the tribes a portion of the state motor fuel tax revenues.

Under the terms of the bill, tribes entering into a contract with the state would receive three percent of the total fuel tax revenues during fiscal year 1997; four percent in fiscal year 1998; and 4.5 percent in fiscal

year 1998 and in following years.

Despite the anticipated annual appropriations to the Indian tribes, estimates from legislative staffs indicate, the state should see an increase in gas tax revenue due to increased compliance with the tax requirements.

The agreement was necessary after the US Supreme Court ruled last June that Indian tribes do not have to pay taxes on motor fuels. In the case, *Oklahoma Tax Commission v Chickasaw Nation*, the court unanimously upheld a ruling by the Tenth Circuit court of Appeals in invalidating Oklahoma's excise tax on motor fuel and diesel fuel sold by Chickasaw Nation retail stores in Indian Country, rejecting Oklahoma's argument that the proper approach to evaluate a direct state

imposed tax on Indian tribes or on tribal members inside Indian Country is to employ a balancing test and weigh the relevant state and tribal interests.

Rep. Howard Cotner, D-Frederick and chief architect of the bill, and other House members described the bill as the best possible solution to what one representative said was "a sticky situation."

Some of the bill's opponents, however, claimed it would make the state a hostage to the Indian nations.

"This will allow one group of citizens to hold another group hostage," Rep. Don Weese, R-Broken Arrow, said. "We don't have to throw in the towel."

Rep. Dan Webb, R-Oklahoma City, said,

HOUSE REPUBLICANS PUSH PAY PLAN PROPOSAL

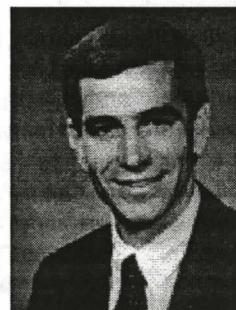
■(GIT) Republicans in the House plan on Friday to push a proposal designed to fund the state employee pay raises vetoed by the governor, a Republican representative told *Capitol Network News*.

"We'll try to do it by inserting it into one of the three Senate appropriations bills scheduled for consideration on Friday," Rep.

Jim Reese, R-Narden, said, referring to a proposal advanced twice on Thursday by Republicans that would appropriate money for the pay raise to 14 agencies.

Those agencies had funding for the pay raise vetoed earlier in the week in a series of line-item vetoes issued by Governor Frank Keating.

Rep. Tim Pope, R-Mustang, first raised the issue on Thursday during consideration of **SB832**, which appropriates funds to the State Board of Vocational and Technical Education. Pope tried unsuccessfully to have the bill's conference committee report rejected so that language could be added to "(P)rovide appropriations for the state employee pay raise as authorized by **SB1128** and provide appropriation for the employer's contribution increase for the Oklahoma Pub-

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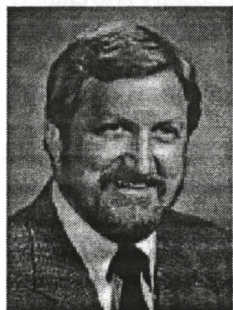
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 "We are going to start supporting another sovereign nation because they could threaten to sue the state."

Reading from a mock news article, Webb compared the proposal to a state being held hostage until lawmakers decided to pay the hostage takers.

Rep. Larry Ferguson, R-Cleveland, urged the rejection of the bill's conference committee report out of

what he said was concern that the governor might be veto the bill. He said he based his position on the governor's statement that the state should have the ability to audit tribe's use of the money they could receive under the terms of

the bill. That provision, he said, was not specifically included in the bill.

"The biggest problem I have," the House Minority Leader explained, "is that we've been working on this for several months, we've changed boats in the middle of the stream and all of a sudden we're voting on an agreement.

"I just don't think we've thought this all the way through."

Rep. Jim Hamilton, D-Poteau, called the agreement historic:

"This is the first time the Indian tribes have waived their sovereign immunity to enter a contract with the state of Oklahoma."

