GOVERNOR ISSUES LINE-ITEM VETOES

■(GIT) Appropriations of 'new money' to six state agencies were vetoed by the governor on Tuesday.

Governor Frank Keating vetoed the appropriations "because the appropriations contained in those items exceed the Executive Budget. The excess funds must be preserved for future budgetary needs in order to offset fiscally irresponsible spending in other parts of the budget," he wrote in his veto message for each of the bills containing a line item veto.

Agencies having their funding vetoed include the Office of the Auditor and Inspector and Oklahoma Tax Commission, **HB1787**; the Human Rights Commission and the Indian Affairs Commission, **HB1800**; and the State Election Board and State Ethics Commission, **HB1812**.

The appropriation to the Auditor and Inspector's Office included \$235,570 for the employee salary increase; \$30,664 for the OPERS increase resulting from the pay hike; \$200,000 for the replacement of revolving funds; \$50,000, moving expenses; \$35,000, county government commission; and \$80,000, data processing equipment up-

grades.

In the case of the Oklahoma Tax Commission, the appropriation included \$1.6 million for the employee salary increase; \$63,055 for the OPERS increase; \$135,000 for the administration of **HB2102**; and \$45,000 for a tax on demand distribution system.

In his budget recommendations for the 1997 fiscal year, the governor proposed an \$80,000 increase for the auditor and inspec-

tor to make up for a one-time loss of the same amount during the 1996 fiscal year. Keating also proposed a \$200,000 increase in funding for the tax commission for what he called "programming and policy changes needed to implement the Governor's tax cut proposals."

HB1800 appropriations to the Human Rights Commission, which totaled \$57,013 was earmarked for the employee salary in-

WORKERS COMPENSATION REFORM MEASURE PASSES SENATE

■(GIT) A measure reforming the Oklahoma Workers' Compensation Act passed the Senate Tuesday. The bill, **SB1310**, by Sen. Bernice Shedrick, D-Stillwater, received unanimous support, despite early opposition from a handful of members.

The bill is the result of a House interim study conducted late last year concerning the State Insurance Fund. A report was issued with recommendations to the Legislature on the course of action it should take with then pending legislation.

Calling the measure "premature," Sen. Howard Hendrick, R-Bethany, told Shedrick

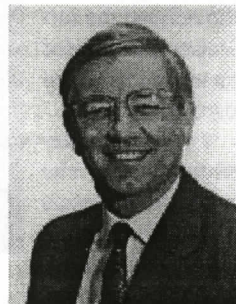
it was unfair to expect the Senate to vote on a measure "when the author of the bill has not even read the report."

Hendrick referred to the fact that Shedrick had not read the issued report and had difficulty answering questions about the bill. She claimed that the bill represents an agreement by all parties involved, including the State Insurance Fund.

Under the measure, insurers, except for the State Insurance Fund, must provide access to a certified workplace medical plan. After 60 days written notice to its insurance carrier, insurers may choose a plan of choice and contract for one year.

Also, if the State Insurance Fund fails to contract with at least three certified workplace medical plans, each covering at least 50 counties in the state, then the insured may contract for one year with a carrier of choice.

If an employee elects not to enroll in the certified workplace medical plan, they may choose from a list of physicians who meet

INFANT SCREENING BILL BACK IN COMMITTEE

■(GIT) A bill creating the Early Identification and Support for Infants Act was returned to conference committee for the third time by the House on Tuesday with instructions to include a provision banning so-called partial birth abortions.

HB2393, by Rep. Mark Seikel, D-Harrah, would allow, "with the consent of the parent or legal guardian of the infant, a voluntary screening procedure for the early identification of infants who may require or benefit from health or other community infant support services shall be conducted for each infant."

Seikel took a chance on the bill's future when during debate over acceptance of the third conference committee report he asked what it would take to adopt the instructions proposed by Rep. Joan Greenwood, R-Moore. Greenwood asked that a provision be added to the bill protecting parents who refused the services recommended as a result of the proposed screenings.

The Moore Republican said she had documentation from other states with similar laws that showed parents being penalized, even losing custody of their children, when they had refused the services recommended

by screenings similar to the one proposed by Seikel.

