100-PLUS LAWSTAKE EFFECT NOVEMBER 1

■(GIT) Those who deal with the results of the legislature's work probably either dread or embrace Nov. 1, the day the bulk of the legislation passed during the second session of the 45th Legislature takes effect.

Well over 100 new laws go into effect today, some with dramatic effects and others with less significant implications. The new laws run the gambit, touching almost every issue addressed by the legislature during the legislative session. In the cases of the Department of Human Services, the Department of Public Safety, parents of teens, attorneys and insurance companies, industrial and business leaders, responsibilities, obligations and opportunities. In other cases,

such as entomologists and trivia buffs, the day is equally important, although seemingly not nearly as significant for some others.

One bill that won't be taking effect, however, is HB2796, which sets standards for filings in the state's county clerks offices. A group of 16 plaintiffs, including banks, real estate groups, abstract companies and two business associations, won a temporary injunction Thursday blocking the law's implementation.

A Dec. 5 hearing on a temporary injunction was set by Oklahoma County District Judge John Amick. The judge's decision then could delay the law's implementation until after the legislature has a chance to take an-

other look at the law during the next legislative session.

The pages that follow contain analyses of some of the most important legislation taking effect today. In addition, *Legislative Information Network/Capitol Network News* has compiled a complete list of all the measures going into effect today.

That information is followed by a statutory citations cross reference, allowing easy identification of which existing state laws are affected by those measures taking effect today. Finally, a bill subject cross reference lists the bills effective today by the subject areas they envelope.

75 HOUSE BILLSTAKE EFFECT NOVEMBER 1

■(GIT) As this year's general election nears and attention focuses on who will serve in the 46th Legislature, much of the work of the House of Representatives comes to fruition as 75 bills take effect Nov. 1.

The areas addressed by the new laws cover a wide area, including everything from the establishment of an official state butterfly — the Black Swallowtail — to new procedures for handling child abuse cases and investigations.

Following is an analysis of some of the more important bills to take effect Nov. 1.

HB2053: Tragedies Provide Basis for Reform

It may be one of the most well known pieces of legislation to pass since HB1017. Known as the Ryan Luke Bill, HB2053 is called "a direct response to the deaths of Shane Coffman and Ryan Luke" by its primary author, Rep. Laura Boyd, D-Norman.

"Their legacy to Oklahoma's children," said Boyd of the two little boys who lost their lives to child abuse, "is that we responded and took action on those things we knew to be flawed."

Ryan Luke died in March 1995, after an alleged beating that left his brain irreversibly damaged. Ryan's mother, Wendy Luke, pleaded guilty to first degree manslaughter in her son's death, admitting to a judge that she failed to promptly seek medical atten-

tion for her dying child. She has since petitioned a Pittsburg County court to withdraw that plea.

Larry Tannehill, Wendy Luke's boyfriend at the time of her son's death, was acquitted of a first degree murder charge in the two-year-old's death earlier this year. The toddler's grandfather, Don Luke, faces a trial on a charge of second degree manslaughter in the death.

Shane Coffman's body was found in February 1996, stuffed inside a freezer outside a trailer once occupied by his mother, her boyfriend and Shane's brothers and sisters. The boy's mother and her boyfriend will face first degree murder charges in the child's death in Cleveland County.

The cases bore one disturbing similarity: Both children and their families had been the subject of Department of Human Ser-

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vices' inquiries prior to their deaths. For some, that meant the department had failed in its duty to protect the children.

HB2053, which in some cases makes dramatic changes in the way child abuse cases are handled in Oklahoma, had almost unanimous support. Although action on the bill was sometimes delayed to allow minor changes in often difficult-to-arrive-at wording, only three votes were cast against the bill during its entire legislative trek.

Key provisions of the bill include:

- The opening of some DHS and other records in child abuse death cases;
- The training of judges in child abuse and related issues;
- Requiring social workers to provide sworn testimony in child abuse cases; and
- The ability to stay a judge's order concerning the custody of a child in certain instances.