Hamilton added, "It's time to put our trust

in them as they've put their trust in us by being willing to waive their sovereign immunity."

Cotner's motion to adopt the bill's second conference committee report received a 63-34 passing vote, followed by a 64-33 passing vote for the bill.

The measure then moved to the Senate.

Senate Minority Leader Gerald "Ged" Wright, R-Broken Arrow, under limited debate, said he was disappointed with the final version of the bill. He said agreements reached earlier in the day were not represented in the bill.

"I don't know how the man on the second floor is going to feel about this," he commented.

He cited two issues that particularly "offended" him, one being the question of whether or not the state has the right to audit tribal nations to assure agreements are being adhered to. Wright, an attorney, said such audits are perfectly legal.

"Contract law is very clear on that," he said.

He also argued that Republicans were not adequately represented in the negotiations.

He accused the tribes of taking advantage of the state.

"I don't understand how citizens of our state who drive our roads shouldn't have to pay for it," he said. "We've got some people in the state that aren't part of us anymore."

Sen. Cal Hobson, D-Lexington, a key figure in negotiations with tribal and state officials, said the state must respect the fact that the tribes are indeed sovereign nations.

"These people are indeed sovereign entities," he said. "They do not expect us to be directive of their assets just as we do not expect us to be directive of theirs."

Though he called Native Americans "probably the most persecuted race on the face of this earth," Sen. Frank Shurden, D-Henryetta, opposed the measure, saying it would destroy Oklahoma's tax base.

"The Indian nation doesn't need this for their livelihood," he said. "I have no problem with non-Indian tax dollars going to help the tribes, they deserve it, but on things like this, you ought to pay."

Shurden said the "mom and pop" gas stations across the state would be ruined as a result of the compact.

Other members offered other solutions to the bill. Sen. Don Rubottom, R-Tulsa, suggested that the matter be deferred to the Oklahoma Tax Commission for them to address on an issue-by-issue basis. He ques-

tioned the legality of the state entering into contracts for more than one year at a time, which is prohibited by state law.

Hobson assured that officials, including the Attorney General's Office, were in agreement that the compact was perfectly legal.

The bill now heads to the governor.

"This is a win-win agreement. It strengthens the ties between Oklahoma and its tribes and ensures this important funding to help the tribes and to help rural Oklahoma," Governor Frank Keating said only hours before the bill's passage.

"This is a tremendous sign of good will on behalf of the state. It's important to step aside from lawsuits and come together to integrate fully the tribal leadership as sovereigns with the state of Oklahoma," the governor added. "It allows us to work together for mutual prosperity, mutual understanding and mutual respect."

lic Employees Retirement System ..." for 14 agencies whose money for those expenses had been vetoed by the governor.

A motion to adopt the bill's conference committee report received a passing vote of 55-41, leading to a passing vote on the bill of 54-43.

Rep. Wayne Pettigrew, R-Edmond, raised the issue later on Thursday when the House considered **SB811**, which specifies budget limitations for health services agencies. Pettigrew asked the bill's author, Rep. Jim Hamilton, D-Poteau, whether he was aware the Edmond lawmaker had instructions on the table to fund the pay raise and related expenses. Hamilton said he was not, and asked House Speaker Glen Johnson, D-Okemah, to rule on the germaneness of the instructions.

After consulting with the chief clerk, Johnson ruled the instructions were not germane because the bill dealt with substantive language, while the instructions made appropriations.

The House adopted the conference committee report by unanimous consent and the bill received a passing vote of 87-10.

Reese said the proposed instructions are germane to the three Senate bills up for consideration on Friday — **SBs 819, 825 and 1254** — which each make appropriations.