Lying on the desk at the time, however, were instructions from Rep. Bill Graves, R-Oklahoma City. Those instructions had been submitted ahead of Greenwood's, and as a result, were due to be heard first. The instructions call for the addition of a provi-

The measure also authorizes the state commissioner of health to authorize a workplace medical plan other than that recommended by the administrator of the Physician Advisory Committee if the administrator fails to choose a plan.

The measure provides that workers' compensation carriers may use present value discounting at a rate of four percent for claims involving disability and death.

A provision of the bill provides that any person not required to carry workers' compensation insurance may apply to the commissioner of labor for a Certificate of Non-Coverage Under the Workers' Compensation Act. The certificate, for a fee of \$10.00, would excuse the bearer from the requirement to carry the coverage.

A "reasonable inquiry" will determine if the application is legitimate. The labor commissioner along with the workers' compensation fraud unit of the office of the attorney general are responsible for conducting the investigation.

The measure also exempts the State Insurance Fund from any future hiring freezes implemented by the governor.

"The State Fund has saved our collective back sides more than once," said Sen. Ben Robinson, D-Muskogee. He said he was concerned that the bill will impose requirements on the fund that private insurance companies would not have to follow.

The bill's conference committee report was adopted with a vote of 40 to 7. The measure itself passed as an emergency measure with a vote of 46 to 0.

Shedrick lodged a motion to reconsider, normally giving her three legislative days to re-address the issue. Under a Tuesday suspension of Senate rules, however, all motions to reconsider must be addressed that same day. The measure was not brought up again. It now goes to the House for its consideration.

crease, \$31,117; the OPERS increase, \$2,896; and the addition of one full time equivalent, \$23,000. Indian Affairs Commission appropriations included in the bill were \$6,603 for the employee pay plan and \$441 for the OPERS increase, with \$26,000 allocated for the agency to maintain its operations.

The governor's recommendations for the 1997 fiscal year did not include a funding increase for the Human Rights Commission. A \$15,000 increase in funding for the Indian Affairs Commission was recommended by the governor for the employment of a clerk typist and to cover summit costs.

Some \$353,306 was included in the HB1812 appropriation to the Election Board. The allocations included \$143,617 for the employee pay increase; \$3,102 for the OPERS increase; \$1,587 for the OTRS employer increase; \$214,130, precinct official compensation; \$145,723, full-time county offices; \$70,000, motor license registrations; and \$75,147 for county benefits reimbursements. Also included in the provisions of the bill was \$300,000 in savings from OEMS refinancing.

Funding vetoed for the Ethics Commission included \$9,949 for the employee pay increase; \$2,197, OPERS increase; \$500, diskettes for electronic filing; \$2,225, expanded fax capabilities; \$4,150, computer system upgrades; \$5,000, replacement of revolving funds; \$3,552, general counsel salary; and \$1,300 One-Net hardwire interface.

The governor recommended a \$1,000 increase in appropriations to the election board for teachers' retirement contributions and an \$11,000 increase in funding for the Ethics Commission to pay the cost of the commissions operations.

Earlier in the session, the governor signed legislation increasing state employees' pay by \$1,200 annually. Lawmakers chose to fund that pay increase with this year's so-called new money or additional revenue.

Base funding for all six agencies was included in a bill approved by both houses of the legislature and signed by the governor earlier in the session. The governor and legislative leaders touted the bill as a way to avoid a state government shutdown should budget matters become a stumbling block for lawmakers and the executive branch.

sion banning so-called partial birth abortions.

Following a graphic description of the procedure, Graves explained that a similar federal proposal had been vetoed by President Bill Clinton.

Pressed by Rep. Ron Kirby, D-Lawton, about the number of partial birth abortions performed in Oklahoma, Graves said he did not know, adding that current law does not require such records to be kept.

"One time is too many," Graves, who has proposed regulations allowing the health department to set minimum safety standards for abortion clinics that would include keeping such records, added.

Greenwood proposed that her instructions for the bill be considered as an amendment to those of Graves', and by unanimous consent, the instructions were adopted as an amendment.

Graves' amended instructions, which then included the partial-birth abortion ban and parents' protection clause, were also adopted by unanimous consent.