Boyd points to the opening of some records when a child dies as one of the bill's most important provisions, calling it "the single largest part of the reforms" contained in the measure.

"Currently, there are no provisions for that," the Norman lawmaker said. "This will give officials, as well as the public at large, the opportunity to see how some of our state agencies are operating, to hold them accountable when necessary and to praise them when they do things right."

Word of the provision has spread quickly, Boyd said, adding that other states are looking at the language in the bill as a model for legislation elsewhere.

"This will give the Department of Human Services, district attorneys and others involved an opportunity to defend themselves or admit the truth," Boyd added. "In some cases, there's reason for criticism, but in others, there is not. This should help everyone see all the efforts that are made to intervene on behalf of a child."

In many cases, Boyd said, people will see that the victims of child abuse had never been identified prior to their deaths, resulting in no intervention from law enforcement and the child social workers.

"What we sometimes forget is that these are not just DHS kids who are dying," Boyd said matter of factly. "This can happen to any kid, and it does. Many of the children who die each year due to child abuse have never been introduced into the system."

That, she adds, is why child abuse is not an issue that goes away after one legislative session and the enactment of one bill.

"Unfortunately, we know that children are going to die, sometime, somewhere, due to child abuse," Boyd said, "and some of those deaths are going to be at the hands of their parents. Until we work on prevention and create an effective system for dealing with this situation, that will continue to be true."

Some of those sentiments are shared by Governor Frank Keating, who proclaimed early in the legislative session his support for the bill and signed it shortly after its passage.

"Obviously, my greatest hope would be for this legislation to totally end child abuse in Oklahoma, but that, unfortunately, is not realistic," Keating said. "However, HB2053 will dramatically reform how child abuse cases are investigated and handled in Oklahoma. Everyone knows the tragic circumstances surrounding Ryan Luke and Shane Coffman. This law will not only address the horrific details of those cases but will set tougher restrictions and standards on new abuse cases as well."

Secretary of Human Services Ken Lackey agreed with the governor, adding, "I concur with the governor. There is no one solution to end child abuse in our society, but this legislation provides another tool to help solve a very serious problem."

HB1088: Leveling the Playing Field for Adoptive Parents

Part of the ongoing work by an adoption reform committee, HB1088, by Rep. Russ Roach, D-Tulsa, is designed to equalize the

playing field for adoptive parents.

The bill allows for a deduction of up to \$10,000 annually to aid families with "non-recurring adoption expenses," such as adoption fees, court costs and attorneys fees.

In voicing his support for the bill on the floor, Roach told lawmakers that the one-time costs associated with adopting a child are sometimes barriers for those wanting to become adoptive parents. The bill, he said, attempts to address that situation by allowing adoptive parents to deduct such expenses from their annual state income taxes.

Roach explained that biological parents have the benefits of health insurance to cover the costs of the birth of their children and receive a variety of tax breaks as a result of becoming parents. This bill, he said, would provide some of the same benefits to adoptive parents, who, like birth parents at the time their child is born, bore extraordinary costs in the process of adopting their child.

HB2115: Taking a Lesson From Real Life

When Sen. Jerry Smith, R-Tulsa, explained the reasoning behind the introduction of HB2115, which he co-authored with Rep. Flint Breckinridge, R-Tulsa, other lawmakers looked on in disbelief.

Smith told the story of a 14-year-old boy sent to commit a crime by two adults. The adults reasoned, Smith said, that the young boy would face only the repercussions of the juvenile justice system, while they would benefit. But after things went awry, the 14-year-old boy killed someone and found himself facing a murder charge as an adult.

The two men, however, avoided prosecution on a murder charge, Smith added, because the statute was not written in such a way that they could be charged with the crime.

Now, it is.