Meanwhile, the governor also challenged legislative leaders to "stop playing end-of-session politics" with funds earmarked for

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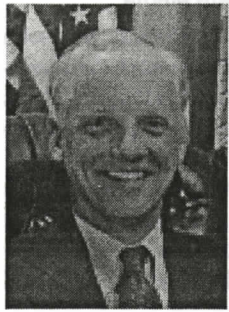

state employee pay raises.

"If the legislature will send me clean, revised appropriations bills that address the raises and nothing more than our original budget, I'll sign them before the close of business Friday," Keating said. "My pen is uncapped and ready. The legislative leadership knows very well that these much-needed raises are mandated and will go into effect on July 1 no matter what they do. By making this money a political football they're putting agency heads throughout state government in an unnecessarily difficult position."

The governor reiterated a position expressed by House members of his party during an attempted veto override on Thursday: Some of the appropriations approved by lawmakers have included unrelated spending that exceeded the executive budget requests presented in February.

"They knew precisely what they were doing by lumping money to fund the raises with other budget-busting items," he said. "By tying them together, they made it impossible to separate the raise money from other funds. To safeguard the public from irresponsible spending, I had no choice but to use the veto."

Keating said legislative leaders have adequate time to revise the vetoed sections of the appropriations bills to include the raise money and exclude additional spending.

"(Wednesday) they were talking about adjourning early," he said. "They can't claim they don't have time to revise these bills and assure full funding for the raises."

Maintaining the position they staked out on Wednesday, Democratic lawmakers reiterated that they would not resubmit bills containing the pay raise for the legislature and governor's consideration.

"We have no plans to bail the governor out of the dilemma he has created," said Senate Pro Tempore Stratton Taylor, D-Claremore.

Also on Thursday, Keating issued the following line-item vetoes:

✓ **HB1780**, section 31, appropriates \$3,000,000 to OCAST;

✓ **HB1782**, allocating \$300,000 of OCAST's appropriation to research and de-

velopment partnership projects involving two year or four year institutions of the State System of Higher Education with persons, entities, cooperative programs, or with Oklahoma industry;

✓ **HB1783**, section 4, appropriates \$227,326 to State Fire Marshall;

✓ **HB1795**, section 12, decreasing DEQ's appropriation level by \$3,047,663; section 14, references decrease noted in section 12; section 17, appropriates \$178,688 to Department of Mines; section 20; appropriates \$450,000 to MESONET via the Water Resources Board; and section 23, appropriating \$ 50,000 to complete Mangum Reservoir Project of the Water Resources Board;

✓ **HB1799**, creates in the State Treasury a revolving fund for the Department of Environmental Quality to be designated the "Department of Environmental Quality Revolving Fund." The fund shall be a continuing fund, not subject to fiscal year limitations, and shall consist of all monies received by the Department from appropriations, administrative penalties, fees, charges, gifts and monies from any other source that are not designated for deposit to any other fund authorized by this Code;

✓ **SB800**, section 40, Oklahoma Commission for Teacher Preparation; and section 47, State Board of Vocational & Technical Education appropriation of an additional \$1,486,980 from the proceeds of bonds deposited in the Oklahoma Building Bonds of 1992 Fund (B) in the State Treasury;

✓ **SB805**, proposal to use funds from the State Judicial Retirement Fund to implement Supreme Court computer automation plan and court security enhancements;

✓ **SB814**, section 2, appropriates \$250,000 to the Dept. of Agriculture for Rural Fire Training Centers; section 4, appropriates \$100,000 to the Dept. of Agriculture for a diagnostic swine lab; section 5, appropriates \$30,000 to the Dept. of Agriculture for Rural Development Council; section 8, appropriates \$45,000 to the Dept. of Agriculture to fund the salary of a Regional Fire Coordinator; section 9, appropriates \$370,000 to the Dept. of Agriculture for a Center for International Trade; section 10, appropriates \$ 15,000 to the Dept. of Agriculture to support the Economics of Agriculture event; and section 20, appropriates \$303,170 to the Horse Racing Commission;

✓ **SB816**, section 1, State Arts Council; section 9, appropriates \$336,500 to the Dept. of Tourism & Recreation for planning &

development; and section 11, appropriates \$200,000 to the Dept. of Tourism & Recreation for the Multicounty Organization Match increase; and

✓ **SB1043**, expands damages for injury to a right to or interest in water.