Earlier this month, the bill's first conference committee report was rejected for unspecified reasons. One week later, the bill reappeared, this time containing the infant screening provisions, as well as language related to the state's long-term care ombudsman program, a program designed to protect nursing home residents.

That conference committee report, too, was rejected, and the bill returned to conference for additional consideration. A floor ruling removed the ombudsman provision from the bill on the basis that it was not germane, and the conference committee was then instructed to rework the bill's key section — Section 1 — related to the infant identification program.

TAX EQUITY BILL SIGNED INTO LAW

■(OKLAHOMA CITY) Calling it a victory for Oklahoma retirees, Sen. Brad Henry announced today that his tax equity bill has been signed into law.

Governor Frank Keating signed **HB1621** during a Tuesday afternoon ceremony at the State Capitol.

"This is fantastic news for retirees across Oklahoma. This measure gives them the tax relief and equity they deserve," said Henry, D-Shawnee.

Henry is senate author of the measure which extends the same tax deductions government retirees already enjoy to the private sector.

Under **HB1621**, private sector retirees with Oklahoma adjusted gross income of \$25,000 or less would be allowed a deduction of retirement income of up to \$5,500.

The deduction would be phased in over a five-year period. Social Security income is fully exempted.

"Married retirees filing joint returns can also take advantage of the deduction if their Oklahoma adjusted gross income was \$50,000 or less," said Henry. "They would be able to deduct a total of \$11,000."

"I'm sure everyone of us is concerned about making ends meet once we've retired. I believe this bill should give those who are already retired, and those who are approaching retirement, greater peace of mind," said Henry.

Oklahoma retirees can be taking advantage of the new deduction in tax year 1997, for a total of \$1,100. The amount they can deduct will increase by \$1,100 each year after that until it reaches a total of \$5,500.

■(GIT) In an usually short session with only three days remaining before the legislature adjourns sine die, the House considered the following the measures, most with no questions and none with debate:

HB2463, by Rep. James Dunegan, D-Calera, modifying the date to 1997 related to required FTE recommendations from the Human Resources Management Advisory Committee, received a passing vote of 95-0 with an emergency clause following the adoption of its second conference committee report.

HB2960, by Rep. Mark Seikel, D-Harrah, which directs DHS to cooperate with and help promote foster parent associations in each county; provide additional services relating to the placement of children in foster care; develop a policy of accident, personal liability, and automobile liability insurance; and develop a procedure to determine the ability of parents to pay part or all of the costs for foster care, received a 94-2 passing vote with the acceptance of the bill's second conference committee report.

HB2964, which changes the name of the Developmentally or Physically Disabled Persons Community Residential Living Act to the Community Residential Living for Persons with Developmental Disabilities Act; transfers jurisdiction to the Department of Human Services; states that any related

rules promulgated by the State Board of Health shall remain in effect until such rules are superseded by rules from the Commission for Human Services; and provides for prior licensure of group homes, by Rep. Seikel, received a passing vote 99-0 following the adoption of its second conference committee report.

HB2969, also by Rep. Seikel, directing the Oklahoma Health Care Authority to amend the state Medicaid plan to provide a funding source for payment of temporary managers or state monitors in facilities certified to provide long-term care services and community-based service provider facility under Medicaid, received a 99-0 passing vote with an emergency clause following the unanimous consent adoption of its conference committee report.

HB2975, prohibiting the requirement for filing paternity affidavits when consent for adoption has been given, by Rep. Russ Roach, D-Tulsa, received a 96-0 passing vote with an emergency clause after the adoption of the bill's second conference committee report.

SB921, by Rep. Robert Weaver, R-Oklahoma City, repealing various sections pertaining to sales and incomes taxes, received a 97-0 passing vote with an emergency clause after the adoption of its second conference committee report.

SB996, by Rep. Fred Stanley, D-Madill,

■(GIT) The Senate considered the following measures on Tuesday, May 28, 1996:

HB2079, by Sen. Don Williams, D-Balko, modifies language as it relates to class size limitations. The bill provides calculation formulas and states penalties.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure and its emergency clause with a vote of 47 to 0.