Smith's measure, HB2115, expands the point at which first-degree murder occurs, adding when a person "or any other person" takes the life of a human being during, or if the death of a human being results from, the commission or attempted commission of murder of another person, shooting or discharge of a firearm or crossbow with intent to kill, forcible rape, robbery with a dangerous weapon, kidnapping, escape from lawful custody, first degree burglary, first degree arson, unlawful distributing or dispensing of controlled dangerous substances, or trafficking in illegal drugs.

In arguing for the bill, Smith said Okla-

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47 SENATE BILLSTAKE EFFECT NOV. 1

■(GIT) Economic development, rural health care, tax incentives, as well as landmark legislation addressing teen drivers are among the forty-seven Senate bills that are becoming law Nov. 1. The following is an analysis of several important Senate measures that are going into effect today.

Teen Behind the Wheel Becomes Parent's Choice

SB1115 allows parents to decide whether or not their teenage children are licensed to drive. Two Shawnee Democrats, Sen. Brad Henry and Rep. Robert Weaver, were principal authors of the bill that passed both houses with huge margins.

As a result of SB1115, parents can file a written objection with the local testing of-

fice of the Oklahoma Department of Public Safety blocking their teenage son or daughter's ability to become a licensed driver.

Further, if a child under the age of 18 is licensed and the parent or legal guardian feels the teen is not handling the responsibility well, the license can be revoked.

In either case, a written request, signed by the parent or legal guardian, must be on file at the local testing facility of the Department of Public Safety. A license will not be issued and a previously issued license will remain canceled until the objection is withdrawn by the custodial parent or guardian or until the child reaches age 18.

"A driver's license is not an automatic rite of passage," Sen. Henry said. "If they can't handle the responsibility, then their

parents should have the right to take that privilege away."

"Since introducing this bill last spring, one of the most common reactions I've heard from parents is, 'Thank goodness!' I want families to have more control over their children's behavior," Henry said. "This [law] gives them an important tool to do that. It puts the law back on the parents' side."

Zero Tolerance Law Becomes Effective in Oklahoma

In another landmark effort by the Senate to address the problem of teenage drivers, SB1230 makes it unlawful for any person under the age of 21 to drive, operate, or be in actual physical control of a motor vehicle if they have any measurable quantity of alcohol in their blood or breath at the time of a test taken within two hours after arrest, or if they exhibit any evidence of being under the influence of any other intoxicating substance as shown by a blood, breath, saliva, or urine specimen.

Incremental to the bill are stiffer penalties for violations and provisions to fight the problem through education before the fact.

SB1230 sets first offense fines of up to \$500 or completion of 20 hours of community service or completion of a treatment program or any combination of the above. Second offenses receive fines of up to \$1,000, 40 hours of community service, or completion of a treatment program or any combination thereof.

Most importantly, anyone under the age of 21 arrested for driving under the influence with any measurable alcohol or other intoxicating substance in his or her system may lose their driver's license until age 21.

SB1230 also addresses the problem of teens driving under the influence by seeking a solution through education to reduce the problem rather than just heighten penalties for the problem after the fact.

The State Department of Education is directed by the measure to develop and administer appropriate driver education programs in all schools to increase awareness of the dangers of drinking and driving. All driver's license manuals will also contain dialogue concerning the hazards of drinking and driving and the legal and financial consequences available to law enforcement. The new elements of the driver's education programs will be fully implemented no later than November 1, 1997.

The new law, approved overwhelmingly
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homa, much like other parts of the country, is seeing an increasing number of incidents when adults, particularly those involved in gang activity, "send children to do their dirty work." Like in the case of the 14-year-old boy, prosecutors were left with few alternatives — Charge the child with the most serious offense possible and attempt to find ways to prosecute those behind the crime.

"They're the real criminals," Smith said on the Senate floor. "They are the ones responsible for having this 14-year-old boy go out and commit a crime. They are the ones who really deserve to be prosecuted and to receive a severe sentence."

HB2494: Bill Disappoints, Satisfies Groups

Months before Oklahoma Attorney General Drew Edmondson filed suit against the major tobacco companies, the industry faced what many considered a significant threat to the way it does business in Oklahoma, HB2494.