PUBLIC EMPLOYEES OUTRAGED BY VETOES

■(GIT) "This association is not playing the game of Democrats and Republicans, we just want to address the issue," was the comment from Oklahoma Public Employees Association (OPEA) Executive Director Gary Jones Thursday, blasting Governor Frank Keating and the Legislature for their failure to enact legislation that would, they say, give some \$7.1 million in mandated pay raises and related employee expenditures to state employees.

Jones responded to the numerous vetoed bills containing the state employee pay increases set forth in **SB1128**, signed into law last month. Attempts to override the governor's vetoes failed late Wednesday in the House.

Jones accused the second and fourth floors of dragging their feet and creating partisan gridlock in terms of addressing the issue, pointing out that each of the bills originally passed with at least 74 votes in the House and 40 votes in the Senate.

"How can you on one hand vote for a piece of legislation and then turn around and not vote to override the governor's veto," Jones asked. "If there was a problem with the budget, they [the Legislature] have had four months to fix it."

Jones estimates some 1,500 employees could possibly be affected by the cuts. Since the pay raise has been signed into law, agencies would be required to somehow find the money to fund the salary increases. Layoffs and furloughs may be necessary to meet the, what Jones calls, unfunded mandate.

"Political partisanship in the last two days of the Legislature serves no one," he said.

Jones said agencies anticipating employee reductions include the Merit Protection Commission, the Indian Affairs Commission and the Human Rights Commission.

"I'm not going to get into a racial argument, but in some categories, minorities will be the hardest hit."

Jones also said that the Office of the State

FOURTH OVERRIDE ATTEMPT UNSUCCESSFUL

■(GIT) House Democrats tried unsuccessfully for the fourth time in two days to override line-item vetoes issued by the governor.

Some \$6310,234 appropriated to the Office of the State Auditor and Inspector and \$1.8 million allocated to the Oklahoma Tax Commission were at issue on Thursday when House members considered overriding Governor Frank Keating's line-item vetoes in HB1787.

The 63-35 vote to sustain the governor's veto came despite praise from both sides of the aisle for State Auditor and Inspector Clifton Scott and the work performed by his office.

"He may have the toughest job in all of state government," Rep. Tommy Thomas, D-Atoka, told fellow House members during debate on the motion to override the governor's line-item veto. But, Thomas said, the veto was inconsistent with Keating's claim of being a law and order governor and protector of the public's interest.

"The veto is inconsistent," he said, "and ill advised at best. If he is going to say he's tough on crime, for law and order and say he stands for the public's interest, this veto is wrong."

House Majority Leader Rep. Loyd Benson, D-Frederick, also praised the auditor and his staff, reading off a long list of investigations conducted by the auditor's office, as well as a list of criminal convictions that have resulted from the probes.

"I sat down yesterday," Benson said, "and tried to figure out why the governor would pick on the state's watchdog, and I just can't."

The veto, Benson added, could lead the office to cut 10 auditors if funds for the state employee pay raise are not made available. That, Benson said, would devastate an office already involved in seven investigations

and with more than a dozen requests waiting.

Republican lawmaker Leonard Sullivan, of Oklahoma City, said the veto represented part of "a new era in state government."

"It's like you're being hit in the head with the two-by-four," Sullivan said. "You should be learning that the governor is part of the budgeting process."

"This and the other vetoes show that the Republicans and governor are part of the process. This is like a training program for you, because you may be in the minority next year."

That idea did not sit well with Rep. Jim Glover, D-Elgin, who argued the Republicans should have been active in the process last week when the appropriations bills were considered.