HB2101, by Rep. Jack Begley, D-Goodwell, allows officers or employees of a municipality with a population of more than 2,500 to conduct business with said municipality. The bill also allows members of any board of education of a municipality with a population of over 2,500 to furnish materials or supplies to said municipality and allows members of any board of education within a municipality with a population of more than 2,500 to vote on contracts between area vocational-technical schools and the entity by which the member is employed.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure with a vote of 42 to 2.

HB2271, by Sen. Brooks Douglass, R-Oklahoma City, increases minimum payments and assessments related to victim compensation.

requiring voters to sign a precinct registry before being issued a ballot, received a 97-0 passing vote after representatives, by unanimous consent, adopted the bill's emergency clause.

House members voted 93-1 to pass **SB1002**, by Rep. Calvin Anthony, D-Stillwater, providing an additional basis for the issuance of a specified certificate from the Oklahoma Corporation Commission. The bill's passage followed the House's adoption of its second conference committee report.

SCR57, by Rep. Al Sadler, D-Ardmore, related to atomic veterans was adopted by unanimous consent.

Conference committee reports for the following measures were rejected and further conference requested and granted by the House on Tuesday: **HBs 1672, 2088, 2466, 2874 and 2981**.

House consideration of **SB1100**, the education reform bill, was laid over.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure and its emergency clause with a vote of 47 to 0.

HB2463, by Sen. Larry Dickerson, D-Poteau, modifies the date to 1997 relating to required FTE recommendations from the Human Resources Management Advisory Committee.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure and its emergency clause with a vote of 48 to 0.

HB2698, by Sen. Brad Henry, D-Shawnee, allows the Department of Human Services to charge a service fee to those obligated to pay child support to cover administrative costs; states that such fees shall be deposited into the Child Support Revenue Enhancement Fund.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure and its emergency clause with a vote of 47 to 0.

HB2704, by Sen. Kevin Easley, D-Broken Arrow, modifies language relating to the Oklahoma Municipal Code.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure with a vote of 39 to 7.

HB2964, by Sen. Bernest Cain, D-Oklahoma City, changes the name of the Developmentally or Physically Disabled Persons Community Residential Living Act to the Community Residential Living for Persons with Developmental Disabilities Act. It transfers jurisdiction to the Department of Human Services and states that any related rules promulgated by the State Board of Health shall remain in effect until such rules are superseded by rules from the Commission for Human Services.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure and its emergency clause with a vote of 48 to 0.

HCR1103, by Sen. Stratton Taylor, D-Claremore, commends Peggy Smith for being selected as the 1996 National Financial Services Advocate of the Year.

The measure was unanimously adopted.

SB709, by Sen. Ted Fisher, D-Sapulpa, directs the Corporation Commission to cause the expansion of wide area calling plans to include every local telephone exchange which is the sole unincorporated exchange seated in a county where all other exchanges seated in said county are already included in a wide

area calling plan. It also provides for related constitutional amendments.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure and its emergency clause with a vote of 44 to 3.

SB742, by Sen. Larry Dickerson, D-Poteau, authorizes the Office of Personnel Management to enter into contracts for the payment of expenses relating to conferences, meetings or training sessions. It also authorizes the Office of Personnel Management to establish and collect fees for participation in training programs.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure and its emergency clause with a vote of 43 to 0.

SB901, by Sen. Jerry Smith, R-Tulsa, includes dishonored checks written for child support or support alimony in the definition of false or bogus checks.

"This is an idea who's time has not come," said Sen. Ted Fisher, D-Sapulpa.

Fisher said the measure did not allow for a warning of pending legal action, after one false check, the person is sent to jail.

"Don't you think these people ought to show a pattern of this first?"

Smith said, often people will write bogus checks in an attempt to control their former spouses.

"They use it as a power play," he said.

Fearing the measure would reinstate a form of debtors prison, Sen. Howard Hendrick, R-Bethany, opposed the measure.

"You should not use a check to discharge a debt," he said. "This is like the reinstitution of debtor's prison."

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure with a vote of 30 to 15.