The bill, authored by Rep. Ray Vaughn, R-Edmond, allows cities and towns to enact and local law enforcement officers to enforce "ordinances prohibiting and penalizing" the sale of tobacco products to minors. A caveat in the bill, however, prevents municipalities from enacting measures more stringent than state law on virtually any tobacco issue.

When introduced, the bill posed a much greater threat by empowering municipalities to do just the opposite — Enact ordinances more stringent than state law. The original bill carried the support of 42 members of

the House and 14 members of the Senate. Nine Oklahoma communities and the Oklahoma Municipal League formally endorsed the measure.

Vaughn, however, withdrew the original bill and offered a substitute, reversing the role of municipalities, much to the chagrin of anti-smoking groups, particularly those concerned with children's access to tobacco products.

The move appeared to set the stage for a major battle over the proposal. On April 9, the Senate passed the so-called Murcer Amendment, named for baseball legend Bobby Murcer, a one-time chewing tobacco pitchman turned anti-smoking advocate, which would have allowed cities and towns to pass local laws in three narrowly tailored areas:

- Prohibiting cigarette vending machines in areas accessible to children;
- Prohibiting self-service displays of tobacco in areas accessible to children; and
- Establishing a tobacco license for retailers with a possible seven-day suspension for stores that repeatedly sold tobacco products to children.

Despite pressure from groups like the American Cancer Society, the American Heart Association and others, the amendment was rejected by the conference committee assigned to the bill. When it made its way back to the floors of the Senate and the House, cities and towns had won the right to enact ordinances dealing with tobacco on a basis equal to or less than that of the state.

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by the legislature, is required by the federal government. Federal highway dollars depend on every state's passage of a zero tolerance law.

Developments Assessed at Fair Market Value

In order to right a wrong, Sen. Ted Fisher, D-Sapulpa, introduced **SB730** to change the way land on a current development is assessed. Rep. Wayne Cozort, R-Tulsa, is House sponsor of the bill.

Sen. Fisher explained a developer pours his own money into roads, water and sewer lines and electricity when raw land is being developed into building lots.

"In any development," Fisher said, "25 percent of the lots are prime, 25 percent are junk and the rest are mediocre."

"The best lots are always the first lots to sell," Fisher continued. After the sale the county assessor puts that value on all the remaining lots.

With the new law, the developer gets to keep the raw land valuation until the lot sells, after which, the new buyer isn't stuck with an assessment of prime land, because the lots are all assessed at fair market value.

"That's the cowboy definition," Sen. Fisher concluded.

Vehicle Accident Victims Provided New Protection

Among other senate bills to become law, **SB1147** limits access to written accident reports filed by law enforcement officers for accidents involving an injury, fatality, or damages in excess of \$300.

As a result of the new provisions, access to such reports will be limited to law enforcement officers, legal newspapers, and broadcast news entities.

The law prohibits using the accident report to contact any of the principals involved or relatives of those involved in an accident to attempt to solicit work or funds.

Small Town Medical Care Gets a Helting Hand

Sen. Bruce Price, D-Hinton, and Rep. Randy Beutler, D-Elk City, gave cities, towns and counties in Oklahoma an opportunity to take care of their own medical needs with **SB999**.

This new law allows those entities to create a hospital authority — with the approval of the people. Levying a two percent sales and service tax on themselves, rural cities, towns and counties can set up a board and funnel the two percent tax into a hospital or medical facility for local residents.

Danny George, assistant executive director of the Oklahoma Municipal League, said rural communities may not have a large enough tax base to support a hospital. "This bill gives them the ability to tax themselves and subsidize their medical care if they choose to do so," he said. "It's just another vehicle available to maintain rural medical care," he added.

Estate Tax Exemptions Rise for Farms, Businesses

Senator Bruce Price, D-Hinton, introduced legislation to raise the estate tax exemption for Oklahomans from \$175,000 to \$600,000. In the process, Price said, it was estimated the exemption would cause a \$16 million a year hit to the general revenue fund.