"The right thing to do," Glover said, "was to stand up when the bills were out here."

Rep. James Dunlap, R-Bartlesville, also said the vetoes represented a change in the status quo.

"This represents the ability of this side of the aisle to change the way this legislature does business," Dunlap said, adding that he supported the auditor and his office and that he had voted for Scott in the last election.

"But these bills put all the appropriations together into one lump sum. That doesn't give the governor the ability to line-item veto those things he feels are inappropriate or excessive," Dunlap said.

Speaker of the House Glen Johnson, D-Okemah, concluded debate on the unsuccessful effort to override the governor's veto, saying the Republicans' idea of affecting the budget process "was a good idea — one week ago when the bills first came through."

Johnson called the Republicans' decision to sustain the vetoes "partisan politics at its worst."

"What has changed in this bill?" Johnson asked. "Not one word. But what has changed is that the governor has decided he didn't like this bill."

"You've got a chance to exercise your best judgment," Johnson added, "or to let someone else decide what is your will. You were elected to cast your vote, not to vote the way the governor decides is best."

"This," Johnson concluded, "is the right thing to do."

Like the three override attempts before Thursday's, the final vote reflected a strict party-line decision and the attempt failed.

PARENTAL CONTROL FOR TEEN DRIVERS BECOMES LAW

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Parents will soon be able to have a say in whether their teenagers are able to get a driver's license. That's according to Sen. Brad Henry, principal author of the bill.

"I'm very pleased that the Governor has signed **Senate Bill 1115**. This measure gives parents an important tool for ensuring their children's responsibility and safety," said Henry, D-Shawnee.

"The problem in the past has been, that even if a parent had real concerns about a child's maturity or responsibility, there was nothing a parent could do to stop that teenager from getting a driver's license," explained Henry.

Under Senate bill 1115, a parent will be able to file an objection with the local Department of Public Safety testing location. They would also have the ability to get a minor's driver's license revoked until age 18. A revocation would remain in effect for at least three months.

Rep. Bob Weaver co-authored the measure in the House of Representatives.

"If a parent knows a teenager is simply not mature enough, or has a drug or alcohol problem, they need to be able to keep those kids from getting a driver's license until they can get straightened out. This bill does that," said Weaver, D-Shawnee.

The parental control law goes into effect November 1, 1996.

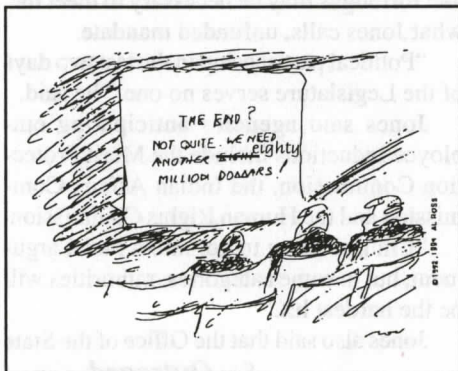

Auditor and Inspector stands to lose an estimated 10 auditors as a result of the cuts.

Conversations with the governor's office and Office of State Finance Director Tom Daxon yielded some hope. Daxon is reported to have said that if lawmakers would present legislation listing specific line-item expenditures, the governor would be able to line-item veto specific sections of the measures, saving the pay-raises.

"The governor created this mess," Jones said, "let him figure it out."

The issue must be addressed by 5:00 p.m. Friday when the Legislature will adjourn for the last time until 1997, unless the governor exercises his right to call the Legislature back into special session where the matter could possibly resurface.



ANOTHER JUVENILE JUSTICE MEASURE IS SIGNED INTO LAW

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Legislation by a Tillman County lawmaker that would deprive school drop-outs of the privilege to drive was signed into law recently.

HB2692 by House Majority Leader Loyd Benson clarifies and strengthens HB2640, a 1994 juvenile justice reform package by the Frederick Democrat that established juvenile detention centers across the state, including Manitou.