SB1209, by Sen. Sam Helton, D-Lawton, modifies references relating to vehicle inspection fees.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure and its emergency clause with a vote of 41 to 0.

SB1227, by Sen. Ben Robinson, D-Muskogee, allows certain state government entities to participate in the State and Education Employees Group Health and Life Insurance plans under certain circumstances.

After adopting the bill's conference committee report, members passed the measure and its emergency clause with a vote of 44

USDA BUYS MORE THAN 4 MILLION POUNDS OF GROUND BEEF

■(WASHINGTON) Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman Thursday announced that the U.S. Department of Agriculture is purchasing 4.3 million pounds of bulk frozen ground beef at a delivered cost of approximately \$4.1 million. The purchases will be used for distribution in the National School Lunch Program and other federal food assistance programs.

Glickman said this purchase includes USDA beef purchases for the 1995-96 school year under Announcement LS-43, which is nearing an end. However, beef purchases will continue on a weekly basis for the 1996-97 school year.

GLICKMAN ANNOUNCES TRANSFER OF FUND TO EMERGENCY FARM LOANS

From US Dept. of Agriculture

■(WASHINGTON) Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman last Friday ordered the transfer of \$16.4 million into the emergency farm loan account so that loans can continue to be made to family farmers and ranchers to help them overcome natural disasters which are affecting wide areas of the country this year. The \$16.4 million will allow the Department to make or guarantee \$56 million of emergency loans.

"The emergency loan fund was exhausted this year for the first time," Glickman said. "All \$109.3 million that was available was loaned out with nearly five months left in the fiscal year. To meet this unusually heavy demand, I have exercised the Secretary's

emergency transfer authority to move funds that otherwise would not have been used from the Conservation Reserve Program to the Emergency Loan Program.

"These additional funds should be sufficient to take care of loan applications on hand and those expected by the end of the fiscal year in September. Ample funding will be left for any needs that might arise in the Conservation Reserve Program."

Glickman said that in recent years, appropriations for emergency loans had been reduced from previous years' levels. "This year, the funds available just weren't sufficient to meet demand caused by the unusually large number of disasters," he said. "In recent weeks, I have traveled to places such as Texas, Kansas and Colorado and have seen the disastrous effects of this drought. I know people are suffering. This administration is committed to helping our producers make it through these tough times."

At latest count, 2,260 of the nation's 3,218 counties had been designated as disaster areas, and designation requests for another 317 counties were being considered. Since last summer, most states have suffered from drought, flooding, unseasonable freezes or other weather disasters.

Family farmers and ranchers in designated counties are eligible for low-interest loans from the Farm Service Administration to help them recover from the disasters.

The most severely affected states are in the southwest, especially in the winter wheat region. Much of this year's wheat crop has dried up from lack of moisture and the harvest is expected to be seriously affected. Other states, in the midwest and elsewhere, have had excessive rain, often accompanied by severe storms, and spring freezes that damaged fruit and vegetable crops.

DOE APPROVES SALES OF MORE THAN 1 MILLION BARRELS OF STRATEGIC PETROLEUM RESERVE CRUDE OIL

■(WASHINGTON) The U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) last Friday completed its second sales cycle for Strategic Petroleum Reserve crude oil, approving offers from three companies to purchase nearly 1.1 million barrels of oil.

DOE decided to end the second cycle Friday when the latest round of "best and finals" did not produce additional offers that met the Government's acceptable price threshold. Last Wednesday, the Department said that three bids met the price requirements and that the agency hoped to attract additional acceptable offers by extending the bid cycle another day.

The oil is part of approximately 12 million barrels being offered to the market following President Clinton's April 29 directive to begin the oil sale. Last week's sale brought more than \$21 million in revenue to

the Government, approximately one-tenth of the \$227 million that Congress — as part of the recent 1996 budget agreement — directed be obtained from selling oil from the Government's 587-million-barrel emergency oil stockpile.

The contract prices for the sour crude oil ranged from \$19.45 per barrel to \$19.65 per barrel. The sour crude oil stored at Weeks Island typically is valued at about \$1 to \$2 per barrel less than West Texas Intermediate, the frequently used benchmark for oil prices.