"The leadership thought the loss was too high," Price said, "but they liked the idea." So a compromise was reached.

The \$600,000 estate tax exemption passed in **SB 1111**; but only for inheritors of small businesses and farms.

"It helps with the economy," Price said, "because when an estate passes, those who inherit the property won't have to sell the business or farm to pay the taxes." And the hit to the general fund is only \$4 million a year, Price said.

Individuals are still limited to a \$175,000 estate tax exemption, but Price said, "I'm working on it."

Quality Jobs Program Extended

SB689, authored by Sen. Ted Fisher, D-Sapulpa, and Rep. Don McCorkell, D-Tulsa,

continues the Quality Jobs Program, Saving Quality Jobs and Former Military Facility Development Acts, by removing their sunset provisions. The bill requires the Oklahoma Department of Commerce to submit a report every three years documenting the results of these programs and their cost effectiveness.

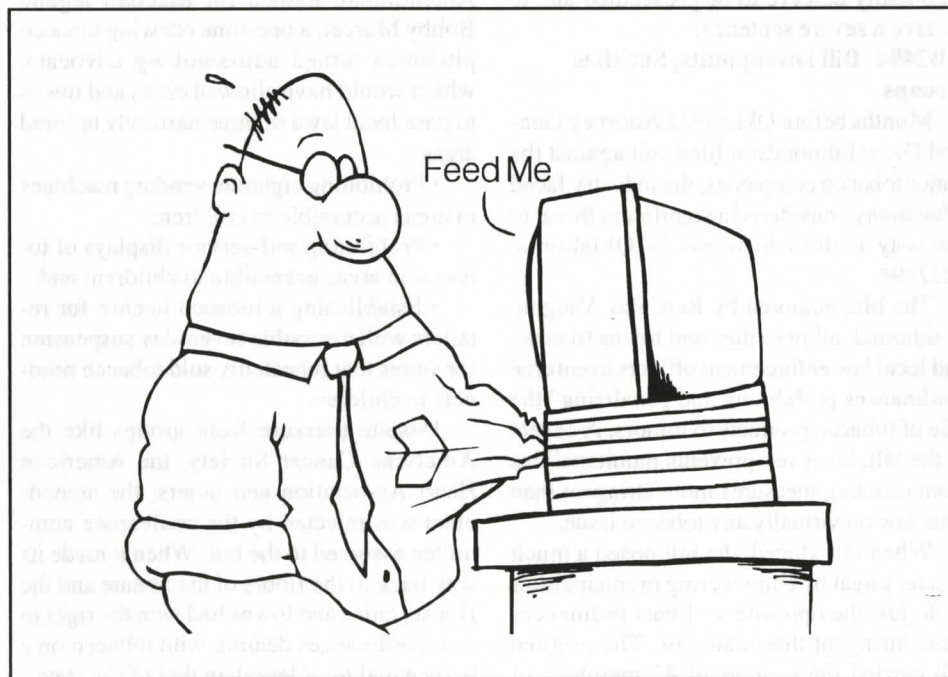
In 1996, the Oklahoma Quality Jobs Program Act continued its noticeable impact on Oklahoma's economy, and is credited for improvements to the Oklahoma economy. For the second consecutive year, Oklahoma added more than 30,000 net jobs. Oklahoma ranked fifth in the nation for growth in personal income for the third quarter of 1995.

As a basic premise of the Quality Jobs Program Act when it originally passed in 1993, the Legislature continued to focus on assisting certain basic industries which generally export their goods and services, and on creating growth which would not otherwise occur.

Investing in Electric Cars Gets a Tax Break

SB679, by Sen. Bill Gustafson, R-El Reno, and Rep. Jack Bonny, D-Burns Flat, extends the current tax credit for conversion of motor vehicles to alternative fuels at 50 percent of the expense. The amount was scheduled to be lowered to 20 percent in 1997.

The bill also extends the tax credit to conversion of motor vehicles to electric power.