A key feature of HB2692 is that, effective July 1, it will deprive school drop-outs of the privilege to drive. Approximately 8,000 students quit public schools in Oklahoma each year, Benson said.

The new law directs the State Department of Public Safety to deny a new driver's license application or revoke an existing driver's license — for a minimum of two months — whenever anyone younger than 18 cannot prove that he or she is enrolled in a public or private secondary school or vocational-technical school, is home schooled, has graduated from school or is enrolled in a general equivalency degree program.

Submitting false information about a student's school attendance will be a misdemeanor crime.

In a related vein, HB2692 will require schools to offer alternative education programs for disobedient and non-violent delinquent students.

The bill decrees that any student who is suspended from school must be placed in "a supervised, structured environment in either a home based school work assignment setting or another appropriate setting" in accordance with a plan prescribed by the school administration that educates and monitors the student.

"We only aggravate the problem when we suspend a student from school and kick him out on the street," Benson asserted. "We need to keep these kids in a more structured environment."

HB2692 directs the State Board of Education to phase in alternative education programs in schools throughout the state over the next five years.

Implementing these programs ultimately will cost an estimated \$30 million, Benson said. The Legislature appropriated \$6.4 million to introduce the project in 100 school districts during the next school year, he added.

Educators who have implemented alternative education programs "are sold on the benefits that results for their schools," Benson said.

HB2692 also allows the Juvenile Justice Department to contract with private service providers to create jobs that will enable ju-

venile lawbreakers to make restitution to their victims. At least 75 percent of a juvenile lawbreaker's net earnings from a job will be earmarked for restitution, the bill decrees.

The bill stipulates that a supervised work program must not interfere with the child's schooling.

Last year the Office of Juvenile Affairs processed 10,523 juveniles involved in events serious enough to warrant state intervention. Almost 27,000 other youths who were deemed at risk and/or were involved in relatively minor incidents were diverted into youth service programs.

OKLAHOMA GAS PRODUCTION ALLOWABLE CONTINUES AT 50%

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) The Oklahoma Corporation Commission Thursday continued the production allowable for Oklahoma unallocated gas wells at the greater of 50 percent of wellhead absolute open flow potential or 1 million cubic feet per day for the third quarter of 1996.

The production allowable is the same as for the second quarter of 1996.

Unallocated wells are not regulated by production allocations for specific fields. About 95 percent of Oklahoma gas wells are unallocated.

The commission staff recommended continuation of the present production allowable to help replenish a below-average supply of gas in storage, caused in part by extremely cold weather last winter in eastern and upper midwestern states.

Claude McNully, Technical Department manager, cited an American Gas Association estimate of gas in storage at the end of May of less than 1 trillion cubic feet, about 54 percent of the federal Department of Energy's six-year average of 1.839 trillion cubic feet of gas in storage at the end of May.

"From all indications, (gas) consumption

PETTIGREW MOVES TO STOP UNNOTICED TAX SALES

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Jim and Dee Stottlemire thought it was a bad joke the evening a stranger approached them saying he had purchased their home at a sheriff's sale. During the course of the following days, their bad joke turned into painful reality.

According to recent information uncovered by Rep. Wayne Pettigrew, the Stottlemires' predicament is not an isolated incident.

"In visiting with the county treasurers of Oklahoma and Canadian counties, I discovered that as many as 20 or 30 properties are sold each year at sheriff's sales because of delinquent tax bills," the Edmond Republican said. "Yet of these sales, there is always the chance an owner may not be aware that action is being taken by the county to recover back taxes."

In response to the situation, Pettigrew, a first-term legislator, amended **Senate Bill 682** to require physical notification of the imminent sale of homestead property to be posted on the front door of the home in question at least 30 days before the sale.

Governor Keating signed the bill into law May 14.

"At the very least it would be decent to let people know they may be losing their home," Pettigrew said.