The Energy Department judged the bid prices to be acceptable, in contrast to last week's initial bid cycle in which none of the offers met the Government's price threshold. All of the bidders receiving contracts this week offered higher prices than were in last week's bids.

The crude oil will be sold to Basis Petro-

leum Inc. (formerly Phibro Energy USA), Houston, Texas; Exxon Company USA, Houston; and Coastal States Trading Inc., Houston.

The oil will be drawn from the Strategic Petroleum Reserve Weeks Island storage site in Louisiana. DOE currently is emptying the converted salt mine that stored oil at Weeks Island due to geologic problems that have compromised the site's structural integrity.

CLINTON NAMES JEANNE GIVENS TO THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE INSTITUTE OF AMERICAN INDIAN AND ALASKA NATIVE CULTURE AND ARTS DEVELOPMENT

■(WASHINGTON) The President last Friday announced his intent to nominate Jeanne Givens to the Board of Trustees of the Institute of American Indian and Alaska Native Culture and Arts Development.

Jeanne Givens of Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, is a member of the Coeur d'Alene Tribe and was the first Native American woman elected to the Idaho House of Representatives in 1984 and 1986. She was appointed by Idaho Governor John Evans to serve on the Idaho Humanities Council from 1980 to 1984.

Since 1988, Ms. Givens has been a member of the Americans for Indian Opportunity Board, a national organization promoting the economic, educational and social advancement of Native Americans. She currently serves as a trustee of North Idaho College.

The Board of Trustees of the Institute of American Indian and Alaska Native Culture and Arts Development is responsible for the direction and control of the Institute of American Indian Arts. The mission of the Institute is to promote the preservation and development of American Indian and Alaska Native arts and culture through programs of education and outreach to students, tribal communities and the public. The Institute is the only educational institution in the World devoted solely to the study and practice of the artistic and cultural traditions of all American Indians.

GETTYS TO DESCRIBE 19TH-20TH CENTURY CERAMICS OF OKLAHOMA AT CHISHOLM TRAIL MUSEUM IN KINGFISHER

■(KINGFISHER) Marshall Gettys, historical archaeologist with a special interest in ceramics, will present a program on "Historic Ceramics of Oklahoma" at 1 p.m. on June 15 at the Chisholm Trail Museum in Kingfisher.

"He will describe ceramics of the 19th and 20th Centuries, covering the period from the 1820s to 1920," said Curator Renee Mitchell of the museum. "The lecture-workshop will focus on the types of ceramics which have been recovered from archaeological sites around Oklahoma and date to this period."

The presentation will include a display of period ceramics from both archaeological sites and public and private collections. Also included will be materials focusing on dating historic ceramics and discussions of source material available to ceramic collectors and scholars.

"Those attending are strongly encouraged to bring ceramic items for examination and identification," Gettys said. The public is invited without charge, said Mitchell.

Gettys served as historical archaeologist for the State Historic Preservation Office of the Oklahoma Historical Society since 1980.

He earned his bachelor's degree in anthropology and his masters in anthropology Eastern New Mexico University.

He has lectured at Central State University (now the University of Central Oklahoma), and he served as an archaeologist at the Fort Towson Historic Site for the Oklahoma Historical Society from 1976-1980.

Prior to that, he served in research on projects such as the Kaw Reservoir, the Skiatook and Birch Creek Reservoirs, and the Lukfata Reservoir in Oklahoma.

His published work on Native American art has included "Native Baskets of the South: A Living Tradition" for the *Bulletin of the Oklahoma Anthropological Society* and "Historic Choctaw Pottery in the State Museum of History" for *The Chronicles of Oklahoma*.

He has written reviews and articles for *The Chronicles of Oklahoma* and other publications on Native American art and culture.

The Chisholm Trail Museum and Seay Mansion are operated in Kingfisher by the Oklahoma Historical Society with support from Chisholm Trail Museum Inc. of Kingfisher and community volunteers. For more information, contact Mitchell at (405) 375-5176.

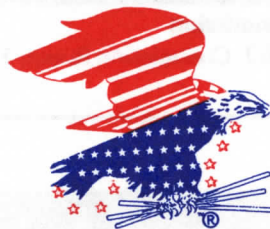