Stottlemire says neither she, her husband nor the mortgage company which financed the house was notified of the sale until it was too late.

"Our home was literally sold from underneath us," she said. "We had paid our taxes for 1992, 1993 and 1994; the back taxes were just an oversight."

Written notice of the Stottlemire sale was published in the El Reno newspaper, a town 15 miles away, which they neither take nor read, she said. Personal correspondence of the impending action was mailed to a post office box which they closed in 1992.

"I thought surely it must have been some sort of mistake," she said. The county treasurer's office "even had the unopened letters on file."

Within days, the Stottlemires found themselves out of the home she had occupied for 19 years — all for an unpaid tax bill amounting to about \$189. Adding insult to injury, their home, valued at \$45,000, was sold as sheriff's sale for \$501.

"We couldn't stay in the home," she said.

"The new owner talked about renting it to us, but how do you justify renting the home you have labored to preserve for 19 years? I can't even bear to drive by it anymore. It just sits there empty. It's not our home anymore, it's just a vacant house."

The Stottlemayres are appealing the court's decision that the sheriff's sale was valid. In a separate lawsuit, the Farmers Home Administration, which financed the purchase of the house, is suing for improper notification.

Pettigrew said that although his amendment may be too late for Jim and Dee Stottlemayre, it may save another family from the heartache they have experienced.

"I can't imagine the pain those people have endured," he said. "To wake up one morning in your home and go to bed knowing it is all gone is unbelievable."

"I feel like we were lucky," Stottlemayre said. "We had someplace to go. If it hadn't been for our children, we would have been on the street for \$500."

USAO REGENTS DISCUSS BRIGHT FUNDING PROSPECTS

From USAO

■(CHICKASHA) Prospects for better funding in state appropriations were discussed this week when the University of Science and Arts of Oklahoma Board of Regents met to consider a light agenda of business. USAO President Roy Troutt, in his monthly report to the board, outlined the State Legislature's announced plans to put \$71 million new dollars into the State System of Higher Education.

"I have some very good news," Troutt told the board. "The legislative leadership has agreed to appropriate \$71 million new dollars to higher education. This is significant because there has been no new money for operating campuses in the past three to four years."

Troutt also discussed USAO's advancing telecommunications projects. He introduced Dr. Alan Todd, who completed a Telecommunication Training Institute at Oklahoma State University earlier this month. Todd shared insights on "distance learning" and how USAO might maximize the use of its new interactive-video-classroom under construction in Nash Library.

"It was a great learning experience," Todd said. "We'll be scheduling training sessions on our campus for faculty who will be sharing in the distance learning process. It

is a new kind of teaching and learning experience."

USAO's new telecom classroom will serve numerous functions in delivering and receiving educational programs from across the state. Scheduled for completion in July, the classroom is important for USAO, which has been designated as one of 33 hubsites across the state to send and receive courses and other programs.

In practical terms, it means area residents may be able to enroll in such things as graduate level courses at other institutions and participate in those classrooms live through videoconferences on the USAO campus.

Troutt also recognized Regent Loretta Jackson, who was named recently to the Democratic Women's Hall of Fame in Oklahoma.

In other business, Regents approved a revised Student Association Constitution.

Amendments to the document were developed by student leaders of the organization in the fall and were presented to the student body for a vote in March. In essence, the changes were proposed to encourage more students to participate in their campus government. Approval by the Board of Regents makes the changes final.

Regents also approved a revised Student

continues to grow at a fairly steady rate. Demand should remain high until such time as consumers and marketers are comfortable with working gas levels in storage. It appears unlikely that this will happen before next winter.

"All available data to date indicates that demand for gas should be high enough to justify continuation of present levels of production for the coming quarter," McNully said.

Industry spokesmen at a Corporation Commission public hearing supported the commission staff's recommendation. No one opposed it.

The production allowable cap affects fewer than 1,000 of about 29,000 producing gas wells since most wells are not capable of producing enough gas to reach the allowable limit. McNully said no operator has complained about lack of access to market due to the high allowable for high-volume wells.

PENA SELECTS PANEL TO PICK NATION'S FIRST OFFICIAL SCENIC BYWAYS

■(WASHINGTON) U.S. Secretary of Transportation Federico Pena recently selected a panel of travel, tourism and historic preservation experts to select the first National Scenic Byways and All-American roads.

National Scenic Byways are roads or highways that states have deemed outstanding and that merit national recognition because of their scenic, historic, cultural, recreational, natural or archeological quantities. All-American Roads are the "superstars" or the best of the National Scenic Byways.

In naming the panel selections, Pena said, "President Clinton and I are strong advocates of protecting the environment and maintaining an efficient, safe transportation infrastructure. Scenic byways are the embodiment of these two goals.

"The blue-ribbon panel that I have selected will help us evaluate the nominations we have received so we can officially introduce America — and the world — to our beautiful, open roads. These roads reflect our country's rich, diverse natural landscape and are often destinations unto themselves. They also illustrate how we can effectively balance economic development with historic and environmental preservation."

Handbook. Considered the policy manual for all matters of interest to students, the 55-page document includes services available to students and University policies on everything from freshman orientation to graduation requirements.

New to the handbook this year is a statement on academic progress and a policy banning handguns, which was enacted by the school following a new state law allowing concealed weapons for licensed individuals. The handbook was updated by a campuswide committee and compiled by the Office of Administrative Affairs.

Regents learned that a new member has been named by Gov. Frank Keating to the USAO Board. Former Chickasha resident Beverly Carter, now of Oklahoma City, will join the board in July. She will fill a vacancy to be left by Regent Lillian Boland, who is completing nine years of service.

In personnel matters, the board approved the retirement of Dr. Pauline Hook, associate professor of speech pathology, and the appointment of Allison Fahsl as special adjunct faculty member in education.

Regents also approved the reappointment of Vaughn Groom, instructor in computer science, and the appointment of Jeffery Martin, student life counselor and intramural sports coordinator.

INHOFE RATES AMONG BEST IN FISCAL RESPONSIBILITY

From US Sen. James Inhofe

■(WASHINGTON) U.S. Senator James M. Inhofe, R-Oklahoma, ranks near the top of the U.S. Senate in fiscal responsibility, according to a detailed legislative analysis prepared by the non-partisan National Taxpayers Union. Only seven out of 100 senators ranked better than Inhofe in the NTU's annual report which adds up the total spending proposed in every bill which is sponsored or co-sponsored by each member of Congress.

"I am very proud of my efforts to save taxpayers money and keep government spending in check," Inhofe said. "Few things are more important than getting control of runaway federal spending. Oklahomans didn't send me to Washington to run up the national credit card and increase the national debt. They sent me to help balance the budget, reduce the size of government and re-

store fiscal responsibility. I take this mandate seriously because it is right for America's future."

The NTU's annual "BillTally" report is a comprehensive evaluation of the cost implications of all the bills which members of Congress either propose or support which affect federal spending. This year's report covered 346 Senate bills introduced from January 1995 through February 1996, and co-sponsored through April 16, 1996. For each member of Congress, the NTU added up the cost estimates for all the bills that a member sponsored and co-sponsored. It then reported that totals of how much each members had proposed to increase spending and to decrease spending. By subtracting the proposed decreases from the increases, it determined the net spending impact of each member's legislative proposals.

The report showed that Inhofe had sup-

ported over \$27 billion in total spending reductions and only about \$9 billion in increases. His almost \$18 billion in net spending reductions was eighth best in the entire Senate. At the other end of the scale was one senator who had proposed net spending increases of over \$45 billion.

As was announced earlier this year, Inhofe has also received the NTU's "Taxpayers' Friend" award for his exemplary 1995 voting record on tax and spending issues.
